

1 Boynton, Lake Worth, West Palm Beach, they're coming down the  
2 way.

3 And if we can be proactive -- because, listen, West Palm  
4 Beach didn't think it would be a looting last night; although  
5 they had their officers out, it happened. And they had to call  
6 Keith James at 9:00 at night, or whatever, to get assigned to  
7 have a curfew. By that time they were a little too late.

8 What we're doing is we're taking a proactive (inaudible)  
9 with the intelligence that we were given to, that we're being  
10 threatened that they want to come in and loot these areas. So  
11 why wait until it happens and then try to (inaudible).

12 I don't think -- if I listen to Chief Osgood and the  
13 team -- I mean, if you need to go to Wal-Mart and you're riding  
14 in your car, I don't think they're going to stop you. With that  
15 being said, it's for groups that they see, that these looters or  
16 the people that don't want to do a peaceful protest, that come  
17 into your city to do damage, and they're in crowds, that's who  
18 they're seeking out. To make sure that our residents and our  
19 businesses stay safe.

20 So I don't think you -- he said it, he said it himself, if  
21 you're walking down the street they're not going to stop you.  
22 You know. And so use discretion when we're doing this. But  
23 let's not be caught, you know, with our tail down, our pants  
24 down, and this thing hit us tonight and we're not prepared. Be  
25 proactive (inaudible) that's fine.

1 CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you, Mr. Mayor.

2 Mr. McCoy, and then Ms. Lanier.

3 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Thank you, Madam Chair.

4 So Councilwoman Lanier, Mayor Felder, if -- you know, I  
5 actually did come across some information that I shared with the  
6 appropriate personnel at the City; but if there's truly  
7 actionable intelligence that would suggest, as you have the  
8 verbiage in this declaration, a clear and present danger, then I  
9 think as a body, why shouldn't we be aware of that and convene a  
10 meeting under 281, that's exempt from public, so that we're not  
11 making a decision basically shooting from our hip. That way at  
12 least everybody on this Board, Mayor included, we're all aware  
13 of exactly what the imminent threat and danger is. And, you  
14 know, I won't have so much reservations.

15 But I simply -- and I can tell you, and I shared this with  
16 KaShamba Miller -- Councilwoman Miller-Anderson, I simply shared  
17 a post about I specifically pray for our police department.  
18 And, oh, my gosh, did I get beat up so bad on social media about  
19 it because I went to just see our police officers one morning  
20 and there were shots fired at 5:45 in the morning.

21 So at the very least I would expect that if it's that  
22 imminent and it's that much of a danger to the community, then,  
23 you know, that's exactly why these exemptions are provided for  
24 under the law, so that when we make these decisions it's not  
25 based on us not having enough information.

1 And I certainly support being a citizen, a de facto  
2 employee and a business owner in the community, I certainly  
3 respect the need to have a curfew. But I don't want to do it  
4 out of us not making sure that everybody has the same  
5 information and that we all are aware of what the potential  
6 threat is and why there is such a sense of urgency to move  
7 forward with this.

8 That's it, Madam Chair. Thank you.

9 CHAIR BOTEL: Councilwoman --

10 COUNCILPERSON LANIER: Yeah, and I'm going to say this and  
11 I'm going to, you know, wrap this up. But I just really want to  
12 say, to piggyback off of that, saying that I for one am all for  
13 it. Don't get that misunderstood.

14 But what I want to be for, is I want to be able to make  
15 sure that every person who lives in this city is aware of this.  
16 It is 7:08 at night. If this goes into effect in an hour and a  
17 half, or an hour and 45 minutes, 90 percent of the City won't  
18 know about this. And I just want to be clear on the fact that  
19 if you're going to do this, I need a public announcement to let  
20 the public know that 9:00 tomorrow morning night, if you're not  
21 going to work then you might be stopped, you know, you might be  
22 asked questions.

23 But to enact something at two -- in an hour and a half from  
24 now, and nobody knows -- I'm sitting here talking, you know, in  
25 my office, and my father goes to all this all the time, he might

1 not know.

2 So I just want to be able to be clear about the fact that  
3 people in the public understand that this goes down 9:00  
4 tomorrow night. And also that it's not about property, people;  
5 it is about lives we're trying to save.

6 COUNCILWOMAN MILLER-ANDERSON: Madam Chair.

7 COUNCILPERSON LANIER: Because we understand that we don't  
8 want businesses -- I'm not finished. We don't want businesses  
9 destroyed. We don't want people to be able -- to be in a  
10 position, who have a business, to be able to say that I've lost  
11 my business. I understand that.

12 But I do not want additional loss of life because somebody  
13 didn't know, or whatever the case may be. I just want people --  
14 and it's not just the citizens of Riviera Beach. Anybody who  
15 comes in as antagonizers or instigators to know that tomorrow  
16 night you cannot come in this city doing anything that you think  
17 that you want to do.

18 But to give two hours notice to the people who pay our  
19 salaries, the people who live and pay taxes in the city, is  
20 doing a disservice to them. They don't even know. And they  
21 won't know. They're not watching this meeting. They don't know  
22 that in two hours you can't go anywhere unless you're going to  
23 work. They won't know this. So it's just any matter of just  
24 public information, to let people know.

25 COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: Madam Chair.

1 CHAIR BOTEL: Just a minute, Ms. Miller-Anderson.

2 I have every faith that our administration, including our  
3 Chief of Police, would be (inaudible) hey, buddy, walking, going  
4 to home, going to Wal-mart.

5 I think what we're after is that they have actual  
6 intelligence that tonight there may be groups of people doing  
7 damage in our city; and that's why they want us to sign to  
8 approve this for tonight, not wait until tomorrow.

9 As someone else had said, perhaps it was Miller-Anderson,  
10 surrounding cities are making this move tonight. Which means  
11 that if we're the only one, we will be that vacuum into which  
12 everything else will be sucked. And we don't want that to  
13 happen.

14 So my opinion is that we really need to do this now,  
15 tonight; and the only -- only with the assurance from Chief  
16 Osgood and City Manager Evans. But it's not to affect law  
17 abiding citizens in the City of Riviera Beach. It's intent is  
18 to stop crowds of people from doing damage to closed businesses,  
19 based on some information that they have -- and I don't need to  
20 know that information, frankly. I trust that they -- they're  
21 smart enough to know that this is something that we should worry  
22 about. That's my opinion.

23 Ms. Miller-Anderson.

24 COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: I just had a question for  
25 Mr. Evans. Is there a way to -- do we have like an emergency

1 broadcast where we're able to push it out to the phone numbers,  
2 or text, or something?

3 CITY MANAGER EVANS: Yes, councilperson. And that's  
4 actually what we were going to do. We have a systems call, I  
5 think reverse nine one one, where we can call the community.  
6 And we will put the order out on our social media channels, as  
7 well as the website, a crawl on the TV. Everything that we can  
8 do to inform the community as quickly as we can, we certainly  
9 will do that.

10 COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: Okay. Thank you. That's  
11 it for me.

12 CHAIR BOTEL: Now, the motion as it stands is that we enact  
13 this curfew tomorrow night. So unless I hear anything from  
14 Mr. McCoy or Ms. Lanier to put that back to the original motion  
15 which was tonight, we should vote on the motion as it stands.  
16 Am I correct, Madam Clerk?

17 THE CLERK: Yes, Madam Chair, you would vote on the  
18 amendment first. And if that fails, we would go to the original  
19 motion.

20 CHAIR BOTEL: Well, unless anyone else has something to  
21 say -- Mr. Lawson is uncharacteristic silent.

22 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: The gentleman from the Fifth  
23 District, he looks like he wants to say something.

24 CHAIR BOTEL: I don't know. He doesn't look like he wants  
25 to say something, which is very unusual. So, Mr. Lawson, did

1 you want to weigh in?

2 COUNCILPERSON LAWSON: No, Madam Chair. I was actually  
3 debriefed earlier with these same questions and concerns during  
4 the day, so I've been updated on what's going on and I'm  
5 prepared to vote moving forward.

6 CHAIR BOTEL: Madam Clerk, would you -- and this is to --  
7 this vote is to postpone the curfew until tomorrow night. Madam  
8 Clerk.

9 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: No, it's not to postpone the curfew,  
10 Madam Chair. It's to enact the curfew effective June 2nd.

11 CHAIR BOTEL: To enact the curfew tomorrow night and not  
12 tonight.

13 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Is the gentlewoman from the Third  
14 District on?

15 CHAIR BOTEL: Shirley (inaudible).

16 She moved. She's on twice. She's here twice.

17 We can't hear you.

18 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: So while we're trying to wait for her  
19 connection, Mr. Evans and Ms. Wynn, is this not a specific issue  
20 that would be encompassed under 281 of Florida Statutes, that  
21 there is some intelligence that we would have the ability to  
22 convene on un-public meeting for?

23 CITY ATTORNEY WYNN: Mr. McCoy, Florida Statute 281 deals  
24 with safety and security services. For instance, alarm  
25 services, those types of things.

1 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Well, there are specific criminal  
2 intelligence meetings that take place that are not public?

3 CITY ATTORNEY WYNN: Yes, amongst law enforcement, correct.

4 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Okay. So there is no exemption for  
5 us to talk about specific threats to enact a state of emergency?

6 CITY ATTORNEY WYNN: Okay. So, you kind of confused me.  
7 One is for criminal intelligence, no, that's amongst law  
8 enforcement.

9 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Oh? But the Mayor -- in this case  
10 it's law enforcement, because he takes over the police  
11 department.

12 CITY ATTORNEY WYNN: I think that what the Manager if  
13 anything would have done or could do is brief you individually.  
14 But again, it depends on what it is. Because if it's criminal  
15 intelligence that Chief Osgood or law enforcement would not want  
16 to be out there, then we wouldn't tell you that.

17 There is no obligation -- I mean, there are certain things  
18 that you can't know.

19 CHAIR BOTEL: Okay. Ms. Lanier is -- Shirley, say  
20 something so we can -- we're not hearing you. We're not hearing  
21 you. No. I'm not a good lip reader any longer. We all need to  
22 learn sign language.

23 Can you dial in, Shirley? Could you try calling?

24 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Is this every week?

25 CHAIR BOTEL: I don't know. Well, Wednesday we're back on



1 solid ground again, we're no longer virtual, so --

2 COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: Can't she go out and come  
3 back in, please.

4 CHAIR BOTEL: Do you want to try to go out and come -- or  
5 call on the phone? We just really at this point need to vote  
6 and wrap this up.

7 We see that you're trying, Shirley.

8 COUNCILPERSON LANIER: Okay. Can you hear me now?

9 COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: All right. We're ready for  
10 the vote. Call the vote. Call the vote.

11 CHAIR BOTEL: Madam Clerk, will you call the roll, please.

12 THE CLERK: Councilperson McCoy.

13 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Yes.

14 THE CLERK: Councilperson Miller-Anderson.

15 COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: No.

16 THE CLERK: Councilperson Lanier.

17 COUNCILPERSON LANIER: Yes.

18 THE CLERK: Pro-Tem Lawson.

19 COUNCILPERSON LAWSON: No.

20 THE CLERK: Chair Botel.

21 CHAIR BOTEL: No.

22 Now, could we please have a motion to put the curfew into  
23 effect this evening?

24 THE CLERK: Madam Chair, we already have a motion on the  
25 floor to enact the curfew as presented.

CHAIR BOTEL: Could we call that roll, please?

THE CLERK: Councilperson McCoy.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Yes.

THE CLERK: Councilperson Miller-Anderson.

COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: Yes.

THE CLERK: Councilperson Lanier.

COUNCILPERSON LANIER: Yes.

THE CLERK: Pro-Tem Lawson.

COUNCILPERSON LAWSON: Yes.

THE CLERK: Clair Botel.

CHAIR BOTEL: Yes.

THE CLERK: Unanimous vote.

CHAIR BOTEL: Okay. (Inaudible) we need to do -- do we  
need to have a discussion by City Manager?

CITY MANAGER EVANS: No, Madam Chair.

CHAIR BOTEL: A discussion by City Attorney?

CITY ATTORNEY WYNN: No, thank you.

CHAIR BOTEL: Any comments by the Mayor?

MAYOR FELDER: No, Madam Chair.

CHAIR BOTEL: Comments by Chair Pro-Tem Lawson.

COUNCILPERSON LAWSON: Thank you, Madam Chair.

I just want to let all of our residents know that we're  
doing our very best to continue to protect you and speak on  
behalf of your needs. Every one of our -- every one of my  
colleagues is just speaking on behalf of what our residents are

1 asking them to do. This is nothing personal. This is just  
2 discussions that we have based upon what our community needs.

3 So I want us to continue to be safe. I'm praying for all  
4 families. I'm praying for justice. And we're also praying for  
5 the direction of where our system is going to be change and to  
6 being implemented in the proper way. So that's what all of us  
7 are standing for and that's what we will continue to do.

8 So I support all of my colleagues here, whether we agree or  
9 disagree on everything.

10 So thank you, Mr. Evans, and Mr. Osgood, for the intel; and  
11 let's continue to move forward and progress forward.

12 CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you.

13 Mr. McCoy.

14 COUNCILPERSON MCCOY: Thank you, Madam Chair.

15 Mr. Evans and Chief Osgood, thank you for giving us regular  
16 and routine updates on, on the, I guess, current state of the  
17 City as it relates to any kind of potential criminal activity.  
18 But I would hope and expect that that will probably come a  
19 little more frequent, now that we've kind of set forth this  
20 curfew. Going forward. So that we're aware.

21 And that's all I have. Thank you.

22 CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you. Councilwoman Lanier?

23 COUNCILPERSON LANIER: I just wanted to say that I  
24 appreciate the fact that we have a police chief and a city  
25 manager who is taking care of this city. And the fact that

1 they -- I have all the utmost confidence in both of their  
2 abilities to be able to steer us through this storm and to be  
3 able to get us on the other side and to make sure that the  
4 citizens of this city feel comfortable with the police, unlike  
5 so many other cities.

6 We are a unique, unique place here, where we are very  
7 comfortable with our police, that we are very comfortable in the  
8 abilities of the people to make the decisions for us.

9 So I just wanted to make sure that the police chief and the  
10 city manager understands that we appreciate their efforts.

11 CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you.

12 Ms. Miller-Anderson.

13 COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: I just wanted to say, can I  
14 echo what Councilman Lawson stated in terms of we're all working  
15 together. I have to echo exactly what my colleagues have said  
16 in terms of Mr. Evans and Chief Osgood, I have complete respect  
17 for you two and confidence in knowing that you will make sure  
18 that we get through this.

19 And, you know, I just want to say to our community, we --  
20 we're a tight knit community; and I think that if we just  
21 continue to work together we'll be able to get through this.  
22 We're not going to allow those from outside to come in and  
23 damage what we have as a community. So I think that's why it's  
24 necessary for us to take these steps.

25 But I want to be very clear with everyone that I do expect

1 for, you know, there to be some respect involved in all of this.  
2 And I think that everybody is pretty much on the same page and  
3 understands that. And that's what the end goal is, just to  
4 basically keep everyone safe and people's property in order.  
5 But, more importantly, it's about life safety at this point.  
6 And so we just want to make sure that everybody is fine once we  
7 get through this.

8 It's very difficult. And so, you know, having children or  
9 young men, and especially for you all, my colleagues on the  
10 Board, it's a difficult time for everybody, I'm sure; but I do  
11 believe that we can get through this.

12 And as Mr. Lawson stated, hopefully there are some systemic  
13 changes that are made down the line, a little closer now than  
14 further down the line. And I apologize, guys, I can barely put  
15 two words together. A lot going on. So thank you all for  
16 dealing with me tonight.

17 CHAIR BOTEL: Sounded good to me.

18 I also want to thank Chief Osgood and Mr. Evans, and  
19 Ms. Wynn for putting together this thing, and for the Mayor for  
20 bringing it out to us this evening to vote on.

21 You know, as someone who has experienced a privileged life,  
22 to some degree, I've never had to tell my children, be careful  
23 going out in the streets. I've never had to worry about the  
24 kinds of things that many of my colleagues have to worry about  
25 on a day-to-day basis. And it's heart breaking to see what's

1 happening to our country.

2 Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, although he became more  
3 politically active toward the end of his life, just before he  
4 died he said something about riots that comes to my mind now.  
5 He said, when you riot it gives people like George Wallace more  
6 ammunition.

7 So as much as there is pain, and justified pain for the  
8 murder of a good innocent man, we hope that justice will be  
9 done. We hope that they will be brought to trial and -- I won't  
10 comment on -- we hope that justice will be served.

11 But we also hope that people will take into consideration  
12 that the damage they do when they riot and cause harm to our  
13 community is not the proper kind of behavior.

14 I think the president -- not the current president. The  
15 last president put it so well today when he said, you know, let  
16 us not model that kind of behavior. Let's model better  
17 behavior, we're better than that.

18 So, again, I want to thank you all for this vote. And God  
19 bless everyone. Have a great night. Thank you.

20 Let's see. You can't just sign off like that?

21 Anything else? Did I forget -- we have no other  
22 statements. Okay, this meeting is adjourned. Thank you.
