1 COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: Yes, that would be fine. 2 CHAIR BOTEL: Councilwoman Lanier, would you accept that, 3 withdraw your second? COUNCILPERSON LANIER: Yes. 4 5 CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you. Would anyone like to make a motion that we override the 6 Mayor's veto of ordinance number 4155. 7 8 COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: I move that we do what you just said. 9 10 CHAIR BOTEL: Would you care to second again, Commissioner Lanier? 11 COUNCILPERSON LANIER: Yes. 12 13 CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you. 14 COUNCILPERSON LANIER: Second. 15 CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you. 16 We have a motion and a second to override the Mayor's veto 17 of ordinance number 4155. If you're in favor, please vote yes. 18 If you're opposed, vote no. 19 Madam Clerk. COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Discussion. 20 21 CHAIR BOTEL: Yes. 22 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: So this is relative to the resolution. And my frustration is just because nobody knows 23 24 what the heck is going on here. And I think that's pretty darn clear. 25

For us to even be told that there's a resolution that can override the constitution of the city is just preposterous. So for us to sit here and suggest that we were going to add them to a special meeting doesn't make sense.

A resolution is an expression of the body. And I would much rather that we deal with these items just as they come. If we choose to override the Mayor's veto, that's not an ordinance; that's an expression of the body. And I support overriding it.

But what I heard, this resolution from 2002, it's preposterous that you think a City Council can create a resolution that overrides the very charter. If that is true, right, if that is very true, that we can recreate a resolution -- which I guess our predecessors did, they created a resolution that basically conflicts directly with the charter. So if that's the case, we may as well create a resolution now to do exactly what Councilman Douglas Lawson said.

So that resolution that was read by the attorney -- and I'm saying this respectfully because I don't think that we really noticed, but I just hate to get caught off guard with some surprising stuff. Because if that's true, then Councilman Lawson might as well put a resolution on the floor to override what's in the charter. We can't override the charter with a resolution. We can't override the charter with an ordinance.

So I yield back.

And I'm still going to support this item.

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But I'm just a little frustrated that every day you come in here somebody creates a rule. Just like the other time when I missed the Saturday parliamentary training, somebody presented a resolution that said that that supersedes what's already written in the charter.

We need to start and figure out what's going on.

And perhaps it's going to be my recommendation that this is beyond the attorney, beyond the manager, beyond the deputy city manager, beyond the assistant city manager, beyond the city clerk, that somebody from the outside comes in and really offers assistance.

It's a waste of time and it's embarrassing to get in here and when we don't even know the rules to the game.

So I yield back.

CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you.

Any other questions or comments?

Madam Clerk.

If you are in favor of overturning the Mayor's veto, please vote yes. If not, please vote no.

Madam Clerk.

THE CLERK: Councilperson Miller-Anderson.

COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: Yes.

23 THE CLERK: Councilperson Lanier.

24 COUNCILPERSON LANIER: Yes

THE CLERK: Councilperson McCoy.

This goes right

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1 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Yes. 2 THE CLERK: Pro-Tem Lawson. 3 COUNCILPERSON LAWSON: THE CLERK: Chair Botel. 4 5 CHAIR BOTEL: Yes. That motion passes four to one. 6 The Mayor's veto is 7 overturned. 8 Now I would like to discuss very briefly the meeting that we had set for tomorrow night. It strikes me that it may be the 9 case that we don't even need to have it. 10 11 Madam Clerk, could you please remind me, how did the vote 12 go on ordinances number 4156 and 4157 when they were read for 13 the second time? 14 4156 related to the ability for someone to file to run for 15 office, you know, by getting signatures, by doing petition. 16 4157 related to the city manager's ability to fire without just 17 cause. 18 THE CLERK: Madam Chair and Members of the Board, at the 19 December 2nd meeting when ordinance number 4156 and ordinance 20 4157 was presented to the Board for second and final reading, 21 the motion for both of those ordinances were approved with a three/two vote. 22 23 CHAIR BOTEL: Okav. Then I would like to withdraw my 24 request to have a meeting tomorrow night.

So here we go again.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY:

back to the litany of problems that we have because our charter doesn't speak to -- it only speaks to calling a meeting. But then, you know, I don't know how you cancel the meeting.

And it's nothing to you, Madam Chair. Just like every day

And it's nothing to you, Madam Chair. Just like every day we're getting met with something that's a new rule. And quite honestly, when you dive down to it, it just doesn't seem that it even makes sense. So I don't know who signed off on legal sufficiency but --

CHAIR BOTEL: So how do I do -- how do I have to go about canceling my request for a meeting? Do I have to just put it in writing to the Clerk? Does anybody know?

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Well, I can tell you what, I won't show up. How's that?

CHAIR BOTEL: There you are. That would be the solution.

CITY MANAGER EVANS: Madam Chair.

16 CHAIR BOTEL: Yes.

CITY MANAGER EVANS: If I may. In past experience, usually the way in which you call the meeting is the same way in which you would cancel the meeting. So you would just do the same action to reverse it.

CHAIR BOTEL: Okay. Thank you. I'll e-mail the Clerk with my desire to cancel the meeting for tomorrow night.

Do we have any comments by the City Manager?

COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: I have a question about -- oh, I'm sorry.

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1 CHAIR BOTEL: You're recognized, Commissioner 2 Miller-Anderson. 3 COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: So you want to cancel the 4 meeting because you feel we won't get a -- there won't be a 5 four/one? CHAIR BOTEL: Yeah. 6 7 COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: Or a five/oh? 8 CHAIR BOTEL: Yeah. 9 COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: Okay. 10 CHAIR BOTEL: I mean, it wouldn't -- it doesn't make any 11 sense. COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: Somebody could have had a 12 13 change of heart. But, okay. 14 COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Well, well, Madam Chair, I quess I'm 15 surprised, because when I look at this memo, at the background, 16 it says ordinance number 4155 was passed on first reading, three/two; and then on second reading, four/one. I don't recall 17 18 it that way. But it could have been. But maybe you can 19 convince somebody with, you know, your very convincing closing 20 statements or something. I don't know. But I won't be here for it. 21 22 CHAIR BOTEL: It's okay. Do we have any comments or 23 discussion by City Manager? CITY MANAGER EVANS: Yes, Madam Chair. Very briefly. 24

With respect to the conversation that we had yesterday with

the Town of Lake Park and then the continuation with respect to Marina Phase II, I've been able to obtain the solicitation that was put out by the Town of Lake Park, RFQ number 1052020. And the way in which they formulated the request for services, I believe that there is a way that we can piggyback, for lack of better terms, the existing agreement to effectively look at the financial capabilities of the firm that has submitted for Marina Phase II.

The request, statement of qualification, is for consulting services to engage a consultant experienced in public private P3 mixed use development; to advertise, prepare, develop, manage a P3 agreement with a developer for a marina related mixed use development located in the Town of Lake Park and Lake Park marina area.

So I believe, and based on staff's preliminary review -and it's a 267-page document that I'll be reading this
evening -- I think there's elements contained in this, based on
the RFQ, that we can look to possibly bring something for the
Board to consider in the next -- at your next meeting or at
least your first meeting in January.

- 23 CITY ATTORNEY WYNN: No, thank you.
- 24 | CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you.
- 25 Comments by the Mayor and City Council?

1 Starting with Commissioner Lanier. Any comments?

2 COUNCILPERSON LANIER: No, I have no comments at this time.

CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you.

Commissioner McCoy.

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: So, Madam Chair and Madam Attorney, this portion of the -- you know, of the chairperson making a motion or making a second, can we have that defined and clearly delineated?

And, you know, more importantly, you know, I had to go out of town unexpectedly so I couldn't participate in the parliamentary training. But, you know, I think parliamentary training is just probably the smallest of our problems. We seem to have some resolutions that seem to conflict or outright go against our very charter.

So I don't understand how that's possible, Ms. Wynn, that that resolution that you started off reading in 2002 can even be something that could be -- you know, I don't know. And we need some clarification. So can you point us in the right direction when it comes to that resolution and its effect on what's the plain language of the charter?

Furthermore, I did take a look at -- I haven't been through all of the parliamentary training from that Saturday, but much of what I've seen, we don't do in our meetings. And I haven't been through it all.

But I'm just a little frustrated that we get hit with new

rules every time we come in.

And even, as I had the private conversation with Ms. Wynn, she said about, you know, some of these things would have been discussed in your on boarding when we came on as council members.

You know, you can't really expect or want us to participate in meetings that are called at the last, 24 hours in advance, and much of this stuff that we're discussing, right, revolves around parliamentary training or rules of the city council, when we don't really know what the rules are.

I want to know if there is going to be a plan, Mr. Evans, to put all of those resolutions back online so I don't have to call in or particularly do a public records request and let one of my fellow council members know that I'm about to subpoena them, that the charter provides, you know. Or let one of my council members know that I'm going to bring forth a resolution to suspend them because they haven't showed up at the required number of city council meetings. So can we get that stuff placed online?

Because I do plan on invoking some of those privileges and rights that we have under the charter. And I just don't want it to be cut off by the manager sending what I believe is a strategy move by a member of this body to everybody and then let the cat out of the bag. Because I'm thinking about suspending Councilman Lawson for a few things.

CHAIR BOTEL: What was that? Was that a state --

COUNCILPERSON McCOY: I want the resolutions. I want to know, can we get this stuff back online, that should have been ADA compliant?

CHAIR BOTEL: City Manager, please.

CITY MANAGER EVANS: Madam Chair, if I may.

I know the City Clerk's office is scanning those items and making them ADA compliant. And we'll make sure that the corresponding resolutions are placed on the website in a prominent place for folks to be able to see those.

CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you.

Any comments or -- Mr. Lawson.

COUNCILPERSON LAWSON: Thank you, Madam Chair.

I just want to make a comment that the ordinance that we passed tonight -- I want our residents to understand that I'm very supportive of no taxation or additional taxation from this ordinance. What I wanted to see is I wanted to see a process put in place. I wanted to see that our staff was able to advertise and market this ordinance to our residents.

And it's very discouraging to get feedback from the community, that allegedly came from this dais and this staff, that I'm supportive of an additional tax.

It's difficult to continue to serve on this dais and be a support when your best interest is just trying to fight for the best interest of the community. Because I just want to see this

passed.

I would like for us to continue to work together, and whoever is giving false information, and whatever residents is watching and not watching the full meetings and getting full insight and just taking the feel of the perception of one person's opinion, please participate residents, please continue to watch these meetings, please continue to see what's actually going on and continue to follow the work that we're doing.

Because as a city, we're trying to move forward.

But I want my residents to understand that I'm going to continue to fight for what they believe in and what the needs are of all our residents, not just a select few.

So I want to wish everyone a happy holiday. And thank you.

CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you.

Commissioner Miller-Anderson.

COUNCILPERSON MILLER-ANDERSON: I don't have any at this time. Everyone have a great weekend.

CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you.

Mr. City Manager, could we ask for a workshop to go over those rules and procedures, and also the way we conduct our meetings. I know that we had the parliamentary procedure but I think it would be a good idea, as Mr. McCoy suggested, we have a workshop on the rules and procedures. I just -- will you take care of that?

CITY MANAGER EVANS: Yes, Madam Chair.

And I don't know if you recall, but I did write a memorandum probably six months ago with respect to the agenda and the process and all that. And so we can have a comprehensive discussion as it relates to rules of decorum and the agenda process, and the like, so we can be able to iron out any kinks so there's a clear understanding and expectation with regards to moving things forward.

CHAIR BOTEL: Thank you.

I just had a couple announcements that I wanted to reiterate, that I made last night as well. We're planning a community meeting next week. My legislative aide is working to select a date on which Chief Osgood and the City Manager are available to meet at the Ambassador's Center to discuss the police presence on the island.

We will have an upcoming agenda item relating to a moratorium on floating structures, to give us time to formulate a plan to react to an ordinance that's coming from the county in the very near future.

And the All Things Marine Webinar that we did was very successful; but I think people might have either missed it or saw it and yet still have questions. And particularly I mean those people who live in the Sugar Sands area and those other areas that are facing the lagoon.

So we'll be doing a special meeting; again, at the

Ambassador Center, so people can be there socially distanced but

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38 1 be there and present; that we will televise; to discuss the 2 managed mooring fields, because there are so many questions. 3 Any other comments or concerns? COUNCILPERSON McCOY: Yes. 4 5 CHAIR BOTEL: You're recognized. COUNCILPERSON McCOY: I only want the rules. I didn't want 6 another meeting. We have to have a meeting for a meeting in a 7 8 workshop? Just give me the rules to the game. You know, you 9 send it to me by e-mail, I read it at some point. You guys show up for the meeting. I'll watch like Commissioner Lanier is 10 11 doing. 12 CHAIR BOTEL: All right.
