- 197 FROM SENATOR BOBBY POWELL
- 198 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, there are no public
- 199 comment cards on this Item. The acceptance of public comment cards are now closed
- 200 for this Item.
- 201 Chairperson Botel: Is Senator Powell here?
- 202 City Manager Evans: Madam...
- 203 **Senator B. Powell:** I am here.
- 204 **Chairperson Botel:** Oh good. Good evening.
- 205 **Senator B. Powell:** Can you hear me?
- 206 Chairperson Botel: [Chuckle]. Good evening.
- 207 **Senator B. Powell:** You may not be able to see me, but you can...
- 208 **Chairperson Botel:** Senator Powell, you're recognized.
- Senator B. Powell: Wonderful. I thank you, Madam Chair, for giving me the opportunity
- 210 to present before you all this, this evening. We will be going through our PowerPoint
- 211 presentation. Real quick, it's not gonna be that long. I just wanted to give you all a quick
- 212 glimpse of what session is looking like this year and give you an opportunity, since I know
- 213 many Members may not travel up from Palm Beach County. I do have Councilman
- McCoy on my schedule, I think, to meet with regards to some appropriations requests,

but if you all will not be attending, I did want to just run through what session will look like, and give you the opportunity to [audio skipped] coordinate and connect with me.

Again, for those of you who do not know me, I am State Senator Bobby Powell, Jr., a native born Riviera Beach [inaudible], born and raised in the City of Riviera Beach, graduate of Palm Beach Gardens High school and, of course, I'm always in the City. I wanna thank all of our Council Members for the work you're doing, and the Mayor Ronnie Felder. Thank you, Chairwoman Botel, Councilwoman KaShamba Miller-Anderson, Councilman Douglas [stammer].., Doug'.., Douglas Alexander Lawson. Sorry, Doug, Councilwoman Shirley Lanier and Councilman Tradrick K. McCoy, for your work in the City. And I've had the opportunity to work with many of you. I just was with Councilman Lawson not too long ago, working on a, a, a nice presentation he's doing for the Black History Month.

So, without further ado, this is the legislative update, and we'll go ahead and move from this, this screen right here to our next slide. So here, this tells you about the legislature. Many people don't know what we do and know that we're bicameral legislature. I am your State Senator. Previously, four years ago, I served as your State Representative, now I'm in the State Senate, which is a body of only forty members. As a State Senator, I cover more ground and I represent one out of forty, your State House, we have one hundred and twenty members, and you have two State Representatives. One is Representative Mike Caruso and the other is Representative Omari Hardy. I am your only State Senator for the City of Riviera Beach. As a matter of fact, the only State Senator for West Palm Beach, Lake Park, Mangonia Park, all these, these different areas. And we can talk about that more for people who have questions.

I get a, I get a four-year term. I will be up in 2022. So, hopefully, I'll be ready to return in 2022 as your Senator. And, in legislative session, although I'm in Tallahassee right now, yes, I was home this weekend. Today I'm in Tallahassee. I'll see you all. This weekend, I'll be home and then we're ready for session which starts on March 1st.

Legislative session is sixty days. That is the formal part of session. Committee weeks actually start much earlier than that. During committee week, we start the process of getting bills heard and getting appropriations requests put in. We do have approp'.., appropriations requests from the City of Riviera Beach that I will discuss in a moment, but for now, we have started putting those things in. And if you have any questions, or any things that you would like to move forward with, please do not hesitate to contact my office.

Onto our next slide. This talks about the Palm Beach county legislative delegation. Just so you know, there are nine State Representatives in Palm Beach County, four State Senators, of which I am your State Senator.

We'll move onto the next. This is the map of Senate District 30. Senate District 30, we cover a lot of ground. I actually am the Senator that has the most.., of the nine representatives, I think six of them are a part of my District, so I'm the Senator that covers more representatives from Palm Beach County than anybody else. And, these are the

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cities that we represent. Notice in, in blazing and popped out with the larger font there, is the City of Rivera Beach. But just so you know, as your Senator, I do also cover... Now, I am originally from the City of Riviera Beach, but I also cover Royal Palm, Tequesta, West Palm, West Lake, Palm Beach Shores, Palm Beach Gardens, Palm Beach, North Palm Beach, Cloud Lake, Glen Ridge, Haverhill, Jupiter Inlet Colony, Jupiter, Juno Beach, Lake Park, Loxahatchee Groves, and Mangonia Park. I am indeed the first person from the City of Riviera Beach to.., am actually the first person of color, from Palm Beach County, first black person to serve in the State Senate.

We move forward with our next slide. And, these are the committees that I sit on this year. These, these are important. I sit on the full appropriations committee. That's the committee that deals the bulk of the money. This year, the Governor has proposed a \$96.4 billion budget. I sit on the Commerce and Tourism Committee, Community Affairs. That's important because we deal with a lot of home rule issues, your CRAs and your local issues, will go through that committee. Criminal Justice, the Joint Committee on Public Council Oversight. I am the alternating Chair, and I'm also on the Rules Committee, the committee that deals with any bill before it comes to the floor. So, before any bill goes to the floor, it either has to go through rules or appropriations, which means I will see just about every bill before it hits the floor this year.

Move on to the next slide. And, these are just some of of the bills that I've introduced thus far. This is only.., this is not even half of them because I.., thus far, introduced, or have ready to file, about fourteen or fifteen bills. Usually, I file somewhere around eighteen to twenty-three bills, but this year I've got reemployment assistance. This is important because fifty-eight percent of the people who've applied for unemployment since we have been in the pandemic have not received a single dime. Now that's really, really important. People can talk about a lot of different issues, but the fact that we went into a pandemic and people who are on the frontlines, people who are working in grocery stores, people who are working all sorts of places, did not receive the first dime because the, the state's system was trying to be politically correct and not, not.., the state system was, was broken. And, and this affected a lot of people.

Direct file of juveniles in the adult prison system. Councilman McCoy, when, when we worked together, he knows this is something that I've been working on since I was a member of the House. Actually, before I was even State Rep when I worked for Commissioner Mack Bernard as his aide when he was State Rep. We've been chomping away at direct file of juveniles in the adult prison system and we just got our first hearing the other day with regard to how these juvenile offenders in.., offenders in adult population so that they're no longer going to be housed with adults.

Florida Bright Future Scholarship program. We've got a bill for that. Minimum qualifications for law enforcement officers or correctional officers, and mental health training for law enforcement officers. I have been a big proponent for mental health training, as I know in our communities, one of the things that we do not discuss, as much as we should, is mental health. And for our law enforcement officers, that's very important as well because we experience trauma throughout our lifetimes, whether it's been a death, whether it's been a, a incident that we've seen or that has happened to us, but law

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enforcement officers, that's heightened times ten because these individuals who, in their general course of work run into people who have been shot, traffic accidents, a number of things that normal people don't see. And this type of trauma sometimes, if left undealt with, can cause or create other problems. So, we push that legislation. That's one of our bills that we've introduced.

Now we move on to our next slide, which shows you the list of appropriations. This is a big list of appropriations requests that we got in the budget last year. Now mind you, the Governor cut all of our appropriations last year, except for three. So, we ended up at about thirteen or fourteen different requests we had made it through the process, actually, it looks like we had fifteen, we ended up with three requests after the Governor made his cuts due to COVID. Now this year, we have put in requests for the Palm Beach County Firefighter's Cancer Initiative Reduction Project, which is \$800,000. And you see we actually had that in the budget last year, we had requested that same amount. And, we didn't get that amount, we actually, I think, we ended up with... Let me see what we ended up with. We ended up with \$400,000 through the process that was cut by the Governor.

The Palm Beach County Bunker Gear Contamination Project, \$800,000 has been requested. We'll see what we get through with. The Female Teen Delinquency Prevention Program, we've requested \$630,000. As far as the African American History Museum and Library, we requested another \$400,000. We are an African American..., we're in Black History Month. Remember, history is the clock that people use to tell their historical cultural time of day. And, and I can go on and on.

But, Community Based Post-COVID Acceleration Initiative, \$200,000 we requested for that. And then, we also, once again, last year we had a, you see it at the top of my list, Riviera Beach Early Learning to Kindergarten Pilot Program. We received \$150,000 before it was vetoed by the Governor so this year we're requesting the same thing, another \$150,000 in the budget for that.

So, that's where we are in terms of our budget. The biggest thing, remember, people can.., who do not know about the legislature, every year, the major thing that we have to pass is the budget. It doesn't matter if we pass one bill, we do have to pass that budget.

Now we'll move on to the 2021 major session issues. And, the 2021 major session issues, change the slide here, the biggest issue you'll see that will affect the City of Riviera Beach in the State of Florida, are the legislation that's being pushed by the Governor and others, as anti-protestor legislation that will heighten penalties for those who are protesting if some kind of violence breaks out during the protest, creating some, some things that were misdemeanors before, will now become felonies, longer periods of time that people will be held in jail. There, there were parts of this legislation that would've allowed people who were blocking streets to be run over. That has been stricken from the proposed bill but that, remember, that was a part of this reform that we saw in September.

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As far as me and the Florida Legislative Black Caucus on last Tuesday, had a press conference to talk about police reform where we dropped fourteen or fifteen different bills into..., we filed fourteen or fifteen bills related to reforms that we'd like to see, and we're still waiting to file our omnibus bill related to policing reform. Unemployment, that's huge because right now, the issue that I told you about, myself and Representative Ann Eskamani are working on this, along with other members of the Senate and the House, who have smaller pieces of bills. I spoke with Dane Eagle today. Dane Eagle, by the way, is the Secretary of Department of Educa'..., sorry, Department of Economic Opportunity, about the system, and we're still working, after all.., over a year, or about a year, to still get that system fixed. Education, you're seeing where teachers have been paid minimal amounts for years. That has been increased but still, some of the teachers who have been working in the field for years, don't see that increase. And also, we're seeing that there's a push to push children into more voucher programs, more private school programs, which allows a number of different things to happen and we will be fighting against that, but that is on the agenda, or on the.., one of the biggest issues we'll be facing this year.

 Mental health and COVID-19 are always issues.., or, COVID-19 hasn't always been an issue but for the last year it's been a part of our, our speech, and it's part of our new normal. So, of course, most of the stuff that we deal with now, will be centered on COVID-19.

Those are our session issues. And, as we move forward to the next slide, this is the vaccine update. As you know, we've done a couple of vaccine events with the City of Rivera Beach, in partnership with the City and partnership with the state, and partnership with Greater Bethel and a number of churches in the community, I thank you too, Chief Curd, Chief..., the [stammer].., Chief Golden. Thank you to our, our Police Chief, Chief... Why can't I think of the Chief. Chief Osgood. Thank you to the City Manager, Jonathan Evans, and thank you to our City Council for showing up at the site and working with people. As a matter of fact, I think I saw each, each person there. I, I did see..., I, I can recall seeing Councilman McCoy, Councilman Lawson, Councilwoman Botel and Councilwoman KaShamba Miller-Anderson. I, I know I spoke to each one of you personally, so thank you all for your work in making sure that the residents of Riviera Beach were vaccinated at Wells Recreation Center which has done more than, at this point, more than at least twelve hundred people. More than a thousand. And, if we get an opportunity, I'm still pushing for the City to be a fulltime site. If we can make that happen, that will be great. Great, great.

And, my office, we'll move to the next slide..., consists of Diane Andre, Kersti Myles and Kristofer Stubbs. Their email addresses are attached. My office number is 2715 North Australian Avenue, Suite 105. The phone number is 561-650-6880. These are the numbers that people can use to get in touch with me. Once in a while I'll see a constituent say that they've reached out to me, they didn't hear from me. Generally, if you reach out to me, you will hear from me unless you don't call my phone or send us an email. I generally don't respond to Facebook messages. It's, it's just not professional. So, if you tag me in a post on Facebook and say, 'I'm reaching out to you,' that's not..., you're not

reaching out to me. You're being ridiculous. [Chuckle]. So, that's my staff. This is how you get in touch with us and this helps people as we move forward.

And, the last thing I'd like to say is, the last slide is, if you have any questions, comments or concerns, I'm right here, ready and available to answer them for you. Glad to be able to join you all virtually. Look forward to being able to see you all once again in person. But I've seen you all recently, so I know everybody's happy and healthy. And also, to the members in the audience, I have seen from the view that I was looking at, at earlier, I see quite a few people in the audience who I'm familiar with and I, I share those sentiments with. Thank you all for coming out and continuing to do your work. I think I saw Ms. Cindy March, Ms. Hubbard and a number of other people. Ya'll continue to do your work and I'm proud to be here to represent you all in the State Senate.

- 401 councils. And we really appreciate the work that you put into helping us maintain home
- rule. That's really important to us. So, thank you so much.

407 Senator Powell, I just wanted to personally take this moment to thank you for the 408 work that you've done for our community, for the efforts that you did for vaccinating our residents. At the time when I spoke with you, I believe about three percent of the African 409 410 American population was vaccinated and our Governor issued the vaccinations through 411 a private entity. And, at that moment, you took the initiative to make sure that the vaccine, knowing that our Publix here in our community does not even have a pharmacy to operate 412 and assist, you made sure that it got over to our Staff, who did a phenomenal job 413 414 distributing it. So, Senator Powell, we owe that to you, our County Administration, Ms. Verdenia Baker and Commissioner Mack Bernard. So, thank you Senator Powell for the 415

- 416 efforts you've been doing, and continue to fight for our community.

- of good planning, especially for our cities. And, what I can tell you is, that it's very difficult
- 431 to sit on a.., to sit on a dais with a number of people who do not understand this discipline,
- 432 to tell you that planning is not necessary and continue to [inaudible] urban growth and
- development grow out of control and inconsistent with the way that we would move
- forward, making our state sustainable. So, thank you for paying attention to that major,
- 435 major issue. As far as all of our other Council Members, Councilman Doug Lawson, thank
- you for the work that you've done, especially when it came to the vaccine and helping to
- 437 get many of those residents vaccinated. You went out into the community and grabbed
- people by the hand and drug 'em to.., I won't say that. You brung them... [Chuckle]. You
- brung them to Wells to make sure that people were vaccinated. And, so did you
- 440 Commissioner.., Councilwoman KaShamba Miller-Anderson. So I wanna thank you all
- 441 for your work.

- 455 Proclamation from the Office of the Mayor, City of Riviera Beach, Palm Beach 456 County, Florida declaring the month of February as Bile Duct Cancer Month in the City of 457 Riviera Beach.
 - WHEREAS, Cholangiocarcinoma, also known as Bile Duct Cancer, is a rare cancer that affects an estimated twenty thousand people a year in the United States; and
- WHEREAS, Bile Duct Cancer is a rare disease to detect because it does not usually cause signs or symptoms until later in the course of the disease; and
 - WHEREAS, TanAngels Forever, Inc. is a 501(c)(3) organization whose mission is to bring awareness, educate others, support those affected by the disease, raise funds for research and awareness for Bile Duct Cancer while partnering and collaborating with other organizations to bring awareness; and
 - WHEREAS, TanAngels was founded in memory of Tanya Gayle Ingraham, who passed away in 2017 after a courageous battle with this aggressive, silent and deadly disease; and
 - WHEREAS, the organization has hosted two Colors of Hope brunches where it brought awareness about Bile Duct Cancer and celebrated cancer warriors, survivors and caregivers, has delivered three hundred TanAngels gift bags of hope, which included healthcare products, inspirational items, blankets and stuffed animals to cancer patients, and hosted the second annual 10k, 5k run/walk on February 12, 2020 and assisted fifty-three cancer patients financially during 2020 Fiscal Year.

If you come down any interstate here in this, this City limits, you don't see anything on 95 directing for any information or regulatory coming to the City. No information about hotels, gas, some place to eat or anything. Can somebody tell me why that's not represented on 95 for our City?

And I thank you all for taking the time out, giving individuals here some food, making sure they get a shot every now and then, whatever the case may be, for COVID-19, but why is it that you have to pinpoint everything to be done east of the railroad tracks? We have Wells Recreation, which is good. That's where ya'll line up at. But what's wrong with Tate's? Call it Dan Calloway. Why is it that all the residents all have to come east of the tracks to get anything done? Because ya'll don't do anything for the residents on that other side of the tracks, that we can see. You might have it in your mouth saying you're doing it, but because I don't see it, it may be done under cover.

Nobody takes the time out to address the questions that I've come in here asking. And getting back with me with some definitive answer. My words may not be what they need to be to address you people, because ya'll have those educations and we put you there. But think about us. We need some help on that side of the tracks. It it's ain't no more than addressing some of the problems that we have, and we do have problems over there.

Ya'll have something coming up now to vote on, the residents to pay for something? The road, ya'll go down 1st Street, it's like a washboard. Which some of ya'll may not know what that is, but that's that up and down motion. Right off of Barack Obama. And I don't think you're traveling that [stammer] that neighborhood over there unless you are coming over to ask us for our votes, during that certain time of year. Other than that, you don't have no business to come over there and do. So, and I don't think any of ya'll know what I'm talking about unless you come over there. So one day ya'll take the time out and come on that side of the tracks and address some of those issues that I am talking about now. And I'm quite sure there's quite a few other individuals that are here can understand what I'm saying. They may not say nothing about it, but ya'll need to do something about it.

- **Ms. M. Shepherd:** Margaret Shepherd. Chair, Vice Chair and to all of you. The Mayor and the City Manager.
 - I'm here today 'cause I'm kinda troubled. I understand the election is coming on, and, and it's become a tactic to attack one another. Well, I was kinda devastated the

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other night when I was listening to the program Westside/Eastside, or whatever. I'm not sure. But, they started talking about Sammie, Sammie Brown. And it's just deplorable that this young man is going somewhere, is attacked because he speaks out. I have a four-year old.., well, she was four then, Summer. Summer got up in this mic and, I mean, this girl started saying things, unbelievable, and they said did you teach her that? I said no, she come into this meeting and she hear' this stuff. And so, Sammie's not a little kid anymore, he's eighteen. He's in college. And if nothing else, I believe that he's gonna be a part of this community that help the millennials. You haven't heard him rob anybody, he ain't got no baby on the way. So, who are you? Take care of your own children. Look at your own children. I take care of mine. And when I see them get off, I, I don't have to say too much, I just look at them. It's inappropriate to talk about a young man that's go'.., in college, and with all A's. I applaud him. And then he come' to work, I applaud him, for taking care 'his boss, who is now a widow.

So, I hope I never hear that again because some of the people that was blogging, I guess you all call it blogging, I don't know about Facebook, I'm just learning, that you.., if you wanna attack each other, attack each other, but the President of the United States, you do not attack their children. And anybody that know me, my children are off limits. I pray to go God that when I hear what someone say, I have to restrain myself because they are my children. If you have a problem with my children, or anybody else' children.., but he's not a child anymore. He's not a child. Let's deal with him appropriately. He is a gentle giant, that reaches out everywhere, he go' everywhere. How many people do that? How many, how many people go to Washington and, and, and go here and meet with the Sen'... Who does that? Who does that?

If you got children, rub your hand on their head and say thank God that my children is not in jail.

Dr. G. Spiritis: Glen Spiritis, Riviera Beach.

Honorable Mayor, Members of the Council, City Manager, City Staff. Once again, good evening. I'm glad that my comments started some discussion about the revolving loan program for the drinking water fund, and hopefully, that will move forward.

But, I'm here to speak tonight on a very disturbing email that I received a few days ago. And I wasn't gonna comment on it, except I received a phone call today that was very similar, and I felt I must bring this to the attention. And this is the email verbatim. And I don't know this person. I spoke to him yesterday, just to ask permission to read the email publicly. So, I don't know this person at all. 'Dr. Spirits, I am a resident of Riviera Beach. I understand that you are running for City Council. An individual with your opponent's name on their car door, who happens to be my next door neighbor, John

Miller, told me if I would put up a sign in my front yard for your opponent, that your opponent would get me a COVID vaccine. That was two weeks ago.

I didn't add a sign and today both my wife and I are COVID positive. I suppose that I must be old fashioned, but my opinion, this is a deadly game being played by your opponent, and I would be happy to help with your campaign in any way that I can after I get rid of the COVID virus.

Your neighbor, Stuart H. Cunningham, PE, PSM.

I don't know this person at all. But, after the comments that I heard at a previous Council meeting by some residents, and after the phone call I received today, I just hope..., and I believe that my opponent probably doesn't know about this, or had anything to do with this, but I would ask that this be looked into. And, and this stopped, that we should not be trading votes or support for a COVID vaccine. This should be off base and no one should have to deal with this. And I hope that this will be looked into.

I'm here to urge the residents, my neighbors to vote no on the two amendments on the ballot. The words protect and preserve are thrown in the'.., in there as language to distract the residents from what they're opening themselves up for. If, if either of those ballot amendments were in the best interest of the residents, there would have been a town hall on the front end, before they hit the ballot, not after the fact.

The, the other thing is, why in the middle of a pandemic, when you can't host a town hall community meeting to discuss the language before it go' on the ballot, are these two issues being pushed through? That's what you have to stop and ask yourself. These, these things are no good for you. When someone tells you that they're going to take away what you already have, to give you something that is supposed to do better by you or for you, you really need to stop and think about.., think about that.

Our water bills are high. They're extremely high. On the backs of a \$40 million loan that we got no benefit from, that's what we.., that's why our water bills are high. Our water bills are collateral for that loan. Our water bills will continue to be high for the borrowing of several more million dollars. So, now, you say that we want to be assessed for proposed road work that might happen. Now mind you, it doesn't read like that on the ballot itself, but when you look at what's proposed and what could happen to you because of the language that's there, that's what we need to look for.

I urge you to vote no. And if the community is looking out for themselves, and if they have any interest about where we're going and what's happening to you, I'd like to take this opportunity to tell you, we must vote for Glen Spiritis so that we can retain and get community back, and control. Because, we are giving away our City block by block.

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- Please ask the City if it will allow us to use the Ambassador Center, subject to COVID distancing requirements.
- Thank you in advance for helping me arrange this meeting. Sincerely, Karen Gleason.
- So, Dr. Botel got back to me and said, 'Yes, you can host the meeting.' There is a fee, and fine, \$55, which we paid and which I have evidence of here. The check hasn't cleared the bank yet, but I brought the bank'.., the register. And, we sent out about a thousand invitations. Asked Dr. Botel for help with that to let the area know and got back

- forty-four RSVPs. We know every person who got an invitation, and we know every person who got, who got the... who RSVP'd to us.
- And we had a very informative, helpful, thank you, socially distanced...

- **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.
- **Ms. K. Gleason:** That's it. My time's up. Okay. That's fine.

- **Mr. S. Craig:** Steven Craig, 1091 Pine Point Road.
 - I was also at this meeting and I appreciate Commissioner Botel coming over to update us, and the Staff to update us on the things that are going on, on Singer Island. You know, people.., there's some feedback on this. There's some blowback, I guess, but if I had invited Commissioner Botel to my house and invited ten or fifteen of my residents, and she had brought a couple of Staff and we had a meeting in my home, no one would say anything. There would be no problem with that. And if someone who wanted to come in my home and disrupt the meeting, and I said, 'No, you can't come into my home. You can't disrupt our meeting.' No one would have a problem with that.
 - So, the only difference is we invited more people than fit my home. So, we rented a place that would accommodate the people. And I don't see any problem with this. It seems like a lot to do about nothing. And I thank everybody.
 - One quick thing, I got my second shot today and I would like to say that the, the efficiency of the Staff, and the police and the Fire Department, and the organization was incredible. It has to be the best that's in the United States of America.

- **Ms. B. Smith:** Good evening all. My name is Ms. Brown.
 - Here again we are revisiting this deplorable water issue in Riviera Beach, again. If I may digress back to maybe about a decade ago, and here it is again, we're getting our water bills raised, extremely high. We didn't get a notice the first time, we still haven't got a notice this time. And this is just not fair to the residents of Riviera Beach.
 - Unlike FPL and any other, other Utilities, they always let the residents know ahead of time, two or three months in advance, that they're gonna raise their rates. I can't

772 understand, as a panel, why we are not given that same opportunity when you're raising 773 our rates? Again, I think that this.., that this issue shouldn't keep being re'.., keep being 774 revisited over and over again. The water is awful. Some people, in some areas, they're 775 turning on their water and the water is green.

As a matter of fact, actually, I used to reside in Chicago before I [stammer] relocated here to South Florida. I have a friend that just called me last night and she too was telling me that there's some issues in Florida, especially in our area. She said, 'I can't believe that you guys have water like that.' And, as you all know who are very political, you know that Chicago is a very political city, and while there, I was involved in different things that we've done. But, we must do something about this. We can't keep revisiting something every, every decade. So, it's been ten years and, and here we go again, we're addressing the same issues. We must do something about this.

And, and, and also, that requires changing who we have, some people that's there, that's supposed to be orchestrating this, they're not doing what they're supposed do. So, when that happens, we are gonna have to put someone else in their place to do what has to be done.

We can't even be in here without there being some altercation. I had my own experience. I'm sure there'll be many more, but at the end of

With regard to your aide, Sammie, I want to go on record and publicly say, if you read what I said about him, it was no knock on him and it had more to do with you, than it did him. At the end of the day, every one of these people up here have had aides. The people prior to you have had aides, and whether there was disdain or not, they have put forth the effort to keep their aides out of harm's way, in the sense of monitoring what they say. I'm gonna start off by saying that I was truly disgusted by some of the things that are going on in the City right now because, again, we have this division all of a sudden, that I guess is some kind of power takeover to where we want certain people out of office, who are actually doing their job and doing their job very well. I talked to a person today at the school, it was a parent and another teacher, and they stated that, 'Hey, man. You know, everything was going on pretty good in the City right now and our City wanna change things for some reason.' I said, 'Well, yeah. I don't agree with some of those changes in, in the City because things are going very well right now. We've been out of the news, the people are very professional, they're doing their jobs adequately, but it takes a slow.., it's a slow process. Alright? It's not just gonna start up and just be really great one day, it has to be a slow process. Barack Obama, first four years, they had to get everything straightened out, and then after a while, they kinda started booming. Things are gonna run that way. Alright?

So, we have to take time out, change should not be made. Mrs. Botel is doing a great job in this City. And let me just tell you how I met Mrs. Botel. I told Mr. Felder the same thing, 'Anytime you need help with anything, give me a call.' Same thing with our City Manager. Mrs. Anderson, she was my boss at one time over at Bear Lakes. Same thing, 'If you ever need any help with anything, give me a call.'

968 I have no problem in helping out in the City with anything that's dealing with my 969 kids, but one thing I'm not gonna tolerate is that now people attacking anybody on this 970 Staff because of what they're doing and what they're not doing, and wanna make changes 971 about water and all kinda stuff like that. Listen, these problems been here for twenty years. They just didn't start up last week. Alright? And the thing is, that I'm not gonna 972 973 talk about Mr. Spiritis because he seems to be a good guy. But, one thing I can say is 974 that, he hasn't been around to do anything for us yet. Okay? But one thing I do know is 975 that I can talk about Mrs. Botel because I've seen the things that she is doing. Alright? 976 The kids, let me tell you one thing Ms. Anderson and Mrs. Botel have done, over at Palm 977 Beach Lakes, and over at Bear Lakes Middle School, and over at Roosevelt, one thing 978 we've done, we had a bunch of kids who could not afford to be able to go to Grad Bash. 979 Alright? These people contributed to these kids to be able to go. - **Mr. T. Davis:** Good evening, Council and Mayor, Staff and residents of Riviera Beach.
- 1015 My name is Terrance Davis, former Councilman of the City. Current father, loving father.
- 1016 I love our community.

Ladi March talked about the relationships that we have in this room, in this community. And one of the things I wanna talk about is, prior to someone running the campaign on our City in turmoil. The Chair and many others, 'cause it wasn't just her. We found a way to make things work in this community. We found a way. Fane Lozman's been a issue in this community for over fifteen years, and every election, there's a big fight about Fane Lozman. Leave Fane... Spend that time and energy, not on Fane Lozman, but spend it on our..., spend it on our water plant. All these special meetings and private meetings, I'm fine with it if you're helping the quality of our life, I'm cool with that. But, when you start putting [stammer] Items on the Agenda to talk about Fane, when he go in those courts, it look personal, and that's why we keep losing in the courtroom.

Ms. Botel, I will only talk about Items that you vote on. We got an Item that's on the Agenda to talk about our Police Department being a Chartered Department. And the reason it was on there because you talked about going to the sheriff department. You talked about that in a meeting. These are only Items that are on the Agenda. I will never talk to you personally. You've done some good things, yes, you have. When you start talking about our Police Department, our water plant be privatized in public meetings, but you refuse to put it on the Agenda 'cause you didn't want no accountability, but you bring it up in general comment. And these are public discussions that we need to talk about these issues. These issues.

Now, Ms. Jill Wardle and her.., her and I, and the young lady that spoke got into it about a beach polo event because she thought I was trying to stop it because, when I was on the Council, Botel told her I would not support it. But, what I didn't know was, that Councilperson Botel told her, when all of us was on the dais, that there was a email and

I read it, that it said that I will not support your beach polo event unless you put me on your business account. And that's on public record. What Councilperson threatens to put their name on their business account for a vote? Not only didn't she do it, you took the money from her, with the police officer, moved the money into another bank account...

This is all, this is all fact. City issues, a lawsuit that we're gonna have to pay for. And everybody who voted on it, and all.., like myself, is gonna be in the courtroom as a witness.

Everybody, let's stop fighting each other, and holding the real people accountable.

If they're wrong, help them get better. If they continue to do wrong, stop them. I've always said, help people do better. But she won't stop. When we have issues in the City, let the Police Department...

- **Ms. B. Brown:** Good evening. Bessie Brown.

I'm here about the amendments, and these Minutes, all these workshop Minutes that, that the public was not allowed to be present to and speak. And, and that's, that's..., and then now, we're getting them all in one shot. And half the time, we didn't even know about these workshops. But basically, I hope that the City Clerk does better than..., better by that. And I would appreciate it if you all have workshops, that you invite..., that you inform the public, and the public, when you have a workshop, the public speaks. Because, that's the purpose of the workshop.

On these amendments, repeal of special assessments that require fifty percent of the cost of all street and secondary drainage improvements to be paid by the [stammer] City property owner. Well, if we, if we vote for it, that means the \$4 million project on Singer Island can go through. Or.., but, if, you know, but if we don't, but if we don't vote for it, I don't know how they're gonna handle that.

But also, the Police and Fire Department shall be considered Charter departments and shall be preserved by requiring a referendum vote of the electorate to abolish this outsource and/or otherwise transfer the City's provision of law enforcement and fire services to any other entity. Hmm. That would be fine if it di'..., if it didn't mean that the

Police or Fire Department.., that the City shall have the authority to establish or abolish any City department, or office, other than the Police and Fire Departments, by Ordinance, or by adoption of the, of the budget. Now, that wasn't the purpose. The purpose was to make sure that these departments, the Police and Fire Department will not be.., would [stammer] she be... To be.., to, to be on their own and don't.., [stammer] and the City cannot get rid of it. But, it didn't.., it was not for the City to abolish any City department or office other than the Police and the Fire... and, you know?

That's the thing. These things.., it's, it's... One thing in here giving the City Council a whole lot of authority, which that's not what, what was the intent of [stammer] the, the citizens. Now, you, you say one thing, and then you're doing another. You're giving the City Council all this information.., I mean, all this authority to be put into the Charter. That's not necessary. So, I would encourage the, the public to vote no on both amendments as fast as they can.

How many times have I said, in other words, when Julie's getting attacked, or any of any of you are getting attacked. Tradrick's been attacked. Some of you's have not been attacked. KaShamba's been attacked many, many times. Same person every time. Right? But Shirley stood up. I wasn't here, Shirley, but I heard what you did and then I watched it. You did the right thing. You know, we all have a right to get up here and speak, under our First Amendment rights, but what..., a lot of times what we say is wrong. And it's hard to stand up here and say the right thing.

Julie, I apologize to you because what was said by your candidate, or your opponent here, was hearsay and is not true. Period. First of all, why would anybody.., putting a sign in their yard, how can that be a quid pro quo for a vaccine shot? What actually happened, period, was I put my sign in and the neighbor saw me. And when the neighbor walked over, he.., we started talking about COVID, how we both called, couldn't get through. Then it was that we both emailed, and we didn't hear anything. And I said to him, 'Listen, I heard that the church was starting to give shots out,' and I said, 'Give your Councilperson a call and say please put me on a list if there's a possibility for a shot.' I asked him if he wanted a sign and he said, 'I, I don't.., I'll, I'll think about it.' And that was the end of the conversation. There was nothing about... No investigation, Mr. Spiritis... It's hearsay, and, you know, you're a very litigious person.

But, I mean, you're endorsed by some of the worst people in this City. And they are the people who were thrown out of the.., thrown out of office, from, from this dais, they're people who ran for office and lost, they're people who are s'... were fired from the City. they're people who are suing the City. [Chuckle]. And, Jill Wardle, my God. That person who was up here. Julie Botel had to get on [chuckle] a... had to get on a bank account because she, Jill Wardle wasn't paying the vendors. She was taking the sponsor's money from polo and spending it on herself. And the police, she's filed a million reports saying Julie stole this and stole that. Every single one of those investigations have been shown groundless. And they are public record.

So, you know, [chuckle], you have some awful people that you [chuckle], that you've surrounded yourself with, Glen. I, I really swear, I do know him, I don't think he knew about the quality of the people who, who are behind him. He's not that, he's not that bad a guy. Glen Spiritis is not a bad guy. A whole lotta people behind him are really bad guys.

1147 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.

1148 **City Clerk Anthony:** Fane Lozman, Ana V.

1149 **Mr. F. Lozman:** Fane Lozman.

Let's talk about what went on last Thursday night at the Ambassador Center. Julia Botel used her administrative assistant, Sammie Brown, and his email address, and his work hours to spend countless hours coordinating what should've been a public meeting, and instead became a sham meeting and a campaign event. Okay? City computers, City email, City Staff, City office. When SICA used to have candidate forums, they rented a place and they invited people over. With Julia Botel, you had no choice. The City Manager showed up, the Assistant City Manager showed up, Lina Busby showed up, and Sirmons showed up. Okay? That was a City meeting. Okay?

I've talked to a lot of people. I was the First Amendment foundation Man of the Year, up at the Senate Luncheon three years ago. I've studied the Sunshine law for years. You don't know what you're talking about, lady. Go rent a place you coordinated. Once it's coordinated with City Staff, it's a public meeting. You sent an invitation to an attorney who attended, and you had him thrown out. A thirty-four year member of the bar, James Ryan. Unbelievable. We have a text message from Botel talking about, talking about don't, don't record anything. We don't want Lozman to know. We wanna talk about how the City is gonna target him. City Staff. These City Staff know that Botel is like a plantation owner, if she does something wrong, they're gonna end up getting fired.

Ladi March Goldwire was fired because she gave a fence permit, and Botel demanded that it be rescinded. And, when she didn't, she was fired two years later.., two hours later. She has a major civil rights lawsuit going on in federal court.

Botel is an evil person. Okay? She is an evil person. What she did to one of the only female, black Building Officials in the country, is evil. She goes around, threatens people, wastes huge amount of money and is an obsessive freak when it comes to me. She spends all her day, not doing anything for the City, calling up the Army Corp, calling up DEP, calling up Code Enforcement, making meetings with her Staff. And when she's not doing that, she's defrauding the City of work product, running a sham charity out of her office. Governor DeSantis entered an Executive Order for that. The hat lady over there, she puts down her, her...

- **Mr. F. Lozman:** ...office as Botel's office. There's paperwork filed with the state
- where Judy Dixon said this is my office address, 600 West Blue Heron. Okay? Judy
- Dixon and Botel have stolen taxpayer's funds by using City Staff, office equipment, lights,
- 1183 rent. I'm telling you...

Botel, I.., some ways, I hope you do get elected, 'cause it's my goal to see what happened to you what happened to Poitier in 2011. I was there when Poitier was arrested and marched into the Broward jail. I wanna be there when they do a perp walk with you. She even went and ripped off the red tags on, on the Stonybrook housing. There's so much scandal going on with you, Botel, I'm looking forward to seeing you locked up one day.

1191 City Clerk Anthony: Ana V.

1192 **Ms. A. Vergne:** Hi. I'm Ana Vergne. I live at 167 East 24th Street.

This is the first time that I've been here and it's kinda shameful. It is clear that it

was a Botel beat up session. This...

1195 Chairperson Botel: Ms...

1196 **Ms. A. Vergne:** ...City has...

1197 **Chairperson Botel:** Ms. Vergne...

1198 **Ms. A. Vergne:** ...a lot of problems...

1199 **Chairperson Botel:** Could you speak into the microphone?

1200 **Ms. A. Vergne:** Yeah. This City has a lot of problems. Like, I, I just recently moved

here and I must speak to Council or Mr. Evans, or somebody practically every day. Those

1202 two Ordinances we speak of? Yes, we need to vote yes on those. You really need to do

1203 your homework because those are really important.

One issue that we have with the City, that I really need to address, is the way the,

the, the City speaks to its residents. Especially you as the Mayor. Shame on you. You

need to respect the people around you...

1207 Chairperson Botel: Just...

1208 **Ms. A. Vergne:** ...and the way you talk to people.

1209 **Chairperson Botel:** Face the mic.

1210 **Ms. A. Vergne:** 'Cause, in this City, we're all equal. Whether we live on the west side

or the east side. Don't ever talk to me again like that. Ever. And I'm not gonna give up

the fight.

You see, I do live on the east side, and I refuse to ever let you talk to me that way.

1214 And I will address that one way or the other.

But, this is not a Botel beat up session. She does work. She has helped me a lot.

1216 So has Mr. Evans. So has KaShamba. And, if they did not help me, God knows where I

would be. So please, lay off people. Let's come together and help the City. Because,

there's a lot that we can do together, instead of going against each other. And it's really

upsetting to see that I, I really sit at home and I work hard for the City. I don't work for

the City, but Mr. Evans can tell you, there isn't a day that doesn't go by where I text this

- 1226 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, that concludes public
- 1227 comments.
- 1228 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 1229 ORDINANCES ON SECOND AND FINAL READING
- 1230 **Chairperson Botel:** I think we're up to Item No. thir'.., Sorry. 12. Thank you.
- 1231 City Clerk Anthony: ORDINANCE NUMBER 4161 AN ORDINANCE OF THE
- 1232 CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF RIVIERA BEACH, PALM BEACH COUNTY,
- 1233 FLORIDA, PROVIDING FOR AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 10, ARTICLE IV OF THE
- 1234 RIVIERA BEACH CODE OF ORDINANCES (ORDINANCE NO. 2480) ENTITLED
- 1235 SPECIAL EVENTS, PUBLIC FAIRS, PARADES, EXPOSITIONS, CIRCUSES,
- 1236 CARNIVALS AND EXHIBITIONS; PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION; PROVIDING
- 1237 FOR REPEAL OF LAWS IN CONFLICT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND

- 1240 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we do not have any
- public comment cards on this Item. The acceptance of public comment cards on this Item
- is now closed.
- 1243 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Would someone care to make a motion to
- 1244 approve Ordinance 4161?
- 1245 **Councilperson McCoy:** Madam Chair?
- 1246 **Councilperson Lanier:** So moved.
- 1247 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. You're recognized, Mr. McCoy.
- 1248 Councilperson McCoy: Second.
- 1249 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. It is moved and seconded to approve Ordinance
- 1250 4161. Do we have a presentation? I'm sorry.
- 1251 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, if it is the pleasure of the Board, Staff can
- present. There has been no modifications and changes since first reading. And Staff
- recommends approval on second and final reading.

- 1254 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Any questions or comments? Mr. McCoy, you're
- recognized.
- 1256 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Mr. Evans, and thank you, Madam Chair. Can I
- get some volume on my microphone, please?
- 1258 My question is, and pardon me, Members, I was looking...
- 1259 [Inaudible audience comments]
- 1260 **Chairperson Botel:** Could, could we please have a little quiet from the back?
- 1261 Thank you. Could you take that outside?
- 1262 Councilperson McCoy: Mr. Evans...
- 1263 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 1264 Councilperson McCoy: Can I get volume?
- 1265 Mr. Evans, my question is, and pardon my absence for the first reading of this, but
- my guestion concerning Item No. 12 is, and I didn't see the actual vote count from the
- first reading. Would we know what that is? Was it unanimous?
- 1268 **City Manager Evans:** I believe it was unanimous. Yes, sir.
- 1269 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. And, nor did I see these questions come up, but I
- wanna pose them now because I have some concerns, specifically, about maybe three
- items. The first one is, in the proposed Ordinance, the indemnification clause, there's not
- a distinction between a special event that occurs on public property versus that that
- occurs on private property. And, as I want to believe, the City has no control or authority
- in mandating that someone has any kind of insurance requirements for a special event
- on private property. So, that's my first question. I have two other ones. So, how do you
- 1276 wanna respond, Mr. Evans?
- 1277 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, that's a question that Legal should respond to.
- 1278 **City Attorney Wynn:** Mr. McCoy, the definition of special events, this contemplates
- that it's on publicly owned property. However, if it's on private property and it spills over
- and impacts public property, then this would take effect as well.
- 1281 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, that's the very role of us as legislators, and lawmakers,
- that we are the person that creates that [stammer]. Like, we don't complicate'...,
- 1283 [inaudible] any speculation. That's exactly what my concern is. I don't want us to pass
- this, and this is actually a Ordinance, which makes it a little bit more difficult to repeal,
- that we don't put in something that requires.., that's so broad, that someone can interpret
- it that, if you're doing a grand opening... Now, the City needs to concern themselves with
- 1287 a type of liability coverage that, that you're having for your special event. And I so
- understand that if it's a public event, or on public property or in the public right-of-way, I

- 1289 would definitely see that that would be appropriate. But, this is so vague that someone can interpret this as being required for a event held on private property. 1290
- So, for that reason, I'm gonna ask that... Well, I'm gonna offer, before we go to a 1291 1292 vote, that we offer some sort of clarification or an amendment to that section.
- 1293 Chairperson Botel: I'm sorry, could you say the section again? I'm trying to find
- 1294 it.
- 1295 Councilperson McCoy: It's, it's the section of 4161, that says indemnification, that
- 1296 anybody with..., applying for a special event, with a special even application, provides
- 1297 proof of insurance.
- 1298 But, my concern, Madam Chair, is that we shouldn't be doing that for events held on private property, and this Ordinance does not address that. It pretty much mandates 1299
- that indemnification, or proof of insurance be re'... provided. 1300
- 1301 **Chairperson Botel:** What page is that on?
- 1302 Councilperson McCoy: Let's see. I think it's on Page.., pdf Page 4. And it's Section
- 1303 5. Conditions for permit.
- 1304 **Chairperson Botel:** I see it. Thank you.
- 1305 Councilperson McCoy: Indemnification and insurance.
- 1306 **Chairperson Botel:** I see it. Thank you.
- 1307 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, that's the first item that I wanna bring up.
- 1308 Secondly, if I can get back...
- 1309 **Chairperson Botel:** Well, should we deal with that first, maybe?
- 1310 Councilperson McCoy: Well... Go ahead.
- Well, I was going... I know that we also have in process. a **City Attorney Wynn:** 1311
- special events policy and procedure manual, so I didn't know if Ms. Noel wanted to 1312
- 1313 address that, if the...
- 1314 [Inaudible comment]
- 1315 **City Attorney Wynn:** ...section dealing with the spillover, if you will, from private
- property onto public right-of-way is covered in the policy and procedure manual? 1316
- Assistant to the City Manager Noel: Yeah. So, in... I'm sorry. For the record, my 1317
- 1318 name...
- 1319 **Councilperson McCoy:** Can we get volume, please?

- 1320 **Assistant to the City Manager Noel:** ...is Marsha Noel.
- 1321 **Councilperson McCoy:** We need volume.
- 1322 Assistant to the City Manager Noel: Hello. Hello. Okay?
- For the record, my name is Marsha Noel, assistant to the City Manager. And I played a role in the development in our current policies and procedures manual that we wor'... that we're working on.
- But, in particular, on that, on that issue, the guidelines specify that when it comes to that manual, it's primarily for those events that are gonna be done privately, on private property. As it relates to City events, City contracted events, things of that sort, it's important to note that there will be special exceptions. But, when it comes to private pro'..., when it comes to special events, there is going to be a requirement of insurance typic'...
- that's customary in most cases, with other cities.
- 1332 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. Why would the guidelines apply to private property? I
- 1333 don't understand that.
- 1334 **Assistant to the City Manager Noel:** I think what can be done, is that there can be, in
- the guidelines itself, a [stammer] a specification to insurance being required, if it spills
- over into City.., onto City property, or if it's being done on private.., on City property in
- total. So, there can be a specification in the guidelines for that. But the intent in the
- guidelines is to clarify that if you are going to do an event in the City, and specifically on
- public property, or public right-of-way...
- 1340 **Councilperson McCoy:** I'm speaking of private...
- 1341 Assistant to the City Manager Noel: ...that we will require...
- 1342 **Councilperson McCoy:** I'm talking about...
- 1343 Assistant to the City Manager Noel: ...insurance.
- 1344 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...private... I'm talking about private. I'm, I'm only speaking
- of private, and the require'... I'm not interested in public property because it's already
- understood that when we do special events, but there's not a distinction. And for that
- reason, I don't wanna support this Item. And there's a couple other reasons, but, Ms...
- 1348 Madam, Madam Attorney, this is very vague...
- 1349 **City Attorney Wynn:** [Inaudible].
- 1350 Councilperson McCoy: ...and I don't want to authorize Staff to go back and make a
- manual which they're gonna refer back to that the Council approved it and gave us
- direction, when we don't even know what the manual is gonna look like. But once we
- codify this in Code, this gives Staff the exact authority. Which leads to my next question.
- 1354 And, I think I've heard enough, Ms. Noel, regarding that. But I wanna come back.

- But, why are we doing an Ordinance anyway? And why not a Resolution?
- 1356 **City Attorney Wynn:** We already ha'.., excuse me, had a special events Ordinance.
- 1357 This is an amendment to that. I don't know what the, the deficiencies were, with the prior
- special events Ordinance, but it's already in our Code.
- 1359 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right. But, wouldn't we be able to then.., it seems like Mr.
- Evans is looking to get your attention, Madam Chair.
- 1361 Chairperson Botel: I'm sorry. [Inaudible].
- 1362 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, with regards to the permits related to events on
- private property, one of the things that, it, it's Staff's opinion, and I've seen this in multiple
- other entities, the reason that you would ask for a private property owner to apply for a
- special event permit, because their site plan has specified certain ingress/egress, certain
- parking spaces or what have you. If you're gonna utilize a parking lot for an event or
- activity, there is certain provisions that must take place in order to ensure that folks are
- gonna be safe. And so, that is one of the elements that is intended to be reflected in this
- particular policy as to why, you know, we would like a permit. Because, these businesses
- that are seeking..., or, or doing business are... they've re'... received site plan approval,
- they're intended to do 'x', but if they're gonna have activities or programs in their parking
- lot, there is a impact to Joe Q citizen that would be visiting that particular business. And
- so, it's the assuredy to know that persons can have safe passage, and they can still do
- what they're intending to do.
- 1375 **Councilperson McCoy:** Follow up.
- 1376 Assistant to the City Manager Noel: Madam Chair? If, if I may?
- 1377 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. Okay.
- 1378 **Assistant to the City Manager Noel:** Sorry. And we also have Staff here, because
- we, we do process insurance requirement currently. And so, I think maybe Mr.
- 1380 Blankenship, if...
- 1381 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair, I reclaim my time because I'm, I'm very limited,
- and I have two other points. And what they're suggesting is not even answering my
- guestion. I'm only asking about why are we en'... why are we enacting a provision that's
- gonna require an applicant to provide insurance on private property. I understand, and I
- agree, that they should submit an application for a permit. I'm only speaking to the
- requirement of us asking an applicant on private property to make the City the additional
- insured. And the way that it is written, there is no distinction between a special event on
- insured. And the way that it is written, there is no distinction between a special event on
- public property or a special event on private property. So, the suggestion that Mr. Evans is making I totally agree with, but that's not the question that I'm asking. And unless I see
- 13 making riolany agree with, but that 3 not the question that i'm asking. 7 the unless 1 see
- a manual that's gonna lay out a distinction between a public special event and one that's
- being held on private property, I just wanna caution the Members that we're really creating
- a situation where this can potentially happen. And that's just the first of two other
- additional items that I found inside of these proposed Ordinances that I don't agree with.

But, I've not heard any justification. And we've already spent five minutes. I wanna move on, and I don't wanna talk about the, the very essence of doing a permit on app'.., on a private property, because I agree. And I've seen why they're important because just the traffic going in and out, you definitely need a, a permit for that. I, I just wanna move forward, Ms... Madam Chair so...

1399 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. Go ahead.

1400 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...I can ask my next question.

1401 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.

1402 **Councilperson McCoy:** The provision requiring a Business Tax Receipt, I definitely would ask Members to strike that because what you're suggesting is anybody that comes 1403 into the City, have to get Business Tax Receipt if they're doing a special event. And it 1404 may just be a two-hour event, three-hour event. And, if you know anything about trying 1405 to get a Business Tax Receipt in the City, it's certainly not easy. And we're gonna sit here 1406 and require somebody... The reason why I don't agree with it, because there's no way 1407 that, out of our, what is it \$82 million budget, that every dollar and dime that we spend. 1408 1409 that we require every person that's not an employee, to get a Business Tax Receipt, just because they use City dollars. Just because they received City dollars. People come in 1410 all the time as vendors, as contractors, and we don't require them to get a Business Tax 1411 Receipt. If somebody comes here and wants to do a.., like, they had speed dating, do 1412 1413 we now require speed dating and those folks who had a two hour event, three hour event to go through the arduous process of getting a Business Tax Receipt? I think that's just 1414 1415 absurd. And it really does more to deter people from even coming to bring a special event to the City, then it would to encourage it. I mean, they have no vested interest, nor the 1416 weeks of processing for an application, much less a.., an additional bureaucratic fee to 1417 1418 do a, a one-time event?

So, I'm gonna ask and I'm gonna reserve back, and I would welcome any response, but I'm gonna ask that we, you know, strike that provision out of the Code.

1421 **City Attorney Wynn:** Mr., Mr...

1422 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. Evans.

1423 City Attorney Wynn: ...McCoy...

1424 City Manager Evans: It ma'...

1425 **City Attorney Wynn:** ...is that...

1426 Chairperson Botel: Or...

1427 **City Attorney Wynn:** ... Section 10?

1428 Chairperson Botel: ...Ms. Wynn. Sorry.

- 1429 **City Attorney Wynn:** Is that Section 10 that you're referring to?
- 1430 Councilperson McCoy: Um...
- 1431 **Chairperson Botel:** Section... [Pause]. Yes.
- 1432 **Councilperson McCoy:** It's in there [inaudible]...
- 1433 **Chairperson Botel:** Section 10-120. As I see it.
- 1434 City Manager Evans: And, and...
- 1435 **City Attorney Wynn:** Right.
- 1436 **City Manager Evans:** ...Madam Chair, with regards to the...
- 1437 **Chairperson Botel:** On Page 11.
- 1438 **City Manager Evans:**the, the Business Tax Receipt provision. I believe Ms. Noel,
- that is consistent with all the municipalities that we did survey, that they had that particular
- language in their policy.
- 1441 **City Attorney Wynn:** And, it is a current pro'... It's currently in our Code. This is
- not a new provision.
- 1443 **Councilperson McCoy:** To require a Business Tax from someone that doesn't have a
- domicile or have a specific place of business here, to do a special one-time event?
- 1445 **City Attorney Wynn:** The language that you see in Section 10, is not new language.
- 1446 Yes. It's always been in our Code. There are... you may see two small underlines at the
- end of Section 10-120, but the rest of that language was already here and has not been
- 1448 changed.
- 1449 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. I'm sorry. Well, I guess this... Well, will we be... Now,
- we..., will be able to strike that, Madam, Madam Chair, since we're already in this section?
- 1451 Chairperson Botel: I think [stammer], to tell you the truth, it makes a great deal of
- sense to me what Mr. McCoy is saying. If somebody is coming in... And I didn't know
- there was a speed dating thing going on, nobody told me.
- 1454 **Councilperson McCoy:** It was the day after the funeral. It was right after the funeral.
- 1455 [Chuckle]
- 1456 Chairperson Botel: Sorry.
- 1457 **Councilperson McCoy:** You, you was gonna attend?

- 1458 Chairperson Botel: It does... [Chuckle]. It does make sense to me that if
- somebody's just coming in for a couple of hours, why would we need them to have a
- Business Tax Receipt? I agree with Mr. McCoy that that's something maybe we should
- discuss as a, as a group and see if we all agree that that should be taken out.
- 1462 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson**: Madam Chair?
- 1463 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. You're recognized, Commissioner Miller-Anderson.
- 1464 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Is the Business Tax Receipt, Receipt process
- the same as the person who is establishing their business? Or, is it, like, just a shorter
- 1466 process?
- 1467 Assistant to the City Manager Noel: This... Sorry. If I may? I would like Staff, if I
- can have Ms. Franks or Mr. Blankenship kind of respond to this, because they're intently
- involved in the current...
- 1470 Councilperson McCoy: No, no, ma'am.
- 1471 **Assistant to the City Manager Noel:** ...per'.., permitting process...
- 1472 **Councilperson McCoy:** This is very...
- 1473 Assistant to the City Manager Noel: ...so they...
- 1474 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...simple question.
- 1475 **Assistant to the City Manager Noel:** ...can answer...
- 1476 **Councilperson McCoy:** It's a very simple question as to our current process. Mr.
- 1477 Blankenship wouldn't be Development Services, but I already hear enough horror stories
- about how much it takes to get a BTR. I mean, that's a very simple question that...
- 1479 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Right.
- 1480 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...Councilwoman Miller-Anderson asked.
- 1481 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Well, that's what I'm just trying to find out. Is it
- actually two separate processes? I know the regular Business Tax Receipt process, but
- 1483 with this...
- 1484 **Councilperson McCoy:** It's the same.
- 1485 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** ...special event, is there, like, a, a exped'...
- 1486 Chairperson Botel: Expedited?
- 1487 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Thank you.

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- 1488 [Chuckles] 1489 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Expedited process for the Business Tax Receipt for this? 1490 1491 Richard Blankenship, Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: Good evening. 1492 Parks & Recreation Director. 1493 Now, just so I'm clear, we're talking about Business Tax Receipts for vendors at special events. Not for special events. 1494 1495 **Chairperson Botel:** Oh. Oh. 1496 City Attorney Wynn: Right. The vendor. 1497 **Chairperson Botel:** That makes sense. Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: So, even when we do football games, 1498 1499 and we have food trucks, that vendor has to get a Business Tax Receipt. 1500 Chairperson Botel: Okay. That, that makes sense now. 1501 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Thank you. 1502 **Chairperson Botel:** Does that help you? 1503 Councilperson McCoy: No, it doesn't. 1504 Chairperson Botel: Oh. [Chuckle]. 1505 [Inaudible dais comment] 1506 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, here, here's why I don't agree. Because, now, once we get into this, do we then come over here on Sundays and make everybody that rents a 1507 space for twenty-five dollars, and here for two or three hours, to now get a Business Tax 1508 1509 Receipt? Because many of those are pop up businesses, and that becomes the new trend. I know we do have this Code, but there are businesses that actually have made a 1510 significant business in just popping up, and that's the very nature of it, that you don't have 1511
- 1513 And, even still, right, if we present this Item as presented, then every one of those persons out there would now be subjected to the special event clause. And, lastly, I'll 1514 throw this out there, that also raises the question of the provision that mentions the 1515 1516 Community Redevelopment Agency. Is that an existing portion already? 10-23? 10...
- 1517 Section 10-123? That the City...

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1518 **City Attorney Wynn:** That's...

to go through the whole process of doing that.

1519 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...retains the right to apply certain elements?

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- 1520 **City Attorney Wynn:** That's a new section.
- 1521 City Manager Evans: That's... Madam Chair, if...
- 1522 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. Evans, you're recognized.
- 1523 City Manager Evans: If, if I may? With regards to the, the Business Tax Receipt
- 1524 and the research that Staff conducted. The reason why it's in the Code, and why it's in
- 1525 other special events policies, is because your brick and mortar businesses are required
- to have it and they pay taxes associated with, and Utility fees and what have you. If you 1526
- have a situation where entities can come into your community and do business, and 1527
- 1528 then.., that reside without your community, there's no benefit besides the business
- 1529 operation or activity that that they're doing. So, that allows for the City to be able to
- 1530 receive some type of monetary contribution for conducting business in your City, because
- all your brick-and-mortar businesses are required to have a Business Tax receipt. And 1531
- 1532 so, that's why other municipalities require that as a part of conducting business in their
- 1533 community.
- 1534 I have a question about..., something that Mr. McCoy said **Chairperson Botel:**
- 1535 raised this guestion in my mind, do we require the people who participate in our tiki market
- 1536 to have a Business Tax... to pay a Business Tax Receipt?
- 1537 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, yes.
- 1538 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay. Oh, thank you.
- Councilperson McCoy: So, this is not really good, Madam Chair, because, looking 1539
- 1540 back at that, this says, 'Section 10-20 of the Riviera Beach Code of Ordinances is hereby
- amended to read as follows: Section 10-120 Special Event Vendor Requirement. All 1541
- vendors not licensed by the City will be required to be licensed before conducting 1542
- business in the City.' And it goes on for another couple sentences. But, what exactly is 1543
- 1544 the existing language if this section is saying that it's gonna be amended. I don't
- 1545 understand what's being amended there.
- 1546 And this, this makes it a little confusing when you don't have any underlined 1547 language, underlines to indicate the new language. What is the actual new language...
- 1548 **Chairperson Botel:** Oh, it does though. Are you looking at the same file I'm
- 1549 looking at?
- 1550 **City Attorney Wynn:** Yeah.
- 1551 **Chairperson Botel:** Sorry.
- 1552 **City Attorney Wynn:** There's a strikethrough, underlined...
- 1553 **Chairperson Botel:** My file has...

- 1554 **City Attorney Wynn:** ...version...
- 1555 **Chairperson Botel:** ...underlines and strikethroughs.
- 1556 **City Attorney Wynn:** Right.
- 1557 Chairperson Botel: Does your has...
- 1558 **City Attorney Wynn:** There's a strikethrough, underline version, Mr. McCoy.
- 1559 **Chairperson Botel:** There's an un'.., there's a [stammer]...
- 1560 **Councilperson McCoy:** That's not what I have. I don't know where I get...
- 1561 **Chairperson Botel:** Look at the next.., look at the next file down.
- 1562 Councilperson McCoy: It's the... [Pause]. Yeah. That's not what's on mine. I'm
- looking at the one that was in the backup.
- 1564 Chairperson Botel: I, I...
- 1565 **City Manager Evans:** [Inaudible].
- 1566 **Chairperson Botel:** ...was too. Yeah, I was too. There's a there's a
- strike'.., there's a.., one that is stricken through and underlined...
- 1568 **City Attorney Wynn:** And then there's...
- 1569 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well that...
- 1570 **City Attorney Wynn:** ...a clean version.
- 1571 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...helps it a whole lot, right?
- 1572 **City Attorney Wynn:** Mhmm.
- 1573 Chairperson Botel: I think it's the last... Yeah. It's the last backup... last item in
- the backup.
- 1575 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, in any event, I don't agree with vendors being required
- to do that, if they're here on a short... I mean, special event.
- 1577 Chairperson Botel: Well, I, I can understand the objection to people just coming
- in and hosting a special event, not wanting them to get a business license...
- 1579 **Councilperson McCoy:** Absolutely.

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- 1580 **Chairperson Botel:** ...but, it's the vendors. As Mr. Blankenship said, it's, it's.., it's
- the people who are engaging in the commerce. It's the.., it's not necessarily the people
- who are hosting the event, are needing to get a license.
- 1583 **Councilperson McCoy:** I understand what you're saying, Madam Chair, but here, here
- it is, so, if we have the MLK parade, and the person that's pushing the cart down the
- street selling cotton candy, are we gonna require that vendor to then go and apply and
- 1586 get a Business Tax Receipt?
- 1587 **Chairperson Botel:** I think we are. Mr. Evans.
- 1588 **Councilperson McCoy:** And it's for a two-hour event. That's exactly my, my question.
- 1589 And, I mean, obviously, we have folks that come in and do specialize trade. When we
- 1590 have a, a picnic out here, and there's a bounce house, the vendor that provides the
- bounce house, who's only gonna be here for three hours, we're gonna require them to
- come in and do a application that takes a brick and mortar, anywhere from three weeks
- 1593 to six weeks to get done, we're gonna require them to go in and complete a Business Tax
- Receipt application? And, in most cases, all of the Business Tax Receipts, along with the
- 1595 Certificate of Occupancy is about \$183. Is that what we're suggesting? Because I, I
- won't support this for that same reason.

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And, are we gonna.., we would have to revisit this Code because that's just preposterous. We would never have anybody... And, you know, I brought this up before I even got on the Board because if this was true, we should be nickel and diming UPS for every single truck that drives in our community and drops off a package, or Ama'.., every Amazon Prime truck that comes into our neighborhood, should be paying a Business Tax Receipt for every vehicle. I mean, we're getting down in the minutia and I don't think that this is what we should be doing as legislators, creating additional tax for somebody that's just coming in that has no domicile. Obviously, it costs to do business here. It costs to have a Business Tax Receipt and folks to come out and inspect your business. But if you don't have any domicile or brick and mortar location, what's the purpose of us asking a potential vendor that's here for a very short time, for a very special event, to spend that kinda time? Not even to mention the money, just the time alone, in doing this.

And unless there's a consensus with the Board, I'm just gonna not support it. There's no need to amend it if the Board Members don't agree, because I just see that that's just overreaching. And I can tell you, I've only been through the BTR process maybe about five times, it's not really a fluid situation. Especially dealing with, now, do we have a different process? Right? Do we think about adding this Code, because there is a BTR process, and unless we're gonna amend that process to then encompass special events, we're gonna make a three-hour special event vendor wait on nine different departments to sign off on one Business Tax Receipt application? And pay \$180?

I'm not supporting this Item, Members. I yield back, and I'm done.

1618 Chairperson Botel: Thank you.

1619 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Madam Chair?

- 1620 **Chairperson Botel:** You're recognized, Commissioner Miller-Anderson?
- 1621 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** So that was my question, is the process the
- same, and do we charge the same amount, or is it pro-rated?
- 1623 **City Manager Evans:** I would have to defer to, to Mr. Sherman to speak on the, the
- specificities with regards to the Business Tax Receipt for vendors for special events.
- 1625 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 1626 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Good evening. Randy
- 1627 Sherman, Finance Director.
- There's.., I think there's two things we're talking about. One is applying for the special event permit. That's, that's one process. But, if you're coming in for a BTR, it goes through that same process. You know, but again, you get your BTR and you're a vendor, you can use that all year. I mean, that's not just a one event BTR. Again, Finance
- takes the applications, and we send it forward. The process that Development Services
- and Fire and Police and Code, and the rest of them go through, that's.., I, I can't speak to
- that, but you're coming in, you're getting your BTR, it is good for the entire year. So it's
- not just a per event type BTR.
- 1636 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Thank you.
- 1637 **Chairperson Botel:** You're recognized. Anything else?
- 1638 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, is there any answer about the requirements of, like, the
- 1639 CRA. How does that work? Is that section suggesting that the CRA, any events that's
- gonna be done or hosted by the CRA are exempt from the special event requirement? I
- mean, it, it's really not very clear, Mr. Evans.
- 1642 **City Manager Evans:** The language that's here gives, gives the flexibility. It, it
- doesn't say that, you know, it shall or shall not. It says we have the right to apply any
- element contained in the Ordinance... Our intent is to follow the exact same policy that's
- prescribed by the City, to ensure that's uniform and consistency, so one person doesn't
- 1646 go to book an event at Wells Recreation Center, and then finds a different process if they
- go to the Marina Event Center, or Bicentennial Park, et. cetera. So, our intent is to comply
- with this, if this Item is, is passed in its entirety, similar to that of the City.
- 1649 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. And, I just wanna look at one last thing. Was.., and I
- didn't get a chance to pull up that strikethrough and underline version, but was there a
- definition of special events? Oh yeah, there is. I just wanna make sure that... [Pause].
- Okay. I just don't wanna have the scenario of suggesting a, a meeting in a community
- center becomes a special event. So I don't see anything that speaks of a meeting. So...
- Or even.., see, and this is... Okay. I, I don't support this Item, Members.

- 1689 Evans do we have a presentation?
- 1690 City Manager Evans: Madam Chair, if I can have the Director of Development
- Services, Mr. Clarence Sirmons, make this presentation.
- **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.
- **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Alright. Good evening, Madam Chair
- and Members of the Board.

I am pleased to be before you to present this Item. And I, I will start by saying this will be the first of multiple Items coming from Development Services related to our administration of the Florida Building Code as a City.

The Florida Building Code is adopted every three years by the state legislature, and it is automatically applies to every jurisdiction within the City. However, there are certain housekeeping aspects of it that need to be done locally, that have gone neglected for a little while here, partially due to..., for some time, outsourcing our Building Official services to third party and other factors. So, there's some things that we need to clean up and this is the first of a few Items related to it.

So, the Florida Building Code contains Chapter 1, which is related to administration of the Code. This is the things related to how a permit is processed, how inspections are done, which appendices are adopted at the local level. It is primarily a shell Chapter, meant to be customized at the local level for what works locally, and with the, the processes of the type of government there. That's what this Chapter does, and the City currently does not have an adopted Chapter 1 of the Florida Building Code. Again, it changes every three years, and every three years we need to adopt the Chapter 1 that meets our local needs.

So, this Ordinance before you does that. It adopts a Chapter 1 that deals with those specifics of how we will admin'.., administer, and our processes related to the Florida Building Code. But this Ordinance before you also adopts that via a standalone manual. Currently, all the, all of those items listed under Chapter 1 for administration of the Florida Building Code are written directly in the Ordinance. So, every three years when it changes, we have to strike through everything and, and update those details related to Chapter 1. Whereas, if we do it by reference, which this Ordinance does, we have a manual that we can upload.., I'm sorry, update every three years as a standalone document without having to be as messy doing it through the, the Ordinances on the book.

This also allows that Chapter 1 information to be available online quickly to anyone developing in the City. Additionally, it allows them to.., this information to be available on the state website when someone looks up the Florida Building Code, and they look up

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- 1725 Riviera Beach, Chapter 1 would be available to them there, so they can have all of the information related to our codes and how we administer them, located in one place.
- We have our Building Official, Mr. Michael Grimm on hand today to address any questions, especially as they relate to the technical aspects of the Building Code, and what we are attempting to accomplish here. [Inaudible].
- 1730 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair?
- 1731 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. You're recognized.
- 1732 **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you. Mr. Sirmons, I just wanna make sure I understood
- 1733 you. You said that there is a need to adopt the appendices? But, I'm correct.., if I'm
- 1734 correct, it says in the memo that the Building Code is deemed adopted for use statewide
- without the need for adoption by local government. So, any appendices would, therefore,
- need to be adopted as well. So, can you clarify?
- 1737 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** The appendices are only adopted if the
- locality elects to do so.
- 1739 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. So, aren't the appendices a part of the Florida Building
- 1740 Code?
- 1741 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** If the locality adopts them.
- 1742 **Councilperson McCoy:** But, the memo must be incorrect because the memo clearly
- says the Building Code is deemed adopted for use statewide without the need for
- adoption by local government.
- 1745 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Correct. The Code automatic'..., the
- technical aspects of the Code apply automatically when the state adopts them. However,
- the appendices to the Code are adopted only if the locality decides to do so. And again,
- our Building Official can provide more detail on this as well.
- 1749 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. And I have one question for him when you finish.
- 1750 Thank you, Mr. Sirmons.
- 1751 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. Grimm. Do you wanna respond to any of that...
- 1752 **Building Official Grimm:** Certainly. My name is Michael Grimm. I'm the Building
- 1753 Official for the City of Riviera Beach.
- 1754 And, Mr. Sirmons is exactly correct. The, the Building Code is adopted by the state
- to be uniform throughout the state, except for the appendices. The appendices would
- have to be adopted individually by the local municipalities.
- 1757 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. We do have public comment, so let's hear public
- 1758 comment and then we can...

City Clerk Anthony: Fane Lozman, Bessie Brown.

Mr. F. Lozman: Fane Lozman.

 I think, Mr. McCoy, you're probably the smartest person up there when it comes to understanding legal stuff, interpreting rules, and stuff like that, 'cause that's one of his hobbies. And he's brought some very good points up, and that is, if you can adopt the Florida Building Code, you can't pick and choose which sections you wanna adopt. Now, we have a full time Attorney and a full time Assistant Attorney. And, Ms. Busby out there signed off that everything was cool. Okay? So, if everything is cool, and we've adopted the Florida Building Code previously and we're adopting it going forward, we have some problems that we need to discuss. Are we really gonna adopt the whole Building Code? Or, are we gonna carve out sections of it?

And specifically, I'm talking about what happens when Ladi March Goldwire... eventually, Mr. Grimm will be fired for doing something, that's just the way this Council works. What happens when a Building Official is terminated? The Florida Building Code discusses that. It says termination of employment. Employees in the position of Building Official, Chief Inspector, or Inspector, shall not be removed for..., from office except for cause after full opportunity has been given to be heard on specific charges before such applicable government authority. So, it says it in the Code that we've adopted, Mr. Evans, yet your lawyer, Ms. Busby, is ignoring that. It's creating a, a case where you're gonna have millions of dollars of a possible runaway jury because we've adopted the buil'... Business Code, excuse me, the Building Code, but we've cut that section out. So we only have one Building Official that wasn't given the appropriate termination process. Sooner or later. Mr. Grimm is gonna piss somebody off, he's not gonna be given that thing, so what.., you need to come to a consensus. You need to analyze what has happened previously that we're not following the Florida Building Code, and why are we setting the City up for millions of dollars of, of a possible runaway jury this year when her case goes to trial?

I wanna understand what this vote means. 'Cause it's not clear. Because if you say you're gonna adopt the whole Building Code and then there's a section you don't like, you've exposing the taxpayers to a huge amount of money. And as the largest property owner in Singer Island, I think I have the right to know why is your Legal Department picking and choosing which sections of the Building Code they want? You know, no one talks about that. Why don't we go through the Code and say what are we, what are we gonna look at and keep and what are not? Because otherwise, what you're doing right there, and Mr. McCoy will tell you that, what you're doing right there, you're adopting the Code and then when you're not following it..., if I'm an attorney representing Ms. Goldwire, I'mma say hey, here it is, they adopted the Code in 2017 and they didn't follow the procedure, Ladi March wins. You know, 2025, they fired Mr. Grimm, they didn't follow procedure, Mr. Grimm wins. There's something fundamentality flawed that the Legal Department that is signing off on this adoption of the Florida Building Code is not..., is, is putting the City at risk and that needs to be addressed.

Chairperson Botel: Thank you, Mr. Lozman.

- 1801 City Clerk Anthony: Bessie Brown. 1802 Ms. B. Brown: Good evening. Bessie Brown. 1803 This is... It says Building and Technical Codes. And then... [stammer], I want to 1804 know, Section 22 through 32, it says reserved. Does this mean that this, this stays or is this actually being eliminated? I really, really would like to know if you're just gonna adopt 1805 1806 Building and Technical Codes, and then you're gonna get rid of administration, and all of these other sections, why is that? Why is that? I'd really like to understand what's going 1807 1808 on, because then... [Sigh]. You just, you're just doing codes and then you're deleting 1809 everything else. - Development Services Director Sirmons: Correct. And it's the Ordinance that's currently on the books but it is expired, because we're no longer under the same Building
- 1835 Code as we were in 2004.
- 1836 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. So why aren't we under that same Building Code?
- 1837 Because it changes every three years?
- 1838 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Correct.
- 1839 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, in essence, what you're suggesting, even though the
- Building Code changes every three years, I think it's triennially, is how it's pronounced
- 1841 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Correct.
- 1842 **Chairperson Botel:** Triennially.
- 1843 **Councilperson McCoy:** Triennially. Then we have to come back and then adopt the
- appendices... appendices, and appendix and amendments separate from what's already
- 1845 the actual Code?
- 1846 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Correct. So, and.., when the Code is
- adopted by the state every three years, Chapter 1 is essentially a shell. And so, provision
- 1848 101.2.1 says appendices, provisions in the appendices shall not apply unless specifically
- adopted. And so, in this manual it states that the City of Riviera Beach hereby adopts by
- reference, and it lists which appendices we are...
- 1851 Councilperson McCoy: What section?
- 1852 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** ...hereby adopting.
- 1853 **Councilperson McCoy:** What section was that? 102 point...
- 1854 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** And this is in the manual attachment

- **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we do have public comment cards on this Item. The acceptance of public comment cards on this Item is
- 1898 now closed.
- **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Would someone care to mo'... make a motion to
- 1900 approve resolution 124-20?
- **Councilperson McCoy:** So moved.
- 1902 Councilperson Lanier: Second.
- **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. We have a presentation by Mr. Blankenship?
- 1904 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship.: Actually...
- **Chairperson Botel:** Or, Mr. Sirmons.
- **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Good evening again, Madam Chair,
- 1907 Members of the Board.

This Item, again, we previously brought it forth but it did not contain additional provisions related to the naming of buildings and City facilities, in addition to street naming. So, there is currently a Resolution on the City's books related to how we go about renaming or naming streets. This Resolution would remove that Resolution and replace it with what's before you. Skip through that. The first section I will cover related to the portions of this Resolution related to renaming or naming, streets, and then I will turn it over to Director Blankenship to cover the portions related to naming City facilities and amenities.

The table here is just a refresher on some of the other municipalities that we studied to look for best practices related to street naming administration. And, this table here really highlights what's existing on our books related to street naming and what changes this Resolution would add. So, to quickly go through them, these aspects have.., are already in place, an individual must have achieved local or national prominence and have been deceased for no less than five years to have a street named after them; streets may only be named after living persons if City Council determines there are exceptional circumstances; all street names require review and recommendation from the Development Services Department; renaming can be initiated by City Council or by citizens; community rename applications must include a petition signed by two-thirds of the property owners along that street to be renamed. Those are all of the provisions currently in our policy.

The additions we've added are the application fee of \$250. We've also added a deposit for the expenses associated with the renaming of streets, namely the, the

- manufacturing and installation of new signs for the street. And then, it adds a, a, a
- provision on Council initiated proposals must include a funding plan as well, when..., as
- they move forward. Those last three are changes with this amendment.
- 1933 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Madam Chair?
- 1934 **Chairperson Botel:** You're recognized.
- 1935 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Could I ask a question about the.., so, the
- applicant..., they're just going to pay a deposit, or they'll be responsible for paying for the
- street cha'.., the sign changes as well?
- 1938 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Yes. And it doesn't...
- 1939 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** If it's not...
- 1940 Development Services Director Sirmons: ...list...
- 1941 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** ...Council initiated?
- 1942 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Correct. When it's not Council initiated,
- and it doesn't list those details on this table, the applicant is required to pay a \$1,000
- 1944 deposit. If their renaming project is approved and cost more than that, they will be
- responsible for the remaining balance after it is approved. And, it lists a, a, a timeline in
- the Resolution, by which they must pay those funds.
- 1947 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 1948 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** If it comes to less than the \$1,000
- deposit, it also describes the process of us refunding any balance.
- 1950 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. Thank you.
- 1951 Chairperson Botel: What, what does the funding plan.., Council initiated
- proposals must include funding plan. Could you tell us a little more about that?
- 1953 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Correct. So, if the, the.., it is the
- 1954 pleasure of the Council to create a Resolution renaming a street to honor a, a person or
- 1955 for anything, that it must also include where the funds will come from. That, that must be
- 1956 contemplated. There have been situations where there were miscommunications on how
- a City initiated street renaming would be funded, and this is to clarify that that should be
- worked out on the front end.
- 1959 Chairperson Botel: Okay.
- 1960 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Can I...
- 1961 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Madam Chair?

1962 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** ...just say something? 1963 **Chairperson Botel:** I'm sorry. 1964 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** I don't know if there was a miscommunication, it 1965 probably just never came up, and it was just done. And, I mean, it wasn't..., I don't think... 1966 We've never discussed how it's gonna be paid when we're talking about renaming, so I'm 1967 glad to see that is there. 1968 **Chairperson Botel:** Yeah. 1969 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** So that we don't have any issues later on. 1970 **Chairperson Botel:** Any other... 1971 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Madam Chair? 1972 **Chairperson Botel:** You're recognized. 1973 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Thank you. 1974 Mr. Sirmons, the individual must have achieved local or national prominence, or 1975 have been deceased for no less.., and, have been deceased for no less than five years. 1976 So, are we not going to do any naming... street renaming's of any living individuals? Look at Item 2. Look at Item 2. 1977 **Chairperson Botel:** 1978 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Streets... 1979 [Inaudible dais comment] Chair Pro Tem Lawson: ...may be named only if... 1980 1981 **Chairperson Botel:** [Chuckle]. 1982 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Reading is fundamental. Thank you. 1983 [Chuckles] 1984 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: So, what would outline and highlight exceptional 1985 circumstances? 1986 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** So, we did.., although this provision previously existed, we added an additional line to clarify that City Council shall determine 1987 1988 what constitutes exceptional circumstances. So, we do not provide a definition in the 1989 Resolution for it but we make it clear that Council, amongst themselves, must determine

whether this person that's still alive, has.., checks all the boxes for someone we would

want to recognize to the level of, extent of changing a street name.

- 1992 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** [Inaudible].
- 1993 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Okay.
- Anybody else? 1994 Chairperson Botel:
- 1995 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: I mean, I appreciate you all taking that off of your 1996 plate, but I think it does still need to be really, truly defined what exceptional circumstances are for, you know, I mean, we need to determine what that it is. Because 1997 1998 I just see it being the same as before. I don't see how.., I mean, your argument of what 1999 exceptional circumstances is may be different from what mine are. And so, I think we have to define what that means.
- 2000
- 2001 When you did any research for the other municipalities, did you, did you all come across anything that kinda gave a definition, or checkboxes, things that we could check 2002 2003 off and say..., for any living persons?
- 2004 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** In researching the Ordinances or, or Resolutions on the books and other cities, we didn't come across a specific definition, but 2005 we can do additional research to find something that the Council may approve of... deem 2006 2007 appropriate for being more specific on what those criteria are for living individuals to be 2008 honored in this way.
- 2009 Okay. I, I think that's important to define that **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** because, otherwise, we're, we're in... we'll be in the same position we were before, in 2010 2011 terms of determining who qualifies for the naming. Right now, that, that would be a lot of 2012 debate, you know, trying to determine what is exceptional.
- 2013 So... but, will that hold us up from moving forward with this tonight though? If we 2014 have to come up with the definition for the exceptional circumstances?
- 2015 City Manager Evans: Madam Chair, if I may?
- 2016 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. You're recognized.
- 2017 City Manager Evans: Does that particular, Director Sirmons, does that particular
- provision only apply to the situation where it's driven by the City Council? So that 2018
- 2019 exceptional circumstances is only applicable to when it's initiated by the Council?
- 2020 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** It's written as that applying to citizen
- 2021 initiated street name'... renaming as well.
- 2022 **City Manager Evans:** Okay. Okay.
- Councilperson Miller-Anderson: 2023 Yeah. That, that, that would..., we're basically
- 2024 gonna be in the same position we're in now if that is not truly defined, what that means.
- 2025 **Councilperson McCoy:** Madam Chair?

2026 City Manager Evans: Yeah.2027 Chairperson Botel: You're

You're recognized...

2028 **City Attorney Wynn:** You can always take it out.

2029 Chairperson Botel: ...Mr. McCoy.

2030 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: And add it?

2031 **City Attorney Wynn:** Just take it out.

2032 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** But that's the whole... For me, that's the whole purpose of needing this, because we, we do need something clearly defining, saying, I

mean, you've done this, or you've done that or, you know...

2035 **City Attorney Wynn:** I'm saying if you take it out, there are no exceptional circumstances. It's just deceased for no less than five years and achieved prominence.

2037 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** But that is only for dec'.., individuals have...

2038 **City Attorney Wynn:** Yeah. We...

2039 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** ...achieved local...

2040 **City Manager Evans:** Or you...

2041 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** ...or national prominence.

2042 City Attorney Wynn: We...

2043 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** And, have been deceased. But that means that

we would not be able to do anything for any living person that...

2045 **City Attorney Wynn:** Correct.

2046 **City Manager Evans:** Or... Madam Chair, if I may? Or, you can do something that

says, street may only be named after a living person the City Council determines that there is, you know, documented proof over a length of time of community service or what

there is, you know, documented proof over a length of time of community service or what have you, to, you know, have a chronological timeline that's provided as part of the actual

submission so we can.., that has to be measured, quantified, deliverables as it relates to

the services that were provided, or the activities that a person would have done.

So, in essence, I would see a situation where an individual.., if the Board would look to bring this forward, that that particular Councilperson would, in essence, have a resume or some information that really delineates and shows documentation over a duration of time that 'x' person contributed, you know, 'x' to the City.

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- 2056 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** And I agree. I unders'... Yeah. That's exactly
- what I'm saying, but for tonight though, if we don't lay.., lay that out, are we able to move
- forward with this and bring that one specific piece back to add as an addendum to this or
- are we now saying we have to, you know, hold the whole thing off again?
- 2060 Development Services Director Sirmons: If...
- 2061 **City Manager Evans:** Go ahead, Director Sirmons.
- 2062 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** If I may...
- 2063 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. Sirmons, you're recognized.
- 2064 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** ...the, the section related to naming a
- street after a living person, I'll read directly what it says, a living person, only if the
- individual has achieved prominence as a result of his or [stammer]..., his or her significant
- contributions to the nation, state or local community, and only if a super majority vote of
- 2068 Council is realized. That's the current language. So it does make it more difficult, being
- 2069 that it has to be a super majority vote of Council. But, if, again, additional details in terms
- of what constitutes prominence, and things in that vein, are needed, we could potentially
- add an addendum after further research or whatever the pleasure of the Board is.
- 2072 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 2073 **Chairperson Botel:** Yeah.
- 2074 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** I, I do think that needs to be done. Otherwise,
- we're, we're, we're still in the same position we're in. So, if we can do the addendum at
- some point, you can get that for us, or come up with..., let us know what you research,
- 2077 and if we can come up with some additional ideas, we can have that to discuss, so we
- 2078 can have a checklist. I mean, the amount of people that ask for this, that are living, is
- 2079 [stammer], Mr. McCoy can tell you. I'm sure he's been hit up a few times, as well as
- 2080 everybody else, and you just wanna be able to have a fair process and not be a popularity
- 2081 thing in terms of..., or, an election thing, or, you know, you, you really need to have a set
- thing in terms on, or, an election thing, or, you know, you, you really need to have a se
- criteria as to why we're choosing to give this person this honor.
- And so, I, I do think we need to do that. If we can move forward with it, if that's the
- 2084 pleasure of the Board, that's fine. But, that would need to be something that comes right
- behind it, because..., and to not do any signs until we've put that on.
- 2086 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. McCoy, you're recognized.
- 2087 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair.

A few things. Council Member Miller-Anderson, I agree but I don't know that there is any opportunity for there to be any kind of objectiveness in this. Even if it passes, from a citizen led petition to change a name, I don't like the fact that we're gonna ask an applicant to pay \$250 and then it becomes still, ultimately, the decision of City Council

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and that \$250 just goes towards the cost of Staff time, if they turn around and don't have that street naming. And if it's done by City Council, then we don't put up a fee. Right? That's the first thing.

And then, even more so, to your point, it's become such a hassle, I'm almost ready to sunset everybody and just start from scratch, because it just becomes too much that people think that it's all about what.., I heard Dr. King's, in, in one of his speeches called The Drum Major Instincts, where everybody has to have their name on something, or be the drum major, in essence. I particularly think it's great, but we've kinda gotten too far with it. It's almost like the prerequisite to do it is you have to be some sort of minister or clergy, because probably eighty percent of them are representative or members of the clergy community. And, it just becomes too much when you got folks that says.., I don't wanna get into that, about what they've done and what they haven't done, or my cousin did more and, you know, that just becomes too much.

I, you know, I like the fact that we wanna recognize them, but there's no way that there's gonna be any kinda impartiality to this because if the decision is done, or if it's recommended by Staff, it's still is a decision of the body. And you really don't take the politics out of it. It still exits. And I know that that's the ideal situation but, you know, I just figured if somebody go and get two-thirds, sixty-six percent of the property owners on one street, which again, Members, you know we got streets that go all the way from..., we got East 23rd and we got a West 23rd. You know? So, it goes both sides of Broadway, and then you're on the other side of the railroad tracks in some areas. So that means we would essentially be [inaudible] the whole entire City, that one street, and if someone has the effort and manpower to get sixty-six percent, I just don't wanna sit here and tell them, 'Oh yeah, well, the Council didn't approve it and you don't get your \$250 back.' Yeah. That's..., that almost kinda goes counter to the very essence of, you know, representation.

- So, [sigh], you know, I don't see that there's ever gonna be any real clear way to do this.
- 2119 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Madam Chair?
- **Chairperson Botel:** You're recognized.

Councilperson Miller-Anderson: I mean, I.., for the application fee, I, I do think probably if we're not going to approve it, that probably needs to be refunded. I don't, I don't want it to seem like, you know, we're taking people's money and, and there's no [chuckle], you know, they don't.., if they don't get it. Maybe adding a, a refund if, I mean, refundable if it's not approved.

I do think we could be objective if, if you say, just like it says, if you have some kind of, I don't know, if you have documented experience of doing things in the community, for the masses, you know, if you've been recognized by 'x' number of organizations in the City. I mean, having something like that. And, regardless of how the vote may go, I mean, if the facts are there, then we should be able to take out the politics of it by just voting on the objectives, if they, they met the criteria. Now, the criteria that we set, we

- 2132 need to make sure we're setting reasonable criteria. I, I think it can still be done, as long
- 2133 as we have that criteria set. And I do think it's gonna take a little time. Not a little time,
- but definitely not tonight, to identify what that criteria is.
- So, and, you know, like I said, that \$250 application fee, probably should be refundable if... What is the fee gonna.., what is it for, basically?
- 2137 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** So, the fee is consistent with any
- 2138 application that someone would submit to Development Services. Even if it's a zone
- change, there's a, a Staff fee. And if their, you know, request isn't approved, they, the
- 2140 don't get that back., So this wouldn't be inconsistent with that. But that is because the
- 2141 Resolution, as it currently sits, requires a Staff report to Council, and that report should
- include research aspects, such as the origin of the street name, any historical significance
- of the existing street name, whether there are any other historical structures around the
- 2144 City that have the same name, that could [stammer] potentially cause confusion, the age
- of the street name, whether it's a duplicate or not. So, there's a lot of research that Staff
- 2146 is required to present to this Board, for you to make that decision, and us to provide a
- recommendation to you. And this is just to, to, to account for a little bit of that time. This
- is.., would probably be one of the lowest application fees we charge in the Department.
- 2149 And just to make sure that people aren't arbitrarily sending these applications and they
- 2150 know that, you know, they have some skin the game. And...
- 2151 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Mhmm.
- 2152 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** ...and this is a part of that, along with
- the deposit.
- 2154 **Unk.:** Right.
- 2155 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Well, tho'..., those are my comments in regards
- 2156 to the exceptional circumstances, identifying what that means, and I, I still say the
- refundable application fee of \$250, if they're not approved.
- 2158 Chairperson Botel: I, I was about...
- 2159 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson**: Madam Chair?
- 2160 **Chairperson Botel:** ...ready to agree with you on that but it makes sense what Mr.
- 2161 Sirmons is saying, that, you know, if there's no fee that you have the potential of losing,
- every person in the City could say, 'well, I want my uncle.., I want a street named after
- 2163 my uncle, and it doesn't cost me anything, and I know I'm gonna get my \$250 back,' so...
- 2164 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** No. They get it back if they're not approved.
- 2165 **Chairperson Botel:** Well, that, that's what I mean. But there's no.., there's nothing
- 2166 to prevent a hoard of people from coming in and wanting to do this, if they're, if they're
- just..., know that if it's not approved, they'll get their \$250 bucks back.

- 2168 **Councilperson McCoy:** They gotta get sixty-six percent still.
- 2169 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Yeah. They still gotta go through the process of
- 2170 getting those signatures and, they're putting in work.
- 2171 **Chairperson Botel:** Yeah.
- 2172 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** I mean...
- 2173 Chairperson Botel: Well...
- 2174 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** When, when is the deposit done? At, at the
- beginning, as well, with the \$250?
- 2176 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Correct.
- 2177 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Mhmm.
- 2178 Chairperson Botel: Okay.
- 2179 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Madam Chair?
- 2180 **Chairperson Botel:** I... You're recognized, Mr. Lawson.
- 2181 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: I would be in agreement that the application fee is a
- 2182 nonrefundable fee with this process of a community initiated, or a citizen-initiated petition
- for renaming. Just because of the hours that'll be put in by Staff, the time and effort that's
- being done to process this, if they're not approved, or if they are approved. The majority
- of applications that are submitted, whether it's City related or even just private sector, are
- 2186 nonrefundable application fees that are submitted. So, a resident would wanna do some
- 2187 of the due diligence to prepare all of the information necessary to submit once Staff
- completes their task and presents it to the Board, we will make the decision as a, as a
- 2189 Council to move forward. But I would say that the application fee is nonrefundable, the
- 2190 deposit can be refundable.
- 2191 **Chairperson Botel**: I agree that we need to have a better definition of [stammer]
- 2192 exceptional circumstances. I think we can move forward on this, this evening, with the
- understanding that you'll come back to us with some clarification about that term.
- 2194 Any other comments? Did we...
- 2195 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Madam Chair?
- 2196 Chairperson Botel: Yes.
- 2197 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** I want to do some comment, I just wanted to reserve the time
- after we make this motion for another motion.
- 2199 Chairperson Botel: Okay.

2200 Development Services Director Sirmons: I...

- **Chairperson Botel:** Do we have public comment?
- **Development Services Director Sirmons:** I, I wanted to note that there's a second
- part of the presentation, including the buildings and amenities...
- **Chairperson Botel:** Oh, okay.

- **Development Services Director Sirmons:** ...[inaudible].
- **Chairperson Botel:** Let's hear that and then we'll have public comments.
- **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Director Blankenship.
- Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: Good evening, Council, Mayor, City Manager. Richard Blankenship, Parks & Recreation Director.
- 2209 Manager. Richard Blankenship, Parks & Recreation Director.
- A few months ago, Staff was asked to start developing a policy for the naming of facilities, amenities, the like, that are, that are in the City.., and then, when this first went.., became before you. Then, we were asked to combine the two policies, so we have one policy now. I'll lead you to Section 7 that outlines the amenities in the City that can be named, dedicated, renamed or, or, or rededicated. And then, Section 8, gives the application process, the timeline, and the fee structure for these.
 - Now, Staff didn't know, at the time, how deep the Council wanted to go in, in this process, as far as approving it, but our better judgment was to give you the opportunity to approve them all. We have everything from existing buildings to new buildings to park benches; trees and landscapes; community gardens; playgrounds; existing playgrounds new; pavilions existing, pavilions new; community center or gym room; existing community center, gyn new; athletic field, a core, existing or new; and trail existing or new.
 - As the City moves forward with its Reimagine program, there's gonna be a lot of opportunity for people to be a part of this, and to have some civic pride in their City, and, and putting, putting a name on something. So, we wanted to add some guidelines. And what I wanted to point out at the very beginning of the policy, there's a disclaimer, where the City has rights. We, we are, we are setting rights that we can remove stuff after the fact, if needed, if something goes wrong with the, not... Maybe the, the.., that we've seen nationally lately, we can remove that. We set that out early in the policy.
- Those fees that aren't related to the actual construction, cover Staff time, signage, any of the intricacies involved in naming something, or renaming something, or dedicating something. Section 9 of the policy dictates that we will be in charge of the signage, it will be uniform. The cost of the signage will be borne in the fees that they're paying.., will be provided in the fees that they're paying and we, we will be the one in charge of making it, putting it up and, and unveiling it.

- 2236 With that, I'll answer any questions that you may have.
- 2237 **Chairperson Botel:** An questions? Mr. McCoy, you're recognized.
- 2238 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair.
- Mr. Blankenship, can you point to that section that provides the City the option to
- remove?
- Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: The very top of the poli'..., not, not my
- 2242 part, but the whole policy.
- 2243 **Councilperson McCoy:** Oh. Okay. I was looking at the bottom.
- 2244 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: I think it's...
- 2245 **Chairperson Botel:** Oops. I went too far.
- 2246 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: Section 2, scope and applicability. 'E'.
- 2247 **Chairperson Botel:** Refuse to [inaudible].
- 2248 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** I, I believe on your version, it has it
- 2249 under F, under Section 2.
- 2250 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: Yeah.
- 2251 **Chairperson Botel:** Yeah.
- 2252 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: I think.
- 2253 **Chairperson Botel:** Right to remove any name or rename of a street, building,
- facility, or real or tangible property.
- 2255 **Councilperson McCoy:** And that is at the discretion of the City. Who...
- 2256 Chairperson Botel: Council.
- 2257 **Councilperson McCoy:** Oh. Okay. So, it would be an action of the City Council?
- 2258 **Chairperson Botel:** Right.
- 2259 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Even though.., does this policy also provide for Council
- ratification of a street bench? A bench at a bus stop?
- Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: Any, any tangible property that the City
- 2262 has.
- 2263 Councilperson McCoy: It would an action...

- 2264 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: That is ours, that is the City's.
- 2265 **Councilperson McCoy:** But it would be an action the City Council to approve a bench?
- 2266 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: The way it's written now. Again, Staff
- didn't know how deep in the weeds you wanted to get with this, so we laid it out that 2267
- 2268 you're... that, that you would be involved in all decisions.
- 2269 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.
- 2270 **Chairperson Botel:** Did we have public comments?
- 2271 **City Clerk Anthony:** Yes, Madam Chair...
- 2272 **Chairperson Botel:** Let's hear the public comments.
- 2273 ... Members of the Board. City Clerk Anthony:
- 2274 **Chairperson Botel:** [Inaudible].
- 2275 [Pause]
- 2276 [Inaudible dais comment]
- 2277 **Chairperson Botel:** Madam Clerk.
- 2278 [Pause]
- 2279 City Clerk Anthony: Margaret Shepherd, Bessie Brown.
- 2280 **Ms. M. Shepherd:** To the Mayor and City Manager, and to all of you in respectful place.
- 2281 Mr. Evans, I was thoroughly.., I, I, I can't explain how I felt when you came to Ms.
- 2282 Dawson. I couldn't even breathe. I, I had to sit down up under the shade. I, I, I, I was
- 2283 looking for something big, but I tell you outdid yourself. And I told Ms. Jenkins, when I go
- out, you get Mr. Evans to care of me. That, that was excellent. Thank you, sir. Thank 2284
- 2285 you, thank you.

Well, I'm here today. I'm back, back again talking about the Brooks Center. 2286 2287 Nobody know' the Brooks, but them. Ms. Dawson been doing this.., I've been here forty some some' years, and she's been doing this for years. She has the shovel in her house, 2288 2289 with the hardhat that said Riviera Beach Heights. I don't wanna ask nobody to do anything, but I just demand that that name be taken out of... try to find a way to put the 2290 2291 Riviera Beach Heights up there. It's insulting that these people worked so hard... And then, I think I read a little article that Rich Ryles is suing the City. So, now, you're here 2292 an nobody know where you came from. I just know him because of him being an attorney 2293 2294 and I, you know... But, the stigma is that people work hard in this City. I have boxes and 2295 boxes of trophies, and I thought I outdid her but when she took me in her house and I saw

2296 all of those trophies, I sat down. She deserved it. And, and, and the one thing that I wish is that the, the street would be Southside Coalition, so when people come in there, they say, 'What is it all about?' You always ask what is it about. And you begin to explain it. This is our City, and it should be people that we know. And I'm grateful for Reverend Griffin Davis name, he deserve' it. Reverend Henning deserve' it. These are not.., Alexan'... they deserve it. These people was here before some of us was even born.

And then people come in our neighborhood and they... They just take over. It looks bad. And I was depressed. I, I, I, I, you know, how, how, how does this happen that you said, shovels in the ground, big ceremony, Riviera Beach Heights. And then that was a real slap in the face. I hope that you all will find some type of confidence in this City, into the... The lady said old, so I guess I'm getting old [chuckle]. Us old people, let me put it like that, to do something that make us feel proud. Because we do work in this City. We work hard.

Elections come, this stuff going on, they're scared of us. They know what's coming. We deserve it.

- 2313 City Clerk Anthony: Bessie Brown. [Pause]. Madam Chair, Members of the
- Board, as Ms. Brown come, the time is now 9:50.
- 2315 Chairperson Botel: Yes.
- 2316 **Ms. B. Brown:** Hi. Bessie Brown, Riviera Beach.
- I just want to know, there was a thing up there, a document that says what the price and all of that. Well, that should've been in the backup as well. I, I think because, because how would we know that that's, that's a part of the Agenda Item. You know? Because, you know, you.., this is the second time these little things come across. You, you, you present something to the Council and the, and the public doesn't have it. Now, I, I don't think that's, that's too fair to the public. Especially where the fees are. If you had a two hundred dollar fif'... \$250 fee, what... I asked the guestion the last
- 2324 time and I didn't get an answer. I'd like to get an answer this time, the \$250 fee for what?
- 2325 And then the \$1,000 deposit. What is that for? And is that refundable?
- 2326 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board.., Mr. Chair, Mad'.., and
- 2327 Members of the Board [chuckle], that completes public comments on this Item.
- 2328 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Madam.., Mr. Chair?
- 2329 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** [Inaudible].
- 2330 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Are we... did we do an extension? It's almost
- 2331 10:00.

2332 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Yeah. We need a motion for an extension... 2333 **Councilperson McCoy:** Move to extend indefinitely. 2334 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Uh. **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Second. Do we have a second? 2335 2336 [Chuckles] 2337 Councilperson McCoy: I thought I heard... 2338 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: No second? 2339 **Councilperson McCoy:** ... Councilwoman Miller-Anderson, did you say anything? 2340 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** I said, "Uh." 2341 Councilperson McCoy: Oh. I thought you said... 2342 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: If we don't have a second.... Councilperson Miller-Anderson: 2343 Oh, we do not have a second? 2344 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** We didn't have a second. 2345 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: I'll second. 2346 [Chuckles] 2347 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** The motion is made, properly second. Madam Clerk. 2348 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Miller-Anderson? 2349 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Yes. 2350 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Lanier? 2351 **Councilperson Lanier:** Yes. 2352 Councilperson McCoy? City Clerk Anthony: 2353 Councilperson McCoy: Yes. Chair Lawson? 2354 **City Clerk Anthony:** 2355 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Yes.

That motion is approved with Councilperson Botel out.

- 2357 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Thank you. Mr. Blankenship, I believe you were completing
- 2358 your presentation.
- Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: I'm com'.., finished with my presentation.
- 2360 I'll answer any questions you may have.
- 2361 **Councilperson McCoy:** Madam Chair.., Mr. Chair, excuse me.
- 2362 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** You're recognized, Mr. McCoy.
- 2363 Councilperson McCoy: Ms. Miller-Anderson, was your concerns, was there any
- 2364 suggestion of any offer of an amended or did you wanna see more work done on this?
- Where are we?
- 2366 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Yeah. I mean...
- 2367 **Councilperson McCoy:** I would agree.
- 2368 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Yeah. I, I don't have the criteria in my head right
- 2369 now. You're talking about that part? Yeah. I don't have that set, so hope'.., I'm hoping
- that we could bring that part back, and add it as an addendum of some sort.
- But, I don't want to see anything move forward under these.., this base.., this
- 2372 criteria which is vague right now. So, I mean, do we need to put a moratorium on it, or
- saying... just basically say we're not going to move forward with...
- 2374 **City Attorney Wynn:** Postpone it again?
- 2375 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: I mean [sigh].. [Inaudible].
- 2376 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, well, you know, I guess.., I don't have a problem...
- 2377 [Inaudible dais comment]
- 2378 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...with us sending it back, but if there is something specific,
- can we kind aput our suggestions in to Staff and see if they can come back with something
- 2380 at, I mean, when I say suggestions, I mean individually and, you know, outside of the
- 2381 meeting, we can contact the Manager and offer our suggestions?
- 2382 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Yeah. Yeah. But that would..., but what I'm
- saying is, it will still put it to coming back to the next meeting.
- 2384 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, there's no other way, I don't think.
- 2385 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Yeah, well...

- 2386 **Councilperson McCoy:** And this is.., and, and I know what you mean, but I don't think
- 2387 that we can.., I mean, this is just as critical as an Ordinance amount of... I mean, we've
- been dealing with this for some time now, so I think it's important.
- 2389 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Yeah.
- 2390 **Unk.:** Okay.
- 2391 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** So, what are we gonna motion...
- 2392 Councilperson McCoy: And...
- 2393 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: ...to post'...
- 2394 Councilperson McCoy: ...you know... Madam Chair?
- 2395 Chairperson Botel: [Inaudible].
- 2396 Councilperson McCoy: [Stammer], you know, what's interesting is, you know, I
- 2397 thought, in my mind... And, and let me just go back to that section but what I seen about
- 2398 the renaming the building facilities, is that also the same reverter position that, I mean,
- 2399 we're asking for, proposed, is \$5,000 for an existing building. If that's not approved by
- 2400 City Council, then obviously..., is that person gonna get that money back? Because that's,
- that..., I don't think it says it in this section.
- 2402 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** The way...
- 2403 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: Council... I'm sorry. Go ahead.
- 2404 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** The way this is written is..., there's a
- separate application and processing for the naming of City buildings and amenities then
- 2406 street names. Street name applications would be processed by the Development
- 2407 Services Department. The naming of buildings and City amenities would be processed
- 2408 by the Parks Department.
- 2409 In, in terms of criteria, the Resolution does direct the Development Services
- Department to create the application for street renaming and, in that application, we can
- add a criteria, checklist of..., that applies to proposed renaming for living persons. And,
- that can be built into the application process since it's not written in this Ordinance now.
- 2413 Again, just an additional option to get to where the Councilpersons are, are looking to be.
- 2414 Councilperson McCoy: Follow up.
- 2415 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: And if I could add for the facilities and
- such, there'd be no monies exchanged until after you approve them.
- 2417 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. And I would ask that we also include, because this
- 2418 seems to be specific to individuals. I mean, obviously, I don't know if the, the

- amphitheater in West Palm is owned by the City of West Palm Beach, but it has a name.
- 2420 What is it?
- 2421 **Unk.:** [Inaudible].
- 2422 **Councilperson McCoy:** No, no. The one in downtown.
- 2423 **Chairperson Botel:** Meyer.
- 2424 **Councilperson McCoy:** Meyer. I don't know if that's a person's name. But then, just
- like you said, Cruzan [sp] is a name and I don't believe that that's..., was intended after an
- 2426 individual. I think that was after some sort of product or something like that. So, can
- 2427 we...
- 2428 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: Well, I, I..., now we'd, we'd be talking
- 2429 about naming rights versus dedication.
- 2430 **Councilperson McCoy:** But, wouldn't it be...
- 2431 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: And we don't have naming rights in the
- 2432 policy.
- 2433 Councilperson McCoy: I'm sorry?
- 2434 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: We don't have naming rights in the
- 2435 policy. What you're talking about with Cruzan...
- 2436 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right. But essentially, if we're gonna ask somebody to pay
- \$5,000 for a building, I mean, that's pretty much naming rights.
- 2438 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: Naming rights, in my definition, are
- 2439 temporary.
- 2440 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. And... Yeah. I think we're going too far. So...
- 2441 [Chuckles]
- 2442 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** [Inaudible].
- 2443 **Councilperson McCoy:** But I believe, Mr. Blankenship, if I'm correct, you're saying
- 2444 naming rights only exist for a [stammer] temporary amount of time?
- 2445 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: Well, we don't have a policy on naming
- rights, but that's the difference between...
- 2447 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Yeah.
- 2448 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: ...naming rights and dedications, as
- written in this policy.

- 2450 **Chairperson Botel:** I'm sorry. I don't understand how you're differentiating
- between naming rights and Item No. 2 under Section, where am I, 8? You don't think of
- 2452 this as naming rights?
- 2453 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: These are dedications that, unless
- 2454 extenuating circumstances, they're up there forever. Naming rights would be Joe Robbie
- 2455 Stadium, or Seminole Hard Rock Stadium, or that... Cruzan...
- 2456 Chairperson Botel: Okay.
- 2457 **Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship:** ... Amphitheater, that could change. It's,
- you know, it's a contractual thing.
- 2459 **Chairperson Botel:** But these could change as well, right?
- 2460 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: Only with extenuating circumstances.
- 2461 **Chairperson Botel:** Ah, I understand.
- 2462 **Councilperson McCoy:** Or, not even in that case. If someone comes in ten years or
- 2463 fifteen years later and say I wanna change it from John Smith to Jane Smith, then, I mean,
- essentially, we sunset John and give me \$5,000 Jane, and your name goes on the
- building. I mean, that's what we're getting down into, right?
- 2466 **Chairperson Botel:** Yeah.
- 2467 **Councilperson McCoy:** Careful. This is almost as slippery as what we.., the reason
- that we're here.
- I don't have an appetite for this, Members. 'Cause there's too much... [Pause].
- 2470 So, can we.., I move to postpone.
- 2471 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Madam Chair?
- 2472 **Chairperson Botel:** You're recognized.
- 2473 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** It's the whole.., the street and the building,
- 2474 you're saying. Right? Or just..., you're saying the buildings?
- 2475 Councilperson McCoy: It's all...
- 2476 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Both of them?
- 2477 **Councilperson McCoy:** It's all one...
- 2478 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** One, right? Well, we were... Yeah. That's
- where we were.., I think we were heading anyway to get the clarification on the criteria.
- And then, I guess if there's some other concerns about the building naming, then maybe

2481 we... when we have our individual conversations with them, we can talk about that with 2482 them as well. So that when it comes back, all of that could be presented. 2483 Second. 2484 Chairperson Botel: I will say... I.., thank you. I just wanna say one thing. I think 2485 it's been almost three years now ago that a gentleman on Singer Island asked if he could name a bench after his deceased daughter, and I have yet to have anybody give me a 2486 process to do that. So, I'm happy to see that park benches [chuckle] are here so that that 2487 2488 gentleman can finally have it [chuckle], have it named after his daughter. It's good to see that there's a process in place, so I appreciate that. 2489 2490 Any other comments before we vote on postponing? 2491 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, is it going to be postponed indefinitely or 2492 postponed to a, a specific date? 2493 **Councilperson McCoy:** I will say indefinitely. Because, I mean... 2494 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** That's what your motion is? 2495 Councilperson McCoy: Yes. 2496 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** 1... 2497 Councilperson McCov: Move to... 2498 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Well. I... 2499 Councilperson McCoy: ...postpone... 2500 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** I mean, I have a sec'... I, I seconded it but why 2501 do you wanna do indefinite instead of the... 2502 Councilperson McCoy: Because... 2503 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: ...next meeting? 2504 Councilperson McCoy: ...I don't wanna force them to come back in two weeks. And then, you know, I, I just don't wanna put that pressure on... I mean, we're already here 2505 2506 at 10:00 o'clock, so I want them to have the discretion on this Item, when to bring it back, depending on the capacity of the Agenda to come. So, if it's not the first meeting, then it 2507 could, you know, indefinitely leaves it open to maybe the second meeting in March. 2508 2509 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. Sirmons, how much time do you think you would need to 2510 clarify these issues?

Well, we gotta.., we gotta meet to talk to him.

2511

Councilperson Miller-Anderson:

- 2512 **Chairperson Botel:** Yeah. But how much.., I mean...
- 2513 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** As far as a finding of definitions and
- criteria, we could have something turned around in, in two weeks. That's not a problem.
- 2515 **Chairperson Botel:** Would there be enough...
- 2516 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right. But then would it be able to be back on the Agenda,
- 2517 given the capacity? Of the Agenda.
- 2518 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, if I may? I, I don't think it would be able to be
- 2519 placed on the first meeting in March, 'cause we've already got some pretty substantive
- 2520 Items that are queued up for that Agenda, so it most likely would be the second meeting
- in March when this can come forward.
- 2522 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay. That probably should give us enough time to speak
- with Staff.
- 2524 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** So, he's.., you're making you motion...
- 2525 **Chairperson Botel:** Is that your motion then? To second and postpone?
- 2526 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:**for the second meeting?
- 2527 **Councilperson McCoy:** [Inaudible] indefinitely.
- 2528 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Okay.
- 2529 **Councilperson McCoy:** I mean, does that not work...
- 2530 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** That'll work.
- 2531 Councilperson McCoy: ...Councilwoman?
- 2532 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Yeah. That'll work. Yeah. That'll work if.., but I
- 2533 would say if we could try to get it back as soon.., well, not as soon as possible but by the
- 2534 second, the second meeting in March? If they're ready.
- 2535 **Councilperson McCoy:** And then, you know, keep in mind, I'm sorry, I thought
- community benefits deadline was the ending of this month, so, you know, there's gonna
- be some Items that we're gonna have to deal with. So.
- 2538 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay. We have a motion and a second to postpone this
- 2539 indefinitely. Madam Clerk.
- 2540 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson**: Madam Chair?
- 2541 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. Mr. Lawson.

- 2542 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** I, I know we're stating indefinitely just to kinda give Staff the
- 2543 flexibility, but just as direction, I would love to see this or actually want to see this by the
- second meeting in March, since the first meeting is already full, as Mr. Evans just stated.
- So, do we want to determine that we just set that date, because I want this on the Agenda
- for that first mee'.., that second meeting in March.
- 2547 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** I mean, I agree with you on having it...
- 2548 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.
- 2549 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** ...that second meeting.
- 2550 **Chairperson Botel:** Yeah. Okay. So, the motion is cha'.., is altered to say
- postponed until the second meeting in March?
- 2552 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. But what if, in some event...
- 2553 [Inaudible dais comment]
- 2554 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...something occurs that they're not able to produce it then?
- 2555 What happens?
- 2556 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** They'll let us know...
- 2557 **Councilperson McCoy:** I mean, I think that directive...
- 2558 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** ...and then we'll...
- 2559 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...is there. Mr. Evans...
- 2560 **City Attorney Wynn:** They can come back and ask for an extension.
- 2561 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** They can come back, yeah.
- 2562 **Chairperson Botel:** Yeah.
- 2563 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.
- 2564 **Chairperson Botel:** Okay? So, the motion is to postpone 'til the second meeting
- 2565 in March. Madam Clerk.
- 2566 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Miller-Anderson?
- 2567 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 2568 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Lanier?
- 2569 Councilperson Lanier: Yes.

- 2570 City Clerk Anthony: Councilperson McCoy? 2571 Councilperson McCov: Yes. Pro Tem Lawson? 2572 **City Clerk Anthony:** 2573 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Yes. 2574 City Clerk Anthony: Chair Botel? 2575 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. That motion is approved unanimously. So, we'll take 2576 this up at the second meeting in March. Item No... Thank you gentleman. Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Madam Chair? 2577 2578 **Chairperson Botel:** I. I... 2579 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Madam Chair? Yes. Mister... I'm sorry, Mr.., Mr. Lawson, you did ask for... 2580 **Chairperson Botel:** 2581 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Thank... 2582 Chairperson Botel: ...an opportunity to make... 2583 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Thank you, Madam Chair, I appreciate it. 2584 Being that we did postpone this to March, I wanted to address with my colleague 2585 the opportunity to move forward with a street naming, and bring this back at the same 2586 time with that meeting in March. A Council initiative street naming. Two of the things that 2587 were addressed in the, in this process are funding source, and I was gonna ask for my colleagues to support using sector funds to provide a funding source, from District 3. And 2588 then also, in regards to the individual, I wanted to make a motion to have 9th Street named 2589 2590 after our Bishop..., former Mayor Bishop Thomas Masters, and bring that motion to the 2591 table for my colleagues. 2592 Do we have a second? **Chairperson Botel:** 2593 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: When.., you want that coming on the same 2594 Agenda... 2595 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** The same Agenda Item. Councilperson Miller-Anderson: 2596 ...on the sev'... I mean...
- 2599 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Do we...

Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Immediately following that Agenda Item. So, in the event that Item is passed, we would go ahead and make a, a decision to move forward with that.

2600 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: But having the... Councilperson Miller-Anderson: ...know if he... 2601 2602 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: ...research done so that we could know the cost, so that we 2603 could.., because I know they have to do their due diligence and research, but making it a Council initiated Item, to be brought back on that same Agenda Item. 2604 2605 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** You... 2606 **Chairperson Botel:** [Stammer]... 2607 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** ...already know that he met the criteria? 2608 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Well, Council initiated... 2609 **Chairperson Botel:** [Chuckle]. 2610 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: It would be Council initiated. So... 2611 Chairperson Botel: I think she's teasing you. 2612 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:**I'm hoping that, you know, his twelve years and..., of Mayor, and thirty years of serving this community would be sufficient, but we'll wait 'til they give 2613 us the proper outline to determine. But, we'll see if they come back with that information 2614 2615 for us. 2616 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Okay. 2617 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. McCoy, you're recognized. 2618 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you. Thank you, Council Member. You know, I'm not sure if I'm confused, but that's the 2619 very reason that got us here to making this, and you're asking us to now start that process 2620 2621 before we even adopt... I mean, you're puttin' us on notice about that process before we even adopt the policy? I don't understand why we do that, and that's the very reason that 2622 2623 drove us here. And... 2624 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Based upon the... 2625 Councilperson McCoy: ...obviously... Chair Pro Tem Lawson: ...cri'... I'm sorry. Go ahead. 2626 2627 Councilperson McCoy: [Inaudible]...

Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Go ahead, Councilman.

- 2629 **Councilperson McCoy:** It caused a lotta concern when we found out that a room was
- dedicated, and it was not even authorized by the Council. Now, the very thing that we
- were trying to stop, is being now proposed by you? Is that I'm understanding?
- 2632 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Well, not the very thing we're trying to stop. Based upon the
- 2633 Agenda Item that we reviewed that we did table until the second meeting in March, and
- 2634 the criteria that's outline in these attachments, I would like us to move forward as a
- 2635 Council and Board to immediately follow that Resolution with the Resolution of the naming
- 2636 , after a.., and a prominent individual from our community.
- 2637 Chairperson Botel: So...
- 2638 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** So, in the vent that is not passed on that second meeting,
- then we will not go forward with the naming.
- 2640 **Chairperson Botel:** Right. So, you're really just asking Mr. Evans to place that on
- the Agenda?
- 2642 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** And have all the information prepared in regards to cost,
- because I know we have to determine cost and have Staff take the steps necessary.
- 2644 **Chairperson Botel:** Well, I think that's fine. You're just asking for an Agenda Item.
- 2645 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** So, we're not essentially doing the naming. I'm not gonna ask

- 2731 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Would someone care to make a motion to

- 2733 **Councilperson McCoy:** Second. I mean, so moved. I'm sorry. So moved.
- 2734 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Second.
- 2735 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you.

- 2737 **Chairperson Botel:** Mr. Evans, do we have a presentation?
- 2738 **City Manager Evans:** Yes, Madam Chair. If I can have the Director of Procurement,
- 2739 Ms. Althea Pemsel, make this presentation.
- 2740 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Good evening, Mayor, Chair Botel, Council.
- We are proud of the responses that we received for this Item. As we move forward with the initiatives of the Council, we're.., realize that we wanna be doing a lot of things in a lot of places at one time. And, as a result of that, the purpose of the owner's rep is to assist the City in many ways. We were proud of the responses that we received. We received six responses. In addition to the six responses we received, we have a hundred

percent SBE, DBE, and MBE represented among the six firms in one form or fashion. So, at least three of the firms have a hundred percent in those categories, in one or more of those categories. The firms will be a pool of suppliers available to the City on an as needed basis. They will serve somewhat as a CMAR, Construction Manager at Risk.

Each project is different, so there's no cost allocation with this award until a project is ready to be bidded, among the pool of suppliers. This provides for an opportunity for local suppliers, including the ability to work with the larger firms to develop them. The firms range from small to large, and a varying degrees of expertise. Their primary functions are consisting of the three main project phases, pre-project, or construction services. That consists of reviewing plans, analyzing cost estimates, conducting design progress meetings. The construction phase, the coordinate with designers, contractors and assist with direct purchases, do progress reports, scheduling, re'.., review shop drawings and confirm payments for completed work. The closeout services ensure that as built drawings are provided, that operation and maintenance manuals are provided, as well as to ensure that any deductions or savings are then also realized.

One of the primary things that we can benefit from, is communication, cost savings. Some people think it ranges from around two to three percent, but each project is unique so there's no real set dollar value that we can say that it's gonna be seven or eight, or, or, or, or ten percent. But we know that, that we will get what we negotiate, and it's my, my goal, always, to make sure that we steward the funds of the City properly.

Another thing is constructability reviews. We have a lot of designs sometimes that require a little bit more viewing, and sometimes a different set of eyes is helpful to us. As with the Utility District, they have several projects that they would like to get out of the ground, the Lift Station No. 19, the canal crossing, and also Palm beach Shores. They'll need an extra set of hands to be able to help them to manage these projects as well.

Software and information. Generally, they have great software accessible to them, to be able to track the project and for the records filing, permits, and all of those other things. There's, there's also the relationship of being an extension of Staff. They help with scheduling. So there's a lot of benefits that the City can achieve from the use of owner's representative.

- done that, but since I've been here, we've done a least four.
- 2788 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Alright. That's fine. And I'm okay with this, I just know
- you said a whole lot and I was just hoping that going forward, if we're just gonna be
- 2790 routinely recertifying these individuals, to be basically continuing service agreements,
- then that's something that will just be on a Consent. That's what I would hope that the
- Members.., because clearly this.., all we're doing is reauthorizing that the Staff can have
- on hand a dispense... What is this, six contractors?
- 2794 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Yes.
- 2795 Councilperson McCoy: Yeah, six. You said, six?
- 2796 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Yes.
- 2797 **Councilperson McCoy:** So we're not speaking of any monetary, but this is pretty
- routine and this just gives Staff that flexibility. But, I'm perfectly okay with it, I just, you
- know, I'm glad you made such a thorough explanation. I just hope that if this comes up
- again, you know, certainly, if Members wanna pull it, then I just think this is regular and
- routine. And, you know, because, you know, unless there's some significant issue, I don't
- see why we need a whole lotta extended discussion on it.

- included was something that we've been driving since I sat on this dais, and that's
- something that you've made sure that was addressed with this. So, thank you so much
- 2862 for that and ensuring that with this project.
- I have a question. The last time that we used owner's rep, based on my
- 2864 conversations during my Agenda review was the Marina Phase 1. What are we doing to
- 2865 ensuring some of these experiences that we had the first time, and some of the challenges
- 2866 that happened during the Phase 1 process, will not happen again this..., with Phase 2, or
- 2867 any other project that we use owner rep for?
- 2868 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Well, I can honestly say that, with these ones, we will
- certainly have strong performance metrics. Unfortunately, Mr. Lawson, I don't know really
- what happened in the past.
- 2871 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Okay.
- 2872 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** So, I don't have..., you know, a, a background or history
- on that. But I do know we've picked some solid firms and performance metrics are very
- important. But, I will, you know, get with Staff to figure out what exactly took place before.
- to make sure that we can avoid those pitfalls in the future.

- 2876 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Give me some examples of the performance metrics that
- we're gonna be looking at? What are we looking at with this, with this owner's rep?
- 2878 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Well, one of the performance metrics is making sure
- that they provide adequate reporting, that they conduct weekly construction meetings,
- 2880 that they ensure that if we're using the owner direct process, that that's done correctly...
- 2881 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Mhmm.
- 2882 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** ...that we also ensure that the scheduling stays on
- track, that they inform the City if something goes wrong, or that they need a decision from
- us, that they have clear processes to be able to communicate back and forth all the
- 2885 elements of what's occurring with the project.
- 2886 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** And who's the vendor gonna report to?
- 2887 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Who they will report to?
- 2888 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Yes, ma'am.
- 2889 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** It depends on the project. But, basically, it'll be the
- 2890 Public Works Department or the Utility District, or the department that's using their
- 2891 services.
- 2892 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: So, whichever department that's using the services, gonna
- report directly..., is gonna report to that Director of their Department. So, whether it's in
- our Parks & Rec, Public Works, UD, they'll report to those Directors?
- 2895 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Yes. And City Administration overall.
- 2896 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Okay. And then, that'll be weekly reports that they'll be
- 2897 giving?
- 2898 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** It depends on the project. Some of them will be weekly.
- We can ask for whatever we need, depending on the project.
- 2900 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** And then the perfoma that they're gonna be bringing to the
- table, when do we make a decision or determination that they're not gonna be hitting
- 2902 those points that we need as a owner rep, how long will that drag out?
- 2903 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** In my world, it doesn't drag out.
- 2904 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Okay.
- 2905 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** If we see that they're not providing what we need, when
- we need it, we need to deal with it immediately.

- 2907 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: Okay. Are we gonna give construction.., constructive
- 2908 criticism, are we gonna give them the opportunity to make corrective measures, or are
- 2909 we gonna immediately terminate contracts? That's one of my concerns.
- 2910 Procurement Director Pemsel: I believe we should always do constructive criticism,
- and also, cure notices, whatever it takes, for us to bring them back in align. Our goal is 2911
- to have partners. You know? And to use our stick, the, the stick of penalty when it's 2912
- 2913 needed. There will also, of course in every project, be different nuances, like liquidated
- 2914 damages or things like that, depending on that.
- 2915 But yeah, I believe in... In the weekly meetings, or biweekly meetings, however
- we set them up to do, generally you start off with weekly meetings, when the project is 2916
- new and then you adjust accordingly. But, at each of those meetings, we are going to 2917 2918
- also help Staff to understand how to work with owner's representatives as well. So, I am
- 2919 full..., very committed to training Staff on the procurement process, and I will do so in this
- 2920 instance as well so they understand what the City's role is, and what the contractor's role
- 2921 is.

As you know, we continue with our Reimagine Riviera Beach capital program. The ltem before you today is for the demolition of two existing buildings. The first building being the Walgreens on Congress and Blue Heron. This is an effort that is required in order for us to bring the new Fire Station 88 out of the ground at that same site.

In addition, the Library at the City Hall Complex, is currently not in use, and as you know, we purchased a new building at 2129 North Congress, and this Board authorized renovations, I believe last month for the interior of that building to house our Library and Youth Empowerment Services.

So, this Resolution will authorize the contractor to begin prep work and contracting for the demolition of these two facilities at the.., immediately for Walgreens, and then after the Library is fully moved over to 2129 North Congress, that property will al'.., that building I should say, shall also be demolished.

Chairperson Botel: Thank you. Madam Clerk, you said we had public comment.

City Clerk Anthony: Yes, Madam Chair, Members of the Board. Fane Lozman,

2974 Bessie Brown.

Mr. F. Lozman: Fane Lozman.

One firm from Boynton Beach to demo that? That's not gonna cut it. [Chuckle]. Back in 2006 when I moved to Riviera Beach, Michael Brown's brother, the Mayor, was a demolition guy. And there was a bunch of other demolition guys who wanted to tear down all the five thousand homes, and all the businesses around there for their \$2.4 billion contract. And I remember they came and talked to me. Said, 'Hey, why are you opposing the redevelopment project, to give away the Marina and knock down all these homes? We're gonna make millions of dollars. You know, we're struggling here in Riviera Beach.' And I said, 'Hey,' I said, 'I'm against eminent domain to take private property.' I said, 'Why should poor people be kicked out of the waterfront?' Michael Brown's theory was that the poor people shouldn't live by the waterfront, it was too valuable, so everybody should move to Pahokee. But, in the process of doing that, I learned a lot about the demolition game. [Chuckle]. And the point being, there's plenty of demolition people in this City, and I don't know if was Mayor Masters, maybe, he said we need to give points when it comes to a competitive bid if they're based in this City.

Somebody oughta go back to that mindset, and say we're gonna table this and we're gonna see is Brown's brother, and all these other guys who came up to me fifteen years ago, are they out of business? But if they're still in business in Riviera Beach, we need to do what's best for this City, not what's best for some firm in Boynton Beach. You know? I wanna understand why there's only one firm that applied? Did all those companies go out of business? Okay, great. If they did, I understand Boynton Beach, but what are we gonna do for the people of this City? Okay. For the people that work here. Why aren't we giving bonus points, like they do in other places that if you're a local city, you get points as part of the competitive process.

I have a problem when I see one company in Boynton Beach, and I know for a fact, fifteen years ago, I had all these demolition guys yelling at me for fighting to keep those homes from being given by eminent domain. You know, does anybody really care? You know, you're up there, you're looking at your phones, you really... You got a poor woman here, Ms. Williams, you call the bullhorn lady, and you mock her. That's why you shouldn't be the Chair. She waited here all night to make three minutes of comments and you just pay her lip service. You are a disgrace, when this woman is an activist in this City. Okay?

But, the rest of you up there, does anybody care about the businesses in Riviera Beach? I know Masters used to have job fairs. He used to wo'..., he used to have all kinds of stuff. You're just looking at the clock. Well, we're gonna talk the next twenty seconds, I wanna have an answer why we're giving this contract to Boynton Beach when there's plenty of demolition contractors in this City? I'm gonna ask the Mayor. Mayor, you ought to go around and see who's the demolition contractors and say we're gonna talk to them one on one. Maybe they were out with COVID. Who knows. But we should give that contact to somebody in this City, 'cause fifteen years ago...

- 3018 **Mr. F. Lozman:** ...contractors.
- 3019 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, it looks like Ms. Brown
- has left. And that concludes public comment for this Item.
- 3021 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Any questions or comments from Council?
- 3022 Councilperson McCoy: Yes.
- 3023 **Chairperson Botel:** You're recognized.
- 3024 **Councilperson McCoy:** I'm sorry, Mr. Bailey, I think I must've missed it. So, where's
- the existing items for the Library? Is that gonna be moved over to the new facility?
- 3026 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes. Once the renovation at 2129 North
- 3027 Congress is complete, there..., all the items will be moved from the existing Library at City
- Hall to 2129. And, the 2129, will be their operating location until the permanent location
- of the Library is, is completed.
- 3030 **Councilperson McCoy:** Do you have a proposed timeline on... I, I guess we're waiting
- on the renovations. Do you have a proposed timeline on that?
- 3032 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes.
- 3033 **Councilperson McCoy:** For that?
- 3034 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Right now, we're anticipating early in the
- summer. And, early I mean, in June, we're anticipating having the grand opening for the
- new Library and Youth Empowerment Center at the..., on Congress.
- 3037 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. And, this Dev-Land, is that the only submittal we had
- 3038 for this?
- 3039 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes. You'll recall in the last quarter of last year,
- we brough before the Council, many contracts in the pool of contractors. We had thirteen
- in the general construction arena, we had three vendors who came in for demolition. All
- three vendors were given opportunity to come to these buildings. As you can imagine,
- with the complexity and age of the buildings, we made the pre-bid meeting mandatory.
- You need to set foot in there before you can just throw in a price for this demolition. Dev-
- Land was the only vendor that showed up of the three that are on our demolition contract,
- and so, we are moving forward with Dev-Land.
- 3047 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair.

- 3048 **Chairperson Botel:** Any other questions? [Pause]. It has been moved and
- 3049 seconded that Council authorize a work order to Dev-Land Demolition and Site, Inc. of

- 3074 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, there are no public
- comment cards on this Item. The acceptance of public comment card on this Item is now
- 3076 closed.
- 3077 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Would someone care to make a motion to
- 3078 approve Resolution 19-21?
- 3079 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** So moved.
- 3080 Councilperson McCoy: Second.

3081 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. Bailey.

Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes. Toward the end of last year, I was before 3082 this Board in reference to roadway projects, and the question came up on the 3083 3084 methodology with which roads were selected for reconstruction. I had mentioned at the 3085 time that there was a 2013 pavement analysis and study that we were attempting to use as a guide. That study is now outdated and requires updating, and this Resolution will 3086 provide for updating the pavement [stammer] pavement analysis throughout the City, and 3087 will provide us a five and ten year capital plan that we can then use and follow as we 3088 move through the worst streets first methodology for investing in infrastructure in our 3089 3090 roadways.

3091 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. McCoy, you're recognized.

Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair.

3092

I was just curious. The worst streets methodology? I know between 23rd and 26th Court, they're pretty bad off, in Monroe Heights. So, is that on this.., where's that on that criteria list?

- Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Could you provide the cross street on 23rd to 26th Court, that you're referring to, sir?
- Councilperson McCoy: So, we're talking from Avenue R, between Avenue R and President Barack Obama Highway. That whole section, from 23rd Street, there's a little valley in the middle of those streets. I would hope that that's on your list.
- Interim Public Works Director Bailey: This plan intends to look at all of the streets and determine, based on their age, the last time they were.., they had a significant investment, if there are significant issues with their water, sewer or drainage infrastructure that require immediate attention. Those are the primary criteria that determine the sort of age and the life expectancy remaining on the road.
- I think that the roads you're referring, sir, recently had a significant investment, and based on general criteria, probably will not rank very high in the need for replacement, based on engineering analysis.
- 3109 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. Follow up, Madam Chair.
- 3110 Chairperson Botel: Go ahead.
- Councilperson McCoy: Well, I know the engineering and, you know, the timeline. I, you know, that's cool but, you know, even recognizing in 2019 when we started here as new Members, we had some significant challenges, and they still exist with that. And we had to really bite the bullet and move forward.
- But, to make matters worse, we're not doing a great job at managing these pro'..., projects, Mr. Bailey. As a matter of fact, we're doing a terrible job. And I'm gonna point

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out to you. I called the Assistant City Manager one day when somebody called and said you guys turned the streets into one way. I said, 'I can assure you that didn't happen.' But when I went over to Avenue M at Monroe Heights Park, and I traveled southbound from 25th Street down to 23rd Street, when I got to 24th Street, clearly, whoever the road pavement person, literally turned 23rd Street into a one-way street. And it's very clear because you see the markings of the, of the, I guess the paint that was on the road. And, I'm just saying to myself, all the money that we spent, and we asked, you know, asked the Board to approve for these projects, we literally have a contactor that put the stripping and put directional arrows going in the wrong direction. How do we get that... And then, clearly, there is.., not even it was repaved, it seems like somebody just painted over top of it, but clearly, if you were traveling east on 23rd Street, West 23rd Street and you came around that curve in the, in the 1100 block, you literally had someone painting it as if it was a one-way street driving northbound.

So, I just, you know, this all sounds good, but I just see that.., I don't see where we're really improving and how anybody is managing it. I know they cleaned it up but that goes to show that we're not doing what we should be doing when it comes to these projects because, if this... You know, I know we had the guys that were managing it, the outside firm that was doing the day to day management, I guess the construction management portion, but I just don't see that we're doing a good job. And I'd really like to see how we can put together again, a plan to address, not just, you know, Citywide, but more importantly, the issues that we didn't correct the first time. And to make matters worse, we doubled down and got it wrong.., well, not we, but it's wrong because people look at the City Council Members. You know, they call and come by personally sand say, 'This is wrong.' That was a big one.

You know? And as far as I'm concerned, that should be high on the charts, when you're literally asking these folks, that are taxpayers... And then, you know... I'm sorry. Let me deviate for a second. That goes back to the very point of why we need more public information, Mr. Evans, on that fifty percent improvement that's being repealed from the Charter because it just was repeated here tonight, several times, incorrectly and improper. And this is the stuff that we get crucified for in our communities. This very thing where there's a lot of misinformation outta here. And believe it or not, that passed four to 1, and then the Police and Fire Charter, passed unanimous.

But, getting back to the street thing, that was just outright ridiculous. I know we had some challenges that were beyond, you know, this body's control when it came to the overall design of that, but when we were here, they literally painted the directional signs in the wrong direction. And that's unacceptable. So, I.., well I hope that, not just this Item authorizing this firm to take an assessment and, you know, come up with a long-term plan, but we have to just do a better job in managing these.

And I just have one question. I guess I said all that to ask this question. I'm not understanding how is this coming.., it said it's coming out of the impact fees.., impact main'.., \$55,000 from available impact fees. What does that mean? Can you explain what, what that means? It's from the available impact fees.

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- 3159 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: I would request our Finance Director... That
- was his component of the, of this Resolution on the funding source.
- 3161 **Councilperson McCoy:** And while he's coming, I guess I wanna make the question
- more specific. Are we budgeting to receive that [stammer] well, an allotment of impact
- fees, and then we're re.., I guess, we're rebudgeting to expend that amount of \$50,000?
- 3164 I'm sorry, \$55,000. I can't see. Mr., Mr. Sherman?
- Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Randy Sherman, Finance
- 3166 Director.
- Yeah. As projects occur within the City, new construction occurs, they're paying
- impact fees. They pay for roads, they pay for public buildings, they pay for parks, they
- for police, they pay for the Fire Department, so those funds are kept to the side, they're,
- they're separated and then we come back here, and we get those dollars appropriated.
- 3171 So, what we're doing is, we're taking some of the dollars out of the, the, the roads impact
- fees and that's what we're appropriating for this project.
- 3173 Councilperson McCoy: Last question, Madam Chair.
- 3174 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.
- 3175 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, Mr. Sherman, when we collect impact fees, it does not go
- into general fund?
- 3177 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: No.
- 3178 **City Manager Evans:** No.
- Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: We keep it in a capital
- 3180 project fund.
- 3181 Councilperson McCoy: Well...
- Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Because the impact the
- impact fees haves to be used for specific purposes. So it's a, it's a special revenue that
- 3184 we keep to the side.
- 3185 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. Thank you.
- 3186 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, if I may?
- 3187 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes. You're recognized.
- 3188 **City Manager Evans:** With regards to the comment that Councilperson McCoy
- made with respect to the roadway projects, after this analysis is complete, we would bring
- 3190 the analysis back, and then obviously bring back what the anticipated cost would be
- associated with. So, if we then move forward with a plan to fund roadway projects, or the

reconstruction of roadways, you know, we can look at certain areas to find out, hey, what would the cost be associated with that?

3194 So, if there is any previous construction activities or roadway projects that may 3195 have recently been done, and conceivably would score high as it relates to the, the condition of the asphalt, we still would have the ability, if we go out for a bond issuance 3196 or what have you, to look to address that as a part of our holistic roadway network plan 3197 that we look to bring forward. So that's gonna be also something that we would discuss 3198 once the study is complete. But definitely looking at it from the standpoint as which 3199 roadway has the greatest chance for failure, or is, is not up to standard. And then, having 3200 that discussion with the Board holistically, how do we fund it and how do we address 3201 3202 maybe some of the other concerns that the community has articulated.

- Chairperson Botel: Thank you. I have a comment to make. Just with regard to the little section there, across from Publix. I think that, Mr. Evans, you've been receiving complaints from people on that side of Blue Heron about the fact that the trucks from Publix are really ruining the streets over there. So, I'm hoping that you take a close look at those streets when you do this study.
- Anything else? [Pause]. It has been moved and seconded that Council authorize a work order to AE Engineering to evaluate the City's roadway network to develop a long range capital plan. As your name is called, please answer yes or no.

- 3232 City Clerk Anthony: Madam Chair and Members of the Board, we do not have
- public comment cards on this Item. The acceptance of public comment cards on this Item
- 3234 is now closed.
- 3235 Chairperson Botel: Thank you. Would someone care to make a motion to
- 3236 approve Resolution 20-21?
- 3237 **Councilperson Lanier:** So moved.
- 3238 Chairperson Botel: Do we have...
- 3239 Councilperson Miller-Anderson: Second.
- 3240 **Chairperson Botel:** ...a second? Thank you. Mr. Bailey? This is you too? Yes.
- 3241 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes. Council, you will recall, traditionally each
- year, Staff brings a hurricane preparedness plan and a request for funding in preparation
- of our summer storm season. At last year's meeting, the question was raised why we
- continue to rent generators, and the Council directed Staff to install permanent generators
- 3245 and not rent them another year.

3246 This is the coming to fruition of that directive. We conducted the design, put a solicitation out and the winner..., the lowest responsive bidder was Zabatt. You will note 3247 that we've expanded to two new facilities in addition to previous conversations, the 3248 Lindsay Davis Center and Brooks Center are now going to be provided with generator 3249 power. This is a direct result of changes based on COVID. You will recall in years past, 3250 we packed a significant number of Staff members, when there was a storm coming, in the 3251 Public Works building. Under COVID scenario, that is no longer an option. So, we are 3252 bringing these two facilities online, into our sort of quiver, as opportunities and locations 3253 3254 where we'll be able house Staff during a storm. These are the two newest buildings, other than the Public Works building, that have been built to post-Hurricane Andrew standard, 3255 that would also now have generators. So we'll be able to spread the Staff out, do sort of 3256 distancing while we brace for an impending storm, and also allow us to deploy, more 3257

- rapidly, as we will be embedded in the community at these facilities.
- 3259 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Any comments or questions? Mr. McCoy.
- 3260 **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you, Madam Chair.

- Mr. Bailey, I'm just curious. Looking at both proposals... I'm sorry, both submittals.
 Excuse me, that's a more appropriate terminology. Give me one second, I gotta get 'em back up. There's a bit of a disparity in the amount of the generator cost and I'm not sure if I understand that, and I mean disparity between the two firms. And, it said... Give me one second, I'll get it back here. [Pause]. On the bid sheet, why is the purchase different on.., between the different contractors? Am I seeing that correctly? Seems I see...
- 3267 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: I'm sorry. Why is the...
- 3268 **Councilperson McCoy:** Purchase price different?
- 3269 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Well, the.., under the construction plans, we, we generally do a performance specification for the generator. It'll have to be, let's say, 500 3270 kilowatts, but we will limit it to say the top three brands. We're not going to allow the 3271 vendor to propose, say some very cheap brand. Similarly, when you buy an a/c unit, 3272 you're gonna buy a Trane, you're gonna buy one of the American brands that you know 3273 3274 has a longevity and history. So, the difference in price could be explained potentially by 3275 the different selection in the brand of equipment that was proposed by the two different 3276 vendors. And if you look, Zabatt is an actual generator company. The other firm is a general contractor that would simply be buying a generator sort of off the self, for lack of 3277 a better word, and, you know, sort of cobbling together a team, and that's not necessarily 3278 3279 their specialty.
- So, they potentially have different cost profiles, embedded costs, and different levels of experience installing generators of this scale.
- Councilperson McCoy: Okay. So, and forgive me if it seems that I'm.., well, I am naïve to this, but wouldn't the City be better positioned to purchase this or going through
- 3284 that supplier? Because it seems like the, the difference in price.., the difference in the
- 3285 two bids is the price of the generator.
- 3286 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: I, I think to your question of would the City be
- 3287 better off...
- 3288 Councilperson McCoy: I mean...
- 3289 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...purchasing the generators...
- 3290 **Councilperson McCoy:** As far as the price.
- 3291 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: ...directly?
- 3292 Councilperson McCoy: Right.
- 3293 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: That.., we possibly could. That's not a model
- 3294 that we have done...

- 3295 **Councilperson McCoy:** Fair enough. I, I just didn't know if that was how it works. But, clearly, what I'm seeing here is that the difference of the two bids is mostly made up of 3296
- 3297 the actual purchase price of the generator.
- 3298 Not to mention, you know, I don't know if the Member, Council Member is gonna say this, but I was looking exactly at this whole, I guess this new one is DBE. What is 3299 that? I know MBE and SBE, but there's a notation of a DBE. I don't know what that 3300 3301 means, that acronym is.
- 3302 **Interim Public Works Director Bailey: DBE?**
- 3303 **Councilperson McCoy:** It's saying one of the pages that there's a MBE, SBE and DBE.
- Ms. Pemsel, are you aware what a DBE is? 3304
- 3305 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Disadvantaged [inaudible].
- Councilperson McCoy: Disadvantaged. Okay. Alright. Okay. So, this was a hard 3306
- 3307 bid and the only difference that I seen was the price. Correct? In the generator?
- 3308 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes, sir.
- 3309 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. So, okay. And these hard bids, we can't stipulate any
- kind of specific local participation or sub-participation? In those solicitations? 3310
- 3311 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: I would have to rely on Ms. Pemsel on what our
- 3312 Procurement Code would allow in a direct hard bid of this nature.
- Procurement Director Pemsel: Good evening, Council, Mayor, Chair. 3313
- 3314 In our solicitation packets, we generally have forms for them to fill out. We call
- them now Schedules 1 through 4, for them to list the different firms that they're going to 3315
- 3316 use. And that's always a part of our solicitation packet. So we, we do ask.
- Councilperson McCoy: Okay. Does, does it provide any preference of..., does it 3317
- 3318 provide any benefit in a hard bid?
- **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Does it provide any benefit? 3319
- Councilperson McCoy: In terms of how Staff recommends these. Because, if it's a 3320
- 3321 hard bid, it's my understanding that you're only looking at the price.
- **Procurement Director Pemsel:** We are looking at lowest, most responsive, yes. That 3322
- is the driving force behind that. So, if we have RFP's and RFQ's, we have a little bit of 3323
- more... we have a committee and we have other factors we can use. But our Code does 3324
- 3325 not support that at this time, to be able to make a different decision...
- 3326 Councilperson McCoy: [Inaudible].
- 3327 Procurement Director Pemsel: ...based on the...

- 3328 **Councilperson McCoy:** It's yes or no, Ms. Pemsel. I don't.., you confuse me when
- you start saying too much. So, [inaudible]...
- 3330 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Okay. So, I'm a little tired. So sorry about that.
- 3331 [Chuckle].
- 3332 **Councilperson McCoy:** So you're saying no?
- 3333 Procurement Director Pemsel: No.
- 3334 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Alright. Good enough.
- 3335 [Chuckle]
- 3336 **Councilperson McCoy:** I, I mean, when you start...
- 3337 [Inaudible dais comments and chuckles]
- 3338 **Councilperson McCoy:** When you start explaining, I'm like, I even forget the question
- that I asked. So, okay. No. Alright. Good enough.
- 3340 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Alright.
- 3341 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you.
- 3342 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** You're welcome.
- 3343 **Chairperson Botel:** Any other questions? Comments?
- Councilperson McCoy: Oh, I'm sorry. One last question, and I think this is not for Ms.
- Pemsel, it's probably a Mr. Sherman question but, Mr. Manager, would you know that this
- money, because it's hurricane related, is coming out of the hurricane, I guess, the.., not
- the catastrophic, I love to call it that, but...
- 3348 **City Manager Evans:** The major disaster fund?
- 3349 **Councilperson McCoy:** Major disaster. Yes. Is that where it's coming from?
- 3350 **City Manager Evans:** I believe so. Mr. Sherman, is that the funding source?
- 3351 **Chairperson Botel:** Just go like this or this. It's gonna be yes or no.
- Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: The generator that's going
- at the Public Works facility is being paid out of the major disaster fund. The other two
- generators are being paid out of the, the facility funds. For.., because one is going to
- 2129 Congress, that's coming out of that project. And, where's the other one going?
- 3356 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Lindsay Davis.

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- 3357 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Lindsay Davis, right.
- That's coming out of that project as well.
- 3359 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: 2129 already has a generator.
- 3360 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Right.
- 3361 Councilperson McCoy: So...
- 3362 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Where's the other one...
- 3363 Councilperson McCoy: So...
- 3364 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: ...going?
- 3365 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Lindsay Davis and the Brooks Center.
- 3366 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: And Brooks Center. I'm
- 3367 sorry. Yeah. Those...
- 3368 Councilperson McCoy: [Inaudible]...
- 3369 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: ... are coming out of the
- municipal facility fund that we budgeted.
- 3371 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.
- 3372 Interim Public works Director Bailey: Moving a lot of facilities...
- 3373 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right. But there's not...
- 3374 Interim Public works Director Bailey: ...[inaudible].
- 3375 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...a fund specific to each building, correct, Mr... this is overall
- 3376 municipal building...
- 3377 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Right.
- 3378 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...fund? So, it's not one specific to each project.
- 3379 Finance and Administrative Services Director Sherman: Correct.

- 3422 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Yes. It is with great pleasure that I bring this
- Resolution and work order forward. This is for our temporary Fire Station 87 on the
- 3424 southside of Blue Heron, in the corner of Blue Heron and Avenue H on the Wells property.
- This is the first move in our advancement on the City Hall site and facilities there. We've
- discussed this multiple times. There is a.., we put a solicitation out for modular firms, to
- be able to react quickly and bring our facilities, temporary and/or permanent facilities out
- of the ground timely.

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So, with this.., with this work order, we will be bringing a.., the Fire Station, the apparatus bay, and a storage area, all associated.., parking, lighting, security and all elements, as well as fencing to secure this temporary Fire Station location.

Of the \$1.5 million being contemplated for this project, we know local participation is a priority of this Council, and we are working with our vendor. While this is a design-build, so that they haven't yet engaged all of their design professionals to get a site plan, a layout and fixed elements, the vendor has provided a list of commodities or trades that they foresee really being available to our local vendors to participate. Those commodities are the civil underground, paving, security elements, fire alarms, sprinklers, concrete work, and landscaping trades are right for local participation here with Riviera Beach firms. The elements that I've outlined total \$465,000, or represent a potential twenty-nine percent local participation of those elements of the project.

You can imagine as a modular firm, the building itself comes off their factory and there's really no local participation available there, but all of the onsite work that'll happen here, on the property, is where we would consider a ripe opportunity for that participation. Speaking of, while this is a \$1.5 million request to move forward, please understand, the buildings themselves, and you'll see it in your backup, represent \$467,000. And that's an asset that'll move into the City's portfolio, so as we move through this Reimagine Riviera Beach, we will be able to relocate these facilities.., buildings, I should say, to other properties, for other uses. They're being designed to be flexible for a multitude of purposes as we go forward. So, the \$467,000 building will be a fixed asset that we will use over and over again, as we move forward with the entire capital program for new facilities for Staff.

3451 facilities for Staff.

3452 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Any comments or questions?

3453 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Madam Chair?

3454 **Chairperson Botel:** You're recognized.

- 3455 Chair Pro Tem Lawson: So, Mr. Bailey, there's no local, minority participation on this
- 3456 project as of yet, that has been engaged?
- 3457 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: No. Because there is no design yet. So it's hard
- 3458 to ask the subcontractors to bid and participate when there is no design. But, it is our
- intention, and that's why I, I've sort of outlined.., we've worked with the vendor on what

- forward, there'll be.., and I know Ms. Pemsel is working with them directly, opportunities
- to engage the local community and firm up the participation, as we get a little further along

- 3464 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Okay. So... Follow up, Madam Chair.
- 3465 **Chairperson Botel:** Go ahead.
- 3466 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** I guess this is my only concern, I don't wanna go forward with
- supporting this Item without having a concrete path on what we're gonna expect for local
- participation. Whether it's a percentage or an expectation, or an amount because, right
- now, we're gonna begin to engage them but any vendor or any person on this contract
- can just simply say there's no local participation that we can utilize for this process. They
- can say that we don't have the ability, or that we don't have the, the trained individuals
- which we know that's just a cop out or an excuse for not using locals and minorities on
- this project. I want that actually to be detailed and outlined, 'cause if this is a design bid,

- can do is, once we get to design the facility, and get to have the conversations with the

- construction can commence, so we would be able to give you a really good or close to
- 3488 accurate number. It is our intent, if there is twenty-nine percent of the \$1.5 million

- 3499 **City Manager Evans:** What would be the anticipated cost for the design?
- 3500 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** We're, we're not gonna actually know about locals until we get
- to that design portion. Will we have expended any.., will we have expended any money
- 3502 up until that process?
- 3503 **City Manager Evans:** The design is usually about ten percent of the cost. Isn't that,
- as far as industry standards, Mr. Bailey?
- 3505 Interim Public Works Director Bailey: Ten to twelve percent. So you're in that hundred
- and fifty to \$180,000 range. But, you're gonna need the design irregardless of how we
- end up moving forward. You need the design, you're gonna need to go through site plan
- approval and things of that nature before you really can put a shovel in the ground.

- design, if we decide not to move forward with this process, with this project, we could still

And so, when elected officials get death threats, when elected officials are criticized and scrutinized... I can tell you that these elected officials work very hard for this community. They get and receive hundreds, if not thousands of emails on a monthly basis. So, they get tons of phone calls, they are talked to in parking lots. And so goes for Staff. And they're doing their level best to do what's in the best interest of this community forward.., to move this community forward.

And if we're to see the fruits of this labor, materialize into something that we can all be proud of, we have to work together collectively, for the betterment of this agency. We are all entrusted with a responsibility to make this community better for future generations, and take care of those that have paved the way for us.

And so, when we hear information with regards to the Charter amendments, and what that means, some of the information is grossly inaccurate. And what it does is, it scares employees and people that rely on this agency for their livelihood. The first Charter amendment that is on the ballot, the one that speaks specifically to the assessment. There is a provision in the Charter right now that says the City shall, not may, shall assess for investments in roadway or stormwater that a private individual benefits from. So, if there is a roadway that's in front of your home, or stormwater improvements that are in front of your home, in the Charter now, there is a provision that the City shall assess. It's not a mechanism that hasn't been..., it's a mechanism that hasn't been utilized since the 1980's, but it's a 'shall'.

We're looking to ask the voters to change that because we believe that what you pay in ad valorem revenue is enough to be able to budget appropriately for roadway improvements. We don't want the additional burden to be placed on the taxpayers. We are looking to create a situation where it relieves any particular burden. Roadway projects cost millions and millions of dollars, and nobody wants to place undue burden on the residents of this community.

The issue with regards to the Police Department, and the Fire Department. We're trying to make those Chartered departments. So, what it does is, the elected officials now have the ability to establish, abolish, or modify any department in the City of Riviera Beach now. They have that authority now. By making the Police Department an Charter departments, you are taking the authority away from the elected body to ever make that decision, and you the voters will be empowered to make that decision. So, in the event that the voters ever decided that they did not want Police or fire services, it would require a referendum. Right now, as it stands, if the Board ever took action to say they wanted to contract out, modify, tweak, or abolish, they have that authority now.

What they're asking for in the Charter amendment, is giving the residents back the authority and the ability to ensure that you will have a Police and Fire Department in perpetuity, because it would require the voters to make a decision on the service provision as it relates to Police and Fire.

So when you hear things that are out in the community, we've made ourselves available. We will visit you at your home, we will do whatever is necessary to educate and inform the community to make sure that you make a good decision, based on all the information and facts that are in front of you.

The fear mongering, the coming to the podium and attacking persons, that's not productive. We're looking to try to bring well over \$300 million worth of investments to this community. The world is watching. They can sit in their living room and watch our meetings and when there's disruption, or there's personal attacks, it's not conducive and it's not the Riviera Beach that we all know and love. We want better for this community, but it starts in every conceivable thing that we do.

Staff has to step up, the community has to step up and we have to work together for the betterment of this community. That has been being monitored and I did speak 3754 with Ms. Jacobs regarding the, the permanent paving of that spot. They did not pave it 3755 3756 yet because they've been monitoring it to make sure that it does not sink again, and they didn't want people driving over it. I pass there every day so, twice a day at least, so I do 3757 see it and that's why I've been in communications with the Public Works Department, as 3758 3759 well as the Utility District. So, they're looking to be paving that very soon, but it was not forgotten.

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And, regarding the amendments. I, I appreciate Mr. Evans mentioning that. And I kinda eluded a little earlier about the amount of scare tactics that are being put out there. I know the individuals that are pushing the opposite of what the amendments mean are educated enough to know that, that is not true. And so, to deliberately put out lies and play on the intelligence of the community, makes absolutely no sense. So, you know, I just wanna make sure that people understand, although you may know a person, please do your research, read the amendment. It's pretty clear that what is being put out there is the direct opposite of what the amendment said.

Unfortunately, alternative facts is, is really making a comeback here where we're now taking something and then thinking that it's okay to just straight out lie about something. And, and that, that's very disingenuous. And so, I wish.., if people have issues, just, you know, talk about the issues. I mean, say what your problem is, but don't sit here and try to confuse the community. And I know it's an election time, and thank God I'm not running against anyone, but I do understand how this goes. Every election, you always have the foolishness that goes on. But, [stammer], going to a point of just straight out lying is, is a issue. It's a serious issue.

And, you know, I just wanna tell the community, please read because they're banking on you not reading, and just taking something because they put it out there. Which is an absolute lie. What Mr. Evans just explained, it clearly tells you, you're the one that is in control. And that is the whole point of having it. And I think it would best if we.., I mean, we know the truth. We know what it means. I mean, it.., and so, I think it's incumbent upon us to make sure people are telling the truth, correct people when they're putting the wrong thing out there. And they're doing it deliberately. They know it doesn't mean... it don't mean that at all.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING 114 **FEBRUARY 17, 2021** Also, you know, Ms. Lanier, I think a couple meetings ago, mentioned about the death threat. She's not the only one that got death threats. There's a couple of us.., a couple more of us up here that got death threats, including myself. But I understand that it's election time. And people do stuff, trying to scare people up, but they need to understand that kinda stuff, nobody, nobody's thinking about that because I know where it's coming from. Just understand that, people protect themselves. Just understand that when you, you think about doing stuff like that.

Also, you know, I'm glad the people who were in the audience earlier spoke about the secret meeting situation. [Sigh]. I think it was kinda put..., I hope it was put to bed when they came up here and explained it, but I [audio disruption]... That's my que to stop talking?

- [Chuckles and inaudible comments]
- 3797 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** Well, regarding that whole [sigh] what's out 3798 there now, social media talking about a secret meeting, that meeting is nothing near what 3799 they want to equate it to being of this Hurst Chapel situation that happened years ago. There are a number of homeowner's associations and neighborhood associations that 3800 3801 request Staff, and Councilpeople, to participate in their meetings. The picture of the 3802 Agenda clearly says it was Pine Point. That was their Agenda. And again, it goes back to the fact that people who are putting this out there, they know the truth, but yet, they 3803 3804 continue to push this conspiracy theory.

And so, you know, if it's an issue, it's an issue, but it's not uncommon for Councilpeople and Staff to go to different meetings and present information. So, when we talk about this, [sigh], just, just get the facts. And that, and that's all I can say to people. Stop running with information that you get from people. Do your research because you're pushing stuff that is not true all the time.

- And I think that's about all I have for tonight.

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- 3812 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Commissioner McCoy.
- 3813 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair.
- I don't know. Council Member Miller-Anderson and the Manager about said it all.
- 3815 **Chairperson Botel:** Yes, she did.
- 3816 Councilperson McCoy: But not quite.
- 3817 [Chuckles]
- 3818 **Councilperson McCoy:** I would agree, Councilwoman Miller-Anderson about the death threats. I've been threatened three times, twice by members of the public, and

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once by a City employee who said he was gonna drop me. And I don't think anybody has to wonder whether or not I'm gonna protect myself. It is what it is. And to that point, we still haven't had anything done by City Administration, when the same City employee lied to the police and denied it, but came back later in the redetermination hearing and recanted and admitted he did make threatening comments to me, but, in his mind, he said it in a joking manner.

So.., and, I didn't know, initially, Council Member Lanier, that you had received those death threats and, I guess to my surprise, I had the same ones in my mailbox. So, I guess that's being handled with the Police Department.

Thank you, Mr. Evans, for bringing out that explanation of the Charter amendments because I was literally outraged when I seen individuals... And I, you know, I wanna believe that they didn't understand, but before this was actually adopted to be sent to the voters, there was two times that we voted on it. There was one time where there was a workshop on it. So to suggest that, is outright incorrect. And, you know, I was very much in support of the Police and Fire Station.., I'm sorry, the Police and the Fire Department Charter amendments being presented to the voters and it's specifically to give the voters that authority or that power to be able to control that. And, you know, I, I agree that I don't know.., I wanna believe that they were, they were mistaken, but it's clear that this was very much intentional to put that out there.

I'm just gonna jump right to the next Item and that was something I brought up to Mr. Evans regarding organized activities at Parks & Recreation facilities and, to my surprise, and also because of it I've gotten calls from individuals about why are we doing organized sports at Wells Recreation in the middle of COVID. And I wanna say that I found out that those activities being done are not actual City activities. And, I wanna ask the question about this interlocal agreement that we had, Ms. Wynn, for you to, and your office, to look into. But clearly, I'm surprised that we're now having the school Suncoast Community High School coming to use our facility because of an interlocal agreement when, in my opinion, they have the same facilities over at their school campus. And that presents the same thing that I was suggesting earlier that we literally get the calls of why is it that certain individuals can use certain amenities that have been restricted to citizens and to the community at large.

So, you know, I wanna know if there's something within the agreement because of the current situation of this pandemic, that we've restricted it for our own residents, that we cannot have a whole group of intermural sports taking place right in front of City Hall. And it looks like, in some fashion, that it's sanctioned by the City, when that's not the case, and I think they're using this interlocal agreement. And, I wanna know if there's any provisions that we can exercise to suspend that activity to coincide with what we're doing. Because clearly, the School District doesn't allow them to do that on their own property, so I don't think that we should just be the immediate substitute because it creates a lot of problems for us as a City, and even more so as Members of this body.

So, Ms. Wynn, that literally came up I think yesterday, and I would ask if you could, you know, look into it or, or come back with some, some explanation as, as to... And I

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3862 guess this is a collaboration with also the Manager, because, I mean, his office and his Staff would be the ones that will be implementing this. 3863

3864 That's all I have.

3865 Thank you, Madam Chair.

3866 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr...

3867 Councilperson McCoy: Oh, I'm sorry. One last thing. One last thing, I'm sorry. I can't 3868 read my writing.

3869 It appears again, we're lacking public notice and publications of these meetings, consistent with the law. And I think this has probably been the third or fourth time that 3870 3871 I've particularly noticed this, and I just wanna know what are we doing and where are we going? Because, it seems like I keep finding ourselves in the same situation time and 3872 3873 time again.

3874 That's all I have and I just wanna make sure that other Members were aware that 3875 I'm putting it on the record in front of the Manager.

- 3876 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** What [inaudible]...
- 3877 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you.
- 3878 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** ...are you talking about?
- 3879 **Councilperson McCoy:** The publication that has to be published outside the City Hall.
- 3880 **Councilperson Miller-Anderson:** What, are you talking about, out on the board?
- 3881 Councilperson McCoy: Yes.

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- 3882 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Is that? Mr. McCoy?
- 3883 Councilperson McCoy: Yes. Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 3884 **Chairperson Botel:** Thank you. Mr. Lawson.
- 3885 **Chair Pro Tem Lawson:** Thank you, Madam Cahir.

My only concern, colleagues, is the discussion about these amendments that's on 3886 the ballot. We had this conversation. I was hesitant to even support the Chartered 3887 3888 department, which I think is a vital discussion. But, my hesitation was that we did not have enough time to have community involvement, and community charettes. I stated 3889 3890 this on the record when we first voted on this, and Mr. Evans gave me clear direction that we would have something out within a few day'.., within a few weeks, and our first public meeting is not until February 22nd, which is gonna be virtual. And then our in-person is 3892 3893 gonna be March 1st. I think we opened up the.., we opened up the opportunity for

discussion because we did not take the proper steps necessary to go through educating our community, having the community charettes, having the discussions and going through the steps necessary to discuss these amendments. And we left ourselves viable'.., open for discussion.

That was my biggest concern, and that was the discussion. That's why I dissented on these Items, because I knew that these topics would be hot button Items that were brought to the residents in a fashion that they would feel [stammer]..., that they would feel like they were rushed into making this vote and this decision. So them telling the narrative and us still not even having a public forum to discuss them, when that was the epitome of what I said we needed to do. Yet, our first public meeting's not until February 22nd. And that's to have a discussion which will be a week out..., or, two weeks out from our election. Two weeks out from the day that they have to make a decision. So, it gives the opportunity for anyone to tell the story, the narrative, i.e., the same reason that the media can tell whatever story they want about the City, where we have to be crystal clear about what the City represents and what we're doing.

So, before we even put these ballot initiatives out, we should've had these community charettes, or we should've just waited until the next time that we could get them on the ballot. Because there was no reason to rush these through. We have protected our departments for a..., for..., since the inception. So, I'm not sure if our colleagues had a change of heart or something was gonna happen to where we had to get that Charter departments on there. And from my understanding, since Mr. Evans said, I think, we've never implemented the charging our residents a percentage, in regards to something that said shall in our Charter.

So, that is my other concern, if we've never actually charged our residents and we have not actually voted to make this a Charter department, my colleagues here seem to be in support of our Police and Fire, why did we rush this on here to have these residents vote on it? Because I'm absolutely in support of these Items. My concern is that the residents may not know what we're voting on. The residents may be voting against it and we may be having an issue or a problem to where they, they have a certain direction that we're having a discussion where it doesn't pass. 'Cause I believe back in 2008, we had this same discussion. So why would we rush this onto the ballot? And that's my biggest concern. I wanted to make sure we were on the record 'cause we talking about the narrative that's being portrayed, but we haven't done our due diligence, and we dropped the ball. This was something we instructed our Staff to get done immediately and we still haven't had a public meeting or forum. That's the first concern.

So, if we really wanna hold anyone accountable, we have to hold ourselves accountable, first and foremost. Because we need to make sure that we're telling the story.

Colleagues, we have.., we have a few events that I wanna announce for the City that's coming up. Tomorrow, JFK is actually gonna be hosting an event. It's gonna be from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Emory Moore, he's actually a Profession School of Behavioral Health professional, and he's hosting a big event at JFK from 10:00 a.m. to

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1:00 p.m. There's gonna be a lot of coverage, media coverage there, there'll be a lot of support for the kids. They're trying to really get the kids engaged. They had a hundred and twenty-five withdrawn from the school, and they really wanted to get the kids back engaged, and they need the support of the City, of the residents. So, if you have an opportunity to go by JFK tomorrow morning, they'll be there from 10:00 to 1:00.

Black History Month. I'm hosting a series of events for the community to honor Black History Month. The first one is gonna be supporting black business. This week, I made it an initiative to support Black Business Week and to support black businesses in the community. Because of Black History Month, I wanna make it kind of normalcy within our community to support black businesses. So, I've visited different black businesses within our community, throughout Palm Beach County and I'm asking for other residents to go out and support local black businesses.

Trailblazers and community pillars. I'm gonna start airing that series that we.., that I've been interviewing residents from the community. I'm gonna.., I'm gonna start that series, I'm gonna interview residents from the community. It's gonna be airing on the 22nd. I'm gonna actually be airing that on Channel 18 on Facebook Live, on YouTube, and that's interviewing local pillars of our community.

On March 30th, I'm gonna be hosting 'Surviving Emotional Trauma.' That is gonna be a mental health in the minority ser'.., community series that I've been doing within the community, and I would love for my colleagues to support that as well.

Finally, next Thursday, hosting a job fair at the Marina. It's gonna start at 10:00 a.m. and it's gonna finish at 1:00 p.m. And that is February 25th. It's a job fair at the Marina. So please, residents, come out to support these events, and come to things that you can. This job fair will be practicing social distancing, CDC guidelines, and we'll have a lot of opportunities for our residents.

Chairperson Botel: Commissioner Lanier.

Councilperson Lanier: I just wanted to say that if anybody has ever heard the term gaslighting. Gaslighting means that I'm telling you that the sky is purple but really it's blue, but you just keep trying to convince me that it's purple. Gaslighting is saying that you're supposed to be doing the same thing that we've been doing and we're in the middle of a pandemic. Nothing is the same. Things are different. And gaslighting is actually saying that people have misinformation when really it is a lie.

[Chuckles]

Councilperson Lanier: People are lying. It is not mistruths, it is not misinformation, it is a blatant, boldface lie. And when you say that we are putting out amendments that people don't understand, again, don't gaslight me. The people in Riviera Beach, the residents who live here, are smart enough to read, and to know what is on the table here.

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There are two amendments. One says that, guess what, I'm not gonna make a motion and somebody gives me a second and then the Police Department now becomes the sheriff department. That is what that means. And number two, I'm not gonna charge you fifty percent if I'm gonna.., I'm.., if I'm gonna do roadwork on your road. It's two simple, very clear items. And people are actually lying and it's so funny because it appears that.., when people come up here and they start lying, it's like, 'Do you really know that you are actually lying here?' And that people can't buy this. You're trying to gaslight me. You're trying to muddle the waters. But these things are very simple, these amendments are.

We are having the City to go out and talk about what these amendments are, but they are very simple. We don't have residents who are dumb or who are stupid, or who can't read or who don't know what time it is. They do know. They know what this means. And just, like, two years ago, two and a half years ago, when we had our election and the people in this City said they were fed up. They were fed up with how this Council was being run, how people were here and how they were doing business. And got rid of every last one of them. That is what the residents of this City does, and this is what they will do. If people continue to lie and gaslight us, and to thinking that one thing is something else, the residents are not stupid, they are not blind and they know what is happening here. They know who's behind these things. To say things like, 'Dr. Botel is racist.' When you say.., when you say that Dr. Botel is racist, I.., if anybody who sees me on Facebook would say that, you know, that, that Shirley is a Black Panther party type of girl.

- Councilperson Lanier: And I have been black all my life so I know a racist when I see one. People like Fane Lozman who say, 'Oh, you know, I'm gonna tell my [stammer], my black friend, key, Bingo. When you have to tell me about your black friend, then I know already what time it is.
- 4000 [Inaudible dais comment]
- **Councilperson Lanier:** So, what we have here is people making these accusations that are lies. And I know a racist when I see one, and Dr. Botel is not one of them. Trust me. I've been black all my life. I know it when I see it. So, to have people to come to this Council to gaslight us, to tell us what we, we know to be blatantly untrue. Not only does it does a disservice to the City, but you look foolish. I don't think that people understand when they come up here and lie, how foolish they look.
 - So, I would caution you people, who come to the Council and who blatantly lie, and who try and gaslight us. You better be careful, because not only do the residents notice, the residents will check you on this.

So my comments tonight are about the fact that no longer are we going to continue to allow too be gaslighted and to be lied to. And it's.., what Mr. Evans has said, and what Ms. KaShamba Miller has said is that, if you want any information about what is happening in the City, what is going on, any information that you need, come.., call us. Call City Hall.

The people who are supporting other candidates, look who... Malcom X said, 'If you want to know who a person is, look behind them and see who's supporting them.' That will tell you everything you need to know about that person. Who supports them. Birds of a feather type of deal.

So, I just want to make sure that everybody understands this, especially the ones who are looking at us at 11:30 at night. I'm so sorry it went.., ran so long. But the fact that we are sitting here and we know the game that's on table here, and that we are going to continue to dispel these rumors. Not rumors, not mistruths.., to dispel these lies. That are continuing to go on.

And, Madam Chair, those are my comments.

Chairperson Botel: Thank you so much. I also wanna make a statement about the amendments. And I was not certain until this evening, Mr. Evans, that we could encourage people to vote. Can we? I don't wanna say too much un'.., unless I have the legal authority to say what, what's on my mind. Is it appropriate for me to say what's...

- **City Attorney Wynn:** I don't think that that was done. There was.., you can't tell
- 4029 people how to vote. You...

- **Chairperson Botel:** Okay.
- **City Attorney Wynn:** It was...
- **Chairperson Botel:** But I can tell you...
- **City Attorney Wynn:** ...an explanation.
- **Chairperson Botel:** ...that I voted yes on both those amendments, and I think most people in this City are smart enough to know when they've been lied to. Yes, on the amendment about the Police means that we are protecting our Police and Fire from being outsourced. I never advocated for anything, any'.., for the sheriff to take over, no way. Yes, on that amendment means we're protecting our Police and Fire.

Yes, on the amendment about the fifty percent means we're protecting you, the taxpayers, from being doubly taxed. We're protecting you from being taxed for the roads that we put in front..., or for the bridges, as a matter of fact, in, in Palm Beach Isles. We're protecting you, if you vote yes. And I have [stammer].., because I've been cautious about recommending what people.., how people vote, I've always just said to them, 'I'm voting yes.' And then they can make their own minds. They're smart enough to read those amendments and know what they mean.

And thank you for reminding me about that term gaslighting. Because that's what's been going on, they've been lied to. And it's really a shame. I sh'.., it's shameful that people would take that.., take the, the position that our citizens aren't smart enough to know when they're being lied to.
