The City of Riviera Bach has always recognized the life and legacy of Dr. martin Luther King, Jr. Dr. King was at the forefront of fighting for equality and access for all people. His contribution to this nation is immeasurable and as his contribution to this nation, we recognize and celebrate the amazing works that he has done as a remarkable person. The City has taken great strides to celebrate Dr. King, bringing together our community from young to old, from east to west, so just holding events such as the MLK senior luncheon, the MLK gala parade, the MLK black and white soiree, the MLK day of service, CRA food drive and the MLK free movie series.

We understand that the torch still burns bright and that the dream is still obtainable. But there is much work left to be done. And as a community and a City, we celebrate those who seek to bring unity and peace, and to spread love and affection to all. And as a result of Dr. King's legacy, the City of Riviera Beach, Florida proffers a Resolution to honor Dr. King and to celebrate what would have been his 90th birthday. And so, in brief, I will quickly read part of that Resolution. And it states:

City Manager Evans: Madam Chair, this Item before you is the process associated with a bid protest. I will ask that the City Attorney provide some context as how we got to this particular point, and then I believe it is a opportunity that both Staff will have an opportunity to present, as well as the entity, that is the existing service provider.

- 342 Attorney Wynn.
- 343 City Attorney Wynn: Thank you, Mr. Manager. Good evening, Madam Chair,
 344 Members of the Council.
- 345 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Good evening.

346 City Attorney Wynn: In late June of 2019, the City publicly solicited for services to
 347 provide security guard services for City Hall, the City Library and Public Safety building.
 348 Five security firms submitted proposals and City Staff selected and recommended Norred

349 & Associates. In accordance with the City's Procurement Code, Giddens Security 350 Services.., Security Corporation are our current provider of security services, filed a 351 written bid protest and requested a hearing. Also according to the Code, the hearing 352 must occur before City Council who shall listen to the evidence and make a decision, and 353 make a motion, to vote upon whether or not to uphold Staff's recommendation. You will 354 be voting to either deny the protest or to reverse Staff's recommendation and award to 355 Giddens.

356 This is a quasi-judicial hearing. My understanding is that you have not done this 357 before in the past, but it's in our Code and this is the process that we have to follow. The witnesses for each side will be sworn in by the City Clerk and they will each be given ten 358 359 minutes to present their case, a maximum of ten minutes. They don't have to use the full 360 ten minutes. You'll have the opportunity to ask guestions and.., of other either side, if you 361 desire. And, the standard of proof in this proceeding is whether or not the City's Procurement Department, whether their actions were clearly erroneous, arbitrary, 362 363 contrary to competition or capricious. I'll be advising the City Council in this matter and Ms. Busby will be assisting Mr. Little, our Director of Procurement. There's a, a rule in 364 Florida law that I can't do both. I can't advise you, it's called dual representation. I can't 365 advise you and advise the Staff. But my office can do both, and so that's what we're 366 367 doing.

368 So, at this time, Mr. Little will.., if you'll come up, along with Ms. Busby and present 369 the City's position as it relates to this procurement, how you arrived at the decision to 370 award to Norred & Associates.

- 371 **Councilperson McCoy:** Madam Chair?
- 372 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

373 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, let's ask some, some, I guess, some procedural questions 374 before we hear a presentation. So, the standards... If I can, Madam Chair?

375 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

376 **Councilperson McCoy:** Ms. Wynn, the standards that you just provided, you went 377 through it pretty quickly.

- 378 **City Attorney Wynn:** I'm sorry.
- 379 **Councilperson McCoy:** Is that something that you have that can be distributed to us, 380 right now? Or...

City Attorney Wynn: I can repeat it to you. I can remind you of it. I don't have it to hand out to you. The standards are whether or not the decision of Staff was clearly erroneous. That means there was no way that they could make the decision that they made, because it was incorrect. Whether it was arbitrary or capricious, and whether it's contrary to competition.

386 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, Madam Chair, if I can follow up and ask...

- 387 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Go ahead.
- 388 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, I'm., so I'm clear, the standard is having met any one of these?
- 390 **City Attorney Wynn:** Correct.
- 391 Councilperson McCoy: Not all of them?
- 392 **City Attorney Wynn:** Correct. Anyone.
- 393 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, clearly erroneous, arbitrary...
- 394 **City Attorney Wynn:** And capricious... Or capricious.
- 395 **Councilperson McCoy:** And capricious.
- 396 **City Attorney Wynn:** Arbitrary or capricious.
- 397 **Councilperson McCoy:** Or capricious. And then...
- 398City Attorney Wynn:Contrary...
- 399 **City Attorney Wynn:** Contrary to competition.
- 400 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...to competition.

401 **City Attorney Wynn:** And, just to also explain, there are also rules against ex parte 402 communication because this is a quasi-judicial hearing, so I could not give you information 403 prior to giving it to them or giving them the opportunity at the same time. So you are 404 hearing all of this for the very first time. Which is what the rules require.

- 405 **Councilperson McCoy:** Follow up.
- 406 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Go ahead.

407 **Councilperson McCoy:** Do you have a textbook definition or example of what you 408 would describe as contrary to competition?

409 **City Attorney Wynn:** Contrary to competition would be, for instance, if there, if there 410 was no competition. If, if we put in place.., if the City put in place some rules that only 411 allowed, for instance, one vendor to be able to meet the standards that we put in. If we 412 made it noncompetitive.

- 413 [Pause]
- 414 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Anything else, Mr. McCoy?
- 415 **Councilperson McCoy:** That's it for now. Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 416 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. Anyone else?
- 417 **Councilperson Lawson:** Madam Chair?

CITY COUNCIL MEETING

418 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Yes.

419 Councilperson Lawson: Thank you. Attorney Wynn, the solutions that we're looking
 420 to come up with, you stated that we would either have the option of awarding or denying
 421 Gidden's Security bid protest. What were the other options?

422 **City Attorney Wynn:** If you deny the bid protest and agree with Staff, then Norred 423 should be the awardee. That's who will be.., who the contracted will be awarded to.

424 **Councilperson Lawson:** Mhmm.

425 **City Attorney Wynn:** If you disagree and you find one of the options that I gave you, 426 that it's contrary to competition, arbitrary or capricious, or clearly erroneous, then you 427 would deny'.., you would.., you would not uphold Staff's recommendation. You would.., 428 you would not affirm Staff's recommendation and you would either award to the next 429 lowest bidder. And you would determine who that tis based on the evidence presented, 430 or you could reject all of the bids and we could start the process over.

- 431 **Councilperson Lawson:** Okay. Thank you.
- 432 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. Any'...
- 433 **Councilperson McCoy:** Follow up.
- 434 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 435 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, wouldn't, I guess, you're mentioning Norred. Isn't that 436 mutually exclusive from what we have here before us, right now?
- 437 **City Attorney Wynn:** There's a...
- 438 **Councilperson McCoy:** Are we...

439 City Attorney Wynn: ...separate Agenda Item for Norred Security Services, or
440 Norred & Associates. They, according to Staff, they were the responsive..., lowest and
441 responsive bidder. Th'..., that is who Staff would have awarded to, or did award to I guess,
442 prior to Giddens filing a protest. They would have been the City's security firm. And Staff
443 will show you how they arrived at that decision.

444 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. So I'm clear, so when we start, they're gonna have 445 their [stammer], ten minutes. Is there straight testimony? Do we question? Like, what 446 happens about that process? Do we have any authority or ability to ask questions?

447 City Attorney Wynn: Yes, you do. What I would prefer, and Staff would probably 448 prefer as well, is if you allow them to get through, Staff and, and the Giddens firm, if you 449 allow them to get through their presentation. After Staff presents, you can Staff questions. 450 Then, the Giddens firm will come up, they'll present, you can ask them questions. And 451 then, if you have follow up questions even after that, you're, you're able to answer those 452 questions.

453 Councilperson McCoy: So l'm...

454 **City Attorney Wynn:** Ask those questions.

455 **Councilperson McCoy:** I, I have to make a joke outta this. This is gonna be really 456 funny but, I was actually watching MSNBC today and the argument was that we're being 457 asked to make a decision on something that we don't even have all of the evidence before 458 we start the trial.

459 **City Attorney Wynn:** Mhmm.

460 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, my question is, whatever claim that Giddens is gonna 461 present, is there gonna be something formal presented to us so we're not expected to be 462 able to, I guess, transcribe and remember every facet of what they're argument is while 463 we're deliberating?

464 **City Attorney Wynn:** Staff may have handouts, the Giddens firm may have 465 handouts, they may have PowerPoints, but you won't be able to deliberate now and 466 decide later necessarily. That's the purpose of this. You, you are coming into this with a 467 clean mind, not jaded at all and you're hearing all of this for the first time.

- 468 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay.
- 469 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Everyone's ready?
- 470 **City Attorney Wynn:** So, if we can have the Clerk swear in anyone who is going to 471 testify in this matter. On both sides. You could...
- 472 [Comments and chuckles as parties come to podium]

473 **City Clerk Anthony:** Is this everyone that will testify on this? Can I get each of you 474 to raise your right hand and repeat after me? Or should I say, just say, 'I do,' if you affirm 475 to the statement that I'm about to give. Do each of you swear or affirm to tell the truth in 476 the testimony that you give so help you God?

477 **All:** I do.

478 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, they have been [stammer] duly sworn in. No 479 one that has been sworn in can testify regarding this matter.

- 480 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright.
- 481 **Councilperson McCoy:** You mean no one that has not been sworn in.
- 482 **City Clerk Anthony:** I'm sorry. You're correct.
- 483 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** I knew what you meant, but thank you for clarifying.
- 484 [Chuckles]
- 485 **City Clerk Anthony:** We just want the record to be correct.
- 486 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** And Lagree.

- 487 **City Clerk Anthony:** That has not been sworn in. [Chuckle].
- 488 **Councilperson McCoy:** 'Cause, I mean, we can end it right now, 'cause...
- 489 [Chuckles]

490 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Good evening.

Assistant City Attorney Busby: Good evening, Chair. Good evening, Members of the
 City Council, Mr. Evans, City Manager.

Mr. Little is our Interim Director of Procurement and he's going to present to you the invitation for bid for security guard services and he's going to explain the process and the scoring process that the City utilized in this matter. At the end of his explanation, I'll be able to address you again. During such time, I am going to pass out, and I've already given it to the Giddens group. I'm gonna pass out the bid number 980194, and you're not gonna see.., the only thing you're gonna see is exactly what each applicant received when this bid was published.

500 And, here's Mr. Little.

501 **Interim Procurement Director Little:** Good evening, Council. Ricky Little, Interim 502 Director of Procurement.

503 The process tonight, I'll give you a small explanation about what we actually did. 504 In June, we actually submitted a solicitation for security guard service, both armed and 505 unarmed. We received five proposals, with one of the proposals being nonresponsive 506 due to the did not submit a bid bond. At that point, we reviewed the proposals that came 507 in and we based the award based on the lowest responsive bidder. And our Code 508 basically says if a specific award is not established [inaudible] to the bidders, 509 specifications or special conditions of the bid, the award shall be to the responsive bidder 510 with the lowest responsive bid. And in our case, we had two commodities that we were 511 dealing with, armed security guards and unarmed security guards. And out of all the 512 proposals that came in. Norred was the lowest responsive bidder, for unarmed security quards. And that was the basis of the award. 513

- 514 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. That's it for your presentation?
- 515 **Interim Procurement Director Little:** Yes, ma'am.
- 516 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. So, [inaudible].
- 517 Assistant City Attorney Busby: If I...
- 518 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 519 Assistant City Attorney Busby: Madam Chair?
- 520 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mhmm.
- 521 **City Clerk Anthony:** [Inaudible].

522 Assistant City Attorney Busby: In Mr. Little's presentation, the scoring process as 523 applied by the Procurement Director was not erroneous, it was not arbitrary, capricious 524 or contrary to law. He chose the lowest price submittal here, no matter what the category. 525 Sixteen eighty-nine was the lowest price submittal, per hour. And, as he said, TriCor and Norred both tied as the lowest priced submittal. However, TriCor's references didn't 526 527 respond and they were deemed, by the Procurement Director, as nonresponsive. That's 528 important because, or else they could have had this awarded to them as well. The intent 529 of... to award, went to Norred as the lowest responsible... responsive bidder who's bid 530 met the requirements and criteria set forth in that invitation for bids, that you are reviewing 531 right now. If Giddens had submitted the lowest priced submittal, meaning if their submittal was sixteen eighty-nine or below, Giddens would've been chosen as the lowest 532 533 responsible and responsive bidder. The invitation to bid is clear, it says, the contract will 534 be awarded to the lowest responsible and responsive bidder.

535 Moreover, if you move to.., and I tabbed it for your ease, if you move to number 536 twenty-four in those instructions, it has specific basis of award is not established in the 537 instructions to the bidders, specifications are special conditions of the bid, the award shall 538 be to the responsible bidder with the lowest responsive bid meeting the written 539 specifications. According to the City Code of Ordinances, Section 16.5, bids shall be 540 evaluated based on their requirement set forth in the invitation for bids. Subsection d, the 541 contract shall be awarded to the lowest responsible and responsive bidder whose meets 542 the requirements and criteria set forth in the invitation for bids. And here, that 543 determination, made by our Procurement Director, was simply a scoring process that looked at what was the lowest priced submittal? And here it was, sixteen eighty-nine. 544 545 And that's how that bid was awarded in the intent.

- 546 Thank you.
- 547 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay. Questions from the Board?
- 548 **Councilperson McCoy:** Yes.
- 549 [Inaudible comments]
- 550
- 551 **Councilperson McCoy:** Madam Chair?
- 552 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 553 **Councilperson McCoy:** Assistant City Attorney, you referenced 16.5. I think you said subsection d.
- 555 Assistant City Attorney Busby: Subsection g. I...
- 556 Councilperson McCoy: G?

557 **Assistant City Attorney Busby:** Yes. And, I brought a, a physical copy this evening. Of 558 our Code. [Pause]. So, 16.5, competitive sealed bidding, 'g'. Award. 'The contract shall 559 be awarded with reasonable promptness by appropriate written notice to the lowest

- responsible and responsive bidder, whose bid meets the requirements and criteria set forth in the invitation for bids. [Pause].
- 562 Thank you.
- 563 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Do we have any other comments? Or questions for the 564 Staff?
- 565 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair, I was...
- 566 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 567 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...looking at the last page, the next to the last page where it 568 had the, the details of the bid.
- 569 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 570 **Councilperson Lanier:** And, [pause], it says unresponsive, no bid bond. What does 571 that mean?
- 572 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: It's...
- 573 **Councilperson Lanier:** Or that first one, that was [stammer] like, the lowest one, but 574 then it says no bid bond.
- Assistant City Attorney Busby: Okay. Excuse me. This was not provided in the bid package. I must have attached this, but this is what was..., what was prepared by Mr. Little and it's the bid tabulation score sheet, and, the section on unresponsive no bid bond. Deluxe Security actually would have been awarded this bid, however, 'cause you see \$16.00 an hour was..., they would've had the lowest responsive and responsible bid, however, they became unresponsive because they could not produce the verification for a bid bond. Which is a requirement in this invitation to bid.
- 582 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Anything else, Ms. Lanier?
- 583 **Councilperson Lanier:** No. Not at this time.
- 584 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** I have a question. So, I know you mentioned unarmed 585 and armed, and you're only referring to the unarmed. Is that.., is it separate or it's... Is 586 the armed separate from the unarmed?
- 587 **Assistant City Attorney Busby:** Well, I'll let Mr. Little answer, it's factually. But, I will 588 say that he looked at it in, in its entirety.
- 589 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 590 **Interim Procurement Director Little:** Good evening again, Chair.
- 591 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Good evening.

592 **Interim Procurement Director Little:** Again, we did look at both categories and when 593 we ran the total numbers for both armed and unarmed, the actual number was actually 594 lower for Norred, using a forty hour work week for both armed and unarmed. Their total 595 was actually lower than Giddens was.

- 596 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay. Alright.
- 597 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair?
- 598 Councilperson McCoy: So...
- 599 **Councilperson Lanier:** I'm sorry.

600 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Because I was just looking, so City Hall and Library 601 security officer unarmed, Norred has sixteen eighty-nine and Giddens had seventy 602 twenty-eight. So, in that category, Norred was the lowest. And then the armed section, 603 Norred had eighteen 'o' nine, and Giddens had seventeen ninety-two.

604 Interim Procurement Director Little: Correct.

605 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** So, you're saying once you added up all of those 606 sections, the Public Safety Building, armed and unarmed, they.., Norred still came out...

- 607 Interim Procurement Director Little: They still came...
- 608 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...the lowest?
- 609 Interim Procurement Director Little: ...out the lowest. And please be reminded that
- again, we award it on the lowest, even though we had two commodities, we award it on
- 611 the lowest commodity.
- 612 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** On the lowest commodity?
- 613 Interim Procurement Director Little: Correct.
- 614 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay.
- 615 [Inaudible comment]
- 616 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** So, you're saying the sixteen eighty-nine...
- 617 Interim Procurement Director Little: Sixteen eighty-nine.
- 618 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Because that was.., they look at the lowest one per 619 section?
- 620 **UNK:** Overall.
- 621 Interim Procurement Director Little: Correct.
- 622 Councilperson Lawson: Madam Chair?

623 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

624 **Councilperson Lawson:** Thank you. Mr. Little, the number of officers that are in place 625 for armed versus the unarmed, did we take an estimate to how many officers we actually 626 are using, whether it's armed and unarmed?

- 627 **Interim Procurement Director Little:** Councilman Lawson, since I don't run that 628 program, I don't know how many officers they actually have.
- 629 **Councilperson Lawson:** So, with us using the lowest responsive bid, that means we 630 just looked at the unarmed security, at the sixteen eighty-nine but we may only have three 631 unarmed security at sixteen eighty-nine, and the remaining Staff could all be armed, at a 632 higher price?
- 633 Interim Procurement Director Little: That is correct.
- 634 **Councilperson Lawson:** So, essentially, the contract would be possibly priced higher 635 with Norred & Associates? If we consider all of the Staff.
- 636 Interim Procurement Director Little: But since we don't have that number... Like I 637 said, I went back and did a total comparison of both armed and unarmed, using a forty 638 hour work week for both the armed guard and unarmed guard for one week's worth of 639 work...
- 640 **Councilperson Lawson:** Mhmm.
- 641 Interim Procurement Director Little: ...and when we ran that number, again, Norred
- 642 was the lowest responsive bidder. Even though that was not the requirement for the 643 proposal, or...
- 644 **Councilperson Lawson:** But how many...
- 645 Interim Procurement Director Little: ...[inaudible].
- 646 **Councilperson Lawson:** How many officers did you base it on? Just based on one 647 officer?
- 648 Interim Procurement Director Little: One. Just one.
- 649 **Councilperson Lawson:** But this contract is based on staffing the entire facility.
- 650 **Interim Procurement Director Little:** Again, like I said, I don't run that program so I don't know how many officers we have doing that.
- 652 **Councilperson Lawson:** Okay. Thank you, Mr. Little.
- 653 **Councilperson McCoy:** Question.
- 654 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

655 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, le'.., and I think I may be asking the same thing as 656 Councilperson Lawson but in a different, I guess, in different verbiage or... Are we, I 657 guess, are we.., I guess, your job is to assess or base your determination on the rate, 658 regardless.., irrespective of how many officers we're using. Right? Whether...

- 659 Interim Procurement Director Little: Yes.
- 660 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...it's ten or whether it's one?
- 661 Interim Procurement Director Little: That is correct, Councilman.
- 662 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, it's sixteen eighty-nine regardless. Right?
- 663 Interim Procurement Director Little: Regardless.
- 664 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, does the bid account for, or provide for, any economies of 665 scale discounts or anything like that?
- 666 Interim Procurement Director Little: It did not.

667 **Councilperson McCoy:** Without seeing their submittal, is that something that was 668 permitted.., I guess submitted by Norred? Did they proffer this number based on some 669 proposed discount that they may be receiving?

- 670 **Interim Procurement Director Little:** They based it on an unarmed guard and an 671 armed guard, with an hourly rate.
- 672 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, just their regular rate?
- 673 Interim Procurement Director Little: Correct.
- 674 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.
- 675 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Anyone...
- 676 **Councilperson McCoy:** That's it.
- 677 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...else? [Pause]. Alright. That's it for this side?
- 678 **City Attorney Wynn:** Correct.
- 679 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 680 **City Attorney Wynn:** The Giddens' presentation?
- 681 **Mr. A. Giddens:** Good evening everyone.
- 682 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Good evening.

683 **Mr. A. Giddens:** Madam Chair, Council Members. My name is Adam Giddens. I am 684 a CPA and the Chief Financial Officer of Giddens Security Corporation. As you've learned 685 tonight or already know, we are the current security provider for the City of Riviera Beach. 686 We are a Florida firm, with a local presence. We are competent and stable and have 687 provided security officer services for over thirty-seven years to numerous public and 688 private entities, including multiple counties and cities across Florida.

I am here today for an appeal of the recent notice of intent to award the security services bid to Norred & Associates. The City's Purchasing Code, Section 8-101, allows for the right to appeal before the City Council. As 8-101 requires, we had first sought resolution with the Director of Purchasing, and secondly, with the City Manager prior to appealing before you all tonight. Per your Code, I'm allowed for ten minutes to present tonight, and I will not amend or supplement anything we have provided to date as required in your Code.

696 So with that, I'll begin with a quick recap of the facts. As the Assistant City 697 [stammer] Attorney stated, and I previously stated, we're the current and [stammer] provider of security services to the City. We were awarded on a bidding process in 2015. 698 699 The term of our current contract with the City, including all the renewal options, was 700 coming to an end so the City had to put this out for bid. As stated, it went out to bid on June 28, 2019. On July 17, 2019, there were guestions released in an addendum to the 701 702 bid. It is standard process to have questions asked by bidders and then Procurement responds in an addendum with clarification. So, that process played out and then the 703 704 bids were due July 30th, was the deadline, and which my company, and four other 705 companies, submitted a proposal.

So, in.., with this being an ITB, in order to have your pricing considered, as is
normal for this bidding process, you have to be deemed responsive and responsible.
Those are two very important terms. This means you have to meet certain minimum
requirements, such as references your company's insurance, the fact that you signed all
required forms and, as stated, one bidder was thrown out due to the bid bond. The, the
City defines it this way. So, the ITB process...

- 712 **Councilperson McCoy:** Can you full screen that, Ms...
- 713 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** She.., it's gonna take the time away.
- 714 **Councilperson McCoy:** That's fine.
- 715 **City Clerk Anthony:** [Inaudible].
- 716 **Councilperson McCoy:** She can keep track of time.
- 717 **UNK:** Yeah.
- 718 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: [Chuckle].
- 719 **Mr. A. Giddens:** So...
- 720 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Maybe he wants to keep track of time.
- 721 [Inaudible comment]

- 722 **Mr. A. Giddens:** I'll...
- 723 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Can he see?
- 724 **City Clerk Anthony:** He can't see...
- 725 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Just...
- 726 Mr. A. Giddens: Well, I, I can...
- 727 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...turn it a little bit.
- 728 **Mr. A. Giddens:** ...glance over here and see.
- 729 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay. Alright.
- 730 Mr. A. Giddens: Yeah. That's...
- 731 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright.

732 Mr. A. Giddens: ...fine. So, companies respond to the invitation to bid. The City of 733 Riviera determines which companies are responsive and responsible. The Purchase Code, 1-201, responsible bidder, a person who has submitted a bid which conforms in all 734 735 respects, to perform fully the contract requirements and the tenacity, perseverance, 736 experience, integrity, reliability, facilities, equipment and credit which will assure good faith performance. So, that's responsible. Responsive is a person who has submitted a 737 738 bid which conforms in all material aspects to the requirements set forth in the ITB. So, 739 once companies have deemed the responsible and responsiveness, per Section 3-101. 740 Subsection 7, the contract shall be awarded with reasonable promptness, by appropriate 741 written notice to the lowest responsible and responsive bidder, whose bid meets the 742 requirements and criteria set forth in the ITB. My company was deemed responsive and 743 responsible, by City's Purchasing. So was Norred & Associates. So, once this threshold 744 is met, price is now king. Low price wins the contract.

745 So, there are two types of security officers provided to the City, armed with a 746 firearm and unarmed. The bid price form in the ITB you were given tonight, had price for unarmed and unarmed. It also, also showed scope of work, with specific hours, 747 748 schedules, locations of guards to be provided. So, in my opinion, it is erroneous to go off 749 of just the unarmed rate to award this when, in the ITB that you're supposed to bid off of, 750 showed you the exact hours, locations and types of service to be [stammer] provided. 751 So, Giddens submitted bill rates of seventy twenty-eight, for unarmed and seventeen 752 ninety-two for armed. Norred submitted bill rates of sixteen eighty-nine for unarmed and 753 eighteen 'o' nine for armed. So you can see, they were lower on unarmed, but we're 754 lower on armed. So, how do you determine the low bidder? Council, I think you've already kind have gotten to that point in your thought process. You said [stammer], 'Do 755 756 you base it off of just that one unarmed rate?' To me, that's arbitrary and erroneous. So, 757 let's look at the actual hours to determine the low bidders. Hourly rate that's to be 758 multiplied by the amount of armed and unarmed hours the City actually utilizes. Currently and historically, and I know this because we are the incumbent, and I also know this 759

because it is in our ITB, there was specific schedules. The City utilizes two hundred and
twenty-either hours a week of armed, and only fifty-eight hours a week of unarmed. So,
if you do the math, there are more armed hours. So, let's do the math, Giddens is lower.
We're the low bidder. We're responsive and responsible, and we're the lowest priced
firm.

765 So, in spite of clear data, on August 29, 2019, the City posted their notice of intent to award to Norred & Associates. Following the City's protest procedures, my company 766 submitted a protest to the Purchasing Director, and then to the City Manager, on this 767 768 intent to award, because we are clearly the low bidder. Our protest was denied with a basis and I quote from the City Attorney, 'The City's use of unarmed guards at the Library 769 facility far exceeds its use of armed guards, and thus, resulted in Norred prevailing as the 770 771 lowest responsible and responsive bidder. So, for some reason in her denial of our 772 protest, Ms. Wynn focused only the Library area, and even then, the statement is incorrect. She states that he number of unarmed guards at the Library far exceeds the 773 774 armed guards. It is actually the opposite. More armed guard hours are used at the Library than armed. The Library utilizes fifty-eight weekly hours of unarmed and sixty-eight 775 armed. So, if you do just the math on the Library, would show that Giddens is still the 776 lowest bidder. And for the City as a whole, as my diagram shows, the armed services 777 778 substantially exceed the quantity of unarmed hours.

779 To me, this is clearly erroneous, arbitrary and contrary to competition. Μv 780 company is the clear best value and most responsive and responsible bidder, saving the City and the taxpayers thousands of dollars. Giddens Security should've been ranked 781 782 first and so should be awarded this contract. Moreover, our bid best satisfies the interest 783 of competitive bidding, which is the spirit of Florida state statues, as well as the City of Riviera Beach Purchasing Code. I am asking the City Council to rescind the attempt to 784 award to Norred and instead, award the contract Giddens. As the [stammer].., as the 785 786 incumbent company, there have been no questions ever raised about the quality of our work experience with the City. And in fact, Giddens has performed all services with the 787 788 City, under our existing contract, in a very satisfactory manner.

789 And lastly, in case this gets brought up for discussion and it has been asked 790 already about..., regarding canceling the ITB and rejecting all bids. Section 3-107, of your 791 Purchasing Code, states: 'An invitation to bid may be cancelled, or any or all bids or 792 proposals may be rejected when it is for good cause and in the best interest of the City. 793 In this case tonight, there's no indication that cancelling this ITB and rejecting all bids, 794 would be for a good cause and in the best interest of the City. The competitive bidding 795 process has worked. What's in the best interest of the City is to award this contract to the 796 lowest responsive, responsible bidder, which is Giddens. Giddens, not Norred, will save 797 the citizens and taxpayers of the City the most over the four year term of this contract.

- 798 Thank you for your time.
- 799 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Thank you.
- 800 **Councilperson McCoy:** Question.

801 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

802 **Councilperson McCoy:** Mr. Giddens, so, obviously you're at an advantage that the 803 other five firms didn't have knowing exactly what those hours and demands currently, at 804 the time, was for the City. Is that correct?

- 805 Mr. A. Giddens: Well, [stammer] I mentioned...
- 806 **Councilperson McCoy:** I mean, it's...
- 807 **Mr. A. Giddens:** ...we...
- 808 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...either yes or no.
- 809 **Mr. A. Giddens:** Well, it's in the ITB what the scope of work is.
- 810 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right. But, there's nothing that indicates hours.
- 811 **Mr. A. Giddens:** Yes, there is.

812 **Councilperson McCoy:** I'm looking at the ITB and it speaks of location but it doesn't 813 give a total number of hours. Nor does it speak of...

814 **Mr. A. Giddens:** If you go to... It's not numbered but it says City Hall guards. I think 815 it's the next page, probably what you're looking at. It says first guard, 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 816 p.m., second guard, 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Right above that, it's two armed guards to be 817 stationed at the lobby entrance of City Hall.

- 818 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: What page...
- 819 Mr. A. Giddens: And as you go down...
- 820 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ... is that? What page is that?
- 821 Councilperson McCoy: It's not numbered. It's...
- 822 Mr. A. Giddens: Well, it's not numbered...
- 823 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...in the mid'... It's about, it's about ten pages in. Scope of 824 work.

Mr. A. Giddens: It's about twelve pages in. You have the, the scope of work at the 825 826 top, and then when you go to the next page, it gets into [stammer], you know, specifics of 827 what is actually being asked for here. And I, I do a lot of these bids and proposals for the 828 company and this is standard that you, you put what you're actually hiring the company 829 for so that when you do your bids, you know whether or not you wanna price your unarmed rate lower or higher, based on the amount of hours. What you.., what you 830 would do if you award it to Norred, they could essentially do a bid rate of \$50 an hour for 831 armed and sixteen twenty-eight for unarmed and you say, 'Oh, that's the low bidder.' 832 They're not the low bidder. We're talking a close margin but we're the low bidder and 833 price is king on an invitation to bid. 834

- 835 [Pause]
- 836 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Anything else, Mr. McCoy?

837 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, this only speaks of those that's provided at City Hall. Did 838 you, I guess, make a determination, a.., I guess, an estimate about the other requirements 839 for the Utility Department and the Library?

840 **Mr. A. Giddens:** We need to see the addendum because I did mention that usually 841 there's questions asked, and usually, you know, the company asks what are the total 842 hours you use? They ask for the previous company's invoices or contract to get that 843 information. Then, an addendum is released.

- 844 Councilperson McCoy: So, I...
- 845 **Mr. A. Giddens**:
- 846 I...
- 847 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...guess...

848 **Mr. A. Giddens:** [Stammer] but following what I think you're asking is, in your scope 849 of work, it says.., on the previous page, for scope of work it shows you your City Hall and 850 mun'.., municipal Library, then it shows you your Public Safety Building, which it says two 851 armed security guards is required.

852 Councilperson McCoy: Mhmm.

853 Mr. A. Giddens: And then right above that, City Hall Municipal Library, two or more 854 armed security guards are required. So, if you were going in this as a bidder that had... 855 you were in the dark, you had no idea what the City's' actually utilizing, you would read this, I would assume, that it's all armed. The, the bulk of your weight is gonna be towards 856 armed. You say that two armed security guards are provided for City Hall and the Library, 857 858 then you say two armed security guards are provided for the Public Safety Building. 859 Nowhere does it really even mention unarmed. But, what's normal is this type of purchasing, with the a city or county government, is they want the option to go with armed 860 861 or unarmed, so they ask for both those rates. So sometimes you bid., the., it'll say the 862 award's gonna be based on armed only, but we want you to price unarmed in case we 863 wanna purchase an unarmed guard.

So, that's kinda what you guys did in your I'.., in your.., towards your last page for your price sheet, you had armed and unarmed but, like I said, looking at your scope of work, you elude to most of it is armed.

- 867 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Anyone else?
- 868 **Councilperson Lawson:** Madam Chair?

869 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** I'm, I'm sorry. Mr. McCoy, are you done? Or, can 870 come back or what?

- 871 Councilperson McCoy: You can come back.,
- 872 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. Mr. Lawson.
- 873 Councilperson Lawson: Madam Chair?
- 874 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 875 Councilperson Lawson: Ms. Wynn, will we have an opportunity to ask some questions
 876 to our Procurement Director and [inaudible]...
- 877 **City Attorney Wynn:** Yes.
- 878 **Councilperson Lawson:** Okay.
- 879 **City Attorney Wynn:** You can go back and forth.
- 880 Councilperson Lawson: [Inaudible].
- 881 **City Attorney Wynn:** The timing for presentations is over, but you can still continue 882 to ask questions so that you can arrive at your decision.
- 883 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. Are you wanting Mr. Little back?
- 884 **Councilperson Lawson:** Mr. Little, please.
- 885 Councilperson McCoy: Well...
- 886 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Huh?
- 887 **Councilperson McCoy:** Before he comes back, he's...
- 888 Councilperson Lawson: [Inaudible].
- 889 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...we.., we're still on his time. So I wanna ask Mr. Giddens...
- 890 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Were you still doing your presentation or you were 891 done?
- 892 **Mr. A. Giddens:** Well, the presentation's done. Question and answers is fine.
- 893 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: He was done with presentation?
- 894 **City Attorney Wynn:** Correct.
- 895 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 896 **Councilperson McCoy:** So we'll...
- 897 **City Attorney Wynn:** But you can still con'...
- 898 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...be able to go back...

- 899 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yeah.
- 900 Councilperson McCoy: ...and forth...
- 901 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: You can go back and forth.
- 902 **City Attorney Wynn:** You can still cont'...,
- 903 Councilperson Lawson: [Inaudible].
- 904 **City Attorney Wynn:** ... you can continue now or you can go back.
- 905 Councilperson McCoy: Well... Well, okay. So...
- 906 Councilperson Lawson: [Inaudible].

907 **Councilperson McCoy:** Even looking at the scope, Mr. Giddens, I'm looking at the two 908 guards and I'm estimating [pause], just for argument sake, and I guess in, in.., to lend to 909 your, your point, so, if we take the first guard and second guard, and we're assuming that 910 that applies for both the City Hall Complex, as well as 1481 West 15th Street.

- 911 **Mr. A. Giddens:** Right.
- 912 **Councilperson McCoy:** I'm looking at thirty-six hours a day. Is that accurate?
- 913 **Mr. A. Giddens:** Well, if you were to.., I guess, if you were to assume that there were 914 eight hour shifts, and...
- 915 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, this says nine. So, nine and nine is...
- 916 Mr. A. Giddens: So, yeah. Okay.
- 917 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...eighteen.
- 918 **Mr. A. Giddens:** So there is...
- 919 **Councilperson McCoy:** And then.
- 920 **Mr. A. Giddens:** It does say it. I missed it. So it does say nine hours.
- 921 **Councilperson McCoy:** So thirty-six hours per day would be your...
- 922 Mr. A. Giddens: Nine times...
- 923 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...estimate for armed...
- 924 Mr. A. Giddens: Correct.

925 **Councilperson McCoy:** However, the price sheet, what we have in front of us, Staff 926 took the rate of unarmed and awarded it to Norred based on the sixty eighty-nine rate.

927 Mr. A. Giddens: Correct.

928 **Councilperson McCoy:** Instead of your seventeen twenty-eight rate?

929 Mr. A. Giddens: And that is the entire basis for our protest. I mean, we're not an 930 argumentative company. If we were not the lower and I truly didn't feel we were low, we 931 would not being..., putting everybody through this. I mean, that's why we protested. We, 932 you know, we're not litigious and argumentative but to me, this is the most clear black 933 and white type of reason to protest. I mean, we're.., your, your bid says armed. You can 934 do the math like did, nine times four is thirty-six. There's no math to do on unarmed. So, any, anybody that would numbers driven and doing this bid would, would do that. They 935 936 would say, well the... the hours that probably are gonna be looked at here are armed, 937 that's what you guys are hiring for. You got two hundred and twenty-eight hours a week 938 more of armed. You got fifty-eight of unnamed.

939 Councilperson McCoy: So how do you arrive at two twenty-eight? I mean, if I'm taking
 940 thirty-six...

941 Mr. A. Giddens: Well, we'll see that, that's where we need to go back to the bid 'cause
942 I know what we do now. I know what the City does now. It's two twenty-eight a week
943 armed and fifty-eight unarmed. But it., legally, I guess, you would have to...

944 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well...

945 Mr. A. Giddens: ...stick to the ITB and that'd be thirty-six daily armed. Times five 946 days a week. So you could do the math that way. But either way, we're the low bidder. 947 The way you're thinking is the correct way, with tis ITB. You have to look... You know, 948 you can't say, well.., because Giddens has the.., as the incumbent knows what's being 949 done. You have to look at, what does the bid say you're hiring for? Armed. And then 950 you do the math, we would, we would far lower on our total then. 'Cause our unarmed 951 rate's a lot lower. You're looking at thirty-six times five.

- 952 **Councilperson McCoy:** One eighty.
- 953 Mr. A. Giddens: Yeah.
- 954 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright.

955 Mr. A. Giddens: And multiply that by the difference of our two billing rates, which
 956 would be seven... Yeah. Seventeen twenty-eight minus seventeen ninety-two times one
 957 eighty.

958 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Can we go to Mr. Lawson, then we'll come 959 back? If you need it, Mr. McCoy? Alright. Mr. Lawson.

960 Councilperson Lawson: Thank you, Madam Chair. Ms. Busby and Mr. Little. [Pause].
 961 So, the five submitted security guard services, there was only one that was unresponsive,
 962 which was Deluxe Security?

- 963 **Mr. A. Giddens:** Two.
- 964 **Councilperson Lawson:** Two. So TriCorps was also unresponsive?

- Interim Procurement Director Little: Correct. Because their reference people did not
 respond when you asked for reference checks. That's why they were deemed
 nonresponsive.
- 968 **Councilperson Lawson:** Okay. And, based on the proposal, we submitted a request 969 for lowest responsive.
- 970 Interim Procurement Director Little: That is correct, sir.
- 971 Councilperson Lawson: So, to Mr. Giddens points, if the armed security guard was
 972 posted at fifty dollars an hour, and the unarmed was at sixty eighty-nine, that would still
 973 be lowest responsive based on this RFP?
- Interim Procurement Director Little: Based on the process for the City, and our
 Code, again, we simply look at the lowest responsive bidder, out of the two commodities
 that were there.
- 977 **Councilperson Lawson:** Lowest responsive based on the individual security guard, 978 not...
- 979 Interim Procurement Director Little: Correct. Armed and unarmed.
- 980 **Councilperson Lawson:** So not based on the entire value of the contract?
- 981 Interim Procurement Director Little: No. It was not written that way.
- 982 [Pause]
- 983 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Anything else for now? I have a.., so, in the scope of 984 work, why did we only reference armed?
- 985 [Inaudible comment]
- 986 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** I know the overall says we're seeking proposals for.., 987 qualified proposals to provided armed and unarmed...
- 988 [Inaudible comment]
- 989 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...but then when we went in the bulleted points, we only 990 spoke of armed. And then once we specified armed, why did we then go and make the 991 selection based on unarmed?
- 992 Interim Procurement Director Little: That, I really can't address but you'll look at the 993 actual Exhibit for pricing, you'll see that we're asking for both on the pricing sheet. We're 994 asking both armed and unarmed on the pricing sheet.
- 995 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** I know. But when you determined which one was the 996 lowest, you went by the unarmed.
- 997 Interim Procurement Director Little: Since [inaudible]....

- 998 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: So...
- 999 **Interim Procurement Director Little:** ...the Code which says, if we do not specify 1000 which of the two that we are asking for, we choose the lowest.
- 1001 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. So, back to the scope of work. Why did we just 1002 mentioned armed though?
- 1003 Interim Procurement Director Little: Can't address that.
- 1004 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. Who can? [Pause]. Okay. So when, when 1005 the... When we're.., who determines how many guards we're going to use in these 1006 locations? And whether they'll.., they are armed or unarmed?
- 1007 **Interim Procurement Director Little:** I don't know the answer to that again, Madam 1008 Chair. Remember, I'm Procurement. I put out the solicitation...
- 1009 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: But...
- 1010 Interim Procurement Director Little: ...requirement...
- 1011 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** But when they put in your.., what they, what they're 1012 requesting to you, right? Who, who, who do they come from?
- 1013 **Interim Procurement Director Little:** This scope of work should've come out of the 1014 Manager's office 'cause that's who's been managing the security guard services for the 1015 City.
- 1016 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Was that before you, Mr. Evans or?
- 1017 Interim Procurement Director Little: It would 've been Mr. Evans, correct.
- 1018 [Pause]
- 1019 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Do you know we.., I mean...
- 1020 **City Manager Evans:** Just for.., a question for Legal, if I'm to provide any comments with regards...
- 1022 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: No , he is.
- 1023 **City Manager Evans:** ... to this, I think I have to be sworn in.
- 1024 Interim Procurement Director Little: Well...
- 1025 **City Manager Evans:** As it relates to providing any comments that...
- 1026 **City Attorney Wynn:** That's correct.
- 1027 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay. So, can Legal...

1028City Attorney Wynn:You can still ask questions, we just have to have the Clerk1029swear...

- 1030 UNK: [Inaudible].
- 1031 **City Attorney Wynn:** ...Mr. Evans in.
- 1032 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay. You wanna swear him in?
- 1033 City Clerk Anthony: I can.
- 1034 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right. But, point of order.
- 1035 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: What?

1036 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, just rules of quasi-judicial hearings, we don't take any 1037 outside political influence, or any.., we have to be neutral just based on what's presented 1038 in front of us. Am I right?

- 1039City Attorney Wynn:That's correct for you all. But you can take testimony from Mr.1040Evans if he has knowledge that would be useful to you.
- 1041 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay.

1042 **Interim Procurement Director Little:** And one other Item I would like to add, we need 1043 to remember that the Manager always has the determination to make the needs of what 1044 security they actually need. And that can change at any time.

1045 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, and that's why I was kinda..., you can on, Mr. Evans, but 1046 that's why I wa'..., Madam Chair, so, that's why I kinda was kinda confused as to why, and 1047 certainly no disrespect to Councilman Lawson, I think it's less about our demand but when 1048 you go and bid, and I know you've seen these before, you have to rely on the four corners 1049 of the page, when you look at a, you know, what ta proposal, or what a invitation to bid 1050 is. And if it says unarmed, then that's what you would base your, your, your submittal on, 1051 on what's in the scope of work.

1052 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Right. I...

Councilperson McCoy: So, it doesn't necessarily matter if we use one guard or we use fifty guards, I wanted to know from Mr. Little, what the actual determining factor that we were using and that's the rate. The hourly rate is what we were using to determine, you know, what was the determining factor in how we choose it, as opposed to whether we use one or fifty. And that's why I even asked the question, was Norred basing their submittal on some sort of discount or something like that? Because...

- 1059 **Councilperson Lanier:** Ma'...
- 1060 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Well, if Norred...
- 1061 **Councilperson Lanier:** [Inaudible] arbitrary and capricious then.

1062 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right.

1063 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** If Norred only had to go by what was in the scope, and 1064 looking at it, it said two or more armed and.., two armed, I would think that we.., if we're 1065 going to select somebody, it's going to be what we said in the scope.

- 1066 **Councilperson McCoy:** Correct.
- 1067 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: And that is how we would select...
- 1068 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right.
- 1069 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...who's...
- 1070 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right.
- 1071 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: And the...
- 1072 Councilperson McCoy: [Inaudible].
- 1073 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...unarmed it appears is just an added bonus may'.., if you will?
- 1075 Councilperson McCoy: Mhmm.
- 1076 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** But to base your selection on unarmed, I just.., that's 1077 the part I'm not quite understanding.
- 1078 Councilperson McCoy: Correct.
- 1079 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** How do we.., how do we decide to that?
- 1080 **Councilperson McCoy:** I.., and, and certainly I don't wanna stop Mr. Evans from 1081 inputting, but I think what Mr. Evans can only at this point, is what the Manager would 1082 ha'...
- 1083 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** At the time.
- 1084 **Councilperson McCoy:** What the use would be, or what, you know, I think...
- 1085 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: I just...
- 1086 **Councilperson McCoy:** It's pretty...
- 1087 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...wasn't sure if he was aware of why that would've 1088 been [pause]... Why it was determined to put in the scope of work only armed.
- 1089 Councilperson McCoy: Well...
- 1090 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Maybe that just doesn't even...
- 1091 Councilperson McCoy: I...

- 1092 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...matter.
- 1093 **Councilperson McCoy:** You know, I don't wanna further confuse things by having Mr. Evans to comment because I think... 1094
- 1095 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. So...
- 1096 Councilperson McCoy: ...we already recognize...
- 1097 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...who, who would not Mr. Evans to comment?
- 1098 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, I would ask that he don't.
- 1099 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 1100 Councilperson Lanier: I would ask that he do.
- 1101 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. Mr. Lawson.

1102 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right. Be'.., because he's why. There's nothing Mr. Evans can offer us that can provide any clarity on this because first of all, he wasn't here and, 1103 Mr. Evans, the only thing he can offer us, is his interpretation of what the demand or the 1104 assignment of it. But again, that's not..., the assignment or the demand is not what's in 1105 1106 the scope. The only thing was in the scope, and the determining factor in the scope is 1107 the hourly rates.

- 1108 Councilperson Lanier: I beg to differ.
- 1109 Councilperson McCoy: Well, I, I...

Madam Chair? I think that, given that Mr. Evans has been 1110 Councilperson Lanier: 1111 here for the last eight months doing this contract, that he ha'..., does have something to offer. In terms of what's been happening here with this. 1112

- 1113 Councilperson McCoy: Right. But we're not talking about the contract, we're talking 1114 about...
- 1115 Councilperson Lanier: We're talking about what is happening right now. And he's a 1116 City Manager right now.
- 1117 Councilperson McCoy: So what..., so explain to me exactly what he would offer that's 1118
- gonna clarify...
- 1119 Councilperson Lanier: I don't know.
- 1120 Councilperson McCoy: ...anything [inaudible].
- 1121 Councilperson Lanier: That's why I want to hear from him.
- 1122 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. Well, I mean, what you're doing now is you're opening this up because, you know, when you look at the guasi-judicial hearing... 1123

- 1124 **Councilperson Lanier:** The, the Attorney did not say that.
- 1125 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. But what you're creating is, you're creating 1126 something...
- 1127 **Councilperson Lanier:** The lawyer did not s'...
- 1128 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...that's not...
- 1129 **Councilperson Lanier:** The Attorney did not say that.
- 1130 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay.
- 1131 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Ms. Wynn.
- 1132 **City Attorney Wynn:** You have the opportunity, if.., whatever Mr. Evans testifies to,

1133 you can either give it credit or you can discount it. And that's each of you individually.

- 1134 You can give it however much weight you want to give it.
- 1135 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay. Alright. Mr. Evans.
- 1136 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, let me just make that.., make sure that I'm clear that I don't agree with the Manager...
- 1138 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 1139 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...testifying.
- 1140 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay. Mr. Lawson, did you have any input on this?
- 1141 **Councilperson Lawson:** No, Madam Chair.
- 1142 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 1143 [Inaudible comment]

1144 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. So, it was issued June 28th, which was before

1145 Mr. Evans came. And, I just wanna know if he is aware. I mean, I, I don't think he was 1146 here or working on it, it woulda...

- 1147 **Councilperson Lanier:** [inaudible]...
- 1148 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...been Ms.
- 1149 **Councilperson Lanier:** [Inaudible].
- 1150 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...Jacobs. Right? 12th? Right. July 12th, is when...
- 1151 **Councilperson McCoy:** No, no.
- 1152 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...Mr. Evans came?
- 1153 **City Attorney Wynn:** Yeah.

- 1154 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 1155 **Councilperson McCoy:** This was...
- 1156 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Yeah. June 28th.
- 1157 **Councilperson McCoy:** June 28th.
- 1158 **Councilperson Lanier:** I mean, the Attorney said that we can discount or take...
- 1159 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 1160 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...what he says regardless.
- 1161 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Go ahead, Ms. Claudene.
- 1162 **City Clerk Anthony:** Mr. Evans, do you swear or affirm to tell the truth in the testimony that you give, so help you God?
- 1164 City Manager Evans: I do.
- 1165 **City Clerk Anthony:** You may proceed.

1166 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. So Mr. Evans may or may not have anything 1167 to add, but we're going to find that out right now. So, it was issued in June.., on June 28, 1168 2019. Mr. Evans started on July 12, 2019. Do you have anything to add as to why it may 1169 been listed as scope of work for just armed?

1170 City Manager Evans: As it relates to the elements associated with the scope of work, obviously that was before my tenure. I know that the City has utilized both unarmed 1171 and armed guards. With respect to the management of the contract, that resides in the 1172 1173 Procurement function. If there is any deviation or modification to the contract, it is that 1174 management contacts Procurement, Procurement reaches out to the vendor and then the 1175 level of service is modified. From historical knowledge, back in 2017, when we discussed 1176 about the security services over at the Library, that was an addition that we made because of acts of violence that occurred in South Florida. We have had discussions about does 1177 it necessitate us having armed guards at certain locations throughout the City. But, when 1178 you look at this particular contract, you're looking at the information contained in it. but it 1179 1180 still gives us.., the, the way the way the agreement, it provides the flexibility for...

- 1181 **Councilperson McCoy:** Mr. Evans, can clarify? You said when we're looking at the 1182 contract, or we're looking at this...
- 1183 City Manager Evans: Well, well [stammer]...
- 1184 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...RF'...
- 1185 **City Manager Evans:** When you're...
- 1186 Councilperson McCoy:ITB?

City Manager Evans: When you're looking at the scope of work, the scope of work outlines what the City believes the arrangement to be, however, when you move to the next phase of the agreement, we as Staff, and as Administration, have the ability to alter the amount of hours that we want, whether it's unarmed or armed guards. So, there is some flexibility as it relates to the arrangement.

1192 Going back to 2017 with the existing contractual provider 'cause that was a 1193 modification that we wanted to see occur and that was an additional service. As it relates to now, the information that was placed in this was Staff's attempt and, and Mr. Little can 1194 1195 speak in more specificities as it relates to trying to emulate the level of service but, obviously, that can be changed and modified. Why it was written in this, this particular 1196 form and fashion, that's a dire'.., that's a conversation for Procurement and for the 1197 1198 Administrator at the time, to be able to provide a little bit more specificities but I can tell 1199 you that there's not many times on an Administrator level that the Manager gets involved with something that is as granular as this, as far as the hours of operation, usually, that's 1200 1201 provided to Procurement as far as.., from a department director level, what type of level of service they're looking at for their respective buildings. 1202

- 1203 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 1204 **Councilperson Lanier:** That makes sense.
- 1205 **Councilperson McCoy:** Which part?

1206 **Councilperson Lanier:** The part that, the part that it would be up to the C'.., it would 1207 be up to the department directors to be able to direct, in terms of the number of hours. 1208 The Library would know that they would need, you know, armed guards at certain times, 1209 or they would know that would need guards at, you know, from 8:00 to 4:00 instead of 1210 7:00 to 3:00. They would know that.

1211 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right. So, my question...

Councilperson Lanier: And, and I'm assuming that this is where the information came from, given the fact that, if you're gonna put a bid out for services, you would want to know from the departments what they need. So, I'm assuming that's where it came from,

1215 from department heads. It would make sense that, that would.., it would come from them.

- 1216 **Councilperson McCoy:** Madam Chair?
- 1217 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

1218 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, Mr. Evans. So, obviously, you have already seen this 1219 prior to use seeing this. Am I right?

1220 **UNK:** Mhmm.

1221 **City Manager Evans:** I have seen the original scope of work and the ITB, and the 1222 information that was put out for solicitation. Yes, sir.

- 1223 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, and let me clarify, when I seen this, the appeal process 1224 went to the City Manager already. Am I right?
- 1225 **City Manager Evans:** That is correct.

Councilperson McCoy: So, okay. So, that's why I wanted to limit Mr. Evans interaction on this because he's already moved on this. And, I think what was clear and what I was trying to share with the Members, was that the scope is limited to the four corners of this page. Mr. Evans has already had his bites at the apple in deciding on whether or not this protest should be upheld or denied. But to insert him back into this conversation, now creates an opportunity for further possibilities of litigation when...

1232 **UNK:** [Inaudible] right.

1233 **Councilperson McCoy:** ... he hasn't even had any personal knowledge as to why this 1234 scope was drafted in the way it was. So, unless you got some information that I didn't get 1235 out of what he said, other than some historical information, we're limited to what's in front of us. So, I didn't think it was important to have his testimony, being that he's already had 1236 decided on this and historical information is not something that we have to base our 1237 1238 decision on. Only thing that we have to base our decision on, based on the Procurement 1239 Code and guasi-judicial process, is what's presented in front of us. And that would make 1240 sense as to why we weren't provided this information before. So I certainly don't have a problem with him giving his opinion but what I don't wanna do is cloud the minds of the 1241 Members about Mr. Evans' opinion or his historical..., I guess, his historical experience 1242 with dealing with this contract. Which has no bearing on... 1243

- 1244 Councilperson Lanier: I...
- 1245 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...what's before us.
- 1246 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Well, well...
- 1247 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair?

1248 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Hold on. Being that I'm the one that asked and Ms. 1249 Lanier may have agreed with me. I did not ask for him to give his opinion and, and as to 1250 what he....

- 1251 **Councilperson McCoy:** And that's what I...
- 1252 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...thought it would do.
- 1253 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...was trynna stay from, Madam Chair.

1254 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Right. And that, that's not what I was looking for. The 1255 question was, Mr. Little did not know why, or ho'.., why it would say armed or, or why it 1256 would not say unarmed, and I wanted to know from a City Manager's perspective, how 1257 do they determine what goes in the scope. And he's...

1258 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right.

- 1259 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...been here before so it's not like he...
- 1260 **Councilperson McCoy:** But, but...
- 1261 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...doesn't know...
- 1262 **Councilperson McCoy:** But, but...
- 1263 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...why.

1264 Tm: Let me tell you something, Madam Chair. You're absolutely right. But at this point, 1265 it doesn't matter how we got...

- 1266 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** It mattered for me.
- 1267 **Councilperson McCoy:** But, but, but, but still, they were making a bid...
- 1268 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mhmm.

1269 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...they were responding to based on the four corners of the 1270 scope of work.,

1271 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** And because of that, you are correct. And it said 1272 armed. But when the Procurement Department, deciding on the lowest number, they 1273 went by unarmed.

- 1274 Councilperson McCoy: Unarmed.
- 1275 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** So, for me, I'm trying to understand why did we go with 1276 the unarmed...
- 1277 Councilperson McCoy: And...
- 1278 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...and why wasn't it just put in there? I mean, this is 1279 not making sense to me right now.
- 1280 **Councilperson McCoy:** And that's totally...
- 1281 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** And I'm trying to clarity.

Councilperson McCoy: And, and that's totally understandable. But, you know, when you take things that aren't a part of what's presented before you, it presents more opportunity for someone to appeal because you're being prejudiced based on information that's not provided to everybody. And...

- 1286 Councilperson Lanier: How...
- 1287 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Well, everybody just heard what...
- 1288 **Councilperson Lanier:** Right.
- 1289 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...he just said.

- 1290 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair? I, I...
- 1291 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: So everybody's...
- 1292 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...totally disagree with that. You know, to say that we would 1293 get our minds muddled because of what the City Manager said, I, I...
- 1294 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** We gotta keep it down out there, please.
- 1295 **Councilperson Lanier:** ... I have to take offense to that, I can make up my own mind. 1296 I don't need to.., you don't need to tell me about who I don't need to hear from.
- 1297 [Inaudible audience comment]
- 1298 **Councilperson Lanier:** We have...
- 1299 Councilperson McCoy: Well...

1300 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...to be able to hear from whoever we ask to hear form. That's 1301 the purpose of us being up here, so that we all can be able to ask the questions and to 1302 get the information that we want. So you can't tell us who we can't call or.., because it...

- 1303 Councilperson McCoy: Well, let...
- 1304 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...will our minds.
- 1305 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Well, let me say...
- 1306 **Councilperson McCoy:** Can I finish my conversation?
- 1307 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Hold on one second. I, I think we're clear on your point.
- 1308 **Councilperson McCoy:** No., You're not.
- 1309 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: I am.
- 1310 **Councilperson McCoy:** Because she keeps defending something and I'm going by the 1311 quasi-judicial hearing rules. So, it's...
- 1312 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mhmm.
- 1313 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...not... So, this is different than any other process...
- 1314 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Right.
- 1315 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...that we take.
- 1316 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mhmm.

1317 **Councilperson McCoy:** So that's why they're sworn in. And quasi-judicial rules 1318 provides simply that we sh'.., must be neutral decision making.., decisionmakers above

1319 politics or outside influence. And...

1320 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: [Inaudible].

1321 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...I would hate to have someone who's already reviewed this 1322 and made a decision, to come back and give his opinion on a whole other appellate level, 1323 and now you change your decision based on that, or even raise the possibility that the 1324 decision was changed because we've inserted some...

- 1325 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: But no one...
- 1326 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...undue influence.
- 1327 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...would ever know that because it's...
- 1328 **Councilperson McCoy:** But it raises an opportunity...
- 1329 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 1330 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...is what I'm saying.
- 1331 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Your point is well taken. I, I agree. I understand where you're coming from.
- 1333 [Inaudible audience comment]
- 1334 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay? Anybody else have anything to add, or any 1335 questions regarding the selection or the process or anything? Or, are you ready to make 1336 your decision?
- 1337 **Councilperson Lanier:** I'm ready to make my decision.
- 1338 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mr. Lawson? [Pause]. Anything?
- 1339 **Councilperson Lawson:** Ready to make my decision, Madam Chair.
- 1340 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay. Mr. McCoy?
- 1341 **Councilperson McCoy:** I'm ready to make a decision.
- 1342 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. So, do we have.., are we just going to vote or.., 1343 and it's to deny, their bid.
- 1344 **City Manager Evans:** [Stammer]...
- 1345 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Their protest. I'm sorry.

City Manager Evans: Madam Chair, if I may? Just as, as a point of, you know, consideration for the discussion and the action that the Boards will take. As it relates to this particular contract, I think the, the conversation, or the, the discussion the Bord had, certainly was a spirited discussion and if there is a desire from the Bord to move forward with the cancellation of this particular process and go through a competitive process, certainly [stammer], you know, coming in, now being in the organization, I would like to have a little bit more input and involvement in the placement of guards, level of service. 1353 Because, I think some of the things that are contained in this, is a copy and paste from 1354 probably a proposal that was executed in, in previous years, and maybe some tweaks and modifications to it. 'Cause that's sometimes what adds some additional challenges 1355 1356 to these particular process. So, if the Board does move in that direction and wants to go through the competitive solicitation process again, one of the things that I would bring 1357 1358 back to the Board for consideration, is the Board approving the scope of work and the 1359 level of service that you would like to see at specific facilities, because ultimately, we've 1360 had conversations from Members of, of the Board about armed guards versus unarmed guards at certain facilities and those type of things. So, I wanted to, to let you know if that 1361 1362 is a direction that the Board wishes to proceed, Staff is prepared and willing to be able to do that for the good of the City, to be able to bring it back and clear up some of the 1363 1364 concerns that have been articulated as part of this conversation.

1365 So, I did wanna add that to the, to the record for the Board's consideration.

1366 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** So, but in the meantime, the current group that's there 1367 will continue on while we go through this process again if we, we choose to go that way?

- 1368 **City Manager Evans:** That is correct. That we would say that the existing service 1369 provider will continue to be in place until the competitive solicitation process is complete.
- 1370 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 1371 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. So, if, if there was a way in quasi-judicial process, I 1372 could move to strike, I would certainly strike everything...
- 1373 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Right.
- Councilperson McCoy: ...the Manager just said. Because, what you just did, Mr.
 Evans, was clearly influence us on what we should do at this point.
- 1376 [Inaudible comment]
- 1377 **City Manager Evans:** It wasn't an influence, it was providing you an option.

Councilperson McCoy: Right. But, okay. What's before us is clear. The question is very clear. So, you're saying that you wanna have an opportunity to be a part of the process, when what was laid out before us, was very clear, was to deny, reject or to..., deny the protest, grant the protest or reject all bids.

- 1382 **City Manager Evans:** And if you reject, that's the process that I would recommend 1383 that we proceed forward.
- 1384 **Councilperson McCoy:** [Inaudible] but...
- 1385 **City Manager Evans:** Not that you would.., not that...
- 1386 Councilperson McCoy: But...
- 1387 **City Manager Evans:** That, that's how we...

- 1388 Councilperson McCoy: Mr...
- 1389 **City Manager Evans:** ...would move through the...
- 1390 Councilperson McCoy: Mr. Evans...
- 1391 **City Manager Evans:** ...rejection process.

1392 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...my question is, is your recommendation proper at this point, 1393 when we're reviewing whether or not they have a valid claim to have.... I mean, do they 1394 have a valid claim? That's, that's all I'm simply asking.

- 1395 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Cahir?
- 1396 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 1397City Clerk Anthony:Before you all continue, let me please advise you all that the1398motion on the floor was to deal with the presentation.
- 1399 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right. That's exactly my point.
- 1400 **City Clerk Anthony:** A, a motion was not made as to whether or not to accept or 1401 deny Staff's recommendation.
- 1402 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Right.

1403 **City Clerk Anthony:** So, can we just go ahead and just vote upon that, and then 1404 you all move forward with whether or not you wanna make a motion to approve the 1405 Resolution that's being presented, or go a different direction?

- 1406 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay.
- 1407 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair?
- 1408 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

Councilperson Lanier: But, what I'm reading says that the City Council of the City of
 Riviera Beach affirming Staff's recommendation to deny Giddens Security Corporation's
 bid protest. We're voting on...

- 1412 **UNK:** No.
- 1413 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...to deny their bid... This is...
- 1414 **Councilperson McCoy:** That wasn't...
- 1415 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...what it's saying.
- 1416City Clerk Anthony:Madam Chair, the motion was made to hear the1417presentations...
- 1418 **UNK:** Right.

- 1419 City Clerk Anthony: ...only.
- **Councilperson Lanier:** So, th'.., so, we're not voting on this particular Item?
- **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, that is...
- **City Attorney Wynn:** Right.
- **City Clerk Anthony:** We're.., you're not voting on the Resolution...
- **Councilperson Lanier:** Okay.
- **City Clerk Anthony:** ...that's on the Agenda.
- **Councilperson Lanier:** Alright.
- 1427 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.

City Attorney Wynn: Not yet. What happened she read the Res'.., the Clerk read 1429 the Resolution, and then there was a motion and a second to hear the Item. I wrote it 1430 down to make...

- **Councilperson Lawson:** Yes.
- **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Lanier?
- **Councilperson Lanier:** Yes.
- **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson McCoy?
- **Councilperson McCoy:** I don't know what we're voting on.
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** You're voting on...
- **City Clerk Anthony:** You're voting on the...

- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...hearing the presentation.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** We already did that.
- **City Clerk Anthony:** I understand but the vote was not taken before the 1451 presentation, to .
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Well, why you didn't say...
- **Councilperson McCoy:** So, we're voting after the fact?
- **City Clerk Anthony:** Basically, [stammer], Madam Chair.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** So, if we say no, then what happens? I mean...
- **City Clerk Anthony:** It's already been done, Mr. McCoy.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. So, why you...
- **City Clerk Anthony:** I totally understand...
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Why are we doing roll call?
- **City Clerk Anthony:** ...but we, we, we have...
- 1461 [Inaudible comment]
- 1462City Clerk Anthony:...we have to clear the motion off the floor. Because that's the1463standing motion right now.
- 1464 Councilperson McCoy: Yes.
- **City Clerk Anthony:** Chair Miller-Anderson?
- 1466 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- **City Clerk Anthony:** Unanimous vote. Now, Madam Chair, you all can make a decision what you want your motion to be. Whoever wants to make the motion.
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Well, isn't the Resolution...
- **Councilperson Lanier:** Yeah. You gotta read...
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...the motion?
- **City Clerk Anthony:** The Resolution is what's been read, but you can make a motion to accept Staff's recommendation or to deny Staff's recommendation.
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** We're just voting yes or not for...
- 1475 Councilperson McCoy: No...
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...the Resolution...

- **Councilperson McCoy:** We don't...
- 1478 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...right?
- **Councilperson McCoy:** We don't...
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** We read the Resolution. Correct?
- 1481 Councilperson McCoy: No.
- 1482 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Or, [inaudible]...
- **City Clerk Anthony:** You read the Re'...
- 1484 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...read it now?
- 1485 Councilperson McCoy: So...
- **City Attorney Wynn:** The Resolution was read, there was no motion as it relates to 1487 the Resolution. You can...
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** But don't we need to do that?
- **City Attorney Wynn:** You can vote... Right. You can vote it up or down.
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. So, to keep things clean, shouldn't we just do 1491 that?
- **City Attorney Wynn:** Right.

- 1512 Councilperson Lanier: [Chuckle].
- 1513 **City Clerk Anthony:** Let me just say.., let me be clear. The first time it was read, 1514 we did not have public comment, and [pause]... Because I was asked this question. We 1515 do not have public comment cards at this time, on this Item. The acceptance of public 1516 comment cards on this Item is now closed.
- 1517 [Inaudible comment]
- 1518City Clerk Anthony:Madam Chair, Ms. Paulk put in a public comment card for the1519Consent Agenda. This is not Consent Agenda.
- 1520 [Inaudible audience comment]
- 1521City Clerk Anthony:Madam Chair, I have two public comment cards from Ms.1522Paulk. One of them re: Consent Agenda, one reads public comments.
- 1523 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. Alright. We haven't gotten to the general public 1524 comments yet. We'll be going there very shortly. Alright. So, we have a, a motion and 1525 a second for this particular Item here?
- 1526 **City Clerk Anthony:** Yes, Madam Chair.
- 1527 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. We've had questions and comments already, 1528 or do you all have any additional ones before we vote?

- 1532 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** As printed. Alright. Madam Clerk.
- 1533 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Lawson?
- 1534 **Councilperson Lawson:** No.
- 1535 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Lanier?
- 1536 [Pause]

- 1537 [Inaudible comment]
- 1538 **Councilperson Lanier:** I'm not sure. Wait a minute, hold on. I'm not sure. 'Cause 1539 you have, like, a double negative in this sentence. I'm trying to figure out...
- 1540 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Are you agreeing to recommend to deny...
- 1541 **Councilperson McCoy:** You made...
- 1542 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...their protest?
- 1543 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...the motion to deny...
- 1544 **City Attorney Wynn:** Are you upholding Staff's recommendation to deny Giddens 1545 protest? Which means that the next...
- 1546 **Councilperson Lanier:** I am not voting to deny them, no.
- 1547 **City Attorney Wynn:** Okay.
- 1548 **Councilperson Lanier:** So what is that? Yes? I mean...
- 1549 [Chuckles]
- 1550 **City Attorney Wynn:** It's, it's no.
- 1551 **Councilperson Lanier:** I, I, I do not want to deny them, so what...
- 1552 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: It's...
- 1553 Councilperson Lanier: ...what is it?
- 1554 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: No.
- 1555 City Attorney Wynn: No.
- 1556 [Inaudible comment]
- 1557 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: No.
- 1558 **Councilperson Lanier:** Okay.
- 1559 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: So, what is your vote?
- 1560 **Councilperson Lanier:** [Chuckle]. I do not want to deny them.
- 1561 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, no.
- 1562 **City Attorney Wynn:** Right. It's a no.
- 1563 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Pull your microphone down for me. Clerk.
- 1564 **Councilperson Lanier:** No.

- 1565 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Go ahead, Clerk.
- 1566 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson McCoy?
- 1567 Councilperson McCoy: No.
- 1568 **City Clerk Anthony:** Chairperson Miler-Anderson?
- 1569 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: No.
- 1570City Clerk Anthony:The motion was not approved. All Councilpersons present1571dissented.
- 1572 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair?
- 1573 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 1574 **Councilperson McCoy:** Can I be recognized for a motion?
- 1575 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Sure.
- 1576 **Councilperson McCoy:** I move that we grant Giddens Security Corporation bid 1577 protest. [Pause]. There you go.
- 1578 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** And what happens after that?
- 1579 [Chuckle]
- 1580 **Councilperson McCoy:** Then we...
- 1581 **City Attorney Wynn:** You enter into a contract with them.
- 1582 **Councilperson McCoy:** Then we...
- 1583 **City Attorney Wynn:** And we bring that back...
- 1584 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...bring back...
- 1585 **City Attorney Wynn:** ...to you.
- 1586 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: But...
- 1587 **Councilperson Lanier:** Okay. What now?
- 1588 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. You have a motion on the floor. Who...
- 1589 Councilperson McCoy: So...
- 1590 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...anyone second?
- 1591 Councilperson McCoy: So, I'm just...
- 1592 **Councilperson Lanier:** I'm [inaudible]...

- **Councilperson McCoy:** ...doing the opposite of what you did. So you...
- **Councilperson Lanier:** [Inaudible]...
- 1595 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Hold on, hold on. Do we have a second for...
- **Councilperson Lanier:** I don't know what...
- 1597 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...his motion?
- **Councilperson Lanier:** ...it is.
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Say your motion again.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** I, I move to grant Giddens Security Corporation' bid protest.
- 1601 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** So, I'm...
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Do we have a second?
- **Councilperson McCoy:** ...giving them... I'm granting them their protest. So...
- **Councilperson Lanier:** Oh, their protest.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** ...they, they...
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Even though they were [inaudible].
- **Councilperson McCoy:** ...they prevail. They ,they proved their case, is what I'm...
- **Councilperson Lanier:** Okay.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** ...saying.
- **Councilperson Lanier:** Okay.
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. Do we have a second?
- **Councilperson Lanier:** I got a second on that.
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Do we need to get public comment cards for 1615 this?
- **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, that's up to the Board?
- 1617 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: I think...
- 1618 [Inaudible dais comment]
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...we'll be okay in terms of not taking it, being that it's 1620 just the opposite. And we didn't have any for that first one. Go ahead.

1621 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, I wanna have [stammer].., now that it's moved and second, I wanna have a discussion.

1623 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay. Go ahead.

1624 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. So, we're at this point, right? And this is why I kinda 1625 wanted to caution the Members about... so, I'm, I'm certainly open for any amendments, 1626 but, you know, I've been in that chair where Giddens is, and you have to rely on what's on the paper, and I think, I think they made a compelling case that it could be ambiguous, 1627 1628 it could be arbitrary. I think, perhaps, even..., we got great Staff so, erroneous is definitely 1629 not something that I would agree with but, nonetheless, I would..., I do believe that we should have Staff to go back and draft something. However, I have some concerns 1630 1631 because I haven't reviewed the contract before going forward as to what that provides as 1632 far as length, and some other processes, like, some deliverables or expectations. So, I certainly would like for it to come back. And, [pause], yeah. That's what I would like to 1633 1634 do, I would like to grant their protest, but I'm concerned, even if we grant their protest, is 1635 it based on what they presented is now what we consider factual or do we have to give some direction to Staff as to what we expect? Because, even if we take Mr. Giddens 1636 1637 numbers...

- 1639 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...I don't necessarily think that that puts him in the position of being...
- 1641 [Inaudible comment]
- 1642 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...the next selected if we say that the process Staff used was 1643 not what was laid out.
- 1644 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair?
- 1645 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Hold on. Did you have something else, Mr. McCoy?
- 1646 **Councilperson McCoy:** That's it.
- 1647 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Ms. Lanier.

S: No. I, I, I disagree with that. I think that the security firm, Giddens, made their, made their point. They, they proved their case. And, because of that.., and it was [stammer] it was a simple numbers game. They proved their case and I think that we need to move forward.

1652 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right. But, even if you look at the numbers, even if they 1653 proved their case and their numbers are, in fact, true, based on the scoring sheet, that 1654 doesn't necessarily put them in.., next in line to be awarded the contract.

- 1655 **UNK:** Hmm.
- 1656 **Councilperson Lawson:** Madam Chair?

- 1657 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 1658 [Inaudible comment]
- **Councilperson Lawson:** Based on the numbers of responsive...
- 1660 Councilperson McCoy: Is it...
- **Councilperson Lawson:** ...bidders, it would actually make them...
- **Councilperson Lanier:** Yes.
- **Councilperson Lawson:** ...the next in line.
- **Councilperson Lanier:** It would do...
- **UNK:** Yeah.
- **Councilperson Lawson:** Because TriCorp's was actually...
- **UNK:** Right.
- **Councilperson Lawson:** ...a nonresponsive...
- 1669 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Right.
- **Councilperson Lawson:** ...based on what...
- 1671 Councilperson McCoy: Oh...
- **Councilperson Lawson:** ...Mr. Little said.
- 1673 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yeah. Their references.

Councilperson Lawson: TriCorp's woulda been.., if they would've had been 1675 responsive, then they would've been the next lowest but if you throw them, throw out 1676 Deluxe, then Giddens would actually be...

- **Councilperson Lanier:** The next...
- **Councilperson Lawson:** ...the lowest.
- **Councilperson Lanier:** ...one in line.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** So, what's happens to American Guard?
- **Councilperson Lawson:** Because of the pricing...
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** They weren't...
- **Councilperson Lawson:** I'm sorry. Madam Chair?
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Go ahead.

- **Councilperson Lawson:** Their pricing for their armed guards, based on the numbers 1686 that Gidden' provided, hours...
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay.
- **Councilperson Lanier:** Yep. They would be...
- **Councilperson Lawson:** ...it, it... They'd be well overpriced.
- **Councilperson Lanier:** Exactly.
- **Councilperson Lawson:** So Gidden would be lowest responsive.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Alright. Fair enough. I didn't.., but, it doesn't show TriCorps 1693 on here, but I do recall us saying that they were...
- **Councilperson Lawson:** Nonresponsive.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Nonresponsive.
- 1696 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yeah.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay.
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** They, they didn't put it down there in the comments, but 1699 they said their references didn't check out. Didn't respond, rather.
- **City Attorney Wynn:** Just to make it clear, when there's an invitation for bid, the 1701 actual contract is attached to that. There is nothing that comes back to you. It's a one 1702 year contract with four twelve month renewals. If it were a request for a proposal, the 1703 contract would come back to you. Or, it would have accompanied the Item.
- 1704 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Right.
- **Councilperson Lawson:** Right.
- **City Attorney Wynn:** The bi'.., when you have...
- 1707 Councilperson McCoy: S'...
- **City Attorney Wynn:** ...a bid, the contract is already is already attached. So, when you approve this tonight, you're approving the contract as well.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Well that, that's not what we're gonna do then.
- 1711 Councilperson Lanier: Well, I...
- **Councilperson McCoy:** We, we can...
- **Councilperson McCoy:** ...beg to differ.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, how? If you haven't...

1715 S: Well, it, it...

- 1716 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...even seen the contract?
- 1717 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...it goes for a vote. I mean, that's how it works.
- 1718 City Clerk Anthony: Madam Chair, Mr...
- 1719 **Councilperson Lanier:** We don't just arbitrarily...
- 1720 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Hold on, hold on.
- 1721 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...say it's not going to work.
- 1722 **City Clerk Anthony:** Mr. McCoy, you were the one that the made the motion. If 1723 you so desire, you can withdraw your motion.
- 1724 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, let me, let me clear. So, you're gonna agree to a contact 1725 that we haven't seen. And we already...
- 1726 **City Attorney Wynn:** It's in..
- 1727 Councilperson McCoy: So...
- 1728 City Attorney Wynn: ...your backup. Excuse...
- 1729 Councilperson McCoy: I know.
- 1730 City Attorney Wynn: ...me, sir.
- 1731 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, but it's not.., and so, it's in the backup of the Norred Item?
- 1732 **City Attorney Wynn:** It's in the backup... No. To deny Giddens Security 1733 Corporation, in, in the protest Item.
- 1734 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair?
- 1735 **City Attorney Wynn:** If you flip...
- 1736 **City Manager Evans:** I'm sorry.
- 1737 **City Attorney Wynn:** If you... I'm sorry. Go ahead, Mr. Manager.

1738 **City Manager Evans:** If, if I may? And, and this is a question for Legal and 1739 Procurement, can the Board authorize the award of the bid to Giddens and direct Staff to 1740 work on a contract and bring that back? So, basically, separating it to the point where 1741 they have effectively awarded it, and then bringing the corresponding contract back to 1742 alleviate and address some of the concerns that the Board has articulated at this 1743 evening's meetings, or do you have to take it in one action?

- 1744 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** But what would we change...
- 1745 Councilperson McCoy: No...

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- 1746 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...in the contract if it's, if it's normally attached?
- 1747 **Councilperson McCoy:** Because listen, we already have the confusion about whether 1748 we're going with armed or unarmed, and what that really looks like and, you know, what...
- 1749 [Inaudible comment]

Councilperson McCoy: And then too, here's the other thing. There are some very particular things that I'm gonna ask for to be placed in the contract, and who these people are to re'.., I'm sorry, who these officers are to report to, and how we cure certain remedies, because I've observed things that I would like to see going forward that we, as a City, are more proactive about that... In, in fact, they are two independent things. So, the contract is separate than us granting the bid protest. I mean...

- 1756 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair?
- 1757 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 1758 **Councilperson Lanier:** What motion do we have on the table?
- 1759 [Chuckle]
- 1760 **City Attorney Wynn:** It's a motion to grant Giddens bid protest.
- 1761 **Councilperson Lanier:** Okay. We.., can we call the question on that, please?
- 1762 **Councilperson McCoy:** Yeah, but, let's... Can we get clarity?
- 1763 UNK: [Inaudible].

1764 **City Attorney Wynn:** To answer the question regarding the negotiations, typically, 1765 that's not done in an invitation for bid. However, if we were to do that, and if they were 1766 amenable to it, the one thing we have to make sure, Mr. Manager, is that we don't 1767 significantly deviate and, therefore, change the terms...

- 1768 **Councilperson Lanier:** Of the scope.
- 1769 **City Attorney Wynn:** ...of the original...
- 1770 Interim Procurement Director Little: Right.
- 1771 **City Attorney Wynn:** ...bid to begin with.
- 1772 **Councilperson Lanier:** Exactly.
- 1773 **City Attorney Wynn:** Because then we would have to cancel the bid and send it 1774 back out so that everyone has the same opportunity.
- 1775 Interim Procurement Director Little: Right.
- 1776 **Councilperson Lanier:** Exactly.

- 1777 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right.
- 1778 Councilperson Lawson: Madam Chair?
- 1779 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Go ahead, Mr. Lawson.

1780 **Councilperson Lawson:** If we did cancel the bid and send it back out, our current 1781 contract would remain in place with Gidden? As our security company? Until that bid 1782 goes through?

- 1783 City Manager Evans: That would be the, the course of action that we would utilize.
 1784 Yes. We would not have any lapse of service.
- 1785 **City Attorney Wynn:** Right.
- 1786 **Councilperson Lanier:** [Inaudible].
- 1787 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. So, the motion on the floor is to grant their bid 1788 protest. So, are we ready to call the question on that?
- 1789 Councilperson Lanier: Yes.
- 1790 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. Madam Clerk.
- 1791 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Lawson?
- 1792 **Councilperson Lawson:** Yes.
- 1793 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Lanier?
- 1794 **Councilperson Lanier:** Yes.
- 1795 City Clerk Anthony: Councilperson McCoy?
- 1796 Councilperson McCoy: Yes.
- 1797 **City Clerk Anthony:** Chair Miller-Anderson?
- 1798 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 1799 **City Clerk Anthony:** Unanimous vote.
- 1800 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright.
- 1801 Councilperson McCoy: So, where exactly is this contract, because it's not in this Item
 1802 that we're on.
- 1803 **City Attorney Wynn:** Yes.
- 1804 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair?
- 1805 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

1806 **City Attorney Wynn:** It is. It's, it's attached to.., it's right after the, the Resolution. 1807 You should see it. It starts with general information to bidders. That's all included as 1808 part.., an invitation for bid. There are standard terms and conditions...

- 1809 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. You must be looking at a hardcopy but it's not in the digital copy that I was looking at.
- 1811 **City Attorney Wynn:** Okay. I am looking at a hardcopy.
- 1812 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, well, if that's the case, I guess we can go ahead and delete the other Item off of the Agenda, regarding...
- 1814 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Well, we haven't [stammer]...
- 1815 **City Attorney Wynn:** When we... Yeah.
- 1816 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Can we finish up...
- 1817 **City Attorney Wynn:** When we get to it. Right.
- 1818 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yeah. We'll get there...
- 1819 Councilperson Lanier: Madam Chair?
- 1820 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...in a second. Yes.
- 1821 **Councilperson Lanier:** I'd like to make a motion to award the bid to Giddens Security.
- 1822 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Do we have a second? [Pause]. Do we have a second?
- 1824 UNK: [Inaudible].
- 1825 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Dies for lack of a second.
- 1826 [Inaudible audience comment]
- 1827 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Do we have another motion?
- 1828 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, I would like to see us go back and work on it with Staff, 1829 in the language. Because, again, there are some concerns that I would like to address.
- 1830 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. So, you would like to make a motion to send it 1831 back out for bid?
- 1832 Councilperson McCoy: Well, I think that's what has to happen. D. Lawson at Norred
 1833 dot com is...
- 1834 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. So, what...
- 1835 **Councilperson McCoy:** Is that you?
- 1836 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...is your motion, Mr...

- 1838 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...McCoy?
- 1839 Councilperson McCoy: No.
- 1840 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: What?
- 1841 **Councilperson McCoy:** I don't wanna make a motion.
- 1842 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** You don't wanna make a motion.
- 1843 **Councilperson McCoy:** We don't just.., I mean, we don't have a contract in front of us 1844 so we can't just award it, right?
- 1845 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** I didn't say to make a motion to award it, I said do you want to make a motion to...
- 1847 **Councilperson Lanier:** I make a motion to...
- 1848 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...cancel it and go...
- 1849 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...award out, which it means...
- 1850 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...back out for bid?
- 1851 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...that they be'.., they became the next, next...
- 1852 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** You already did your motion..
- 1853 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...company in line.
- 1854 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...and it died.
- 1855 **Councilperson Lanier:** Right. They, they became the next company in line to get the 1856 bid. What are we waiting for?
- 1857 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Huh? What now? I'm sorry. What...
- 1858 [Chuckles]
- 1859 **Councilperson Lanier:** Gidden Security, given the fact that we just rejected their.., or 1860 actually accepted it.
- 1861 **City Attorney Wynn:** Granted it.
- 1862 **Councilperson Lanier:** Granted their protest. Which means that they're back in the game now, which means that they're the next in line for this.., for this bid.
- 1864 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right. But...
- 1865 **Councilperson Lanier:** So, why would we not move forward...

- 1866 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Hold on.
- 1867 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...with awarding them the bid?

Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Well, for me... Well, I haven't decided on what I'm going to do yet, but I just want to make sure that... I, I have a issue with the scope of work saying armed and if we were to stick with what that said.., I, I believe it should say unarmed and armed and it should be a little more specific as to how many we need and.., or, at, at...

- 1873 Councilperson Lanier: And I...
- 1874 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...minimum anyway.
- 1875 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...I totally, I totally...
- 1876 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** There's some more detail...

1877 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...agree with you, Madam Chair, but that, that's, that's unfair 1878 to the people who bid and this, this lingering protest they've been.., that's been going on.

- 1879 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: So...
- 1880 **Councilperson Lanier:** We have a lingering protest here, we've decided that they did 1881 prove their case, that the next in line... I mean, I, I.., it just makes sense to move forward.
- 1882 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Um...
- 1883 [Inaudible comments]
- 1884 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, Madam Attorney and Assistant, so, are we limited to only 1885 armed if we accept this award because of...

1886 **City Attorney Wynn:** No. The, the, the scope of work was specific as it relates 1887 to the number of armed guards but the very.., I think the second line in the scope of work 1888 says that we are looking for armed and unarmed guards.

- 1889 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Well, it said it in the beginning.
- 1890 Councilperson McCoy: Yeah. But...
- 1891 **City Attorney Wynn:** Right.
- 1892 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** But he never referenced it throughout the, the bullet'...,
- 1893 the numbered items.
- 1894 [Inaudible comments]
- 1895 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Even under where it says City Hall security guards, it 1896 talks about armed.
- 1897 **City Attorney Wynn:** It says armed and unarmed...

1898 **Councilperson McCoy:** But, but even.., but, but, but, but Mr..., Mr. Manager, even 1899 though what this ITB is asking for, is for security officers, two at City Hall, two at Public 1900 Safety Complex. We're using more than that anyways, am I right?

1901 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Well, City Hall [inaudible] says two or more.

1902 City Manager Evans: It, it does, it does fluctuate depending on events and programs. Specifically, you can see that we've got a, a guard that's here outside of the 1903 1904 Council Chamber, and that was just a modification that awe said we wanted to increase security as it relates to our Council meetings. So, we worked with our vendor, and our 1905 vendor said, 'Okay. This is the cost associated with it,' and they added. So, there is times 1906 where it's a fluid contract, where we say that we want more [stammer].., armed or 1907 1908 unarmed or, or those of things. So, the level of service, for the most part, is determined 1909 by the needs of the City at that particular time.

1910 **City Attorney Wynn:** And, excuse me. To the Manager's point, on the second page 1911 of the scope of work, it says that specific duties and responsibilities of security guards at 1912 each location shall vary and will be assigned by each facility manager. The C'.., and that 1913 the City will provide the written procedures for each facility.

1914 So we have the opportunity, as the Manager just stated, to vary the duties and 1915 responsibilities and make this a fluid contract, which it is.

1916 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Well, I wanna make it a fluid contract by awarding it, 1917 but I would like to see what that contract looks like before we...

1918 [Inaudible comment]

1919 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...move act'.., I mean can.., I mean, you know, I would second 1920 Councilwoman Lanier's action but I wanna see it come back in writing before we solidify 1921 it, I guess subject to the contract.

1922 **City Attorney Wynn:** My understanding is that the Giddens firm is amenable to 1923 further negotiating or specifying with more clarity, the scope of work in the.., in the 1924 contract. Of course, that wouldn't change the rates.

Councilperson McCoy: Okay. Well, I would.., I'd be open to awarding it. But I, you 1925 1926 know, there are some things that I wanna make sure that I send to City Administration, because, you know, it gets.., you know, here's the problem that I've seen with security. 1927 1928 You know, one time there was a occurrence where something happened with a security 1929 officer and I was told that it has to be..., we have to contact Purchasing. Well, they leave 1930 at 5:00 o'clock. After hours, we need to make sure that there is some supervision as to 1931 who our point person is, or who our contact department is after hours. And there are 1932 some other concerns that I'll let City Administration, you know, deal with. But certainly, I 1933 would support doing the award.

1934City Manager Evans:And, Councilman McCoy, to your point, one of the conditions1935that we would ask and, and the modification, is...

1937 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...that the point and the security elements will be managed 1938 out of the City Manager's office. It wouldn't be something that Procurement would, would 1939 manage. We would manage the deployment and the contract for security.

This particular structure would go over the temporary Fire Station to be able to cover the existing apparatus. Right now, as it 2169 2170 stands, our apparatus are exposed to inclement weather. Our.., which leads to the, the deterioration of those assets, as well as fire personnel having to go out into weather 2171 2172 conditions in the chance that they have to respond to a call. There was one responsive 2173 bidder to the particular solicitation and Staff recommends approval. And the Interim 2174 Director of Public Works and the Interim Fire Chief are prepared to answer any questions 2175 that the Board may have. And there's monies budgeted for the project in the existing 2176 2020 budget.

2177 And Staff recommends approval.

It, it'll basically add value to the property with whatever final use that property has for the City, as we move forward.

- 2291 Councilperson McCoy: It...
- 2292 **Councilperson Lanier:** Scroll.
- 2293 **Councilperson McCoy:** It doesn't work.
- 2294 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** It scrolls. So, the City Attorney Performance Review 2295 Rating Sheet...
- 2296 **City Attorney Wynn:** Right. That's about four pages.
- 2297 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: And that's just...
- 2298 **City Attorney Wynn:** [Inaudible].
- 2299 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...a yes or a no.

- 2300 **City Attorney Wynn:** Five pages. And then, City Attorney Performance Evaluation
- is the rest of the Item.
- 2302 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: [Inaudible]...
- 2303 **City Attorney Wynn:** And you just pick the format that you want.
- 2304 **Councilperson Lanier:** I kinda like the sample two.
- 2305 Councilperson McCoy: Mhmm.
- 2306 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Yeah. The second one.
- 2307 **Councilperson McCoy:** [Inaudible]evaluation?
- 2308 Councilperson Lanier: Yes.
- 2309 **City Attorney Wynn:** The second one?
- 2310 Councilperson Lanier: [Inaudible].
- 2311 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: For me.
- 2312 **City Attorney Wynn:** Okay. Is that...
- 2313 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mr. Lawson?
- 2314 **City Attorney Wynn:** ...the consensus?
- 2315 **Councilperson Lawson:** Samp'.., sample two, Madam Chair.
- 2316 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mr. McCoy?
- 2317 **Councilperson McCoy:** [Inaudible] evaluation's good.
- 2318 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright.
- 2319 **City Attorney Wynn:** Okay.
- 2320 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** So, the second one.
- 2321 **City Attorney Wynn:** Thank you.
- 2322 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Thank you. Alright.
- 2323 **10.** Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Item No. 10.

2324City Clerk Anthony:ROADWAY PROJECTS - MONROE HEIGHTS STREET2325CONFIGURATION AND 13TH STREET TRAFFIC CALMING

2326 TERRENCE BAILEY, P.E., DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC WORKS (561) 845-4080

2327 City Clerk Anthony: Madam Chair, we do have public comment cards on this Item.
 2328 The acceptance of public comment cards on this Item is now closed.

2329 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. Mr. Manager.

City Manager Evans: Madam Chair, Members of the Board, upon my arrival, there was information that was provided to by Members of this Council concerning the project that we refer to as the Monroe Heights Improvement Project. We did have an opportunity to have a discussion with the Board at your first workshop...

2334 [Inaudible dais comment]

...to have conversations as to how we can look at some 2335 City Manager Evans: options and alternatives to move this particular project to closure. Based on the 2336 conversations that we've had, Staff has worked with our consultant to bring some options 2337 2338 before you for consideration. At this time, I will ask Director Bailey to provide a presentation, working with one of consultants and then we will entertain some addition 2339 conversation from the Board. At the end of the day, we do want to get some clarity as to 2340 how you wish for us to proceed because, in a email that I provided to the Board, the 2341 2342 options that are proffered before you range anywhere from \$150,000 to \$5.7M and, of course, there's some significant time that's associated with this. But we do want to make 2343 2344 sure that the project is something that the Board is in support of and that the community wishes to see, as it relates to the project. 2345

- 2346 So, without further ado, Director Bailey.
- 2347 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Good evening, Council, Manager.

As you know, we have had many discussions on Monroe Heights. And the.., to sum them up, there's a concern in reference to the gutter down the middle of the road. At the workshop as mentioned, Staff was commissioned to come back with multiple options so that we could present them back to the community and have a robust discussion of how Monroe Heights will end at the end at the day when this project is deemed complete.

Here with us today is Susanne Dombrowski from Chen & Associates, the consultant who does a lot of work with the City and has provided the report that was attached in the previous correspondence.

And with that, I'll turn it over to Suzanne.

2358Ms. S. Dombrowski:Alright. Thank you, Terrence. And good evening, Council.2359Suzanne Dombrowski, Chen Moore & Associates.

So, the project area we're looking at is Avenue ! to Avenue M, 26th Court to 23rd Street. Specifically, the streets with valley gutter going down the center, which are included in our study, are the east/west roads only. So, all of these alternatives you see, only apply to these east/west streets. Right now, the project is substantially complete, meaning everything has been installed except for the last layer of asphalt on the road.

2365 So, the existing conditioned section that you see there right now is a thirty foot right-ofway. We have to ten foot travel lanes with the concrete valley gutter going down the 2366 center. And all of the drainage is go'..., running down that center, underneath the valley 2367 2368 gutter and we have four foot raised sidewalks on the side. So, the design alternatives that we've looked at, they're.., they all utilize the thirty foot right-of-way, so we will not 2369 need to acquire any right-of-way from the property owners. And they all provide the level 2370 of service we believe is needed for this neighborhood in terms of traffic flow and flood 2371 2372 protection.

So, Option 1 looks very similar to the existing section. We call this an inverted crown road, where the 'v'.., the roadway has a 'v' shape, all of the stormwater is collected in the sensor. The difference here, between this option and the existing is that the gutter will be replaced with asphalt so the entire roadway will appear to be asphalt and the drainage will still be collected down the center of the road.

2378 **Councilperson McCoy:** Can you, can you repeat that again because...

Ms. S. Dombrowski: So, the, the existing... I'm gonna go back to the existing system. The existing section has a valley gutter in the center, and this is the inverted crown road, so the 'v' shape where the low point is in the center of the road, and Option 1 keeps that same 'v' shape but we are removing the concrete valley gutter and replacing it with asphalt. So, it'll be the same texture, same color as the pavement.

2384 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, will that still act as a drain? I mean, as a...

2385 **Ms. S. Dombrowski:** The.., all the drains will still be in place, and so the, the 2386 roadway will still channel the water to the center and then to the drains. Yes.

2387 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.

Ms. S. Dombrowski: Okay? So, Option 2 is a crowned road, so this is like an upside down 'v' where the high point is in the center of the roadway, and any, any alternative that uses [inaudible] this crowned road, we have to collect the stormwater on the side. So, we're gonna be installing drainage all along the side as well, and [inaudible] to catch the water. This section here is a one-way traffic. So it's a fourteen foot travel lane, with sidewalk on either side and an 'f' curb and gutter.

- Option 3 is a crowned road again. This is two-way traffic, two eleven foot travels, no sidewalk on this section. We have a two foot grass strip on either side.
- 2396 Option 4, again, is two-way traffic, crowned section, sidewalk on one side. And 2397 the 'f' curb and gutter, these are two ten foot travel lanes.

And then, Option 5, is a crowned section with four foot raised sidewalk on either side, so that's no curb and gutter. But you still would be installing the drainage on the side of the road to collect the stormwater. 2401 So the cost comparison to complete the existing design, which is just to add the 2402 top layer of asphalt on the east-west streets, is \$144,000. And then, you'll see the options 2403 vary from \$1M up to \$5.7.

Alright. And I'm happy to take any questions you may have.

2405 City Manager Evans: Madam Chair, if I may? What Staff's seeking for... seeking from the Board as it relates to this particular Item is to request direction as to how you 2406 wish for us to proceed. If you can select three or four options for consideration, Staff 2407 2408 would like to have a series of community charettes to get some input and perspective 2409 from the residents in that impacted area. Because if we look at a situation where we're going to expend anywhere between \$3M to \$5M, or, or \$6M for that matter, we can 2410 2411 understand that there may be some concerns, as it will result in additional destru'... disruption and a longer construction period because you're effectively, you know, redoing 2412 the, the roadway project. So, if the Board is amenable to taking that approach, Staff will 2413 2414 be prepared to have a series of community charette meetings, working with development 2415 services to make sure that there's appropriate notice, and having participatory discussion with residents in the community, ultimately then bringing that information back before you 2416 2417 all, and then moving forward with allocating the appropriate funding associated with that 2418 project.

Also, the Board can, if they choose to selection an option and have us, or.., and have Staff move forward or select one option that you would like to have, the community provide some input and perspective but obviously we know that this has been a, a point of discussion throughout the City and we wanted to get some clarity from the Board, as to how we wish to proceed. Once we get direction on this Item, then Director Bailey has a supplemental Item that is related to this Item, and we will share that after we have a dialogue with the Board as to how you wish to proceed.

- 2426 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. You said we had public comment cards?
- 2427 **City Clerk Anthony:** Yes, Madam Chair. We have one public comment card.
- 2428 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** That wasn't the one that was submitted late, is it?
- 2429 **City Clerk Anthony:** No, Madam Chair.
- 2430 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 2431 **City Clerk Anthony:** William Wiley.
- 2432 Mr. W. Wiley: Good evening...
- 2433 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Good evening.

Mr. W. Wiley:City Manager and Council Members. I just.., My name is William
Wiley, for those who don't know. I'm an honors algebra teacher, Roosevelt Middle
School. I'm a process server also for the Palm Beach County Courthouse and I am also
a Planning & Zoning Board member for Riviera Beach.., for the City of Riviera Beach.

2438 I wanna talk to you guys about, and I spoke with Mr. Gagnon about it also, about 2439 the trucks and the transportation coming through Federal Gardens..., the City of Federal Gardens, and possibly the Monroe Heights..., excuse me, not Monroe Heights but the 2440 2441 Parson Heights area. I took my.., I took duty, well, my job to go to a couple of the facilities 2442 and talk to them about the, the trucks coming through the city..., coming, coming through 2443 our neighborhoods, and I was a little concerned but the people kinda put me at ease, the 2444 supervisor put me at ease by stating that they're educating their drivers on it. A lotta the 2445 guys that were very sympathetic about coming through that area, well, it seem' like the major problem was the GPS systems are actually running through the City. Now, the only 2446 2447 answer to that is that some of the GPS's, as far as the electronics, what they do actually is that you have two different types of GPS systems. You have one that's actually for 2448 2449 truck drivers, then you have a local. That truck driving system will automatically reroute 2450 you from going through a neighborhood, and then you have a regular GPS like you have 2451 on your phone that will actually run you through anywhere you need to go at. So, she talked to her drivers at the time and a lotta guys were very sympathetic about coming 2452 2453 through the neighborhood because it is damaging some of the house foundations with trucks coming through and banging on the ground once they go over the speed bumps. 2454 2455 But, the simple answer I think for this, at the end of the day, was to at least be able to put a sign. 'Cause even the new guys were like, 'Well, if I'd'a known, I would never went that 2456 2457 way. I would a went around that corner and went down S Avenue and then came around 2458 Martin Luther King Boulevard. But, there's no sign there for them and all they're doing is 2459 looking at their phone, or looking at the GPS and they're following them, taking them 2460 straight through Federal Gardens.

- 2461 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Well, Mr. Wiley, this is about the Monroe Heights street 2462 project.
- 2463 Councilperson McCoy: [Inaudible]...
- 2464 **Mr. W. Wiley:** But I saw the 13th Street.
- 2465 **UNK:** [Inaudible] together.
- 2466 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Oh, I have it... Okay. Okay. Well, why we didn't we 2467 talk about that yet?
- 2468 **Mr. W. Wiley:** Am I ahead of time?
- 2469 **Councilperson McCoy:** No, you're good.
- 2470 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Go ahead.
- 2471 **Mr. W. Wiley:** I apologize.
- 2472 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** No, go ahead. I mean, we just didn't talk about 2473 Federal, unless I missed it.
- 2474 Councilperson McCoy: No, Madam...
- 2475 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Did I miss it?

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- 2476 **Councilperson Lanier:** No. It was a.., they were two together.
- 2477 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: [Stammer]...
- 2478 **Mr. W. Wiley:** Right. It was two together.
- 2479 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** I'll give you fifteen seconds back.
- 2480 **Mr. W. Wiley:** I apologize.
- 2481 [Inaudible dais comment and chuckles]

2482 So yeah. So, it's, it's sort of a big deal because, again, it is damaging Mr. W. Wiley: 2483 some of the houses there and a lotta the neighbors now who know my participation inside the City are, you know, calling asking, Facebooking, whatever, you know, about their 2484 2485 concerns about what's going on because some cars almost got sideswiped and some 2486 kids almost got hit. So, therefore, they wanted to make sure that these concerns were 2487 addressed. And, we talked to.., also with Mr. Gagnon, also. So, we're hoping to get this, 2488 at least if we can possibly get some signs put up so we can have at least some safety there for the kids that are in the neighborhood, and also for the cars that are parked on 2489 the side of the roads to where they won't be hit by these large 18-wheelers. 2490

- Alright. Thank you.
- 2492 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Thank you.
- 2493 [Timer]
- 2494 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. So, can we hear about 13th Street, or are we breaking this up?
- 2496 **Councilperson Lanier:** [Inaudible].
- 2497 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Because I would've waited on public comment if that 2498 was the case. I mean, I know I stepped out for a minute, maybe I'm...
- 2499 **Councilperson McCoy:** Both of them, yeah.
- 2500 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: We didn't discuss...
- 2501 **Councilperson McCoy:** Both of them are attached.
- 2502Interim Director of Public Works Bailey:13th Street yet.We were gonna do2503them sort of...
- 2504 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 2505 [Inaudible comment]
- Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. Just let me know what we got going on here.Thank you.

- 2508 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Apologies.
- 2509 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Go ahead. Alright. So questions...
- 2510 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: We...
- 2511 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...or comments...
- 2512 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: ... we are on Monroe Heights.
- 2513 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...on Monroe Heights?
- 2514 **Councilperson McCoy:** I do have...
- 2515 **Councilperson Lanier:** [Inaudible]...
- 2516 **Councilperson McCoy:** Go ahead.
- 2517 **Councilperson Lanier:** I, I., I like Option 5. I mean if you're asking but, you know, what would... Put up Option 5, let me see.
- 2519 **Interim Director of Public Works Bailey:** There you are.
- **Councilperson Lanier:** I think I like that one. [Pause]. Yeah. But it's not my neighborhood, so, you know, I, I would defer to the residents, int terms of what they want.
- 2522 Councilperson Lawson: Madam Chair?
- 2523 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

Councilperson Lawson: I would think that we, as a Council, maybe give them about three options to do these community conversations and just pick our top three and then allow for our Staff to go back to the residents and let them decide and rank the one, two and three.

2528 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Well, the only thing.., the only issue I have with that is, 2529 if we pick three and they don't want any of those, then we come back, I would like to hear 2530 what they have to say about...

- 2531 **Councilperson Lanier:** For all of them.
- 2532 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...the five. I mean, about all of them.
- 2533 Councilperson Lanier: Yeah.
- 2534 **Councilperson McCoy:** But you know you can't give 'em too...
- 2535 **Councilperson Lawson:** [Stammer]...
- 2536 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...many options, Madam Chair.
- 2537 **Councilperson Lawson:** ...and that, that's the issue [inaudible], Madam Chair.

- 2538 **Councilperson Lanier:** Don't, don't say that.
- 2539 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yeah. But this...
- 2540 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...people... Don't say that...
- 2541 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...is thing though.
- 2542 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...people know what they...

Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...I don't wanna be... I don't wanna be right back where we are because if we pick the three that they don't want, and that's all they have to vote for, then it's, 'You all didn't give us an option. Regardless, you gave us what you wanted to give us, so why didn't you just go ahead and select what you want?'

- 2547 **Councilperson Lanier:** [Chuckle].
- 2548 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Why bring it to us? That's kinda...
- 2549 **Councilperson Lanier:** I agree.

Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...being disingenuous. I mean, if all of these options are here... I mean, I think it needs to be pointed out how much they cost, because that is certainly a fac'.., a major factor to consider.

2553 Councilperson McCoy: Mhmm.

Chairperson Miller-Anderson: But I, I, I just don't want it to be that we're deciding and, and they're only giving input on what we've already decided on. Granted, I mean, you know, tonight is the opportunity too to share but, of course, everybody doesn't come to the meetings. But, I just.., we, we've gone down this road several times over the years. I know I saw one of the options being the one-way street.

- 2559 Councilperson McCoy: Right.
- 2560 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** You know? And, I mean, there was some contention 2561 about that issue. So, I don't want.., I'm just not trying to go down this road again.
- 2562 **Councilperson Lanier:** Yeah.

2563 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** I really hope that we get a lot of participation 'cause I 2564 think that was part of the problem too, we didn't have a lot of participation, we had two 2565 different survey charettes...

- 2566 **Councilperson McCoy:** And, you know, they were manipulated surveys, I would say.
- 2567 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** I don't know. I wasn't a part of it, so I...
- 2568 **Councilperson McCoy:** I live in...
- 2569 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...was not...

- 2570 **Councilperson McCoy:** ... District 1.
- 2571 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 2572 **Councilperson McCoy:** Despite what people think...
- 2573 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Pull it down.
- 2574 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...or say.
- 2575 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 2576 Councilperson McCoy: But...
- 2577 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Pull your mic down.
- 2578 **Councilperson McCoy:** You know, here, here's what I wanna ask...
- 2579 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Pull your mic down, please. Thank you.
- 2580 **Councilperson McCoy:** Is that better?
- 2581 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** So, the tie in option, I guess, you know, one of the.., I mean, the .., I mean, aside from the inconvenience of no longer being able to park on the road, the concern that I hear a lot is not being able to.., well, the, the centerpiece in the middle of the street, and where it is now, if there was a car that's on the road, if you hit.., what do we call it a divot? What do we call this, a? The center sidewalk? Then, it...
- 2587 **UNK:** A divot.

Councilperson McCoy: ...kinda jerks the wheel and it, like, redirects you so you really have to, you know, drive with two hands on the wheel when you're going there. My concern is, I'm looking at, I guess, one of the options and the tie in options, if you go with the crowned streets, here's one of 'em.

- 2592Interim Director of Public Works Bailey:Which, which option are you referring2593to you, sir?
- 2594 **Councilperson McCoy:** I, I guess, this is one of them. So, so this one right here.
- 2595 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Mhmm.

2596 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, my question is, how much of the road do we have, I 2597 guess, take.., do we have remove the whole lift off of the road in order to tie in the, the 2598 curb gutters back to the existing drain that's already in the center of the road?

Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Yes. The.., any relocation of the
drainage from the center of the road to the outside, is a major.., which is why you see
such a price difference, to the tune of two to \$3M. You'll notice the, the less expensive
options leave the drainage down the middle of the road. As soon as you move the

- drainage to the outside in order to get the road crowned, you, you pretty much add \$3M
 to the project. Just to go from crowned versus inverted crown.
- 2605 Councilperson McCoy: Mhmm. Well...
- 2606 Councilperson Lanier: Madam...
- 2607 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Hold on.
- 2608 **Councilperson McCoy:** The one-way option was, I think...
- Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: That was the original approved option,
 form the community, when did the surveys mailed to all the houses.
- 2611 Councilperson McCoy: Mhmm.

Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: That.., we pu'.., we put that back in because, again, as you have mentioned, there's been some question on how these decisions were arrived. So, you'll see the, the.., what, what the design is now, which was the second selection of the community and the one-way option, which was the original selection of the community, because there are still individuals out there who are saying, 'I voted for the one-way, why isn't it one-way?' And a number of them.

- 2618 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right. So, the C'.., the option that we have now, that was your suggestion?
- 2620 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: No, sir.
- 2621 Councilperson McCoy: Oh.
- 2622Interim Director of Public Works Bailey:Staff puts toge'.., Staff did this exact2623exercise, provided options and let the community decide what they wanted.

Councilperson McCoy: I, I just wanted to be sure because I was a Planning & Zoning Board meeting last week and it was suggested that [chuckle], I guess it was suggested that I, some kinda way, [chuckle], had something to do with it but I was like [chuckle], I thought it was funny. Even though it was the prior Council Member who had this seat, I thought it was very funny to suggest that, when we literally came into office and, you know, it was under construction at that point.

You know, I, I certainly agree, we have to go back out to the community but we're gonna find ourselves in a situation where, you know, I really wanna be a part of making sure that we get everybody out, but I don't wanna have any influence on what the community decides. I want it to be genuinely about what the people who live here and travel down this street every day has to say, because, you know, we'll go back and forth, you know, time and time again...

- 2636 [Cellphone ringtone]
- 2637 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...because we'll never get...

- 2638 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Can somebody silence their phone, please? It's sounds like ring doorbell or something.
- 2640 [Inaudible dais comment]
- 2641 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Go ahead. I'm sorry.
- 2642 **Councilperson Lanier:** It sounded like CashApp drop.
- 2643 Councilperson McCoy: So...
- 2644 [Chuckles]

2645 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, I would like to see if we can certainly.., we, we definitely 2646 have to have a lotta community meetings about this because I don't think we're gonna 2647 get everybody onboard to one design. But, I think we do have to make a concerted effort. 2648 But I was really hoping that we could find an option where we didn't have to go back 2649 through and tear up the roads again because that was very painful.

- 2650 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Well, [stammer], you do, sir. Actually,
 2651 you have two options.
- 2652 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well...

2653 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Finish it the way it was ori'..., finish it the way it was designed. Right? Just put the, the last inch.., last lift of asphalt on and finish 2654 2655 it the way it was approved in the last version, or you have, what is in essence, this version because there has generally been a complaint about, I've heard it called the sidewalk 2656 2657 down the middle of the road. The.., it's a curb for drainage down the middle of the road. 2658 If that is the primary concern, that residents just wanna see it black all the way across 2659 with asphalt, this, which I believe was the million dollar option, is to simply remove the 2660 concrete down the middle, make all of it asphalt and you don't have to relocate the 2661 drainage.

- 2662 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair?
- 2663 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Hold on one second.
- 2664 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, so that design that we seen in times past, where they 2665 showed Rosemary with the center grates down the middle?
- 2666 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Mhmm.

2667 **Councilperson McCoy:** Is something like that even an option? Like, even if you just 2668 outright remove the gutter altogether out the center, and then you do a, a grate however 2669 many feet, every forty-five or however many feet the distance is between the...

- 2670 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Well..
- 2671 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...the grates.

Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: ...thi'.., this option doesn't remove the grates that exist now. They'll still be in the middle of the road. The only thing that will come out is the concrete that's in the middle and it will replaced with asphalt. So the grates will still be in the middle of the road.

- 2676 **Councilperson McCoy:** So that very sharp inverted point, it'll be, I guess...
- Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: No. It'll be a little smoother. That's
 there for graphical exaggeration. It, it'll be, it'll be, it'll be smooth.
- 2679 Councilperson McCoy: [Chuckle].
- 2680 [Audience chuckles]
- 2681 **Councilperson McCoy:** For graphical exaggeration?
- 2682 **Councilperson Lanier:** Okay.
- 2683 **Councilperson McCoy:** That was good.
- 2684 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** That was very convincing.
- 2685 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair?
- 2686 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes, Ms. Lanier?

First of all, I think that the, the, the residents have the, you 2687 Councilperson Lanier: know, have the last say on this. First of all, let us be clear, this was a debacle from the 2688 2689 beginning. So, we need to be very, very clear about what the residents want with this deal. And I think giving them all five options, I think that, at this point, and I'm., can't 2690 2691 believe I'm saying this, but cost should not drive this decision at this point. We are at a point now where this is just outrageous, where we are with this. I think that the time and 2692 the effort need to be put on getting residents to a location to discuss this. Not on... I 2693 mean, I, I, you know, I like the fancy diagrams and all that, but Staff time and energy 2694 2695 should be placed on getting people in the door, in the seats to discuss this. That is it. 2696 Because the way we are now with this, this is, this is too much. This.., the way this ha'... the way this has played out, now we're here with five options. This is the point where we 2697 2698 bring the residents in who live in this neighborhood, who walk, who walk down these 2699 streets, who drive down these streets every single day. And I think the effort for the Staff 2700 at this point, is to get people in the door, in the seats to discuss.

- 2701 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** How, how will the sidewalk issue be corrected? On these options.., with these options? Some of them are too small. Right?
- Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Well, please understand, there's only
 thirty feet.
- 2705 **City Manager Evans:** 'Feet, yeah.
- 2706 **Interim Director of Public Works Bailey:** So, depending on which option you select, if, if you want more sidewalk, that means you're gonna have to go with the one-

way. Because, there's n'.., typically, a sidewalk is five feet wide, so out of that thirty feet,
we just lost ten. There's only twenty feet left and we haven't done anything about the
drainage. So, even if you.., the reason the gutter went down the middle, is because you
would only utilize two feet of the twenty that's left, for drainage.

- 2712 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay. I'm...
- 2713 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Right?

2714 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Wait a minute. I'm thinking back. So, I remember a 2715 conversation saying that we had to have two side'.., sidewalks on both sides. And then, 2716 I mentioned about Singer Island having theirs done, they only had, in some parts only 2717 had one sidewalk. So, that still an option to have just one sidewalk? Have a sidewalk on 2718 one side?

- 2719 **UNK:** Mhmm.
- 2720 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: One of the options have a, have that like that?
- 2721 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Yes.
- 2722 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Which one is that?
- 2723 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: [Inaudible].
- 2724 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** And that, that helps with the sidewalk issue.
- 2725Interim Director of Public Works Bailey:So, there's Option 3 that has no2726sidewalks.
- 2727 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Which is crazy but...
- 2728Interim Director of Public Works Bailey:And there's Option 4 that has one2729sidewalk.
- 2730 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** And that will be wide enough to accommodate the wheelchairs and all of the walkers and all of that stuff?
- 2732 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Yes.
- 2733 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 2734 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: The.., we... Yes.
- 2735 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.

City Manager Evans: And, and, Madam Chair, Staff's concern with regards to that or, or the discussion that we've had internally is, invariably you're making a decision as to who gets sidewalks and other folks may say, you know, 'How come there's a sidewalk on that side and not on, on my side?' And there's people that don't want a sidewalk on

- their side as well, 'cause they don't want people walking in front of their home. So, you know, as part of the discussion...
- 2742 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: They're gonna walk in front of...
- 2743 **City Manager Evans:** ...with the community...
- 2744 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...the home even if they walked in the street.
- 2745 **City Manager Evans:** Yeah.
- 2746 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** You still gotta walk in front of the house.
- 2747 City Manager Evans: Uhuh. So...
- 2748 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Right.

2749 ...as part of the discussion, we can, we can certainly have City Manager Evans: 2750 those conversations. But what we can do, based on the comments that I'm hearing from 2751 the Board, we can have the community narrow down the options as part of the meeting, so we can say, 'Here's all five options. We wanna get the Board to three options but we 2752 wanna be able to say, 'seventy-five percent of the people like Option 3, thirty percent liked 2753 Option 2, et. cetera. So, we can work a process of elimination with the members that 2754 attend those meetings and then bring that to you with some calculations as to what the 2755 community says, out of all the options, which is their preferred, and you can see based 2756 2757 on what he sentiments are and actually have the community the process of elimination versus you, as a Board, saying... 2758

2759 Councilperson Lanier: Yeah.

City Manager Evans: ... you're gonna eliminate two and then next thing you know, you have a small group, or a large group that prefer the two options that you eliminated and then we're back in the situation where we're having additional conversations to include this and remove that, et. cetera.

- 2764 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 2765 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair?
- 2766 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 2767 **Councilperson Lanier:** I, I just think we have a chance now to get it right.
- 2768 Chairperson Miller-Anderson:: Mhmm.

2769 **Councilperson Lanier:** I think we have a chance now to let the community, the people 2770 who live on those four streets, I think we have a chance to allow them to say, 'This is what 2771 we want.' And I think that's what we should do.

2772 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** What.., is it feasible to have someone go to the doors and provide them with the...

2774 **Councilperson Lanier:** We're talking about four streets.

City Manager Evans: What my recommendation would be is to work with a graphic designer to create a literature about the meeting and then.., to see what the options are, the price tags, so kinda provide some information in advance to the meeting. And then, we get into the more substantive facilitated discussion. I won't have Staff facilitate the conversation, I will have somebody from the outside facilitation that we, as Staff, will be there to assist and then bring that back for the Board for consideration.

And so, there's, there's probably a series of at least three to four meetings that we would have concerning this project and, and drilling it down in more specificities. But we would go door to door, because it is a, a small area in the community, and we will send to property owners, as well as engage individuals that reside in the, the homes as well.

- 2785 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay. Anyone else?
- 2786 **Councilperson Lawson:** Madam Chair?
- 2787 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 2788 **Councilperson Lawson:** Mr. Bailey, the one-way road option, what would that do in reference to any road parking?
- 2790Interim Director of Public Works Bailey:Parking in the right-of-way is a difficult2791issue.
- 2792 Councilperson Lawson: Mhmm.

2793 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Because I don't believe there's 2794 supposed to be parking there. That said, everybody does it. So, we are struggling.., this 2795 has been the, the struggle for four years. We know it happens, but we can't design 2796 to that because there are rules on the books. We can't intentionally design against a rule. 2797 Which is also why the, the sidewalk conversation is also a difficult one. There's a s'.., a 2798 code that says when we rebuild roads, we're supposed to put sidewalks on those roads. 2799 Obviously, the Council always has the authority to override that in their motion when they direct Staff on what this community wants. But, the parking is an issue because there's 2800 2801 only thirty feet, and the..., I, I believe that there's a little bit of nostalgia on how east it was 2802 to park in there before the road project and get around. Because, individuals who have been for a long time, especially in the public safety sector will tell you, this has always 2803 2804 been a problem if somebody parks on the road, you know, getting around through Monroe 2805 Heights. So, the parking issue is not new, and this project did not create or exacerbate 2806 the existing parking problem. There's only thirty feet. So, if you park your car there, everyone's gonna have to go around. And if two people park next to each other, there's... 2807 2808 I [inaudible] anybody, in good conscious would try to squeeze in between two cars, sitting 2809 next to each other in, in that area.

- 2810 **Councilperson Lawson:** So my, my question is that current policy does not allow for us
- to have road parking in the Heights?

Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: The.., it, it's a little more complicated
than that because the parking from what I recall and I don't have it in front of me, you
can't park in front of driveways or next to driveways, you can't park in front fire hydrants.
And in effect, because the driveways are so close together and there're hydrants, it really
doesn't leave twenty to twenty-five feet anywhere, especially in this type of community,
where you could park and not violate one of the different, 'Don't Park Here,' type rules.
Inside the City's right-of-way.

- 2819 **Councilperson Lawson:** So if there was space, with a one-way road, would they only 2820 be able to park in the direction of traffic?
- 2821 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Being that we don't have that anywhere 2822 in the City, where we have indicated specifically for what is in essence on street parking. When you have on street parking, it goes through the site plan process to where you 2823 ma'..., you decide how you're gonna do it, where you're gonna do it, look at the driveway 2824 2825 spacings. It, it's, it's part of a, a much more intense look where you're gonna put on street parking. 'Cause there're, again, there are a number of different factors of where it will 2826 work and where it won't. And that's typically not in a residential neighborhood of this 2827 2828 nature. Think of more of a commercial arterial or somewhere in a downtown type setting, 2829 where you're pull off and, and do on street parking.
- 2830 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, if I may?
- 2831 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

City Manager Evans: Also, we, we see it in every major metropolitan city that has these constraints, where they say, Monday, Wednesday, Friday you park on this side. Tuesday, Thursday, you park on that side. So, if it is something that there is so prohibition in our policy and we want to look at that and let's say there is overwhelming support for the community to say that we want the one-way, with the understanding we'd like the opportunity to park on the roadway, then that's, you know, conversations that we need to have with Development Services as looking to modify an Ordinance or the Code...

- 2839 Councilperson Lawson: Mhmm.
- **City Manager Evans:** ...to be able to effectively address that but, you know, this particular situation and circumstance is not unique just to Riviera Beach, it's, it's...
- 2842 **Councilperson Lawson:** Right.
- 2843 **City Manager Evans:** ...any major city has these constraints. And we've gotta look at it, you know, from multiple angles.

2845 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Have we looked.., have we had conversations with 2846 Public Safety in, in regards to which ones are more difficult to get through, when they're 2847 coming down that street? Those streets, rather?

2848Interim Director of Public Works Bailey:No. Not at this time.

- 2849 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** So, when would be a good time to ask? I mean, when 2850 would we talk.., do we get input from them?
- 2851 **City Manager Evans:** We, we do get, as part of the, the site plan process, we do get 2852 input from Public Safety.
- 2853 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** But, is that after we've decided?

2854 City Manager Evans: The... that, that usually, and where we are today, obviously, 2855 this.., I don't think there was any conversation with Public Safety. I know originally when the conversation happened about the roadway project, Public Safety opined and said that 2856 the one-way streets was optimal from the standpoint, as far as being able to move 2857 2858 apparatus, but then there's other situations that their ability to turn and how they navigate 2859 through the community, there was some concerns on both sides. So, we can certainly, as part of the discussion, have conversations with Public Safety and get their opinion on 2860 2861 these particular projects. But, even as it stands now with the roadway as it is, when we have vehicles that are parked on both sides, it, it still impedes our ability to, to move 2862 2863 through the neighborhood.

2864 So, we, we can include them in the discussions and get their perspective as to 2865 which option is optimal for the purposes of life safety services.

2866 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. Yeah. I would like to know what their opinions 2867 are on each of the options. I mean, how it would impact them, and so, that the residents 2868 are aware of what the impact would be.

- 2869 **Councilperson Lawson:** Yeah.
- 2870 **City Manager Evans:** Yeah.

2871 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** You know, with Public Safety responding. And then 2872 also, looking at the idea about the parking on one side versus the other on the different 2873 days and, you know, what it would take for us to do that, or at.., just let.., at least, let it be 2874 a part of the conversation?

- 2875 **City Manager Evans:** Yeah.
- 2876 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** And what are the pros and cons for doing so?
- 2877 **City Manager Evans:** Okay.
- 2878 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Anyone else?
- 2879 **Councilperson Lawson:** Madam Chair?
- 2880 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mhmm.

2881 **Councilperson Lawson:** So based on the discussion, or from previous community 2882 conversations, the one-way was the overwhelming response, that was requested? 2883Interim Director of Public Works Bailey:Originally, when this project was being2884scoped, a survey was sent to all two hundred, I think it was about two hundred and twenty2885or two hundred and forty...

2886 **Councilperson Lawson:** Mhmm.

Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: ...houses in the, the construction area.
At that time, the options presented were similar, one-way, five feet of property on each side. And I believe there was one or two other options. The overwhelming response to that survey was one-way.

- 2891 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Now, how many though was that? How many.., of the 2892 two hundred...
- 2893 Councilperson Lawson: Responses?
- 2894 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...and something?

Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: [Stammer], it was not insignificant. It's
been three or four years, so let's say, [pause], anywhere from eighty to a hundred and
twenty respondents. It was, it was a decent response. We sent out a card that was prestamped back to Public Works, so they literally just had to put a check, write their name
on it and send it back.

- 2900 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: So, eighty...
- 2901 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: So we got...
- 2902 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...to a hundred and twenty responded way or the 2903 other?
- 2904 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Yes.
- 2905 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: We did get back...
- 2906Interim Director of Public Works Bailey:...Provided a response, and the2907majority was one-way.
- 2908 **Councilperson Lawson:** Hmm.
- 2909 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: And then what changed that? What happened...
- 2910 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: There was an election.
- 2911 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 2912 **Councilperson Lawson:** Okay.
- 2913 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** And then when.., did you do.., did they do another...
- 2914 **Councilperson McCoy:** [Stammer] hold on...

- 2915 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...survey?
- 2916 **Councilperson McCoy:** Hold on.
- 2917 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Well, hold on, hold on.
- 2918 **Councilperson McCoy:** What election?
- 2919 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: We already know what election. Which...
- 2920 [Chuckles]
- 2921 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: What was the response?
- 2922 [Chuckles]
- 2923 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...from the nigh'.., from the community? Was there 2924 another survey done?
- 2925 [Inaudible comments]
- 2926 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Yes.
- 2927 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: So...
- 2928 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: So...
- 2929 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...how many respond'... How was that done?
- 2930 Councilperson McCoy: [Inaudible].
- 2931 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: A meeting was called...
- 2932 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mhmm.

Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: ...and individuals filled this Chamber
 and cards were handed out to the individuals in the Chamber and they selected the option
 of their choice.

- 2936 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** How many people was that?
- 2937 Councilperson McCoy: Seven.
- 2938 [Chuckle]
- 2939 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Um...
- 2940 **Councilperson McCoy:** It was a handful.
- 2941 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey: Maybe thirty.
- 2942 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.

2943 Interim Director of Public Works Bailey:

High twenties, maybe thirty.

- 2944 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Okay.
- 2945 Councilperson Lanier: Madam Chair?
- 2946 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

2947 Councilperson Lanier: Okay. As I said before, we know what happened with this 2948 from the beginning. I think that we need to start these charettes. I think you need to get 2949 your Public Information Officer to get the information out to the public on the City's website. scroll it on Channel 18. If we had that many respondents initially, then there 2950 2951 should be as, as.., much more interest at this point, in terms of getting this right. And I 2952 think the only way that we're gonna be able to get this right, is from the people who live 2953 on those streets. And having them to come to these charettes, but I., but, but I want to 2954 say this and I wanna be very clear, you have to..., we have to do our part to get the people 2955 there. The issue has been, you know, you get six people there, eight people there and 2956 then, you know, that, that makes a decision and, you know, maybe they eighty but we know it's eight. But, the issue here is to get the people in the room, to be able to talk 2957 2958 about their own streets. And I think that we need to put the effort behind getting that 2959 public information out, and getting those charettes done.

2960 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright.

2961 **City Manager Evans:** Absolutely, Madam Chair. And we can do that. And, the other 2962 thing about lit is, we wanna make sure that not one, or a group of folks, take control of 2963 the conversation. That's why I think it's important to have it facilitated...

- 2964 **Councilperson Lanier:** Yes.
- 2965City Manager Evans:...so we get a tangible product that you all can make a public2966policy decision on.
- 2967 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Any other questions, comments from the Board?
- 2969 **City Manager Evans:** So, it's the desire from the Board to bring all those options and 2970 then have the community narrow it down to at least three for you all to consider?
- 2971 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** That's my recommendation.
- 2972 Councilperson Lanier: Yes.
- 2973 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mr. McCoy and Mr. Lawson?
- 2974 Councilperson McCoy: Yes.
- 2975 **Councilperson Lawson:** Yes, Madam Chair.
- 2976 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright.

2977 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: There is one more issue.

2978 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: [Inaudible]

2979 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: I believe you were provided, by email and paper 2980 copy tonight, due to the length of time between the workshop where the Council directed 2981 Staff to stop the project and today, there's a concern by the residents in Monroe Heights 2982 that the Avenue O, specifically, the manholes and the valve risers are sticking up about 2983 an inch because, again, it's missing that last inch of asphalt. We've gotten a couple 2984 complaints about cars, tires, rims, alignments. And so, I believe someone approached 2985 the Mayor, and maybe I believe a, a number of you all in reference to this, so Staff looked into what would be the cost to just put the second lift of asphalt down Avenue O, which 2986 2987 will eliminate this issue. Obviously, this conversation we're having right now has zero 2988 impact on Avenue O, because Avenue O is already a crowned road, that you would 2989 expect. So, any change or deviations will not... that are selected through this process, 2990 will not impact Avenue O and we won't have any redundancy. So, this memo sort of 2991 outlines the request by the residents in Monroe Heights to, in essence, put the second lift of asphalt, just down Avenue O so that they don't have to continue running over the, the 2992 2993 raised valve covers and manholes.

- 2994 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: And that's seven.., am I looking at this right? \$7M?
- 2995 **City Manager Evans:** That, that's the...
- 2996 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Am I looking at the wrong thing?
- 2997 **City Manager Evans:** ...total cost of the project.
- Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yeah. So, \$95,000 would be the cost to pavejust Avenue O.
- 3000 City Manager Evans: Yes.
- 3001 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Oh, okay.

3002 **Interim Public Works Director Bailey:** And you can kinda see in the picture, obviously, 3003 that the'..., there's an, an elevation difference. I'm sure you've been out there to see...

- 3004 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Well, it was like that in Park Manor too.
- 3005 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: During...
- 3006 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: We just put some...
- 3007 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ... until the second lift of asphalt...
- 3008 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...spray around it and, then told people to go around it.
- 3009 Councilperson Lanier: [Chuckle].
- 3010 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Until the second lift of asphalt...

- 3011 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yeah. Which was...
- 3012 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...was down.
- 3013 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...a while afterwards.
- 3014 Councilperson McCoy: Mhmm.
- 3015 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mhmm.
- 3016 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: But once the second lift of asphalt was down...
- 3017 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: It, it...
- 3018 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ... Avenue H runs...
- 3019 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...was good.
- 3020 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...pretty smooth.
- 3021 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yep.

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: So, their request is that they, they don't want to
 have to drive over that for however long it'll take for us to make this decision, do a design,
 go out to bid and actually construct the ultimate option.

3025 So, we... currently, Avenue M is under construction, right now. We authorized that contract [pause]... Was that in, I think July or August. I can't recall when we came to 3026 3027 Council, but we've gotten a, a proposal from that contractor who will be laying asphalt in 3028 the next three weeks. Plus, part of the Avenue M project to also do Avenue O. The 3029 request is that, that will take that contract over the City Manager's ten percent allowable 3030 change order authority, and we have your standing order not to do anything else on Avenue O. So, Staff is requesting the motion that is listed below, authorizing completion 3031 3032 of the Avenue O and acknowledging that it will take it over the ten percent signature 3033 authority of the Manager, in order to implement your will, if it is...

- 3034 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** What, what percentage has been paid on the contract 3035 already?
- 3036 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: So...
- 3037 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** 'Cause that was included, right?
- Interim Public Works Director Bailey: It was included, but we told them not to do it and,
 it's...
- 3040 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: [Inaudible].

3041Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...a different contractor because, remember, it's3042been four or five months si'.., maybe longer, since they were.., they're pretty much done

3043 and gone. And it's Man-Con who did that work. So, it, it would be...

- 3044 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** But that was a part of the...
- 3045 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: It was a...
- 3046 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...scope.

3047 **Interim Public Works Director Bailey:** ...part of the project but remember, we also 3048 gave them directive that we're taking it out of their contract, so its.., has been removed 3049 from their contract 'cause we wanted to close that contract. Remember, we were having 3050 issues with Man-Con.

- 3051 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Yeah. That's why I'm saying, what percentage did we 3052 already pay?
- 3053 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: I don't have the [inaudible].
- 3054 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** We didn't pay the one hundred...
- 3055 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: But we didn't pay...
- 3056 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...percent?
- Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...this. We didn't pay for this 'cause they didn't
 do it.
- 3059 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay. So, what percentage did we do though?

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Again, there were change orders back and forth,
 I don't, I don't have the percentage of the Man-Con contract, but Man-Con wouldn't be
 the contractor we would have do the work. Almazan, you may remember, like I said, six
 months ago we...

- 3064 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mhmm.
- 3065 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...authorized Almazan to do Avenue M.
- 3066 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mhmm.

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: They are getting near completion. If you've been on Avenue M, you can see concrete work is pretty much done. There's only, you know, they're about to pave, so while they're bringing the pavement.., the asphalt and the paving machines, they could come over to Avenue O and do this for us at the same time, and have this accomplished within the next four weeks. Otherwise, we would.., we'd have to go through a, a extensive bid process in order to get it done, if that's the will of the Council.

3074 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** So, you're saying with the payout, they did not.., we did 3075 not close them out? We took this out before...

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: We took.., we removed... All the scope of work
 that the Council directed us not to implement, was removed from their contract.

- 3078 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** But I thought they were pretty much done and, and they 3079 had been paid and we were just holding up from...
- 3080 City Attorney Wynn: [Inaudible].
- 3081 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...them putting out the last layer out?

3082 **Interim Public Works Director Bailey:** Yes, we removed it from their con'.., we, we 3083 removed those elements from their contract.

3084 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** No. I'm saying I thought all of.., everything was pretty 3085 much done and they had almost received all of their money, and they were gone or 3086 leaving before we told them anything about that. So, they were still around and we told 3087 them we were gonna take this part out, and we did not pay for that already?

- 3088 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: We have not paid for this. From their contract.
- 3089 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. Anyone else?
- 3090 **Councilperson Lanier:** Yeah. Madam, I just wanna know why, why do I have it like 3091 this? Why wasn't it a part of the Agenda Item?

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: This came up after the Agenda was submitted.
This, this was a..., it was an issue that was discussed, but because we were talking about
the Item, I discussed it with Mr. Evans, 'Would this be a good time to bring it up?' As a...

- 3095 **Councilperson Lanier:** But you coulda...
- 3096 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...request from...
- 3097 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...you coulda, you coulda...
- 3098 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...the community...
- 3099 **Councilperson Lanier:** You could just added this to the Agenda. This is a whole 3100 Resolution and everything right here. Why you just didn't add it to the Agenda?
- 3101 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mr. Evans, you, you wanna...

This, this particular.., in, in my conversation with Director 3102 City Manager Evans: 3103 Bailey and continuous comments from folks in the community, the memorandum was proffered as a supplement to this particular Item. We are not moving forward with a, a 3104 3105 new Resolution, we're asking for a motion to allow for Staff to modify a, a previous 3106 Resolution so we can benefit from the mobilization of an existing contractor. Our concern is that, in the vent that when the Agenda was posted and those kinda things, if we were 3107 3108 to go through the process and push this to another week, we may miss that window when 3109 the contractor was gonna mobilized and then you're looking at a substantially higher cost, 'cause they may add \$15,000 to bring units back on scene. So, it was something that 3110 3111 Director Bailey and I had a conversation about. We said, 'Let's get this Board as guickly 3112 as possible, for the purposes of completing this particular issue and addressing some of the concerns that have been expressed from the elected body, as well as the Mayor, and 3113

3114 some of your constituents that have been calling related to this.' So, that's why we added 3115 this as an element to the conversation this evening.

Councilperson Lanier: I, I can appreciate that, but I don't like this. I liked it.., I don't like this. So, form, from.., from this point on, don't, don't give us something as a part of a conversation and then have us to make a motion. I mean, I, I, I completely agree with the motion, don't get me wrong, but I don't like how.., this form it came in. If you're gonna have a motion, and us to make a decision, put it in the Agenda.

- 3121 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Anyone have any comments regarding this, or 3122 any motions that you would like to make...
- 3123 Councilperson McCoy: Well...
- 3124 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...for this Item or?

3125 **Councilperson McCoy:** One question. So, does this extend.., I, I guess I'm looking at 3126 the back of the memo, appears to be 23rd Street and Avenue O. Can you see the memo?

3127 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: I have a copy, yes.

3128 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. So, there's a portion that's actually on 23rd Street. Will 3129 the paving cover that? Because I see that there's a valve, or something there.

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: So, the, the paving as we've set it up, will be for 3130 3131 Avenue O and then, as you know, when you come around the corner, there's a radius, it'll flare out all the way to the end of the radius so when the side streets straighten out. 3132 3133 In essence, right at the white part where the concrete valley gutter starts, that where the 3134 new pavement will stop. So it'll, it'll be the entirety of the intersection. We won't just pull the straight thru lanes, it'll be wider at the intersection to make sure we get, basically, 3135 everything but where the concrete starts and the valley gutter. So it'll, it'll carry the valves 3136 3137 I think you're discussing. You...I

- 3138 Councilperson McCoy: Right.
- 3139 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...were questioning.
- 3140 **Councilperson McCoy:** And there'll be some...
- 3141 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: There will be a transition back down to where it's3142 one inch lower.
- 3143 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Not a speed bump? Right?
- 3144 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Not a speed bump.
- 3145 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Well, they probably need a speed bump.
- 3146 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, I mean, you don't get to driving up 23rd Street and all of
- a sudden, [bladoop sound].

- 3148 [Chuckles]
- **Councilperson McCoy:** You know, you got a, a harmonization.
- Interim Public Works Director Bailey: There will be a little [badoonk sound], because,
 you know...
- **Councilperson McCoy:** You know, I just don't want it to be like, you know...
- **Interim Public Works Director Bailey:** Well, so there's stop signs at that.., those 3154 intersections, so they should be stopped...
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Yeah, but...
- **Interim Public Works Director Bailey:** ...[inaudible] rolling into the intersection at the 3157 stop sign. So, there shouldn't be any careening and a [badoonk sound].
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** He's speaking from personal experience, obviously.
- 3159 Councilperson McCoy: No. I'm looking at this picture. You, you see...
- **UNK:** You see a 'badoonk' right here? [Inaudible].
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** You gotta stop for the stop sign.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay.
- 3163 S:" Alright
- 3164 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright.
- **Councilperson Lanier:** So, let me ask a question, can you, can you increase the 3166 scope when it's.., it was not originally envisioned?
- **Interim Public Works Director Bailey:** Yes. That's what a change order, as long as it's not a material change.
- **Councilperson Lanier:** But see, I...
- **Interim Public Works Director Bailey:** Asphalt.., asphalt is in their bid in contract, so 3171 this is, in essence, just a quantity overrun. We wanted to buy...
- **Councilperson Lanier:** So, you didn't know this would be needed before?

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Well, we were given direction from the Council,
'Do not do anything else in Avenue O.' So, this is.., that's why I said, we, we had to come
back. Your last direction was, 'Do not finish that Avenue O project. Stop where you're
at, just clean it up and send the contractor down the road.'

Councilperson Lanier: Now this a Procurement issue.

- 3178 **Interim Public Works Director Bailey:** This was a request from the community that 3179 they don't wanna drive over those valves for the time 'til...
- 3180 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** And I, I agree with that. I mean, yeah. They're, they're 3181 horrible. You have to dodge them, [inaudible]?
- 3182 **Councilperson Lanier:** Yeah. And I, I, like I said, I totally agree with moving forward 3183 with this, it's just the fact that how it was presented.
- 3184 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Right. Okay.
- 3185 **Councilperson McCoy:** Can you find some better words to use? That's my District. 3186 You know?
- 3187 [Chuckle]
- 3188 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** You said something about your sector funds? Right? 3189 You can take it out of his sector funds.
- 3190 Councilperson McCoy: Ooo.
- 3191 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: If you'd like to add that to the motion...
- 3192 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Whose motion was that?
- 3193 **Councilperson Lanier:** [Inaudible].
- 3194 Councilperson McCoy: But it's...
- 3195 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: [Inaudible].
- 3196 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...already budgeted for.., the money's already there so...
- 3197 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: I'm just sayin'...
- 3198 [inaudible comments]
- 3199 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: So, we're making a motion to allow this to...
- 3200 **Councilperson Lanier:** District 1, sector funds.
- 3201 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...move forward. Mr. McCoy, would you like...
- 3202 Councilperson McCoy: Yeah.
- 3203 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...to do the hors?

Councilperson McCoy: Yeah. Yeah. I make a motion authorizing the City Manager to exceed the ten percent change order authority as outlined in Resolution 46-18 and Resolution 30-19 for the completion of the Avenue O project, less the side streets, 23rd, 24th, 25th, 26th and 26 Court, authorizing the Director of Finance and Administrative Services to make the payment for the same. 3209 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. Are we putting an amount? I know on the fiscal

- impact it said \$95,000, but we're just leaving it to open to exceed ten percent? That couldbe a hundred.
- 3212 **Councilperson McCoy:** To exceed ten percent.
- 3213 **Councilperson Lanier:** Okay.
- 3214 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Huh? To not exceed ten per'...
- 3215 **Councilperson Lanier:** To what?
- 3216 **City Manager Evans:** I would say, if... Madam Cahir...
- 3217 **Councilperson McCoy:** I mean, it's...
- 3218 **City Manager Evans:** ... I may, not to exceed \$95,000. If, if we gotten...
- 3219 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yeah. I...
- 3220 **City Manager Evans:** ...that cost, that needs to be...
- 3221 **UNK:** Right.
- 3222 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yeah. I would be comfortable...
- 3223 City Manager Evans: ...specified.
- 3224 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...with it. So...
- Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Could you make it, I think it was ninety-five and
 two...
- 3227 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: So, \$96,000?
- Interim Public Works Director Bailey: \$95,301 or something to that effect. The exact
 number but...
- 3230 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: \$96,000?
- 3231 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Ninety-six.
- 3232 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. Can you...
- 3233 City Clerk Anthony: [Inaudible].

3234 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** How do you want him to do it, Ms. Claudene. Since 3235 the.., it says City Manager to exceed the ten percent change order, but we're now saying 3236 for it not to exceed \$96,000.

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Point of clarity, that would be for this effort, because there are already.., I think there's one change order for a very small amount that

- has already been worked on. So, ninety-six is not the grand total of all change orders, it would just be this Avenue O effort.
- 3241 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Oh yeah, he read the rest of it off.
- 3242 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Okay.
- 3243 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: What it has written in the memo. Right? Those are...

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Right. Well, the change that you're proposing, I don't want it to be confused that \$96,000 is the total of all change orders because there are a couple that are existing. That area already executed in inside the Manager's signing authority. This would be \$96,000 for this Avenue O work.

- 3248 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Only?
- 3249 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Only. Yes. 'Cause we know this is defined cost.

3250 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** So that's not what we're saying? What are we saying? 3251 We're not saying that?

- 3252 **City Clerk Anthony:** [Inaudible]. You're saying for the completion of.
- Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Okay. As, as long as we're clear that for the completion of makes it.., the \$96,000 is just for the Avenue O portion.
- 3255 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: But that's what it says, right? In Resolution 46-...
- 3256 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: We're on the same page
- 3257 **City Manager Evans:** Yeah.
- 3258 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...18 and Resolution 30-19 for the completion of the 3259 Avenue O project, less the side street? 23rd, 24th, 25th, 26th and 26th Court.
- 3260 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Okay.
- 3261 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** That covers what you're saying?
- 3262 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: I think so.
- 3263 **UNK:** Yes.
- 3264 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Well who wrote this?
- 3265 City Clerk Anthony: [Stammer]...
- 3266 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Well...

3267City Clerk Anthony:Madam Chair, how the motion would read is, a motion3268authorizing the City Manager to exceed the ten percent change order authority as outlined3269in Resolution 46-18 and Resolution 30-19, not to exceed \$96,000 for the completion of

- 3270 the Avenue O project, less the side street, 23rd Street, 24th Street, 25th Street, 26th Street
- and 26th Court, authorizing the Director of Finance and Administrative Services to make
- 3272 payment for same.
- 3273 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. Your motion still stands, Mr. McCoy?
- 3274 Councilperson McCoy: Yes.
- 3275 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: And your second still stands?
- 3276 **Councilperson Lawson:** Second.
- 3277 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. Madam Clerk. Did we have.., I don't even... 3278 Did we do pu'.., yeah, we did public comment, right? Earlier?
- 3279
- 3280 UNK: Yes.
- 3281 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mr. Wiley.
- 3282 **Councilperson McCoy:** Yeah....
- 3283 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** But now we're getting to 13th Street. Can we.., do we 3284 need to.., we need to vote on this now.
- 3285 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes, please.
- 3286 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 3287City Clerk Anthony:[Inaudible] this one and then move on to discussion regarding328813th Street.
- 3289 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** It really feels like it's 11:00 o'clock.
- 3290 **Councilperson Lanier:** [Inaudible].
- 3291 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** I mean, it really feels late here. Go ahead.
- 3292 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Lawson?
- 3293 Councilperson Lawson: Yes.
- 3294 City Clerk Anthony: Councilperson Lanier?
- 3295 Councilperson Lanier: Yes.
- 3296 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson McCoy?
- 3297 Councilperson McCoy: Yes.
- 3298 **City Clerk Anthony:** Chairperson Miller-Anderson?

3299 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

3300 **City Clerk Anthony:** Unanimous vote.

Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. Now we're going to take a look at 13th Street,
 traffic calming.

3303 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes. Thank you for your patience and that vote.

There has been concern from residents along 13th Street, about traffic patterns, and the use of 13th Street by more heavy trucks, and the noise that it creates, potential damage to the road and the houses. So, this commission..., a study was commissioned on alternatives for traffic calming to try to alleviate this issue of trucks using 13th Street through that residential neighborhood. And again, Suzanne is still here. Suzanne Dombrowski [chuckle] is here to provide that, that analysis.

3310 **Ms. S. Dombrowski:** Thank you, Terrence. Good evening...

3311 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Good evening.

3312 Ms. S. Dombrowski: ...everyone again. Suzanne Dombrowski, Chen Moore &
3313 Associates.

3314 So, we looked at the 13th Street corridor. As you can see, this is between Avenue 3315 U and Avenue R, it runs through the residential neighborhood of Federal Gardens. It's 3316 surrounded by schools, you've got some recreational uses and industrial uses, with the 3317 UPS facility. So, we looked into various alternatives to reduce both, either the speed or 3318 the volume of vehicles going through this corridor and these alternatives they're based 3319 on national studies by transportation organizations. They look at the effect'..., 3320 effectiveness of these methods throughout the country.

So, the current section for the 13th Street corridor, it's two twelve foot traffic lanes 3321 and the speed limit is 25 miles an hour. So, our alternative one is to narrow the traffic 3322 3323 lanes with the use of striping. You could either do the one solid stripe or have some cross 3324 striping here. And, the narrow travel lanes is one method that's shown to reduce speed 3325 and increase driver awareness. The second alternative is introducing traffic calming 3326 signage. You already have speed humps in the, in the area. I think you've got two sets 3327 of them through there. So, adding this traffic calming signage, again, it's increasing the driver awareness sign'..., you know, signalizing to everyone that they need to slow down 3328 3329 as they enter the neighborhood. Alternative three is a raised intersection, so this would 3330 be... Oops. That's Avenue U and Avenue R, and the raised intersection is gonna physically force vehicles to slow their speeds as they go through there. This can be 3331 3332 decorative, stamped or colored concrete, or you can have it as plain asphalt and have it be striped. Alternative four are crosswalks. There would be two at each of those 3333 intersections. You'd have signage and, again, these could be decorative or they could 3334 be just asphalt with striping. These will physically force the vehicles to slow down again. 3335 3336 Alternative five are called chicanes. Some people call them bump outs and this certain areas, almost like a little island on the side of the road that narrows the traffic lane in that 3337 one area. Again, these are shown to reduce the speed and increase driver awareness. 3338

Also, can be decorative, you can do it with landscape features or have it just be concrete. 3339 Alternative six is a traffic circle installed. We propose one at the intersection of Avenue 3340 R and 13th Street. And these traffic circles reduce the speed of all vehicle, but they greatly 3341 3342 reduce the speed of the larger truck traffic. The curbing you see around the traffic circle is designed so that emergency vehicles can get through there quicker if they need to. 3343 They can mount that curb and take that intersection faster if they need to get through. 3344 Alternative seven is a permanent road closure, so 13th Street would end there, at Avenue 3345 3346 U. And, you could replace the asphalt with sod or concrete, however you wanted to do it, and have signs. Now, this would have access only to this neighborhood from the west 3347 3348 side, so that's, you know, both for the emergency vehicles and the neighborhood. Alternative eight is a partial road closure so only eastbound traffic would be allowed 3349 3350 through this area. And, this would prevent the general population from traveling 3351 westbound through the neighborhood. Emergency vehicles could still pass through there 3352 if they needed to. Obviously, they'd be going through a one-way street.

And so, the costs vary, you know, pretty significant'..., pretty significantly. In the alternative, they can be combined, it doesn't have to be just one, but you'll see they range from \$1,500 all the way to thirty. And, the speed reduction, it really depends on the enforcement level that you have out there as well, but it ranges from half a mile an hour up to nine mile' an hour. And obviously, the permanent road closure is more of a reduction in the volume of traffic rather than speed. And we've also [stammer] signified in here which ones we think would be considered a beautification to the neighborhood as well.

- 3360 Alright?
- 3361 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright.
- 3362 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair?
- 3363 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 3364 **Councilperson Lanier:** Since I live on 13th Street....
- 3365 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mhmm.

3366 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...and this has been an issue with the street for the last five 3367 years, there's never been an issue with the speed.

3368 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mhmm.

Councilperson Lanier: That's not an issue. The issue is the 18-wheelers, the UPS trucks, all types of heavy trucks that are coming through that neighborhood. So, I like a lot of those options. The, the traffic circles, the bump outs, in addition to having some signage. I think that we might wanna go the same route as the Monroe Heights deal in letting the neighborhood.., and letting that street decide how they want to proceed. But, since there are eight options on here, I know that for a fact that the closing the street off is not.., it won't be one of them.

3376 **Councilperson Lawson:** Madam Chair?

3377 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Go ahead.

Councilperson Lawson: I've heard the same thing about 13th Street. Is it an option, or an interest, of just restricting trucks going through the neighborhood?

- 3380 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair?
- 3381 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Go ahead.
- 3382 **City Manager Evans:** Unfortunately, since it is a public roadway...
- 3383 [Inaudible dais comment]

City Manager Evans: ...we, we can't restrict access to the, to the neighborhood. If there was a situation where the weight would impact or impede, you know, the, the infrastructure there or damage the infrastructure, then we have a little bit more to stand on. And we did do some structural reviews to see if effectively that was another mechanism we can utilize and, and based on the information that was provided, everything seems to be up to standards. So, that's why we have proffered these options for consideration.

- 3391 **Councilperson McCoy:** Madam Chair?
- 3392 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Were you done, Mr. Lawson?
- 3393 **Councilperson Lawson:** Yes, Madam Chair.
- 3394 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Go ahead.

Councilperson McCoy: So, is it possible to do something like a artificial archway or something like that? Where you can reduce or prev'.., you know, you can maybe put a sign that says like, 'Entering Federal Gardens,' and have it at a certain height to prohibit, you know, large trucks from going through?

- 3399 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: If the...
- 3400 **Councilperson McCoy:** Similar to...
- 3401 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...Council wanted a...
- 3402 **UNK:** Like a arch...
- 3403 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...beautification...
- 3404 Councilperson McCoy: Some...
- Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...project that had something large that forced
 vehicles to pass underneath...
- 3407 **Councilperson McCoy:** Like a bridge.
- 3408 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...and that... Pardon?

- 3409 **Councilperson McCoy:** Similar to how there's bridge clearances in, you know...
- 3410 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Like an arch...
- 3411 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Something of that nature...
- 3412 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: But would [inaudible]...
- 3413 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: I don't, I don't...
- 3414 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, 'cause I...
- 3415 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...I don't think...
- 3416 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...know there's some sector dollars...
- 3417 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: [Inaudible].
- 3418 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...over in District...
- 3419 **City Manager Evans:** And, and here, here's the other access, the other issue is...
- 3421 UNK: [Inaudible]

3422 **City Manager Evans:** ...some people do get FedEx deliveries, some people get 3423 Amazon deliveries and so, you know, when you do that, understand that one, there's 3424 gonna be other people throughout the community that want that and two, now you're 3425 impacting the ability for, you know, cer'.., certain packages and things to be delivered as 3426 well. So, we're, we're [inaudible]...

- 3427 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Or moving trucks.
- 3428 City Manager Evans: ...that.
- 3429 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Remember, moving trucks are semi.
- 3430 **City Manager Evans:** Moving trucks as well.
- 3431 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: I mean, if somebody's a whole house, they're 3432 probably backing up a semi and...
- 3433 Councilperson Lanier: Yeah.

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: So, the trouble is the.., it's all the same truck.
Right? It's all the same truck. So the ones that help us.., help our lives be wonderful,
look the same as the ones that really kind of...

- 3437 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Aggravate...
- 3438 Councilperson Lanier: I, I think...

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: De'.., degrade. So, there's not.., it's, it's very
 difficult to create physical barrier that will separate the ones we like and the ones we don't
 like, 'cause they're exactly the same truck.

- 3442 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair?
- 3443 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mhmm.

3444 No. I agree, the, the FedEx trucks or UPS trucks, I mean, you Councilperson Lanier: 3445 couldn't very well do anything about that. I know that [stammer] when Mr. Evans, City Manager, I remember one time he was here he did go and talk to UPS and they did stop. 3446 3447 But then, you know, after he left and it just kinda started back up again. So, the 3448 conversation that he did have with that business section right there, they did stop. But 3449 then we, we were back at it, the same thing again. So, we're just trynna figure out ways 3450 now that we can just eliminate it altogether in terms of, you know, this.., maybe the circle, 3451 maybe these bump outs, something that can physically stop them from coming through 3452 because [stammer]..., he's had the conversations, we've had the conversations with 3453 them. They stopped. We've had people, police officers come, they ticket, they stop. But, 3454 this has been going on for the last ten years. It's, it.., they'll stop for a minute, you know, 3455 four months, five months and then we're, we're back at it again.

3456 So, there needs to be something that permanently dis'... you know, makes them 3457 say, 'Okay. Yeah, I'm not going down that road again.' But what happens is that, what you have to understand is that when come down 13th Street, it's not only the GPS that's 3458 bringing them there, they are avoiding three school zones, coming down..., coming down 3459 8th Street, coming down Australian, coming down Blue Heron. They come down 13th 3460 Street across, they don't.., they can avoid all three school zones. So they come down 3461 13th Street because of that. Which is one of the reasons. So, we're just trynna figure out 3462 3463 now because we've had the ticketing, we've had the, you know, had the conversations 3464 with the, the businesses and they'll stop for a while but then they start back.

3465 So, I think at this point, we just need to have something in there that will deter them 3466 physically from coming through that neighborhood.

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: I think, if I may interject. Our struggle, as
engineers and technicians, the, the vehicles you're describing, are almost the same size
as a fire truck. So, we have to design it to allow a fire truck. And...

- 3470 Councilperson Lanier: And I, I...
- 3471 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...if a fire truck can get through...
- 3472 **Councilperson Lanier:** ... I get that. I...
- 3473 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...I don't know...
- 3474 **Councilperson Lanier:** Wait a minute.
- 3475 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...that we're gonna...

- 3476 **Councilperson Lanier:** Hold on, Mr. Bailey.
- 3477 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...achieve...

3478 Councilperson Lanier: Hold on, hold on. I get that. And we've had that conversation 3479 before, about the fire trucks and I know we have to ensure that they can come because 3480 that was an issue in terms of the speed humps down 13th Street. 'Oh, the fire...,' you know, 'the fire trucks may not be able to get there.' That did not deter them. They can 3481 still come down 13th Street. I'm saying, I've had this conversation, we've has this back 3482 3483 and forth with 13th Street for the last five years. And at this point, we need to be able to 3484 bring something to the neighborhood for them to be able to say, 'We want this or we don't want that,' so that we can have something physically that impedes traffic and 18-3485 3486 wheelers. I'm not talking about FedEx trucks. I'm not talking about UPS truck' or a regular moving truck. I'm talking about 18', forty ton trucks that come through that neighborhood 3487 every single morning. [Pause]. So, something that deters that, is the conversation that 3488 3489 we're trying to have with neighborhood.

3490 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Anyone else? So, you want, Ms. Lanier, I 3491 understand you want them to take it out to the community with these options? You wanna 3492 do the same type of setup as their doing...

- 3493 Councilperson Lanier: Yes.
- 3494 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...in Monroe Heights?
- 3495 Councilperson Lanier: Yes.
- 3496 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** With all of the options?
- 3497 **Councilperson Lanier:** I, I think that we can take out the road closures.
- 3498 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** The two.., the partial...
- 3499 Councilperson Lanier: Yes.
- 3500 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...and the full?
- 3501 **Councilperson Lanier:** Yes.
- 3502 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mr. Lawson, Mr. McCoy? Anything to add?
- 3503 **Councilperson McCoy:** Just one question. Mr. Evans, you said it was reviewed, I guess, when, when did that happen?
- 3505 **City Manager Evans:** Director Bailey, if you can provide some more specificities as to when we took...
- 3507 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: It...
- 3508 **City Manager Evans:** ...a look at that.

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: I believe it was in the middle of twenty sevent'..., eight'..., end of 2017. Because I know that this issue came up and it first started in law enforcement because there used to be 'No Truck' signs. And law enforcement went to look at implementing some pretty strict enforcement of those 'No Truck' signs, and it came back that..., and, and, Madam City Attorney, can you help me, and you may not remember as well...

- 3515 **Councilperson Lanier:** She, she...
- 3516 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: It was...
- 3517 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...wasn't, she wasn't here at that time. Sh'...
- 3518 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: But we...
- 3519 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...she wasn't here but...
- 3520 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: it came up again in...
- 3521 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...let me, but let me stop...
- 3522 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Hold on, hold on, hold on. Both of you can't talk at...
- 3523 Councilperson Lanier: Yeah. Let me...
- 3524 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...the same time.

Councilperson Lanier:stop you right here. I've been through this issue for the last 3525 five years in this, in this same neighborhood, this is where I live. So, there were some 3526 issue in terms of police, in terms of ticketing the.., they said, 'Oh, you can't put a sign up.' 3527 3528 Now, I beg to differ given the fact that this, this is the City of Riviera Beach and we are the Council and I think we can put a sign where we want to put a sign. But, they took the 3529 signs down. There were signs there. They took 'em down, and said that we can't put a 3530 sign that says, you know, 'No Trucks.' They have signs all over the county that says no 3531 3532 trucks. So, I disagree with that act, that the Police Department did. Or whoever did that. So, I'm just saying to you now... I mean, we can kill this issue and we can move forward 3533 and take this to the neighborhood so that can decide. 3534

- 3535 [Pause]
- 3536 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Mr. Lawson, you said you didn't have any comment?
- 3538 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, I was just gonna ask, he was gonna defer to the 3539 Attorney, what... Is there something he was gonna get from her?

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Well, there.., if, if I recall correctly, the law enforcement provided, was it an Attorney General render'.., decision or determination that because it's a public road, because those vehicle' pay for that road through their gas taxes, that everyone pays, that they're allowed to use public roads. Because there was a similar situation, I believe in another part of the state, where they wanted to eliminate

- truck traffic through a residential neighborhood and it came out of the State Attorney's office that you can't do it because we don't segregate who pays gas tax when they go to the pump, so they.., if they fill up in the City, they part for part of the construction of that road and they have access to it. It's a very watered down, sort of.., my recollection of the situation when, when it came up, eighteen, twenty-four months ago.
- 3550 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** So then, the neighborhoods where we see those signs, 3551 they're allowed to put those up because it may impact the roadway in a negative way? 3552 How do the other neighborhood'...
- 3553 **Interim Public Works Director Bailey:** If there's a safety issue. So, initially this came up with the covert on the canal...
- 3555 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Mhmm.

3556 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ... and we looked at the original design, the construction on whether that covert would collapse, 'cause people though, potentially, the 3557 weight of the trucks would collapse the cover. And, as you heard Mr. Evans said, that 3558 analysis was done and it was confirmed that there is no safety issue with trucks over that 3559 covert and it's potential to sort of cave in and... cave in the road. So, with that eliminated, 3560 there is no public safety.., and I'll say safety concern. There is a nuisance, and it's 3561 3562 acknowledged but in order to restrict access, there has to be a clear public safety reason, obviously, like a bridge falling down or something of that nature which would then give 3563 you cause to not allow heavy vehicles when you know it's going create a safety issue. 3564

- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** So, the places I'm speaking of are not actually in the City, they're in other cities and I'm., they're just roads. You know? In the neighborhoods. But, maybe that was just grandfathered in? Did this change at some point in time? Because I, I know there is no safety issue with some of the places I've seen.
- 3569 **Councilperson Lanier:** Yeah. And you see...
- 3570 City Manager Evans: And...
- 3571 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...truck signs up...
- 3572 **City Manager Evans:** We...
- 3573 **Councilperson Lanier:** ...that which means that makes no sense given the fact that 3574 you can close it off if you want to.
- 3575 **City Manager Evans:** We can place signs but it's unforceable . So some 3576 communities place signs but they can't cite or restrict somebody if they did want to go 3577 through it. And, from the law enforcement perspective, they were concerned about a sign 3578 that effectively says no truck traffic and then they call from a resident, and then say they 3579 can't enforce it, and then the resident says, 'Well, why do you have the sign?'
- 3580 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Right. Right. Like the bike lane...
- 3581 City Manager Evans: Mm.

3582 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...that they park in. Okay. So, Ms. Lanier?

3583 SL: We're gonna move forward with the... And then too, I think that the City does have 3584 some home rule authority to risk trucks traveling on residential areas. That's first and 3585 foremost.

- 3586 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Can you all get some information on that and bring it 3587 back to the Board?
- 3588 **City Manager Evans:** Yeah. We, we can pull the, the Attorney General opinion, 3589 'cause I've, I've read it and, and we've.., it's the same question that was posed.
- 3590 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 3591 **City Manager Evans:** About that. So we can get that and have Legal take a look at it and provide some perspective as well.
- 3593 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. So, we'll move forward to the community with all the options except for the partial and the full closure?
- 3595 Councilperson Lawson: Mhmm.
- 3596 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Everyone okay with that?
- 3597 Councilperson McCoy: Yes.
- 3598 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. That's it for this Item?
- 3599 Councilperson McCoy: Move...
- 3600 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: That is...
- 3601 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...to adjourn.
- 3602 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...end of... I'm actually right there with you all on that.
- 3603 You know that, right?
- 3604 [Inaudible dais comment]
- 3605 **City Manager Evans:** I, I can move through mine very quickly.
- 3606 **Councilperson Lanier:** We're all on the same page with it.
- 3607 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. Alright. Go ahead, Mr. Evans.

3679 **City Manager Evans:** The, the three names are published in the Agenda Items. The 3680 last name, Ms. Coffer, we will make sure that we, we publish that on our website, as far 3681 as the individuals that are on the Surtax Committee. We can certainly do that.

3689 City Manager Evans: Madam Chair, this Item is updating on the status of Peanut 3690 Island. We've had continued discussions with the Port of Palm Beach and feel that we 3691 are in a good place as it relates to the potentiality of the City of Riviera Beach being a partner as it relates to the restoration and reconstruction of the facilities on Peanut Island. 3692 We have had conversations with private sector firms that are interested in participating 3693 3694 with the City of Riviera Beach. However, one of the things that I do want to get correction 3695 from the Board is, I, I would like to put together a scope of work or a scope of 3696 responsibilities for purposes of going through a competitive solicitation process to see 3697 what proposals or interest we get from the private sector to assist us in this endeavor. I 3698 think it's abun'... been abundantly clear from this Board that we as a City would assist in 3699 the grand funding and the grant writing as it relates to Peanut Island, but bringing ad 3700 valorem tax revenue to the table, would be something that the Council would have to think 3701 long and hard of about and looking to leverage some other ways to see this particular 3702 opportunity come to life. But I think in the abundance of caution, I would like to, at your 3703 next City Council meeting, put together basically what a arrangement would look like in 3704 the event that he City is to partner up with the private sector and then ultimately, get the 3705 Board's blessing on what that document is so we can go through a, a competitive 3706 solicitation process where we get proposals from the private sector, or the public sector 3707 that may be interested in participating with us.

Also, I do want to update the Port of Palm Beach that there is still a desire from the City of Riviera Beach to be the entity involved in securing the lease of the 4.3 acres, that includes the boathouse, the Coast Guard facility and the Kennedy bunker. And our intention is to activate the site to help promote some passive recreational uses, to also provide ecotourism and a special place for events and venues. But one of the major elements associated with that is the modification to the Ordinance that the county has in 3714 place that really impedes our ability to do some of the things that we believe create the 3715 synergy necessary to facilitate the contribution that is necessary.

3716 So, this Item is to bring you up to speed and ultimately see if the Board is interested 3717 in me bringing forward what a potential arrangement would look like, or what the City 3718 would like to see proposers bring forward for our consideration for a partnership in actually 3719 operating and restoring those historic facilities on Peanut Island.

3720 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Did we have any public comment cards on this 3721 Item? You said no, right? Alright. I remember. Mr. McCoy, Ms. Lanier, Mr. Lawson, any 3722 comments? [Pause]. Alright.

- **City Manager Evans:** Okay.
- 3841 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright. So...
- **Councilperson Lanier:** It slipped...
- 3843 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...Kimberly Jackson
- **Councilperson Lanier:** ...[inaudible]. Yeah, Kimberly Jackson.
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...and who said... Lawson, you said you had 3846 somebody?

- 3880 **Councilperson Lawson:** 'Be able to come back with [inaudible]...
- 3881 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: The name?
- 3882 **City Manager Evans:** Yeah. We, we can come back with...
- 3883 Councilperson Lawson: [Inaudible].
- 3884 **City Manager Evans:** ...the other one. We can definitely come back with the other 3885 one.
- 3886 Councilperson Lawson: [Stammer].., I'll have a recommendation to you by tomorrow,
 3887 Mr. Evans. I just to...
- 3888 **City Manager Evans:** Alright.
- 3889 **Councilperson Lawson:** ...confirm with the individual first.
- 3890 **City Manager Evans:** Okay.
- 3891 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright.
- 3892 [Inaudible dais comment]
- 3893 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, you know... And, you know, I don't know...
- 3894 [Inaudible dais comment]

3895 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Yeah. That's fine. But, you know, we shouldn't wait 3896 an'.., because, I mean, it's not like they'll be doing anything contentious that there'll be a 3897 [inaudible] vote.

- 3898 **City Manager Evans:** Yeah. [Stammer]...
- 3899 **Councilperson McCoy:** They're essentially, putting...
- 3900 Councilperson Lawson: [Inaudible]...
- 3901 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** They can get started.
- 3902 City Clerk Anthony: Madam Chair?
- 3903 **City Manager Evans:** Yeah.
- 3904 **City Clerk Anthony:** In discussing with the, the City Attorney, I would like to 3905 suggest that you all make a motion to appoint these individuals...
- 3906 City Manager Evans: Yes.
- 3907 **City Clerk Anthony:** ...because, as of this point, once you all have made this decision, they would now have to operate up under the Sunshine law.
- 3909 **City Manager Evans:** Yes.

- 3957 City Clerk Anthony: TOWN OF MANGONIA PARK UPDATE

CITY COUNCIL MEETING

3958 JONATHAN EVANS, CITY MANAGER (561) 812-6590

3959 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, we do not have any public comment cards on 3960 this Item. The acceptance of public comment cards on this Item is now closed.

3961 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Mr. Evans.

3962 City Manager Evans: Madam Chair, pursuant to the direction that was provided to the Board at a previous meeting whereby we provided notice to the Town of Mangonia 3963 3964 Park that we were not interested in moving forward with a additional agreement for future years, and that we wanted them to cure the over \$500,000 balance that was owed, we 3965 went through the dispute resolution process with Legal present and Administration, and 3966 we were able to work out basically what we believe to be the terms and conditions of a 3967 3968 settlement with regards to the amount that is owed to the City of Riviera Beach. The 3969 Town of Mangonia Park, this evening,, is having the discussion and that's where Assistant 3970 Manager Jacobs is at this particular moment. The thought process and what the 3971 agreement would contemplate is that they would pay the City of Riviera Beach \$355,000 3972 of the \$500,000 that is owed to the City of Riviera Beach. Also, that they will continue to 3973 make themselves current as we continue to work through another long term agreement 3974 with them. There is a \$148,000 that is still outstanding, that we are working with them as 3975 a mechanism to provide some clarity as far as some of the charges, but also, they wanted 3976 to be able to go back to their Council and say this is something that we effectively have to keep Riviera Beach involved and engaged in the conversation with the Town of 3977 Mangonia Park. We believe that there is some value as it relates to a long term 3978 3979 agreement with Mangonia Park. If we look at moving forward with them, with another fifteen year agreement, the term and conditions of the agreement, the value of the 3980 3981 contract is approximately \$7.5M over a fifteen year period. If you were to also put in the 3982 CPI, which has been over the term of the contract that we executed with them from 2005, which is set to expire in 2020, and if you accounted for the CPI, you're looking at a contract 3983 3984 that is valued close to \$10M, if we look to move forward. One of the things that we will 3985 have conversations about in future discussions, and not to give out what our strategy is, is that there's so'..., certain elements that the Town of Mangonia Park wants the City of 3986 Riviera Beach to consider as part of contractual negotiations, but we want to get them 3987 paying on time, we wanna get them current and we also want to work towards a long term 3988 3989 agreement because there is value. In the event that the City loses that revenue stream, 3990 obviously, you have to find a mechanism to bridge the gap for the shortfall.

3991 So, more information will be happening, as it relates to that, but I did want to let 3992 you know that we did have a productive conversation and there's certain elements that 3993 we put in place to ensure that they pay their bill on time and that we work towards a long 3994 term agreement. So, this is just for your edification and ultimately, this would have to 3995 come back before the Utility District for ratification, as it relates to the agreement between 3996 both parties to cure the outstanding issues.

And, Ms. Wynn, I didn't know if you had anything else to add as it relates to the conversation we had with them?

3999 **City Attorney Wynn:** No. You covered everything. Thank you.

4000 **City Manager Evans:** Alright.

4001 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Discussion by City Att'.., well, were there any 4002 questions or comments for Mr. Evans, regarding this Item? [Pause]. Alright.

4003 DISCUSSION BY CITY ATTORNEY

- 4004 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Discussion by City Attorney.
- 4005 **City Attorney Wynn:** No comments.
- 4006 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright.

4007 CITY COUNCIL COMMITTEE REPORTS

- 4008 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** City Council committee reports. Any committee 4009 reports?
- 4010 **Councilperson Lawson:** Madam Chair?
- 4011 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 4012 **Councilperson Lawson:** The meeting next month, I believe the TPA...
- 4013 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

4014 **Councilperson Lawson:** ...will be a [pause] I could say, highly contentious meeting

4015 based upon some of the discussion that was happening at the last meeting. Myself and 4016 Councilwoman Lanier are the.., serving on the Board over at TPA and there was 4017 discussion about State Board 7 that we

- 4017 discussion about State Road 7, that we...
- 4018 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** You're serving on it, not together.
- 4019 Councilperson Lawson: No.
- 4020 **Councilperson Lanier:** [Inaudible].

4021 Councilperson Lawson: I'm sorry. We, we've ser'.., I've served as the alternate and she was the primary. So, just to make sure that we have some representation there, we 4022 4023 are gonna make sure that we work out, before the next meeting. I don't have the exact 4024 date but I think it's gonna be after our next Council, so by then we'll be able to work out a 4025 schedule at the next meeting to determine who will be able to attend. And we've, as a 4026 Council, I just wanna make sure that we're well attended at these meetings and we can 4027 implement some of the, the plans of our City, and sitting down with Mr. Bailey and Mr. Evans about what we'd like to see and what improvements we'd like so we can actually 4028 be a player with the TPA as well. So, by the next meeting, I'm gonna have a discussion 4029 4030 with Mr. Evans to just talk about some of the roadwork that we would like to have done.

4031 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright.

- **Councilperson Lawson:** And then also, myself and Ms. Lanier will make.., have a discussion at the next meeting to just confirm our schedules for the following TPA.
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Alright. Any other committee reports?

4035 STATEMENTS BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL

- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Statements by the Mayor and City Council. We'll start 4037 with Mr. McCoy.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** I have nothing.
- 4039 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Oh. Gosh. Ms. Lanier.
- **Councilperson Lanier:** I have nothing [inaudible].
- **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** [Inaudible]. Mr. Lawson? He has something, of 4042 course.
- **Councilperson Lawson:** I have nothing, Madam Chair.

4064 So, the City Council attended Palm Beach County Day on last week, quite a few 4065 of us. And I thought it was very productive. Mr. McCoy probably has more information 4066 to share.

4067 [Chuckles]

4068 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Were you planning on sharing that tomorrow, since 4069 you were.., you got ahead of us.

- 4070 **Councilperson McCoy:** No. I think when I went up there, it...
- 4071 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: [Inaudible].
- 4072 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...almost took me out.
- 4073 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Oh. [Chuckle].
- 4074 **Councilperson McCoy:** Because I went, you know, I was going five days straight.
- 4075 **Councilperson Lanier:** Oh, that's how you got sick?
- 4076 **Councilperson McCoy:** Yeah. And then, come back to something...

4077 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** Well, he represented us up there well before many of 4078 us got there, so we thank you for that, Mr. McCoy. But, I think it was pretty productive 4079 and, and trying to secure funds for our Utility District.

- 4080 Councilperson McCoy: But...
- 4081 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: So...
- 4082 Councilperson McCoy: But, but Members...
- 4083 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: I thought this...
- 4084 **Councilperson McCoy:** Let... Can I...
- 4085 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...was my comment...
- 4086 **Councilperson McCoy:** Can I...
- 4087 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...time.
- 4088 **Councilperson McCoy:** Can I say this?
- 4089 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 4090 [Chuckles]

4091 **Councilperson McCoy:** I gotta say this. You know, the work is really not done. There 4092 has to be follow up because, you know, we got the very first day of session, there's 4093 probably another fifty-five more to go and they probably already forgotten...

- 4094 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** [Inaudible]. Okay.
- 4095 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...about us.

4096 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** So, we're gonna stay in contact with our lobbyist and 4097 our reps and senators and just make sure they remember why we came up there and 4098 we're still...

- 4099 **Councilperson Lanier:** [Inaudible].
- 4100 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...here.
- 4101 **Councilperson Lawson:** Madam Chair?
- 4102 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

4103 **Councilperson Lawson:** I think we should definitely make a point to having somebody 4104 go there.., back to Tallahassee before sessions out, whether it's Mr. Evans and one of 4105 our colleagues up here on the dais. So...

- 4106 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** But you all know that the Florida League of Cities' 4107 legislative days are coming up...
- 4108 **Councilperson Lawson:** Yes.

4109 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...the first week, I think, of February.
4110 So, if anyone plans on attending that, that is another opportunity to go in front of them.
4111 So, might wanna take a look at that date if you were not planning on going. It's pretty
4112 impactful, like the Palm Beach County Day. At least I think it is.

- 4113 And I just wanted to thank Parks & Rec and all of the departments that participated 4114 in making the MLK parade and other activities successful. The weather was great, so it, 4115 it, it really worked out very well for us, I think.
- 4116 I, I don't.., if I had something else to say, I kinda forgot it at this point, 'cause...
- 4117 **Councilperson McCoy:** [Inaudible].
- 4118 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** ...getting... I don't know. It's not even late, guys.
- 4119 **Councilperson Lanier:** I know but it's...

4120 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** I don't know but for some reason we're.., it just seemed 4121 very long. But, I think we got a lot accomplished and we do have another meeting 4122 tomorrow, so maybe tomorrow you all can gas up and be ready to...

4123 Councilperson Lanier: [Inaudible].

- 4124 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: ...talk.
- 4125 [Inaudible comments]
- 4126 **Chairperson Miller-Anderson:** With that being said... You have something now?
- 4127 **City Manager Evans:** Yeah, yes.
- 4128 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 4129 **City Manager Evans:** Really quick, Madam Chair. I'm, I'm sorry. I'm sorry.
- 4130 [Chuckle]
- 4131 **City Manager Evans:** Just really quickly, tomorrow from 10:00 to noon...
- 4132 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Oh yes.
- 4133 **City Manager Evans:** ... is the Heron Estates grand opening.
- 4134 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Right.

4135 **City Manager Evans:** So, if you can be in attendance, certainly, they, they would 4136 love to have you in attendance. We have the event, the soiree, on Friday and so, 4137 hopefully, see everyone there. And, we will be putting out information on our social media 4138 and our City website.

4139 After a lot of discussions and conversations with law enforcement professionals, 4140 as well as Staff internally, I have come to a conclusion for the top two finalists for the 4141 Chief of Police for the City of Riviera Beach.

- 4142 **Councilperson McCoy:** Tradrick McCoy, Doug Lawson?
- 4143 **City Manager Evans:** [Chuckle].
- 4144 [Chuckles]

4145 **City Manager Evans:** The two candidates that are moving on in the final steps of the 4146 process, that there is a private investigator that's looking into their background as, as we 4147 speak...

4148 Councilperson McCoy: Oh...

4149 **City Manager Evans:** ...right now. It is Ms. Tonya Chapman and Mr. Nathan 4150 Osgood, are the two individuals that are finalists for the Chief of Police. We're hopeful to 4151 be able to conclude all the background checks and then convene with other law 4152 enforcement professionals within the agency to select the number one candidate. But 4153 those are our top two that are moving on in the process.

4154 So, thank you to the community, the Staff, all the support that went into the process 4155 and looking forward to introducing our new Chief here pretty soon.

4156	And that concludes my comments, Madam Chair.
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4157 Chairperson Miller-Anderson: Alright.
