- 71 question upon granting the leave, shall be decided by a two-thirds vote without debate.
- No Member can speak a second time to a question as long as any Member desires to
- speak who has not spoken to the question.'
- And I would also ask, in addition to following that two ti'.., two bites at the apple
- rule, that you please mute your microphone until I recognize you. That way, we'll cut

- Robert's Rule that you're quoting with no reference to us applies then I don't even think
- that that's something that we should even be entertaining at this point because, clearly,
- that is very much open for interpretation.

- to be deemed as me taking another opportunity to ask.., or, me speaking twice on a Item.
- 110 Chairperson Botel: Okay.

- 112 **Chairperson Botel:** So, what we're gonna...
- 113 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...somebody's gonna opine on that and provide us some sort
- of reference ahead of time, I don't think it's something that we need to adopt right now,
- because there are some issues...
- 116 Chairperson Botel: Oh no.
- 117 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...that I even raised to.., with the Manger today, a few of these
- 118 Items, so I don't even want to even start this whole conversation when it appears that
- asking follow up questions can be perceived as speaking twice.
- 120 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. McCoy, thank you. We, we will be using Robert's Rules
- and Robert's Rules will allow you to speak twice on a topic. You can speak once for ten
- minutes, and have all the questions, all the follow ups that you like in that first opportunity.
- 123 And then we'll see other people.., listen to...
- 124 **Councilperson McCoy:** But Madam...
- 125 **Chairperson Botel:** ...other people's...
- 126 Councilperson McCoy: ...Chair? What I'm...

- 132 **Chairperson Botel:** We're gonna adhere to it tonight. Ms. Miller-Anderson.
- There was, well, a couple years back, there's a 133 Councilperson Miller-Anderson:
- Resolution that should be on the books regarding the limited amount of time to speak 134
- and, and how many times we can come around. So, I personally think that, that's 135
- 136 something that needs to go on the Agenda so we can have a discussion about that, in
- 137 terms of following it versus just coming out of the blue before this meeting saying that
- 138 we're gonna do it that way. That [inaudible] that we had a meeting for a couple years
- 139 back, and there's a Resolution on the books, so we can actually, you know, read.., look
- 140 at that, bring that Resolution back and modify it based on what Council wants to do, but
- 141 being that it did come to us before, I think that we probably need to bring it back before
- 142 we try to implement something here on the spot.
- 143 Okay. It's really.., I... Thank you for that opinion. It's not so **Chairperson Botel:**
- 144 much that it's on the spot, we do adhere to Robert's Rules of Order. Now, I will, I will
- 145 admit that we haven't had this discussion, but I will also tell you that we are facing a lot of
- criticism from the community, all segments of the community, with regard to the way we 146
- 147 are conducting our meetings. I would ask you, if we don't abide by this, then at least,
- 148 please, be succinct, think about the questions you wanna ask before you ask them. If
- 149 you can please abide by this Robert's Rules.., we'll, we'll give you a little, little flexibility
- 150 this first go around but if we can abide by Robert's Rules as much as possible, take one
- 151 big bite of the apple, ask all your questions and then let's o'.., let's have other people
- 152 speak before you speak again. That's the way good meetings are run and that's the way
- 153 I'd like to see this meeting be run. And we can have that discussion in the future. As a
- 154 matter of fact, we're going to be having a discussion in the not too distant future about
- 155 how we run our meetings, about how we put our Agendas together and we can make that
- 156 discussion part of the discussion about our Agenda composition. But for this evening,
- please try to abide by Robert's Rules and speak once on the topic, get all your questions 157
- out, let other people speak, speak a second time if you have to and then we can move 158

266 1. RE-APPOINTMENT OF BESSIE BROWN TO THE GENERAL EMPLOYEES

267 PENSION BOARD.

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EUREKA YOUNG, INTERIM DIRECTOR OF HUMAN RESOURCES, (561) 840-4880

269 **Chairperson Botel:** And now, we'll move to Item No. 1, which would've been the 270 reappointment to the General Employee's Pension Board. And I had an opportunity to 271 very briefly text with Mayor Felder earlier and he expressed, as do I, a desire to have a 272 discussion about how board members are appointed, by whom, is there a distribution 273 across this City with regard to membership on any board and so forth. So maybe we can 274 ask... Mr. Evans, I hate to put you on the spot like this but if we could ask you to give us 275 a brief description of how board members in general are appointed, and most particularly, how Board members to the pension Board are appointed. It seems to me I recall reading 276 277 that four of the Pension Board members are appointed by Council, and three are 278 appointed directly by the employees. Or, I should say, elected by the employees.

Mr. Evans.

City Manager Evans: Okay. I'll, I'll speak in, in generality as it relates to the boards throughout the City, and then if we can have the Interim HR Director, Ms. Young, provide a little bit more specificity on the Pension Board. As it relates to the boards and advisory boards, and Councilperson Lanier has communicated her desires to have the holistic discussions as we look at these boards because there's a lot of inconsistency and ambiguity into the process. There is not a certain rhyme or reason, in some cases, as how some of these board positions are filled. The one that is a board that is consistent and, as it relates to appointments, is usually your Planning & Zoning, and that's consistent

amongst most municipalities, at how those board members are selected. But, as it relates to our Audit Committee and some of the other boards, there's not a consistent procedure or protocol, and that's one of the things that I think we should build out and have an expectation as to individuals that are serving in these boards, certainly should go through the same type of training that you all go through, Sunshine Law, Ethics, et. cetera and even some government entities that I've worked with in the past have required them to go through the Citizen Leadership Academy, or Citizens Academy before you even qualify to serve on a board.

So, Staff is having the conversations internally and we do want to bring forward a plan that speaks on how do we look at addressing these boards holistically on the appointment side, but also to ensure there's fair and equitable representation from all of the, the respective districts as it relates to the board. And so, that's something that Staff has an item queued up, and that's something that we can certainly run into, you know, as far as collaboration as it relates to the Agenda process and some of the items that were communicated today. We can do that as one particular item and really focus on the Agenda process and, and the meeting process, as well as the, the board appointments.

Ms. Young, if you can speak more specifically on the Pension Advi'.., or the Pension Boards.

Interim Human Resources Director Young: Okay. The, the City has three Pension Boards. I'm sorry, this is Eureka Young, Department of Human Resources.

The City has three Pension Boards. We have a General Employees Pension Board, a Police Pension Board, as well as a Fire Pension Board. The boards are made up of citizens from the community. The General Employee's Pension Board has a clause that one of their appointed members could be a retiree of the City.., from the City, and the other members are.., must be residents of the City, as well as the three remaining members of the Board, are elected by the participating employees of the plan. A couple of years ago, a revision to the General Employee's Pension Ordinance designated that two of the appointed members come from the City Council and the other two is from the Mayor, with the approval of the City Council. That's where we are now.

The Fire and Police Pension Board, their rules are slightly different. The Fire and Pension Board, and I believe that a member of the Pension Board can be appointed by the members of the Board. However, that appointment must be approved by the City Council.

Are there any particular questions, in particular, that you have? Regarding the appointments of the Board?

City Manager Evans: And, Ms. Young, correct me if I'm wrong, also, there is a, a stipulation that the Council made some time ago with regards to professional certifications or training that they wanted individuals on those Pension Boards to have. Is that not correct?

- 327 **Interim Human Resources Director Young:** That is correct. It was established maybe
- 328 about five years ago, that all of the Pension Board members must be certified by the
- Florida Public Pension Trustee Association, and that certification takes approximately,
- maybe, two years for a trustee to receive that certification. And, as we'.., and that is the..,
- that training is out of state, in most cases, or in the City of Orlando. So, the board
- members must attend the education seminar, as well as the workshop to obtain that
- certification. And, the board members, they must attend their meetings regularly.
- 334 **City Manager Evans:** [Stammer]...
- 335 **Chairperson Botel:** Ms.., Ms. Miller-Anderson. Thank you.
- 336 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Ms. Young, you said that each mem'..., each
- 337 Council Member has two appointments? Correct?
- 338 Interim Human Resources Director Young: Yes. Yes, ma'am. The Mayor has two
- appointments, and the Council have two appointments.
- 340 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: I don't...
- 341 Interim Human Resources Director Young: Total.
- 342 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** ...recall ever appointing anyone. I mean, when
- do.., I mean, the only thing I remember is just ha'.., it coming on the Agenda and obviously
- voting for it, but I, I, I don't recall appointing anyone since I been on. So, how do these
- people get on if we haven't submitted names?
- Interim Human Resources Director Young: Well, we normally advert'..., we sub'..., we
- advertise the vacancy and the citizens respond to the vacancy.
- 348 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: So how...
- 349 Interim Human Resources Director Young: We advertise...
- 350 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** ...are we appointing them?
- 351 Interim Human Resources Director Young: I'm sorry?
- 352 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** How are we appointing them if they're.., it's
- 353 open to anyone?
- 354 Interim Human Resources Director Young: That is...
- 355 Chairperson Botel: Can I j'...
- 356 Interim Human Resources Director Young: ...one of the technical issues that, that
- hasn't been worked out. Because, that came up.., well, because normally, in most cases,
- as you... this, this particular Board, it has pretty much been the same members for the
- 359 past several years.

- 360 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Right, right. Yes. That I know. And that's
- what..., that's my point. I, I have not..., I haven't appointed anyone as long as I can
- remember since I've been on here. It's just...
- 363 Chairperson Botel: Actually...
- 364 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: [Inaudible].
- 365 **Chairperson Botel:** There are two members on this Board from District 2, one
- member from District 3 and no members from Districts 1 or 4.
- 367 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: But that...
- 368 Chairperson Botel: Current... [stammer].,...
- 369 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** ...does not mean that I submitted that name.
- 370 **Chairperson Botel:** No, no, no. I know, I'm just telling you, that's the current...
- 371 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Right.
- 372 **Chairperson Botel:** ...Board. Yeah.
- 373 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Oh, I'm aware. I'm aware. But what I'm saying
- is, at no point...
- 375 Chairperson Botel: Right.
- 376 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: ...has the Council appointed those people. I
- think they have just carried over, over the years. So, my question is, when do we actually
- appoint them and Ms. Young just explained that it was that.., it's just being carried over.
- 379 So, it's...
- 380 Chairperson Botel: Right.
- 381 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** ...not a matter of us having appointed... 'Cause
- I think these people that are in District 2, have been on before I got here. So, I didn't
- appoint them either.
- 384 **Chairperson Botel:** Right. Right. Thank you. Are you finished, Ms. Miller-
- 385 Anderson? Thank you.
- 386 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 387 **Chairperson Botel:** Mayor Felder. Thank you. Mayor Felder.
- 388 **Mayor Felder:** Ms., Ms. Young, whose appointment was Bessie Brown?

- Interim Human Resources Director Young: So, basically, since the Ordinance has...
- 390 since the Ordinance changed a couple of years ago, we decided to... Well, not
- necessarily decided, but we defaulted into the pattern of the Mayor has appointment, the
- 392 Council has appointment. The Mayor has an appointment, the Council has an
- appointment. So, Ms. Brown's appointment is the Mayor's appointment.
- 394 Mayor Felder: Okay.
- 395 Chairperson Botel: [Stammer]...
- 396 Mayor Felder: And, and just piggybacking on Councilwoman Anderson, Miller-
- 397 Anderson, 'cause I, I knew nothing about that. I know my Chief of Staff was telling me I
- had an appointment to a Pension...
- 399 Interim Human Resources Director Young: Right.
- 400 **Mayor Felder:** ...Board.
- Interim Human Resources Director Young: Okay. So, when this appointment came
- up, the memorandum that is attached with the, with the Item, [stammer], it included a little
- bit more education of the appointment to make you all fully aware of how the appointments
- 404 work for the Pension Board. Because I assumed that you are not fully aware that this is
- 405 how it occurred. So, in.., we wanted to make sure that you were aware of how this
- 406 happened with the, with the Pension Board appointments.
- 407 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Would there be any, any negative affect on your
- operation if we postpone this appointment until after we had an opportunity to discuss this
- at a future meeting, a meeting where we're gonna discuss other boards? Ms... Where'd
- 410 she go?
- Interim Human Resources Director Young: No, ma'am. The Board..., the, the Board
- will continue..., or, the trustee will continue until there's an appointment.
- 413 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay. So, Mr. Evans... Someone's.., Ms. Lanier, maybe it's
- 414 your micro'...
- 415 Councilperson Lanier: No. I...
- 416 **City Manager Evans:** I think Chief Curd just joined us. I think that's what it may be.
- 417 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay.
- 418 **City Manager Evans:** And, and that.., therein lies the challenge as it relates to the
- ambiguity and the inconsistencies with regards to the appointments. Let alone, providing
- 420 the Board with all the different advisory boards and pension boards and committees that
- 421 you may have, 'cause invariably, you're going to have duplications of roles and
- responsibilities. And so, that's one of the things that we want to ask the Board, how do
- 423 you want to handle this? It's also common in other municipalities that the appointments

run concurrently with the term of office of the individual that's appointing, and then if the individual chooses not to run or they vacate their seat, then the, the new individual that gets the opportunity to appoint individuals to the Board.

But, you know, we're gonna have about three or four different options for the Board to provide, but we want uniformity and consistency because if it's confusing to us and confusing.., it's gonna be confusing to the Members and the public. And there's a lot of different ways in which we've done that, so we do wanna have the holistic discussion with the Council. And we can look to have that discussion with you at one of your upcoming meetings, where we can keep the Agenda light and focus on how we want to address this, and look at all the boards and committees we do have.

- 434 **Chairperson Botel:** Great. Do we have to table this Item then, or do we have to 435 eliminate the Item? What's the best way to proceed, Ms. Anthony?
- 436 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, rather than table, I would say that the Item
- and needs to be postponed.

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- 438 Chairperson Botel: Okay.
- 439 **City Clerk Anthony:** With a time certain.
- 440 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay.
- 441 **City Clerk Anthony:** If that's the desire of the Board.
- 442 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. McCoy.
- 443 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, Madam Chair, respectfully, I, I wanna ask that if you have
- 444 a specific recommendation, offer it to the body and not leave the discussion to ask the
- Chair..., I mean, ask the Clerk how we move forward. And, and I'm concerned...
- 446 Chairperson Botel: [Stammer]...
- 447 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...because of two reasons. The Item that's before us is the
- reappointment of a Board member. And if what we're saying is we wanna change the
- process that is nothing to do with the appointment at hand. And I'm saying that because
- 450 I'm looking at the backup documentation for this Item. More specifically, for the
- attendance record of this appointee which, in this case, was December of 2016. So,
- basically, in order to get this certification, you would have to be at least, at a very
- minimum, on the Board for two years. I don't see how this appointment is even relevant
- 454 to the convention or the structure of us appointing people from here on out. Because, if,
- if that's the case, every time a new elected official comes in, then we can expect new
- 456 board members to come in. What I do know about the Pension Board, there is a
- 457 certification for a reason. Because they have specialty knowledge and understanding.
- 458 And in this case, I know Ms. Brown worked for the City for some time, but unless we're
- gonna vote down this issue, I don't see why we need to be talking about what we need to
- do, should it be appropriate to table or any of that.

I mean, the issue that's before us, is whether or not we're gonna reappoint her to the Board. Now, if the Mayor chooses not to do that, then that's something else then, but the precedent that you're creating at this point is, every time a new elected official comes in then we have, basically, a new appointee. But clearly, I don't know if she's obtained that certification but she's been there just over two years, so even if she hasn't, I think it would be premature to start reassigning new appointment every time, you know, this comes up.

468 Chairperson Botel: [Stammer]...

- **Councilperson McCoy:** So, what I'm asking is, that we vote on the Item before us, and if we wanna bring this back to have a discussion about the general convention, or re'... revisiting the Ordinance that organizes these various boards, then I'm okay with that but it just would'... wouldn't make sense. Because I've seen this happen in my time on the P&Z Board. And then, most recently where we are right now on the P&Z, because when we start having these discussion about appointees, you're gonna have yourself in a position where if you remove a member, you can likely not have another member to move forward because absence of a quorum or absence of the appropriate certification that they can act in certain fashions. So, I don't understand how us going forward has anything to do with the specific Item of reappointment.
- **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. Mayor.
- **Mayor Felder:** Yeah. Because it was my appointment, and I'm not saying we don't reappoint Bessie Brown. I have not talked to Bessie Brown to even know if she wanted to be back on the Board, so I would say at least give me that opportunity to speak with her, because it is my appoint'..., my appointment to bring back to the Board to say aye or nay, she wants, you know, to stay on the Board. So I'm not saying or disagreeing with her being appointed but at least give me the opportunity to speak with her to make sure that that's what she wants to do.
 - Chairperson Botel: Right. So, you're asking for us to postpone? And, and, Mr. McCoy, I don't have a hidden agenda here [chuckle]. I, I discussed this, as I said earlier, very briefly, on text with the Mayor because I didn't see anyone from District 1 or District 4 on this Board, and it struck me that there should be at least a balance across the City, and that's the only reason. I have nothing against anybody that's on the Board, nor do I think that this postponement necessarily indicates that we're going to change Board members every time we change Council. That was just one suggestion that Mr. Evans raised as a possibility, not as something that we were deciding to do this evening.
- So, if there's no other question'... Do you have anything else to say, Mr. McCoy?
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, I, I mean, Ms., Ms. Young, how is this Item before us? 497 Is this just because of the expiration of term? Because I thought I seen that the term 498 expired in 2019, or was that an expressed interest by this member to be reappointed?
- Interim Human Resources Director Young: Ms. Brown expressed her interest to be reappointed.

- 501 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. And, you know, I certainly, you know, would love if the
- 502 Mayor can have that opportunity to meet with that appointee if this is, in fact, his
- 503 appointee, as you say. And then, you know, they can decide from whatever. But, I, you
- 504 know, I, I just wanna make sure that we're not gonna, you know, kinda suspend
- reappointing members at this point.
- 506 **Chairperson Botel:** No., I don't think that's the intention. Thank you. So, we're
- gonna postpone this Item. And then we have.., anything.., if there's nothing else, we'll
- move to Item No. 4, which is...
- 509 Councilperson McCoy: Well, do we vote to postpone it, or do you just make that
- 510 decision? That's, that's actually what I was asking...
- 511 **Chairperson Botel:** Oh, okay.
- 512 Councilperson McCoy: ... Madam Chair.
- 513 **Chairperson Botel:** Madam Clerk, do we have to vote to postpone it?
- 514 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board that was what I was
- raising my hand for, was to advise that a motion has to be made to postpone the Item
- 516 with a time certain.
- 517 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay.
- 518 **Councilperson McCoy:** So Mayor.., Madam Chair? Mayor, is that your desire?
- Mayor Felder: Yeah. I, I will make sure I reach out to her tomorrow. Maybe on the
- next meeting, we can put it back on the Agenda. But just give me a opportunity to meet
- 521 with Mrs. Brown.
- 522 **Councilperson McCoy:** Madam Chair?
- 523 Chairperson Botel: Yes.
- 524 **Councilperson McCoy:** Can I be recognized to move to postpone, please?
- 525 Chairperson Botel: Yes.
- 526 Councilperson McCoy: To...
- 527 **Chairperson Botel:** You're recognized.
- 528 Councilperson McCoy: Well, I guess...
- 529 **Chairperson Botel:** Does someone...
- 530 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...if we move to postpone, we don't have to come back to a
- 531 time certain, it just comes back.

- 532 Chairperson Botel: It just...
- 533 Councilperson McCoy: Correct?
- 534 Chairperson Botel: ...goes back.
- 535 Councilperson McCoy: Alright.
- 536 Chairperson Botel: Madam Clerk.
- 537 **City Clerk Anthony:** It, it is proper to give a time in which to bring the Item back,
- because if you do not, it remains postponed indefinitely.
- 539 **Councilperson McCoy:** And what's... And, I don't understand. What's the problem
- with that? Because, I mean, I don't wanna limit him to next meeting. And provided the
- Agenda's already full, I mean, but if it's postponed, it's indefinite. It's just gonna appear
- 542 back on the Agenda.
- 543 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, if that is the..., if that's the pleasure of the
- Members.., Members of the Board, Staff will move accordingly.
- 545 **Councilperson McCoy:** Move to postpone.
- 546 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Do we have someone who would like to second?
- 547 **Councilperson Lanier:** Second.
- 548 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Second.
- 549 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Madam Clerk.
- 550 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson McCoy?
- 551 Councilperson McCoy: Yes.
- 552 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Miller-Anderson?
- 553 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 554 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Lanier?
- 555 Councilperson Lanier: Yes.
- 556 **City Clerk Anthony:** Pro Tem Lawson?
- 557 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Yes.
- 558 **City Clerk Anthony:** Chair Botel?

559 Chairperson Botel: Yes.

560 **City Clerk Anthony:** Unanimous...

561 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.

562 City Clerk Anthony: ...vote.

563 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.

- 564 4. HOPE DEALER- \$3000 COUNCILPERSON SHIRLEY LANIER- THE

- 569 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, we are now on to Item No. 4, which was pulled
- 570 from the Consent Agenda.
- 571 Chairperson Botel: Yes.
- 572 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, I need to announce that, following this Item, the
- 573 Office of the City Clerk has a announcement that it needs to make.
- 574 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay.
- 575 **City Clerk Anthony:** Item No. 4. Hope Dealer. A.., there's a benefit request from
- 576 Councilperson Shirley Lanier in the amount of \$3,000. The funds will be utilized to support
- 577 the Hope Dealer Hybrid Mentoring Program for inner-city males to develop leadership
- skills, social/emotional learning and a love of community.
- 579 Councilperson Lanier: I...
- 580 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, I do not have any public comment on this Item.
- The acceptance of public comment on this Item is now closed.
- 582 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 583 **Councilperson McCoy:** So moved.
- 584 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Second.
- 585 **Councilperson Lanier:** Hi. I wanted to have Mr. Aiken come on and provide just a
- brief description of his program but I think that..., I don't see him on here. Are you on here,
- 587 Mr. Aiken?
- 588 **Councilperson McCoy:** Ma'.., Madam Chair, can we.., we can postpone... He's, he's

589 back.

- 590 Councilperson Lanier: I wanted Mr. Aiken just to give a brief description of his
- 591 program. You can go ahead, Mr. Aiken.
- 592 **Mr. R. Aiken:** Hello everybody. My name is Ricky Aiken. I'm the Founder and
- 593 Executive Director of Inner-City Innovators. We run a program called the Hope Dealer
- 594 Mentoring Program, which is a hybrid mentoring program focused on leadership
- 595 development, social/emotional learning and community service. We got about thirty
- 596 young men in our mentoring program in West Palm Beach. Forty percent of our program
- 597 participants have encountered gun fire before, meaning they've been shot, meaning
- 598 they've participated in things that would wind them up in those situations. And we're
- happy to say, none of the young men in our program that encountered that, have gone
- back thanks to our mentoring.
- lt's very down to earth, really meeting the young men where they are and trying to
- fill the gaps that many of them are missing, as far as fatherhood and having role models
- to look up to. And I'm sure.., how much time... A minute, right?
- 604 Chairperson Botel: Keep going.
- 605 **Mr. R. Aiken:** Yeah. But, yeah. It's.., our, our mentoring program is very down
- to earth and I'm sure if you follow me on Facebook, you know all about it. I really want to
- kinda use this time to answer any questions you guys might have about how we plan to
- work in regards to moving into Riviera Beach.
- 609 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. Aiken, how do you select the, the young men? Do you
- work with our Police Department or? How do you do that?
- Mr. R. Aiken: Yeah. A lot of the young men we work with were referred to us
- through the Public Defender's office, concerned parents, and through friends of young
- 613 men we already work with. I don't know if you know but we started in 2015 after the death
- of Johnny Davis, one of our mentees, a few of his peers wanted to do something to kinda
- stop themselves and others from going down the same direction. So that's kinda how we
- started, and since, we've expanded on that work.
- 617 **Chairperson Botel:** And do your meet.., where do you.., do you have a place, a
- regular place, to meet with young men or do you meet them in the community or?
- Mr. R. Aiken: Yeah. In West Palm Beach, we were meeting at Coleman Park
- 620 Community Center before our community centers were shut down. This summer, we did
- a leadership academy, taking ten leaders from the group and meeting at our office at 313
- Datura, using social distancing measures.
- 623 **Chairperson Botel:** Mhmm. And are the young men.., what age group are they?
- Where do they fall in?
- 625 **Mr. R. Aiken:** Yeah. Ages fifteen to twenty-four, homicide's the leading cause of
- death for black young men in this age group and that's our focus.

- 627 **Chairperson Botel:** Well it sounds like a worthy... Mayor Felder.
- 628 **Mayor Felder:** How, how often do ya'll meet, Ricky?
- 629 **Mr. R. Aiken:** Throughout the summer, we've been meeting every Tuesday and
- 630 Thursday for our social/emotional learning circle and leadership development, with
- 631 Saturdays delegated for community service and field trips.
- 632 **Mayor Felder:** Follow up, Madam Chair.
- 633 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. [Inaudible].
- Mayor Felder: Do, do.., do you have a place in Riviera Beach? A main spot?
- 635 **Mr. R. Aiken:** Yes. I believe we do. We're just waiting for things to open back
- up. I'll let Commissioner.., or, Councilwoman speak to that.
- 637 **Mayor Felder:** Okay. Thank you.
- 638 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr., Mr. Lawson, and then we'll hear from Ms. Lanier.
- 639 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Thank you, Madam Chair, Mr. Aiken, I love the program. I've
- been a follower of what you've been doing. Excellent program and I love what you're
- bringing to the community.
- Madam Chair Botel requested and asked how were you gonna be selecting the
- young men. More.., specifically, how were you gonna choose the Riviera Beach residents
- and will all of the residents..., all of the individuals you utilize for the program you're
- 645 launching in Riviera Beach, be residents of Riviera Beach?
- 646 **Mr. R. Aiken:** Absolutely. We have a few young men in our current program that
- we bring down to West Palm from Riviera and they'd be like the first young men in recruit
- to help us with recruiting in the area. And, when gun violence happens in our community,
- 649 it's usually young men who already have criminal histories or records, put in a request
- with the Department of Juvenile Justice to kinda find out who we have within Riviera
- Beach City limits, that have gotten the kinda charges that we know put them at a higher
- propensity, participating gun violence and that's where we wanna focus our efforts. There
- are lots of great programs already happening in Riviera Beach and we don't wanna take
- away from any of that. We wanna really focus on targeting those high risk individuals.
- And, many of you, especially you, Commissioner.., or Councilman Lawson, may know
- of voung men that you feel like would benefit from a personalized touch that you may
- consider high risk. But that's our focus area.
- 658 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Okay. And a follow up, Madam Chair.
- 659 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.

- 660 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Again, Mr. Aiken, I, I.., like I said, I, I follow the program, I, I
- love what you're doing. If you can send over a request for benefits, I'd love to support it
- as well. So, if you could forward that over to me, I'd love to support the program as well
- moving forward.
- 664 **Mr. R. Aiken:** Awesome. Thank you so much for your support over the years, sir.
- 665 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Thank you, sir.
- 666 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. Aiken, just a [stammer].., out of curiosity, do you use the
- standard social/emotional learning protocol or is it something you have unique to you?
- 668 **Mr. R. Aiken:** I wouldn't say it's unique to us. It is being used in other places.
- And essentially, it's a circle. We all come in and the young men share the trauma or they
- share good news/bad news in their state of being, and during that time, we facilitate them
- opening up and being able to share. It's built on rituals which include mindfullest
- 672 techniques. And, I can def'.., I could forward you all the curriculum we use for you to take
- 673 a look at. It's a...
- 674 **Chairperson Botel:** I'd like to take a...
- 675 **Mr. R. Aiken:** ...little too much to explain in the timeframe...
- 676 **Chairperson Botel:** Yeah.
- 677 **Mr. R. Aiken:** ...I have allotted.
- 678 **Chairperson Botel:** I'd love to see that. Thank you so much. It sounds like a really
- exciting program and I'm so happy that Councilwoman Lanier brought it to our attention.
- 680 **Mr. R. Aiken:** Thank you.
- 681 **Chairperson Botel:** Anything e'.., anything else before we...?
- 682 **Mr. R. Aiken:** No. I just wanna...
- 683 **Councilperson Lanier:** [Inaudible].
- 684 **Mr. R. Aiken:**say I'm super grateful for the opportunity to work with you all.
- l've, l've been looking for the opportunity and l'm, l'm thankful it's here. And many of you
- 686 have already been proud supporters of my [stammer] Councilwoman Miller... Many of
- you have already been supporters, so I think this was a logical next step. And I'm thankful
- for the Mayor and everyone on the Council. I really appreciate this opportunity. I look
- 689 forward to working with you all.
- 690 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 691 **Councilperson Lanier:** Thank you so much, Ricky, for coming and, and sharing that
- 692 with us. We look forward to working with you.

- 744 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 745 **Ms. D. Hall:** The public...
- 746 **Unk.:** [Inaudible].
- 747 **Ms. D. Hall:** ...comment comes... The public comment comes from
- 748 marybeth.coffer@gmail.com.

On behalf of the Riviera Beach Library Advisory Board, I would like to thank Councilwoman Miller-Anderson for her funding Ms. Baker and her students at Inlet Grove for their un'.., outstanding artwork executions, Ms. Dickenson for executing the final distribution of the boxes and the local businesses where the book boxes will be placed before becoming many libraries.

This has been a community team effort. Reading is fundamental and the joy of a book in your hands cannot be denied. The earlier a love of books is developed and encouraged, the earlier more windows of the world around us will..., around us emerge. My father said, if you can read, you can do anything. Not only can you do anything, but you can anywhere and become your best self.

- 761 Chairperson Botel: Thank you. Do we have a presentation by Ms. Dickerson?
- Dickinson? 762

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- 763 Interim Library Director Dickinson: Yes, ma'am. I'm here. Can everyone hear me?
- 764 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes.
- 765 **Interim Library Director Dickinson:** I'm trying to share my screen but, unfortunately,
- it's not allowing me at the moment. [Pause]. There we go. Can you see my screen? 766
- 767 There we go.

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768 Good evening, Honorable Mayor, Members of Council. My name is Amy 769 Dickinson. And I am the Interim Director for the Library. This evening, we are going to 770 present to you on our Little Free Library Boxes.

So, to give you a little background, through an initiative supported by community benefits, funded by then Council Chair KaShamba Miller-Anderson, the Riviera Beach Public Library partnered with Inlet Grove High School this year to create little free library boxes to be distributed to local community businesses. Sixteen students worked with the digital design instructor at the school, Ms. Arenthia Baker and produced the following items which are to be filled with complimentary books from the Library, and to be distributed to business locations throughout Riviera Beach for City residents to read and enjoy.

So, here are some of the student with their creations. Some of the boxes required two parties to work on them due to their size. So I'm gonna read off their names and beg forgiveness for any mispronunciations I may have. On the left we have Jaheim Wilson's box, who Garrett Loewenberg assisted on, who.., but who is not pictured here. And Mr. Pierre Moniville, Brianna Luberisse, Collin Loveless, Nhya Elien and Justina Leslie. On the right, we have A'Layssia [sp] Burkes, Sur'.., sorry, Sireayah Jones, Janiya Toney, Nicholas Boston, and David Rodriguez. Our next students are Isaac Jessup, Josue [sp] Charles and Liana Wynn.

As you can see here with some of the double decker boxes, the artwork covers the entirety of the box, and the interiors as well. Students used a variety of art medians, including drawing, painting and new media, digital art forms. Yeah, you can see here also that each box is equipped with a chalkboard face, with artwork already on the item. But the location receiving it will be able to change this if they would like to do so. Many of the pieces have incorporated great phrases within the artwork. They.., pretty much almost all of them include the little free library concept of give a book, take a book. But, there are also some that say, there are many books you could give or take, choose wisely; better the inside of your head too; just read it; not all readers are leaders, but all leaders are readers. For instance, here is Mr. Charles' box, he has incorporated the following sayings into it, a peasant that reads is a prince in waiting; in books I have travelled not only to other worlds but into my own; take a book to bed with you, books do not snore; reading is to the mind what exercise is to the body; read a book and save a llama. One of my favorites. And then finally on the back, what are we reading? This box is by Mr. Ming. He has incorporated the following sayings, let your imagination run wild with the greatest achievement; libraries are full of ideas, the most dangerous and powerful of weapons. What appears to be a backdrop of Mario Brothers. This double decker box by Ms. Elien and Ms. Leslie incorporates the sayings, mother nature has to read; reading is dreaming with eyes open. The box by Ms. Luberisse shows a picture of Tupac reading with the phrase, tomorrow a leader. And the box by Mr. Adams, who was not originally pictured or had his box available for the picture day, so we've incorporated it here, indicates the word loser changed to lover with the phrase, saying, Georgie always loved to read, you should too, for your dear friend, Pennywise. Obviously a reference to Stephen King's 'It'.

We have a short video here showing the students preparing the boxes for the artwork with the digital art director, Ms. Arenthia Baker. We, unfortunately, found later that sound is not available for this item through GoTo Meetings so, for any party that's interested, I will be happy to forward this video separately, but I just wanted to play it for you.

- 833 **Chairperson Botel:** Ms. Miller-Anderson.
- 834 **Interim Library Director Dickinson:** And that was it?
- 835 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** I just.., I'm glad Mr. Evans pointed that out that
- that was pre-COVID and it was so much so pre-COVID that when the boxes were finished,
- 837 I was actually sick. That's when I was having my coughing fit for a while, and I kept
- delaying coming up there to see the boxes. They kept telling they're done, they look
- good. I said, 'Okay, I'm gonna come,' and I think two weeks went by before I finally made
- 840 it up there. And Ms. Dickinson was.., showed me the boxes that were upstairs in the
- Library. You know, I really.., I'm really appreciative of Ms. Cobb and Ms. Dickinson, as
- well as the kids just being very creative with the idea. I just ask for them to possibly look
- into doing the Little Free Library Boxes so that we can kinda get it going on this side. I
- 844 know Singer Island former Chairwoman.., well, former Councilwoman Pardo started it
- over there but those boxes were designed, I believe, by some of our employees. And so,
- we wanted to make sure that students in the City of Riviera Beach participated and had
- a hand in getting these boxes created.

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And so, I truly appreciate Ms. Dickinson and former Director Cobb for taking on the project and seeing it through, and I appreciate the children for putting in the hard work to get it done. Those boxes are going to be delivered, I believe in the next week or two, to some businesses in the community and, and just see how it goes. Those of you who have leftover obviously now we have to worry about things being disinfectant. So, [stammer] pre-COVID, we would've said probably to, you know, have them added. You know, if you have free books, you could possibly take them still and then get them disinfected some sort of way so that they can be added to the collection, but there are books and Ms. Dickinson, I'm.., I don't know if you mentioned it about how they.., the books will be placed into the box and, and as well as how they'll be replaced.

So, I appreciate everything that you all have done and, you know, in the future, if there is funds to be given to increase the amount of boxes that we have in different businesses, that would be great as well and I really look forward to doing like a Phase 2 of it. Thank you so much everybody.

- 883 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, we do not have any public comments on this
- ltem. The acceptance of public comment on this Item is now closed.
- 885 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Would a Member care to make a motion on the
- 886 question?
- 887 **Councilperson Lanier:** So moved.
- 888 Chairperson Botel: Thank you.
- 889 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Second.
- 890 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. We have Mr. Sherman, I believe, Mr. Evans?
- 891 **City Manager Evans:** Yes, Madam Chair. If I can have our Finance Director, Mr.
- 892 Randy Sherman present this Item..
- 893 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Good evening, Mayor and
- 894 Council. Randy Sherman, Finance Director.
- Yeah. The Item that you have before you is a request to appropriate funds out of the Major Disaster Fund. The City has recently been presented two invoices from AshBritt
- 897 Environmental for debris removal for Hurricane Irma. So this invoice is almost three years
- 898 old. You'll notice if you actually look at the backup and the invoices attached, the invoices
- actually have a February [inaudible], 2017 date on them, which obviously isn't correct. I

900 will tell you that in closing out the Irma projects, we had until November, I wanna say it was November 17th, to present everything to FEMA that we would like to be reimbursed 901 for. We made numerous attempts to [inaudible] these invoices, to gather them and be 902 903 able to submit them. We were never able to do that at that time. We actually received 904 assistance from our FEMA rep trying to get the invoices. And ultimately, I think, you know, 905 even he concluded that possibly the county could pay these invoices. Until recently, you know, we weren't even aware of them. Interim Director Terrence Bailey.., Public Works 906 907 Director Terrence Bailey has reviewed them, feels that they are due and payable. Clearly, 908 we didn't appropriate any funds but they are eligible to be paid out of the Major Disaster 909 Fund. So that's why we're asking for an appropriation so we can pay off these two 910 invoices.

- 911 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. McCoy.
- Mr..., Finance Director, Mr. 912 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 913 Sherman, who authorized AshBritt to do this vegetation pickup from the City? And is
- 914 there a receiving report for this?
- Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Yeah. Debris removal is 915
- 916 handled by Public Works, so I'll ask Mr. Bailey if he could answer that.
- 917 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes. At the time, directly after the hurricane...
- 918 Actually, I'll back you up, before the hurricane, the City piggybacked on the Solid Waste
- 919 Authority contract for debris removal, as well as observation and oversight. Most
- 920 municipalities went with the Palm Beach County contract for consistency and all of the
- 921 arrangements. Directly after the hurricane, we called AshBritt to begin debris cleanup
- 922 throughout the City. It took about two weeks to clean the City up from all the tree limbs
- and other vegetation. And after they completed their work, we spent upwards of six 923
- 924 months requesting these invoices. And you can see from your backup, some of the
- 925 emails back and forth. After approximately December/January of 2017-18, we stopped
- 926 asking for the invoices and it became apparent about three weeks ago that the invoices
- 927 were out there and were provided to the City, here nearly three years later.
- 928 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. McCoy, go ahead.
- 929 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. And I'm sorry, you said a lot, Mr. Bailey. So I guess
- 930 I'm, I'm back at my original question. Who authorized the specific pickup that corresponds
- 931 to this invoice and do we have somebody from our Staff, or from the City, that can verify
- 932 that what [stammer] what we have in front of us to deliberate on, was actually collected,
- 933 and agreed upon? And I mean, I, you know, I, I thank you for the backup but I'm, I'm very
- 934 simple but I'm very simple with my question because I'm being asked to even deliberate
- on something that clearly has the wrong date on it, that's the first thing, and I wanna make 935
- 936 sure that there is some employee within this organization that's willing to put their name
- and reputation on the line that this is a valid and legitimate business expense because 937
- 938 clearly, there's a few things that jumped out at me that wouldn't necessarily pass the
- 939 litmus test, in my opinion.

- 940 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes, sir. As Mr. Sherman indicated, I have
- 941 provided my review and approval that these are legitimate costs associated with
- 942 Hurricane Irma, and that they should be paid.
- 943 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, Mr. Bailey, if that's true then why would we have a invoice
- 944 dated for before when the hurricane occurred.
- 945 **Interim Public Works Director Bailey:** Well, my verification was on the quantity and the
- dollar number. The fact that it says February of '17, I'm sure is a scrivener's error that
- should've been '18, because in our email communication back and forth with the vendor.
- 948 after the fact, they had indicated that there was, as Mr. Sherman said, these tickets got
- 949 intermingled with Palm Beach County's tickets, so... I apologize, let me back you up.
- The way the system works, AshBritt will go out into the community, pick up a lot of debris
- and take it over to the dump. At the dumpsite, because they are working in Riviera Beach,
- they are given a dump ticket. That dump ticket is checked by the oversight company and
- the oversight company then takes all of those tickets and assigns them to Riviera Beach.
- So, the ticketing system and verification of the quantities can be back checked. The issue
- being, the oversight company, unfortunately, intermingled Riviera Beach's dump tickets
- 956 with Palm Beach County's and it took them all the way until February of 2018 to unwind
- that mistake. So, the February date that's on the invoice, they change the February but
- 958 they missed the 2017. Obviously, these invoices couldn't have been twenty seve'...,
- 959 February of 2017 because the hurricane didn't happen until later in the summer. So, the,
- the 2017 versus 2018 date is a minor scrivener's error.
- 961 Councilperson McCoy: O'...
- 962 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.
- 963 **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you, Madam Char.
- 964 **Councilperson McCoy:** Scrivener's error or not, Mr. Bailey, we're July 2020, don't you
- think that could've been corrected at this point? I mean, 'cause I'm, I'm voting down on
- this Item simply because, don't bring me something half-baked. If this was, in fact, an
- omission, they should've amended the invoice. But you're basically asking us to authorize
- something on its face that you guys.., well, Staff could've corrected. And as far as I'm
- occount in the state of the sta
- 969 concerned, I still haven't gotten an answer to, who verified, and I guess in your
- 970 explanation it would've been whoever issued the dump ticket, that this is actually
- 971 something Riviera Beach is responsible for.
- So, absent of that, I have no other questions and I'll be voting down on this Item.
- 973 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair?
- 974 Chairperson Botel: Yes.
- 975 **Councilperson Lanier:** I, I just wanted to ask, you know, just a basic question of how
- 976 did it take so long for this to get to us? And I understand the back story, I understand the
- unraveling and I understand, you know, all of that but it's been, it's been three years and

- 978 the people who actually were supposed to be paid this, they themselves waited three
- 979 years to be paid? [Pause]. I'm asking...
- 980 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: No.
- 981 Councilperson Lanier: ...a question.
- 982 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: The, the.., we asked those same questions. In 983 essence, where have you been for the last three years and we presented to them all of 984 our email requests to their team for these invoices. And, they provided.., they provided 985 the explanation of wi'..., the unwinding of why it took so long but they did not provide any 986 satisfactory evidence on who they reached out to in the City and who they sent these invoices to. Unfortunately, with our data breach of last year, there's no way to go back 987 into the system to see if they may have sent the email to someone, or an email address 988 989 that wasn't currently in use, but they did end up, I believe, reaching out to our lobbyist to 990 get in contact with someone in the City and it came through that way, and once we were 991 made aware of these invoices, we opened up a direct line of communication with the 992 company to understand exactly what happened, over these three years.
- 993 Councilperson Lanier: I'm gonna have to agree with Mr.., Councilman McCoy. 994 There, there's no way that after three years... if I did work and... It wouldn't take me three 995 years to ask for my money, it would take me three minutes to ask for [chuckle] my money. 996 So, how they..., they, meaning the people who are owed this money, took so long to be 997 able to come to us and say you actually owe us this money, is, is beyond me. It, it, it just, 998 it just does not sound like a, a, a entity that does business. If you're doing business and 999 you are owed every bit of \$65,000 and you wait three years to come and get the money? 1000 I, I, I just, I can't see it. I can't see it.
- 1001 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. Lawson, and then Mr. McCoy and then Ms. Miller-1002 Anderson.
- 1003 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Thank you, Madam Chair. Mr. Bailey, guestion. You said that 1004 we don't know who sent over, or when they sent over the invoice. Couldn't we just ask 1005 them to forward the original email or invoicing of who they sent it to so we could 1006 acknowledge who was supposed to receive this? And if it did come in during our, our 1007 crash, our system breach, that would still be after the fact of the deadline for FEMA. So, I guess some of my concerns is gonna be the invoice that was written is dated incorrectly, 1008 1009 the timeframe that's actually gonna cost our taxpayers this money instead of allowing for 1010 us to be reimbursed, and also, I'm almost inclined to, to fight this and to not move forward 1011 with paying this invoice. And I would actually also wanna hear from Ms. Wynn in reference to the status of actually having to pay this invoice and pay this service after 1012 three years. I, I know there's a, a limitation on when you can bill me for services that were 1013 1014 provided, and we don't have accurate dates or information. So, if three years later we're still getting invoices for a service that was gonna be paid by FEMA, I can't really be in 1015 1016 support of this.

- 1017 So, I was gonna ask if Ms. Wynn could give some feedback on legality of paying 1018 this business.
- 1019 City Attorney Wynn: Yes. I asked the question when we talked about it during
- 1020 Agenda review and based on the timeframe given to me, the statute of limitation has not
- yet run. And I ended my inquiry there. 1021
- Chair Pro Tem Lawson: When, when is the statute of limitation? What is the time'... 1022
- I'm sorry, Madam Chair, just a follow up. What is the... 1023
- 1024 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. Go ahead. Sure.
- 1025 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: ...statute...
- 1026 **City Attorney Wynn:** Four years.
- 1027 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: ...of limitation? Four years?
- 1028 **City Attorney Wynn:** Mhmm. It's only been three. If, if we go by the date of October
- 1029 twenty..., 2017, it hasn't even been three years yet.
- 1030 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Okay. Go by..., which date did you say, Ms. Wynn?
- 1031 **City Attorney Wynn:** I was given the date of October 12, 2017. Mr. Bailey can
- 1032 clarify that, but I have that in my notes.
- 1033 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Okay. So, that was my question in regards to limitation of
- having to pay this invoice, the timeframe. 'Cause I thought it would've expired. But if 1034
- 1035 you're saying it's four years, I guess my only concern is having them clean this up. Getting
- some additional information as to who they sent the original invoice to, fixing these 1036
- 1037 invoices before we vote on paying them and if we owe them, and I understand we owe
- them but we have to do a better job of just demanding this information, just letting them 1038
- know that they're in default of providing the, the documentation 'cause FEMA essentially 1039
- 1040 could've covered this, now it has to come out of our taxpayer's dollars. So, I would wanna
- 1041 figure out moving forward, what can we put in place to require that we're not put in this
- 1042 position ever again?
- 1043 Chairperson Botel: Thank you. Ms. Miller-Anderson. Mr.., it looks like Mr. Evans
- 1044 is wanting to speak. Would you allow him to speak first? Thank you. Mr. Evans.
- 1045 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: McCoy was...
- 1046 **City Manager Evans:** Ye'... Yes, Madam Chair. One of the things also that we have
- 1047 some exposure from the City side is, compliance with the Prompt Payment Act. So we
- do have a situation whereby the invoice has been submitted and we have to par'..., you 1048
- 1049 know, pay the invoice in a reasonable time. And so, in the event that we were to
- effectively fight this, we don't have really good footing from the City side as to why this 1050
- 1051 particular invoice wasn't provided. Plus, there's statutory obligations that we, as a

government entity, need to be able to render payment expeditiously. Now why that didn't occur during the appropriate timeframe, that's something that, you know, Staff can certainly do some additional research.

I do agree with the Board, it.., as it relates to getting the invoice corrected and maybe even some additional documentation from the vendor but I think one of the challenges associated with that, if it's three years ago, finding the employee if they still work in that company, or who the account manager was and if they, you know, they're not obligated to retain public records at, at the degree that we have to. So, we can get the invoice corrected, we can do additional research and then bring it back with some additional information that the Board has requested to provide additional context to the Item versus the Board having to approve I'.., an Item or voting an Item down without having all the information that can provide additional clarity.

- 1064 **Chairperson Botel:** Will it put us in any legal jeopardy if we postpone this for a couple of weeks to get that information? You're saying that we have an obligation but my
- question is, the obligation, we're not hurt in any way by postponing, am I right? Mr.
- 1067 Evans?

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- 1068 **City Attorney Wynn:** No. I think we'll be fine. I mean...
- 1069 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay. Ms. Miller-Anderson, you had a question? And then
- 1070 Mr. McCoy.
- 1071 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** No. You had said Lawson, McCoy, and then
- 1072 Miller-Anderson, so. Go ahead, Lawson.
- 1073 **Chairperson Botel:** [Chuckle]. His had his... Go ahead. Mr. McCoy.
- 1074 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. Thank you. And, I thought you were gonna say I had
- 1075 my time but...
- 1076 **Chairperson Botel:** [Chuckle]. No, no. Go right ahead.
- 1077 Councilperson McCoy: This is exactly why I don't wanna accept accepting this
- Robert's Rule that you produced today because I had a number of questions and.
- conveniently, Staff has not answered it, and I thank you, Mr. Evans, for bringing up that
- 1080 Prompt Payment Act. In one of the components of Prompt Payment Act and state law
- requires that the local agency, being the City, has to actually receive and acknowledge
- receipt of these goods. I don't understand, and I'm still asking the same question. So,
- 1083 Madam Chair, please take note, I'm still on the same issue...
- 1084 Chairperson Botel: [Inaudible].
- 1085 Councilperson McCoy: ...that has not been answered. What employee
- acknowledged, or have we received a receiver report, that these services were rendered?
- I mean, being offered a invoice after the fact, coupled with that the date is wrong, you
- asked a guestion of the Manger, do we run a risk? We run a risk with the Inspector

General because we lack internal controls, or our internal controls just failed when we approve or authorize invoices when we don't have appropriate backup documentation. Literally, we all know that the Finance Department in our City is so tight, if you're missing a receipt, you can't expect any kind of reimbursement. And I don't want me, as a Member or any of my colleagues, to authorize something that, on its face, just doesn't pass the test. And, that's my only question.

Obviously, I appreciate the Member from the 5th District bringing up the statute of limitations, but if it's owed, I wanna make sure that we pay it. But I don't wanna see something that doesn't have the correct dates. And if it's been three.., close to three years, or at least three years, then at the very minimum, somebody should've corrected this and somebody from our department or from our City, needs to validate that this is something that the City's responsible for because now we run the risk of having the Inspector General to say that we've authorized, as a body, an invoice that we don't even have the correct.., the appropriate backup documentation for it.

So, my concerns, I, I shared with some of the Members but I'm solely from the City's perspective of how we make sure we're handling our end of ensuring that this was actually done properly.

And I, and I yield back. Thank you, Madam Chair.

Chairperson Botel: Mr. Evans.

City Manager Evans: Director Bailey, if you would, one of the things that I know from past relationships I've had with debris contractors, in most cases, they do take photos and they have documentation as it relates to the tonnage and what in fact was provided. Is that something that we have, or something that can be provided? I know that there's certain information that may have not been retained for whatever reason, but I think to Councilperson McCoy's point, that's the issue. If there is documentation or photo'..., photographic evidence that says, you know, six trucks that were full, you know, with this type of tonnage and this is the cost associated with that, it provides the backup or the information that he's requesting to facilitate the payment. Is that something that we have or we have kept, or is that something that we're gonna have to rely on the vendor to provide?

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Due to the data breach, again, we.., those are.., that is information that we may have had at the time but wouldn't have now. We would need to rely on the vendor to provide it. But again, I believe because these are federal dollars for the hurricane debris cleanup, the retention requirements are a little bit longer and everyone knows FEMA takes five years to pay so the.., between Palm Beach County, the Solid Waste Authority and the vendor, they should have all the necessary documentation.

And again, to Mr. McCoy's question, I was Interim Director of Public Works at the time of the hurricane. I oversaw the debris cleanup effort and I am the one who said that yes, these are valid costs and volumes that were picked up from the City streets, that

- need to be paid. So, what we will.., we can ask for, from the vendor, additional
- documentation from their files in the way of pictures, truck tickets, anything that can
- 1131 validate the information to substantiate the invoices as presented, in addition to
- demanding that they amend the dates and get them corrected so they correlate to the
- actual time of the operation in 2017.
- 1134 City Manager Evans: And, and, Councilman McCoy, I wish I could provide
- additional information but I went on vacation from September 20th...
- 1136 Chairperson Botel: [Chuckle].
- 1137 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Oh gosh.
- 1138 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair?
- 1139 Chairperson Botel: Yes.
- 1140 **Councilperson McCoy:** I promise you that I was literally gonna differ to Mr. Evans and
- 1141 I didn't wanna seem like the guy that was making a wise joke but...
- 1142 Chairperson Botel: [Chuckle].
- 1143 Councilperson McCoy: ... I literally knew exactly the timing of this issue. But, I
- appreciate that we're at the same point where we have an understanding. But from an
- accounting and a, a finance and reporting standpoint, Mr. Sherman, you know, the
- moment you put in an invoice, when you create it.., when you receive an invoice, it's
- automatically populated for that date. I don't know how, it seems like somebody has
- backdated this but I just wanna make sure that it's corrected because this is gonna be the
- very issue that we have an Inspector General's report on. And I don't wanna be validating
- something where, at least on the face, the documentation is incorrect. So, if you guys
- can, you know, fix that. And I, and I mean.., people wanna get paid. Obviously, things
- slip through the cracks, but if we can correct that, I'm more amenable to see it but I just
- can't support it. And I would, you know, yield back but I wanna see if there's a opportunity
- 1154 to perhaps postpone it or bring it back at another time. Because at this...
- 1155 **Chairperson Botel:** So, we have...
- 1156 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...point, right? Three years, I'm sure they're not, I mean, I'm
- sure they're not gonna close down because of this.
- 1158 **Chairperson Botel:** [Chuckle]. So, we had a motion and a second on the floor to...
- on this guestion. Do we need... Ms. Miller-Anderson.
- 1160 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** I still wanted to make my comment.
- 1161 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.

- 1162 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. And I think everyone has pretty much hit
- on everything. I know, Mr. Evans, I was going to say that certainly probably is not an
- answer that he can give, 'cause that was a time in which he was not here at that point
- afterwards. With this Item having the.., the things that you all said about the invoice, that
- definitely needs to be right and I would like for documentation kinda supporting that it was
- actually done. I'm glad to hear that Mr. Bailey said that he, he definitely was the one in...
- on site, but I think we need to have some sort of formal documentation to support the
- paying of the people. I'm sure they did the work and, like you said, Mr. McCoy, I'm sure
- that this is not gonna cause them to close their doors because they're not that small of a
- 1171 company, but I think we.., in order for us to move forward, we do need to make sure that
- we have the right documentation so we're not being accused of just paying random
- invoices that we really don't know if the work was completed.
- Thank you. I support the postponement.
- 1175 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. So, we have a motion on the floor. We have to
- withdraw the motion and the second I think and then ask for the motion to postpone.
- 1177 Madam Clerk, Am I...
- 1178 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Madam...
- 1179 **Chairperson Botel:** ...right about that?
- 1180 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: ... Madam Chair?
- 1181 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr.., Mr. Lawson and then we'll answer that question.
- 1182 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Sorry, I just wanted to just make a quick comment or request.
- 1183 Mr. Sherman, when was the cutoff for reimbursement requests from FEMA?
- 1184 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Yeah. We, we had to
- report our expenses, I wa'.., again, I wanna say it was November 17th of 2017. You're
- allowed to finalize things after that point but you pretty much have to have most of it done
- and in place by, by that cutoff.
- 1188 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** And when was this service provided? You said November 17,
- 1189 2017?
- 1190 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Correct. The...
- 1191 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: And when...
- 1192 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: ...service for these two
- invoices was the end of September 2017, and then the first couple weeks of October of
- 1194 2017. So, one invoice is for September, one invoice is for October.
- 1195 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Okay. And, those invoices were not sent over to the City and
- we don't have that exact date because of our, our system breach. Can we request from

- the vendor when is the first time they sent the invoice over? I, I see requests from Mr.
- Bailey, multiple emails. So, I just wanna see what.., if we can have them send us a
- forward because they're saying they sent over the invoice. If they can just re-forward that
- 1200 email that they sent to whatever representative that actually approved it, as Councilman
- McCoy said, or even any representative that they just forwarded this email to that may or
- may not have acknowledged it. If we could request that information with the updated
- invoice, that would be my request as well.
- 1204 **Chairperson Botel:** Ms. Miller-Anderson. [Pause]. You're, you're...
- 1205 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: You're, you're...
- 1206 Chairperson Botel: ...you're...
- 1207 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: ...you're muted, Ms...
- 1208 **Chairperson Botel:** ...you're muted.
- 1209 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: ...Miller-Anderson.
- 1210 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** The email that Mr. Sherman has on the backup,
- that's from Ms. Hoskins for December of 2017. How were we able to obtain that?
- 1212 [Pause]. Mr. Sherman, did you [inaudible]?
- 1213 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Yeah. That was.., that was
- provided to me by Mr. Bailey. So maybe he can answer that question.
- 1215 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. Mr. Bailey, how did you access that email
- from Ms., Ms. Hoskins from December 22, 2017?
- 1217 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: The short version is, due to the fact that I
- typically get very large emails with pdf's and AutoCAD files, my email system is set up to
- save locally, so we..., when we had the data breach, I was able to retain a portion of my
- 1220 emails going back to 2017. Luckily, that email was in some of the emails that were saved
- locally on my machine, and not corrupted in the cyber attack during the incident last year.
- So I was able to retrieve that email, convert it into a pdf so that we had the, the
- 1223 conversation and documentation of our requests.
- 1224 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. So, is it possible for IT to take a look at
- 1225 your computer and see if they're able to locate others? I mean, it, it's the computer
- 1226 [inaudible], right? That's...
- 1227 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes. Well, during this conversation with the
- vendor. I asked them to provide proof that they had sent over the invoices, and they did
- provide me two emails from 2018, and they did not submit the invoices to anyone on our
- team that had been working on it. And in addition, when I opened the email itself, they
- sent it to ajohnson@rivierabeach.org in 2018. Well, Riviera Beach dot org is not an email
- address that goes to the City, which explains why they sent it to no one and that is why

- we never received those invoices until now. They sent it to an email address that doesn't
- 1234 exist.
- 1235 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. But you.., we could possibly have our IT
- take a look to see if they're able to identify any others from Decem'.., from the 2017 time?
- 1237 Is that not possible? You said [inaudible]...
- 1238 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Any other emails...
- 1239 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** You said those things are saved locally on your
- 1240 computer, right?
- 1241 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes.
- 1242 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** So, is it possible for us to have IT take a look at
- it to see if they can obtain a little more than maybe you may be able to? I don't, I don't
- know. I'm not a tech person, but I'm just thinking that part of it, some of it was saved in
- December of 2017, maybe some of others were too. And maybe you're just not able to
- get it for some reason. I don't know. That.., at least try.
- 1247 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes, ma'am. I'll have IT look into it.
- 1248 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. Thanks.
- 1249 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. McCoy, and then Ms. Lanier.
- 1250 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair. Ms.., Councilwoman Miller-
- 1251 Anderson, thank you.
- Mr. Evans and Dr. Botel, I'm looking for records around that time too, September
- 1253 30, 2017, I, I yie'.., I, I withdraw my.., I withdraw. I have nothing else.
- 1254 **Chairperson Botel:** [Chuckle]. You just... Okay. So...

- that we have to be in a position to validate this as well. We can't put all the onus on the
- 1259 company to give us information to say that we're going to provide you with whatever you
- need to pay this, I think that we need to be in a position to validate this and we need to
- be in a position to make sure that this happened and that we received invoices, or we
- received emails. So yes, it, it has to.., the burden has to be on us as well.
- 1263 **Chairperson Botel:** I don't see any other hands raised. So, I'm gonna ask the
- 1264 Clerk..., we have a motion on the floor and a second. Do we need to withdraw that and
- then make a motion to postpone, is that the way we should handle this?

- 1266 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board. The motion.., the maker of the motion can be asked to withdraw their motion, and then a motion is made to postpone or an amended motion can be made to...

Do we have public comments on this Item, Ms. 1332 Anthony? 1333 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, we do not have any public comments on this 1334 Item at this time. 1335 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay. Mr. Evans, is Mr. Sherman gonna take this? Your, 1336 your... 1337 City Manager Evans: I, I will..., I will actually be making the presentation but I think... 1338 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay. 1339 **City Manager Evans:** ...Councilman McCoy should be recognized for his Item. 1340 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay. Mr. McCoy. 1341 Councilperson McCov: Thank you, Madam Chair. Members, I just..., I, I, I had a 1342 conversation with the Manager today and wanted to share with you. I appreciate the work 1343 that the Manager is doing relative to the budget but I really have to encourage you guys 1344 and really ask, let's really push this to the point of driving down what we require of our 1345 taxpayers to contribute. Now obviously, this is the same tax rate that we had last year 1346 and we're in a position that we don't have to raise the millage rate/tax rate, which is 1347 synonymous. But, I really wanna see that we don't accept just the same as the last time 1348 and, you know, obviously this is a time that is unprecedented for everybody. And I only 1349 offer an alternative and if it's not supported, I'm okay with that but I really wanna see if we can, you know, not just do the same thing we did last year and try to turn this tide because 1350 I looked back, you know, just nine years ago, we were operating, in 2012, I think it was 1351 1352 just over \$25MM, give or take, for our operating budget for the year and we're almost 1353 nearly triple that amount. And, obviously, I don't think any Member of this body should 1354 be surprised that there's gonna be some, some.., there, there's gonna be some changes 1355 how we operate government but I at least wanted to allow the Members to have a

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discussion about financially or fiscally where we take the City in, as far as our millage rate

and our overall operations of our budget. And I only wanted to offer that so that we can

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have the discussion and then hear from the Manager. But I certainly, you know, support whatever conversations that come from this.

So that's all I have, Madam Chair.

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Chairperson Botel: Thank you. Mr. Evans.

City Manager Evans: Madam Chair and Members of the Board, this Item before you is to request that the City Council adopt the maximum millage rate for Fiscal Year 2020 and 2021 at 8.452 mills by establishing the maximum millage rates. This is to allow for us to provide notice based on truth and millage, which it provides notice to the taxpayer. This is the same millage rate that was levied last year. However, the taxpayer would see an increase as a result of the values that we have seen..., the property values that we've seen increase in our community, to approximately about 6.9 percent. This is consistent with Florida State Statute 200.065, that we established the maximum millage rate, as well as making sure that our first public hearing does not conflict with the School District or Palm Beach County. Palm Beach County has set their public hearing for Thursday, September 3rd, and the school District for Wednesday, September 9th. And so, Staff is recommending that we set our first public hearing for Tuesday, September 8th at 6:00 p.m. In the event that we wanted to look to levy the rollback rate, which is 7.9567 mills which, in essence, generates the same revenue that the City collected in the previous budget year. That would be about a \$3MM less revenue intake for the City. The revenue that would be generated as a result of the rollback rate, would be \$46MM.., a little over \$46MM.

One of the things that we also want to communicate, in the event that we move forward with the millage rate that is..., Staff is recommending, it would generate about \$50MM, however, \$5.6MM of that is paid to the CRA in their tax increment value, and about \$750,000 is transferred into the Major Disaster Fund. By establishing the maximum millage rate, you do have the ability to reduce the millage rate. One of the things to Councilperson McCoy's point, in the event that the Council wishes for Staff to present a budget based on the maximum millage rate or that 8.2 millage rate that's proffered, it is something that we can look to share with you as part of the budget discussions that we will be having with the Council. The impact, the revenue impact's about \$1.7MM, in the event that we would look to institute that reduced millage rate.

Staff has started beginning going through the budget process, and I can tell you that the deficit going into Fiscal Year 2021 is approximately \$4.3MM. Virtually every sector of our business models as it relates to.., or our business relationships as it relates to health insurance, property and liability, we're seeing double digit increases. We're also seeing revenues.., our revenue projections are down about thirty percent. And so, Staff is looking to make some, some tough choices and ultimately per Charter to provide the City Council with a budget that is consistent with the millage rate that we are requesting for the, the Board to set, that maximum millage rate.

But, in the event that the Board says you would like to see two variations of budgets, that's something that we can work on and to provide that to you. We know that

1399 it's been a point of discussion in our community for quite a bit of time, as to how we can effectively reduce expenditures, as well as reduce the millage rate. And so, there's plans 1400 that we are putting in place to right size the organization and to make us a little bit more 1401 1402 leaner, a little bit more efficient and this particular crisis is, is making us look at the way 1403 in which we do business differently. So, we are going to prepare the, the budget with some reductions, as well as providing for a pathway forward as to how do we become 1404 1405 more fiscally sustainable on the long terms because we're not seeing the economic 1406 growth and the redevelopment in our community that's essential for our, our tax base to go up. In addition to, we have some concerns with regards to the commercial industries 1407 1408 being impacted because we actually feel the impact in arrears. So what we're gonna do is, this year, we've seen a 6.7 percent increase. Next year, flat is considered the new up 1409 1410 and so you may not really feel impact the until, you know, 2023 is where you can possibly 1411 see revenues being impacted on the ad valorem side. But the good thing is, we have very diversified funding streams and we're not completely reliant on the ad valorem 1412 1413 revenue as most, for instance the county, probably about seventy percent of their revenue 1414 is predicated on ad valorem value.

- So, Staff is recommending that we adopt the millage rate as levied as previous years, but if it's the pleasure of the Board, we can bring you a budget that accomplishes the millage rates that was proffered by Councilman McCoy.
- 1418 **Chairperson Botel:** Ms. Miller-Anderson.
- 1419 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Is it po'.., I know it is possible to look at bringing
- a budget back with, like, half a mill and then one with a full mill?
- 1421 **City Manager Evans:** Yes. We, we can, we can, if, if the Board, if it's the pleasure
- of the Board, we can actually bring it down, you know, by quarters to show what it would
- look like and the impact as a result of that. We, we can definitely do that.
- 1424 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. Yeah. That would be good.
- [Inaudible comment]
- 1426 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** And, yeah. I'm fine with making it..., with the
- approval tonight for the maximum being set at that, and then obviously we can make it
- 1428 lower when have our discussions. And we're starting that when? Our budget
- 1429 discussions?
- 1430 **City Manager Evans:** Our, our discussions commence in August. I will be sending
- the, the Board a updated budget calendar, no later by the end of this week.
- 1432 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. Thank you.
- 1433 **Chairperson Botel:** Any other... Mr. McCoy.
- 1434 **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you, Madam Chair. Thank you, Councilwoman from
- the 2nd District. That's exactly what I wanted to hear from the body. You know, by no

means do I wanna tie the Manager's or Administration's hand when it comes to a budget because that is their role to present us with a budget for us to approve, but I want us to begin to think outside the box.

And, Mr. Evans, this is just my personal belief and it's not representative of the Council, but I would like to see, obviously there's a initiative across the country to defund the police. Let me tell you something, [chuckle], you know where I was out at 6:00 o'clock this morning, so I certainly respect our Riviera Beach Finest and the work that they do, but I really wanna see that we can take a very thorough and intense look at how we budget for police spending. And I.., let me tell you something, apparently I must have missed the invitation for the, the bicycle event but I lit'.., did see our... Is something funny?

- 1447 **Chairperson Botel:** [Stammer], you, you could'.., you coulda been there on a tricycle or, you know. We talked about this.
- 1449 **Councilperson McCoy:** I, you know, it was so great to see our officers... Actually, I seen them...
- 1451 Chairperson Botel: What?

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- 1452 **Councilperson McCoy:** ... yesterday, out in the community on their bikes. And this is, 1453 like, the real emphasis of where I wanna see our City dollars spent. When they're riding 1454 up to, to people in the community, just on a fellowship. I, I wanna see that we're less the old, old SWAT and very tactical unit, and obviously we need it, right? But, more in the 1455 1456 community base and I thought that was very..., I mean, that was very reinforcing that it, it 1457 does work when we have a community and individuals in our community that really respect. And I tell you, our, our policing unit, Sergeant Menard, Officers Terrell and Officer 1458 1459 [inaudible], who I seen yesterday were suited and they were actually in the neighborhood, so I can really appreciate that. And that goes to the point, Mr. Evans, I, I don't..., and 1460 1461 again, I don't wanna tie your hands, I just really wanted us to think, and bring back us something that can really support where we are as a City and where we're moving as a 1462 1463 country overall because I think it really helps if we're proactive on the front end, as opposed to, you know, doing all of the backend stuff that doesn't always equate to, you 1464 know the situations. And, perhaps we don't need to support an initiative like 1465 Councilwoman Lanier's because we're taking care of, taking care of it on the front end, 1466 1467 and we don't need to do, you know the backend where we have individuals that are suffering from..., or victims of gun violence and, and being arrested in that criminal justice 1468 1469 system. Certainly, I think it's needed, but I would much rather put those resources on the 1470 front end.
 - So, Mr. Evans, by no means am I taking any kind of.., any, any offense to what you presented. I just really want us to think outside of, out of the box when it comes to creating a budget this year.
- So, I will withdraw my motion that I offered and allow the Manager to put together a spending plan in the millage rate. So, I yield back.

- 1476 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Ms. Lanier.
- Councilperson Lanier:: Yeah. I also, too, [stammer], Mr. Evans, to take a look at the, 1477
- 1478 the disaster fund annual required contribution. You know, I wanna see if we can adjust,
- 1479 adjust that, if we can, to support to more acquisition of, of major fixed assets, Fire
- 1480 Department, Fleet. You know, what can we do to look at.., look at that fund, and also to
- put that funding in towards, in towards, towards major fixed assets because we really 1481
- understand that as we're moving forward here, we know that this economy is not going 1482
- 1483 to sustain itself based on how we are going now. We know that, given the number of...
- I mean, and, and everything kind of circles back to COVID-19, the fact that we are looking 1484
- 1485 at a major economic, financial meltdown for this country, which means it's going to trickle
- 1486
- down to this community. So, we need to look at a lot of other options that were not normally on the table. So, if we can have some look to, to look at that disaster fund and 1487
- 1488 the annual contribution to that, so that we can be able to look at other options. Given the
- 1489 fact that we are going into a atmosphere, and a financial atmosphere, that is not going to
- bode well for small communities like ours. 1490
- 1491 Thank you. Ms. Miller-Anderson and... **Chairperson Botel:**
- 1492 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** I just wanted to make a comment and piggyback
- 1493 on Mr. McCoy speaking about the officers being on the bicycles. On yesterday, I.., on my
- 1494 Ring alert, I saw something where someone posted over in.., they live in Villa Rosa, and
- they said they see policemen riding around on.., riding around on bicycles so they're trying 1495
- 1496 to find out what was going on. You know, I think they thought something major, you know,
- 1497 some kinda crime was going on. So, we definitely need to do a little more of that so they
- don't think it's a problem [chuckle] when they see our officers out there on the bicycles, 1498
- 1499 but they definitely saw them. So, it, it's working.

1619 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Are there public comments, Madam Clerk?

1620 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, there are no public comments.

1621 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Do we have a presentation by Ms. Wynn?

City Manager Evans: Madam Chair, I'll actually be making the presentation, and then Chief Curd will speak on the Fire operational side and then Ms. Busby can speak on

the legal elements contained in the Agenda Item.

City Staff is recommending approval of the Resolution to authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to execute the Purchase and Sales Agreement for an acquisition of the property located at 1920 West Blue Heron, referred to as the Walgreens site. When City Staff looked at the opportunity to construct a, a Fire Station 88, principally it was identified to reconstruct the facility in an existing location at 1663 West Blue Heron. But Chief Curd and I had some conversations about what is the optimal location and what can provide for fire services, not just today but also looking at a fifty year plan. Based on the site that has already been identified for Fire Station 88, as soon as we were to move forward with the construction of that site and open that site, it would already be at capacity. So, we looked at the opportunity that has been afforded to us at the Walgreens site. This particular facility can accommodate the Fire Station... a Fire Station that can serve us for well over fifty years. It also provides additional capacity to be able to have some flex space, move professional offices as it relates to Fire Administration and also provide a... an ops function in the event of our EOC having our operations sections report and, and effectuate any response in the event of a disaster. So, we've taken a look at this particular property. We had an appraisal done on the property. There was two appraisals that were conducted, one came in, and I think at around one point... or \$2.1MM and the other one was at \$2.4MM. We then went back and had conversations with the property owners and they were deadset on the \$2.4MM. And we still believe that that is a, a excellent investment and a great site for Fire Station 88.

In the event that the Council gives us authorization to move forward with this, closing will be scheduled on or before August 19th. However, some other things that are germane to the process is that we would have to get a Future Land Use Map and Zoning Map Amendments because currently it is commercial general, and we would need to change that to community facilities. So, prior to issuing any type of development order or any type of construction, we would have to have a Comp Plan amendment, as well as Zoning Map, and so it would have to go betwee'..., before the Planning & Zoning Board, as well as the City Council for first and second reading. The City Attorney's office has provided notice as stipulated in the Code of Ordinance, the Planning & Zoning Board that the City's desire is to move forward with the acquisition of this particular parcel.

At this particular moment, I would like for Chief Curd to talk about some of the Fire elements and, and what we would look to be able to do if we are able to secure this site. One of the things that has been expressed by this Board is the concerns of Blue Heron and Congress, and having some issues with regards to individuals traversing that roadway, and I would say to the Council that by locating the Fire Station at 1920 West Blue Heron, we can then push on the state and the county for intersection improvements, as there is a Public Safety facility there so I think we can actually make that intersection more safe for pedestrians, as well as motorist at that particular intersection should we be able to provide service.

At this time, I'm gonna turn it over to Chief Curd to speak on the Fire side, and then Ms. Busby is on the meeting as well to provide any legal explanation with regards to the Purchase and Sales Agreement. Chief Curd.

Interim Fire Chief Curd: Good evening, Mayor Council. Chief Curd, Interim Fire Chief.

I, I just wanna have a conversation about what a Fire Station should look like and what a Fire Station should be built for considering what the next fifty years is gonna look like, 'cause this truly will be a fifty year decision. Originally, the property where existing Fire Station 88 was located, was our only option. We tried to obtain some properties from the School Board to the West of that property and we also looked at areas behind that property to build a fully functioning Fire Station. And to no avail, we were unable to acquire those properties. So simply, we were working with the area that we were given. It was very tight. The area to enter the station would've been off of Avenue S, which woulda posed some problems when school was, you know, coming in, in the morning and letting out.

When the property became available over on the, the Walgreen site, Mr. Evans had me and Staff do some research on what that site would look like as far as response from a Fire Rescue standpoint. We've reached out to Palm Beach County Fire Rescue; we've done time response analysis and we've actually determined that we would actually decrease our response time by being at that location. While it's marginal, it is a decrease in response time. However, what's more important is what that property is gonna allow us to build moving forward.

Fifty years ago, we didn't have ambulances in the Fire Station, we didn't respond to HAZMAT calls, we didn't respond to active shooter calls, we didn't have special rescue operations. I don't know what the next fifty years will look like in the fire service, but I can tell you over the last six months, it will lend to us being a community partner to provide whether it be vaccine'..., vaccinations to the community, or some type of a community health program and we're looking at the new facility. It'll give us space to have some type of pseudo-clinic in the lobby for community, should vaccinations be needed, it'll give us a little bit more space to operate as a EOC for fire operations during times of disaster, it'll also give us room for growth should that come in the next fifty years, and allow for a widening and enlarging of, of the floor plan so that we can provide the employees with the room and space that we've needed.., that we need. If we learned anything from COVID-19, we have learned that we will have to build and design our buildings differently

- and I do believe that this property is in the best interest of the City and Fire Rescue moving forward in that fifty year decision.
- 1699 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 1700 **City Manager Evans:** Chief Curd, if, if I may? I'm going to Madam Chair. I'm going
- to share my screen and allow for Chief Curd to kinda walk through some of the, you know,
- basic interior elements and how the site will work with regards to this. 'Cause I think it's
- important for the public, as well as the, the Council to, to see it and hear from Chief Curd,
- 1704 you know, how we plan to site this particular station. So.
- 1705 [Pause]

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1706 **Interim Fire Chief Curd:** So, what we're looking at here is the property on the corner of the Walgreens station. And, what we have determined is that we are gonna be working, 1707 as we build this station, to be able to have our units respond out onto Blue Heron. Now, 1708 1709 just to the east of where we would respond out from, we are gonna have a controlled intersection. We've also had Mr. Bailey reach out to DOT, I've reached out to members 1710 of Palm Beach County and there is a preemption and priority lighting system, which 1711 1712 actually is gonna help us control that intersection, it's gonna give us the ability to come out onto Blue Heron, move west to our western community, which is growing and we're 1713 seeing an increase in call volume or simply cross the median, in which we're gonna be 1714 working with the DOT to provide that crossing in the median, similar to what you see at 1715 the old Station 88, to allow us to move east on Blue Heron. We'll also have control of the 1716 intersection to go north and south on Congress to address those areas, and that 1717 community's growth both north and south of Congress, whether it be Thousand Oaks, 1718 1719 Marsh Harbor, Villa Rosa or any of the other communities that have been built out and, and have increased our call volume in that Congress corridor. 1720

This is gonna be a five bay station. This is gonna allow for an engine, a rescue and a Chief Officer to be able to respond. It's also gonna provide us with an additional bay where we can have spare apparatus located on the western side of our community. It's going to have what is gonna be known as a clean station concept. This is similar to what we were gonna build with 88 on its existing property, however, this larger footprint is gonna give us a better opportunity to provide showers and facilities for both our male and female firefighters. This is also gonna provide the ability for us to be able to have a training room, west of the tracks. It is gonna provide us with office space, not only for the officers at that station, but also a second story which is gonna provide for offices for City Administration..., Fire Administration, excuse me, and also members of the operational EOC.

So, this is a fully functioning five bay station where each firefighter now will have its.., their own bunkroom. There will be individual restrooms. The, the days of conjugal restrooms of just that large male and female bathroom, with a female and male locker room is coming to an end. I have to look at what the next fifty years is gonna look like. It may be gender neutral, it may be nongender specific. We may not have male or female restrooms, we just simply will have restrooms. There will be a toilet, a shower and a sink

that is all contained within one restroom to accommodate anyone, regardless of their identities or genders. It is also gonna allow us to be able to have a bit of a flex space. We do know we have some concerns with Fire Station 89 out at Military Trail, we are working diligently with the Department of Veteran Affairs to extend that lease on that property but in the event that that property is no longer available to us, this station will allow us to bring those individuals in while we look at options and alternatives.

But as you can see the rendering, we think it's gonna be a, a key element when coming into the City, it is gonna be able to house not only spare apparatus to keep some of these valuable apparatus out of the wind, rain and sun but it's gonna allow us to also have a command element west of the tracks, while maintaining our current element east of the tracks. So, it's gonna be a very unique station, it's gonna be the first of its kind in the State of Florida and we think it's gonna be a staple in the fire service for what fire stations should look like in Florida..

1751 [Pause]

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- 1752 **City Manager Evans:** And Madam Chair, that concludes our presentation, unless
- there's any questions for Ms. Busby on the, the legal side or the Planning & Zoning side,
- 1754 Staff is prepared to answer any questions the Board may have.
- 1755 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. Lanier first, and then Mr. Lawson. [Pause].
- 1756 You're, you're muted, Ms. Lanier.
- 1757 **Councilperson Lanier:** I, I wanted to say that I, I like this project. I like the fact that, reading the backup, it being the only Category 5 building that we may have in this City, the fact that [stammer] aesthetically speaking, this is how our buildings are supposed to
- look going forward. I like the fact that it has a high level of functionality to it, that there is some other operations that can happen in this particular building. And, when the person
- gets off of I-95, coming into the City, looking at something that is pleasantly, you know,
- pleasant to the eye and going down through our City to be able to put something on... I
- know Councilman McCoy has always talked about looking at Blue Heron Boulevard and
- getting off of I-95 and seeing apartments here, gas stations here, this over here, this over
- here. So, having something that is going to bring some type of appearance to the City,
- especially a building that is functional and a building that we need in terms of, of providing
- services to our residents. So I certainly approve and appreciate the fact that we are
- moving forward with this.

What I also want to say as well that, you know, moving forward with all of our facilities, that we also need to be looking at the, the land and the, the properties that the City owns, to be able to build our own buildings. So, with that being said, I, I approve of this project and I'm, I'm looking forward to seeing how it's going to look and how it's going to fit into how we do business with the City. And also, that it looks good coming off of I-95.

- 1776 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. McCoy.
- 1777 **Councilperson McCoy:** I'm sorry. Am I being asked a question?

1778 Chairperson Botel: Yes.

1779 Councilperson McCoy: I didn't...

Chairperson Botel: No. I thought you had your hand... I.., did you not have your

1781 hand raised earlier?

Councilperson McCoy: No, ma'am.

1783 Chairperson Botel: I'm just so...

1784 Councilperson McCoy: No, ma'am.

Chairperson Botel: ...used to calling on you and looking for you have an opinion.

1786 [Chuckle]. I, I [inaudible]... Did anybody else...

Councilperson McCoy: I mean it is in District 1 side.

Chairperson Botel: Mr. Lawson. Mr. Lawson.

1789 Councilperson McCoy: [Inaudible].

Chairperson Botel: Mr. Lawson.

Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Thank you, Madam Chair. Mr. Evans, I wanted to discuss just a few concerns that I have with the project because I've been adamant since we got into office with buying buildings, developing and just beautifying our community. I think it's gonna be a beautification of our community by actually building something on this corner that's been vacant for so long. My concerns and my hesitation is, that we're gonna be taking between fifty and \$60,000 annually off of our tax roll by actually purchasing this lot and then building a Public Works building, or a Fire Station there.

The second concern is that, like Councilwoman Lanier stated, we do have a lot of land throughout the community, but we don't have any of this prime real estate that's on some of those main corridors. So.., and then the last point is, to the current state of affairs of what we're experiencing right now. With this COVID crisis, that this pandemic that no one has ever experienced in their lifetime, it's a concern that I foresee with my profession, a recession coming and in a community that's gonna be devastated by what's gonna happen over the next one to two years.

So, with that stated, I don't foresee any major companies, corporations, businesses, restaurants, anything coming to that corridor in the near future just because it's gonna be limited in regards to social distancing, in regards to space, opportunity, office space. So, I think it is definitely a good buy. My issue with the purchase price is, its reflective upon a, a parcel of land and a fifteen thousand square foot building, which is essentially obsolete to us 'cause we'll be going onto the land and tearing it down and then rebuilding. So, the two questions I have are, what is gonna be the cost, our estimated cost to build this big house as, as we call it for this parcel. And then, in addition to that,

can we put together an idea and a proposal for eliminating Station 89 on Military and utilizing this big house as the one station to represent Military and Station 88 by simply.., I think I spoke to Chief Curd in a, a meeting, by simply placing ambulance, paramedics and other of the first responders throughout the community on that west side, that I know it's gonna extend the time of travel by about a minute and a half, is what I think Chief Curd said in our facilities meeting.

So, if we can implement that, eliminating some cost, eliminating 88's selling the land over it, 87, I believe that's in front of Barracuda Bay, and, and bringing some more resources back to the City. Possibly looking at... We talk about Barracuda Bay, possibly visiting that idea and selling that entire parcel and maybe working on a P3 project or partnering with someone? Because, with our new facilities, we have the option of actually building a similar project to Barracuda Bay that is actually costing us money and make something more cost effective.

So, I would be definitely in supportive of this if we could provide some, some revenue to offset the \$50,000 to \$60,000 we'll lose on the tax roll, eliminating some additional overhead, like, that's on Military and being very cautious with our spending because I do know that if this market does crash, they may be inclined to that \$2MM offer that Councilman McCoy stated. So, but I do see that is an amazing buy because even in the recession, it was still selling at \$2.8MM. I think, in the down market it was around \$3MM, so you're getting it at a very good price but I wanna make sure we address all the financial aspects attached to the property.

City Manager Evans: And, and...

- **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.
- City Manager Evans:Councilman Lawson, your, your point is, is well taken.
 When we did look at properties, we did identify this because of its location, it's prominency and, and its ideal location to be able to effectuate fire response and, and emergency response in our community.

The.., to your point with regards to the Station 89 on Military, this Station is going to be built to be able to accommodate, in the event that the VA says we're not going to enter into a extension with the lease agreement, this Station can effectively accommodate that fire company and that ambulance company to come over there and provide service. In the event that we had to ever shut down Station 87 at City Hall because of whatever issue, this Station can accommodate that. One of the things that we have spoken at the Staff level, is we would like to have community discussions with regards to what fire service will look like in.., off of that Military Trail because I can tell you, and the Chief will agree, is one of the most contentious items you could ever do is put a fire station in or take a fire station out.

And so, we, we do want to have those conversations but also, as we see development that's happening, Arbor Parc, and even the development that is contemplated over by the Rapids to see if, as part of the agreement, if there's a track of land that can be provided to us from the developers to be able to look at a long term solution for how fire services will be provided. But nothing is off the table and we are looking at it holistically. So, if.., once this Station is up, in the event that the lease is no longer provided for on Military, we can move our units in there, there wouldn't be a bump in the road. Response times would be a little bit longer, however, we wouldn't have to search around for places to go ahead and, and put our Staff on. We do believe though, when you look at relocating Station 88 and you look at Barracuda Bay, one of the things that we will be having discussions with the Board at your workshop this weekend, is consolidating Barracuda Bay into a recreational facility so it's all encompassed as opposed to a one standalone facility, and we have some examples of other communities to do that. And so, if we relocate Barracuda Bay and Station 88, now you have a great corner there that can facilitate a P3 arrangement or a mix use development that creates some synergy, as well as, you know, we're always keeping our eyes on what the federal government's gonna do with the Post Office as well, 'cause that's another parcel of interest.

Well, so, we're, we're looking at everything holistically but think that this is probably that..., the one opportunity we have to really control that corner because I think a lot of us do not want some of the repurposing we have seen of some of the Walgreens throughout the community to occur there. And I know I've had some conversations with Councilperson Miller-Anderson about what is gonna go on that corner and, and what type of businesses, 'cause there's a lot of businesses that are..., a costume store comes in there and occupies it or something else, and this is really, I think, a, a staple facility that we can have in the City, as well as making the improvements on that intersection that I believe all the Council Members have expressed some concerns about the pedestrian concerns that we have on that intersection. Having a Fire Station there, we can easily push back on, on DOT and, and the county to help us make some improvements to make that intersection a lot safer and, and be able to accommodate what we're trying to accomplish.

So, as we have the discussions, Councilman, we certainly are looking at all different ways to accommodate and address the concerns that you have. And then, we know we only have limited time as it relates to the Station 88, the temporary station on the Public Safety site, 'cause that is borrowed time. And so, one of the challenges and, and the Chief has, has provided email correspondence and I've shared that with you, those confined spaces just don't work in a COVID era at this particular moment, and, and moving into the future.

1888 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Thank you...

1889 Chairperson Botel: Thank you.

1890 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: ...Mr. Evans. I'm, I'm definitely... I'm sorry, Madam Chair,

follow up to my quest'...

Chairperson Botel: Go ahead. Yep.

- 1893 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: The.., I'm definitely adamant about us getting this and moving
- forward and quickly with it. It's just offsetting some of the revenue that we would be losing,
- based on taking it off the tax roll. What is the lease agreement amount, annual amount
- 1896 for Station 89?
- 1897 **Interim Fire Chief Curd:** There's, there's no cost to the lease agreement. That was
- part of the original VA construction. And I think, at one time, it greatly benefitted them to
- have a Fire Department on their property. The building was built for us, there is no cost
- 1900 to the lease agreement, we're just required to maintain and upkeep the building. There's
- about six to seven years left on that lease agreement and Ms. Pemsel's working diligently,
- we might even have to work through Mr. Hastings or somebody up in.., higher up in
- 1903 government to really get the VA to give us an answer. However, it's so far out in the
- 1904 future, nobody really wants to make a decision on what they're gonna do with that property
- seven years from now.
- 1906 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Okay. Yeah.
- 1907 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Anything...
- 1908 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: ...I definitely...
- 1909 Chairperson Botel: ...else, Mr. Lawson?
- 1910 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Yes, Madam Chair.
- 1911 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.
- 1912 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** I definitely, Mr. Evans, would, would love to see us move
- 1913 forward with this, this project because I think that that just renovation and then your idea
- of, of doing something with 88, Barracuda Bay and that corner station, is just gonna
- revitalize Broadway like we discussed, trying to make this corridor entering into the City
- beautified and having the buildings that actually represent this beautiful City.
- 1917 So, I'm definitely in support of it and just moving forward just to offset some of the
- revenue we're going to lose.
- 1919 **City Manager Evans:** Yeah. And, and, Councilman Lawson, to your point, if we're
- able to effectively relocate Barracuda Bay on our, on our, one of our recreational sites,
- 1921 you're talking about a two acre tract of land that is highly desirable for redevelopment of
- the downtown core.
- 1923 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Evans. Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 1924 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Ms. Lanier.
- 1925 **Councilperson Lanier:** I just wanted to say that, you know, of course with it being the
- Fire Department, it is a issue of, of health and safety at this point, to be able to make sure
- that we are, are responsive to the needs of the residents here in the City.

1928 And I also wanted to, to make the point that.., to Mr. Lawson's point as well, that, 1929 you know, looking at this land that the City owns, there is property that the Housing 1930 Authority wanted, there's property that other entities wanted from the City, that belongs 1931 to the City, and as we are moving forward with facility and looking at this whole idea of 1932 facilities, because as we know, the facility that we currently occupy have not been serving 1933 us well. [Chuckle]. You know? We know that they have not, you know, in all honesty, 1934 have not been maintained and basically are, you know, [inaudible]. So, I, I really want it 1935 to be a situation where this particular Fire Department, Fire Station, is going to be 1936 indicative of how we move forward with all of our new facility, in, in terms of, of building 1937 them but I al'.., but I definitely want to, to look at .., and to Mr. Lawson's point, to look at 1938 these properties that, you know, that we're buying but also have City owned property that 1939 we can also use to do some of this business with.

So, I just really want to move forward with this, given that, as I said before, it is an issue of health and safety at this point.

Chairperson Botel: Thank you. Anything else? I wanna take then a brief moment to thank Chief Curd and the firefighters who addressed the.., and slightly off topic, who addressed the fire this evening at The Reaches. I understand they did an excellent job and I really appreciate the rapidity with which they responded and the, and the great work they did. So, thank you.

I'm very supportive of this project. I think you're getting a great price on this land. I agree completely with what Mr. Lawson and others have said, that we need to be sure that we're making use of, of the land that we now have and repurposing it and, and doing some development.

Chairperson Botel:

1990 **City Attorney Wynn:** Good evening, Madam Chair, Members of Council, Mayor

1991 Felder.

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Thank you. Mr. Evans, who's making this presentation?

1992 This Resolution requests authorization to enter into a personal services agreement 1993 with Ms. Gamble, not to exceed \$50,000. The City Attorney's office is not asking for 1994 additional funding to add'..., be added to its budget, this is a budgeted expense, it's already 1995 in our budget. The total budget for the Department is \$865,000 and we've only spent 1996 \$738,000. And that means that we're coming to the end of this budget year well under budget. The minimum salary for a legal staff assistant position, not including benefits, is 1997 1998 \$44,150. Our previous legal staff assistant was close to \$56,000 after sixteen years with 1999 the City. And the paralegal position alone starts at \$51,955. Both of those positions have been vacant since I've been with the City, so at least for a year and a half. The Legal 2000 2001 Department has faced significant challenges, staffing challenges over the last two years. We are budgeted for four attorneys, four full-time attorneys, including myself. And, it was 2002 2003 only in March that we added the third attorney. Again, we're also budgeted for a full-time 2004 legal staff assistant and a paralegal.

In the next upcoming budget, we have agreed to transfer out the fourth attorney position in order to help with any budget shortfall issues.

2007 I'm gonna turn it over to Ms. Busby now, just to let her talk about the staffing issues 2008 that the office of has experienced prior to my coming to the office.

- 2009 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair...
- 2010 **Chairperson Botel:** Ms. Busby, before you...
- 2011 Councilperson McCoy: ...I wanna stop right...
- 2012 **Chairperson Botel:** ...start, Mr. McCoy has a question. Mr. McCoy, go ahead.
- 2013 Councilperson McCoy: Ms. Wynn.
- 2014 City Attorney Wynn: Mhmm.
- 2015 **Councilperson McCoy:** That was something I had not heard of. What does that mean,
- 2016 you agree to transfer out? Can you provide some additional information on what that
- 2017 means?
- 2018 **City Attorney Wynn:** There are four attorneys budgeted for the Legal Department
- and we are... we currently have three attorneys as you all know, and we have agreed to
- forego the, the, the fourth attorney. We will keep half of that salary. I think the salary
- budgeted for that was \$1000,000. We'll keep \$50,000 for contractual services, and
- transfer the other \$50,000 into, I believe, the general fund, Mr. Evans?
- 2023 **City Manager Evans:** Yes. What the City Att'.., what the City Attorney has offered
- 2024 up as part of our budget discussion is to effectively unfund a position and transfer a portion
- of the monies that would be allocated for that position into professional services, and then
- to effectively reduce their budget by at least \$50,000, not to include probably, the benefits
- and other ancillary perks that are provided to the employees. But that's something that
- will be experienced in Fiscal Year 2021. However, in Fiscal Year 2020, the City Attorney

2029 has not filled that position so we've been carrying the vacancy with the monies to be

utilized for any type of expenditures that the City Attorney may need to accomplish, the

items that are in her office, as far as the professional services agreement with Ms.

2032 Gamble.

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2033 **City Attorney Wynn:** Thank you, Mr. Evans.

2034 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you.

2035 Chairperson Botel: Ms. Wynn. Ms. Busby.

2036 **Assistant City Attorney Busby:** Good evening, Chair. Good evening, Members of the

2037 City Council and Mayor Felder.

I just wanted to describe to you what was going on in the office that, that explains the staffing challenges. At the end of 2019, the Legal Department, we had a full-time legal staff assistant who had been with us for about sixteen years and she abruptly had to leave and she took FMLA during that time and did not return to work. Shortly thereafter, the Department lost its paralegal and, as you know, this was during a great time of transition where Ms. Wynn was coming into the office. And, during the time, the Department had to use the temp agency just for the essential duties of that legal staff assistant. And thankfully, Ms. Wynn recruited Ms. Gamble from the county out of retirement. She had retired with over thirty years of experience, specializing in litigation and claims. When she left the county, her salary was close to \$80,000. She came into the office with no required training necessary, she successfully has been working to transition our office purely to an electronic legal office. So, I think that that is.., deserves a great amount of credit, particularly because she has reduced other expenses within the office by going purely electronic. You know, paper expenses, printer, postage and all of these kinds of antiquated expenses that legal offices used to have, we're pretty much moving away from.

In addition, the Department has used Ms. Gamble.., well, initially we used her as a full-time temporary employee, however, in November, she transitioned to an independent contractor on a limited hourly basis. You know, we were doing that kind of to .., 'cause we were expecting that we would have filled the two positions. So, we were trying to move away from our reliance on her. However, following the Local State of Emergency, the City Manager did release temporary employees and the Legal Department was forced to rely more heavily on her services. Given the state of the uncertainly with the State of Emergency and all Department personnel within the Legal Department are rotating our physical presence in the office, Ms. Gamble's legal support services, with the litigation and claims files, have become critical to the successful functioning of our legal office.

Lawsuits continue to be filed, we still have to respond [chuckle] to those lawsuits, and deadlines exist and can be quite aggressive during this time period. So, the City Attorney's office is still working as hard as it's ever been and we're committed to providing the best legal representation for the residents of the City and the City.

- in the spirit of full disclosure, you are gonna see an increase in the City Attorney's budget
- because we found legal monies that were in another department that we pulled over to
- the City Attorney's budget. So, just for clarity sake.
- 2109 **City Attorney Wynn:** Right.
- 2110 Chairperson Botel: Mr. McCoy.
- Councilperson McCoy: Okay. So, thank you for clarifying that. Let me get back to
- 2112 my point, and I really appreciate the work that they've been doing over there. But, there's
- 2113 two things that I wanna say and I brought this up last year at this time.., well, last year
- 2114 around budget time. I think it's very admirable and noble to say that we're gonna give
- \$50k back into general funds to be reallocated. But, I really had this concern, Mr. Evans,
- and I think I shared this with you last year, at least, that obviously there are two contractual
- 2117 employees with the City of Riviera Beach that reports to the City Council, the Attorney
- 2118 and also the Manager. And, you know, uniquely, the Manager kinda oversees everything
- and controls the budget. But Mr. Evans, is there a way that we can kinda create an
- 2120 autonomy when it comes to a budget that that portion is strictly done by City Council?
- And, the reason that I'm suggesting that because I really had some concerns with how the classification of certain positions within that Department is done by Human
- Resources, when they have no specific dealings or experience, or even where how with
- 2124 how those departments, or even the Legal Department works and what's required of it.
- Obviously, Ms. Wynn has the ability to recruit and hire whom she thinks is appropriate for
- 2126 that office but, you know, I would like to at least give them the opportunity, going forward,
- that office but, you know, I would like to at least give them the opportunity, going forward,
- you know, and, and looking at the new fiscal year, how we can, you know, perhaps I even
- would even venture to say keep the \$50k and, you know, maintain it at eight sixty-five or
- 2129 eight seventy and allow that Department directly to control her own budget as far as the
- classification and, and the employee salary and that sort of thing. Similar to the autonomy
- that you have in, in your what, almost twenty departments?
- 2132 **City Manager Evans:** Yeah. [Chuckle]. Ms. Wynn and I have worked very well with
- regards to that. And, and she does have, in fact, that autonomy with regards to, you
- know, bringing people onboard, selecting what appropriate compensation is, those types
- of things. So, when the City Attorney's office asks for, you know, we wanna bring
- somebody in above market, we in Administration comply with that request because it is...
- we work in the confines of, of the budget but I wanna make sure that they have all the

- 2145 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Mr. Evans. And, I appreciate you giving that
- example of Human Resources and I'm, I'm saying this because I don't ever wanna ever
- 2147 have to deal with this from any other department within the City. Obviously, Ms. Wynn
- reports to the Board, as well as the Manager. And, and I'm sorry, let me clarify that, the
- 2149 City Attorney reports to the Board, as well as the City Manager and I, I just wanna give
- 2150 her the latitude and not have to, in seven months, deal with some department coming
- with some creative method to try to, you know fulfill some sort of vacancies through this
- 2152 method, and obviously we know the value of Ms. Gamble but I, I certainly wanted to make
- sure that there was not gonna be an opportunity to have to revisit this across some other
- department which would kinda create a bad precedent. But obviously, Ms. Wynn, in just
- 2155 the fashion that she reports to this body, would necessarily... would, would necessitate
- this need. So, that's the only reason I asked that question.
- I did wanna ask one question of the agreement, Ms. Wynn, if that's okay. There
- was a section in there, Section 19 that deals with public records.
- 2159 **City Attorney Wynn:** Yes.
- 2160 **Councilperson McCoy:** Is this something that you guys worked on jointly, or is this
- general, I guess is this general information about public records and...
- 2162 **City Attorney Wynn:** It's standard contract language. It's in all of our City contracts,
- as required by Florida statute.
- 2164 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. So, generally, she has to comply with the provisions of
- 2165 Chapter 119? When it comes to public records?
- 2166 **City Attorney Wynn:** She does. However, as you know, there are certain things...
- documents, in the City Attorney's office that are not public records. So, if someone were
- 2168 to come to the City Attorney's office and ask for a specific document, she would run that
- by either me or Ms. Busby or Ms. Matumba first, in that order.
- 2170 **Councilperson McCoy:** Alright. Good enough. Thank you.
- 2171 **City Attorney Wynn:** Thank you. And I would also like to state that I thank Mr.
- 2172 Evans so much for all of his support of the Legal Department. He and I, as I've said
- before, work very well together and we support each other because most of us just want
- what's best for the City. And, you know, I think that's evident to you all in, you know, in
- 2175 looking at our work.., our working together.

- 2225 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Council, the acceptance of
- 2226 public comments at this time is now closed.
- 2227 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Would a Member care to make a motion...
- 2228 **Councilperson Lanier:** So moved.
- 2229 **Chairperson Botel:** ...[inaudible].
- 2230 Councilperson McCov: Second.
- 2231 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Are there any public comment cards, Ms.
- 2232 Anthony?
- 2233 **City Clerk Anthony:** No, Madam Chair.
- 2234 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. Evans, is Mr. Sherman making this
- 2235 presentation?
- 2236 **City Manager Evans:** Yes, Madam Chair. If I can have our Finance Director, Mr.
- 2237 Randy Sherman make this presentation.
- 2238 Chairperson Botel: Thank you.

Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Good evening again, Mayor, City Council Members.

This Item is requesting to enter into a Treasure Management Master Services Agreement with Truist Bank. Truist Bank is the merger and result merger of SunTrust and BB&T. Our current provider of banking services is TD Bank. They were awarded the bid back in 2016. Coincidentally enough, they beat out BB&T in RFP process and now BB&T, in conjunction with SunTrust, has now been rated higher than the TD Bank proposal. The good news on this, our current fees under TD Bank are about \$70,000 a year. Under this proposal, which was the lowest proposal of the three received, the banking fees will actually go down to about \$53,000 a year. Additionally, Truist Bank offered the highest earnings credit rate, which is the rate that the City earns for our investments with the bank. And again, the net savings for the City will be roughly about \$30,000, as compared to the, the second proposal.

I would add, not that this was necessarily a consideration during the RFP selection process, [inaudible] let you know BB&T has always been there for the CRA. They've, you know, provided funding when the CRA needed money for the Marina District. And as you know, the CRA is out looking to refinance that debt and get some additional new money. And again, Truist Bank was the only proposer to their RFP.

- So again, we would recommend that we enter into this agreement with Truist Bank for the next three years. And I'll take...
- 2259 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.

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- Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: ...any questions that you may have.
- 2262 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. McCoy. [Pause]. You're, you're muted.
- 2263 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair. Mr. Sherman, you spoke briefly to
- 2264 suggest that the return, or I guess the interest that we earn, is more going with Truist
- Bank. What's that rate or what's that amount? 'Cause I didn't see that. And, I guess,
- 2266 can I throw a few questions at you?
- 2267 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Sure.
- 2268 Councilperson McCoy: I, I was looking in the backup and I didn't see this but, I, I, I
- certainly trust that it was \$70,000 being reduced to \$53,000 but I didn't see any other
- proposal, then I just so happened to bank with TD Bank, and I'm only saying this because,
- while I understand the RFP may lay out what we're looking for as a City, was there
- 2272 consideration of the convenience of TD Bank compared to BB&T? Not just for the City
- 2273 operations but the people that we serve as vendors and also our employees?
- 2274 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: In answer to your first
- 2275 question, the earnings credit rate that Truist offered is 1.15 percent. The interest rate that
- was offered by the other two proposers was 1 percent. So again, they were fifteen percent

2277 higher on that earnings credit rate. Now we typically keep between ten and \$15MM in the bank on a daily basis, so that .15 is a considerable amount of money to the City. Part 2278 of the RFP process and one of the questions, is the services that they do provide to our 2279 2280 employees. A lot of the employees, when we went to TD Bank, and I will say that I bank at TD [chuckle] Bank as well, were disappointed that they, you know were losing the plan, 2281 2282 the employee programs that BB&T offered at the time. They really liked the pl'.., the 2283 programs that they had developed for the, the employees. TD Bank does offer programs 2284 but the employees did prefer what BB&T offered. And so again, as we convert over, 2285 employees can clearly stay with TD Bank, they can move to whichever bank again, that 2286 they choose. But BB&T and SunTrust will be offering programs to the employees. One thing that we did like about, and again, I did not sit on the committee, one thing the 2287 2288 committee did like about Truist is, again, the BB&T location right on Broadway versus 2289 over on Congress. They actually [chuckle] thought that that was a better suited situation. 2290 I will tell you that in 2016, one of the things that really worked against BB&T as compared to TD Bank, TD Bank was more geared towards small dollar/large volume transactions, 2291 2292 which is what, you know, the City really operates in. And, BB&T kinda struggled in that 2293 area a little. I think now that they're partnered up with SunTrust who, again, is bringing 2294 that experience to the table, I think again, that'll assist us with our business transactions 2295 going forward.

- I don't know if that answered your question or not but...
- 2297 **Councilperson McCoy:** It did. Thank you, sir.
- 2298 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Okay.
- 2299 **Chairperson Botel:** Anything else, Mr. McCoy?
- 2300 Councilperson McCoy: That's it for now. I will wait on my second opportunity if the
- 2301 question...
- 2302 **Chairperson Botel:** [Chuckle]. Thank, thank you. Anyone else have a question
- 2303 for Mr. Sherman? [Pause]. I think your second opportunity has arisen, Mr. McCoy.
- 2304 [Pause]. Mr. McCoy?
- 2305 **Councilperson McCoy:** I'm good. I'm sorry, I'm good. I have nothing else.
- 2306 Chairperson Botel: Okay.
- 2307 **Councilperson McCoy:** I was waiting for another Member to offer but, you know...
- 2308 Chairperson Botel: I don't...
- 2309 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...Mr. Sherman, can we get them to open the drive thru? And
- even open their lobby because TD Bank hasn't skipped a beat in COVID-19.
- 2311 [Inaudible background]

- 2312 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, that wasn't me but...
- 2313 **Chairperson Botel:** Wasn't me.
- 2314 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: [Chuckle].
- 2315 **Chairperson Botel:** I'm alone.
- 2316 Councilperson McCoy: [Chuckle]. Yeah. That, that's my only concern. And I
- 2317 understand...
- 2318 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: I...
- 2319 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...that this is a decision that we have to make based on the
- 2320 RFP. And I support it. Actually, let me ask this question though, was there any options
- afforded to TD Bank in their contract or was it just a three year contract?
- 2322 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: TD Bank did have a three
- 2323 plus two one's. We're actually in the process of entering into the second one year
- extension, which we will do as well. I'll tell you a transition of banks can take up to a year.
- 2325 If you think of the tail that's out there on our receivables, EMS billings, lockbox, you know,
- there's a lot of transitions. We have to contact federal government stakeout and get all
- those accounts and wirers and everything transitioned. So, yes, they will be still in place
- for their fifth year as well.
- 2329 **Councilperson McCoy:** Last question. Thank you for bringing up that lockbox. Does
- 2330 BB&T have somewhere local? Obviously, Riviera Beach is a stretch but I don't wanna
- send money outside of the relative area to process payments for utilities or anything like
- 2332 that.
- 2333 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Yeah. It, it actually is in
- 2334 Orlando.
- 2335 Councilperson McCoy: Oh.
- 2336 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: But that's, that's way
- 2337 [inaudible]. But, what I will say is with our new billing system and going to more electronic
- payments versus the lockbox, you know, that's our hope is really to eliminate a lot of that.
- 2339 'Cause it's an expensive process for us. But that's where their, their lockbox is located.
- 2340 **Councilperson McCoy:** I, I remember, Mr. Sherman, that was brought up and that just
- makes so much sense. I mean, we have to really manage how our dollars are spent and,
- 2342 I mean, when that came up years ago, I just said it makes perfect...
- 2343 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Yeah.
- 2344 Councilperson McCoy: ...sense to... You know, and I'm probably one of those
- persons that sometimes just have to put a stamp just to make sure that I'm remitting my

- payment but I just don't like the fact that we have to send money outside the City. But,
- you know, I, I guess, obviously, at thirteen thou'..., well, actually, it's a little more than that.
- 2348 Was that... Yeah. Thirteen.., \$17,000 difference in the annual fee, plus additional
- earnings on interest then, you know, so be it. But, that's, that's a..., something that we, I
- 2350 think as a City, and I think all of the Members kinda.., we really would like to keep our
- money here locally, if at all possible.
- 2352 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Yeah.
- 2353 **Councilperson McCoy:** I, I still support it and I, I appreciate the work you've done on
- 2354 it
- 2355 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you...
- 2356 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Thank you.
- 2357 Chairperson Botel: ...Mr. McCoy. Ms. Lanier.
- 2358 Councilperson Lanier: No. I was just...
- 2359 **Chairperson Botel:** Oh, just turn your mic on. I... Oh, Ms. Lawson.., Mr. Lawson.
- 2360 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Thank you, Madam Chair. Mr. Sherman, I've seen in other
- 2361 municipalities, most recently I'd say, think Atlanta, they were able to negotiate for
- residents, small business loans, lines of credits and beneficial opportunities for them to
- 2363 invest and to actually garnish funds. I see that the employees are gonna have a lot of
- 2364 advantages when it comes to checking accounts, credit services, financial solutions, but
- 2365 is there anything being passed over to the residents as well with us banking there?
- 2366 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: They do have under the
- 2367 Community Redevelopment Act that they have to invest in the communities where they
- 2368 operate. So, once we get them engaged in that discussion, you know, get them under
- contract and you start engaging them in the programs that we have, we will work our best
- 2370 to, to see what we can get.
- 2371 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** I think we lose our bargaining chip with getting them on the
- 2372 contract and then starting negotiations for having these discussions. Because if we get
- 2373 them under contract and then decide to start talking about community redevelopment,
- 2374 in'..., incentives for our residents, they're not gonna be as inclined to offer as much as we
- would like to see with the contract signed. So, prior to signing this contract, is there
- something that we can actually get some additional information on moving forward with
- 2377 some additional benefits for our residents? And, even a little bit more in depth for
- employees 'cause, based upon this proposal I'm looking at, it's, it's really just kind of a
- 2379 simple opportunity for checking accounts, savings accounts and vague responses in
- 2380 regards to financial goals. Where I know TD was amazing with small businesses and
- small business lending and, and support for small businesses. So, I really wanna see
- some opportunities to use our, [stammer] our revenue that they're going to be making off
- of the income from the City, to impact the community in a deeper fashion.

- 2384 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Well, they already do
- operate here. So, they already do invest. I can pull the CRA reports, get some, some
- background on that.
- 2387 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Yeah. Because this...
- 2388 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: [Inaudible].
- 2389 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** ...amount.., this dollar... This dollar amount that...
- 2390 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: I'm sorry?
- 2391 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** ...we're gonna be... The dollar amount that we're gonna be
- transitioning over to SunTrust or Truist is gonna be substantial for their bank, and as
- 2393 Councilman McCoy said, I, I understand them operating out of Orlando but I really want
- every dollar spent to impact and, and benefit all of our residents in this community.
- 2395 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you, Mr. Lawson.
- 2396 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 2397 **Chairperson Botel:** I was gonna rai'.., raise that issues because we know that Mr.
- Evans has on a number of occasions, raised the issue of the potential for working with a
- bank to offer mortgages and, and improvements loans for our citizens because of the
- dollar value of our, our business. So, and I agree that it's much more effective if we can
- do that prior to signing any contract with them, because now is the time we have the
- leverage. So, I'm sure that Mr. Sherman and Mr. Evans will, will take a good hard look at
- 2403 that.
- 2404 Anyone else before we ask for a vote?
- 2405 **Councilperson Lanier:** I just wanted to quickly say, yeah, that, that if it wasn't a part
- of the RFP, we kind alost a little leverage at that point then, but if we can move forward
- with these type of ideas, certainly, we can make sure that the next time we go out to bid,
- it's a part of the contract or part of the RFP itself.
- 2409 **Chairperson Botel:** Right. Ms. Miller-Anderson and then Mr. McCoy.
- 2410 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Thank you. Mr. Sherman, was.., when we had
- the RFP before, when TD Bank got it, did we have that conversation then? Was it in their
- 2412 RFP to do these things that are being asked of now?
- 2413 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: We ask.., we ask for their
- 2414 CRA reports. So, you know, the..., we do get the ability to find out what they are investing
- in. How many we can.., and what it'll tell you is, how many loans they have, how many
- 2416 mortgages they carry and all those types of things within the community. When we did
- go to TD Bank we did have the conversation with the rep'.., excuse me, with the rep at
- 2418 the meeting about additional commitment, which again, you know, they're all ha'.., they're

- 2419 all happy to do as long as it's within their, you know, their [inaudible]. So, if we bring programs to them, I think, you know, we'll get a positive response back. 2420
- 2421 But, I think as, as Councilperson Lanier mentioned that, you know, it's kinda tough.
- 2422 It's not.., it wasn't in the RFP to, to negotiate anything like that. But again, we'll have that
- 2423 open conversation with them.
- **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Yeah. That's why I was asking if it was in the 2424
- last RFP when... 2425
- Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Yeah. 2426
- Councilperson Miller-Anderson: ...I, I vaguely.., I recall being there, on the 2427
- Board, when we did that but I couldn't remember if that was in the RFP when we met 2428
- before on the one with TD Bank.. I know there was a little dispute between BB&T and 2429
- TD Bank but couldn't recall if we had it in the RFP before. 2430
- 2431 Okay. Thank you.
- 2432 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. McCoy.
- 2433 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair. Ms.., Councilwoman Miller-
- Anderson, also Councilwoman Lanier, I, I think that's very important. But, Ms. Wynn and 2434
- 2435 Mr. Sherman, don't all of our contracts provide us the option to terminate? Provided we
- 2436 give notice?
- 2437 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Oh yeah.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** And, that's certainly not what I'm trying to suggest to leverage, 2438
- 2439 and I know that maybe probably tuning in but I'm asking for an opportunity to have a seat
- 2440 at the table. Obviously, this is perhaps something that wasn't negotiated on, but going
- with BB&T, yeah, I think all of us as a body and individually, have a commitment to 2441
- 2442 supporting the initiatives in our community. And I'm not asking for a sponsorship but I'm
- 2443 asking for some consideration and, and preference when it comes to our employees and,
- 2444 you know, our residents here in the City. So certainly, I would love to see if there's a
- opportunity, Mr. Evans, and our Economic Development Director to build out some sort 2445
- 2446 of program to kinda support some of those initiatives to some of the individuals that work
- 2447 within the City. And, perhaps that can come later down the line, and I would never
- 2448 suggest that we should do it pending the contract, but obviously we're, we're coming to
- 2449 the table to work together and I wanna see that we can accomplish that. Because, you
- know, obviously I didn't see any kinda backup as to all or who.., all of the banks that had 2450
- submitted, provided in here. I was looking for a more.., a, a local bank in terms of s'... 2451
- one having some roots here in South Florida and not a national chain. But in the event, I 2452
- understand the economies are scaling what those larger banks have to offer and I support 2453
- 2454 where we're going but, certainly, I would love to have that conversation going forward,
- 2455 Mr. Evans and also, Finance Director, Mr. Sherman
- 2456 So, I, I support it as it's presented. Thank you.

- 2457 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Anything else? Are we ready for the question?
- 2458 [Pause]. Oh, Mr. Lawson.
- 2459 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Yes. Madam, Madam Chair. So, based upon what
- 2460 Councilwoman Lanier stated that us going into..., or, not having this presented in the RFP,
- 2461 we're not able to actually ask for any additional resources or benefits to the community
- because it was not outlined in the RFP. Okay. So, then my request for Mr. Evans, moving
- forward with any RFP that we do put out, I would definitely want some type of community
- im'.., impact, benefitting the residents, [stammer] fitting the disparities that we have in the
- community and just making sure that we're, we're utilizing our leverage of spending major
- 2466 dollars with these businesses to address the, the blight that we have in our community.
- the housing crisis, the food desert. I don't want us to spend any more money without
- 2468 addressing...
- [Inaudible background]
- 2470 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** ...a lot of the concerns... Uhuh, that was Dr. Botel that time...
- 2471 without addressing any of the concerns that our community is truly experiencing. So, I
- 2472 want us to implement that prior to these RFP's going out because I can't be in support of
- this if we're not able to have that seat at the table, like Councilman McCoy stated with us
- spending millions of dollars with a bank that I know is gonna profit on a monthly basis,
- 2475 eight to ten percent revenue, based upon how they invest.
- So, I think it's a great opportunity for us to utilize the leverage of a City to get what we want. And, that would be my request moving forward with future RFP's, addressing
- 2478 disparity, addressing food deserts, addressing housing crisis and making sure it's
- impactful. This Council does an amazing job with the community benefits that we receive
- from Waste Management but, essentially, we would all throw it back in if they would
- provide better opportunities for the community when it came to jobs, when it comes to
- 2482 housing. I think that'd be a better opportunity. Like, Councilwoman Lanier just did a
- amazing investment to a program that I've watched for years, but providing a housing,
- 2484 providing fresh fruits, I think is something we wanna address further.
- 2485 **Chairperson Botel:** Mayor Felder.
- 2486 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 2487 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mayor Felder.
- 2488 **Mayor Felder:** Thank you, Madam Chair. And just to piggyback on Councilman
- McCoy, as we're looking to maybe putting that in other RFP's, as he stated, we still have
- some type of leverage. We're not saying we wanna go in and terminate a contract before
- 2491 it gets going but I think that's our leverage point. [Inaudible] she said, you know, we
- 2492 should be at the table and kinda getting some of our ideas of what we want this
- relationship to be about and warn that if they're not gonna follow those ideas, you know.
- we do have a, a option to terminate. So, you know, I, I.., until we get that written in our
- 2495 RFP's, we, we still have a little bit of leverage to be at the table.

- 2496 **Chairperson Botel:** Right. Thank you. Ms. Lanier.
- 2497 **Councilperson Lanier:** I just wanted to quickly say that, that, you know, I did not say
- 2498 that..., Councilman Lawson, I did not say that because we had past..., it wasn't in the RFP
- that we should not consider this. What I said was that when, when you talk about
- community benefit, yes, it should be a part of our RFP's regardless of it's the banking
- 2501 industry or anybody who wants to do business with our City. There should be a
- 2502 community benefits clause in it regardless.
- Second of all, I think that moving forward, because we do.., are.., we are in negotiations, don't make it a part of negotiations but consider a proposal for the agent.., for the bank to look at some of the programs and some of the proposals that we have for
- 2506 the city. It is not to say that they won't.., they will not look at it. They have fou'.., banks
- have foundations sized to them and they can fund some of the programs. So, we can..,
- knowing this.., what we know now, we can move forward into asking them questions and asking them for things that now we do know. But, moving forward, not just the banking,
- but any RFP that comes out of the City needs to include a community benefits clause
- 2511 period.
- 2512 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Anything else? Okay. Madam Clerk.
- 2513 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson McCoy?
- 2514 Councilperson McCoy: Yes.
- 2515 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Miller-Anderson?
- 2516 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 2517 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Lanier?
- 2518 Councilperson Lanier: Yes.

The \$100,000 will be used for afterschool programming, and the \$80,000 will be used for our career internships which you normally see our kids working within the City 2568 and around the City during the summer months. And that will occur for us over the next 2569 two years with the dollars that they're providing. 2570 2571 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you, Ms. Grimsley. Do we have any questions? 2572 [Pause]. Well. I guess we're ready to ask the question to be called. Development Services Director Sirmons: Good evening, Madam Chair and Members of the Council. I am before you today to present our Department's research on the Art in Public Places Item.

So, City Council previously directed us to look into the, the feasibility and what it would like to implement a, a successful Art in Public Places program here in Riviera Beach. That research led us to look at several municipalities in the area and the county that have successful programs, to look at how their programs are structured, how they are facilitated and different funding sources so we can see what works and see what may work in our City. So, that research led us to identify four main components of the Art in Public Places programs. One was the program facilitator, two was having a Art in Public Places Master Plan, and the third was an Art Advisory Board and the fourth was a reliable funding source, of course.

And so, the first item, a Master Plan, similar to a Comprehensive Plan that we already have for the City, just identifying the long term goals of the program, where certain installations would be placed and what the main priorities of the program are. New public and private projects would be reviewed for consistency with this Master Plan, again, similar to a, a Comprehensive Plan that we already have and without a Master Plan, this program may have unmet objectives and lack clear vision.

The second component would be the Board, an Art Advisory Board Commissions generally consist of seven volunteers appointed by City Council. Pretty standard there. An application would be required and the terms would be one to three years. All meetings would be open to the general public and meeting minutes would be required. A program facilitator, all of the programs we observed, for the most part, have a full-time staff member that administers the program. This implementation includes serving as executive secretary and technical advisor to the Arts in Public Places Board; applying for grants and other funding sources for the program; and the staff person would also develop and have oversight of the Art in Public Places Master Plan; monitoring installations and their maintenance; monitoring the budgets and revenues for the program; as well as issuing and reviewing calls to artists when there are opportunities for installations to be designed and created.

And then funding sources. Private and public sources have been used to fund these types of programs. Under private, one percent public arts fee is often used in these programs. That fee is levied in lieu of that property owner or developer installing the arts on their property or donating art to the City, and if they provide the art physically, it would have to be in equivalent value to one percent of their project's value. An art impact fee has also been used in some municipalities, naming rights and sponsorships is also an..., a method for funding that has been used, as well as grants and private donations. And then on the public side, typically initial seed funding, funding is required to get the program off the ground. General fund contributions on the regular are also used to prop up these art funds in different municipalities. There are situations where the municipality created a partnership with the local CRA to combine those efforts or interests in seeing art spread

around the City. And then, a public art component of capital projects is often involved, whereas the City, the City's goal is to be the example they want to see in the development community so it's City projects making sure that at least one percent of the budget of those goes to a public art component, just like we would expect from the developers.

And then, approximate program costs. As always, the biggest ticket is the human capital involved. The program facilitator on the, the.., what we estimate as the lowest end would be probably \$65,000 for salary and benefits total. Public meetings, quarterly meetings we estimate would be the necessary regularity of those meetings, about \$4,000 advertising costs for newspaper ads. For public meetings, calls for artists and things of that nature, and then miscellaneous trainings, supplies and travel that the administrator of this program may need or benefit from to, to administer the program. Estimated annual program cost, seventy-two, \$75,000 per year.

And then potential revenues. So, we looked a little more deeply at the one percent public art fee and what type of revenue that would generate. So, what Staff did was look at the past twelve months, so from July 13th of this year to July of 2019 and we looked at all of the projects that we had in Riviera Beach, I looked at the valuation of them and we pretended that we charged the one percent fee for public art on those projects to see what types of revenues we would could expect from that. And with that research, we found that if we took a look at.., a look at all commercial projects valued greater than \$50,000 for the past twelve months, that total net would be \$59,123. However, that does include all projects that are classified as commercial, so anything from a new commercial building to a new sprinkler system in an existing commercial building. So, if we break that down to be more specific on the types of projects we want to levy that fee on, we looked at commercial interior work only, that's commercial buildouts, things of that nature, \$27,950, commercial with projects that are only new construction or existing building expansions, that would generate about \$29,613, if we levied that one percent fee only on those exterior projects. And then, we did have one CIP project that would've netted or required a \$1,560 either fee or installation. And I'm sure if we were doing the project, we would do the installation ourselves.

And this next slide has a table that shows just what one percent looks like based on project valuation. So again, looking at these same categories, a project valued at, on the first line here, \$974,000. They pay..., and this is a actual permit that we had over the past twelve months, they pay \$21,000 in permit fees, that one percent additional Art in Public Places fee would be \$9,741, so that's what they would pay to contribute to the Art in Public Places fund or they would be required to install some art of a equivalent value on their property, or donate art of equivalent value based on how most municipalities structure that fee requirement. So that's what the one percent would look like. Other options would be, again, general fund contributions from the City, partnering with other organizations such as the CRA and, and, and as many municipalities do, mix various sources to make that happen. And on this last slide, I will just leave you with some images of different art installations in public places.

Again, Staff is prepared to move forward with developing an Ordinance or Resolution related to this program. However, we would need to know the desire of the 2702 Council on how we would structure the revenues required for this program, and then a lot of the other details, we could work out after that.

And that concludes my slide presentation.

- 2705 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you, Mr. Sirmons. Any questions from Council? Mr.
- 2706 Lawson.
- 2707 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Thank you, Madam Chair. Sorry, Mr. Shermans.., Sirmons, if
- you could stop sharing the screen.
- 2709 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Yes.
- 2710 [Pause]
- 2711 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: And while you're doing that, I just wanted to thank you very
- 2712 much for working on this project. We brought this to the table and a few months ago and
- we finally got a tangible idea of how we can incorporate this into our community. So,
- 2714 thank you for getting it completed for us. I see a lot of the same locations as what Mr.
- Jackson had put on there, on the initial proposal and that's a great assertion that those
- are right on point with what we wanna incorporate into the community. So, thank you
- very much for bringing this to the City and to the Council.
- 2718 Question.., I have two questions now. Have we researched the estimated cost for a Master Plan?
- 2720 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** For creating an Art in Public Places
- 2721 Master Plan, no.
- 2722 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Okay. If we could get some updates on that because I know
- that we're gonna try to incorporate that into our budget. I know that that's gonna be fairly
- 2724 expensive and I wanna keep the budget as limited as possible, while getting this program
- off the ground. I still want us to make sure that we can incorporate not just the art, but
- the actual programming to assist with some of the kids in the community, young adults and also do some possible training when it comes to the art arena, whether it's the murals,
- whether it's the, the programming, whether it's the sculptures and just incorporate that
- into the idea of an educational piece. That's the programing.

2730 The next step would be beautification and ideas of different sculptures and, and outlines throughout community. One of the ideas that I wanted to actually present is that 2731 we have the only intersection in the nation that actually has a Barack Obama and MLK 2732 2733 intersecting. I've been speaking with the Port, as the Port rep to discuss beautification of that corridor for entry into the Port. And I think that would be a good location for us to 2734 launch and to really expand our Arts in Public Places by representing that location here 2735 2736 in our City, by acknowledging our community lea'.., our leaders, previous president and our civil rights leader by showing support with the Ports and also possibly commemorating 2737 these leaders from the community, or these leaders that have influenced so many people 2738

in this community by some type of sculpture and making that as a destination, and kinda kicking that off as a great incentive for the community.

Lastly, Mr. Sirmons, the, the impacts to adding these [stammer] additional fees to the developers, once it was incorporated from these other communities, what impact did you see, or did these other communities have when it came to adding this additional one to two percent fee to their accounting? Did it reduce the amount of development within the community? Did it keep it pretty consistent? Or, did it not effect it at all? That'd be just something I'd want us to take a look at as well.

- Development Services Director Sirmons: Okay. Yeah. We can definitely take a deeper look into the before and after development rates based on these programs.
- 2749 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Perfect. And thank you very much. I also wanna just give credit to Mr. Jackson who did a lot of this initial research, my legislative aide, when we
- actually put... presented this program about two months ago, and your Staff as well, for
- bringing it together and putting it together because I think this will be a great initiative for
- the community and to also assist with the beautification of the community. So, thank you
- again, sir.
- 2755 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** No problem.
- 2756 **Chairperson Botel:** Anyone else? Mr. McCoy, and then Ms. Lanier.
- 2757 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair. Mr. Sirmons, appreciate the
- 2758 presentation. I actually am kinda feeling bad because I couldn't see some of those
- 2759 numbers...
- 2760 **Chairperson Botel:** [Chuckles].
- 2761 Councilperson McCoy: ...and perhaps I need glasses at this point. But, I.., did I see
- correctly that there was numbers suggesting estimates of what that one percent will look
- 2763 like based on certain construction costs?
- 2764 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Correct. And those, those fees are
- based on the project valuation, not, not necessarily the permits they would've paid with
- them but, yes.
- 2767 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. And this will be for new commercial constructions only,
- 2768 correct?
- 2769 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** That is the only categories that we
- looked at was commercial, but some of them were new building construction, some of
- 2771 them were just interior buildouts, just some interior remodels and things like that. Some
- commercial projects are, are things such as mechanical systems and sprinkler systems.
- 2773 So, on the table, we broke out what the revenue would look like based on those different
- 2774 construction, or permit, categories. So again, if we only looked at just new construction
- when it comes to commercial, the revenue would be a lot less. And, and then that

category only, we saw about \$29,613, but that's only exterior commercial construction. And, and I think most of the time, these programs are envisioned for those types of projects, it's when you're doing something on the outside, a new building or significantly expanding an existing building. And those are typically when these fees are levied. However, over the, the twelve year period that we did this study, we had about six of those projects where it was exterior construction. The year previous to that, there was only one exterior construction permit in the City so the revenue rates would fluctuate greatly based on just the type of development we have in a calendar or fiscal year in terms of the amount of revenue we get from them.

- **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you. Follow up.
- **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.

Councilperson McCoy: Okay. Thank you for that, Mr. Sirmons and I appreciate the concept, however, I, I have some reservations. Obviously, are we gonna go ahead and start at the top. The first thing is, the suggestion of general funds, I just can't, in good conscious, ask taxpayers to pay for Art in Public Places when, you know, we had this conversation just this meeting to see if we can return dollars back to the taxpayer and not levy it through general funds. That just seems like that is more or less an investment of taxpayer dollars into art that may or may not, you know, really add any value to the City. We have, I think, already, ever increasing needs for City services and I'm still at this whole point of how nine years later we almost tripled and, you know, it's kinda really hard to point to where we really improved as far as the efficiency and the type of services that we deliver to the citizens of Riviera Beach.

My next concern is, how is this gonna be reduced into any kind of legislative action, be it by Ordinance or Resolution? And, I guess that's more or less..., probably one of the final questions that we should ask ourselves as a body because I would not want this to be something that becomes a permanent situation for the City. I mean, we can [stammer], we can be in a situation where we're collecting or levying a one percent tax that's now being codified in our Ordinances and we don't have any growth, and the money is just accumulating. Councilwoman Lanier brought up the, the very point tonight of how monies are being diverted into the, the City's disaster fund and we don't get to control that because that's set by Charter, and I don't know if I wanna set something that has such a fiscal impact on development into an Ordinance because it'd be that much more difficult to undo it in the event that they economy changes.

Speaking of economy changes, it seem like, I think that's where we are right now. But, in any event, a one percent tax, I just can't support. We are in need of development in the City of Riviera Beach. And let's welcome development by not adding additional tax. I just don't understand how that's gonna be enticing to any developer. I certainly support the idea of, you know, reaching out to the CRA and dollars that have already been appropriated specifically for community redevelopment, perhaps there's an avenue there but I just can't see or support any kind of initiative to add one percent tax to commercial development. Because you know what that one percent tax equates to? That one percent tax is gonna be now forwarded over to whatever that business does, it's

gonna trickle down to the residents that have to patronize that business. And, I think it does a lot and it adds a lot of value to the beautification but, at this point, I don't see, as a City in this current economy, that we should even commit to something of that.

And then, additionally, the idea that you suggested, Mr. Sirmons, of perhaps any kinda interior upgrades, be it mechanical or electrical in nature, that we add a one percent, I mean, we have certain businesses that have to now conform to new provisions within the Code, for whatever reason, they perhaps passed the percentage threshold and they now need to comply, now, if that's the case because we already have a requirement that they were perhaps already grandfathered in being legally nonconforming and some incident change where they now have to do some increases or improvements, on top of them doing that we're gonna also consider adding an additional one percent of that project cost back onto their bill to then divert it to Art in Public Places.

You know, I, I wanna really support this but there has to be some very fine tuning when it comes to this because I want people to wanna come here and not to fear here, because there's a way that we can pull a tax up and, and be able to add it to a bill. I mean, obviously, there is a need and, let me tell you, I've seen some really great art projects and I think you guys have done a lotta work in the twelve years but I don't see that we're in a situation, given where we're going economically as a community, to support something of adding an additional one percent. Definitely not from general funds, and I'm very cautious about doing that about individuals that have existing businesses that just simply have to comply with the Code, or if someone that wants to perhaps expand. And, I mean, what we're asking for is, you know, the, the, the businesses in Riviera Beach, I'd probably would venture to say, and I.., don't quote me on this, at least ninety-five percent of them are small, small businesses. So, to ask for something like this, I think it has a lotta unintended consequences.

So, that are my.., those are my concerns. Some of my concerns, and I wanna at least allow the conversation to go forward but the very first absolute no for me is general funds.

2846 I yield back.

- **Chairperson Botel:** I think... Thank you. I think Mr. Lawson and then Ms. Lanier. 2848 Mr. Lawson's been trying to reply.
- Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Thank you, Madam Chair. Thank you for your response, Councilman McCoy. I want us to kind of take a look at what nationally has been beneficial for the residents in the community. If you look at the Wynnewood Art District, if you look at Northwood, if you look at the Cultural District, Arts District in New York, and even West Palm Beach, those are some of the things that have revitalized these communities and they've instilled and beautified the community by allowing for arts to actually benefit.

The one percent sales tax that you did address, is actually.., the one percent investment into the community is actually going to attract businesses that see we're trying to beautify our community with the arts, with the murals, with the structures. So, I think

that actually is gonna contradict what you said by deterring people 'cause it shows that we're actually going to instill a benefit of beautification to our community and they're gonna wanna work with a City that actually is trying to beautify that corridor. Right now, nobody's running to the City to actually build and develop right now. But, that's traditionally because of staffing issues, media turmoil that we've been considered, and we've done a great job to transforming that and to changing the narrative. So, with the leadership of our City Manager and the Staff that he's bringing in, the initiative that we're putting in place shows that we're actually gonna beautify this community.

One thing that you talked about is also a burden on the taxpayers that are gonna actually trickle down from the businesses. The one percent sales tax on a million dollar, a five hundred thousand dollar investment is not gonna cause for a burden on these businesses that are developing, especially if we beautify the corridors, or, even giving them the option of beautification. So, I really think that's actually be beneficial to the development versus actually impacting our taxpayers in the negative fashion. So, essentially, we're pac'.., placing the burden on the businesses by letting them know we're beautifying our community, we're developing our community and we're gonna make it a destination for them. And it's also gonna be an incentive for our residents because now we're gonna have individuals wanting to visit and travel to our City, comparable to how people talk about Wynwood, comparable how to they talk about Northwood, and they travel to these locations 'cause they beautify the area and that community.

You also addressed the concern right here and now with the issue of COVID, with saving the money and the issues that we're gonna have over the next six months, year or two years, but we have an initiative that we're trying to implement in the policy that's gonna essentially take affect for the next ten, twenty, thirty years and allow for us to develop our community and build and look outside the next six months to a year. We have discussions of two hundred, three hundred, \$400MM of development that we're gonna be doing as a City. So with that development and other businesses seeing this development, they're gonna want to build next to our new Fire Station, they're gonna want to build next to the new Wells development and City Hall Complexes, they're gonna wanna build next t to the Marina and continue to branch off of that, and that's an incentive that we're gonna take care of and actually build out our corridors of Broadway and Blue Heron.

So I want us to start living up to the idea of Riviera Beach 2030 versus looking at the next six months to twelve months because we have to really address policy that's gonna impact our community for the next ten, twenty and thirty years so that our kids' kids can be.., well receive benefits of actually seeing development in our community.

Chairperson Botel: Thank you. Ms. Lan'...

2896 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: ... Madam Chair.

Chairperson Botel: Thank you. Ms. Lanier.

2898 Councilperson Lanier: I just wanted to say that when talking about art, you know, you have to look at the fact that, you know, art significantly contributes to the quality of life. 2899 Period. That, that's just a..., that, that's just a known fact. We, we..., when we're looking 2900 2901 at.., looking through these slides, I see that, you know, it looks like a salary, I think that 2902 this program can be phased in. I think that we can look at half cent and, and sales tax funding as a, as a method of.., of, of funding this project. I also see it as something that 2903 2904 can be phased in where we start with local artists, we start with, you know, our libraries, 2905 our, our, our public spaces, our parks. What we have to do is that we have to move forward in terms of ensuring that not only are we bringing in new development, not only 2906 2907 are we bringing in new buildings, but we are also beautifying our space. And I, I, I sincerely believe that art is something that contributes to a better way of life for people. 2908 2909 People seeing nice things, they're seeing it clean, they're seeing it, you know, people... 2910 when you look at art, you don't have this, what they consider to be a trash mentality, 2911 where you're just looking at trash on the side of the road or you're looking at some space 2912 that is not, you know, occupied by some type of beautification. And I think that we can move forward with it being, especially with the.., it being a salary, it could be a contract 2913 2914 position, but I also think that other alternates that we can use as funding for this, and it 2915 also can move in phases.

- 2916 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Anything else? Ms. Miller-Anderson.
- 2917 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Thank you. I can certainly look at supporting
- 2918 this. I know this, you know, we've done it over in the CRA, or at least trying to start it
- 2919 [inaudible] CRA. And so, I'm looking forward to possibly doing it on this side, but I, I
- wanna see how we're gonna be working out some things during the budget time. So, I, I
- would like to see how that plays out.
- Thank you.
- 2923 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. McCoy. And then I have something
- 2924 [inaudible].
- 2925 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair. I, I have two things, Madam Chair.
- 2926 Indulge me, please. Councilwoman Lanier, and also Mr. Sirmons, are, are you
- suggesting there's a salary that's supposed to come or be derived from the one percent?
- 2928 Because I didn't think that that's what I understood, unless I'm wrong. I mean...
- 2929 Councilperson Lanier: I saw that it said salary and benefits, so I 'm assuming that it's
- a salary position.
- 2931 Chairperson Botel: Yes.
- 2932 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Yes. The primary cost of the program in
- 2933 our calculations and, and the slide that we did was from the salary of the program
- 2934 administrator, and various duties would be required to make sure this program operates
- 2935 well. And, especially, if we have funding sources such as grants and private donations,
- 2936 and we're putting out requests for proposals, requests for qualifications for artists and
- 2937 things like that, it, it quickly becomes a full-time job to administer this type of a program.

- 2938 [Stammer] I'm sure it would be possible to potentially scale up but I, you know, we, we
- looked at the most successful programs in our area that do this and they pretty much all
- 2940 use a full-time staff member for them.
- 2941 Councilperson McCoy: Follow up.
- 2942 Chairperson Botel: Yes.

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2943 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. I'm sorry. I'm.., I, I overlooked that point but we have 2944 current staffing within Development Services. It would just seem to me, and obviously you and the Manager have this decision to determine to make, but that should not create 2945 2946 a new position within the City. Something we're starting should not create a new position. Obviously, I mean, we still have.., I mean, we're not even in the stages of training wheels, 2947 2948 right? And that's, albeit, if we even get to this point, I don't see that we need to have, you 2949 know, a whole lot of debate and discussion on creating a position because we don't even 2950 know that there is a demand that exists for it. That's the very first thing. So, I would hope 2951 that that's not something that is gonna be a deciding factor on whether we move forward 2952 or a deal breaker, especially when we're asking to rollback currently.., the current tax rate. Obviously, we're going into a fiscal year, so we're in the budget discussions, that's the 2953 2954 first thing. But, Members, I certainly support it, I just don't think that it's a good idea to do 2955 it from dollars that we're gonna do it..., ad valorem dollars based on construction costs.

Do you remember, Mr. Evans, we had this workshop when we had Waste Management here early part of the year, and then we did have those dollars that we said we were gonna do back..., we were gonna get those dollars that we were able to receive from penalties, and that sorta thing, from commercial businesses that violated or..., Mr. Evans probably could add more to it, but that actually overloaded and there was penalties and dollar values assessed by Waste Management and those additional dollars that were set forth by Resolution, can come back to the City. I certainly don't have a problem with putting all of those dollars back into it, to support this initiative but I think we're, we're, we're doing a lot. We're doing a lot to demand that one percent of any kind of new commercial development, or even improvements, or significant improvements, are gonna go back into an Art in Public Places project or program, that's gonna also generate enough money to support a salary and also to support any kinda art. But there are some other avenues. I just would like to see if we can be open enough to not exactly tie this to ad valorem of construction costs or the value of construction.

- 2970 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 2971 **Councilperson McCoy:** I'm done, Madam Chair.
- 2972 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. Evans.
- 2973 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, and, and one of the things I've seen other
- 2974 municipalities do is to establish the program that the City complies with. So, as it relates
- 2975 to our construction projects and our initiatives, a portion of those dollars that are set aside
- 2976 for the project, are saying okay, we're gonna do half a percent of the total capital costs
- 2977 for public art, and so we're gonna make improvements on those public spaces and the

exterior of the building and we end up leading by example, as it relates to the design elements that we look to, to bring forward.

So, there is variations of the plan and, and we can have those conversations as to what the, the Board wishes to facilitate. But, to Councilman McCoy's point, and if we're looking to effectively decrease that mileage rate, we need to find a revenue stream that is outside of the general fund revenue stream to be able to accommodate any expenditures associated with it. And plus, you don't wanna have a program that you're only putting in forty or \$50,000 a year because are you really effectuating the, the, the real impact that you wanna see occur. And so, there's some things that..., and, and I think Mr. Sirmons communicated in his presentation, that the fee is in lieu of the developer saying that I'm not gonna do anything to improve the aesthetics or the elements associated, so I'm gonna pay in this account for you to go ahead and, and do those type of investment.

But, one of the things we can certainly look at is, you know, your impact fees. And as you look for impact fees, there is.., it's a good amount.., it's good timing for us to take a look at our impact fees but there is, you know, impact fees that can be levied that you say you can save up and then do community projects. Every park that we have, every gree'.., every piece of property we have, there's nothing that precludes us from the City to.., and create.., to create those spaces that, that we speak of and lead by example from the City standpoint. And a lot of other governmental entities have started and said, okay, let us start with it and then rolling it out to the community.

2999 So, just...

Chairperson Botel: Thank you, Mr. Evans.

City Manager Evans: ...something to consider.

Why, why don't we ask Mr. Sirmons to come back to us at **Chairperson Botel:** some future meeting, with the outlines of a plan that would address the issues that Mr. McCoy has raised. You know, we don't want to discourage developers from coming by adding anything additional, however, if we could ask that any new development incorporate art, it would certainly behoove a new developer to take a look at their project and say, okay, rather than paying some money to the City, I'm going to incorporate public art into my project. I think if Mr. Sirmons takes a look at that, we would, we would have a better sense of how we could do this. And [stammer] I support Art in Public Places. As Ms. Lanier said, it's a quality of life issue but, along with Mr. McCoy, I certainly don't wanna add anything to our budget that we can avoid adding. So, I think if Mr. Sirmons comes back to us, maybe with some recommendations about how we could accomplish this without adding too much overhead, I, I agree with Mr. McCoy, this is something that could probably, at least initially, as we phase it in, be dealt with by an existing employee in the Development Services Department. And then, if it grows, and we would hope that it does grow, we could consider adding additional Staff, or a Staff member when the time is right. But, certainly not in the beginning when we are.., when we're just starting.

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3079 City Manager Evans: Madam Chair, Members of the Board, I just want to again

thank you for allowing for me to make a year in the City of Riviera Beach.

3081 Chairperson Botel: [Chuckle].

3082 **City Manager Evans:** That was July 12th, so that's equivalent to, like, five years in

3083 other agencies but it...

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3084 Chairperson Botel: [Chuckle].

3085 City Manager Evans: ...it's been fun. Certainly looking forward to the, the next 3086 phase and the next chapter. There's a lot of great things that are on the horizon and Staff 3087 is working really hard to accomplish the collective goals of the Board and, and to move 3088 things forward. And so, I think when we get that Fire Station up and operational and, and 3089 we move forward with some of the other capital projects and... You're, you're gonna see a significant improvement on the way in which we provide services and, and I will give 3090 3091 you a little bit of information that's been provided to me via the Community Values Survey. 3092 We had over six hundred and eighty-two respondents and sixty-four percent of the 3093 respondents said that in the next three to five years they see the City of Riviera Beach 3094 better than it is today. And so, there is a sentiment that people truly believe in the work 3095 that we are all doing and that we've got a job to do and I'm committed to making sure we 3096 move forward in that direction and have the facilities and the community that we all 3097 imagine for future generations by doing so now. So we're excited about the future and 3098 thank you so much for the opportunity to be with you all for a year.

There is, you know, obviously, this is certain times of the seasons that I didn't get to experience the last time so it's been refreshing to, to go through that, that process. So, thank you again and I just wanted to say Staff is excited, and energetic and we're looking forward to going through the budget process, but also moving forward, some of the Agenda Items that you all have communicated to us, that what are some of your priorities.

3107 **Chairperson Botel:** Discussion by City Attorney.

3108 **City Attorney Wynn:** No comments. Thank you.

3109 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.

CITY COUNCIL COMMITTEE REPORTS

3111 **Chairperson Botel:** City Council committee reports.

3112 Councilperson Lanier: Briefly.

3113 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes, Ms. Lanier.

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3114 Councilperson Lanier: Briefly. I just wanted to say that we are having a food 3115 distribution tomorrow.., I'm sorry, Friday at Wells from 9:00 to 11:00. We also will be 3116 having a, a testing for City of Riviera Beach residents on July 25th at Wells, from 9:00 to 3117 12:00. That is what the Committee is working on. We're also working hard with getting the, the residents involved with the gardening program. We're also working with the CRA, 3118 3119 with the Reentry Program and with the program called Urban Farmers Grow. We're 3120 working to have men, who are returning citizens, and women, to work with rehabbing houses in the City. In addition to that, with the Hope Dealers Program and all of those 3121 3122 initiatives are coming under the Health and Human Services Committee.

3123 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. McCoy, committee reports?

Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair. Thank you, Members, and also to 3124 3125 the Manager. This is the report on Small and Medium Business Committee. I wanna 3126 start and also end with the people that make it happen. Obviously, thank you, Mr. Evans for finding those dollars to appropriate. I wanted to remind you.., that you, Mr. Sherman. Is he still her? He, he said it last week that the City of Riviera Beach COVID-19 business forgivable loan program is still going on and we're still accepting applications and I just got a report back today that there have been at least thirty applications that have been reviewed. Obviously, reviewed don't necessarily equate to being issued. So, this is definitely a work in progress and I gotta commend the Assistant City Manager, who I don't 3132 see on here, Ms. Deirdre Jacobs for all her hard work. And also, a really good supporter of this program, Ms. Lia Gaines and her organization for all they're doing. But I wanna also remind members, and also... I mean, members of the public that this program is still 3135 3136 going on and they're still accepting applications. There's a link on the City's homepage and we're gonna be looking to start disbursements, if not this week, then probably next 3138 week. So, the program is there.

So, thank you so much, Members for making these dollars available for small and medium businesses, and also the Manager, and also the Small Medium Business Committee.

Chairperson Botel: Thank you. Anyone else on committee Councilwoman Miller-Anderson and I attended the Government Affairs Committee of the Palm Beach North Chamber of Commerce on Friday. The guest speaker was Carol Jones Gilbert, who's the Palm Beach County Housing Authority Director and she spoke about the number of tenant vouchers, public housing units, et. cetera. I was most interested in something she called Section 3, which is where people can get training through the Housing Authority and, and they are not necessarily [stammer]..., do not necessarily have to be Housing Authority residents. So, we're gonna be looking into that. She... the Chamber asked us to publicize the I Love Local Project that they have going on. There will be a July 24th breakfast, that'll be a virtual breakfast for the Chamber.

And, the only other thing I have about my Tourism Committee is that we're gonna be working with Discover.., I hope we're gonna be working with Discover the Palm

- Beaches. We've had a presentation to the core group, Ms. Noel, Dr. Wihbey and myself
- and Mr. Brown. And we'll be presenting the Discover the Palm Beaches research arm to
- 3156 the larger committee and that's.., that's a project where they will take a look at what people
- are coming to the City and where, and what..., where they're spending dollars in terms of
- 3158 tourism.
- And that's all I have for the committee reports.
- 3160 Anyone... Mr. Lawson.
- Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Thank you, Madam Chair. Just wanna kinda give an update 3161 3162 on the two reports, is the Port. I've had conversations with the Port in reference to their involvement with beautification of the entry to the Port. And, they are looking at their 3163 budget currently because a major contributor to their budget is the cruise line, and 3164 depending on if the cruise line is actually able to continue their business or to keep going 3165 and moving forward, they're going to start to address that location on 13th Street and 3166 Barack, which I want us to really make as a staple because I look at Miami Port and I just 3167 3168 see how beautiful that, that, that passthrough is with Miami and the Port, and the 3169 relationship they have. So, I want us to continue to address the, the, the relationship with 3170 our current Board so that we can really beautify our City, 'cause that's a main entry there.
- In regards to my Expedited Permitting Committee, that's going very well. We'll 3171 have a full presentation at the next meeting. We're currently addressing the, the virtual 3172 or online process of [stammer] processing permits. We'd love to make it a hundred 3173 percent online but just the education of, of the process of registering the permits online, 3174 we.., it's gonna take a little bit of time. So, we're gonna implement that program, and 3175 we're also addressing comprehensive plan, which is gonna really take a look at the 3176 development that's coming to the community. Because the Comp Plan is normally 3177 recommended to be updated every three to five years and it's been just about ten years 3178 since we've addressed our Comp Plan. 3179
- So, those are two of the things that we're gonna address in detail for our presentation at the next Council meeting.
- 3182 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Any other committee reports? Ms. Miller-
- 3183 Anderson.
- 3184 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** The Public Safety Committee has a meeting this
- week, and so, out of that meeting we should definitely be bringing an Item towards the
- next meeting, regarding the [stammer] Civilian Oversight Committee.
- 3187 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Any comments from.., unless there are no other
- 3188 committee reports.

3189 STATEMENTS BY MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL

- 3190 **Chairperson Botel:** Statements from the Mayor and City Council, starting with the
- 3191 Mayor.

- Mayor Felder: Yeah. Just a couple things. Tomorrow, all of our seniors, can pick up your yard signs from in front of City Hall. We're gonna be there between 4:00 and 6:00. Come and get them. Thank you guys for not coming early to get them, or take a picture with the Mayor. Tomorrow from 4:00 to 6:00.
- We'll be putting on my Page and the City's Page, the CDC Community Collaboration Council. Thank you, Mr. Evans and your Staff for just drawing that out for me. We'll be putting it up online. You can fill out an application. We have a number on there that you can call if you have any information. Hopefully, we can get that started next month.
- Mr. Evans, just a question for you, Monroe Heights streets, is that gonna be in our next budget, upcoming budget?
- City Manager Evans: Our capital projects. Yes, sir. We're gonna be talking about that with the Board, as to how we move forward.
- 3205 **Mayor Felder:** Okay. So that's something we'll be talking about.
- And, where are we with.., with some of our City projects, are we looking to involve minority participation? With just some of the, the projects that the City has.
- City Manager Evans: That is why we.., yes, sir, that is why we've secured the services of Mr. Lee to help us facilitate how we can establish a program and then roll that in to some of the capital projects that we look to move forward that facilitate minority participation and building a program that effectively can stand up in the event it is challenged.
- 3213 So, that is a priority for us. Yes, sir.
- Mayor Felder: Okay. And that... Oh, I'd like to give thanks to Jacoby Brissett and Abe Elam Foundation. What a wonderful event they had last weekend Friday and Saturday. Councilman McCoy, I think I heard you say you wasn't invited, but I did invite
- you to ride next me...
- 3218 Chairperson Botel: [Chuckle].
- Mayor Felder: ...last week. So, I don't think [audio skipped]. But, it was a wonderful day. [Inaudible] the police to come out and ride with us. Great kudos out to those guys
- for putting that on.
- That's it for me.
- Chairperson Botel: Thank you, Mayor. It was a great event. Let's have, I'm starting at the top... oh, Mr. McCoy, did you wanna go next.
- 3225 Councilperson McCoy: Yes, Madam...

- 3226 Chairperson Botel: Or did you...
- 3227 Councilperson McCoy: ...Chair.
- 3228 **Chairperson Botel:** ...wanna respond? Yes. Go ahead.
- 3229 **Councilperson McCoy:** I, I'm gonna respond and I also want to say my comments.
- And Madam Chair, let me tell you something, when you say starting at the top, that only
- 3231 appears on your screen.
- 3232 **Chairperson Botel:** Oh, I know. But that...
- 3233 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, everybody [inaudible] different screen.
- 3234 **Chairperson Botel:** [Chuckle]. But it's my only...
- 3235 Councilperson McCoy: I'm, I'm cool with...
- 3236 **Chairperson Botel:** ...way to remember.., it's my way to remember who's already
- 3237 spoken, otherwise by the time the last person goes...
- 3238 Councilperson McCoy: Well...
- 3239 **Chairperson Botel:** ...I may have forgotten. You know?
- 3240 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Well, I still ride... Thank you, Madam Chair. I still ride,
- Mayor. I just didn't know the logistics of the event and I'm glad it worked out.
- I, I wanna take this opportunity, you said seniors can pick up yard signs. I don't
- know if I heard you say what those yard signs are. What does that mean, Mr. Mayor?
- 3244 **Chairperson Botel:** Graduates. I'm sorry.
- 3245 **Mayor Felder:** Senior..., I'm sorry...
- 3246 Councilperson McCoy: Oh.
- 3247 **Mayor Felder:** ...senior graduates.
- 3248 **Councilperson McCoy:** Oh my goodness. I thought you was... Oh, God.
- 3249 **Mayor Felder:** No. Not senior citizens.
- 3250 **Chairperson Botel:** He, he's run'... He's running for Mayor and he wants them to
- put their..., his signs in his..., in their yards, yeah.
- 3252 **Councilperson McCoy:** No, I... When you said seniors, I assumed that we were doing
- 3253 something with our seniors that part'...

- 3254 **Chairperson Botel:** Older people.
- 3255 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...participated in some of our other programs. Okay. Those
- 3256 signs. Okay. I'm sorry.
- 3257 Chairperson Botel: [Chuckle].
- 3258 **Councilperson McCoy:** [Chuckle]. That's all I have. I just wanted to comment on that.
- And there was one last thing, Mr., Mr. Mayor, thank you for bringing that up. You know,
- 3260 I actually was going to talk to Mr. Evans today but, you know, he abruptly hung up on me
- and cited that his phone was going dead.
- 3262 [Chuckles]
- 3263 Councilperson McCoy: I'm just kidding. I'm sorry. I had an electrical emergency at
- my house and I had some repair people so I couldn't finish the conversation but one of
- those questions that I was gonna ask the Manager... I'm sorry, did I say the Ma'.., I was
- gonna ask the Manager, was about Monroe Heights. And, guite honestly, you know, I'm
- at this point where I, I would love to have this conversation offline to figure out what needs
- 3268 to happen but, we're, we're talking about some very serious concerns and I had someone
- just as recent as yesterday tell me about how difficult it is for them to traverse through
- West 26th Court. And, you know, Members, and, and I'm just not speaking to my
- 3271 colleagues, but members of the public, it's not easy being an elected because every day
- it seems like we're dealing with new issues and I really appreciate it and I gotta commend
- 3273 Mr. Evans on his one year mark. And, now that you're the Manager, you've got.., kinda
- gotten in here and got set, I'm still looking for those records from September of 2017. So,
- between you and Ms. Gamble over in the Legal office, somebody should be able to come
- 3276 up with those. But, it is really a lot that we have to deal with issues day in and day out.
- 3277 And, I wanna see also that we can address that concern of Monroe Heights because that
- was what I wanted to talk to you about and it didn't happen, and we can take it offline.
- But in any event, thank you, Mr. Manager for your one year and we'll be revisiting
- that soon as a Member of the Board, but also, I would hope that we can also revisit Ms.
- Wynn and her term because, obviously, the ever, ever occurring emergencies with the
- 3282 City, we've kinda, kinda moved away from it but, obviously, I would hope that we can
- revisit both at, at the same time.
- So, that's all I have, Members, and thank you for indulging me.
- 3285 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you, Mr. McCoy. I, I have to agree with you about 26th
- 3286 Court. It looks like something out of, I don't know, it's like a moonscape over there. It's,
- 3287 it's...
- 3288 Councilperson McCoy: [Stammer], Madam Chair, just say your comments. Don't,
- 3289 don't beat up my District.
- 3290 **Chairperson Botel:** Alright, alright. [Chuckle]. No, but it does. I was over there
- the other day. It was.., it's just... I'm just agreeing with you. I'm agreeing with you. Okay.

- Oh, what is she telling me here. Ten minutes. Okay. We'll be quick. I'm starting at my
- view of the top, which is Ms. Miller-Anderson.
- 3294 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Sure, try to cut my time off.
- 3295 Chairperson Botel: [Chuckle].
- 3296 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** It happened last time. I don't have a whole lot.
- 3297 I just wanna say congratulations to Mr. Evans on his one year mark. You went further
- 3298 than you did the first time. Congratulations.
- Ms.., I have a question for Ms. Anthony regarding the Order of calling people for
- the vote. You know, we've had this conversation before. And so, I wou'.., I would like to
- know, I know you do it at random but, from our discussions for many years now, it.., then,
- you know, it kinda sets some people up to see who's gonna vote and a whole number of
- issues. So, are we able to rotate that? Like, some kinda way so that we know that it's
- not certain people always being called first and second? <u>I.e.</u>, me, second.
- 3305 Councilperson McCoy: No, no. I'm always first.
- 3306 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: McCoy, first, yeah. I said me second. So, I
- know you changed it up before. You said there was no specific way that you do it, and
- 3308 so, I'm just asking that we can... And have a...
- 3309 City Clerk Anthony: Madam Chair...
- 3310 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:**certain way of mixing it up? Not just willy nilly.
- 3311 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, I'll make this quick. I
- 3312 believe I provided a Resolution to you all previously where it outlines the order in which I
- am to call the vote. And it states that it's gonna be called in the order of the Districts, with
- the Chair and the Pro Tem being called last. So, as a result, when you hear me call Mr.
- 3315 McCoy first, that is because he's in District 1 and then you're 2 and he.., and Ms. Lanier
- is District 3. I will provide the Resolution to you all, so you all can review it, as well as the
