And another modification is the principal planner position. It has been vacant for a few months. And I think one of the best gains we can see in terms of that body in the department is to convert it to a long-range planner.

Our planning staff currently focuses on current planning, or transactional planning as I call it. So those are your permit reviews, your site plan processing, and activities of that nature. However, because of that focus on the short term, short deadline planning applications and activities, some of our long range things slip, such as updates to our comprehensive plan, potential planning for our neighborhoods, as well as our development codes that in some areas are outdated and need to be brought before you to reflect some of the current trends in development.

Having a person to own those processes, own the comprehensive plan, we are confident will reflect some increases in efficiency and updates of our documents. So that reclassification isn't necessarily an increase in budget items, but it is a need in terms of personnel that we are addressing now.

Another change we are making is in our code

enforcement division. So Ms. Bostic, our code administrator, does a great job of overseeing that division. However, I think there can be some advantages and increases there by breaking up the supervision of that division. Currently she has eight people that report to her directly. And it spreads her thin in terms of responding to administrative needs for in office and magistrate hearing activities and those legal issues. As well as the field staff who are on the ground talking to homeowners and working with them on addressing code issues.

And with the purview of responsibility and the level of employee development and attention that I'm requiring of my managers, that's just not a good spread. So to alleviate that and to get some better efficiencies and accountability for our field crews, we are reclassifying one of the code enforcement officer positions to a field supervisor, to provide them with a bump in pay and giving them the additional responsibilities of overseeing the field crew interact with our residents and homeowners, to increase the efficiencies and attention given to field work.

The fourth budget modification is to update

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our fee schedule for the planning division. Our staff has done a comparison of our peer and (indiscernible) localities in the county. And we -- for planning applications, we don't charge anything near what other localities do. And that's not always a bad thing. Some localities charge for pre-application meetings. I don't necessarily agree with charging people to get basic information, because the more they know before they submit, the better quality projects we will see.

And we also don't charge on the initial submittal. We don't charge on the resubmittal. But with this new planning application fee, when you submit to us for a fourth time, at that time we want to better account for staff time that goes into each one of these revisions that go with the different site plans and other planning applications. So we will be instituting a fee to account for that staff time. But it also works to ensure that developers are taken serious. round of review, each comment -- round of comments that go out to them related to their projects, and that they don't operate under the impression that they can resubmit as many times as possible with no type of financial skin in the game, so to speak.

So those are the budgetary and personnel modifications that we are making in the department. And again, I'm confident that we'll see some increases and some efficiencies based on those changes that I've been able to discuss and work out with the administration.

In terms of goals. We want to make sure that there is accountability and expectations with our turnaround time. So this year we will make sure that there are established review times and turnaround times for our permits. So that means that a reviewer has a certain amount of time that they have to crank out their review. And in turn, the applicant, we can let them know that when they submit a permit you'll get, at the minimum, any relevant comments within a certain period of time. So that's something I'm working on across the city with the different departments involved in the review process to institute.

Additional goals. We want to complete the transition to enter the electronic permitting. I expect if we continue on the aggressive schedule that we set before ourselves, that we will be moving to that in the -- probably the first half of FY '21. So that's something that's already in the

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works. And then we are also working with Councilmember Lawson and his team in making sure we bring that to the front line.

One thing that always helps is to make sure that we are taking care of our small businesses in the City. One of my goals is to establish a point of contact in the department for those small businesses who may be transitioning from a small operation or a home operation and having to tread through the development process to either build or occupy space for their businesses. Often they have expertise in whatever the product or service it is that they produce or sell, but the land development process is very complicated and often they are unprepared for that. So we will be establishing a point of contact to make sure that they have someone that they can go to to walk them through that process and make sure we see less confusion for our businesses within the city limits that want to operate here or expand here.

And then finally one of my biggest goals is to just reshape the narrative of the Development Services Department.

COMPUTER VOICE MESSAGE: One moment. I'm having some trouble with the connection.

I don't know what happened but --10 CITY MANAGER EVANS: We can hear you. 11 COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: Why don't you 12 just go out and come back in. 13 CHAIR BOTEL: I'm going to leave and come 14 back. 15 MR. SIRMONS: Well, since I was on my last 16 qoal, my last item, I will be happy to repeat it 17 once Councilwoman Botel comes back in. But the 18 last goal I have for the department for this fiscal 19 year is just to reshape the narrative. Too often 20 for development services we allowed the story of 21 how good we are to be told by those who don't 22 necessarily know the full spectrum of what we do. 23 It's usually those who have a bad experience that 24 are the loudest and most vociferous about our 25 But the truth is, there is far more department.

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The truth is that we process good than bad. permits faster than most other municipalities, including the county, if you look at the numbers of our actual turnaround times. So we will be working with marketing and utilizing all tools to our disposal to make sure everyone understands the great work and the great staff that we have here in Development Services, in all three divisions, and how hard we really work to make sure that this city is well developed and a visually pleasing place when it comes to development on private property. And that concludes my update for the

Development Services budget for FY '21.

CITY MANAGER EVANS: And, Madam Chair, if you can hear us, just to speak about what Director Sirmons has done with regards to the operation since coming on board, he's really grabbed the bull by the horns, and I'm happy to report -- and I will let him fill in the blanks as it relates to this -in this budget we have reduced the contractual amount that the City will pay to CAP Government to basically \$100,000, which buys him just enough to be able to use them if he needs them. But I don't even think that we may get to that point.

Director Sirmons, if you can speak about

the -- your desires and how far we've come, just in your short tenure, to eliminate that contract, because that's been something that was discussed back in 2017. And we're, you know, a lot further to not having that type of situation, where we have in-sourced that operation.

Director Sirmons, can you speak to that?

MR. SIRMONS: Absolutely.

We've made two pivotal hires so far. One being the building official, Mr. Michael Grimm, who has been on for about two weeks now but is very knowledgeable, very experienced. He was a building official at another city in the county for decades before coming here. So we're lucky to have his expertise as a part of the team. But in turn that also saves us about \$15,000 a month that we were outsourcing for a building official.

And we also have an accommodation plans examiner who is starting next Monday, who will cut out another big chunk of the funds that we were spending for structural plans review from CAP.

So in total that came to about around \$26,000 a month that we were paying to CAP, and that's about \$315,000 per year that we won't be paying to CAP in the upcoming fiscal year, because of those

two hires alone.

And my next goal is to cut out the inspection portion as well, to bring in more city inspectors to handle those site visits of those projects, and to get to that point where it's more of an as needed, if there's a situation where we have someone who calls in or is out on vacation, then maybe we tap into some third party services just as a fill in but not the predominant provider of our building services.

So, again, we've cut out a lot of funds already. And I expect further reductions as we go.

CHAIR BOTEL: I'm not hearing -- is anybody speaking? Okay.

COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: What are we doing?

CHAIR BOTEL: Mr. Sirmons is not done yet, am I right, Mr. Evans? Or is he done?

MR. SIRMONS: I'm wrapped up now.

CITY MANAGER EVANS: Yeah, he just finished his presentation.

CHAIR BOTEL: Okay. Well, I heard the very tail end of it. And I must say, I'm pleased to know that we have a building official and are no longer utilizing CAP as extensively as we had been.

So thank you. I did catch that.

And I'm sorry for the technical difficulties
I was experiencing.

Any questions from Council members?

Ms. Miller-Anderson.

COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: I just wanted to make a comment about the utilization of CAP.

That has certainly been on the table for a long time. And to be able to have those people in place, to no longer need their services, has been -- is -- it's a great feeling. So I thank you all for making that happen.

CHAIR BOTEL: Mr. McCoy.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Thank you, Madam Chair.

Mr. Sirmons, thank you for the presentation.

I want to ask a question. You mentioned reclassifying the principal planner position to a long-range planner. And I particularly had a discussion with the City Attorney regarding some of our codes and even, I guess, for that matter, the comprehensive plan needing some updates. Why is this an option as opposed to going out for this? Because it would appear -- obviously, I think you indicated you had a couple of additional positions that you have already filled. But from the

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planning standpoint, why wouldn't we want to go out to have someone to give us a comprehensive overhaul of those antiquated codes and comp plans?

MR. SIRMONS: Well, long-range planning isn't just the comprehensive plan. Although, it would be one of the major priorities of the person in this position. We prefer to have that type of work done in-house as much as possible, especially when it comes to interacting with our community and having things like charrettes and community sessions to find out from the community what they see as the most pressing needs in our long-term, our long-range plans. Especially when it gets down to the neighborhood level. So I think when it's not a City employee they're not as vested in the outcomes and really connecting with the community to build the best product possible when it comes to long-range plans. So working on those aspects, so this person would be able to write and ideally would have experience writing long-range plans but also be a City employee to have that additional connection to the community that they are working with.

And, again, beyond that, there are the ordinances that just are outdated in a lot of

areas. And, again, if you don't have someone that owns those aspects of the department's activities, a lot of times those things languish in favor of the short term; this permit is past due, it needs to be processed; or we have this developer hounding us about this particular project they want do.

This person is going to focus on those governing documents and making sure they're up-to-date. As well as plats, to make sure that the long-term goals of the planning division and our city are met.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Thank you, Mr. Sirmons. I appreciate your perspective. But I've only been hearing this same explanation since 2012. And what I find, and I've seen over the years, is that more or less because of the increase in permitting and site plans being submitted, there's never been enough staff to be able to handle both, just from a planning perspective.

And I've got to really give kudos to

Mr. Gagnon, because he was here when I first

started coming to the P and Z meetings and, you

know, he's been kind of trying to hold it together

for the longest. And now I know that there's been

some increases. But at the very minimum he wasn't

the only person in that department. You know, there was a director then, and then there was a principal planner, and then there was also I think a staff level planner.

But in any event, I -- you know, I don't know what that means to have a principal planner to be reclassified as a long-range planner, in terms of how soon do they get down to work. Is this solely what they're going to be doing, as opposed to reviewing plans and that sort of thing? You know, I think more importantly even as a legislative local lawmaker, in looking at some of the planning and zoning board codes, I think we have probably all had some confusion on it. Obviously, we've seen most recently how it's not consistent and we've had to reach outside the organization to get assistance with making sure that we get those things up-to-date.

And, you know, I'm not convinced -- I mean, obviously, it sounds good in theory but, you know, I don't want to support a budget that generally says that that's going to be a goal or a budget modification, when I don't really know what that means. We're going to reclassify to how much money for that position? So what is going to be the

allocation of that position in terms of actually doing updates, compared to plan reviews and other functions? So I wanted to see if you could provide me more details on that.

And then I have some other questions regarding code compliance, and also the fee schedule.

MR. SIRMONS: I think what would make the biggest difference in this situation is this reclassification ensures that there is a person in the department that owns the long-range planning activities.

Again, previously there have been staff members who in their spare time of processing current applications, they try to get around to those long-range planning activities. But in this case it would be different because that person's job are the long-range planning activities of the department. And that's what we believe will create the results that you haven't seen since you've been asking since 2012.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Okay. Good enough.

So do you have a percentage of the allocation of their time? Is it going to be 100 percent? Is it going to be 80 percent?

MR. SIRMONS: It's 100 percent of their activities would be related to comprehensive planning, neighborhood planning, development code updates, and plats.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Okay. And the reclassification, as you indicated in the slide, that's going to come with a reclassification of the position and obviously the pay grade. Has there been -- obviously, I would hope there have been some preliminary discussions as to what that looks like.

MR. SIRMONS: So far we don't anticipate it pushing the position into a different pay grade. A lot of the activities are already written into the job description. We may add a couple lines. But this is what planners are supposed to do, this is what they go to school for, to envision the long-term development of cities and how we can get there and how to plan to get there.

Unfortunately, in many localities planners become transactional employees where they process individual applications on behalf of developers or homeowners and they don't do what they're actually trained to, which is to look at the city and where it can be 20 and 30 years out.

So it isn't a large variation from what's already written in a principal planner position. This is explicitly dedicating this position to those activities to make sure that they don't continue to slip.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: And, Mr. Sirmons, respectfully, are you suggesting that employees (audio disruption) just because they're an employee? Because I don't think that's the case. In fact, I often (audio disruption) --

CHAIR BOTEL: Mr. McCoy, you're breaking up a little bit. Could you repeat that?

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: I'm just curious if the suggestion is that you're going to get more buy in from the employee because they own it, simply because they're an employee, as opposed to someone from the outside. And what I found, more often than not, because these are unique, it seems to be in my opinion that when you have someone from the outside that has done this for a number of agencies, it's done a lot faster; and it's done, obviously, with best practices from other organizations; and it takes in not just the actual city's perspective but more or less the regional considerations for a city like Riviera Beach. And,

you know, I don't want to be here two years from now talking about we still have to update our code. I mean, it's -- we're already -- you know, I don't want to speak to how long some of those code sections have been there. I think we, who have kind of examined it, know where it is.

But I'm just more convinced that it works
better if we can just get it done all in one -- you
know, at least the major update in one whap, as
opposed to making this something that, you know,
we're going to piecemeal it one step at a time, one
section at a time of the code. Because it's just
so massive that we need to really overhaul this.

And I'm just curious, because -- you know, one of the other things I was looking at in your presentation is, it doesn't appear -- and I may be wrong -- but I don't see how we could have paid CAP Government out of a 967,000 dollar operating budget. So I wanted to ask that question.

But, you know, I would much rather see that this is done on the outside. I mean, at least the initial overhaul. And then long-range planning, you know, we can pick up from there. But, you know, these are ever evolving; and if some of those sections haven't been touched in 20, 30, 40, 50

years, then should I really expect that one person is going to get it done in nine months or a year?

MR. SIRMONS: So currently, no, the expectation isn't for one person to overhaul that massive document in just a year. That person would likely still need to use third party expertise and resources on certain technical aspects, such as our coastal flood mitigation element of the comprehensive plan, of the type of expertise needed for managing sea level raise, hazardous (audio disruption) that's not necessarily germane to a planner's expertise.

This person will certainly be the manager and overseer of anyone that we bring in to address those or update those certain elements of the project. So it will be a combination of them updating and doing certain portions in-house, and certain parts still being outsourced.

The comprehensive plan is very comprehensive, and I know there is a lot of desire to make sure it's updated and overhauled. But in reality there are parts of the comprehensive plan that are very well done. And it's not necessarily a document that needs to be burned to the ground and that we start over.

We do need to, however, look strategically at the different chapters, sections and elements of it to determine which parts are not currently working and which parts do need to be redone. But in my opinion the comprehensive plan isn't a document that we need to scrap and start over.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Okay. Another question. So, do you have any projections or pay grade classifications for the field supervisor that you're going to move one of the code enforcement -- or code compliance officers up to? And what that looks like as far as the salary range.

MR. SIRMONS: So for the range, we talked about a 5 percent increase to an existing code compliance officer, to create this position.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: I don't know what that means. Is that 5 percent from the uppermost tier of the code compliance officer's salary?

CITY MANAGER EVANS: It's 5 -- Councilman, if I may, it's 5 percent on whatever the individual that is selected for that particular position. So it depends on their rate of pay.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Okay. And that supervisor won't be the same as the position that's held by Ms. Bostic? They'll report to Ms. Bostic?

1 Is that how that works? 2 CITY MANAGER EVANS: That is correct, 3 Councilman. 4 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Okay. The next item I 5 have is the budget modification. Updating planning application fee schedule. How is this presented? 7 Is this done staff level or is this an ordinance? 8 MR. SIRMONS: The planning fee schedule is 9 adopted by resolution. So through this budget, and 10 making sure we update that existing document, we 11 can take care of it with this. 12 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Okay. Is there going 13 to be a study or comparison of what our, I quess, 14 our neighboring communities are doing? 15 MR. SIRMONS: We have done that comparison 16 already. 17 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Okay. And these 18 increases in fee schedule, did you account for that 19 in -- well, obviously, I don't see that this is --20 I quess, maybe it's not in this presentation. 21 you talked about the revenues increasing for that. 22 Is that encompassed in what you expect your 23 department to kind of project for revenues this 24 year?

Yes.

MR. SIRMONS:

However, we don't expect

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that to be a significant source of revenue. Based on the number of planning applications we get per year, and the number of them that go to a third resubmittal and beyond, we're expecting 15 to 20 thousand a year in additional revenue for that. But it isn't something that would be a significant game changer in terms of the budget.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Lastly, do you have -or obviously I wouldn't expect you to be able to answer this question right now. But can we provided -- if this is something that you track. And maybe it's done through Qwilr's, I'm not sure exactly. But from receipt of application, the average time for remodification for a single family residence, commercial, new construction or new development, exactly how long or the average time it takes for us from receipt of an application for review and to approval or denial. Or, actually, I quess denial can almost occur in one day. generally speaking, what does it take for an individual who wants to come and do business at the city to submit an application for a permit or a site plan application, what that time frame looks Because that's what I would like to have.

And my reason for asking for that is, I

think, you know, if there's data that supports that we are in need of increasing our fee schedule for our permits and planning applications, I support it. But I don't want to talk about doing something like that if we haven't increased the efficiencies of the department. And that's what I want to see ahead of us, you know, having a resolution that supports us increasing the fee schedule.

Because I don't want people to pay more to have the same amount of, you know, staff response time, or the time it takes to process an application.

MR. SIRMONS: Okay. I do want to clarify that this fee is not related to construction permits. This is for planning applications, such as a site plan application or other types of amendments to planning documents. The permit fee schedule would be a separate item that I'm not proposing changes to at this time.

But to clarify, you said you wanted the processing time for a single family home new construction application?

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Well, just -- I mean, not specifically. But I wanted some information for us to be able to justify or be able to

1 necessitate that this is something that we should 2 be increasing, given that, you know, we're probably 3 sixty days in getting back, you know, with someone. Because that's the other concern that I have. 4 5 submitted a site plan application and, you know, 6 staff is still doing comments, you know, two months 7 in, you know. And, obviously, that may have been a 8 staffing shortage at that time. But I want to know 9 where we are when it comes to submitting site plans 10 and those kind of things for new development. 11 I can look at how much data we MR. SIRMONS: 12 have related to that, to see if I can get you an 13 answer on that. 14 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Thank you, sir. Ι 15 appreciate it. 16 That's all I have. 17 CHAIR BOTEL: Anyone else? 18 Mr. Evans, I think that concludes all Okav. 19 of your presentations for this evening, am I right? 20 Do we have any comments from the City 21 Manager? 22 CITY MANAGER EVANS: That is correct, Madam 23 Chair, that concludes our presentations for this 24 evening. 25 Just a point of clarity, on the 27th is going

1	to be our final operational budget workshop. And
2	then on the 29th is when we will go into the
3	capital budgets plan and finish up any loose ends,
4	and then if necessary have a recap. But we look to
5	complete that as part of your discussion on the
6	29th.

1 CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you. 2 Comments from the Mayor and Council. 3 Starting with Mayor Felder. MAYOR FELDER: No comments, Madam Chair. 5 CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you. Ms. Miller-Anderson? 7 COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: I just want to thank you all for on the 29th making that for 9 We actually have a virtual sixth grade 10 orientation. You know, school starts on Monday. 11 So we have an orientation virtual, that should be 12 interesting, at 10:00 in the morning. So, thank 13 you all for that. 14 CHAIR BOTEL: Good luck. COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Are you speaking of 9:00 on a Saturday?

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Okay. Mr. Evans, you know, I think I mentioned to you about -- you know, we're all working in a virtual environment, and I don't know that any member is actually in their City Council office but, you know, I don't know what it is but it seems like every day some member has some internet challenges. Perhaps, is there something that can be asked of our IT department, is there a more secure -- I know -- at least I remember Councilperson Lawson having a hot spot I don't know if that is more secure. it seems to be that we need something a little more And I don't know if it's -- you know, I guess -- you know, I've seen situations where, depending on your service provider, once you reach a certain amount of bandwidth it slows down your Obviously, in the case of, if you have connection. multiple people streaming at the same time, live video, that's going to slow it down. But if there is an option for us to have some sort of device

that augments -- I even have a laptop, but I don't even understand if that has enough bandwidth. But a few times in this meeting, and that's why my camera went off for a while, I got a message that popped up, it says something about my bandwidth or I need to close windows or something. And I'm literally the only person on my internet right now. And I'm trying to figure out, is there a better solution. I don't know if this is because we're doing so many meetings and Comcast tries to slow down the connection or what.

CITY MANAGER EVANS: Yeah, we can certainly

CITY MANAGER EVANS: Yeah, we can certainly look at some other options. I know that at this time of the evening, when everyone gets home, there is a drain on the system. But we do have the mobile devices, the hot spots that we can look to issue to the Council. I've used that in a couple cases, and sometimes it just becomes -- you know, it's hit or miss. But we can find some better solutions and get it out to the Board here probably in the next week, so you can have another reliable internet source.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Okay. All right.

CHAIR BOTEL: I had the same problem this evening, Mr. McCoy, where I got that message that

says -- and there is nobody else here but me and the cat so...

Unless he's online.

COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: Yeah, that's what happened to mine, and it went out. Yeah, I couldn't see anything.

COUNCILPERSON LANIER: Your cat is online.

CHAIR BOTEL: I know. He's talking to some dogs in the next building.

CITY MANAGER EVANS: Or you may have some of your constituents in the parking lot utilizing your internet service.

CHAIR BOTEL: Anything else, Mr. McCoy?

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: A few other things. So it's been mentioned this meeting, obviously, the importance of having home owners as opposed to renters. Ms. Wynn, I want to talk about Brooks Subdivision in the current interpleader case that's going on. Would it be appropriate that I ask you to come back with a time for us to have a closed executive session? Because I potentially think that I want to be able to see (audio disruption) online and I know that there are some challenges. I want to see if we can bring that to the Board in a closed session to discuss -- and obviously, I

would hope that you can have staff to brief -- your staff to brief us or you brief us ahead of time. But, literally, I don't want to continue to hear the manager talk about the importance of home ownership when we have (indiscernible) properties that are basically, you know, I guess, basically ripe for us to allow the county to start developing to increase home ownership. I want to see if that's something that you think is something that we should bring to the body as a closed executive session.

CITY ATTORNEY WYNN: Mr. McCoy, I'm hoping that we don't have to do that. We've had some more talks as of last Friday, and so we may -- I think we've come to an agreement, and we're working out the details.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Okay. Good enough.

Mr. Evans, health insurance. I don't know where we left off or what has to be proposed. I did write down a note somewhere, and I believe it was that we went from, I guess a budget of -- initially in this conversation we talked about we initially had a 4.2 million dollar deficit.

CITY MANAGER EVANS: That is correct.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: And we're down to 1.9?

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1 CITY MANAGER EVANS: Yes, sir. That's what 2 we had to close the gap to present the Council with 3 a balanced budget. What was the closure of COUNCILPERSON McCOY: 4 5 Was it the difference between the 4.2 and the qap? 1.9? 7 CITY MANAGER EVANS: The -- once we got the state revenues in, and we adjusted some of the 9 revenues, and then we did some of the corresponding 10 reductions, we were able to close that -- the 11 number was actually 1.9, that we actually had to 12 close.

> So the 4.2 was worst case scenario. And when we projected that there would be about a 30 percent decrease in the state's revenues, where it did come down to maybe about a 10 to 12 percent decrease versus the 30 percent we were projecting.

> COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Okay. What is -- do you -- when will we see health insurance again? Because I wanted to see if it was possible to do -you know, keep our plan where it is and see what those numbers look like.

CITY MANAGER EVANS: We're looking to bring you back some additional information on health I would say if not at your 27th insurance.

meeting, definitely by your 29th meeting. I have staff doing some additional research and looking at the plan design and some other elements. And we are going to bring that back on the 27th or 29th, one of those two meetings.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Okay. And then it appears that --

CITY MANAGER EVANS: I don't anticipate it being longer than an hour, hour and a half, because we're just bringing some information concerning the survey documentation and providing additional clarity and having any -- answering any questions that the Council may have, so that we can move forward with second and final reading of the submerged lands item.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: And get an opportunity to review it at some point. You know, and obviously we have a City Council -- I'm sorry -- yeah, a meeting on Wednesday so...

CITY MANAGER EVANS: Absolutely, Councilman.

I'll definitely work with staff to make sure you all get the information in advance of Friday meetings. Our target date is going to be Wednesday.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: All right. Thank you

1 sir.

Thank you, Madam Chair.

CHAIR BOTEL: Councilwoman Lanier.

COUNCILPERSON LANIER: (Audio disruption) is going, how it's being spent. I think that the information that we've received thus far has given us a lot of food for thought. And I want to commend the staff for being able to bring that information to us in a way that makes it plain and understandable.

And also, I wanted to ask (audio disruption).

CHAIR BOTEL: (Audio disruption) first (audio disruption) of the Palm Beach State College courses that were offered in Riviera Beach is happening this week. And of the 14, 15 or 14 graduates, many of them are continuing on to get their associates degree at Palm Beach State College. So I'm really excited about that. Because this was their first time (audio disruption) a college experience, and they're taking it one step further.

Anything else from anyone else before we close?

Seeing none, this meeting is adjourned. Thank you.
