126 **Chairperson Botel:** Would someone care to make a motion to adopt the Consent

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128 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair, I wanna pull 1 and 2.

129 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay. Mr. McCoy requests that we pull Items No. 1 and 2.

130 Anything else? Anyone else? In that case, would someone care to make a motion to

141 **Mr. F. Lozman:** Fane Lozman, Singer Island.

When you read the Consent Agenda, it's all matters listed under this Item are considered to be routine. I don't think Item No. 1, 3 and 4 are routine. A routine Item is adopting the written Minutes, it's doing a minor expenditure of City's funds, but \$50,000 for Item 3 is not routine. \$50,000 in Item 4 is not routine. Item No. 1, what's the dollar value on that? So, they're taking Items that should be on the Regular Agenda and parking them on the Consent Agenda. They're not Consent Agenda Items. If you go to other municipalities, you would not see some of these Items on the Consent Agenda. And we've talked about this over the years. Some people really get abusive because they put twenty-five or thirty Items on the Consent Agenda with the idea to violate Florida's antishush law. Because any, any Item that is significant, involving the expenditure of taxpayers' funds, you have to give three minutes, but when you put multiple Items expending taxpayers' funds, and you only get three minute for all the Items, you're violating Florida's right to speak law. So whoever prepares this Agenda is violating Florida's anti-shush law and really violating what the spirit of a Consent Agenda is all about. If you have too many Items on the Agenda, then you have to have a second meeting, or a third meeting but you don't bury stuff of significant consequence on the, on the Consent Agenda.

159 And finally, even the settlement in my case, \$875,000, was buried on the Consent 160 Agenda. Those things are not Consent Agenda Items.

161 City Clerk Anthony: Lloyd Brown. Madam Chair, Members of the Board, and 162 speakers that will be coming to the podium, please make sure that you speak into the 163 microphone so that you may be heard.

Well, well I probably got confused... My name is Lloyd Brown... on 164 Mr. L. Brown: the Consent Agenda 'cause I didn't think.., that's what I put down, [inaudible] Park, and 165 166 what you're gonna do. I think it should been done a long time ago 'cause... like. I walked over by Good' Park and I was showing the guy today, I said, 'Look at that park. No lights.' You look at, you at.., I mean, it's, it's been a long time coming. I mean, now that you're 168 169 gonna do it, that's okay but, I mean, this should been done way back. I mean, the court's crackin'. And then, as far as individuals coming over there, you know, like.., they used to have a building. They used to. And when you went to that building and.., both of these 172 parks, they had supervision. So, like, when a kid came over there, he didn't have to worry about being bullied, he didn't have to worry about anybody messing with him, but you 174 don't, you don't really put much money into these parks as far as supervision. Because 175 I, I done been down by these parks and I done seen these kids get in fights and arguments. So, if you're gonna put any money into it, then put it into somewhere where 176 you're gonna send somebody over there to supervise these parks during the weekend, if you can't do it all during the week. 'Cause, I mean, I done seen things happen down 178 179 there. I done seen people get shot down there. I mean, my neighbor's son..., grandson, was killed at Goodmark Park. And think quite other few people were killed at the other 180 park in Monroe Heights. But when I was coming up, they had supervision, and that never 182 happened. I never saw anybody... I saw a fight between t wo individuals, but other than 183 that, I never saw anything that went on. And I mean, for you to say you're gonna put 184 \$50,000...

And I don't know, Lozman may be right about what he's saying but I don't know anything about that 'cause I'm not that deep into it, but all I know is, if you're gonna spend the money into it, you need to put supervision over there too. At least once or twice a week. Maybe Saturday or something. You know? And bring some kind of program for these kids to do. We played horseshoes, we did all kinda stuff. We didn't have to go to the gym, we went right to the park, which was right down the street from me 'cause I used to cut the lights on when they cut 'em off. So I know. And a lot of my friends grew up at the park, and they're not violent or nothing. But now that you're just gonna fix the park with no supervision, you're gonna catch hell. You watch.

- 227 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** So moved.
- 228 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Do we have a second?
- 229 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Second.
- 230 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Do we have any public comments on this topic?
- 231 **Councilperson McCoy:** It was pulled from Consent...
- 232 **Chairperson Botel:** Madam Clerk, do we have any public comments on this topic?
- 233 **Councilperson McCoy:** It was pulled from Consent so there wouldn't be.
- 234 [Inaudible comment]
- 235 **Chairperson Botel:** It was pulled from Consent. Well, you're right. Thank you.
- 236 Sorry. Do we have a presentation, Mr. Sherman?
- 237 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Yes. The Item that you
- have before you is Item No. 1, is the third amendment of the agreement between the City
- and the CRA for the funding to the Ocean Mall. As you recall, we've had a number of
- 240 discussions during the budget process. The second modification to the agreement
- pushed the payback period for the CRA out to 2023, and what we have asked [stammer]
- 242 and I understand the CRA Board approved, is to actually make the payments begin in
- 243 2021.
- So, the \$672,000 annual payments will begin in January of 2021, after the CRA
- receives their tax increments. And then they will start to reimburse the City at that point.
- And this is.., was contemplated as part of the final FY21 budget.
- 247 And I'll take any questions.
- 248 **Chairperson Botel:** Any questions for Mr. Sherman? Mr. McCoy.
- 249 **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you, Madam Chair. Mr. Sherman, the \$672,000 annual
- installment payment, did that encompass any of the concessions that the CRA has been
- covering for the maintenance of the Uplands?
- 252 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: No. This is strictly a
- payback the ten... almost \$10.2MM, that the City loaned the CRA back in 2009.
- 254 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. So, Mr. Evans... I'm sorry. Mr. Sherman, when was
- 255 the second amendment done?
- 256 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: I'd say it was twenty'...
- 257 Councilperson McCoy: '16

- 258 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: '16. That sounds right.
- 259 Yeah.
- 260 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Is there any particular reason why we're calling forth
- 261 debt early? At this point? Other than the City being financially strapped?
- 262 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: No. The, the issue that we
- 263 were looking at was.., it was our casualty and general liability policy was going up.
- Normally, that goes up two to three percent. This year it went up, I believe it was, like, 264
- 265 fifteen or sixteen percent. So, we were looking to fill certain budgetary holes. And
- obviously this is one that the City.., when the City was flush with cash, we were willing to 266
- 267 push it out, and at this point, we were looking to get some assistance back from, you
- 268 know, the CRA.
- 269 It came to light more so when the CRA was refinancing their old debt with BB&T.
- 270 What that did is that freed up additional cashflow for the CRA. As you know, the City had
- 271 to consent to those agreements and that was part of the discussion that we had with the
- 272 then Interim CRA Director.
- 273 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you. Mr. Sherman, that actually was exactly where I
- 274 was going because this was obviously contemplated when we had the previous Interim.
- it's gonna be funny to say this.., our previous Interim CRA Director Evans, emphasis on 275
- 276 Scott Evans. However, I just don't think it's ideal time to do this simply because we have
- 277 our current Interim Director, Jonathan Evans, which is here on an Interim.., Interim basis,
- 278 and then, I imagine probably before the year's out, we'll have another, hopefully,
- 279 permanent CRA Director. And, you know, you spoke of the potential situation that the
- 280 City was in with the increases. We're starting off a new CRA Executive Director.
- Basically, with removing \$700,000 of working capital which would've went to 281
- 282 neighborhood improvements. CRA operations, and I would've rather that that decision be
- deferred to the incoming CRA Director. And I've said this at the CRA meeting, and I 283
- 284 renew my opposition to it again, that I don't think that this is ideal because we are in a
- situation where one person, being Mr. Jonathan Evans wearing the hat as the CRA 285
- Interim Executive Director and the CR'..., and the City Manager, both as directing and 286
- 287 driving this decision when, you know, this is just a temporary spot, you know, that he's
- 288 occup'..., occupying. And I would've not want our CRA Director to start when we've 289 already created a budget, we've already established a number of FTE's, we've already
- 290 established the amount of working capital in the budget that the CRA has to operate. And
- 291 it just seems to me that we originally agreed to start collecting the money in 2023, and
- 292 then now we're calling the debt early in two years, and that kinda really starts off our new
- 293 CRA Director behind the 8 ball. And again, I renew my position on record that I'm not in
- 294 support of it.

- 324 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. Sherman?
- 325 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Yes. Again, Item No. 2 is
- requesting approval to enter into a contract to undergo the fire assessment fee study. We
- 327 first had a conversation about this last December. The Fire Department made a very

- compelling argument for, for additional resources to fund operations and capital. We've
- had additional conversations during the, the budget process and it was agreed upon that
- we would go out and have the solicitation. That has been done. Procurement has done
- that, and the recommendation is before you for approval.
- 332 **Chairperson Botel:** Any questions? Mr. McCoy, you're recognized.
- 333 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair. Mr. Sherman, I know this may be
- a difficult question but what are we expecting from the fire assessment, other than them
- telling us that it's a good idea for us to go out and implement an assessment? Like,
- obviously, we know that this an avenue to relieve the City's budget from the amount of ad
- valorem tax revenue that goes into the Fire Department, but realistically, is there some
- end goal in mind? Are we looking to alleviate twenty percent of what the Fire budget
- relies on the City budget for? Or the City ad valorem tax dollars? What's the Finance
- 340 Director's position?
- Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Yeah. I, I don't t think, as
- far as the study, they're gonna opine on whether it's a good idea or a bad idea. They will
- 343 come back...
- 344 Councilperson McCoy: Right.
- Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: ...with a methodology for
- the Board to consider as far as developing the assessment fee. And then, depending on
- what your ultimate goals are, how much you're looking to generate, the assessment fee
- can, you know, go up or down. Now again, it does not cover any of the EMS services. It
- only covers the Fire, you know, portion of operations. But again, it can go up to a
- 350 [inaudible], it could come up to hundred percent of those costs or any percentage in
- 351 between.

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What we originally talked about, I guess I shouldn't use the word originally, what we talked about, back in August during the budget session, was maybe targeting around two and a half million dollars. That would allow us to cover the capital costs, for the fire stations that we're looking for, allow us to go out and borrow against the fire assessment fee, and then provide, you know, in the, in the range of maybe a million dollars or so to go into operations. Within the Fiscal '21 budget, we included three firefighters, to be paid out of the fire assessment fee, so the Chief can only hire those if the fee is adopted. And the EMS captain, as well.

So that's all contingent on the fire fee. If the fire fee is never adopted, then those positions will never, obviously, be filled.

So again, their real goal is to go out, assess the call data provided by the Fire Department, assess the cost of, of, you know, the performance of the Fire Department and then come bring back to you a methodology that, you know, they [stammer] feel is fair and equitable.

366 City Manager Evans: Madam...

367 Councilperson McCoy: Follow up.

368 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.

- 369 **Councilperson McCoy:** Mr. Sherman, the assessment, or the study, or their analysis,
- 370 is this gonna be based on a point in time, or are they gonna go with historical information?
- 371 Because that seems pretty aggressive if you're suggesting the 2021 budget is gonna
- 372 encompass four new positions, based on this assessment. So, are we gonna start that
- 373 at, I guess the execution of this contract based on the, the calls for service and, you
- 374 know, at that point or are we going back to historical data?
- 375 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: No. It'll be, it'll be historical
- 376 data that they'll look at. And, from my understanding in talking to them is they believe
- 377 that, get the approval tonight that they can have something back to the Board in early
- 378 2021, January or early February for the first presentation and discussion, and then
- 379 obviously, you know, there probably will be a, a couple [inaudible] on, on the final
- 380 presentation. If we follow with the process, and, you know, this could have its public
- 381 hearings probably sometime in March or April for approval.
- 382 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, if, if I, if I may?
- 383 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes.

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- 384 With regards to the fire assessment, 'cause this is a process I **City Manager Evans:**
- 385 have gone through. The statute requires you to do an analysis to ensure that it is.., that
- 386 the individuals that are being assessed are deriving an actual benefit associated with the
- 387 assessment. So, in order to move forward with this, we have to go through the analysis.
- 388 By going through the analysis, it does not obligate the Board to effectively adopt the fire
- 389 assessment. It will come back to you and you will have an opportunity to have further
- 390 conversations with regards to what you all wish to do. Whether you wish to adopt it, if
- 391 you liked the va'.., you know, certain variations of the program. You may want to adopt
- 392 just an availability fee, or you would like to have a, a tiered system. All that is gonna be
- 393 provided. What they look at is.., an economist actually extracts the portion of the budget
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- that's associated with the provision of fire service 'cause you can't assess for EMS, and 395
- then they look at the historical run data and say, 'How much of your total overall fifteen, 396 \$16MM budget is associated with fire apparatus and the provision of providing service?'

And so, when I did this in another community, we end up finding that roughly about thirty to forty-five percent of the monies that were budgeted were associated with the provision of fire service. The other was associated with medical, and you couldn't assess for that. If we don't go through the study process, you leave yourself vulnerable to legal challenges. And there was another community in South Florida that basically had their revenue held up for at least three years as there was a challenge associated with it.

To Mr. Sherman's point, one of the things we would go to... we would recommend going forward with also, would be a bond validation whereby the City would file a suit against itself to make sure that it effectively..., and get a..., an order by a judge that we

effectively followed the appropriate process so we can bond against it and no one can challenge the process and the methodology in which we develop.

So, tonight is just the study phase. This will come back to you in multiple iterations. In my past experience, we've also incorporated a lot of transparency where the residents can go in there and put in their address and see exactly what they would pay and what their neighbors would pay, et. cetera. This is something that you can effectively look to adopt this year, or you can defer it to put it on the tax roll in subsequent years. So, there's a lot of flexibility associated with the process, but the study and the analysis is just a first phase.

415 **Councilperson McCoy:** Follow up.

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- 416 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead, Mr. McCoy.
- 417 **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you, Mr. Evans. I actually was..., you..., guess you
- interrupted my cross examination. I was trying to get there but...
- 419 **City Manager Evans:** [Chuckle].
- 420 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...you, you kind already beat me to it. So, you know, reading this agreement, right, I particularly don't have a problem with it but this requires 421 codification by way of an Ordinance, which this becomes two readings, this becomes 422 codified in Municode. If that is the case, I would only support this Item if it's going to help 423 424 maintain our current level of fire services. And what I mean by that, it's been stated before 425 that, you know, Mr. Evans I think said a few times during our budget process that Public 426 Safety is seventy-eight percent of our ad valorem revenue. I would only support a fire 427 assessment, because this is gonna be codified in an Ordinance which potentially means this could be in perpetuity for years and years to come, and it's based on.., it's gonna be 428 429 assessed on when you pay your taxes. And I would only support this simultaneously with 430 the Charter provision that the Fire Department is chartered county because I would hate, 431 Members of the Board and also of this community, that we levy a tax, an additional fire 432 tax, and we find ourselves five years, seven years down the line in a situation where the 433 conversation comes up about outsourcing our Fire Department services. I will not support that now, and I won't do it in seven years, whether I'm here or not. But I would only 434 support this Item, when it comes back, and I think the schedules shows tentatively one of 435 the schedules shows, the deliverable Ordinance between February and June of 2021, 436 that there is a simultaneous Charter agreement to make the Fire Department, as well as 437 438 the Police Department, a chartered department. Because I would hate to start this 439 conversation and, you know, God knows what the economy brings in seven years.
  - So, I'll support the study now, but I just wanted to establish my impetus for suggesting, you know, the.., or asking the questions of why we're, we're doing this.
- Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 443 Chairperson Botel: Thank you. Any...

444 **City Manager Evans:** And, Madam Chair?

445 **Chairperson Botel:** ...other questions?

446 **City Manager Evans:** Real briefly.

447 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes.

448 **City Manager Evans:** To those points. I, I think it is important that we look at our

- Public Safety Departments to include our Utility operations as Charter departments but I
- 450 think that's something that you can pose to the voters as part of an initiative that this
- Council puts forward to establish your Public Safety, as well as your Utility operations, as
- chartered departments that the only way those departments would effectively ever go
- away, is the voters would have to make the decision. So it takes it out of the hands of
- any elected body or an administrator, or what have you.

455 As it relates to the assessment, there would be a mechanism in the Ordinance 456 that, through your annual budget appropriation, you would decide the amount that's 457 assessed. So it, it's paramount to putting a spigot in the wall, and then you get to turn on 458 how much water pressure [audio skipped], if not, so you can actually say that this year, 459 you're gonna levy this amount, next year you're not gonna levy anything, the following 460 year... So, you have total flexibility with regards to that. Now, if we bond against it, 461 obviously there's a minimum amount that we need to be able to collect for the purposes of a bond issuance. But to Mr. Sherman's point, if we are able to move forward with 462 463 collecting roughly about \$2.5MM, we believe that we can actually move forward with the capital construction of all four municipal fire stations concurrently, as well as bringing 464 additional Public Safety personnel online. And, what I mean Public Safety, it's fire 465 466 because the monies can only be utilized exclusively for the provision of fire service. It 467 can't be utilized for any other municipal operation.

- 468 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Any other comments or questions?
- 469 **Councilperson McCoy:** That's it for that, Madam Chair, but I do wanna respond to Mr.
- 470 Evans if I can.
- 471 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.
- 472 **Councilperson McCoy:** So Mr. Evans, I think that's a great idea. And while we're in
- 473 the month of October, I wanna know if you think it's ideal, obviously with, with this in mind
- and obviously we had the other issue in the budget that came up, of the percentage that
- 475 we have to set aside and not.., the state called it the CAT fund, we call it our disaster
- 476 fund.
- 477 **City Manager Evans:** Major disaster fund.
- 478 **Councilperson McCoy:** If we can convene a, not a Charter Review Committee,
- because we know that that's gonna be extensive, but a, a special meeting for us to decide
- on whether or not we wanna introduce ballot initiatives for the March 2021 election. And

- I would obviously like to see the Public Safety aspect of..., obviously, we can explore the
- 482 Utility District, and certainly we can remove that, I think, that restrictive provision that
- requires us to put it at four percent?
- 484 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: One...
- 485 **City Manager Evans:** One.., 1.5 percent.
- 486 Councilperson McCoy: How much?
- 487 **City Manager Evans:** 1.5 percent.
- 488 **Councilperson McCoy:** Yeah. The.., yeah. I would like to see that because I'm just
- 489 thinking that maybe the Clerk would know. I think generally qualifying in somewhere
- 490 around first or second week of December.
- 491 **City Clerk Anthony:** The second Tuesday in December.
- 492 **Councilperson McCoy:** Yeah. So, you know, that is a action that we would have to
- take, Members, as a body, to put forth valid initiatives on two readings. So, Mr. Evans, I
- 494 guess that would happen.., happen sooner than later, if we're gonna have two readings
- 495 to explore those Items. So, you know, that's what I would like to see simultaneously,
- 496 'cause I support the study.
- 497 Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 498 **City Manager Evans:** Absolutely.
- 499 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Anything else? [Pause]. Madam Clerk.

The location of it is indicated by [inaudible]. The slide here, you can see the renderings of the elevations of the proposed development. You can see the elevation plans of the proposed development on this slide. The east and north elevations on this slide. And the proposed Site Plan for development here.

The proposed uses are restaurant, as well as two [inaudible] office spaces, with a building square footage of 3,840 square feet. On the slide here, you can see the Landscape Plan for the proposed project. And these are the standard Staff recommendations, which have been attached to this Resolution. The two year landscaping performance bond. Construction [inaudible] this must be initiated within eighteen months of this Resolution passing. The..., any future Staff amendments to this Plan can be no greater than five percent of this Plan if it's approved today; development must receive final Certificate of Occupancy within five years of its approval; advertising of the property must state that it's located in Riviera Beach. If this Resolution is approved, it shall [stammer] supersede any previous Site Plan approvals for this Item. The east and west elevations must be consistent with the, the other two. And then, prior iss'..., to the issuance of building permits, the issuance of plat applications, replat of preexisting lots of record must be submitted to the City.

Well anyway, I got something to say about everything. Let me tell you something, the only thing I can see is this, whenever you put these developments and you do these things, there's a lotta individuals out there that I know of in Riviera Beach that don't have jobs. And they..., they're felons. And now they can vote now. So, I'm telling you, if you don't, you don't start getting jobs and these felons, you know, they' felons so they know how to do felonies, so if you don't start gettin' these jobs for them in these different places that you're building... 'Cause I can ride around right now, and I can show you different areas, and I can take pictures of the people who are working over here, who' cuttin' the lawns over here and everything else. You're gonna have to give these jobs to people who live here, even if you do develop these places. It's not right for somebody to come in who live' next door to you and he's not even from here, and he has a job and you got four kids, that don't have a job but they're getting in trouble every day because they don't have a job. And then, you're saying, 'Well, we're, we're bringing jobs here.' That's all they hear politicians say. Especially the black politicians.

But, I mean, it's like you're building these places in Riviera Beach and there's no jobs for the people who live here. I can take you through Riviera Beach and show you different develop'..., the different buildings that they built, and these buildings were built by somebody else. And, I mean, these felons still hanging on the corners. And then these young guys, they're learning what the felons know, just like prison. So, I mean, just because you give a felon a right to vote, give him a right, you know... And somebody gonna say, 'Well, since you got the right to vote, we're gonna represent you too.' Don't just give 'em the right to vote and then you're doing this, you build this place and you don't have a [inaudible] over there that has these rights to vote for you, but you just wanna put the money in your pocket. You just wanna pocket everything and say, 'Oh well,' you know, you wanna look good up here and everything, talking to people about, you know, you're so much this and you're so much that. But if you look at it, Riviera Beach, I mean, when people ask me where I live, I say in Florida. I don't even say Riviera no more.

And it's a shame, really, that you, you're bringing up these places and you're lettin' these people come in and build 'em, and you're giving them all these breaks, but they don't give your people a break. You don't give your own people a break.

**Development Services Director Sirmons:** For this project, the applicant is Storage rental of America Capital, LLC. The agent on the behalf is Schmidt, Nichols Arch'.., I'm sorry, Landscape Architecture & Urban Planning firm. Their request is that the Site Plan be approve to construct an additional 36,310 square feet of new building areas, would expand existing 84,673 foot'.., square foot self-storage use, as well as provide a new building façade and landscaping approvals. The total [inaudible] will be 120,000 square feet.., 983. The location is 1177 West Blue Heron Boulevard. This is an aerial of the site location. [Pause]. A closer view of the site.

 So, background on this one. Self-Storage of America acquired this property in October of 2018 and desires to expand the current self-storage operation, as well as provide general site improvement, including landscaping, building façade improvements per the City Code requirements. A total of 36,310 square feet of new self-storage space is proposed on the southside of the building of the existing structure and will be outside of the Blue Heron Boulevard view corridor. A new building façade will be provided on the existing building, compatible with the City's Code. When completed as proposed, a total of 120,983 total square feet of building will exist on the site.

A Phase 1 environmental assessment was commissioned by Self-Storage of America in July of 2018, prior to the property acquisition. This assessment includes..., conclude by recommending the following actions, contin'..., continual implementation of the protocol set forth by the U.S. EPA super fund program, associated with the ongoing subsurface soil, groundwater mediation due to this historic property use and contamination by Solitron Devices, Incorporated, the previous owner of the building. An operation and maintenance program should be implemen'..., implemented in accordance with safety management and suspected asbestos containing material and lead base paint due to the age of the existing structure on the site

Following the February 19, 2020 City Council meeting, the City utilized the serves of Brown and Caldwell to perform an environmental review of the subject property. And the surrounding area as well. Two documents were created on August 13<sup>th</sup> as a result of the research, the proposed Environmental Development Guidelines Report, as well as the Environmental Review Report. The results were presented and discussed during the September 2<sup>nd</sup> City Council meeting. The summary of the report was, it does not appear that the proposed construction activities will exacerbate any areas previously contaminated. The City should be notified of the construction plans change from..., if the construction plans change from the drawing provided, prior to initiating construction activity. And that's from the Brown and Caldwell report, in their recommendations to the City, moving forward with this project.

Here is the site Plan proposed for the project. [Pause]. The highlighted section shows the existing structure at the site. The grey area is what will be expanded. This is the proposed Landscaping Plan for the site. And here's a closer view of the landscaping as it would reflect along Blue Heron Boulevard. These are the updated elevations of the building. The photo at the bottom shows the existing elevation. The top shows the changes. And there are [inaudible] color renderings of what the site will look like after the changes.

Staff recommends that the City Council approve this project with the following conditions. A two year landscaping performance bond; construction and landscaping improvements must be initiated within eighteen months of the effective date of this Resolution; City Council authorizes Staff to approve future amendments to the site as long as they don't deviate more than five percent from this Plan that's before you now; the development must receive its final Certificate of Occupancy within five years of this approval or it will be considered null and void; all future advertising must state that the development is within Riviera Beach; and once approved, this Resolution shall supersede any previous site plan approvals for this property; prior to approval of the City building permit, the applicant shall provide a draining report sufficient to demonstrate compliance with the City and South Florida Water Management District Regulations. And finally, the development of the site must adhere to the best management practices provided within the August 13, 2020 proposed Environmental Development Guidelines Report, within the Environmental Review Report from Brown and Caldwell, which is attached to this Resolution.

And that concludes the Staff presentation.

- **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you, Mr. Sirmons. Mr. McCoy, you're recognized.
- Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair. I wanted to, I guess I overlooked this, but I wanted to... A, a minor disclosure, I did receive a phone call from one of the agents for the principal, Chris Smith, on this Item, related to the Item's progress and any support of the Item.

But I did wanna point out, I was looking at Staff's report, and when we first heard this Item, it was several months ago but the initial façade improvement was not a part of the original Site Plan application. If I'm correct, we've had a discussion about..., and I know I specifically said during that meeting, you know, obviously I would like to see..., you know, if they're gonna build out and expand their operations, this is on the primary road of Riviera Beach, the I-95 exit, that they can do something with the façade. So in good faith, I think they did go back and, Mr. Nichols..., I don't know if we would necessarily need a presentation from the agent's rep but they did come back and I am very much pleased with what they came back, as far as the façade improvement, but I do think that that was certainly a gesture of good faith and coming back to show us something that really appeals to the overall aesthetics of Blue Heron Boulevard. So, thank you for that, Mr. Nichols. And good to see you.

- **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Madam Chair?
- **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead. You're recognized, Mr. Lawson.
- **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Thank you, Madam Chair. And, Councilman McCoy, that was
- actually one of the discussions we had as.., on the dais, that we wanted them to come
- back with some façade improvements and landscaping improvements. So, we did make
- that request and they fulfilled it. So, again, thank you as well. And it's a beautiful project.
- 758 Hopefully, it can get done sooner.

**Chairperson Botel:** Anything else? We have a public comment.., we have public

760 comment...

**City Clerk Anthony:** Yes, Madam Chair.

762 Chairperson Botel: ...card.

**Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair?

**Chairperson Botel:** Oh sorry. I'm sorry, Ms. Lanier.., Councilwoman Lanier, go

ahead with your question.

**Councilperson Lanier:** This was one of the projects that I was having some heartburn

- about in regards to the environmental study. And now that we've gotten that information
- back in regards to the land being safe enough to develop on, I'm happy with the fact that
- we went through this process to be able to ensure the residents that the building on this
- land is safe, not only for what is being built, but for the surrounding areas of Riviera Beach.
- **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Madam Clerk.
- **City Clerk Anthony:** Fane Lozman.
- **Mr. F. Lozman:** Fane Lozman. Councilperson Lanier, you bring up.., Councilperson
- Lanier, you bring up a very good point, except the Development Director, Clarence
- Sirmons, is trying to pull a fast one on you.

A Phase 1 environmental study is to analyze if there's recognized environmental conditions, REC. What is going on there? Now, he already said that's built on a superfund site [chuckle] from Solitron. So, when you..., when you..., you don't even have to do a Phase 1 when you know there's problems there. What you have to do is, you have to do a Phase 2 environmental study where you actually do drilling, you do soil samples, you see what is gonna come up when you put [inaudible] and dry pilings into the, into the ground. Now, the..., one of the lawyers that represented me at the U.S. Supreme Court is an environmental attorney and they had been involved in the biggest superfund site in the United States for the last twenty years. So, you know, I, I think any environmental lawyer would laugh at you, Mr. Sirmons, for not having a Phase 2 environmental study. There's no way you can have a site that's been [chuckle] identified from Solitron and not do an extensive Phase 2 study and say, 'What is gonna happen when you put a bunch of excavators in there, and you start digging a foundation? Is all this stuff gonna blow up in the air and go over to the surrounding communities?'

And Ms. Lanier is perfectly correct, and you have to have an environmental study but a Phase 1 means nothing. Where's the soil testing, where's all this going on? It's not my job to do your job, Mr. Sirmons. You're supposed to be competent to know what a Phase 2 is, know what a superfund site is. You know, why wouldn't you do that? I mean, this is really... You know, if I lived in that area and I didn't have confidence of what was going down there, from a superfund site, I would.., it's just, like, does anybody give a damn who lives around the surrounding area? Does anybody know what a superfund

- site is? Do you know what a superfund site is, Mr. Sirmons? I do. I bet you Mr. McCoy knows what it is. Mr. Lawson knows what a superfund site is. Why don't you give an explanation what did Solitron do to have a superfund site to begin with? How many people got cancer, you know, within a block of that place? You just can't open up the ground there and, and do construction without doing a Phase 2. That, that should be criminal, that you would come in here and not have a Phase 2 study done.
- So, Ms. Lanier, thank you for your comment but you should demand a Phase 2 environmental study on that before they open up that ground and see what's underneath there in the construction.
- 806 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, that concludes public
- comment on this Item.
- 808 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 809 Councilperson Lanier: Madam Chair?
- 810 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes, Ms. Lanier.
- 811 **Councilperson Lanier:** Could we have someone from the environmental.., the
- environmental study there to present their findings please? 'Cause that's what I asked
- for in the beginning.
- 814 **Councilperson McCoy:** No. I disagree. Here's why. Madam Chair?
- 815 **Chairperson Botel:** You're recognized.
- 816 **Councilperson McCoy:** You guys literally went against what I suggested when the
- 817 Manager came at a meeting to say we're adding this on and I was really pressed for time,
- and I was outvoted and We went through an extensive amount of discussion regarding
- this environmental study. Are we gonna continue to rehash and rehash every time
- someone gets a misunderstanding of it? But Members, I hope you recall that I said, 'You
- know, we don't typically allow for presentations that don't already come in advance,' and
- l'm saying this respectfully, Councilwoman Lanier. I think we've hashed this out already
- and I, you know, for the sake of time, we've seen this at least, in our backup, and then
- we've had probably a half hour of discussion on the [inaudible].
- 825 **Chairperson Botel:** Councilwoman [inaudible]...
- 826 Councilperson Lanier: Madam Chair?
- 827 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.
- 828 **Councilperson Lanier:** Yeah. I, I, I understand McCoy.., Mr.., Councilman McCoy,
- what you're asking. It's just that, that hundreds of pages of backup, some members of
- the public, people who are watching on television, maybe like a five-minute overview of

- what actually was found and what actually was done. I believe the engineer is there. It
- wouldn't take more than five minutes for them to speak on the work that they did.
- 833 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. McCoy, if we could allow three minutes, I think that would
- 834 be...
- 835 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. But...
- 836 Chairperson Botel: It would satisfy...
- 837 **Councilperson McCov:** ...but, but you see the precedent...
- 838 Chairperson Botel: I do.
- 839 Councilperson McCoy: ...that we set?
- 840 Chairperson Botel: I do.
- 841 **Councilperson McCoy:** And this is why I get a little...
- 842 Chairperson Botel: I know.
- 843 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...bothered because I don't wanna be here 'til midnight.
- 844 **Chairperson Botel:** I do'.., I know. We're gonna give...
- 845 **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you.
- 846 **Chairperson Botel:** We're gonna give three minutes as a, as a... Thank you.
- Would you set the timer, Madam Clerk.

- Development Services Director Sirmons: Clerk. I'm sorry, clarification. Our..., our
- consultant from Brown and Caldwell, Mr. Nigel Grace, is here if the Council would like to
- hear [inaudible] of their report.
- 852 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. No more than three minutes. Thank you.
- 853 **Mr. J. Nichols:** Thank you. Good evening. My name is Josh Nichol, for the record,
- with Schmidt Nichols. I'm actually the land planner for the project but I do have partner
- engineering in science, they did the study. And, what we did [stammer] it's a gr'..., I'm
- actually glad that came up and, and I can respond to that. So, we absolutely did soil
- testing. We did twelve specific sites throughout the areas that are to be built on. Those
- specific soil tests were, were then reviewed by Brown and Caldwell, who was hired by the
- 859 City. So again, you had two different sources of environmental consultants looking at all
- those testings, and what came back was that there were no... there was no results that
- were, I guess, of a level that would impact any, any community members, anyone

- surrounding the property, and everything was safe in terms of all the federal and local
- 863 requirements. So.

- 903 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we do have public
- omment on this Item. The acceptance of public comment on this Item is now closed.
- 905 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Would someone care to make a motion to
- 906 approve?
- 907 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** So moved.
- 908 Councilperson McCoy: So moved.
- 909 **Councilperson Lanier:** So moved. Second.
- 910 **Chairperson Botel:** We have at least one second. Thank you. Mr. Sirmons.
- 911 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** [Inaudible] presentation on this Item?
- 912 **Chairperson Botel:** Do we need a presentation on this Item?
- 913 **Councilperson McCoy:** It depends, on who's gonna give it?
- 914 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. Sirmons.
- 915 **Councilperson McCoy:** Oh. I would love to hear Mr. Sirmons.
- 916 [Chuckle]
- 917 **Chairperson Botel:** We can have a very brief presentation to refresh our memory.
- 918 Thank you.
- 919 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** I will move quickly as...
- 920 Councilperson McCoy: Well, well...
- 921 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** ...[inaudible].
- 922 **Councilperson McCoy:** ... Madam Chair, I'm sorry. So, have we established what the
- 923 public comments are? And how that's to work?

- **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. We have.., we, we have the process. We'll, we'll get to 925 them right after we see the presentation.
- 926 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.

**Development Services Director Sirmons:** Alright. The City's Comprehensive Plan and the Future Land Use Map of the City providing for a Special Preservation Future Land Use Designation. The City's zoning code is currently silent regarding the Special Preservation District [inaudible]. In order for the City's zoning code to be consistent with the Citv's Comprehensive Plan and Future Land Use Map, a Special Preservation Zoning District must be created. Additionally, the City's Zoning Map must be amended to apply the newly created Special Preservation Zoning Designation on the same land area currently identified as Special Preservation Future Land Use.

The City's Comprehensive Plan provides specific provisions for a special preservation area of the City. The same land area having a Special Preservation Future Land Use Designation, currently has an RS single family residential zoning designation. Per Florida statutes, the Land Devel'..., Development Regulations, the City's Zoning Map must be compatible with the Future Land Use Map. In order to accomplish the state required compatibility, the City must create a Special Preservation Zoning Designation and amend the Zoning Map accordingly.

This Ordinance would do two things, create the Special Preservation Zoning District, and it would also amend the City's Zoning Map by incorporating the Special Preservation Zoning District into the map. The Zoning District would mirror the Special Preservation Future Land Use area per the City's Future Land Use Map in the Comprehensive Plan. This is a picture of the Future Land Use Map of the City. This is the area in question. [Pause]. A close up of the area in question. This is the City's Zoning Map. As you can see the zoning is residential in that location. This Ordinance would create a transition the tan area to a green area, labelled Special Preservation. The graphic here is the hierarchy of land use authority in Florida. The highest authority for land use in a city is the Comprehensive Plan. Under it are the land development code, such as zoning. And then you have the lowest level, which are your development orders, and they include permits, special exceptions, variances and those, those types of, of orders that the City can issue to individual partners. But the hierarchy demonstrates which one governs if there's ever a conflict.

So, legal status of the Comprehensive Plan. This slide here discusses what happens if there is a conflict, as we have currently. During the interim period, when the provisions of the most recently adopted Comprehensive Plan or element, or portion thereof, and the Land Development Regulations are inconsistent, the provisions of the most recently adopted Comprehensive Plan or its elements, or a portion thereof, shall govern any action taken in regard to an application for a development order. Again, so, if there's a conflict, the Comprehensive Plan is what controls. The top are examples of those development orders, and this talks about how the Comprehensive Plan can be enforced. If a citizen is negatively impacted by the City issuing a development order that is in conflict with the Comprehensive Plan, this states that that citizen has standing to sue

the City to.., for, for any damages that they may incur from that, and the prevailing party is entitled to attorney fees.

This is from our Comprehensive Plan, and it shows the Special Preservation Land Use District, which the subject area is currently designated as, and it shows that the floor area ratio or the density or the, essentially the amount of vertical development that can take place on that property is zero, as you can see in the highlighted area. So this just demonstrates that as things stand now, no one who owns property in the subject area, by way of the Comprehensive Plan, has any development rights when it comes to density or vertical structures on their property.

This is a history of this Ordinance. October 2019, we held a workshop with Council to discuss this Ordinance. May of 2020, the Planning & Zoning Board unanimously recommended approval of this Ordinance. In July of 2020, Staff recommended Council approve the subject Ordinance, and it did pass the first reading. At the July 8<sup>th</sup> hearing, this..., sorry, the July 8, 2020 Council hearing, this Item was tabled, and additional information related to the presence of wetlands was requested. This additional information was provided at a workshop. And then, at the September 16, 2020 Council meeting, this Item was discussed, it was not completed and continues to this date. Here, just some evidence of wetlands that was presented previously in this area. This is from the City's Comprehensive Plan. This is a survey conducted previously in the area identifying wetlands. These are all of the resources the City's consultant used to confirm the existence of wetlands in the area. And their conclusion was that they found several environmental resources worthy of protection in the subject area.

And that concludes Staff presentation.

Chairperson Botel: Thank you, Mr. Sirmons. Madam Clerk, would you please explain the way you're going to the public comments for this Item?

**City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we have two persons here, physically, that wants to make public comments on this Item. As it relate to the over seven hundred emails that were received, I was directed to record the names of those who sent an email in support of the petition that was presented by Ms. Karen Gleason. That recording was done, it will be played by Mr. Stephens. It took up about thirty-five minutes of recording. So, that's how we will proceed. We will.., it's at the pleasure of the Board whether or not we will hear the two persons that are here physically...

998 Chairperson Botel: Let's...

999 City Clerk Anthony: ...first...

**Chairperson Botel:** Let's hear those first.

**City Clerk Anthony:** And then the recording?

1002 Chairperson Botel: Yes. Go ahead.

1003 City Clerk Anthony: Okay. [Pause]. [Inaudible whisper]. Fane Lozman and J.B. 1004 Dixon.

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Fane Lozman. For the record... Fane Lozman. For the record, the Mr. F. Lozman: property owners in the area only received a certified letter on Monday, and it said the date of the meeting spelled out Thursday. So I don't think two days is sufficient notice.

We did file a write of guo warranto and we named Mr. McCoy and Mr., Ms. Botel and Ms. Lanier. Contrary to what Ms. Wynn said, the case was not dismissed. The Complaint was dismissed without prejudice. The court said it was premature. If it passes tonight, then he will analyze should it proceed forward. Because it failed on the first reading and that should've been the end of it. If you wanted to do it, you would've had to start all over again, so when she said it was dismissed, that not true. Also, Mr. McCoy, he said he wasn't even known he was sued, so the... so there was a fraud on the court that Richard Jarolem showed up and said he was representing you. Because you were sued in your individual capacity and you never hired him. Ms. Wynn and Richard Jarolem committed a fraud on the court. They should've informed you because maybe once you read the Complaint, you would said, 'You know something, we're not going to proceed forward on this.'

1020 You know, you look at tall that stuff, what the City, the City should do, is they should have a Comp Plan amendment inst'.., they should say you have a hundred and fifty acres that are privately owned. Why don't you take seventy-five acres, develop it, build the 1022 1023 seawall, save the road and those high tides water got up on all of North Ocean Drive, and 1024 then we can preclude a taking case that's gonna be worth hundreds of millions of dollars? And they said, 'Oh well, it's, it's not matching up,' Sure it is. You have a saving clause in 1025 the Comp Plan, you can leave it just the way it is right now. Okay? What's happening, 1026 is you have thousands of residents in the condos and all those people in the homes, they got there first, so they don't want anything built. They say it's the wetland. If it was 1028 1029 wetland, it would be in the Wetland Preservation Map. All it is a shoreline with mangroves. We can go get a permit tomorrow and tear every mangrove out of there and pay money into a mitigation bank. And the City said..., was like, 'Oh we don't wat... we don't want 1032 wetlands filled out.' The wetlands are swamps, like the everglades. The wetlands is what 1033 Kolter did. Kolter filled in their wetlands and ripped out a bunch of mangroves. So when did the Wetland Preservation Map, they didn't consider our property to be wetlands. It's 1034 1035 all these people with the houses and condos, they're worried about their view corridor. But you know who's gonna have to pay that? We'll win that case. Bauman doesn't know 1036 what he's talking about. We will win a taking case worth hundreds of millions of dollars. 1038 you're gonna have to float a bond here and the individuals that participated have personal 1039 liability. Why would you do that? Why don't you say, 'Let's compromise, fill in fifty acres, save the road and let's move forward.' We have, we have a great lobbyist. Rodney Barreto owns eighteen acres. Yeah, eighteen acres. We got a lot of very powerful people 1042 that are gonna put a lotta money to fight this out. At the end of the day, we're gonna win 1043 it because you have everybody else...

**Chairperson Botel:** Thank you, Mr. Lozman. 1045 **Mr. F. Lozman:** ...built their homes and condos but we're not gonna be?

1046 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you, MR. Lozman

1047 **Mr. F. Lozman:** You don't wanna go down that road.

1048 [Timer]

1049 **Chairperson Botel:** Madam Clerk.

1050 City Clerk Anthony: J.B. Dixon.

1051 I'm sure that the Council is very pleased to find that Mr. Lozman is Ms. J.B. Dixon: not only better than your Attorney's, although he's not an attorney, and he's better than 1052 your new Director of Development Services, as well as your outside counsel, as well as 1053 all of you. But, since we do not have the pleasure of having Mr. Lozman run our City, 1054 1055 because he has not been elected, we're just sort of stuck with the rest of you and I hope 1056 that you will be able to take the advice of your Attorney and of your professionals, who 1057 are experts in this area, as well as not just seven hundred names that you will hear tonight, 1058 but really over a thousand people who have signed the petition to urge you to pass this

1059 Resolution.

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It is untrue that only people who are worried about their views are against this. There are very few people on Singer Island have a view of this lagoon. People all over the Island, and in the mainland, know that it is a natural resource that cannot ever be gotten back if and when it is ruined. It is already being ruined by Mr. Lozman and his cabal, in that all sorts of illegal things have been going on there, building, et. cetera, et. cetera. Seagrasses have been destroyed. All of this has been documented. Everything that you saw up on the screen points to the fact that this is really simply a housekeeping chore. Your Comprehensive Plan already says that those submerged lands cannot be developed in any way. Your predecessor Council Members, not you, simply failed, as did your predecessor management team, failed to do this housekeeping chore of simply bringing..., bringing the zoning in compliance with your Comprehensive Plan, which supersedes it anyway. Mr. Lozman, of course, is always going to sue you. Mr. Lozman is always confident that he will win. This is not a Supreme Court case, ladies and gentlemen. This is not a First Amendment Right case. You are not the same people that he was suing before. Also, as I think Mr. Sirmons pointed out, and certainly your Attorneys will point out, if Mr. Lozman thinks he can sue, the, the people from Singer Island can also sue. So, one way or another...

- 1913 Map and the Zoning Code. And this particular Ordinance, from my understanding, is one
- of those same situations where the Future Land Use Map was changed and this is back 1914
- 1915 in the back in the, in the late '80's I would say, and the next step of the Zoning Map being
- 1916 updated just wasn't taken and it just fell through the cracks.
- 1917 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Okay. Mr. Evans, for the Comprehensive Plan, when can we
- 1918 start to review the Comprehensive Plan and look for these anomalies and get these
- 1919 corrected so we're not in this position again?
- 1920 **City Manager Evans:** Director Sirmons, if you can provide a little bit of context with
- respect to the in'... the review that Staff is ensuing right now, to look at some elements 1921
- 1922 that would end up coming back to the Board for recommendations to make modifications.
- 1923 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Yes. We are currently working with the
- 1924 consultant to address one objection that the state had with a minor amendment that we
- 1925 made to the..., that we submitted for our Comprehensive Plan a few years ago. Those
- 1926 certain type of amendment to the Comprehensive Plan have to be cleared through the
- 1927 state, and when they..., before they approve it, they look through the documents to make
- sure there aren't any major issues. And, they had a objection the last time we sent 1928
- 1929 something to them, so we are currently in the process of working with the consultant to
- 1930 address a certain element of the coastal flooding element of our Comprehensive Plan.
- 1931 So, over the course of the next year, we'll be working to address that particular section of
- 1932 the Plan. So, it is limited in scope, but we are in the process of doing some opening of
- 1933 the Plan and, and making changes.
- 1934 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: So, with this consultant we're speaking with, it's gonna
- 1935 address just that one factor. Are we gonna do an overarching sweep of the Comp Plan,
- 1936 or is this just gonna focus on that one piece?

- Development Services Director Sirmons: So, our, our current focus is focused on one piece but our long term strategy is to do it progressively, section by section to make an update..., update, to get the Plan where we want it in the areas that are outdated.
- So, as far as what is allocated for this Fiscal Year, we are only looking at that particular section.
- 1942 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Okay. If we can get a timeline, what it would look like to get a completed update because there's no reason that this dais should be in this position.
- 1944 Even though this is, essentially, just administrative update and housekeeping, it is a
- twenty year fix, that's just been sitting there and that we have to take on the responsibility
- of fixing. So, if we're gonna fix it, we would not just gonna start with one piece, I wanna
- just overall take a look at what the timeline's gonna be to correct all of the anomalies in
- our Comprehensive Plan and our Future Land Use.
- 1949 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Understood.
- 1950 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 1951 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. McCoy, you're recognized.
- 1952 **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you, Madam Chair. And, Pro Tem Lawson, I was
- gonna say we should take it, similar to how you take an elephant one bite at a time. But,
- 1954 I was hoping that it's not about solely the Comprehensive Plan, but the City's development
- regulations altogether because there are some things that need to correct.
- However, one of the things I wanted to ask, the Special Preservation that's being proposed, is to provide concurrency with.., the special preservation zoning is to provide concurrency with the Comprehensive Plan, is that accurate, Mr. Sirmons?
- 1959 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Correct.
- 1960 Councilperson McCoy: So, absent of us authorizing this Ordinance to amend the
- zoning, will there be any special preservation within the City for the sole reasons of
- preserving the natural resources that, I guess our City is known for? Obviously, the tourist
- destination diving and some of the areas along the Lake Worth Lagoon? Is there any
- other special preservation zoning, is what I'm saying?
- 1965 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** In the Comprehensive Plan, this segment
- of the City, these parcels are the only ones designated as Special Preservation. None
- 1967 exist outside of this.
- 1968 **Councilperson McCoy:** But, but as far as zoning is concerned?
- 1969 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** As far as zoning, there are no special
- 1970 preservation areas. And this Ordinance would create that Zoning District and assign it to
- these parcels.

- 1972 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. And, absent of that, there is the overarching
- 1973 Comprehensive Plan that prohibits the development of any kind of development in those
- special preservation, but the specific zoning to designate it doesn't exist currently? For
- 1975 zoning?
- 1976 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Correct. It's only enforced currently...
- 1977 **Councilperson McCoy:** Through...
- 1978 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** ...through the...
- 1979 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...the Comp Plan.
- 1980 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** ... Comprehensive Plan, not zoning.
- 1981 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. [Pause]. Alright. That's all I have, Madam Chair.
- 1982 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Anything else? [Pause]. I have a question, Mr.
- 1983 Sirmons, just for my own edification and understanding. If it were to come to pass that
- we did not pass this Ordinance this evening, what are the things that can happen as a
- result of that? From, from the Staff's perspective?
- 1986 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** From Staff, it continues potential
- confusion. Any landowner, or future landowner for that matter, if anyone out there right
- 1988 now decides to sell their property, someone could market that property as zoned as
- residential. And, someone could buy it thinking that they could develop it residentially.
- 1990 And then, we.., my Staff and my Department would have to come to them and explain the
- levels of Ordinances and why although it says here you can build a house, it also.., we
- also have a document here that says you can't. So that type of confusion we want to
- avoid and we don't... Of course, the, the onus is on the purchaser to do all of their
- research but, again, it creates confusion when we have [inaudible] conflicting documents.
- 1995 So, that does become an issue for Staff. Also, our Comprehensive Plan does state that
- we will go forth, after approval of that Plan, and make our government regulations
- 1997 consistent with that document so [inaudible] previously approved Ordinance related to
- 1998 land development. But then, there are some state... [stammer] there's a state
- 1999 requirement that they be consistent, and I believe there are some enforcement
- 2000 mechanisms that the, that the state can use [inaudible]. But, I do know Mr. Bauman is
- more versed on.., with those kind of legal actions the state can take [inaudible].
- 2002 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. Bauman, could you address that, please?
- 2003 Mr. A. Bauman: At the...
- 2004 Chairperson Botel: Yes. If...
- 2005 **Mr. A. Bauman:** ...microphone?

- 2006 **Chairperson Botel:** ...you don't mind. Sure. [Pause]. I think you can take your
- 2007 mic off.., your mask off while you're at the mic.
- 2008 Mr. A. Bauman: Okay.
- 2009 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 2010 **Mr. A. Bauman:** Can you hear me?
- 2011 Chairperson Botel: Yes.
- 2012 **Mr. A. Bauman:** Okay. Andrew Bauman from the law firm of Lewis, Longman
- 2013 &Walker.
- In response to what Mr. Sirmons referenced, Florida statute 163.3202 states that 2014 the Land Development Regulations, which include the zoning code and zoning 2015 2016 designations, must be brough up to consistency with the Comprehensive Plan every time 2017 the Comprehensive Plan is amended. In the event that they are not, the Department of Economic Opportunities, which is formerly the Department of Community Affairs, State of 2018 Florida, which approves your Comprehensive Plans, has the ability to make a 2019 determination that you have not carried this forward and file an action circuit court against 2020 the City of Riviera Beach to compel them to take the action required by statute. 2021
- In this case, we have a Comprehensive Plan that designates something a certain way and allows certain specified uses, and then we have a Zoning Code that says something different and specifies different uses. The more troubling issue for the Department of Community Affairs, however, will be that the Comprehensive Plan, in the same section, I believe it's 1.8, is.., states in there that additionally that the City was to, by 2010, adopt Land Development Regulations to implement this section. Prior City Commissions did not get that accomplished and that's why it's in front of you today.
- 2020 Commissions did not get that accomplished and that 5 why it 5 in nont of you today.
- 2029 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay. Thank you very much. Any other questions or
- 2030 comments?
- 2031 Councilperson Lanier: Madam Chair?
- 2032 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. Thank you.
- 2033 [Inaudible comments]
- 2034 **Councilperson Lanier:** So, the attorney is saying that that means that the City, if it's
- 2035 not passed, the City can be sued as well. By the state.
- 2036 **Mr. A. Bauman:** That is correct, ma'am.
- 2037 Councilperson Lanier: Okay.
- 2038 **Chairperson Botel:** Anything else? Madam Clerk.

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- 2079 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, the acceptance of public comment cards is now
- 2080 closed. Fane Lozman, Lloyd Brown, J.B. Dixon.
- 2081 **Mr. F. Lozman:** Fane Lozman. I saw Mr. Bauman give a fist bump to the.., fist bump
- to the City Attorney. Already the City spent over \$40,000 with Lewis, Longman & Walker
- 2083 trying to get rid of Taylor and Scott.

You know, one of the disappointing things, Ms. Miller-Anderson, is that the City did not disclose that Governor Rubin asked you..., Governor Askew was the 37th Governor of Florida, he served eight years. Dan Taylor's father, he passed away, Luke Taylor. He was an attorney, and he litigated the property in the lagoon, and he came up..., and he beat Governor Askew. The court ruled that the land could be filled in. And Governor Askew took that all the way to the Florida Supreme Court, and Governor Askew lost. So, one of the disappointing things that, that Bauman didn't bother to disclose, that for the last thirty years or forty years, this has been litigated. Okay? So the zoning was always in place, and what the City did, is they didn't want to abide by the Supreme Court in Askew v. Taylor, okay? They didn't wanna abide by the ruling in Palm Beach Isles v. the City, so this is just continuing being litigated. And Lewis, Longman & Walker is looking forward to it 'cause they're gonna bill another million or \$2MM.

So the point is, the zoning was in place first, and then the City, years ago, said, 'Well, let's get around these court orders by changing the Comprehensive Plan to Special Preservation. But it comes down to the equal protection. Why was McCoy and Botel and Lanier served notice that they're gonna be in a federal Civil Rights lawsuit? For the equal protection argument. This Board, a couple years ago, let Kolter fill in wetlands. But they're not letting us fill 'em in, even though we have a case history, that you were not educated on. If they said here's the Governor Askew versus Dan Taylor's case, and that was case, let's see, I don't think I have the case number in front of me, but if they had given you the case number and walked through the litigation history, nobody.., no one bothered to walk through the litigation history. Right now, it's being litigated for the new property owners adjacent to Taylor's saying that that case applies to everybody. That's an open litigation now. Did the City Attorney bother to say, 'Hey, is the Palm Beach Isles case being litigation again to add these new defendants? Is the... Is Taylor's case being

- added again?' They didn't tell you the truth. They didn't tell you about the prior litigation
- 2110 that's been going on for fifty years. The zoning was there first and the Comp Plan
- 2111 matched it. Then they changed the Comp Plan. What you guys should've done is had a
- 2112 Comp Plan amendment to allow that property be developed. Now all of you have exposed
- 2113 yourself to [chuckle] liability, you're all gonna be sued for equal protection in a Civil Rights
- 2114 lawsuit five months from now. Number two, you're not gonna win this case. At the end
- of the day, you've exposed the westside for hundreds of millions of dollars. Why would
- 2116 you do that? That is so stupid, because you wanted to listen to Botel who, who.., October

**City Clerk Anthony:** Lloyd Brown, J.B. Dixon.

Mr. L. Brown: How ya doin'? I grew a beard waiting on my turn to come up. [Chuckles] And, you know, it's a shame. I don't know if it's legal or not, I don't know what the lady was ta'.., calling these names for. None of 'em I knew. But all I can say is, it, it doesn't seem to be fair that an individual can come to this... don't even have to come to the meeting, but can run off a group of names, as many as... 'Cause I tell you a whole lot of people who told me things to tell you now. I, I.., but I'm on time. I'm on the time limit. I don't know what the situation is or what it was about it, but I don't think it's legal. Or, if it is, you're gonna have to put it down in paperwork and show me where it's legal. This, this person talked for, I mean, I don't know how many names. And I was waiting on the 'and', and that was the last one. I could went to McDonalds in Jupiter and got back. by this time. And I don't think it's fair. Even to Lozman. Like, you, you, you., I know when it's up I'm gonna have to sit down but let me get right to my point.

Code Enforcement told me that I had a trailer in my yard. I got pictures of tractor trailers in the yard. But, you know what? That's like two people going down 95.., I don't have grass, so okay. I'm in a new car and you're in an old car, so when the sheriff pull' me over, he said, 'Well, you got a new car, I'm just gonna let you go ahead on and run the speed limit.' This the Code Enforcement. I'm, I'm, I'm, Iike, parable, you know, between the sheriff department pulling somebody over with a new car and pulling somebody over with a old car. So the old car, he get all the tickets. That's me. The man with the grass in his yard, he could back a 'effin' tractor trailer up in the back of his yard and nobody said nothin'. And then on Blue Heron and Obama, right down the street from 15<sup>th</sup> Street, that's where the Code Enforcement at. I know they ride through there every day and they don't see that? And for people who live around there, I'll go on strike. Say, 'Forget you people in the Code Enforcement.. You don't be'.., you're not fair.'

And then let me tell you another thing about black politicians. You want us to vote, right? - 2193 her of, and has already accused her of on a county level, in which it was dismissed, and
- 2194 now is going to the state in Tallahassee. The same complaints. What are those
- complaints? Those complaints are that, as a newly elected Councilwoman, when she
- founded a foundation called Friends of the Riviera Beach Schools, which is a charity for
- 2197 Riviera Beach school children, she gave.., when she was asked for the address of the

- 2234 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 2235 **City Attorney Wynn:** If you have any questions, I'd be happy to an'.., answer them.
- 2236 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. McCoy, you're recognized.
- 2237 **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you. Question for.., question for the Attorney, and
- 2238 perhaps even the Clerk. If this is sponsored by the Human Rights Council, why do we
- have it entitled in the Resolution as sponsored by the City of Riviera Beach. If a specific
- Member chooses to bring it forward, I'd much rather see that.
- But again, you know, I, I, I shared some concerns that I didn't think that this
- Resolution was.., I, I understand what it.., the intent is, but I think that he focus is so
- 2243 narrow that I don't wanna make it seem that we're specifically encompassing a, a certain
- 2244 protection and excluding others. But, just from what you're explanation was, Ms. Wynn,
- 2245 this was presented by the Human Rights Council not the City of Riviera Beach, so if you
- have a specific Member that you wanna identify...

- 2247 City Attorney Wynn: Yes. Yes.
- 2248 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...I think that's more...
- 2249 **City Attorney Wynn:** Mhmm.
- 2250 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...appropriate to be held in the Resolution title then to say that
- this is an expression...
- 2252 **City Attorney Wynn:** Mhmm.
- 2253 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...or even not even an expression, a Ordinance from the City
- of Riviera Beach, so I would offer an amendment to correct that.
- 2255 **City Attorney Wynn:** You're correct, Mr., Mr. McCoy. Mr. Lawson, at the request
- of the Human Rights Council, as well as Dr. Botel, requested that this be placed on the
- 2257 Agenda.
- 2258 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. So, would that be appropriate to have that Resolution
- 2259 title amended to reflect...
- 2260 **City Attorney Wynn:** The Ordinance title doesn't reflect the Human Rights Council
- at all. So, you would be...
- 2262 Councilperson McCoy: And that's...
- 2263 **City Attorney Wynn:** ...voting on the Ordinance title as read by the Clerk.
- 2264 Councilperson McCoy: Well, I'm saying, the, the title that she read, it said it's
- sponsored by the City of Riviera Beach.
- 2266 **City Attorney Wynn:** And it is. It was at the request of Mr. Lawson and Dr. Botel.
- 2267 Councilperson McCoy: Right. But, similar to how you would sponsor a bill in the
- legislature, or even in Capital Hill, it's sponsored by a specific member, but this is not an
- 2269 embodiment that we sought to go out and bring this to the Attorneys to draft. This was
- 2270 done by someone lobbying Members of the Council.
- 2271 **City Attorney Wynn:** Right.
- 2272 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, you know...
- 2273 **City Attorney Wynn:** But then Members of the Council requested that it be drafted,
- 2274 and so it was drafted at their request.
- 2275 **Councilperson McCoy:** So when I...
- 2276 **City Attorney Wynn:** I would...

- 2277 Councilperson McCoy: ...get...
- 2278 **City Attorney Wynn:** I would not have bought this..., brought this forward to you at
- the request of the Human Rights Council without a Councilperson asking for it.
- 2280 Councilperson McCoy: And my only thing is, why wouldn't a Councilperson be
- afforded that opportunity, similar to how you hear political ads, 'I sponsored the bill, I co-
- sponsored this legislation.' Why wouldn't that be appropriate in this matter?
- 2283 **City Attorney Wynn:** Mr. Lawson did that at the last meeting, and then Dr. Botel...
- 2284 **Councilperson McCoy:** But I'm saying...
- 2285 **City Attorney Wynn:** ...chimed in after and said that she also requested it.
- 2286 **Councilperson McCoy:** But my concern is, why wouldn't that be appropriate to be read
- in the Resolution title in that fashion?
- 2288 **City Attorney Wynn:** It's not appropriate for an Ordinance title.
- 2289 **Councilperson McCoy:** To say that it's...
- 2290 City Attorney Wynn: To be...
- 2291 Councilperson McCoy: ...sponsored by...
- 2292 **City Attorney Wynn:** Correct. Not in the title of the Ordinance to be codified in the
- 2293 Code, no.
- 2294 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.
- 2295 **City Attorney Wynn:** No, sir.
- 2296 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Alright. Good enough. I just.., you know, it seems very
- 2297 unusual to say sponsored by, when generally in every other legislative body, when you
- say sponsored by, it 's generally associated with a individual member of that body.
- 2299 Correct?
- 2300 City Attorney Wynn: Yes, I understand. And I, I was in error when I said 'sponsored
- by' during my description. And I clarified that.
- 2302 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Alright. Good enough. No, amendment needed.
- 2303 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Any other questions or comments? Madam
- 2304 Clerk.
- 2305 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Miller-Anderson?
- 2306 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.

2307 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Lanier?

- 2326 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair and Members of the Board, we do not have any
- 2327 public comments on this Item. The acceptance of public comments on this Item is now
- 2328 closed.
- 2329 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Ms. Young, you have a presentation?
- 2330 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** So moved.
- 2331 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, please..,.
- 2332 **Chairperson Botel:** Sorry, sorry. I heard a so moved and a second.
- 2333 **City Clerk Anthony:** I didn't hear a second.
- 2334 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Second.

- 2335 Unk.: I think that motion...
  2336 City Clerk Anthony: W
- 2336 **City Clerk Anthony:** Who made the motion?
- 2337 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** I said mo'.., I move... So moved. I don't know...
- 2338 **Chairperson Botel:** I thought I heard a second.
- 2339 **City Clerk Anthony:** And the second came from?
- 2340 **Chairperson Botel:** Didn't hear a second?
- 2341 Councilperson Lanier: Second.
- 2342 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay. Thank you.
- 2343 **City Clerk Anthony:** Thank you.
- 2344 [Chuckles]
- 2345 **Chairperson Botel:** It comes from above. From above.
- 2346 [Chuckles]
- 2347 Interim Human Resources Director Young: Good evening, Council.
- 2348 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** I can't hear.
- 2349 **Chairperson Botel:** [Stammer]. I think you could take your mask off just for the
- 2350 purposes of presentation. I mean, you're, you're the only one up there. So.
- 2351 Interim Human Resources Director Young: Eureka Young. Depar'...
- 2352 **Chairperson Botel:** Could you move the microphone closer to your mouth?
- 2353 Interim Human Resources Director Young: Eureka Young, Department of Human
- 2354 Resources.
- 2355 [Inaudible comment]
- 2356 **Chairperson Botel:** It's a little faint but...
- 2357 Interim Human Resources Director Young: This is a.., this Resolution is for you to
- 2358 approve the revisions to the City's management incentive package. Effective March the
- 2359 20<sup>th</sup>, 2020, the City Manager cancelled vacation for all the City employees, that had an
- impact on the annual vacation buyback program. The buyback program requires the use
- of forty vacation hours in order for participation. This Resolution removes the forty hours
- of vacation usage requirement. This Resolution also adds language that pro rates the
- 2363 allotment of personal time off to managerial employees at hire or transfer.

2364	Are there any questions'
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- 2365 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. McCoy, you're recognized.
- 2366 **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you, Madam Chair. So, I guess I'm not understanding
- 2367 exactly the.., what you're saying seems inconsistent. You said this Resolution removes
- forty hours of vacation usage requirement. So that basically means that it can rollover?
- 2369 Interim Human Resources Director Young: No. For.., to, to participate in the annual
- buyback, there was a requirement that managerial staff must use at.., the minimum of
- forty hours of vacation. Because of the pandemic, all vacation was, was cancelled. No
- 2372 one was able to use any vacation. So, what this Resolution is doing is removing the
- requirement of having to use the forty hours of vacation.
- 2374 **Councilperson McCoy:** I'm, I'm really confused. You said the Manager cancelled.
- 2375 Correct?
- 2376 Interim Human Resources Director Young: Yes.
- 2377 **Councilperson McCoy:** So why, if the Manager cancelled, now this is now an action
- of the body to now reimplement something.
- 2379 **City Manager Evans:** Madam...
- 2380 Councilperson McCoy: Because...
- 2381 **City Manager Evans:** ... Chair, if I may? The...
- 2382 Councilperson McCoy: Mr. Evans. Mr. Evans, excuse me. I wanna make sure that I
- 2383 understand this from Ms. Irving, and I would love for you to respond but I'm really trying
- 2384 to get somewhere, so if you can just bear with me for a moment?
- So Ms. Irving, if this was a policy that was done, at the Manager's level, why is it incumbent upon the City's Council Members to now involve ourselves in the action?
- 2387 Interim Human Resources Director Young: The requirement of the forty hours of
- vacation was not in the last Resolution, which was done last fiscal year. And that was a
- requirement that we have, that the employees, in order to participate in the buyback
- program, they must have used, spent, taken, five days, forty hours of their vacation time
- 2391 in order to participate in the City's buyback program. The buyback program is something
- that all employees, all regular employees, have participated in. However, management
- 2393 employees, there was a requirement that they use [inaudible] vacation, in order to
- 2394 participate in the buyback program.
- The requirement of.., not requirement.., the Manager.., the City Manager,
- cancelling vacation was not done by, by your action, it was a direction from him. But that
- still did not..., it still did not remove the requirement that employees take the forty hours of

- vacation. That is the reason we're here now, to remove the requirement for employees
- 2399 to take forty hours of vacation.
- 2400 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Thank you, Ms. Irving.
- 2401 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. Evans, did you wanna add anything?
- 2402 **City Manager Evans:** Couldn't have said it any better.
- 2403 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 2404 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Well, great. I got some questions.
- 2405 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.
- 2406 Councilperson Lanier: Madam Ch'...
- 2407 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.
- 2408 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, the Resolution that's in front of us, and the memo, don't
- speak to exactly how many employees and what management. Because it actually refers
- 2410 to something different that I've not seen before. I think seen tier 1 and tier 2, which I'm
- sorry, I'm not familiar with. I have not heard that terminology. So, can you speak that?
- 2412 Interim Human Resources Director Young: Okay. The tier program that's in...
- 2413 We've had the tiers for two years now. Tier 1 program are our Directors and Assistant
- 2414 Directors. Tier 2 are other managerial administrative employees.
- 2415 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. The Resolution, I guess, this is called the Resolution
- 2416 Agenda Item summary doesn't speak to any fiscal impact. This normally, if it's just the
- 2417 wash, wouldn't require one but we're adding back something that was not already in the...
- 2418 that was done in '18, '19, then I would imagine there's some fiscal impact.
- 2419 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair? If I may? The fiscal impact will only be
- 2420 experienced if individuals choose to sell their vacation time or their sick time. So, we
- 2421 won't know the fiscal impact until the infor'.., the forms are administered, and then those
- things are turned back into HR and Finance for the purposes of calculating.
- The other side of it is, and Ms. Young, correct me if I'm [stammer] wrong, other collective bargaining units, in the event that vacations are cancelled as a result of a directive by Administration, they are still eligible to effectively be compensated for that
- 2426 time because it was a, a management decision.
- As it relates to the management incentive program, that is not contemplated. So,
- if the Resolution does not change, effectively what happens is, the employees would not
- 2429 get the opportunity to sell back any unused vacation or sick time, because they were
- unable to utilize the forty hours that's stipulated in the Resolution.

- 2431 **Councilperson McCoy:** Follow up.
- 2432 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.
- 2433 **Councilperson McCoy:** Is there a specific period of the fiscal year that, Mr. Evans or
- 2434 Mr. Sherman, when that buyback has to, or when it can occur?
- 2435 **City Manager Evans:** It, it occurs..., the forms are sent out, I believe, in October. And
- 2436 then, the release of payment occurs, I believe, towards the middle of December.
- 2437 Interim Human Resources Director Young: That's correct.
- 2438 **Councilperson McCoy:** Do we know how many, approximately? Or just a rough
- 2439 ballpark amount?
- 2440 Interim Human Resources Director Young: It's hard to tell how many employees will
- 2441 participate in buyback.
- 2442 Councilperson McCoy: Well, I guess in that... You said, this affects managers and
- 2443 assistants, and then others. So we don't.., I mean, I guess...
- 2444 Interim Human Resources Director Young: The parti'...
- 2445 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...it could be anybody. It could be any...
- 2446 Interim Human Resources Director Young: Participation...
- 2447 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...of the...
- 2448 Interim Human Resources Director Young: ...is purely voluntary. It's not something
- that.., it's, it's a choice.
- 2450 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. And, you know, I guess, Mr. Evans, and this will be
- 2451 probably my, not my last question, second to last question. This was done during the
- 2452 administrative actions you took during the pandemic process?
- 2453 **City Manager Evans:** That is correct, Councilman.
- 2454 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. And one of the concerns that we've kinda experienced
- 2455 during that pandemic process was, there was this consideration that we were giving
- 2456 employees something that no other city throughout the state was doing. And that
- particularly concerns me that, while you may think that it's a good gesture, but if we tell
- 2458 them that they can't take vacation time, it's almost like.., I don't know how you can give
- on one hand and take on the other and seem to suggest that that was a benefit to our
- employees. You know? So, it.., this is.., more than what we've experienced when it
- comes to personnel time and days off, but just reading it was not how I understood it when
- it was presented up on this, on this presentation.
- 2463 But that's all I have. Thank you, Ms. Irving and Mr. Evans.

- 2464 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Anything else?
- 2465 **Councilperson Lanier:** Madam Chair, could I see that chart again?
- 2466 **Chairperson Botel:** That chart? I don't... Was there a chart?
- 2467 **Interim Human Resources Director Young:** [Inaudible].
- 2468 Councilperson Lanier: The...
- 2469 **Chairperson Botel:** The only, the only screen we have up here is Resolution 77-
- 2470 20, management incentive.
- 2471 **Councilperson Lanier:** See if there was a chart that she put up. There wasn't, there
- 2472 wasn't a chart that she put up?
- 2473 **Chairperson Botel:** No. It was four bullet points that spoke to the Manager's
- cancelling the vacation, the annual vacation buyback requiring the use of forty vacation
- 2475 days for participation. This Resolution removes...
- 2476 **Councilperson Lanier:** Yeah but.., yeah. But, but it was on the screen, it said forty
- vacation days. Do they mean forty hours or forty vacation days?
- 2478 Interim Human Resources Director Young: Oh, that's forty vacation hours.
- 2479 **Chairperson Botel:** Hours. It [stammer].., it should say hours.
- 2480 Interim Human Resources Director Young: It should say hours.
- 2481 Chairperson Botel: Sorry.
- 2482 **Councilperson Lanier:** Okay.
- 2483 **Councilperson McCoy:** Actually, no. That's not what in the Agenda summary. It says
- forty days, for tier 1 employees, twenty days for tier 2 employees.
- 2485 **Interim Human Resources Director Young:** And that's scrivener's error. It's forty
- 2486 hours.
- 2487 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, I move we table this. Because, if, if that's true, I'm
- looking at the Agenda summary and I would hope that that's not in the Resolution.
- 2489 **Chairperson Botel:** Yeah. Let's look at it carefully.
- 2490 **Councilperson McCoy:** It is different in the Agenda Resolution.
- 2491 **City Attorney Wynn:** Hours, correct?
- 2492 **Councilperson McCoy:** It says fifteen days in the Resolution, for tier 1 employees.

2493	City	Attorney	/ Wy	nn:	Mhmm.
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- 2494 Councilperson McCoy: Or actually, no, I'm sorry. The maximum rollover rate for
- personal time should be forty days for tier 1 employees, twenty days for tier 2 employees, 2495
- 2496 with no option for payout.
- 2497 **City Attorney Wynn:** Correct. It states...
- Chair Pro Tem Lawson: [Inaudible]. 2498
- 2499 **Chairperson Botel:** The use of five days...
- 2500 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** [Stammer]...
- 2501 Chairperson Botel: ...or forty hours of vacation time.
- 2502 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** [Inaudible].
- 2503 **Councilperson McCoy:** Move, move to table.
- 2504 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Madam Chair?
- 2505 Interim Human Resources Director Young: There are...
- 2506 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes?
- 2507 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: I'm still raising my hand from virtual but...
- 2508 [Chuckles]
- 2509 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** The backup, it says... It says tier 1 employees
- fifteen days of personal time off, [inaudible]. Am I looking at the wrong thing? 2510
- Interim Human Resources Director Young: Okay. 2511 There is... the management
- 2512 incentive package deals with two issues. The one issue that we want to address here is
- the forty hour requirement. The management [stammer] incentive package, gives 2513
- managerial employees additional days off. And that was done two years ago when we 2514
- 2515 were also at a time to where employees were having various requirements of spending
- additional time in the City. And we were also faced with issues with recruitment. And so, 2516
- at that time, we created the incentive package with Council's approval, to give managerial 2517
- 2518 employees additional days for time off. That time is 'use it or lose it', with the exception
- 2519 of we allowed it to rollover, with no additional buyout.
- The requirements for the vacation.., participation in the, in the buyback, is a 2520 separate issue. And that was also addressed. That is addressed in this Resolution. The 2521
- incentive package has the PTO time, which gives managerial employees fifteen days for 2522 2523 department heads and assistants, ten days for the managerial employees. That time, we
- 2524 capped it with a limitation of rollover. That day'... those days are not subject to

- participation in the buyback, those days are not subject to any payout at termination or
- separation from the City. As.., whereas, vacation and sick days are subject to payout.
- 2527 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.
- 2528 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, this covers... I'm sorry. So this would cover members
- and employees in the collective bargaining unions as well?
- 2530 Interim Human Resources Director Young: No. Collective bargaining have their own
- agreement for vacation buyback.
- 2532 Councilperson McCoy: So...
- 2533 Interim Human Resources Director Young: And...
- 2534 **Councilperson McCoy:** Go ahead.
- 2535 Interim Human Resources Director Young: During the course of the pandemic,
- 2536 collective bargaining employees were given additional days for time off.
- 2537 Councilperson McCoy: So, oh. I... So, specifically... Oh gosh. I know ya'll are
- probably not gonna like me 'cause I like to bring up pandemic pay but...
- 2539 Chairperson Botel: [Chuckle].
- 2540 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...elect somebody else because I think it's so important to
- bring this issue up at this point, that we specifically said that collective bargaining union
- employees could not receive anything outside of their collective bargaining agreement.
- Let me finish. The exempt employees were those that were able to take time and a half
- 2544 from the very first hour that they worked. Now, on top of that, we're allowing these
- 2545 individuals to participate in getting buyback as well for the hours that they were not able
- 2546 to use when they were already getting time and a half? Is that what I'm hearing? [Pause].
- Because that..., I mean, I don't know if that's double dipping, it almost seems like
- quadruple dipping at this point. I, you know, this is really becoming more convoluted and
- 2549 I would like a little bit more explanation because it seems to be that the memo, the
- 2550 Resolution and the Agenda summary does not clearly spell out where we are and, for us,
- 1. Cooladion and the Agenda daminary account clearly open cut where we are and, for ac,
- 2551 I know that we have four collective bargaining unions. That means we have less
- employees in management level, in tier 1 and tier 2, so I would estimate no more than
- seventy-five. And I'm just guessing, but you know, those are the same individuals that
- 2554 took the time and a half payment. And, are we now extending the buyback period for
- 2555 that? For those individuals as well? When they were already additionally incentivized for
- 2556 pandemic pay? [Pause].
- I yield back and if everybody's.., when everyone is done, I wanna offer a motion to
- 2558 table.
- 2559 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay. Anything from any... Anything? Ms. Miller-Anderson,
- any questions?

- 2561 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: [Inaudible].
- 2562 **Chairperson Botel:** My, my concern... Excuse me. My concern is, I don't see
- 2563 anything about that.... Sorry. I'm pointing through my thing. I don't see anything about
- 2564 that in any of the backup. It doesn't seem to be speaking he same language to me.
- You've got something up here about the vacation day buyback, but this.., in the backup
- and summary, all we have is this management incentive plan. It doesn't even mention
- anything that you've talked about here. Am I, am I missing something, Mr...
- 2568 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Well it... It, it is, at the bottom of the summary,
- 2569 I think, but it says the forty days. It doesn't say forty hours.
- 2570 **Councilperson McCoy:** Can we bring this back?
- 2571 **City Attorney Wynn:** I think it doesn't... If I can.., and, you can correct me if I'm
- wrong, Ms. Young. I think it doesn't mention it because what it does, is deletes that
- requirement, that you see up here, from the Resolution.
- 2574 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay. That's.., it's not clear. That's my concern. It's just not
- clear what we are... what we're doing. And I, I think Mr. McCov was about to make a, a
- 2576 motion and I'd like to hear what he has to say.
- 2577 Councilperson McCoy: Right. And then too, I guess I wanna know who this
- 2578 encompasses because, you know, it's, you know, it's quite difficult to make these
- decisions. And, you know, Members, I wanna call your attention to when we were in one
- of our first collective bargaining agreement discussions, when we were surprised... well.
- at least I was, to find out that in some situations, because of our resolved collective
- bargaining agreement, we had employees that we were spending more in benefits than
- 2583 actually in salaries. You know, more in the vacation time, more in the healthcare benefits,
- more in the pension, then they were actually receiving in their actual salary. So, I wanna
- 2585 make sure that we have a good understanding. And, yeah, I guess the enacting cause
- of this, is this going..., this, this wouldn't be applied retroactive, would it, Mr. Sherman?
- 2587 Well, I guess October, it would be. Right?
- 2588 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: [Inaudible].
- 2589 **City Attorney Wynn:** Is it being applied retroactively?
- 2590 **Councilperson McCoy:** So they would... [Pause]. Because I, I was told that the
- buyback starts in October.
- 2592 **City Attorney Wynn:** December. Right? Or October?
- 2593 Interim Human Resources Director Young: The buyback is covering the last fiscal
- year, through...
- 2595 **Councilperson McCoy:** The Fiscal Year '20, that just ended?

- 2596 Interim Human Resources Director Young: Yes.
- 2597 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. So, well, I guess it would cover what has already
- occurred. Oh, well you know what? It seems to be that we need to kinda hash this out a
- 2599 little further.
- 2600 Interim Human Resources Director Young: Participation in the buyback is from
- 2601 October to September.
- 2602 **Councilperson McCoy:** But from the prior fiscal year.
- 2603 Interim Human Resources Director Young: The prior year.
- 2604 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, I guess, it wouldn't hurt if we kind a had this to come back?
- 2605 Unless somebody objects.
- 2606 **Chairperson Botel:** Are you making... Would you like to make a...
- 2607 Councilperson McCoy: I, I....
- 2608 Chairperson Botel: ...motion to table?
- 2609 **Councilperson McCoy:** I move to temporarily postpone because I don't wanna put it
- on the table to appear back on the next Agenda, but I want a, kinda, more thorough
- 2611 explanation. So, move to temporarily postpone.
- 2612 **Chairperson Botel:** Would someone care to second that?
- 2613 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Second.

- 2640 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board. We have public
- comment on this Item. The acceptance of public comments on this Item is now closed.
- 2642 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** So moved.
- 2643 Councilperson McCoy: Second.
- 2644 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Second.
- 2645 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Let's have the presen'... the public presentation
- and then public comments. Thank you. [Inaudible]. Mr. Bailey.
- 2647 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Good evening, Mayor and Council.
- This is the City's annual allotment from Palm Beach County for the CDBG grant
- program. As you can see, this year we intend to reconstruct 35<sup>th</sup> Street, between Avenue
- H and Avenue F. There's a schedule provided in the backup and anticipate construction
- in the first quarter of 2021. This year, our grant amount was \$558,334.00.
- 2652 And with that, I'll take any questions.
- 2653 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Any questions? Mr. McCoy, you're recognized.
- 2654 **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you. Mr. Bailey, good to see you as always. I just
- wanted to point out that the map does not intersect with Avenue H and Avenue F. It's in

- 2656 between. But the Resolution suggests from Avenue H to Avenue F. So, I know that's
- 2657 really minor, but I looked at the map.
- 2658 But the other real question I have, is there any underground utilities being done or
- 2659 is this just top surface?
- Interim Public Works Director Bailey: No, sir. It is water, sewer, drainage, asphalt, 2660
- 2661 curb, gutter and sidewalks. A full restoration of the roadway.
- 2662 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, underground utilities?
- 2663 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes, sir.
- 2664 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. Thank you.
- 2665 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Madam Chair?
- 2666 Chairperson Botel: Yes. You're recognized.
- Councilperson Miller-Anderson: 2667 I'm very happy any activity is taking place in
- 2668 my...
- 2669 **Chairperson Botel:** [Chuckle].
- 2670 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: ...District, but just help me remember as to why
- we're doing this street, as opposed to other streets? Is there a serious concern with this 2671
- 2672 street?
- Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Well, you'll recall, in the last round of bond 2673
- funding, we did Avenue H East, Avenue H West and 34<sup>th</sup> Street. 2674
- 2675 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Mhmm.
- 2676 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: And, Ms. Bessie Brown...
- **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** 2677 I know.
- 2678 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...who was at many a meeting.
- 2679 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Mhmm.
- Interim Public Works Director Bailey: And I assured her she was next, as soon as we 2680
- got to doing some of the smaller minor streets, because hers was left off in that sort of 2681
- 2682 run that we did. So, this is the next street in that area. And, as promised to Ms. Brown,
- 2683 she was next, and it was in need in order to finish that sort of connective tissue for 34th
- 2684 Street where it loops around.

- 2685 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** So, what about the other loop on the south side,
- from 34<sup>th</sup>... How.., I mean, why thirty'.., why that one other than Ms. Brown? I understand
- 2687 Ms. Brown requested it.
- 2688 Chairperson Botel: [Chuckle].
- 2689 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** But, you do know I have a few other people that
- ask about 20<sup>th</sup> Street all the time. So, I know that's further away, but the same concern
- is there, that that street hasn't been done either. So, how does that curve [pause] such
- a priority over... even the one that's south of 34<sup>th</sup>? There's another one that, if you pull
- the map up, I can't think of the name.
- 2694 Councilperson McCoy: 33<sup>rd</sup>.
- 2695 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: 33<sup>rd</sup>?
- 2696 Councilperson McCoy: Mhmm.
- 2697 **Chairperson Botel:** Yeah.
- 2698 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 2699 **Chairperson Botel:** [Inaudible].
- 2700 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** So, how, how do we leave 33<sup>rd</sup> out and,
- and do thirty'...
- 2702 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Well typically, we, we have a limited amount of
- funding. So, we generally try to anticipate anywhere from six hundred to a million dollars
- a year for road. This project comes in right at about a million, so that's all we can do in
- this Fiscal Year. So, if you look.., during the budget, in the five-year capital plan, all the
- 2706 roads are laid out for the next five years that we anticipate doing. That does presume
- that we'll have enough funding to fully fund all the road construction. So this was laid out
- in the budget process, in the five yar capital plan.
- 2709 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** But what criteria process was put in place to pick
- that street though? That I, I'm not clear on. Because I have other residents, like the one
- where the seawall is on... off of... just south of Blue Heron, was it 25<sup>th</sup> Street? East 25<sup>th</sup>
- 2712 Street?
- 2713 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes.
- 2714 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Where it floods, and they've been having quite
- a few problems with the high tide. So, and I know that one I was told, would not be in the
- works for another two or three years. And so, I'm just trying to.., how do we, how do we
- 2717 determine what streets are in need?

- 2718 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: About six years.., six or seven years ago now,
- we had done a payment analysis study, which helped us create a larger capital program.
- 2720 Remember, before we got [inaudible], when we did the analysis to see where we needed
- the investment the most, for the most part, we were following that plan. It's probably due
- in the next two years for an update, since it'll be over ten years old, but we followed the
- 2723 plan from the payment analysis as best as possible.
- 2724 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** So, you're saying that 35<sup>th</sup> Street, in the
- 2725 analysis, that 35<sup>th</sup> Street was one of the high priorities, based on whatever formula was
- in place?
- 2727 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: I, I believe so. But again, it's been probably a
- 2728 year since we've looked picking this street as the next street. Obviously, because we had
- 2729 already done Avenue H East and H West, and then 34th Street, we left stuff out at other
- future improving, so we wanna continue and finish that segment, so we can then move to
- another area in that general region. For infrastructure.
- 2732 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** I still am not clear on how that one was picked,
- is my concern. Because, I have a lot of residents that feel that their street needs to be
- 2734 redone. And some I know... Like, I mentioned before about the flooding that happens,
- 2735 not even when it's raining. They send pictures about their street flooding because of high
- tide. And then also, I have the people that complain about the 20th Street, with the pot'...,
- well, not even just potholes, just it hasn't been done in a while. So, I just want to make
- sure, on record, that you are saying that the 35th Street is being done because it wasn't...
- an analysis was done for it and it was a high priority that we followed, and not that it was
- just because of a person requesting their street to be done. Because if that's the case,
- we're gonna have numerous people asking why isn't their street being done. Which they
- 2742 already do. So, I just wanna be able to say this is why we are doing this. And I'm pretty
- confident, and I know you're pretty confident, in saying that the reason why we're doing
- 2744 this particular street is because there was something in place to say that this street
- 2745 needed to be done. Because I don't want it to be very similar to how people are
- 2746 complaining about certain...
- 2747 **Councilperson McCoy:** [Clears throat].
- 2748 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** ...lighting done on certain streets.
- 2749 **Councilperson McCoy:** Oh, okay.
- 2750 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** I'm not talking about your lights.
- 2751 [Chuckles]
- 2752 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** So, I just wanna make sure that that's... that we
- can go to something in black and white to, to make the residents understand that we just
- 2754 did not randomly pick a street to do.

- 2755 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: I'll go back into the payment analysis and grab
- 2756 the [inaudible] and provide you a copy, and memorandum to follow through the Manager's
- 2757 office.
- 2758 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Thank you so much.
- 2759 **Councilperson McCoy:** Follow up.
- 2760 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead, Mr. McCoy.
- 2761 **Councilperson McCoy:** I, I would like to see that. And not only that, this backup
- 2762 doesn't contain any design information. And I don't wanna be surprised because, you
- know, I kinda took some shots relative to some street designs and, you know, how do we
- figure out that, because that's not contained. We're authorizing the expenditure but what
- 2765 does the design look like? And I'm more or less...
- 2766 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: This Resolution is authorizing execution of the
- 2767 grant agreement so we can send it back to Palm Beach County to get the bonds. It
- 2768 probably is in design right now. It is sub'.., substantively similar to what's there now.
- 2769 Right now, there's about twenty-four, twenty-five feet of asphalt, a swale and the
- sidewalks are out on the edge of the right-of-way, next to the [Inaudible] Homes. And
- 2771 that is, to the most part, how it will stay. When we build the road, we will be putting in
- 2772 curbing gutter. There will be a grass strip behind it, and then the sidewalks will be
- replaced because they're only four feet wide right now and they'll go up to the new.., the
- 2774 standard of five-foot wide sidewalks on that road.
- 2775 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right. And so, that is so perfect that the gentlewoman from
- 2776 the 2<sup>nd</sup> District. Like, that is important. Like, so now, if we're expanding sidewalks, we
- 2777 need to have a conversation with the community. Right? Because that means
- somebody's gonna lose some property somewhere.
- 2779 Chairperson Botel: Right.
- 2780 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: No, sir. It will expand in toward the road, in the
- 2781 right-of-way. So we have, we have plenty of roadway...
- 2782 Councilperson McCoy: Well...
- 2783 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...to do all that work...
- 2784 Councilperson McCoy: Sir?
- 2785 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...inside the road.
- 2786 **Councilperson McCoy:** But, but even still, right, when you look at a resident's property
- on the property map, it extends to the sidewalk. But more or less, even the area on the
- other side of the sidewalk, on the City side, belongs to the resident because they're
- responsible for the maintenance. I just don't want people to be surprised. Like, what

- happened in Monroe Heights. And I'll tell you, it's just a simple communication and conversation is, 'This is the plan that that's being proposed.' You know, if we send them a mailout and nobody responds, then I'm alright with that, but we got hit really hard in Monroe Heights. Not only that, the gentlewoman and I from H Avenue East and West, still are getting hit regarding the bicycle lanes and, you know, that's.., that's going on H Avenue.
- So, I just really wanna make sure that, you know, we're not being.., we're, we're doing this in a silo, a vacuum, that, you know, we decide what' best for the residents and then when they find out the plan and the construction crew is already out there building, as opposed to say, 'Hey, here's a notice. This is what's proposed. Public Works telephone number for comments or questions is,' you know, 'x, y, and z.'
- Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes, sir. We will put that out. I believe the next submittal from the consultant is probably four or five weeks away and I'll have a..., I think we're in the eighty to ninety percent plan range. It's not too late to make any deviations that re necessary and we can hold a, a community, a public meeting in reference to the budgeting, to bring the community up to speed on the design elements.
- 2806 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** That'll be good.
- 2807 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Mhmm.
- 2808 **Chairperson Botel:** That would be great.
- 2809 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Madam Chair?
- 2810 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Anything else?
- 2811 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Yes.
- 2812 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. Lawson.
- 2813 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Thank you. And, that was actually exactly my question and wanting to see if you could provide a complete outline of the steps after we received and 2814 2815 approved this grant tonight. I know we're just approving the acceptance of this community grant but an outline what are the next steps gonna be once the funds come in so the 2816 2817 community can be aware so that we don't have the same issues that we've had in the 2818 other sections of the City. Specific District. So, what we wanna do is just get an outline so that Council can be aware and that the residents can be updated as well. So, that 2819 notice and update to the residents is a perfect representation of what we wanna offer for 2820
- the two-way communication.

- 2861 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: We have a..., we had a line item for traffic
- 2862 calming, not speed bumps.
- 2863 Councilperson McCoy: Well...
- 2864 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Traffic calming in the broadest sense. It could
- be..., there are a number of methods to achieve traffic calming. There is a traffic calming
- application process that you're familiar with.
- 2867 Councilperson McCoy: Mhmm.

- bump, but a speed bump is not always the appropriate answer to...

- 2917 City Clerk Anthony: Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we have public
- comment on this Item. The acceptance of public comment on this Item is now closed.
- 2919 **Councilperson McCoy:** So moved.
- 2920 **Chairperson Botel:** Do we have...
- 2921 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Second.
- 2922 **Chairperson Botel:** ...a sec'... Thank you. Mr. Bailey.
- 2923 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes. This project is a long time coming,
- 2924 approximately six to eight years to be exact. I would like to thank the Manager and you,
- 2925 [inaudible] your patience on this project.
- As you know, Palm Beach Isles, it was in dire need of replacement of the six
- 2927 bridges that lead over to the Island. It was determined about five years ago that the...
- 2928 we're coming to the end of their useful life. We began the design process and while I
- 2929 understand five years is a long time, please understand that there Johnson's seagrasses
- 2930 underneath the bridges, there are endangered species and we just, about four or five
- weeks ago, received our permit from the Army Corp of Engineers. It took all of that time
- in order to do investigation, litigation and nature of the impact those endangered species
- as little as possible.
- 2934 **Councilperson McCoy:** Can't hear you, Mr. Bailey.
- 2935 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: [Inaudible].
- 2936 **Councilperson McCoy:** Can you speak up or maybe your battery is dead.
- 2937 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Mhmm. Can we find out?
- 2938 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: [Inaudible].
- 2939 **Chairperson Botel:** Yeah. I [inaudible]...
- 2940 [Chuckles]
- 2941 [Pause]
- 2942 **Chairperson Botel:** Oh, I can... that's better already. Thank you, Walter.
- 2943 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: And with that, I'll take any questions.

- 2944 [Chuckles]
- **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Yeah, right. [Inaudible].
- **Chairperson Botel:** Any questions for...
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Public comments.
- 2948 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: [Inaudible].
- **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. Lawson, none? Public comment, Madam Chair'..., Madam
- 2950 Clerk.

- **City Clerk Anthony:** Fane Lozman.
- Mr. F. Lozman: Fane Lozman. Why don't the five of you just give all the City to Singer Island? \$4,000,000? Do you know the story behind those islands? Why don't we talk about that. Those islands were formed by being filled in from a TIFF deed from 1924. So, that, that... what do they call that? Palm Beach Islands? Palm Beach Isles? Palm Beach Isles... Real smug, Ms. Botel, I'm glad you're having a good time. Palm Beach Isles was part of a TIFF deed that the state sold in 1924. That also included our property in the lagoon area. So they filled it in, and they have an HOA. Okay? You don't see no black residents walking down that island, I guarantee it. Okay? A developer filled it in and built it and platted it for single family homes. Let them go ahead and pay.., and pay for the bridges. \$4,000,000. Let the HOA pay for it. You know, what you guys don't understand, is we are gonna fill in our property 'cause we don't need a City permit, we need a permit from DEP. We're gonna fill in our property. And you know we're gonna build a road. We're gonna pay for it. The City isn't gonna pay for it. Okay? The same thing with Palm Beach Isles, why is the City taxpayers paying for their bridges? Let them pay for it. They got a HOA, [inaudible] private development. The City didn't pay to fill in that property, the Palm Beach Isles developer paid to fill it in.

What is wrong with you guys? What's wrong with you, Ms. Anderson? Is this just a big giveaway to the.., from the westside? Do you know how many hundreds of millions of dollars is coming down in, in liability from your stupid vote tonight? And this is just another example. Do you care about anything? I mean, who got to you guys? It's unbelievable. Has anybody bothered to ask a question, 'Well, how was Palm Beach Isles formed? Who paid for it?' Did you look at the plat? Did he put up the plat for Palm Beach Isles? I mean, it's unbelievable. You're like a bunch of little sheep. Whatever Botel says, 'Okay, Botel, we'll vote however you want. We'll do this, we'll do that. You guys are clueless. At least Lawson, as a businessman, should have some kind of a clue what's going on. Lawson was given a tour of our property a week ago. Ms. Miller-Anderson was given a tour three years ago, and, and Evans came out three years go. And they.., all three of them said it should be developed. And now, 'cause Botel says, 'Oh please, let's get in a giant lawsuit for the next three or four years.' She'll be gone. She'll probably be in jail by then for what's going on.

- Hey, how.., who's your criminal attorney that's going on the 23<sup>rd</sup> to Tallahassee with you, Botel? Yeah. To State Ethics Board. Oh yeah. They called me up and invited me if I wanna go there. Yeah. Running a business outta your City Hall office, we'll see how far you get.
- The bottom line is, I wanna know how Palm Beach Isles was formed. I wanna see a plat of it, I wanna see the deed. I wanna know why the westside residents, and myself, are paying for anything on that island. That's.., that is nonsense. But go right ahead. Go ahead and just give all the money. You're gonna all learn a, a hard lesson. Listening to Botel [inaudible]...
- 2991 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you, Mr. Lozman. Your time...
- 2992 **Mr. F. Lozman:** ...that led you down a bad...
- 2993 Chairperson Botel: ...has expired.
- 2994 **Mr. F. Lozman:** ...path, guys.
- 2995 [Timer]
- 2996 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you...
- 2997 [Timer]
- 2998 **Mr. F. Lozman:** You'll find out.
- 2999 Chairperson Botel: ...Mr. Lozman.
- 3000 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Madam Chair?
- 3001 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. Go ahead, Mr. Lawson.
- 3002 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Thank you. Mr. Bailey, looking at the RFP that went out...
- 3003 posted May 25th, bids received June 25th. Tell me a little bit about the MBE/WMBE
- 3004 participation.
- 3005 **Mr. F. Lozman:** Ms. Pemsel. [Inaudible]. Ms. Pemsel, our Purchasing Director, will
- 3006 be able to provide you information on that.
- 3007 **Councilperson McCoy:** Go to the podium, Ms. Pemsel. [Stammer]...
- 3008 [Inaudible discussions]
- 3009 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Good evening, Mayor and Council...
- 3010 Chairperson Botel: Good evening.
- 3011 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** ...Administration.

- 3012 As.., for this particular solicitation, we had twenty-one [inaudible] holders. We received five proposals from Brothers', Continental, Kelley, Lambert and Vecellio. 3013 Brothers' is the company that is the lowest most responsible bidder. We did a outreach 3014 3015 specifically for this for..., on the 28<sup>th</sup> of September. We didn't get much of a response, but we're holding another outreach on the 20th of October. Currently, for the type of work, 3016 there's 7.1 percent in MBE that's going to be awarded already. We hope to increase that 3017 3018 number with the participation... in anticipation of our 20<sup>th</sup> of October meeting, where we 3019 are having another outreach program. We didn't have any success with getting anyone 3020 to come to the table the first time, which is why we're trying it a second time.
- 3021 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Okay. So, Ms. Pemsel, there's 7.1 percent of MBE?
- 3022 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** It is 7.1 percent of small business.
- 3023 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: So, SBE.
- 3024 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Mhmm.
- 3025 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Okay. Where do we stand with the, the hiring of out consultant
- and the work that was done with Mr. Lee?
- Procurement Director Pemsel: We have already engaged Mr. Lee under contract, and we have had two meeting already, and we're having a third meeting on Thursday to look
- at the data, to see exactly what else is needed to be added. In our first meeting, we sh'...
- 3030 I showed him our software systems and I showed him some data that we were able to get
- out of the Tyler System, and gave him a copy of the Procurement Code for him to review.
- 3032 So tomorrow, we'll be reviewing some elements of the Procurement Code, looking at the
- commodity codes and how we can do end to end information. So, we're in, in the process.
- 3034 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Okay. So, it just seems like we've been doing a lot of
- meetings when it comes to Mr. Lee, and I don't wanna see any additional RFP's coming
- before us that haven't had his hands or eyes on this, to make sure that we're actually
- $3037\,$  getting the maximum exposure for MBE and WMBE programs. Because, I saw the
- 3038 marketing that we did recently, and...
- 3039 [Inaudible background discussion]
- 3040 **Councilperson McCoy:** It doesn't.
- 3041 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: ...I'm not sure how much exposure got to our residents
- because there was little marketing done on that. I saw the flyer that went out and did not
- 3043 go out the way that it needed to. And with him being the consultant to give the exposure
- 3044 to these businesses, and small businesses, in regards to responding to the RFP's,
- partnering with these organizations and getting properly trained and certified, those are
- things that we need to implore our residents to do.
- 3047 [Inaudible background discussion]

3048 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: So, I'm not okay with 7.1 percent of this \$4,000,000 project going to MBE and WMBE programs, because the minimum we need to be looking at with 3049 3050 a disparity study is twenty-five percent, to thirty percent. That's with the study in place. 3051 That's why we failed as leaders in the community with implementing a disparity study that should be already done. So, what we're going to push for and I'm hoping that I can get 3052 3053 the support from my colleagues, which they've been getting, is to get this done. But just 3054 to continue to meet with Mr. Lee is not acceptable. We need to implement action and 3055 making sure that his hands are on everything because he's established the study with the 3056 School District and also West Palm Beach, and the county. So, the fact that he's actually 3057 accomplished that, that's something that we need to do. And to continue to see these come before the table, \$4,000,000, seven percent is going to, not WMBE, or MBE, I see 3058 3059 specifically that they do not have an acknowledgement of what is going to MBE and 3060 WMBE. Those are going to SBE, which is appreciated but it's not effecting truly and 3061 impacting what a majority of this community needs. We have to raise the median income of our residents, and before we leave office, we have to impact that. Twenty-two five is 3062 3063 unacceptable, to have a majority of the residents here in this community receiving that amount of income. So, if we can impact them by allowing for \$4,000,000 in one project 3064 3065 to go back into our residents, we need to do that, Ms. Pemsel.

So I'm not gonna support this because I cannot support 7.1 percent going towards small businesses in the community. And, the other three hundred and fifty.., I'm sorry, the \$3.5MM going outside of our community.

Thank you, Ms. Pemsel.

3070 [Clapping]

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3071 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair?

3072 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. Mr. McCoy.

3073 **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you. You know, I gotta really tip my hat to Councilman Lawson for his, you know, efforts in making sure that there's a MWBE participation, and 3074 I think I've shared this, I enjoy that benefit in my own business. And, I think it's important 3075 3076 but, you know, it's one of those situations and I know I don't want to gamble with Public Safety. And we had an Item come up under Utility Special District where the numbers 3077 weren't exactly what we have..., would've liked for that but, you know, the saying, 'You 3078 3079 build it, they'll come,' isn't always true in this situation. Councilman Lawson, you know, 3080 I'm not gonna suggest that you go out and find these contractors and tell them about the procurement opportunity that's out there but, gosh, I should know the, the website that all 3081

procurement goes through across the state. What is it? I should know this.

3083 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** DemandStar?

3084 Councilperson McCoy: I'm sorry?

3085 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: DemandStar?

3086 Councilperson McCoy: DemandStar.

3087 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Mhmm.

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3088 **Councilperson McCoy:** And, I mean, it's literally there but, Councilman Lawson, I don't 3089 wanna vote no on a Item, me, personally, if somebody just doesn't come and compete. 3090 And, and I mean, I think that's only fair, but if they're there and they've put in a concerted and good faith effort, then absolutely, they deserve a seat at the table to compete. Not 3091 to be given anything because this is free marketing, I believe in being competitive and, 3092 3093 you know, that's just the way it works. That's the whole basis of a competitive process, . 3094 But I can't, in good conscious, and I understand what your position is, but I can't, in good conscious, not care for some of our very critical capital needs, water being one of them. 3095 3096 streets being one of them. Certainly, a bridge being another one. And, I mean, I think it 3097 was up on the Treasure Coast where we seen a bridge collapse. I'm not about to do that. 3098 And, you know, the notion that was suggested about a private developer... Yeah, that generally happens all across the community. Congress is full of private developments 3099 3100 that were done by private developments.

And, you know, here's the conversation that we had, and I know Mr. Bailey and also Ms. Noel, and as well as the Manager, we sat in on a very interesting Waste Management conversation with members in District 1, and I'm sure everyone else had a very engaging meeting but one of the things that came up was the fact that we live in communities where we have HOA's and it's essentially double taxation. And I, and I, and I don't disagree with that, but that is kinda the nature of it. If you go into a community where there's special assessments and HOA dues, that's kinda why you go there in the first place. But, us as a City, we still have a duty to provide trash, we have a duty to provide water, and we have a duty to provide safe and operable streets. Now, the regular routine maintenance is probably maintained on a regular basis by the HOA, but by no means am I gonna ever sit here and suggest three wasn't enough minorities. I mean, what else do we need to do? And I mean, I would really make you the Chairperson of a ad hoc committee to figure out what we need to do to bring those people that you represent that need to have a seat at the table here so we can do it. And a matter fact. I think we have something this week. Do we not? Do we not have something this week regarding subcontractors, or did it occur already?

- 3117 **Chairperson Botel:** That's what she mentioned.
- 3118 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** [Inaudilbe]...
- 3119 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Did she...
- Procurement Director Pemsel: ...meting occurred the 28th of September. The other
- one is scheduled for the 20<sup>th</sup> of October.
- 3122 **Councilperson McCoy:** But, you know, Councilman Lawson, I'm with you. You know,
- and again, I benefit from those same protections that's made available, but I don't wanna
- 3124 sit here and suggest that we're not being fair to people, if they're not even coming in. I
- mean, like, let me tell you, I would love to have a, a job being a CEO of IBM. I've never

- 3126 applied, so I would never get it. I would love to win the lottery but if I don't play, I'm not
- gonna win it. So, Councilman Lawson, you know let's figure out a way to get those folks 3127
- in here and I'm, I'm gonna support you on that all the way but I can't not support critical 3128
- 3129 capital infrastructure needs because, you know, I don't wanna be on the other end of
- 3130 trynna figure out how do we settle a catastrophe like we just had a water main to go out.
- And that's because.., I, I have to take that critically. Police, Fire, Water, streets, trash 3131
- 3132 collection, we have some core essential functions that we have to handle. The rest of it,
- 3133 you know, is really good but I, I just can't gamble with it because, you know, if we wait on
- people, we'll be waiting 'til, I think, Mr. Brown said he grew a beard. You know... 3134
- 3135 [Chuckle]
- Councilperson McCoy: ...so, we'll, we'll be waiting forever. So, I.., you know, I 3136
- respect what it is that you're doing but I just respectfully have a different position on, on 3137
- moving forward these critical capital needs. 3138
- 3139 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you, Mr. McCoy. Mr. Lawson.
- 3140 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** To respond. Thank you, Madam Chair. And, and Councilman
- 3141 McCoy, I truly understand that we have to protect the infrastructure of our communities
- but.., and keep our residents safe. And, that's where I believe, Mr. Evans, this is more 3142
- 3143 so coming from your dais that we need this process expedited. We have a half a billion
- dollars worth of development happening over the next five to ten years. And you're 3144
- 3145 adamant about doing it, but if we continue to let these projects push through because we
- have to protect the residents and make sure this bridge is done... Mr. Bailey just told us 3146
- 3147 it's been five years to get a permit. So, we should've already put a disparity study in
- 3148 place.
- 3149 So, Mr. Evans, if you can make sure that this gets done. And thank you for taking
- it into your office, but I need this process expedited. Because we cannot wait to get this 3150
- 3151 process done. I'm completely in line with Councilman McCoy. I still cannot support this
- because if we don't.., do not put our foot down and determine, as a dais, that we're not 3152
- 3153 gonna allow for companies to come in here and not employ..., and employ the residents
- 3154
- of this community, then they're never gonna take us seriously. So, Mr. Evans, this does
- start with you in regards to getting this disparity study passed and making sure that Mr. 3155
- 3156 Franklin Lee has his hands on the process and the projects that go out. Because, yes,
- 3157 we did have an event on the 28th but the marketing went out on the 23rd. So, four days
- 3158 notice is not sufficient. And I did share the flyer the minute it was posted. So, how are
- 3159 we gonna say that we're giving the right opportunities to our residents and we're telling
- 3160 them about what's happening, when we're not doing our job?
- 3161 Unk. Audience: [Inaudible comment].
- 3162 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** So, I really want us to start doing our job, Mr. Evans, and that's
- 3163 what I'm asking. And, thank you for taking it on. I don't wanna continue to have meetings.
- 3164 Ms. Pemsel, I want this done. And this what I've saying from day one. No one 3165 has asked me to do this, I've been consistent and steadfast on this process, so I want this

- to happen. I agree we have to keep Public Safety proper, but it.., this needs to happen.
- This is my priority, that we get this implemented and changed and impact this community
- 3168 for generations to come.
- 3169 Chairperson Botel: Thank you...
- 3170 **City Manager Evans:** Madam...
- 3171 Chairperson Botel: ...Mr. Lawson.
- 3172 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, if I..., if I may?
- 3173 Chairperson Botel: Mr. Evans.
- 3174 **City Manager Evans:** We will set up an opportunity for Mr. Lee to participate in your
- next regular meeting, just to give you an update on the discussions that have happened
- as it relates to the Staff conversation. Because, what is happening, is they're actually
- building out the program. So, we wanna update you on the progress that has been made.
- 3178 And one of the items that certainly will be coming before the Board, as a major contract,
- that is a forty plus million dollar contract, is our Waste Management contract. And, part of the arrangement with Mr. Lee is to assist in facilitating that contract to ensure that we
- of the arrangement with Mr. Lee is to assist in facilitating that contract to ensure that we
- have participation and inclusion into processes. So, we can bring an update to the Board
- and a timeline as to what we can anticipate in delivering something that we can hold on
- to, to be able to ensure that we hit the mark that the Board is looking for, with regards to
- local participation, small business and minority and women owned business participation.
- 3185 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you, Mr. Evans. Anything else from [stammer] any
- 3186 other Councilperson? I wanted to thank...
- 3187 Councilperson Lanier: Yes. Madam Chair?
- 3188 Chairperson Botel: Oh, sorry.
- 3189 [Chuckles]
- 3190 **Chairperson Botel:** Ms. Lanier, go right ahead.
- 3191 Councilperson Lanier: I, I just wanted to say, I, I do agree with Councilman Lawson's
- passion for the MBE program, because it's..., that it's sorely needed with the City, and I
- do understand that there's a process that it has to go through. I don't think that Ms.., it is
- Ms. Pemsel's fault that there is a process that has to be completed before we get to doing
- 3195 the work that we need to do. And I think that the work is being done.
- I want to give the attorney..., Attorney Lee and his staff the opportunity to, to work.
- And I think that they're working as we speak. You know, if anything, we can do a special
- meeting calling for SBE's and, and MBE's to come and, and review with the City.
- We can.., we, we definitely need to develop some team requirements for solicitation. We
- have to look at mentoring protégé's, other joint venture'..., other joint ventures or other

- team requirements in going forward. And I, I certainly agree with Councilman McCoy in
- terms of not allowing for infrastructure to go.., to go un'.., you know, to not be worked
- because of the lack of having this policy in place as we speak. We still have the business.
- And I think that the attorney.., Attorney Lee and his staff are doing the work that needs to
- be done, but I think there's an opportunity for us, in the meantime, to implement small
- business policies that does not take his work..., to wait on his work, we can do something
- ourself. With introducing small business policies. We can introduce, like I said, protégé
- and, and, and mentor programs. We just need to be able to just wait on Dr. Lee and his
- 3209 staff to finish their work, but to also, at the same time, implement small business policy
- 3210 for the City as it is.
- 3211 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. McCoy, you're recognized.
- 3212 **Councilperson McCoy:** My last appeal to my Commissioner from the 5<sup>th</sup> District.
- 3213 Where's the District at?
- 3214 [Chuckle]
- 3215 **Councilperson McCoy:** Oh, that's right, it covers the whole City. I.., you know, in, in
- 3216 the spirit of reasoning and, and just trying to take care of some of the very important
- things that... You know, when we got here, it was, like, so much that we had to address,
- and I really want your support on this.
- 3219 **Councilperson Lanier:** Say that again. Say it again.
- 3220 **Councilperson McCoy:** I want your support, Commissioner Lawson. And then, you
- know, I'd be happy to, you know, see what we can do to, you know, drive this, this other
- initiative home with getting as many people that... You know, and then, obviously, that's
- why we're here tomorrow. Right? That's one of the reasons why we're having a special
- meeting tomorrow. And, you know, I get it. Again, Councilman Lawson, I benefit from
- 3225 this. So I know firsthand. But I never would've gotten that benefit if I didn't go through
- what it took to become a, a MWBE through Palm Beach County.
- 3227 So, that's all I have. I yield back.
- 3228 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you, Mr. McCoy. I wanted to take this opportunity to
- thank Mr. Bailey and, and Mr. Evans for spending one hot, very hot, day out there at that
- bridge, listening to the people who live there, making the modifications that they asked
- for, doing it in a very timely manner and with graciousness. And I really appreciated that.
- 3232 It's a, an extremely dangerous situation out there, as you well know. Those bridges are
- in dire need of repair and, and its, it's really important for us to get this done now and not
- 3234 to wait any longer. But thank you again for the time you took to make the changes that
- 3235 hey asked for. I appreciate it.

This proposed settlement in Riviera Community Development Land Trust with HRY Development, LLC intends to resolve the issues associated with the four Brooks subdivision parcels, in addition to the four interpleader cases associated with those parcels. Pursuant to the settlement agreement, HRY would execute a quick claim deed in favor of the City for all four Brooks subdivision parcels. As you all know, we have been trying to obtain title to the four Brooks parcels for quite some time now so that we can convey them to the county and they can develop the twenty-two Brooks subdivision parcels; the eighteen already owned by the county, and the four that the City would receive as a result of this settlement.

In addition, HRY would donate a total of \$25,000 to the Housing Trust Fund which is under the City. That would assist in down payment assistance to qualified homebuyers for..., in a first-time homebuyer's program. They also would pay the City the remaining nine'..., ninety-two hundred dollars..., well, \$9,290.69 in outstanding Utility liens that are attached to the..., to their parcels. They would forego any interest or entitlement to the surplus on the four interpleader cases in the Brooks..., in the Brooks cases that are listed. That amount of the surplus is \$51,881.74. In exchange, the City would agree to release all City Code and lot clearing liens on the parcels owned by HRY within the municipal boundaries of the City and issue a proclamation acknowledging HRY's past and continued efforts to provide affordable housing to the residents and citizens of the City.

In addition, HRY will also work with the.., our adult reentry program in their on-thejob training program, and use their best efforts to use qualified apprentices reg'.., registered with our program in the development and construction of the homes that they plan to put on the HRY parcels.

I bring this before you for consideration and approval, as it is in the best interest of the City.

The total amount of the Code Enforcement liens comes to \$578,225.00. That's on Page 8 of the settlement agreement, which was provided as backup. There's also a total of lot clearing liens at \$148,026.51. As part of this settlement agreement, Mr. Hankin, through his company, HRY Parcels, has the responsibility to pay all Utility liens and so far he has paid close to \$14,000 in liens, and I believe there's a remaining balance of \$9,290, which he'll be required to pay within a few days of this settlement.

- 3406 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair and Members of the Board, this Item before you is to enter into a master lease agreement with Enterprise Fleet Management. This Item was discussed at the Staff level to look at ways to modernize the City's fleet, while also looking to save the City money over a significant period of time. We have representatives from Enterprise that will share a little bit of information concerning the program and we believe that this will allow for us to have a fleet that reflects the new imagine and new
- brand that the City is looking to move forward with. So, I will allow for Chief Osgood to
- introduce his team and then we'll take it from there.
- Police Chief Osgood: Good evening, Board. Mr. Mayor, Madam Chair, thank you for letting me present tonight.
- Anyway, I have Ms. Christina Anthony and Ms. Kat Williams from Enterprise. And so, they're gonna talk to you about the proposal they have for us. And the reason why this comes up, the police's fleet was aging, and we have a number of problems with our police vehicles that sometimes we cannot get our police officer out on the street fast enough. So, this is why we bring this, this presentation to you tonight.
- Thank you.
- Ms. C. Anthony: Good evening, Mayor, Councilpersons, Chair and the City Attorney.
  My name is Christina Anthony. I'm with Enterprise Fleet Management. I'm an account executive. And with me is Kat Williams. She's an account manager, also with Enterprise Fleet Management. We appreciate everyone's time this evening and for us to be able to present tonight.
- Today I want to discuss how, according to what Chief mentioned, we're able to help the City refresh its fleet, old aging fleet, with new vehicles, at current [stammer] budget or below. And, in today's meeting, our obj'..., objective is to want to introduce Enterprise, our background, some of the government agencies that we are working with, the programs that we are customizing for the City of Riviera Beach, how that cus'..., that concept will assist the City with savings and efficiencies, and some of the current areas of opportunities with the City's fleet today.

Enterprise Fleet Management.., Enterprise Holdings is the parent company. We've been in business for over sixty years. We are the largest transportation company worldwide. Our business lines are as follows, most properly known Enterprise Rent-A-Car, Alamo National and our truck rental brands, due to our retail footprint. However, tonight, myself and Kat represent the Enterprise Fleet Management brand. And, we assist entities, both on the public and private sector in their current fleet and helping them consult on ways to provide savings and efficiencies.

How that drills down in the government sector. We have over fourteen hundred government clients here in the U.S., and over a hundred here in the State of Florida. Our program is nationally vetted as the number one fleet management company to help government agencies. We are vetted under Sourcewell, ENIN Tips [sp]And so, our program was vetted under those as well. On a local level, some of our clientele is the City of Fort Pierce, City of Stuart, Palm Beach Gardens, Lake Park Shores, City of Miami Gardens, City of North Lauderdale, Pompano Beach, City of Hollywood, City of Lauderdale Lakes, and Coral Springs. They all came onboard and [stammer] we have a customized program for them, to help with efficiencies and savings. So, these are some of the local agencies that, you know, currently use our, our services today.

The current fleet situation and with our experience in working with government entities, looks at the fleet in two different funds, both your capital fund and your operating fund. One of the main strategies or, or concepts that cities look at fleets, is typically whenever we're looking to put money into the capital budget, if there are any issues such as pandemic, like it is now, the capital budget typically can be reduced. So, Enterprise is looking to help maximize that capital budget, and also take in account the operating budget so that we can help the City save overall on a total cost level. Our proactive approach will allow us to assist the City save over \$400,000, with a eight-year proactive plan. We're also looking to present different funding strategies to help the City with cashflow, so they, they can purchase the new vehicles within the [stammer], the budget and obviously, affect the maintenance and fuel budgets as well.

Key objectives for, for us to help the City. There's about ten different things that go into operating and, and managing a fleet, everything from acquisition to the way you fund your vehicles, the decisions and processes of operating those vehicles all the way to resale. Enterprise has a program and will help the City of Riviera Beach consult on all of those different areas, and we'll.., we will help the City identify ways to provide savings and efficiencies in each of those areas. In addition to that, Enterprise has invested millions of dollars in technology that will come free to the.., or come with the program to the City so that you can continue to track the cost and the analysis that we put together for the City annually.

On a conceptual level, the way Enterprise is looking at the City's fleet, we look at a total cost to own the vehicle, everything from depreciation, your operating expenses, down time and we're identifying what the current City's fleet is today and how we can help reduce those costs in each of those areas. So this is an illustration of a cost of a truck when you purchase a vehicle. If it's a \$25,000 truck and you just paid \$25,000 on that one truck, there were other costs that was associated with that particular vehicle, so

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Enterprise is looking at all of those different areas as we present today on some of those programs and plans to be proactive.

Enterprise's concept and what we do as a company for not only ourselves but for our business clients, is we look at a proactive approach. We have the data and analytics for over sixty years, we identify the right time to sell those vehicles. Vehicles are a depreciating asset. The great thing with government agencies, is that you have piggybacking contracts such as Florida Sheriff's Association and Sourcewell, where you get great pricing. So, in this illustration on a truck, you can get over \$11,000 of a savings just from the purchasing side. Well, combining that with Enterprise's resources to sell the vehicles at the optimal time, where there is equity still in the vehicle, can allow the City to lower its depreciating costs. So, in this illustration, it's showing that that \$21,000 vehicle, that the City was able to purchase it at, with the contract, by selling it strategically in this illustration at five years, we're able to sell it for \$14,000, lowering that depreciation cost of only \$7,000. In addition to that, by operating this new vehicle, you've gotten... you've operated the vehicle with the latest fuel technology, so the fuel efficiency, as well as its maintenance, so those costs will be a lot lower in its earlier terms, as your operating a new vehicle versus waiting at a later time when you're operating the vehicle at ten years or older.

An area of opportunity that we're also helping the City with is the maintenance shop. Currently, the staffing level is having a hard time to support all of the maintenance for the entire City's fleet. So what has been suggested is Enterprise does have a maintenance program. We were looking to pilot out the City's police fleet to local maintenance shops here in the City of Riviera Beach, so you'll still be supporting the City's maintenance shop here, and the tax base here in the City of Riviera Beach. It will also help alleviate some of the staffing burdens for your maintenance shop, and make sure that all of the vehicles are being maintained at the right time, and with efficiencies. The great benefits of that maintenance program as well, is we do have a fixed and budgeted program that will be going on a portion of the fleet and the rest of it will be a pass through that is at a discounted national rate from Enterprise's program.

Something to illustrate in terms of fuel. As you see new vehicles come out, such as hybrid and electric vehicles and the City's operating and transitioning into a new fleet, we can take advantage of operating the most fuel efficient vehicles based on those new technologies that are coming out, so a new vehicle we know its fuel efficiency will increase year over year, which will help drive savings in that area as opposed to how the City is currently operating today where there are old vehicles and there's fuel degradation. So, there's an opportunity cost there by operating new vehicles as it relates to fuel efficiency.

Looking at the current City's fleet as it is today, as we evaluated over two hundred and eighty-three vehicles, there's about twenty-eight percent of the fleet that is ten years or older, so that's seventy-nine vehicles and sixty-four percent of that fleet that is no longer under warranty. So, Enterprise is going to look at addressing this fleet immediately to help the City get to the point of where it's looking to achieve its..., the initiatives and provide the most savings.

In addition to that, explaining some of the funding options that will be a change for the City. We are presenting an open-end lease. It's a financing structure that our other cities are taking advantage of, as well as our private companies. It is a lease that is a little more flexible than what others are used to, so there are no mileage restrictions, there's no wear and tear penalties.

- 3525 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Can she...
- 3526 **Councilperson McCoy:** [Inaudible] Ms. Lanier...
- 3527 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Ms. Lanier, if you could mute your mic.
- Ms. C. Anthony: There are no mileage restrictions, no wear and tear penalties and there's equity still into the fleet, that the City will own, so the, the City still owns equity in the fleet and will, as a result, get those benefits. However we are able to help with cashflow in purchasing the vehicles, more vehicles, with an open-end lease. So, it takes advantage of the cash benefits as well as financing benefits, and it's a strategic lease.
- Some of the other types of funding that the City may be more familiar with is selffunding their vehicle, so purchasing cash, as well as a closed-end lease which is a typical dealership lease where you can have those mileage restrictions. Enterprise is flexible. We have the ability to help the City in all different areas, however, what we're proposing on the City's fleet is the open-end lease so you can take advantage of the flexibility of, you know, any wear and tear mileage and having equity at the end of the term.
- 3539 Councilperson McCoy: Mr. Chair?

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Ms. C. Anthony: Getting into the funding part, on the comparison of where the budget stands today as the City of Riviera Beach's current fleet trend as comparison to Enterprise's plan. On average, the City is purchasing about twenty-seven vehicles. Purchasing those cash at \$463,000, conservatively, just with the current budget year, looking into this year; maintenance at \$490,000 on the entire two hundred and eighty-three units, and fuel at \$576,000, totaling the fleet budget to about \$1.5MM.

With our plan, addressing those seventy-nine vehicles along with the other vehicles that are in optimal time to be replaced in year one. We are addressing ninety vehicles that will total to \$559,000. However, with selling those ninety vehicles, we'll also be able to capture \$147,000 on that.., those vehicles being turned in, so that will offset the \$559,000. Your maintenance will drop to \$364,000, and your fuel, there's an opportunity cost of savings of \$542,000 by adding ninety new vehicles to your fleet. So, in year one, we're looking at about a fourteen percent savings of \$1.5MM to \$1.3.

Providing a indus'.., a quick industry up'.., update. Due to COVID-19, manufacturers did have to shut down. That basically put them in a position where they will be building twenty percent less or producing twenty percent less vehicles this upcoming year. What that does, is that drives the demand to used vehicles. So, as

Enterprise helps the City sell.., sell its aged fleet, it does increase that resale sell market and helps us with the budget constraint that we have in reducing your capital budget. In addition, interest rates are low as we look into a financing option so there's different benefits when you're a city or a government or a business, in terms of replacing and purchasing vehicles in today's climate.

And lastly, to conclude, all of the benefits in summarizing. Again, we are looking to help the City save over \$400,000 and refresh its entire fleet with a eight-year implementation plan. We are gonna be recommending the best manufacturers with the most incentives to the City so that we can help the City with the most savings and look at the total.., lowest total cost. We're looking at ;purchasing.., going from purchasing vehicles at cash to an equity lease so that we can help with cashflow; lowering the age of your fleet and increasing your resale so that we can take advantage of lowering your capital budget as a whole; reducing your operating expenses, your maintenance and fuel. We will [stammer] be able to achieve that by operating your vehicles. This will help with positive City image and employee morale by having your employees in safer, newer vehicles, and also the updated safety in technology new vehicles will help assist with your employees and accidents and things like that.

And that concludes my presentation. Thanks to everyone for your time and I'm open for questions.

- **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Any questions? Mr. McCoy...
- **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Thank you, Madam Chair.
- **Chairperson Botel:** ...you're recognized. And then Mr. Lawson, thank you.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Me first?
- 3580 Chairperson Botel: Mhmm.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you, Madam Chair. I believe, Christina?
- **Ms. C. Anthony:** Yes.

- **Councilperson McCoy:** So, I guess, and pardon me, I had to step out for a second.
- 3584 The open-end leases, you said provides equity. And, I may have missed this, Chief, but
- 3585 this is not specific to the police, this is across the City, correct? All departments?
- **Police Chief Osgood:** [Inaudible].
- **City Manager Evans:** No. The...
- **Police Chief Osgood:** That's correct. [Inaudible]...
- **City Manager Evans:** Please.

- 3590 **Councilperson McCoy:** Mic. We gotta have a mic.
- 3591 **Chairperson Botel:** Your microphone, Chief.
- 3592 **City Manager Evans:** This is exclusively for law enforcement.
- 3593 **Police Chief Osgood:** That's correct. We're looking, right now, for... Keep going?
- For police.., this is for police, but hopefully one day, we can open it up to the whole City.
- 3595 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.
- 3596 **Police Chief Osgood:** But this is just for police.
- 3597 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, I guess my question, Ms. Christina, so you've done these
- 3598 specific for law enforcement agencies in this fashion that's being proposed for us?
- 3599 **Ms. C. Anthony:** Yes. We have experienced doing it with, specifically, just law
- 3600 enforcement as well.
- 3601 Councilperson McCoy: Well, I, I guess I'm curious. I think seen some vehicles out
- front. Those aren't it, are they? Is that, I guess, a resemblance of what some of those
- vehicles could be? If we were to go through a lease?
- 3604 **Police Chief Osgood:** That's correct, Councilperson. Those vehicles are already
- purchased. We own those vehicles. Now, those vehicles been in the works since last
- 3606 October.
- 3607 Councilperson McCoy: Right.
- 3608 **Police Chief Osgood:** And you can see how long it took us to get, I think it's a total
- of twelve vehicles rolled out by owning. This is a program that we're looking to replace
- our entire fleet.
- 3611 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. I, I guess I'm concerned, and I don't know if this is, you
- know, I, I don't wanna say.., I don't know what kind of question this is, but, you know,
- when retrofit these vehicles, like, how do you resell that? Like, what is the real equity in
- a police vehicle that you've now turned into a, a police transport vehicle that doesn't have
- the traditional features? What's the equity in that, after its exceeded its useful life, or we
- 3616 decide we wanna go somewhere else?
- 3617 **Ms. C. Anthony:** Yes. I can answer that. Enterprise, we have wholesalers and other
- 3618 dealerships that do purchase those used vehicles back from us. We do have the
- experience of selling police vehicles as well. A part of our process is, after the City has
- 3620 operated that police vehicle, Enterprise picks that vehicle up, does all the
- decommissioning of the City's logos, lights, sirens, and we put that on a market where
- that vehicle can sell. So, there are companies, like security companies, that will purchase
- 3623 those used vehicles.

- 3624 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. And obviously, Mr. Evans, you said this is starting with
- 3625 Public Safety, with the Police Department?
- 3626 **City Manager Evans:** That is correct. We're, we're utilizing exclusively for, for Public
- 3627 Safety because they are primarily the department that acquires the most pieces of rolling
- stock, and we have a situation where a lot of our vehicles are at the end of their useful
- 3629 life and this is the most expeditious way to be able to modernize the fleet to be able to
- operate in a more efficient manner. Unfortunately, in some cases, some of our officers
- have to go out to their vehicles with a, a jumper box to jump start some of the vehicles
- that they do have.
- And as we look to rollout our take home vehicle policy, this allows for us to get
- enough vehicles to accommodate the, the take home vehicle policy versus the situation,
- if we're only buying twenty-seven vehicles a year, by the time we make it through the
- 3636 cycle, we're already purchasing vehicles that we purchased years... And, and most law
- enforcement apparatus decommission after five to seven years because there is a lot of
- use. And especially if you're hot seating them and utilizing them...
- 3639 **Councilperson McCoy:** Around the clock.
- 3640 **City Manager Evans:** ...for a twenty-four hour period, where two individuals are
- utilizing the same vehicle. So, we're rolling that out on the police side. This is not gonna
- impact any personnel or any operation that we have. Currently, our existing fleet
- maintenance group will focus some of their time and effort on the other rolling stock that
- we do have, in addition to, as it was communicated, there's partnerships that will be
- established with local mechanic shops. So, there will be an opportunity to create some
- business for some of our other shops to help maintain some of the vehicles we do have.
- 3647 **City Manager Evans:** Mr. Evans, man, for the third time, can you let me get... I
- know you're on the ball, Mr. Evans, and that's exactly...
- 3649 **City Manager Evans:** [Chuckle].
- 3650 Councilperson McCoy: ...what I was gonna ask.
- 3651 [Chuckles]
- 3652 **Councilperson McCoy:** I hope it, it doesn't have impact to our local.., our in-house
- fleet maintenance division. So, that's a great thing. And it's even better, if I'm hearing
- you correctly, that any services that's not handled, I guess, with, with these fleet vehicles,
- will be handled locally, meaning Riviera Beach ASC certified mechanics?
- 3656 **City Manager Evans:** Yes, sir.
- Councilperson McCoy: Oh, that's beautiful. I like that. So, Ms.., Ms. Anthony and Ms.
- Williams, you guys have a ambulance because I'm interested in seeing if we can lease
- an ambulance for me and Councilman Lawson and we can out and do some calls.

- 3660 [Chuckles]
- 3661 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, that's kinda what I wanted to know. So, thank you, Mr.
- 3662 Evans, for...
- 3663 Chairperson Botel: [Inaudible].
- 3664 Councilperson McCoy: ... 'cause that's exactly where I was going about, you know,
- what happens. And that's even better to know that we'll be supporting, through our,
- through these lease agreements, local businesses as well.
- So, I, I like the concept. I just wanna... And I, and I stepped out. What was the rollout? Is.., I mean, are we phasing this? Proposally [sp]?
- 3669 **City Manager Evans:** It, it, it certainly would require, you know, how quickly they can
- get the vehicles and the striping because I've had the similar program that we rolled out
- in, in Madeira Beach and the savings were a lot smaller, smaller agency. But, when they
- deliver the vehicle, all the striping, everything... You basically get the keys and jump in.
- 3673 It's already done. So, it depends on, and as it was communicated, that the factories are,
- are behind and catching up, so there may be a little bit of a lag time but they will, they will
- source and, and get the vehicles and be able to accommodate what the demands of, of
- the City are once we execute the agreement.
- 3677 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 3678 **Chairperson Botel:** Any other... Mr. Lawson, you still have questions?
- 3679 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Thank you, Madam Chair. Mr. Evans, the Resolution, I
- understand that we're starting with our police, but the Resolution outlines all City vehicles.
- 3681 So, with this Resolution, we're giving authority to allow for all City vehicles to eventually
- 3682 be transitioned over to Enterprise?
- 3683 **City Manager Evans:** The, the way in which the, the Resolution is structured, it's
- similar to that of our, our previous master lease agreements, but it, it is gonna be
- exclusively to Public Safety. We have no intention, at this particular moment, to move
- into the other pieces of rolling stock, because we wanna beta test this and see how it
- goes over the next couple of years. So, it wouldn't be something that we would consider
- for a little bit of time, until we have quantifiable data and information to show exactly what
- the numbers are. So, it would just law enforcement exclusively.
- 3690 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: So then, colleagues, I would ask for a amendment to this
- motion to incorporate just Public Safety into the Resolution, because as it's stated, this is
- for all City vehicles. So, if we look at the Resolution and incorporate just Public Safety
- for the time being, since we're looking at the infrastructure, rolling it out and seeing how
- it impacts the, the budget bottom dollar and it's gonna be beneficial, but let's just make
- sure that we're very specific with what the Resolution states.

- Next question, if we could go to the local, the local shops that we'll be using, one of the slides I believe you had up, it was in and around three.., 33404.
