I also wanted to add for under disclosures that although we ask the Council for disclosures, asking the presenters, the entities, the developers for disclosures as if they have.., have had any conversations with us. I wanna have it to be a two way street. And that will be something that will be coming back at our next meeting. I want to make sure that these disclosures are recognized on both sides of the aisle.

## Councilperson McCoy: Thank you, Madam Chair.

So, when we first started in '19, I specifically asked Legal what exactly was the nature of disclosures. And I think we have become accustomed to saying who we met with. But statutorily, disclosures are meant for disclosures of conflicts, not disclosures of who you spoke to. So there's no legal requirement that we put it on the record, or even gesture, or even [stammer] any of that.

And, I stay away from doing disclosures because, quite frequently, a individual from the public, who doesn't understand that you have to meet with developers and those that present. It also sometimes could give the perception of something that may not even be there. So I, of course I talk to people all the time. In fact, I did talk to Sun'.., Sunstar, but there was never anything that was legally required for me to disclose. I don't have a conflict, I don't do business with them.

So, you know, quite frankly, even when I serve over on the Board with the School District of Palm Beach County, the same thing exists. Unless you have a voting conflict, that's the only time you have disclose. So.., and I think it's a little, you know, if that's what the Board wants to do, but I, you know, I kinda wanna stay away from that. Because it gives the impression...

- **Chairperson Lanier:** And I.., and that is the reason why I brought it up at this meeting because we are going to work with Legal to have some language to explain what
- 152 disclosures mean.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Right. But unless it's required, then I don't know that
- 154 you...

- according to our Charter, to explain what disclosures means. We're not going to go out
- willy nilly, we're going to make sure that whatever we are going to talk about in regards
- to disclosures, is something that's part of our Charter.

363	Councilperson Botel: I move that we approve Ordinance No. 4166.
364	Councilperson McCoy: Second.

- 365 Chairperson Lanier: Thank you. Mr. Evans.
- 366 City Manager Evans: Madam Chair and Members of the Board, I'm asking for
- 367 Development Services Director, Mr. Clarence Sirmons, to make this presentation.
- 368 Development Services Director Sirmons: Good evening, Madam Chair. I beg
- your pardon.
- 370 **Chairperson Lanier:** Good evening, sir.
- 371 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Members of the Council, Mr. Manager
- and Madam Attorney.
- I am before you today to present the presentation for a project for Florida Sunstar Logistics. This Item before you today is the voting for the proposed Land Development Code text amendment for this project. But, as it is associated with a Site Plan application, I will go over both Items with your today, but the Item for a vote today is only the text amendment. If it is approved to have the second hearing for the Ordinance, the Site Plan will be on the Agenda for a vote as well.
- 379 And this is not the correct PowerPoint.
- 380 Councilperson McCoy: So... Madam Chair?
- 381 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Alright. There we are.
- 382 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. I'll wait.
- 383 **Chairperson Lanier:** There it was.
- 384 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** There it was.
- 385 **Chairperson Lanier:** [Chuckle]. Go ahead, ask your question, Mr. McCoy. While
- they get their technical things together.

- Councilperson McCoy: Thank you. Mr. Sirmons, I'm looking at the Ordinance and thank you for having the new text that's being proposed underlined, which clearly delineates what's being proposed.
- 390 But...
- 391 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** My pleasure.
- Councilperson McCoy: If this is only specific to that location, I'm.., I guess, I'm trying to understand, like, you know, thirty years from now, how would someone be able to tell by looking at the Code, when the only descriptive features in this Ordinance just says, 'As that area bordered by West Port Road and Broadway, Avenue E and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Boulevard.: 150 feet'?
- So, like, I know when we did the Land Development Regulation for the CRA, we actually had graphics that we actually adopted and got incorporated into the Code, but I'm just curious, how is Boards and Councils and Development Services Department in twenty years, gonna know that this is the only location? Without it being in the actual Code?
- Development Services Director Sirmons: So, there are, especially, as you mentioned, in the downtown Codes, visual depictions of things being described in the text that is not the norm for the rest of the body of our Ordinance, but it is not an issue to insert a picture in there. I, I would have to do research on how that would reflect on websites, such as Municode, which is heavily relied on for our Ordinances. And if we can insert a picture in there without any issue., but generally we use the text descriptive.
- can already see that, in the future, somebody's gonna try to suggest that this applies to the entire [inaudible]. And without a descriptive, almost like a survey or specific boundary, then, you know.., you know, I, I think you have a, a very long future, but in forty years, I don't know that you'll be here to remember...

Okay. 'Cause.., and, and let me just ask.., because, I

- Councilperson McCoy: ...that this was only specific to that one location. And, my only concern with this Item was that I just didn't want it to be abutting some of the
- places in the Port that serves right next to, or adjacent to, residential homes.
- 417 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** So, in the review of an application for
- anything submitted in this area, Staff reviews all of those items and we look.., we look
- closely into the text to make sure that what's proposed is allowed in that zone. So, we
- would research the area and look at the text and ensure that if it's proposed over fifty feet,
- 421 that it does fall within the boundary of this [stammer] the location described in this
- 422 Ordinance.
- 423 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.

Councilperson McCoy:

**Chairperson Lanier:** Alright. Very good. Do you wanna go ahead with your 425 presentation?

## **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Yes, ma'am.

Alright. For this one. Again, there are two applications involved in this proposed development here. The Zoning text amendment, Application ZA21-01 and SP2101, which is the Site Plan application. Only ZA21-01 is on the docket for a vote today. However, in order for Council to make an informed decision, we will discuss their Site Plan as well today.

We have been working with this applicant for close to a year, when they first came in our doors proposing this development, and we believe that the product being presented before you today is the result of [stammer] much diligence on the behalf of Staff to ensure that both parties have been.., the interest of both parties are served by the proposed development here.

The loc'.., location of the proposed text amendment is outlined by the hashed area on the image before you. It extends to the top boundary between Avenue E and the lower boundary of Martin Luther King, Jr., Boulevard. The area circumscribed in red shows the site boundaries for this proposed Site Plan for this development.

The application for approval to increase the maximum building height from fifty feet to a hundred and fifty feet on approximately 17.75 acres of land at the Port, in the center of the IG Zoning District. This request comes from a desire to facilitate and expand the opportunities for future growth and economic development of the Port of Palm Beach, and allow for the construction of a hundred and fifty foot high material storage structure by Florida Sunstar Logistics.

Other existing structures at the Port of similar or greater height include the FPL stacks, the Cemex silos across from Broadway from this site, and some of the light poles on the property also exceed fifty feet and come in close to a hundred and ten feet. The increased height area is only a portion of the overall IG Zoning District of the Port property.

The application for the Site Plan contains a proposal to develop 12,271 square foot, a hundred and fifty tall cement material storage dome; a one story, 2,080 square foot office building; a 2,568 square foot mechanical equipment building; and then, associated parking and mechanical equipment on a 3.9 acre portion of the 17.75 acre property.

Additional information about the proposed use of this applicant. The material storage dome is to store dry materials used to create concrete. The materials in concrete would include stone, sand, and cement. The tank cannot be used to store liquids. This is not a Bedish plant. And the closest resident in Riviera Beach is 1,400 feet away. Again, this is the boundaries of the proposed Site Plan for this project.

And here is a image of the proposed Site Plan for the project. The dome structure is shown by the circle here, and the auxiliary buildings by the rectangles here. Along here, is the overpass or bridge. Under the bridge is the parking area proposed to serve

this site. The dome is proposed to be decorated with a mural and the words, 'Riviera Beach,' will be along the top edge of the tank twice, so as to be visible to motorists traveling either way over the bridge. Two design options are provided for the City Cou'.., City Council's consideration. And the City Council should identify the preferred one to the applicant.

This is the first rendering option of the dome. It would be illuminated at nighttime, per the picture to the right here, with Riviera Beach shown on both sides of it. The next rendering is for Option 2. Again, the initial conversation with this applicant involved a, a generic, all white dome structure.

And the image before you, again, is the result of Staff deliberations and us pushing to see if we can get something more aesthetically pleasing through this gateway into our City. And the second rendering has more colors, it's higher..., the mural is higher on the dome and it has different aquatic [stammer] creatures at the bottom. Excuse me.

This is an elevation of what the site would look like after development. You can see the height of the proposed structure. The dome is now hidden behind the signage at the top, and this is the elevated overpass next to it at scale.

So, the proposed site Plan Resolution for this project includes our standard recommendations from the Development Services Department, but there are also several additional recommendations that are a result of the conversations between Staff and the applicant. The first are our typical conditions. Construction must be com'.., initiated within eighteen months of the effective date of the Resolution or it will be considered null and void. Two, City Council authorizes Staff to approve future amendments to the Stie Plan administratively, so long as the Site Plan does not deviate greater than five percent from the originally approved Site Plan. Three, the development must receive final Certificate of Occupancy from the City for all buildings and units within five years of the [stammer] approval of the adopting Resolution or it will be considered null and void.

All future advertising must state that the development is located in the City of Riviera Beach in accordance with Code Section 31-554. Five, once approved, this Resolution shall supersede any previous Site Plan approvals for this property. Six, the concurrently proposed Ordinance No. 4166, associated with this text amendment, Application, ZA21-01, shall be approved and adopted prior to the approval of the Site Plan. Again, these are conditions for the Site Plan Resolution.

Seven, the applicant shall provide a check payable to the City of Riviera Beach for not less than \$45,285.15 for landscape improvements in the City prior to the issuance of a building permit. This a result of the Port property being not appropriate for the type of landscaping that the City requires for development projects. So, in lieu of them planting it within this industrial area, they will provide the City the funds for the required landscaping for the project so that the City can install the landscaping at a more appropriate location.

Eight, the applicant shall consider partnering with the City, as possible, to identify opportunities to provide outreach and support to local residents, including but not limited

to, programs such as the Youth Empowerment Program, the Reentry Center, or the establishment of a charitable foundation. This condition is a result of the applicant's offer to, to partner with the community for development and the improvement of the quality of life of cit'.., citizens here. They have similar initiatives in other communities in which they work, so we added this condition to reflect that and future discussion will result in potential partnerships and contributions to these organizations.

Ten, the applicant shall actively advertise employment opportunities for temporary and permanent positions within the City of Riviera Beach, including participation at community job fairs or hosting specialized improvement events. The developer shall provide a report to the Development Services Department at six months post Certificate of Occupancy, documenting the outreach efforts to acquire local employees, the number of employees hired, the number of local businesses contracted with subject to employment and privacy laws, and the percentage of construction costs expended with local vendors.

- 519 Councilperson Botel: Madam Chair?
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- **Councilperson Botel:** If I might, just quickly before you finish that.., before you move
- on. Could you just, very briefly, tell the watching viewers here about how many jobs this
- 523 will create?

- **Development Services Director Sirmons:** So, the applicant, who is here and
- 525 prepared to present, can be more specific, but they anticipate a hundred plus jobs for
- construction, and a hundred plus jobs for operations. The majority of those jobs co'...
- 527 connected to operations would be in logistics and, and trucks, and transportation.
- **Councilperson Botel:** Thank you.
- **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Mhmm.

Ten, Florida Sunstar Logistics shall participate in efforts to enhance and beautify the bridge and southern gateway to the City by working with the City and other partners to provide a conceptual design for the beautification of the gateway and bridge to the City of Riviera Beach. Florida Sunstar Logistics shall deliver the conceptual bridge and gateway beautification design to the City prior to the issuance of a building permit. This condition is related to our comments related to this portion of the City being a primary gateway. If you're heading north on Broadway and you go over this bridge, it is one of the main entry points of the City, and we want to ensure, as much as possible that the experience of visitors coming to our City is a good one.

So, with this dome going there with.., serving as a sort of beacon, as persons enter Riviera Beach with that signage and the mural on it, we wanna make sure the bridge itself is a, a.., up to our standards in what it could be. So, what they have committed to doing is to create a design potential plan for what this bridge could look like. And so, imaging a, a bridge that has [inaudible] such as the Blue Heron Bridge, or others in the area for

544	the flyover bridge, for the Port to, again, improve the entry experience for entering into
545	Riviera Beach from the south.

And eleven, the final design of the mural on the dome structure shall be to the satisfaction of the City Council and installed prior to the issuance of the Certificate of Occupancy. The applicant shall provide an alternate rendering for consideration by City Council. And that was at the recommendation of the Planning & Zoning Board, after hearing this project.

So, Staff recommends approval of the amendment to the Code of Ordinance, for Application ZA21-01, to increase the maximum building height from fifty to a hundred and fifty feet on approximately 17.75 acres of land at the, the Port, in the center of the IG Zoning District. The area is subject to the increased height identified as 'That area bordered by West Port Road and Broadway, Avenue E and Dr. Martin Luther King Boulevard.

And that concludes the Staff presentation. Again, the applicant is present and prepared to present as well.

- **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you for that presentation.
- Are there any questions from the Board?

- 561 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair?
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, sir.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you.
- Mr. Sirmons, let me get back up to the condition of the \$45,285. I've never seen that we've ever asked any applicant or any developer to provide the City any money. Are you familiar with how that came about?
- **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Yes. Because of the...
- **Councilperson McCoy:** No, no. I know why, but...
- **Development Services Director Sirmons:** I'm sorry.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** I, I know what it's for, but why are we asking someone
- to give us \$45,000 in lieu of any kinda landscaping that would've been able to provide?
- **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Because the landscaping would not
- be... it would not serve its purpose in the location of the site. And so, it would serve the
- 574 community better if the landscaping is in'.., it is installed at another location in the City.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** And at whose recommendation from the City was that?
- **Development Services Director Sirmons:** This was a result of deliberations
- 577 between City Staff and the applicant.

- Councilperson McCoy: I'm trying to find the origin of the thought to ask them to pay that? Would it have been you? Would it have been the Manager? Who exactly,
- from the City, proposed that?

- Development Services Director Sirmons: I believe the applicant sated that when reviewing the landscaping requirements of the City, that it was impractical that any significant landscaping installed in this area would survive, because it's an industrial property. And furthermore, it would not be visible to the community, and not serve the, the overall purposes of the landscaping Code.
  - So, because of the applicant bringing that forth to question and, and, and they offered would it be possible for them to make a, a contribution in lieu of? This number, is the result of a landscaping review of the property. They used our landscaping Coe and they did the calculations of how many shrubs, how many trees per linear foot of property boundary to calculate what the cost for the installation would be. And they used that cost for the landscaping requirements to create this figure of the \$45,000.
  - **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. The, the reason I'm asking is because we had several projects and developments come through to the Port. We've had several developments and projects come through to other industrial areas and we've never asked anyone to give us a contribution, basically a donation.
  - And I, I guess I wanna correct you because it's not a donation in lieu of because there's no requirement. If there's not any landscape that they can actually put in a, in an industrial area, specifically at the Port, I don't understand how we can now proffer that.
  - But if we do, right? And that's where we are now, and I didn't see it until this just came up, who makes this decision on where the money goes? Because, you know, if we're gonna sit here and, in my opinion, it seems like shakedown money, if we're gonna sit here and a tell a developer something we've never done before, that because you don't have landscaping, just write us a check for \$45,000 and we'll figure out where else in the City we're gonna do it.
  - And I'm, I'm only concerned because we have no program in place, we've not even had a policy or even a previous example of this happening. That is not to be decided today but the Site Plan is contingent on something we've never even built out a program for.
  - So, I wanna figure out how we get to the end without first going to..., you know, we get to 'z' without first starting at 'a' and 'b', and I've never seen this happen before. And I'm really curious. I mean, you know, I don't necessarily agree with the idea, but, you know, clearly there should've been, you know, a program. I know when Risk Management came in and we decided that Waste Management had the ability to levy fees, we decided to set..., set aside that money when they had charged commercial customers for overfilling containers, that money was set aside in a fund that was specifically to..., went towards neighborhood community revitalization.
  - So, I'm just curious how, how we get to the end before we get to 'a' and 'b'? And certainly, if this is approved, which I don't necessarily like to make it a condition because

then that becomes the condition today, and that becomes the standard going forward.

But if a person just wants to open up a business, or open up a development in an industrial

area, they have to now subject themselves to paying a certain amount of dollars.

And there's no.., there's no precedent for it, there's no Ordinance, there's no previous Resolutions that require it. It just seems like, you know, we wanna welcome businesses. They offered to put the mural on the tank. So I'm sure that there's a cost associated with that. And I think that was in the spirit of reasoning and going back and forth with...

- 627 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, Mr. McCoy.
- 628 **Councilperson McCoy:** Am, am I gonna be able to finish?
- 629 **Chairperson Lanier:** No. Not right now. I want some other Members who are...
- 630 Councilperson McCoy: But I still...
- 631 Chairperson Lanier: ...waiting...
- 632 Councilperson McCoy: ...have my...
- 633 **Chairperson Lanier:** I understand that. You have a certain amount of time. I think
- 634 it's ten minutes to be able to have a conversation or discussion about an Item. We have
- four other Members here that might want to ask questions...
- 636 Councilperson McCoy: Can I [inaudible]...
- 637 **Chairperson Lanier:** ...as well. And we will come back to you, sir.

Are there any other Members on this dais that would like to have a question for either the presenters or for the Staff who has presented this Item? [Pause]. With that being said, I want to...

- 641 Councilperson Botel: Madam, Madam Chair?
- 642 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 643 **Councilperson Botel:** Just a quick point of information for the developers. I want
- them to be aware that we have a Palm Beach State College course in logistics and
- transportation right now, with about twenty students enrolled. They'll be graduating at the
- end of the summer and they're all gonna have a college credit cer'.., fifteen credit, college
- credit certificate in logistics and transportation. So, if you need workers, you know where
- 648 to find them.
- That's all. Thanks.
- 650 Chair Pro Tem Miller Anderson: Madam Chair?
- 651 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.

- 652 Chair Pro Tem Miller Anderson: I did wanna hear from the developers. The
- 653 Sunstar.
- 654 **Chairperson Lanier:** Alright. Very good. Would the representative from Sunstar
- of please come up for any answers that you may provide.
- 656 Mr. J. Shir: Good evening, Mayor and Council Members. Jeremy Shir from Becker &
- Poliakoff, representing Florida Sunstar. We have a brief presentation, although Director
- 658 Sirmons did a great job. He may have stolen some of our thunder, but if you have a few
- minutes, I'd like to, to run through it.
- 660 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yeah. Sure.
- 661 **Mr. J. Shir:** Great. Excellent. Thank you so much.
- So... Florida Sunstar Logistics. And, you can go on to the next page.
- 663 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** He has the clicker.
- 664 **Mr. J. Shir:** Oh, do I need a clicker?
- 665 [Chuckles]

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- 666 Mr. J. Shir: Thanks. Excellent.
- So, as Director Sirmons mentioned, this would raise the maximum height in the central IG District to a hundred and fifty feet. The purpose would be to allow for a, a dome that would contain up to fifty thousand tons of cement. And yes, this is a real word, cementitious material.
- 671 Councilperson Botel: [Chuckles]
- Mr. J. Shir: That is actually a real word. Yes. [Chuckle]. And the amount of storage is necessary to accommodate a thirty thousand ton vessel, with a buffer of material until reloading can take place. So very important, there's gonna be a lot of turnover. They anticipate that this is gonna meet, you know, South Florida's construction industry anticipated growth. The facility will be state of the art and meet EPA regulations, with any dust or debris. And that's, I believe, 99.9 percent will be captured within the plant and onsite pipes.
  - Here you can see the aerial, as well as.., the depiction as well, which Director Sirmons already ran through. See here. And, as was previously mentioned, there are other structures that are a hundred and fifty feet, or close to it. There's FP&L stacks to the southeast of the site that are a hundred and fifty-four feet. And then there are existing silos directly to the east of the site, east of Broadway, that are at a hundred and fifty feet.
- So this is the first rendering. As you can see here, there's dolphins swimming.
  There's the day and night view. We are taking requests if anybody wants to become the face of the City, please just let us know. And, so yes, this is the, the first one.

- And here is the alternative with various other marine life. I believe there's still a dolphin, perhaps a shark and looks like an octopus at the bottom.
- And... Alright. So talking about traffic, we are well, well below the minimum of five hundred trips to do, you know, a full traffic report. We're at a hundred and seventy trips a day. So not even close to that.
  - And, let's see here. There was a question earlier about how many jobs would be created. So, we are anticipating over one hundred temporary construction jobs, as well as a hundred and ten full time direct and indirect jobs. And that really runs the, the strata. It's gonna management, operations, mechanics, [inaudible], truck drivers. So, you know, it college graduates, could be, you know, high school graduates. Really.., it really runs the gamut. It's gonna be a great job creator for the community.
  - And Florida Sunstar is really, really excited to partner with Riviera Beach. And, hopefully, make a positive impact on the community.
- Thank you very much.

- **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, sir.
- Are there any questions for this gentleman for his presentation?
- **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair?
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, sir.
- **City Manager Evans:** If I may? To Councilperson McCoy's comments...
- 706 Councilperson McCoy: Well, Mr. Evans, you haven't even heard my comments so I
- 707 would like to finish...
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Sir. Let the City Manager speak, please.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Yeah. Ms.., Ms.., no.
- 710 Chairperson Lanier: Sir.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Point of order because...
- **Chairperson Lanier:** No. There is point of order.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** ...[inaudible]...
- **Chairperson Lanier:** I am the...
- **Councilperson McCoy:** ...the rules here.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** ... Chair here, and I asked...
- **Councilperson McCoy:** And the Resolution calls...

- 718 **Chairperson Lanier:** I asked the Ch'.., City Manager...
- 719 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair?
- 720 Chairperson Lanier: ...to speak.
- 721 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. Well...
- 722 **Chairperson Lanier:** And that is what is going to happen, sir.
- 723 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, are we following the Robert's Rules...
- 724 **Chairperson Lanier:** We are following...
- 725 Councilperson McCoy: ...[inaudible]?
- 726 **Chairperson Lanier:** We are following Robert's Rules of Order. I called on the
- 727 Chair... I, I called on the City Manager to speak. Thank you. Go ahead, sir.
- 728 **City Manager Evans:** Madam, Madam Chair, we have also, in previous actions as it
- relates to a site plan, we have gotten cash contributions. Most recently with the UPS Site
- 730 Plan that came before the Board. \$35,000, I believe, or \$40,000 was set aside for
- infrastructure improvements in the community.
- Also, it is very common in many municipalities that there is contributions in lieu of landscape improvements in industrial parks to help facilitate community beautification.
- 1734 It's also monies that have been aside for public art projects.
- As it relates to the monies, the monies would be set aside and, as part of your budget appropriation process, that's when the Board would allocate where the funds
- budget appropriation process, that's when the Board would allocate where the funds would be utilized. So, if there is any project or initiative that Staff thinks would be within
- that particular impacted area, that would come back before you all for consideration.
- So, those monies would not go into operating or anything like that. It would be
- something that the Board would have some conversations with Staff prior to moving
- 741 forward.
- 742 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, sir.
- Are there any other presentations from you guys? From Mr. Sirmons? From...
- Anything else you wanted to add? Thank you so much.
- Any other questions from the Board in regards to this Item?
- 746 **Councilperson Lawson:** Madam Chair?
- 747 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, sir.
- 748 **Councilperson Lawson:** Thank you, Madam Chair.
- Mr. Sirmons, I just wanted to publicly thank you for the work that you did on this..,
- bringing this to the Council. I got nothing but rave revenues from the organization in

regards to getting this done over this year of discussion. And, working with them, hand in hand with the concerns of the dais, with the concerns of the community in regards to the job creation, in regards to the beautification of the tank. So, thank you for your efforts in this.

When I had the meetings with the organization with Florida Sunstar, they said they were very pleased with the service that they received in regards to the consistency, the customer service and the dialogue. So, thank you very much for that.

Mr. Evans, the \$45,000 that's being allocated, I would love for that, and colleagues, for us to initiate moving forward with our Arts in Public Places program. This is a prime example of one of the programs that we can create to beautify and create sustainability in our area with arts, with the culture, with training, with education. And this would be a great tool for the program to instill that money, that capital, into that program.

The businesses that are coming into the City have no problem donating and contributing to different programs in our community because they're gonna be utilizing the resources in our community, utilizing our land, our beachfront, our Port front, our railroad areas. So, I wouldn't consider it a shakedown, as my colleague stated, more of a contribution to the community that they're actually investing into.

And also with the jobs, I wanted to thank you very much for these jobs. I do have a question though. The starting salary for these positions, what are some of the salaries for these hundred and plus positions that are gonna be created for the residents here in the community?

- 772 **Mr. J. Shir:** I believe \$15.00 an hour, would be the starting. So that would be the floor.
- 773 **Councilperson Lawson:** Okay. So the floor would be a living wage salary at fifteen.
- Even though the cost of living is going up, even though the salaries are raising across the
- country, \$15.00 is gonna be your floor for the positions, going up to what?
- 776 **Mr. J. Shir:** Right. So that would be floor. But as I mentioned earlier, you know,
- 777 Florida Sunstar is very eager to work with the community and, and grow, hopefully. You
- know, have, you know, lifelong careers where, you know, people can grow within the organization.
- In, in addition to that, there are, you know, higher strata jobs that od require, you know, more of an education where they would start at a higher salary. But yeah, that's the absolute floor.
- Councilperson Lawson: Okay. And then how do we.., how do guarantee or ensure that these jobs are going to our local residents here in the community?
- 785 **Mr. J. Shir:** Right. Well, so there is a condition of approval that we're gonna report back to, to Riviera Beach within six months. I believe we're gonna host a job fair and,
- you know, we're gonna make our best efforts as well to hire qualified contractors.
- 788 Councilperson Lawson: Right.

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- **Mr. J. Shir:** So, we're really gonna make as much of an effort as possible to ensure that we hire from within the community.
- Councilperson Lawson: And I appreciate that. The report back is gonna be sufficient for us to get a report, but also, to execute and to bring those job opportunities to the City. 'Cause just to report that we tired or made an attempt is not really sufficient for what we're looking for. It's more of setting up those programs and opportunities for the residents, actually training.

In one of the conversations, I made a recommendation that we partner with the school, Palm Beach State College, and the provost to provide these jobs, the training and the education necessary to hire these hundred plus jobs.

- So, if we can provide that training while we're going through the construction period, that would be perfect to prepare those residents and really give them the opportunity to actually be gainfully employed. I just...
- **Mr. J. Shir:** Yeah. That's a great idea.
- **Councilperson Lawson:** As a, as recommendation for us to move forward with it prior to construction, or during the process.

And also, Mr. Evans, that was part of the discussion. If we can allow for the discussion to be given to Procurement, to our Development Services, with a list of opportunities with the contacts with the provost in Palm Beach State College. And also, making sure and guaranteeing that these jobs are actually brought to the City. 'Cause follow ups are good, but at the same time, actually executing and getting it done is what we wanna see.

So, I think it's a win win for the City and, and especially with Dr. Botel's logistics graduates that will be able to put their training to work. So, hopefully, you'll be able to bring on quite a few of them, that have graduated through that program as well.

So, thank you all so much. And I'm glad you all were able to get it done.

- 876 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we do not have public
- comment cards on this Item. The acceptance of public comment cards on this Item is
- 878 now closed.
- 879 **Councilperson Botel:** I move that we approve Ordinance No. 4163.
- 880 Councilperson Lawson: Second.
- 881 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Mr. Evans.
- 882 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair and Members of the Board, if I can have
- Director of Development Services, Mr. Clarence Sirmons, make this presentation.
- 884 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Thank you, Mr. Manager.
- Madam Chair and Members of the Council, this is the first of three Ordinances that
- 886 was discussed last Council meeting related to our Clean and Lien initiative. There are
- three Ordinances that will give the City additional tools to address portions of the City that

need to be cleaned up and, and enhancements of the, the appearances of them and a reduction of their drain on City resources.

The particular Ordinance before you, the first of them is the Property Maintenance Code. This is a Code that is not new to the City but it is something that we have not had in several years. 2004 is the last time we have a record of the City having an active Property Maintenance Code.

What this Ordinance will do is reinstate that Code. We have drafted this Item based on the International Property Maintenance Code. Our Building Official modeled this, this Ordinance after it, and it would be adopted as a standalone document via this Ordinance. It will create a tool that would be utilized on two sides. One for property owners in the City. This standalone document would be something that could be provided to them and made available to them so they can understand clearly what the minimum standards for property maintenance are in the City of Riviera Beach.

This could be especially useful as it comes to landlords, or owners of rental properties to make sure they understand what the minimum standards are for their tenant property. And secondary, for our Code Compliance Staff. Currently, the, the Code Compliance Staff goes to a home and it is ill maintained on the exterior, often the Code Compliance Staff has to refer to the nuisance section of the Code saying that this property is in violation of the Nuisance Code and you're being cited as in violation of it.

However, this Property Maintenance Code would enumerate the different portions of a property and what the minimum standards are for it. So, in that instance, the Code Officer would say, 'You are in violation of Section 1.23 of the Property Maintenance Code which states that the exterior of your property walls should be well maintained. They should not be.., have.., they should not have chipped paint, discoloration, cracks in them and things like that, that contribute to an appearance of blight.'

So, with them being able to cite that specific section of the Code, it strengthens our Code Compliance cases that are presented to the magistrate. It allows less ability for property owners or, or rental property owners, to, to argue the City statutes, because it would be enumerated in this Code. So, the, the use of it as a manual to property owners, it would go a long way. But also, it goes a long way in our Code Compliance process. So, that is the purpose of this Code.

And, Staff recommends that City Council approve them.

**Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, sir.

Are there any questions from the Board regarding this Item?

**Councilperson McCoy:** Madam Chair?

**Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, sir.

- 924 **Councilperson McCoy:** So Mr. Sirmons, this section in, in the Property Maintenance
- Code that speaks of fees that they would, I guess, be set by Resolution, is that something
- 926 that we should expect to revisit?
- 927 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** It would be referring to the already set
- 928 fees for violations in Code Compliance. Is that the section you're referring to? [Pause].
- 929 This...
- 930 Councilperson McCoy: So...
- 931 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** ...par'...
- 932 Councilperson McCoy: So...
- 933 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Sorry.
- 934 **Councilperson McCoy:** So this, this is what I kind of feel like this is incomplete. That
- 935 section said the fees for activities and services performed by the Department in carrying
- out its responsibility under this Code shall be as indicated in the City Code or by City
- 937 Resolution.
- 938 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Yes. It's referring to Code Compliance
- 939 fees that already exist in the Resolution in any situations where applications for permits
- 940 related to the Building Code, those are already established in, in City Code and
- 941 Resolutions.
- 942 **Councilperson McCoy**: So where are there those fees gonna be posted? Because
- olearly, right now, nobody from the public can go onto our City's website and find out any
- 944 fees, other than the Business Tax Receipt fees. So, any Development Services fees,
- aside from that, I mean, it's whatever Staff gives you.
- 946 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** The fees are established by
- 947 Resolution, in most cases for City fees. And that is referring to existing fees that, that
- 948 already exist. But, if there's an issue with the availability of that information on the
- website, I'll certainly revisit to make sure it's posted.
- 950 **Councilperson McCoy:** No. It needs to be. Because there's no need to have a
- 951 Property Maintenance Code that's gonna be readily available that references that you
- could face a fee to do any kind of improvements, but then you gotta still ultimately contact
- 953 Staff to go back and get the Schedule of Fees? Yeah. I would hope that is.
- 954 **Chairperson Lanier:** Alright. Very good.
- Are there any other questions from the Board?
- 956 **Councilperson McCoy:** Madam Chair? Can you clarify? How much time do I have
- 957 because it seems like every pause, I get you to stop me.

- 1034 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Mr. Evans.
- 1035 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair and Members of the Board, if I can have
- 1036 Assistant City Manager, Ms. Deirdre Jacobs make this presentation
- 1037 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.
- 1038 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Thank you, Mr. Evans. Good evening,
- 1039 Madam Chair, other Members of the Board, Mr. Evans and Mrs. Wynn, in respective
- places. For the record, my name is Deirdre Jacobs, and I'm the Assistant City Manager,
- here with the City of Riviera Beach.

1042 This particular Ordinance is on second reading and it deals with the , the adoption 1043 of a Cross-Connection Control Program. The program is generally set up so that we can 1044 have parameters in place, and regulations that deal with the, the contam'..., or, the 1045 systems in place so that we, we can have activities that Staff can conduct, that will prevent 1046 the con'..., contamination of water to our potable water supply system. Things like 1047 [stammer] backflow devices and other measures, are being put in place. As, as far as 1048 Staff being instructed and trained with regards to being able to install and repair such 1049 devices, there is a program that is in place now but it does not comply with the regulations, 1050 as far as the state statutes require us to. It was done back in, I believe, 2014, where the 1051 state actually established a new system that was put into place. So, even though we are a bit behind, we do believe that these particular parameters and systems that have been 1052 1053 set up over the last couple of months will help us to get to where we need to get in terms

of preventing.., preventing or assisting with the prevention of the contamination of our, our water supply system.

If there are any questions, I can answer them, that the Board may have. As well as, we work with a consultant from Holtz Engineering that is here this evening to assist with answering specific questions that the Board may have.

- 1059 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you for your presentation, Ms. Jacobs.
- 1060 Are there any questions from the Board in regards to this Item?
- 1061 Councilperson McCoy: Yes, Madam Chair.
- 1062 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Go ahead, sir.
- 1063 **Councilperson McCoy:** Ms. Jacobs, I'm still looking for the manual. And, I would think that this not ripe for the Council if you're telling us we're gonna adopt the Ordinance that constitutes the manual, when we don't even have the manual in the backup.
- And, again, the draft that I've seen, Ms. Jacobs, of that Cross-Connection Control manual... And by the way, Madam Chair, I am running my clock, so just in case, you know, you got your accelerated...
- 1069 **Chairperson Lanier:** I'm glad you reminded me.
- 1070 **Councilperson McCoy:** I'm already running mine, so.., and it's of my time.
- So, Ms. Jacobs, how do you propose that this is gonna come forth because the Ordinance establishes a manual. And the draft manual establishes fees. So, we can't authorize an Ordinance without knowing exactly what that manual looks like, or what those fees look like.
- 1075 Certainly, if that is adopted, what is the process in order to have that manual 1076 amended?
- 1077 And I yield back. And turn off the timer, Madam Chair.
- 1078 Assistant City Manager Jacobs: Well...
- 1079 **Chairperson Lanier:** Go ahead.
- 1080 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Thank you, Thank you, Madam Chair. So, Mr.

- the Chair, is to give everyone an opportunity to speak. So, if I can.., if I want to come
- back to you in the middle of your time, I can. You still have that time left. I'm just telling
- 1143 you that I'm gonna let you monopolize the opportunity for other individuals on the Board
- to be able to speak.
- 1145 Go ahead. Proceed. sir.
- 1146 **Councilperson McCoy:** One second. I'm teeing up clock. One second.
- 1147 Chairperson Lanier: [Sigh].
- 1148 **Councilperson McCoy:** Starting at eight minutes, twenty-seven seconds again.
- So, Ms. Jacobs, but, you know, I'm just really.., and, you know, this is what's kinda
- hard for me and difficult, because I literally asked this question in the beginning of May and here we are, we still have this Item. We went through first reading and it was my

- 1152 understanding that the cross control connection manual would be adopted. And the 1153 reason why that that's important, because if you read the actual Ordinance, which I'm 1154 gonna just take a second, because I only a have a few, according to the Chairperson, it 1155 specifically provides for [pause] referenced to the City's Cross-Connection Control manual. And, it says it may be amended from time to time, and it's available for inspection 1156 1157 from the Riviera Beach Utility Special District.
- So, I guess, I'm not exactly sure how this is supposed to work, that we're adopting 1158 a Code of Ordinances, where we don't even know exactly what the manual consists of. 1159 1160 So, I mean, I'll, ill yield back but, even Ms. Wynn, I, you know, I think asked this guestion of you. You know, you're referencing the manual, and then when you look at the manual, 1161 it's going back to reference the Code of Ordinances. So, it doesn't make sense. And I'm 1162 1163 not gonna support it.
- 1164 I yield. Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 1165 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Thank you, sir.
- 1166 **Councilperson McCoy:** Let me give you my timer. It is seven minutes, seven seconds.
- 1167 [Inaudible comment]
- 1168 **Chairperson Lanier:** Very good, sir. I will make a note of that.
- 1169 Are there any other questions from the Board in regards to this Item?
- 1170 Councilperson Lawson: Yes, Madam Chair.
- 1171 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, sir.
- Councilperson Lawson: Thank you, Madam Chair. 1172
- 1173 Ms. Jacobs, the cross-connections, will these be utilized in..., able to be utilized with the new water plant that we'll be instilling? 1174
- 1175 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Sir, the, the Cross-Connection Program, it, it...
- it doesn't necessarily deal with the water plant itself. The Cross-Connection Program is 1176 a program that establishes the regulations for us to be able to install backflow devices, 1177
- and to be able to determine whether or not, if those units are not working properly, 1178
- 1179 whether or not they provide for some type of contamination to our water system.
- 1180 So, even when we construct our new water plant, the back'..., the Cross-Connection Program will still exist, the backflow devices would still be required. 1181
- 1182 Councilperson Lawson: Okay. So, the backflows will be required regardless of the 1183 plant, once we do install the new...
- 1184 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Yes, sir.
- Councilperson Lawson: ...water plant? And, the Cross-Connection Program, we're 1185
- gonna talk about the fees in the next Item, and the cost for the residents, commercial and 1186

- residential, but the actual program that we're just updating, and I think we had a conversation in reference to just updating the Code and the Ordinance for it. I guess my only concern is, it's gonna be on the next Item with the fees, but just making sure that once we actually do and set this cross-connection up, that it's gonna effect the new water plant. It's not gonna effect our residents. But the fees that we're gonna talk about in the next Item, they're kind of the concern that I head earlier.
- So, I'll support this but moving forward with the fees is something I want us to really address.
- 1195 Assistant City Manager Jacobs: Yes, sir.
- 1196 **Councilperson Lawson:** Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 1197 Chairperson Lanier: Thank you, sir.
- 1198 Are there any questions for Ms. Jacobs in regards to this Item?
- 1199 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair?
- 1200 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, sir.
- 1201 **City Manager Evans:** If I may? Ms. Jacobs, with regards to the manual, you stated
- that the manual is an internal working document. Is there anything incorporated in the

- that outlines the maintenance requirements, the expectations for testing, et. cetera? Is
- there going to be..., is there something in the [stammer] manual that invariably could affect
- the property owner to where they needed to come to seek relief from the District or the
- 1207 Board or what have you?
- 1208 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** No, sir. The manual is, is simply a document
- that Staff will use in order to implement the program. It will provide different guidelines
- 1210 and directions for us to be able to...
- 1211 Councilperson Lawson:: [Inaudible].
- 1212 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** ...to do what we need to do on a daily basis.
- 1213 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, sir. Madam Clerk.
- 1214 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson McCoy?
- 1215 Councilperson McCoy: No.
- 1216 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Botel?
- 1217 **Councilperson Botel:** Yes.

- 1234 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we do not have public
- 1235 comment cards on this Item. The acceptance of public comment cards on this Item is
- 1236 now closed.
- 1237 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, Madam Clerk. Mr. Evans.
- 1238 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: So moved.
- 1239 **Chairperson Lanier:** I'm sorry. Go ahead with the motion.
- 1240 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson**: So moved.
- 1241 **Councilperson Botel:** Second.
- 1242 **Chairperson Lanier:** Very good. Mr. Evans.
- 1243 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, if I can have the Assistant City Manager, Ms.
- 1244 Deirdre Jacobs make this presentation.
- 1245 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Thank you, Mr. Evans. Again, for the record,
- my name is Deirdre Jacobs. I'm the Assistant City Manager here, with the City of Rivera
- 1247 Beach.
- Resolution No. 57-21 is a, a document that simply asks the Board please consider
- the fees that would be associated with the particular Cross-Connection Program that you
- iust approved. [Stammer], excuse me, the fees are, are generally minimal and they don't
- technically affect any of our residents, unless the residents have fi'.., unless the, the

1252 customers, the types of backflow devices that are associated with those certain residential 1253 customers have [stammer] propensity to cause some type of high hazard or 1254 contamination for our potable water system. 1255 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. 1256 Are there any questions for Ms. Jacobs? 1257 Councilperson Lawson: Madam Chair? 1258 Yes. Go ahead, sir. Chairperson Lanier: 1259 **Councilperson Lawson:** Ms. Jacobs, could you outline some of those factors, or some of those residents, that may be affecting the backflow... water flow? 1260 1261 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** So, excuse me. You're asking... Could you 1262 please ask that... 1263 **Councilperson Lawson:** The type... ...question again? 1264 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** 1265 **Councilperson Lawson:** What, what residents would actually effect that? **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** If there.., if there is a particular customer, and 1266 the unit is a residential unity, in that unit there may be a pool. There may be a poo that 1267 that particular resident, or it might be a resident that has a fire line there.., that exists at 1268 their unit. Units like that. Maybe there might be a residential unit that also has some type 1269 of business that operates there, maybe like a barber shop or a beauty salon at that 1270 1271 particular customer's property. Those are units that would be considered to have a high propensity of contamination to our system. Those types of residential units would be 1272 affected with a fifty dollar fee. 1273 1274 Councilperson Lawson: And I believe you also said irrigation systems as well? 1275 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Yes. Irrigation systems as well. 1276 **Councilperson Lawson:** So residents with irrigations, under single family properties, 1277 pools, would possibly be receiving this fee for this backflow? 1278 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** And it's only the initial fee. So that's a one-1279 time fee. 1280 **Councilperson Lawson:** So the annal fee would not be a part of what the residential...

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the time that the backflow unit was initially installed at that particular property.

No. There's...

...a fifty dollar initial fee. And that would be

- 1285 Councilperson Lawson: Mm.
- 1286 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** The other fee would be the fifteen dollar
- 1287 annual fee.
- 1288 **Councilperson Lawson:** So there is a annual fee for the residents?
- 1289 Assistant City Manager Jacobs: Yes.
- 1290 Councilperson Lawson: Okay.
- 1291 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** There is.
- 1292 **Councilperson Lawson:** So, the.., whether it's commercial or residential, they will have
- a annual fee. And, whether it's commercial or residential, it's gonna be a fifteen dollar fee
- 1294 for...
- 1295 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Actually, I believe for the residential, it's...
- 1296 excuse me.
- 1297 Councilperson Lawson: Mhmm.
- 1298 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** [Inaudible comment]. I think it may be a two
- 1299 year fee, as opposed to the one year fee for the residential ones that have the, the high
- 1300 hazard.
- 1301 Could you help me out?
- 1302 Councilperson Lawson: Okay.
- 1303 **Chairperson Lanier:** Go ahead, Mr. Hunter.
- 1304 **Unk.:** [Inaudible] answer that question.
- 1305 **Councilperson Lawson:** Thank you, Mr. Hunter.
- 1306 Mr. S. Hunter: Good evening. For, for the record, Stephen Hunter, Holtz
- 1307 Consultant. Good evening to the Council.
- To answer the guestion, I, I like to throw out a number. You all have about 13,500
- water customers in your, your service area.
- 1310 Councilperson Lawson: Mhmm.
- 1311 **Mr. S. Hunter:** This Cross-Connection Control only affects about 3,000 customers.
- Of the 3,000 customers, and we're, we're still doing your inventory on your system, you
- only have about a hundred to maybe a hundred and fifty residential customers that will
- be affected by a annual, a biannual report. So, those are the ones gonna be affected.
- 1315 Now. that's only residential.

- All of your commercials will be affect because they are.., they have to have their
- devices tested yearly. And so, all of your commercial will be meeting the fifteen dollar fee
- if you all pass that.
- 1319 Councilperson Lawson: Okay. Follow up, Madam Chair.
- 1320 Assistant City Manager Jacobs: Well actually, Mr. Hunter, they would.., the
- fifteen dollar fee would go along whether or not they passed it or not, right?
- 1322 **Mr. S. Hunter:** Yeah. And, and.., the, the way it reads is, so back up with the, the
- program. Every backflow device, and let's use a number, somewhere around 2,500,
- 3,000 backflow devices that you all have in your system. Each one of those devices get
- tested once a year per the state mandate. When that test report comes into your City,
- we're recommending that you charge fifteen dollars for that test report to come in to be
- handled through your administrative Staff.
- Now, the plumbing industry, the industry out there, they don't submit reports, bad
- reports. They just don't do that. So, it's not like your customer is going to be faced with
- submitting two and three reports on one backflow per year. The only reason one of your
- customers will submit a second report on a device, will be because they had damage to
- the device. At that point in time, they have to submit a second report.
- But under normal conditions, your water users, they receive.., they'll be charged
- fifteen dollars per year, per device.
- 1335 Councilperson Botel: Madam Chair?
- 1336 Chairperson Lanier: Yes. Go ahead.
- 1337 **Councilperson Botel:** Do, do we have a history of problems with backflow devices?
- Has this been an ongoing situation that we've had for... Why do we do this? Because
- there was an issue?
- 1340 **Mr. S. Hunter:** Okay. I can give some issues. Riviera Beach has had.., not had an
- 1341 issue.
- 1342 **Councilperson Botel:** Oh.
- 1343 **Mr. S. Hunter:** Delray Beach had an issue, \$3MM, just took place in the past two to
- three months, which took about eighteen months to study.
- 1345 Councilperson Botel: Right.
- 1346 **Mr. S. Hunter:** West Palm Beach, 2007, had a major hit with backflows. You don't
- find the problem often, but when it happens, it happens. And what it does, it effects your
- entire drinking water supply. So what you do? You protect your supply to the best of
- 1349 your ability.
- 1350 **Councilperson Botel:** So, this is preemptive.
- 1351 Assistant City Manager Jacobs: Dr. Botel?

1352 **Councilperson Botel:** This. this... We... 1353 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** 1354 **Councilperson Botel:** ...is preemptive. We just.... 1355 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Yeah. 1356 Councilperson Botel:: ...wanna be sure... 1357 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** It is. 1358 **Councilperson Botel:** ...it doesn't... 1359 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** We haven't had any issues. But, in an 1360 abundance of caution... 1361 **Councilperson Botel:** Yeah 1362 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** ...we were preparing. 1363 **Councilperson Botel:** Okay. Thank you. 1364 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Very good. 1365 Are there any other questions about this Item? 1366 Councilperson McCoy: Yes, Madam Chair. 1367 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead. sir. 1368 Councilperson McCoy: Alright. So, to, to the point that was made earlier, Ms. Jacobs, 1369 the manual itself, right? Does that incorporate the fees? Or is it gonna be solely this Resolution? 1370 1371 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** I... actually. I can't remember if we outlined the. the fees that... 1372 1373 Councilperson McCoy: Because I thought... 1374 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** ...are being adopted here... Councilperson McCoy: ...that was the question... 1375 ...in the Resolution. 1376 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** 1377 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...Mr. Evans has. 1378 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** I'm sorry?

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Councilperson McCoy: I thought Mr. Evans just asked, does the manual have, you

know, a schedule of fees. Or adverse affects on the customers.

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- 1381 **Mr. S. Hunter:** Okay. The man'.., excuse me, if I may answer it. The manual talks
- about the fees. The manual talks about you have to submit a report. You know, you have
- 1383 to submit the report to the City in order to show that your device is in compliance. The
- manual mentions the fifteen dollar fee on that app'.., on that part of it.
- 1385 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. So, so the answer will be yes that the manual does
- include the fee then, if you said...
- 1387 **Mr. S. Hunter:** It mentions... I, I don't, I don't wanna wordsmith. The manual
- mentions fee. So I don't know how we're putting it together. We talk about it because
- there's a cost associated with any work that's performed under the manual.
- 1390 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. My next question is, does the manual, which I.., does
- the manual provide that the City or the Utility Special District, can bring a lawsuit against
- 1392 a person? For enforcement?
- 1393 **Mr. S. Hunter:** The manual speaks of the City taking the position of shutting off the
- 1394 water.
- 1395 **Councilperson McCoy:** But that's not the question I asked.
- 1396 **Mr. S. Hunter:** Well, let me, let me... Can I [stammer].., I'm just.., I don't.., I can only
- tell you what the manual says. There's nothing in the manual talks about lawsuits.
- 1398 Councilperson McCoy: It...
- 1399 **Mr. S. Hunter:** The man'...
- 1400 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...[inaudible].
- 1401 **Mr. S. Hunter:** ...manual says this, it says it gives the water purveyor the authority
- to protect their drinking water.
- 1403 **Councilperson McCoy:** Madam Chair, I reclaim my time.
- 1404 **Chairperson Lanier:** Wait a minute. Hold on. Let him, let him finish. Let him finish.
- 1405 Go ahead, sir.,
- 1406 **Mr. S. Hunter:** So, by actions that the water purveyor takes to protect their drinking
- water against the public, basically shuts off the water. From that point, if gets to a lawsuit,
- 1408 I don't know how that's handled. But we.., we're.., you're gonna shut off the water to
- 1409 [stammer] prevent contamination in your entire water supply.
- 1410 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, would the answer be yes, no or you're not, you're not
- 1411 sure?
- 1412 **Mr. S. Hunter:** I'm not sure that it has lawsuits.
- 1413 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.
- 1414 **Mr. S. Hunter:** I'm not sure about lawsuits.

1415 Councilperson McCoy: Well, and this is exactly what my concern was because the 1416 draft that I got clearly says the City has the right to enjoin you in a lawsuit for violations of 1417 the manual. And I'm just so concerned as to how we can get so far into talking about 1418 litigation, when the manual is not even published for us, as Board Members, to review. 1419 And this draft that I have is from the month of April. 1420 So, that's why, you know, as much as you many not agree with me, I'm trying to get to a point that we cannot sit here and adopt some manual blindly, when the manual 1421 provides that a person, unknowingly, can be sued in court by the, by the City or the Utility 1422 1423 Special District. 1424 And, I'm not gonna support the Item. Just, Members, just kinda keep this in mind, 1425 we're supporting and passing a manual, and then now adopting fees for something that 1426 we've not even seen. 1427 So I yield back. 1428 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, sir. 1429 Are there any other questions about this Item? [Pause]. Madam Clerk? 1430 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Botel? 1431 **Councilperson Botel:** Yes. 1432 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Lawson? 1433 Councilperson Lawson: No. 1434 City Clerk Anthony: Councilperson McCoy? 1435 **Councilperson McCoy:** No. 1436 **City Clerk Anthony:** Pro Tem Miller-Anderson? 1437 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** Yes. 1438 City Clerk Anthony: Chair Lanier? 1439 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. 1440 **City Clerk Anthony:** That motion is approved. 1441 **Chairperson Lanier:** Alright. - 1477 Beach.
- 1478 I'm here tonight just to, first of all, thank the Council for allowing the Riviera Beach
- 1479 Cares Coalition to come before you last week, well, last Council meeting to do a
- presentation to talk about the services that we are giving to homeless families in Riviera
- Beach. The good news is that, as a result of that, the good company that is one of your
- clients, called us right away and made a very generous donation, and are now agreeing
- to enter into a partnership with us. So, I just wanna thank you for that opportunity because
- it did open up a door for us.

1514 Blue Heron and Broadway, that's just the ca'.., the caving in week by week. You need to
1515 do something with that intersection, at Blue Heron and Broadway.

1516 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, ma'am.

1517 **City Clerk Anthony:** Marvelous Washington, Mr. Willie Milsap, J.B. Dixon.

1518 **Ms. M. Washington:** Good evening, Councilpersons, Chair, Mayor and City

1519 Manager.

I didn't get a chance to speak on the last Item because I came in a little late, but I do have some questions and corrections as it relates to that last Item. As I read it, that these fees will be put forth on the residents due to if you have a irrigation system or a pool at your residential area. In the neighborhood that I live in, the majority of the homes in my neighborhood has a irrigation system and/or a pool. So, he stated that it would be only about a hundred residential houses or homes that would be affected by this, that's not true.

He also stated the City of West Palm Beach has enacted something similar. That's not true. That was reversed because it was deemed that those devices were unnecessary.

So, my questions are, at the beginning of the pandemic, you guys voted on to increase the water rates by a certain percentage for a certain amount of years. Mr. McCoy did file a lawsuit stating that the residents were not properly communicated about this increase. Who's to say that you guys are gonna properly communicate this to residents, that they have to install this device?

I mean, my water was interrupted multiple times last month. And, the first time, I didn't receive any communication. The second time, I received communication nine hours after the interruption. And at 11:00 o'clock that night, that's when I saw on the news that I need to boil my water. Considering my water had been off since 9:00 o'clock that morning. And I was told that I had to take this up with the Utility District.

Now, I mention that to say that when my water bill is due, or if it's, it's threatened to be turned off, I get a email. So, I don't understand why that same communication can't be used as it relates to boil water notices.

Now back to the original reason why I'm up here, about this last Item. You guys are willing to put forth fees on residents again during a rough time of the year. I don't understand why we contin'..., why you guys continuously approve additional fees on residents, due to the City negligence?

The amount that we're paying each month, the percentage that we're paying each month, I have a question about that. Where's that percentage going to? What is it paying for? Why is not paying for these devices? Because, who's to say that it's gonna be fifteen dollars each year as a annual fee? Because cost of living increases. So you're not gonna tell me in 2021, twenty.., well, 2022-2023, that you're gonna still be expecting us to pay just fifteen dollars to test these devices.

I mean, it's getting really redundant. And, and it is actually disheartening to see that you guys are continuously voting on items that's causing undue financial hardship to residents in our City. And during the worst time in our national history, during a pandemic, which residents are really not paying much attention to what's going on locally, because they're so distracted what's going on in the national level and the state level.

**Ms. M. Washington:** You really need to reconsider what you guys just voted on.

1560 Chairperson Lanier: Thank you.

**City Clerk Anthony:** Mr. Willie Milsap, J.B. Dixon, Mary Brabham.

**Mr. W. Milsap:** Good evening. Mr. Willie W. Milsap, Riviera Beach.

I have questions. And I'd like to address the Council as well as our City Manager, pertaining to certain things that are happening west of the tracks. First of all, I wanna thank ya'll for what ya'll did during the time that you gave away the food, you assisted the individuals that needed to take shots and everything.

But I'm asking a question, why is it that everything to be done in the City, have to be done east of the tracks? Why is that the Councilpersons that came to our residences, in our neighborhood, and asked us to vote for them, they don't do anything west of the tracks for the individuals there. Are we living in a third world country? Or just this City? Because what you do represents everybody east of the tracks, nobody west of the tracks has benefited from anything that you all have done since you've been sitting on the Council seat.

Ya'll saying you're building a Fire Station for the City, on the corner of Congress and Blue Heron. Can somebody explain to me, 'cause this is my thought, who got paid to buy that corner? Because, how can you get a fire truck outta there in a major intersection to a fire? You know, you're talking a major highway within the City itself.

Also, my question is, if I travel down 95, I don't see nothing on 95 that says, 'Welcome to the City of Riviera.' We have service stations, we have this, we have that. There's no identity pertaining to the City of Riviera. But when you get inside, you can see everything for Singer Island. You all put up a new marquee up there. On that new marquee, you see Singer Island, you see all of the things east of the tracks but ya'll still have not addressed us, that's west of the tracks and putting anything that we can identify with.

Ya'll allow all the mom and pop stores and service stations to serve food. Why, why do you all do that? Do they have to have a license? Do they have to have health inspection, or what? Ya'll don't take ya'll family there to eat, so why would ya'll expect for us to take our family there to eat? Why is it some of ya'll can't go out and solicit and bring us some business here to the City?

We got open land and stuff that's out there to be utilized if you wanna buy some that somebody could put.., put something up. The only thing that has been done in this City over the years, is you built a building on the corner of 13<sup>th</sup> and Barack Obama, and J.., J.W. store changed from Martin Luther King corner to 4<sup>th</sup> Street. That's the only thing that's been done for the City on that side of the tracks.

But again, we got Calloway Complex over there. So when ya'll start giving away something, when ya'll start having events, why can't ya'll have something over there? Or is it because we [stammer] predominately black neighborhood? That ya'll don't wanna be aggravated with or won't address with the people? Because ya'll do not give us our due.

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- 1600 And w res'..., earned that respect. I said something to ya'll before. When residents have to catch public transportation, they don't have a bench nowhere from Blue Heron, 1601
- 1602 Singer..., Silver Beach Road...
- 1603 [Timer]
- Mr. W. Milsap: 1604 ...or the 1st Street, to sit down on a bench.
- 1605 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, sir.
- 1606 Mr. W. Milsap: Nowhere. You [inaudible].
- 1607 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.
- 1608 City Clerk Anthony: J.B. Dixon, Mary Brabham, William [stammer Wyly.
- 1609 Ms. J.B. Dixon: J.B. Dixon, Singer Island in Riviera Beach.
- 1610 I also have some concerns about water notification when you have to boil your water. There have been, in the last month or so, instances both on the west side and on 1611
- 1612 the east side on the Island, of water interruptions, after which people are asked to boil
- their water. Now, I realize that boiling your water after such a brief interruption is, you 1613
- 1614 know, in an abundance of caution, but people are very concerned about it. So, to me,
- you have to get to those people before they brush their teeth, before they cook, before 1615
- 1616 they shower in that water, that they believe is contaminated. And, in fact, may be
- contaminated. 1617
- 1618 So, I think we have a system, is called a Red Code? Or Red Button?
- 1619 Code Red. **Councilperson Botel:**
- 1620 Ms. J.B. Dixon: I know I registered for it. Red what?
- 1621 **Councilperson Botel::** Code Red.
- 1622 Ms. J.B. Dixon: Code Red. Code Red. And Code Red is supposed to give you
- notifications, like, if there's a hurricane or whatever. And.., that's why I signed up. So, I 1623
- wonder if people have signed up for that, and if that system is capable of selecting from 1624
- 1625 among all of our addresses, can you pinpoint, can... I think IT can do this, pinpoint
- 1626 neighborhoods. So, if you know that there are four streets that need to boil their water,
- you can get that out instantly because that is text or a call. And one thing people always 1627
- have with them is their phone. [Chuckle]. 1628

They may not see the door hanger that you put out, or the flyer that you put out 1629 several hours later, sometimes the next day later. They can come in through their garage 1630 and not see anything at the front door. And those people are concerned. On both sides 1631 of the bridge, about these boiled water notices. 1632

1633 Considering the fact that we are going to be building a new water treatment plant, 1634 the po'.., probability of those interruptions is going to, realistically, gonna be increased.

And there's going to be far more of them. And so, I would really encourage IT and Staff 1635

to work out a system where within fifteen, twenty minutes, people who are affected can

be notified through Code Red. And then, we need to rally encourage people to sign up

1638 for that program.

**Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.

**City Clerk Anthony:** Mary Brabham, William Wyly.

**Ms. M. Brabham:** Good evening, good people. Mary Brabham, Riviera Beach.

First of all, I would like to say, Ms. Chairperson Shirley Lanier, continue. You're doing a great job. Nothing is never dictated nowhere in history, in any government, that any Chair belongs to anyone. It is entirely left up to the governing Board. A Chair is not guaranteed when your character and your behavior is displeasing. And that goes for a Chair, as well as Vice Chair, or any Councilperson. I stood here last year and I tried to tell you, don't go against we as residents, because we know what to do. And we will do what we will do in this co'..., in this election here.

And it's so strange because now we talk about all of this that is going on now. We are in a new century here. COVID, every historical event in history, those of us who went to school, colleges and stuff know, every historical event carries a different century to it. And we are in a new century here. And we have to govern, and we have to live and od business in what we're in now. It is no going back. Back that you did do, you shouldn't do it now because that's passed and gone.

And then you're apt to talk about monies and stuff. You have some Councilpeoples up there.., see, Ms. Brabham wearing her money outfit tonight here, because see, some of you Councilpeople sit up there and that's all you do is run around here spending the taxpayer's money. Yes, Ms. Brabham has been engaged behind the scene. I got a whole lotta people in to do the vaccine.

And I wanna thank the general public because I.., my.., I buried my sister March of this year, and you all came out in full force to support Ms. Brabham. And Ms. Brabham got you all the vaccine. I've been vaccined as well, and I'm encouraging all of the residents to do the same thing too.

And on Monday night, that event was terrific. The Icee, we liked that. It's good to see new vendors coming in here without taking advantage of us. And the popcorn, you could smell it. It just melted in your mouth.

**Ms. M. Brabham:** And the macaroni and cheese was exquisite. Never tasted anything like it. And the Icee, yes, we as kids and adults, we like that. Because we want to see new things coming into our City here. And we want to move the things that need to be moved in our City here.

- **Ms. M. Brabham:** Don't think that we citizens, we are not sweet, because we're not.
- 1681 Chairperson Lanier: Thank you.
- **Ms. M. Brabham:** Support these new vendors.
- 1683 Thank you.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.
- **City Clerk Anthony:** William Wyly.
- **Mr. W. Wyly:** Good evening, Council.
- 1687 Chairperson Lanier: Good evening.
- **Mr. W. Wyly:** My name is William Wyly. I'm born and raised here in Riviera Beach.
- Honors algebra schoolteacher at Roosevelt Middle School, and also, was at public.., Palm
- Beach Lakes. So, a lotta my students are here in the City. In our City.

First, I wanna start off by talking about something good about our City, about the police exposure. I know a lotta people complain about the police, and I don't see that issue because I have a second job where I work at the Palm Beach County Courthouse. Myself and Mr. McCoy graduated as.., a couple years ago as process servers, and a lot of my business is here in the City and Lake Park and in Palm Beach Gardens.

And I see lotta good police exposure here. Every time I'm around, I see the police officers in different positions, so just in case if something happens, they're ready to go at it. And I always see them, always wave at them, speak to 'em, and I think they're doing a good job. But what I am gonna ask the community to do, is to make sure that we give our help to the Police Department, because the community is only as good as what we provide, the safety for our City, and assisting our police officers in doing their job. So please, let's do that.

I would like to thank also, Cedrick Clark, along with Mr. Bailey from Public Works. They're agreeing to do some work inside the Federal Gardens. We have a couple areas there that need a lotta work, as far as the alleyway area. And they have agreed to come within the next two weeks to get a lot of things cleaned out and dumped, 'cause I was paying for a lot of this stuff myself, and now to find out that we can actually get this stuff done, well, myself and a couple neighbors, to get some properties cleaned out.

I would like to thank Mrs. Shirley Lanier for the beautification project that she got in Federal Gardens for, for the UPS to donate money there, to be able to assist in our City to help with the traffic. And, be able to make it a safer community.

And, I have to agree with Mr. McCoy with what he said earlier, that we don't want this.., with new businesses coming in, to seem like we're shaking them down. We don't want it to seem.., to have that kinda atmosphere, but as Mr. Lawson said also, we wanna make it to where, when these companies come in, they're investing in something that actually make them feel like they're a part of doing something, to make a part of this community. 'Cause they're gonna benefit from it also. So we wanna make sure we are doing that.

And one topic also I wanna discuss with Mr. Evans also, was that I'm getting a lotta questions from a lotta people 'cause I managed a couple organizations before I became a schoolteacher, and a lotta people know me from there and asking me a lotta questions. And so, when the new businesses come in, developers, property owners, anyone willing to come into our City, what is the protocol for Council Members communicating with people who wanna do business in our City prior to coming to the meetings? Because if we're gonna vote, people are gonna vote on these meeting, vote on what's..., when they come into our City, what is the protocol so we understand what's going on? Because, we don't want anything to be, how to say it nicely, compromised. Alright?

- So, I think we need to have a, a.., so we can understand what's going on in our City, to where we know what the rules and regulations are.

- 1758 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** So moved. I mean, second.
- 1759 **Chairperson Lanier:** [Chuckle]. Thank you. Mr. Evans.

- 1761 **Chairperson Lanier:** It's okay. [Chuckle].
- 1762 **City Manager Evans:** We'll have Police Chief, Nate Osgood make the presentation.
- 1763 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Mr. Osgood.
- 1764 **Police Chief Osgood:** Madam Chair, Pro Tem Miller-Anderson, Mayor Ronnie
- 1765 Felder and Council. Good evening. I'm Chief Nate Osgood.

1766 I'm here to discuss Resolution 53-21. The Police Department, we're seeking to upgrade our license plate readers technology by migrating to a new state of the art platform, from Flock Safety.

For more than a decade, the Riviera Beach Police Department has leveraged automatic license plate reader [stammer] technology to effectively identify vehicle subsequently, and their drivers involved in a commission of a crime. The availability of this resource has consistently produced investigatory leads directly resulting in the identification and conviction of numerous of criminals across the City and throughout the county.

In addition to crime suppression activity, the LPR system has also been credited with locating numerous missing and endangered individuals, such as, Silver Alerts, the Amber Alerts. LPR has been very effective in that. This technology is a complement of other crime fighting technology we have such as Shot Spotters, security cameras, as well

as other database systems inside of the Police Department, working at a real time crime center.

As with all technology, as you know, technology gets old and it fails. The City of Riviera Beach's current LPR system is more than ten years old. Features such as artificial intelligent vehicle, analytical and behavior patterns, identification will greatly increase our capabilities by allowing us to directly search for vehicles based on witnesses, description and rarely include complement vehicle description, or a license plate information.

Our current providers do not do such features. It will require substantial infrastructure investment on our part to develop this capability.

As such, for approximately the last two years, the Police Department has been actively evaluating and competing to produce [inaudible] products, trial and comparing to both our current system and each other offers.

Flock Safety has emerged as the overall best value for our needs. Flock Safety provides the advanced analytical we desire, along with the subscription based service model that requires no infrastructure investment in our part. Each of their LPR cameras cover at least two lanes of traffic versus the single lane that our current LPR system provides. The [stammer], the Flock system identifies vehicles not only through your license plate, but also allows investigators to search through make, model, color and other vehicle characteristics.

The Flock Safety pro'.., the Flock Safety has proposed a fixed twenty-six.., twenty-seven cameras deployment. This will, this will almost four times.., give us four times the coverage of our current seven, six camara system.

The annual cost for cameras is \$2,500, with a one-time \$250 installation fee. This amounts to a first year cost of \$74,250 with an ongoing annual cost of \$67,500. All prices are based on a term of Polk County Sheriff's Office competitive RFP, which was also awarded to Flock Safety.

The Riviera Beach Police Department currently budgeted \$50,0000 annually to maintain our current LPR system, which would be used to offset the annual cost of the proposed subscription. For an additional \$17,500 annually, the City will essentially receive four times the coverage, which would greatly increase the vehicle recognition and searchability.

The initial term of agreement is one year, and renewed for a subsequent one year period. The City can terminate this agreement at any time during the year's period.

Council, Madam Chair, any questions?

1813 Councilperson Botel:: Madam Chair?

**Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.

1815 Councilperson Botel:: So, the cameras that we have now in place, we're just gonna

get rid of them? They're.., we can't repurpose them for any reason? We just...

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- 1817 **Police Chief Osgood:** That... That's correct. We're gonna replace them with the
- 1818 upgraded system.
- 1819 Councilperson Botel:: Okay.
- 1820 **Chairperson Lanier:** Any other questions for the Chief? [Pause]. Thank you.
- 1821 Madam Clerk.
- 1822 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we do have a public
- 1823 comment on this Item.
- 1824 **Chairperson Lanier:** I'm sorry.
- 1825 **City Clerk Anthony:** Mary Brabham.
- 1826 **Ms. M. Brabham:** Ms. Mary Brabham, Riviera Beach.
- 1827 Apparently, here I had some deviating questions about this Item as well here.
- compared to what we already have. You say this will include two lanes instead of one.
- Do you find this as a cost saving mechanism here? You know, compared to...
- 1830 **Police Chief Osgood:** Cost saving, ma'am?
- 1831 **Ms. M. Brabham:** Yes.
- 1832 **Chairperson Lanier:** No. You cannot address the Chief.
- 1833 **Ms. M. Brabham:** No, no, no. He...
- 1834 Chairperson Lanier: Yeah.
- 1835 **Ms. M. Brabham:** [Stammer] I know he can't [inaudible]...
- 1836 **Chairperson Lanier:** He answer it after you're finished.
- 1837 **Ms. M. Brabham:** But that..., but that was one of my questions here. What, what cost
- savings compared to what we're gonna be getting here now.
- And, I do know that we had the license plate readers in the City here previously.
- 1840 And, I do understand he.., you want to go with a, a new system here but also does this
- also save us lives or do you find it is more useful as far as really helping combat the crime
- that we have in this City here?
- I was just reading here today, and crime is on the rise all over. Not just Riviera
- Beach but all over. Yes, yes, yes. I come from a lineage of police officers, secret service
- agents and all of that. So I do know that data can be falsified, you know, to meet
- everybody's criteria. But, for what we experience in this City here, we have constantly
- said cameras in these places that we know that are hot spots in our City here.
- 1848 And I'm not gonna stand here over and over to say the same thing about cameras
- that need to be placed in these hot pockets in our City here. You bring all the technology

that you have and want, if you are still not doing what needs to be done, it useless. And I say that. It is useless. It becomes useless.

Because it's just like kicking against the brick. It's okay dong new things but you need to do the things that you should be doing. And that's helping the City as well as the residents. Because I'm not gonna ask Ms. Sally, Ms. Ann or Ms. Sue or nobody else, what's gonna happen when there's a shootin' all over in my neighborhood? I can't sit on my front porch. I can't sit in my.., on my patio. Because I'm constantly hearing gunshots that are going off over in this City.

And this is not one day. Every week, and every day, there's something that's going on in this City, in Riviera Beach. And I think.., and I know that the residents can attest to it. Because I'm engaged with them, and they say the same thing too.

- So, so we need, we need better ingenuity, and...

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- 1863 **Ms. M. Brabham:** ...we need to move on the things that we need to move on.
- Thank you.
- 1865 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, Ms. Brabham.
- 1866 Are there any questions for the Chief, on this Item?
- 1867 Councilperson Lawson:: Madam Chair?
- 1868 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 1869 **Councilperson Lawson::** Chief, can you just give a brief overview of the difference
- between the license plates for this Resolution and the cameras of the next Resolution?
- 1871 **Police Chief Osgood:** Okay. This one is a license plate reader which will give you
- the identification of the car, make, model and the potential owner of the vehicle.
- 1873 Councilperson Lawson:: Mhmm.
- 1874 **Police Chief Osgood:** The camera system is different. It will.., it's only designed
- to.., it's sort of like a closed circuit television, just monitoring.
- 1876 Councilperson Lawson:: Okay.
- 1877 **Police Chief Osgood:** The license reader gives you a little data check on vehicles
- moving about. And this is actually giving us four times the coverage than our current
- system. And I, I compared it today as sorta like an upgrade car, such as a Tesla, a BMW,
- 1880 Mercedes compared to an older model car that was made twenty, thirty years ago.
- 1881 **Councilperson Lawson:** Okay. Well, thank you, Chief.

1882 I'm absolutely in support of whatever it's gonna take just to improve the quality over there, and the support that you need 'cause your Police Department is doing a 1883 phenomenal job. It just needs additional support. And, these cameras, these license 1884 1885 plate readers, will give you that additional tool, innovative tool to continue to do that job 1886 that you guys are doing.

With the last speaker that said the gunshots in our community, this will kind of assist with trying to catch some of those individuals that are just shooting guns in our community, that are killing individuals in our community, these additional cameras and the quality cameras. And then also, the plate readers will allow to catch some of these individuals that are getting away from these sites.

1892 So, whatever it takes to support and to make sure that we're giving you that support 1893 in this area, I'm for.

1894 Thank you, Chief.

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- 1895 Police Chief Osgood: Thank you, sir.
- 1896 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.
- 1897 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair?
- 1898 **Chairperson** Lanier: Yes. Go ahead, sir.
- 1899 Councilperson McCoy: Thank you.
- Chief, similar to the body worn cameras that has a policy, is there a policy for 1900 license plate readers that's currently at the Police Department? 1901
- 1902 **Police Chief Osgood:** Yes, sir.
- 1903 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. And, without me knowing or revealing much of, you know, the criminal intelligence part, but does the policy speak to how the information can 1904
- be used and retained? And, what specifically is prohibited? Or is there some sort of state 1905
- 1906 guidance on this?
- 1907 Police Chief Osgood: Councilman McCoy, I would have to get back to you on that 1908 policy, but I do know we have policy about it.., written about the license plate readers.
- 1909 And you, you have, obviously, information you just can't share with the public. It'll be a
- time sensitive matter to the point, like, you hold it for a period of time depending on what 1910
- 1911 you pick up on it.
- 1912 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. Well, just.., let me just ask this plain and simple and
- 1913 maybe you can or can't answer this. Can these license plate reader information, the data
- it recovers, be used for something outside of a criminal investigation? As it stands under 1914
- 1915 the policy?

Okay. Once again, this is Resolution 54-21. The Police Department seeks to enhance our deployment of security cameras throughout the City by purchasing and installing an additional twenty-four cameras throughout the City. This is in addition to what we have.

So, over the decade, the Riviera Beach Police Department has successfully leveraged cost effective technology to suppress criminal activity and to provide critical evidence needed to prosecute offenders. Security cameras have proven to be a reliable an efficient crime fighting resource for law enforcement agencies in this City, and just throughout the county, and the country.

The network of cameras are [inaudible] to the Riviera Beach in real time crime center, allow officers to monitor large sections of the City from a central location with only a minimum amount of staffing. Cameras are used in conjunction with other crime fighting technology, such as Shot Spotters, license plate readings. The video footage has been instrumental in pursuit of criminal offenders, and has led to [stammer] numerous arrests, convictions, as well as the recovery of stolen property.

The Police Department received a proposal from Broadcasting.., Broadcast Systems in the amount of \$75,059.40 for the purchase and installation of twenty-four cameras. The proposal includes the cameras, the cameras licenses, data, electrical component, and, as well as, the complete installation of twenty-four various cameras throughout the City.

- indulge us, I'd like for the Assistant to the City Manager, Ms. Marsha Noel, to make the
- 2188 presentation with regards to the public meetings that have been held in regards to the two
- females that are being proposed to be placed on the water tank.
- 2190 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, sir. Go ahead, Ms. Noel.
- 2191 **Assistant to the City Manager Noel:** Alright. Trying to set up here. Okay. Good
- evening, Mayor, City Council, City Manager, Ms. Wynn and everyone else who has joined
- 2193 us this evening.

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- So, just as a brief update since our last presentation regarding the water tank art project, we last discussed that we would be going out to the community to garner feedback in terms of the two African American women to be selected to be placed on the project. As it currently stands, we have two males that have been approved by you, which is Martin Luther King, Jr. and President Barack Obama.
  - And so, since then, we've held two community meetings. We've held one April 19<sup>th</sup>, and also, May 11<sup>th</sup> regarding the selection of women. In addition to that, we had an online poll through Survey Monkey that was circulating online and that we've pushed out through some of our communication platforms as well.
  - And, to this date, we have received responses. And we've also received twelve individuals that were shared or sent over to the Mayor's office to be considered in the poll. And I can list to you all the women that were provided to us for the poll. And then, I can also share with you who the top two picks were.
  - So briefly, I'll just list all their names. We received Mary McLeod Bethune, Serena and Venus Williams, Mary Eliza Mahoney, Alice Dunnigan, Wilma Rudolph, Shirley Chisholm, Rosa Parks, Harriet Tubman, Charlotte Ray, Michelle Obama, and Mae Jemison. So, all of these women were listed on the poll. In addition to the poll, there was a section where individuals can also share any names or ideas that probably weren't listed.
- But so far, we've gotten the top two picks as Harriet Tubman, and the second Michelle Obama. So, we're presenting these two individuals to you for consideration and for your blessing to move forward to add them to the project.

Councilperson Botel: I, I don't have questions, I have a couple of comments that I feel compelled to make because constituents, from all over the City really, responded to something that was put on Nextdoor which is, I don't know if you're familiar with hat but it's a communications vehicle that many people in the community use to express their feelings.

Someone put something up there about the water to'.., it's called water tower painting [stammer] contract, and it generated two hu'.., I'm looking at it right now. It generated two hundred and thirty-nine comments. Questions about how many people attended the April 19<sup>th</sup> and May 11<sup>th</sup> sessions? Was there input from a sufficient number of people in the community to make this kind of a decision? Comments about the fact that the City, although it's sixty-nine percent African American, there are other people, other races, represented in the City and why weren't they considered?

These are not my comments. These are comments coming from people who reported these things on Nextdoor.

So, I'm just wondering if you can give me some of those answers. What was the purpose of.., what was the intent.., what, what group of people was intended to be on honored? Was it Civil Rights leaders or was it popular figures in sports? And, and media, and so forth? I'm trying to think what else they asked. Sorry. Well, those are, those are a beginning.

- I, I think people are questioning how many responses there were. And generally when the CRA does a project like this, they have a number of community meetings and many, many people have input into it. So, I just wondered if you could respond to how many people had input. And, I guess to placate some of the questions that came up as a result of this Nextdoor thing, what's the future for the water tank? Will there be other people.., other races involved? Other kinds of people up there? And is the intent to honor Civil Rights leaders or is it in general to say these are people we like so we want them up there?
- 2247 Assistant to the City Manager Noel: Right. I get...
- **Councilperson Botel::** The last thing I'll say is...
- 2249 Assistant to the City Manager Noel: Okay.
- **Councilperson Botel:** Well, it's, it's kind of a moot point now because we've already started down this road, many people said, 'Why don't' you just put something up there about the environment because that should really represent Riviera Beach.'
- Go ahead.

Assistant to the City Manager Noel: No, no. That's fine. And I've actually provided a more comprehensive presentation at our last community meeting. I understand every time we hold one, it's someone's first time, you know, getting the information on the project.

So, just to kind of start from the beginning, back in October of last year, the Mayor brought before you the idea of doing a water tank mural. And the purpose of that was ahead of what was going to be a, I think, Black History Month project. Obviously, we've bypassed that in terms of not meeting that particular deadline.

There was a lot of work on the backend that had to be done. And so, we're still continuing down that vein of representing Black History Month or supporting or commemorating African Americans that have had a positive impact on American society.

In terms of what types of individuals were to be considered, whether they're activists or per'..., or persons from a particular background, from what I understand, we've gotten feedback from across the board. There wasn't, in, in our community engagement, where individuals in the community have only wanted the, the persons to be selected to be of a particular background. I think they were open across a diversity of areas. So, we've received, as you can tell just from the list of the African American women that I listed, they're from various backgrounds, from athletes, entertainers, to activists, politicians.

And then, in terms of the community meetings, on average we've had twenty to thirty individuals respond. So, for this poll, we've had approximately thirty as well. So that's basically the average that we're seeing in terms of response level. And we've held four, actually three, community meetings but that's on top of having these discussions at the City Council meeting. And then, also receiving responses through emails and participation withs the poll.

So, we've carried quite a few activities and we've done our very best pushing out that information online, through our [stammer] newsletter of approximately 1,700 emails. We've pushed it out on social media, we've pushed it out at some of these other meetings that we've held.

So, in terms of the purpose of this or where this is going to, to go. So, like I said, this is still down the vein of what the original intent was, which was to recognizes African Americans that have made an impact, positive impact, on American society for all peoples. But, in terms of where it could go, because in the community engagement activities we've held, we've heard ideas about, 'Well, maybe in the future, we can consider locals.., local figures who have made a positive impact here in Riviera Beach.' Ideas about putting up quotes. And then also to your point, considering individuals from other backgrounds as well.

So, we know that, because there's such a support and interest in the idea of this mural, maybe transforming into something else. I think that maybe this project could be broken down into phases. Maybe for now, it starts off from what it was ori'.., originally intended to be, but then it transforms over time to include other individuals, or other symbols of progress and, and things of that sort for the City.

So, this is not necessarily a closed door project. I think that there's opportunities for it to transform over time. But, just to stick withs the intent that was initially articulated

- **City Manager Evans:** If I may? We need some direction from the Board. Does the
- 2333 Board agree with the two names and wants to move forward with the two names? Or,
- what direction would you like for Staff to take?
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Let us hear this public comment and then we'll come back to
- the Board and, and ask them what their direction would be.
- **Ms. M. Brabham:** Ms. Mary Brabham, Riviera Beach.
- I, I, I too have some reservation about it. Not just myself, but I know that under the circumstances, a lot of us, we did not participate in it because basically I guess with my schedule and stuff, you know, I, I, I was unaware but from the meetings that I saw, I, I alone with other, felt that the money could be better utilized, where it really, really needed to be utilized at. You know? So, that, that, that, that's one thing there.

But I also too, have to piggyback on something what Dr. Botel said too. Even though we are a City that's sixty-nine or sixty-seven percent minority, we ha'..., we bring that inclusiveness. So, you know, it is so many other, Ruth Bader Ginsberg, you know, we thought about her. Thurgood Marshall, the first black Supreme Justice, advocate. First black, Thurgood Marshall, Colin Powell, Condoleezza Rice, and I could on and on and on and on and on. Because we are a City of many here.

That should reflect not just Ms. Brabham. I'm black, and I'm African American, but Ms. Brabham is many. And this is how I like to be looked at, with my other comrades, so that, so that peoples can see our water tower that's not just reflecting us. You know, we, we, we don't live here by ourselves. We cannot live here by ourself. We have to live amongst each other.

So, I, I, I think more as [stammer] I'm not kicking against it but, but, but if the monies could've been utilized a little bit much, much better. And, and I'm hoping that in the next round, that you all really think out of the box a little bit. We, we know in football and basketball and just..., we all know Dr. King. We talk about him every year, every day, 365 days in the year.

But, we need to be relatable in our City. We have the waterfront. We have the Maria. We haves the beach. But most of all, we have We the People. And We the People are inclusive with everyone. This including our children. Because if, if, if we just say, 'Well, okay b, beat Dr. King.' I want them to reach for the darn stars, and grab the moon as well, so they can see others who they can immolate. And be good at. And strive to be not just great, but be the best.

- So, so we really need to think on this. I'm not knocking, City Manager nowhere but...

**Ms. M. Brabham:** It is some areas here that we.., that, that we really can build on.

Thank you.

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- 2370 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Thank you so much, Ms. Brabham.
- 2371 Councilperson Lawson:: Madam Chair?
- 2372 Chairperson Lanier: Yes. Go ahead, sir.,
- 2373 **Councilperson Lawson::** Thank you, Madam Chair.
- I, I, I would have to agree that the, the list goes on 'cause I really wanna know what's gonna be our direction moving forward. 'Cause, the speaker did speak about some great leaders like, Condoleezza Rice, Thurgood Marshall, Colin Powell. There, there were many amazing spe'.., amazing options but I think that we look at this next selection as women that could represent.., be represented on this tower. And when we first started, we wanted to have an equal representation of two males, t wo women on the tower.
  - Mayor, if you could just give us a.., just a brief history of where this started and what was your direction with this tower? Because we can go forward with, you know, expanding the idea and building on it and furthering diversifying it. 'Cause I do hear my colleague's concern about making sure that we have diversity. 'Cause we are a diverse community.
  - But, this was initia'.., this was initiated by our Mayor and I wanted to kinda follow his lead in regards to what his initial vision was. He's done multiple community charettes and gotten numerous names, and I think the names that were brought to us were excellent options. But I also do wanna continue the progress and making this a fluid development.., a continuous proposal of mural and paintings that can keep building on this water tank.
- But, Mayor, can you give us some insight as to where it started and what your vision was?
- 2393 **Mayor Felder:** Sure. Madam Chair?
- 2394 **Councilperson Lawson:** Thank you.
- 2395 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, sir.
- 2396 **Mayor Felder:** Thank you.
- Yes. It started back, I think in 2019, Councilman Lawson.
- 2398 Councilperson Lawson:: Mhmm.
- 2399 **Mayor Felder:** We were looking at the, the wall that separated blacks and whites
- behind the McCray's Barbecue. And the idea was to first take that wall, because it a, a
- couple Councils before was talking about tearing that wall down. I think I got with Mr.
- Evans about I think that wall can actually tell a history of this City, because a lot of our
- kids, and even me growing up here for fifty-two years, or it will be fifty-two years, didn't

really know what that wall meant. So, I went back to my parents to find out. And I said why don't we take pieces of that wall?

And I think, I think we said it in a Council meeting, take pieces of that wall and get some artists to, to, to paint the history and put it in our parks. Like, we got five parks and we can put a piece of history in each park. Where, if a teacher wanted to take their kid on a field trip, it can be.., they can take them to the parks, it could be, like, a scavenger hunt. You go to one park, to the next park, to the next park and it tells the story of Riviera Beach.

So, that really didn't take off. And, Black History Month was coming up, and thinking outside the box, it was.., looking at West Palm Beach, when they did their mural of Civil Rights leaders, they got great support from, from both sides of, of culture, realizing how important that was. And I just said that because we are sixty-nine percent black, to even show our kids that these great leaders existed and you do have something to achieve.

So we started the conversation. And I, and I believe the Chairperson is right, I mean, it's not that what's on the outside of the wall, it's, it's really what's on the inside. I mean the tank.., it's really what's on the inside. But, you know, I just that, that painting, that art, would just give us, will give our kids something that they can look up to.

What we're facing here in the City, we see our young men, fourteen, fifteen, sixteen, as I'm out there, you know, they have no direction. They see.., they don't see us. They don't see, you know, we don't talk Martin Luther King every day, we talk Martin Luther King Black History Month..

Councilperson Lawson:: Mhmm.

- Mayor Felder: And.., so I think they just needed something visual to, you know, see and, and, and say that, you know, be proud. Many of our parents, being a black man who grew up here, wanted to represented something.
  - So, you know, we didn't wanna make.., I think this is a diverse City, and, and we do. It's just the beginning. We, we are going to add to that, that tank, a diverse painting. But this was just the beginning. And, of course, I didn't think it would be this tough. Not looking at.., or piggybacking on West Palm Beach and I think Delray. And every, every city, every, you know, really black city has that. And I don't see why Rivera Beach couldn't have that.
- But I understand that, you know, we are a diverse City. And I think Marsha did a great job last Tuesday, stating that this is just the beginning. We, we will add to the.., we will add to the tank.
- So that's how it first began, and that's what my thoughts were.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you so much, sir.
- 2441 Councilperson Lawson:: Follow up, Madam Chair?

- 2442 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 2443 Councilperson Lawson:: I, I really like the direction because we've, we've had this
- 2444 conversation for a number of months and we literally have decided that we're gonna try
- 2445 to bring some art to our community. This is why I really advocated for Arts in Public
- 2446 Places a year and a half ago, so that we can create that program. I noticed that West
- Palm Beach, they change their mural every few months, down in downtown West Palm
- Beach and it's a, a tourist attraction. It's a beautiful mural that they paint on the.., a wall
- right downtown. And they had a honoring Black History Month and some of the Civil
- 2450 Rights leaders back in February. Well that was beautiful. That literally got national
- recognition.
- So, I know that it's a hefty investment, but it is an investment into our community and beautification in our community. While a lotta people are concerned with the fact that, you know, we're painting on the water tank and not addressing the water, but we absolutely are. We're, we're currently investing into our infrastructure and we're beginning ITN and the discussions about bringing in the water plant.
- So, our discussion about moving forward, I believe Mr. Evans needs some direction, and I would be in support of moving forward with the names recommended, with the intent of continuing to grow the mural around the water tank, and make it a, a living body representation of the City. Something that can honor all of the, the people of our community, be very diverse but starting with what the intent was that the Mayor brought to the table.
- So, I'm, I'm not sure if we need a motion, Mr. Evans, or, or what you're looking for?

  A consensus? But I do want us to move forward and, and not continue to just not getting the project done.
- 2466 **Chairperson Lanier:** Alright. Very good. So, actually, what, what motion are you asking us for, Mr. Evans?
- 2468 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, Staff would request that the Board select two names to move forward with the completion of the first [stammer] phase of the art project.
- 2470 **Councilperson Lawson:** I move we go forward with the recommendation Staff brought
- 2471 to the table, to move forward with the completion of the first phase of the art project.
- 2472 **Councilperson McCoy:** Second.
- 2473 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** Madam Chair, I wanted to make a comment.
- 2474 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 2475 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** [Stammer], you know, I'm gonna go ahead and
- support the Item, but I do think we need to figure out, you know, what is the criteria for
- 2477 putting people up there? I know you all did have a few meetings, and, you know... and
- really, that's the only reason why I'm gonna go ahead and support it is because we have
- 2479 tried to reach out and get the information from people and find out what they wanted. But,

- I would like to really see more of a criteria set, you know, when we're selecting whoever
- 2481 we're gonna put up there. But.., instead of just, you know, [stammer], you know, 'I like
- 2482 that name,' or, 'I like that person.' We need to have more of a defined criteria for selecting
- people, so that we can properly explain why we have that person up there.
- Thank you.
- 2485 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.
- 2486 Councilperson Botel: Madam Chair?
- 2487 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 2488 Councilperson Botel: I, I can't support for that same reason because I don't think
- 2489 we have identified. You say we want this to represent our community. It doesn't really
- represent our community. And, as much as I love Michelle Obama, I mean, I think she's
- fabulous but if you're gonna say these are Civil Rights icons, she's not a ci'.., you know,
- 2492 I don't think that you have identified the criteria. You know, what, what, what makes it
- 2493 that that person is gonna be up there on that water tower?
- So, I'm.., I won't say any more about it. I'm just not, not gonna vote for it.
- 2495 **Chairperson Lanier:** Alright. Very good. Madam Clerk.
- 2496 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson McCoy?
- 2497 Councilperson McCoy:: Yes.
- 2498 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Botel?

FLORIDA, AUTHORIZING A NAMING AND RENAMING POLICY FOR STREETS, CITY BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES (OR COMPONENT THEREOF), AND CERTAIN CITY REAL OR TANGIBLE PROPERTIES; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND OTHER PURPOSES.

## CLARENCE SIRMONS, DEVELOPMENT SERVICES DIRECTOR, 561-845-4060

- **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we do not have public comment cards on this Item. The acceptance of public comment cards on this Item is now closed.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Mr. Sirmons... Mr. Evans.
- **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair and Members of the Board, this Item is to get comments and perspective from the Board related to the facilities and street renaming policy. There's been multiple iterations that have come to the Board for discussion. And, the reason the Item was pulled was to get final remarks and comments from the Board so we can bring back the policy that encapsulates the desired outcome from the Board.
- So, at this time, I'm going to ask that the Director of Development Services, Mr. Clarence Simons, make this presentation.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Very good. Mr. Sirmons.
- Development Services Director Sirmons: Good evening again, Madam Chair, Members of the Council, Mr. Manager and Madam Attorney.

I am before you to present the changes to the policy on street renaming, based on feedback that Staff has received over the past conversations we've had related to this. So, while the presentation is being brought up, I can start by saying that since the last time that we met, Staff took into account the feedback received, and also reformatted the Resolution so that it is a more user friendly document for residents reading it, ;as well as City Staff to understand more clearly what's being proposed in it and that the previous document had some ambiguity in the..., in terms of the formatting. But the, the content is largely intact from the previous..., or, the current policy.

So, to start with just the background, Staff was directed to update and amend the current policy which was adopted on December 15, 2010. The proposed policy updated.., update was presented to Council on December 16, 2020, February 17, 2021, and April 7, 2021 and, of course, today.

In the previous discussions, additional direction was provided to Staff and that direction included providing a Fee Schedule for the costs, and more details on paying for these proposed street renamings; a, a more specific process for street renaming; a more citizen driven process for street renaming; a more objective criteria on evaluating honorees for street renaming, especially as it relates to exceptional persons or exceptional circumstances. The directive was given that the City wants to avoid pervasive

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street renaming, resulting in a City where every single street has a commemorative name at the top of it. And finally, Staff was directed to incorporate City buildings and facilities into the policy.

So, given that, I will begin the presentation discussing the proposed policy from the aspect of street renaming, which would be ha'..., continued to be handled by the Development Services Department. And after me, Director Blankenship will speak to the portion of the policy that discusses renaming City buildings and other minor facilities.

Again, this is the matrix of the, the research Staff conducted on other municipalities and how they handle this process. And this table here highlights the changes that have been made between the existing policy and the proposal. I'm gonna highlight those.

So, Guideline 1, the individual must have achieved... And again, this is related to commemorative street renaming. This policy also covers renaming of new streets. What happens during the development process when streets are extended and things of that nature, but this relates to when someone applies to give a commemorative name to the street, which doesn't change the hard address or the postal address of the street.

But one, the individual must have achieved local or national prominence and have been deceased for no less than five years. That's in the current policy. In this proposal. That's been changed to having been deceased no less than two years.

The second is, a street may be named after a living persons, only if City Council determines that they have met the criteria for exceptional circumstances. That's in the current policy. And what's proposed now, we have a more fleshed out criteria that's in the Attachment 1 in the Resolution that describes the criteria that Staff will evaluate the application to advise the Board based on multiple questions so that you all can determine whether you believe that person meets the, the standards for exceptional circumstances or not.

All street name changes require review and recommendation of the Development Services Department. That has not changed. Renaming can be initiated by City Council or citizens. That has not been changed. Rename applications must include a petition signed by two-thirds of property owners. That has not changed. It is in the existing Resolution.

The application fee must be paid before the.., before it can be processed and brought before Council. That has not changed. The application fee of \$250, the monetary value of it has been added. That was not in the previous.., or, the existing policy. The applicants must pay a \$1,000 deposit for the expenses of renaming the street. That was not in the current policy, and has been added in this proposal.

And City initiated proposals must include an application. That is new to the proposed policy.

And now, I will yield to Director Blankenship to discuss the second portion, related to buildings and facilities.

**Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship:** Good evening, Council. Richard 2589 Blankenship, Parks & Recreation Director.

Let me start out by saying that presently there is no policy for Parks & Rec buildings and for, for facilities. So that was the basis of starting with this. In the spirit of the, of the parks and the, the facility side, follows the same guidelines as the street naming and renaming.

I think this, this iteration of the policy simplifies and is consistent with the street naming policy and much more coherent than it may have been before.

With that, I'll answer any questions that, that you may have about the facilities and parks side of the policy.

**Chairperson Lanier:** Are there any questions from the Board in regards to this 2599 Item?

Before we get started, Mr. Evans, what is the [inaudible]? We'll go ahead with the comments for ..., from the Board. Anyone wants to address this issue?

- **Councilperson Lawson:** Yeah. Madam Chair?
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, sir.

Councilperson Lawson: There was a section 5(c)(2) that addressed street section renaming. I was trying to get the appetite of the colleagues in regards to if we would want to possibly change that to just sections of streets, where we're adding on the additional, or the recommended name for that.., the honoree for that rea? 'Cause there's certain streets that stretch large blocks of our community. And maybe we may wanna cut that down to where we can actually do portions.

In conversations with Mr. Sher'.., Sirmons, he said for, for consistency and for safety, we wanted to try to name the entire street, but I know that there may be different parts of the City where, where one area of Monroe Heights may have a different honoree than a area in Park Manor. So, I wanted to see what the thoughts of my colleagues were in reference to the portions...

- 2615 Chairperson Lanier: What...
- **Councilperson Lawson:** ...and sections...
- **Chairperson Lanier:** ...what, what item? What number?
- 2618 Councilperson Lawson: It is 'b', 'c', No. 5(b)...
- 2619 Chairperson Lanier: 'B'.
- **Councilperson Lawson:** Roman numeral 5, number.., letter 'c'...
- 2621 Chairperson Lanier: Oh, I see.

- 2622 Councilperson Lawson: Section 2. So, in the section, the, the policy states that it's
- 2623 gonna be for the entire length of the street and not for short segments of the street. So
- there may be areas that may have different individuals that wanna be honored for the
- same street in the communities, for future reference. That was one of my first concerns,
- 2626 Madam Chair.
- And just, also, if my colleagues want to chime in, they can. But that was one...
- 2628 Councilperson McCoy: I do.
- 2629 **Councilperson Lawson:** ...of my concerns with this.
- 2630 Councilperson McCoy: I do.
- 2631 **Councilperson Lawson:** And then the... Go ahead.
- 2632 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair?
- 2633 Councilperson Lawson: Madam Chair.
- 2634 Chairperson Lanier: Yes. Go ahead, sir.
- 2635 Councilperson McCoy: Councilman Lawson, I think that's a good idea but not so
- 2636 much, because we've already started. And if we look at just West 28th Street, that goes
- all the way over to Lake Shore. I think you know what Lake Shore is. And it stretches all
- the way west to National Village. It covers east of Broadway, it covers the Park Manor
- 2639 neighborhood, it covers The Acre Home, the Estates neighborhood, nearby Lindsey
- Davis. And it goes all the way into National Village.
- And I think what you're proposing, we would have to go back and undo what's
- already been done. Or, you know, then we create this hodgepodge that I think, you know, for directional purposes, you wouldn't know, you know, unless you focus in and zero in
- on the actual numerical portion, where one ends and the other begins. But.., and, I think
- 2645 that provides more confusion.
- 2646 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: Madam...
- 2647 Councilperson McCoy: But...
- 2648 Chaiar Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: ... Chair?
- 2649 **Chairperson Lanier:** Are you finished, sir?
- 2650 Councilperson McCoy: No. I still got [inaudible].
- 2651 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** No. I just wanted to respond to what, what he...
- 2652 Councilperson McCoy: I'm done...
- 2653 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: ...was saying on that part.
- 2654 **Councilperson McCoy:** I'm done.

- 2655 **Chairperson Lanier:** Alright. Go ahead, ma'am.
- 2656 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** I.., I mean, I understand what you're saying but
- 2657 they changed courses some time ago because the.., is it 37th Street, A.C. Evans, does
- 2658 not go east over the track.
- 2659 Councilperson Lawson: Right.
- 2660 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** And that was in the old group of street names. I
- think also, the one in Federal Gardens on, is it 'T', 'U' [stammer]? 'T', 'U'? The Cla'...
- 2662 What's his... I forget his last name.
- 2663 Chairperson Lanier: Right.
- 2664 **Councilperson McCoy:** Dixon. Dixon.
- 2665 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: Dixon.
- 2666 Chairperson Lanier: Dixon.
- 2667 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** Yeah.
- 2668 Chairperson Lanier: Right.
- 2669 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** So, that is just within Federal Gardens. And
- then, all of a sudden, with the.., I believe that last batch that was done, which is...
- 2671 **Councilperson McCoy:** Leroy Parrish.
- 2672 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** Parrish and...
- 2673 **Councilperson McCoy:** Alexander.
- 2674 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** Yeah. That, that, group is when it went
- across the railroad tracks and we had never done that before. And I, you know, couldn't
- understand why we did that because, on the other side of the tracks, no one really, you
- know.., I mean, the churches are on the, the west side of the tracks and so people kinda
- understood it in that area. But, on the other side of the tracks, I do not believe that was
- the expectation for it, to go across the tracks.
- So, it changed courses. It was an issue, just in that general area, then all of a
- sudden, with that new batch, it went across the railroad tracks.
- 2682 Councilperson McCoy: Well...
- 2683 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** And, I mean, I.., my house was on one of those
- streets and I was a little surprised that it was on there because that was not my
- 2685 understanding. [Inaudible...
- 2686 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, wait. I'm sorry.
- 2687 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: ...happened to...

- 2688 Councilperson McCoy: That was not...
- 2689 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: ...be on the...
- 2690 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...your what?
- 2691 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: That was not my understanding that it was
- 2692 coming across the tracks.
- 2693 **Chairperson Lanier:** So, what happens if.., I mean, applying your concern, Mr.
- Lawson, I'm on 13<sup>th</sup> Street, and my street goes from my house all the way to.., across
- 2695 Congress. But then it also goes all the way to here. So, what you would.., you would
- limit it to just Federal Garden and not go passed Public Works? Not go across Australian?
- Not go across the track? Not... That's how it would go?
- 2698 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: I don't know how it will go now, but A.C. Evans
- only goes to Obama Highway and to maybe S Avenue. I don't know if it goes...
- 2700 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yeah. To S Avenue.
- 2701 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** Yeah. So, it doesn't come across the track. It
- 2702 doesn't..., it's not in Park Manor...
- 2703 Councilperson Lawson: Right.
- 2704 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** ...going over to Broadway.
- 2705 Chairperson Lanier: Right.
- 2706 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** But the others are, the Parrish and all of the
- other two, I think that..., and R..., and R.J. Henley, I don't know..., is there R Avenue
- 2708 over in Federal Garden?
- 2709 Chairperson Lanier: No.
- 2710 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, R Avenue is actually where the Public Safety street is, and
- that actually crosses...
- 2712 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** And that's...
- 2713 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...Blue Heron.
- 2714 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** ...that's not R J Henley, is it?
- 2715 Councilperson McCoy: It's not?
- 2716 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** Yeah. So, I mean, that's what I'm saying. That
- old group, it was just in that general area, and then this last bunch just took the whole
- 2718 street.
- 2719 Councilperson McCoy: Well...

- 2720 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** And I don't know, maybe if someone from Public
- Works could explain how that changed, or why that started happening. 'Cause that was
- 2722 not the way it was going before.
- 2723 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, I.., my only thing is, you know, whatever it is, it has to be
- uniform. And I don't want us to do.., [stammer] this has gotten outta control. So, if you
- wanna cut it off to just being a block, and go back and redo those others, then that's fine.
- 2726 But, whatever it is, it should be uniform because now we're going to essentially propose
- a policy, right? And let's just take, for instance, if we take this policy as presented, and
- we take the same example. Councilwoman Miller-Anderson just offered p. and then
- essentially, we would need to then extend from the west side.., I'm sorry, from the east
- side of the railroad tracks, all the way over to Broadway and beyond, if goes beyond.
- 2731 And, do we really wanna do that?
- 2732 **Chairperson Lanier:** Well, I mean, that's, that's, that's the example I gave. If you
- 2733 do 13<sup>th</sup> Street, you would have to go...
- 2734 Councilperson McCoy: Yeah.
- 2735 Chairperson Lanier: ...all the way across Australian, all the way across Barack
- 2736 Obama Highway, all the way across Broadway to here. So, is that what would be
- 2737 proposed? If not, then we would have to have, as you say, a uniform policy. Whichever
- way it may go.
- 2739 **Councilperson Botel:** Madam Chair? I have a ques'...
- 2740 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 2741 **Councilperson Botel:** ...a question about how people actually use these street
- 2742 names? I mean, if you live on A.C. Evans, let's say you're number 100, whatever that
- 2743 street is... What is it? 28<sup>th</sup>? Twenty...
- 2744 Councilperson McCoy: 37th.
- 2745 **Councilperson Botel:** 37<sup>th</sup>. Do you, do you use the A.C. Evans as your legal
- 2746 address or do you use 37th Street? Is the A.C. Evans part of it just an honorary, you
- know, designation that people don't actually use? Or, do people actually use it as their
- 2748 address?
- 2749 **Chairperson Lanier:** That's a question, Mr...
- 2750 **Councilperson McCoy:** I've seen it both ways.
- 2751 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Yes, Madam Chair. The honorary
- 2752 street names are meant to just that, just honor a person. They, they don't change the
- 2753 hard addresses of anyone on the street. Now, affectionately, people or, or may..., in in
- action, people may begin to refer to the street by that name. And I believe that's why that
- 2755 portion of the, the policy is in there so that there is consistency along the streets, so that
- one portion doesn't have this many people refer to it by the honorary name, and the other
- portion doesn't have that honorary name, and creating confusion.

- But, I, I think in most cases, people do tend to still utilize the hard street name or
- 2759 number.
- 2760 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** Madam Chair?
- 2761 **Councilperson Botel:** So now... Just let me... So, in that case, it might not matter,
- one way or the other if, if one segment of that street is named after someone and the rest
- of the street has the hard, hard number.
- 2764 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** It, it.., technically, for addressing in the
- 2765 postal services, it...
- 2766 **Councilperson Botel:** It doesn't matter.
- 2767 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** ...would not matter. It could only
- potentially create confusion, verbally, if someone is referring to...
- 2769 **Councilperson Botel:** Right.
- 2770 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** ...the unofficial name.
- 2771 **Councilperson Botel:** Thanks.
- 2772 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Mhmm.
- 2773 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: Madam Chair?
- 2774 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Yes. Go ahead.
- 2775 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** But I think with President Barack Obama, if I'm
- 2776 not mistaken, that is the only one that really has a... an official change, where the road...
- it was, it was changed on record.
- 2778 Councilperson McCov: MLLK as well.
- 2779 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** And, I mean, yeah. MLK, but those other
- 2780 honorary names, those are not. They're basically just up there. They're not changing the
- 2781 name. The.., T Avenue is still T Avenue. And so is 28th Street. So, most.., I don't use
- 2782 Parrish Avenue, Street, whatever it's called. I don't know. I mean, I don't know how it's
- 2783 technically named, but I still use 28th Street.
- So, I, I, you know, my thing about this is, I really wish we would look at how we can
- 2785 honor people in a variety of ways. I mean, is street naming the only thing that we're going
- 2786 to be trying to do? Bec'.., and especially, if we start doing just the sections, we could
- 2787 have...
- 2788 Councilperson McCoy: Yep.
- 2789 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: ...a thousand and one people names on all of
- these streets, if we start doing it by block. And, [stammer], it would just, to me, it, it seems
- to be... gonna get outta hand.

- 2792 **Councilperson McCoy:** I make a second. So, is that to repeal all of them?
- 2793 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: I'm...
- 2794 **Councilperson McCoy:** Did I hear you say that?
- 2795 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: I'm.., hey, I'm...
- 2796 Chairperson Lanier: [Inaudible].
- 2797 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** I'm fine with that.
- 2798 Councilperson McCoy: Well...
- 2799 Chairperson Lanier: Well, I mean, I, I...
- 2800 Councilperson McCoy: It...
- 2801 Chairperson Lanier: I mean...
- 2802 **Councilperson McCoy:** But did you hear what...
- 2803 **Chairperson Lanier:** ....there's, there's nothing, there's nothing wrong with
- having a policy, but if, if we wanna just say, 'Just take them all out,' then I have no problem
- with that as well.
- 2806 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, [stammer]... Madam Chair?
- 2807 Chairperson Lanier: Yes.
- 2808 Councilperson McCoy: Just...
- 2809 Chairperson Lanier: Go ahead, sir.
- 2810 **Councilperson McCoy:** Let me tell you something. The time is now.
- 2811 Chairperson Lanier: [Chuckle].
- 2812 **Councilperson McCoy:** If we don't fix it, it'll never...
- 2813 Chairperson Lanier: Yeah.
- 2814 Councilperson McCoy: ...get fixed.
- 2815 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yeah. You're right.
- 2816 Councilperson McCoy: And, you know what? I don't... You know what? I like your
- uncle, your cousin did great work, but, listen, we have to think about what's best for the
- 2818 City. And you're right. I imagine we ought get elected and get a street named after us,
- if that's the case. Then.., I mean, but nobody really wants to get into this whole thing
- about, you know, we have to determine because, undoubtably, right? The neighbor
- across the street from that person who lives there, doesn't always think highly of that
- 2822 person. So, now you've creating...

2823	Chairperson Lanier:	[Chuckle].
2824 2825	Councilperson McCoy: intended but that Hatfields	a, a rift between, you know, excuse me No', nothing and the McCoys.
2826	[Chuckles]	
2827	Councilperson McCoy:	So, you know
2828	Chairperson Lanier:	Well, Mr
2829	Councilperson McCoy:	l
2830	Chairperson Lanier:	Mr, Mr. McCoy, make a motion.
2831	Councilperson McCoy:	I [stammer]
2832	[Inaudible dais comment]	
2833	Councilperson McCoy:	So, so, let's just have a discussion. So, should we
2834	[Chuckles]	

- 2835 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...set this to have a sunset date that remove all of the names?
- Because I don't that just taking an official action to just, you know, revert all of those
- names back, but should we talk about or explore the opportunity of moving this towards,
- we are.., May 19th to have it all sunset at the end of the Fiscal Year or something like
- that? And be reverted back? And that's what I wanna hear the dialogue from Members.
- Chairperson Lanier: My position, Mr. McCoy, and Councilwoman Miller-Anders is, l'm amenable either way. If we want to sunset the na'.., street naming policy, because it has become a very controversial issue for, not only City employees, but for the Board as well. People have been solicited, they have been [pause] harassed [chuckle] to be able
- to get a street named after their person.
- And, it, it is a, it is a.., a, a situation where it's kinda become out of hand. And, one person says that that should've been named after their family member and another person says that that should go to them. And, it becomes this whole thing of who is, you know, who gets to the right person. And, it's, it's just really becoming a situation where.., it's, it's taking up too much of our time when we have bigger fish to fry here.
  - So, if we want to look at setting a sunset date for this type of activity, then we can do that as well. It is at the pleasure of the Board how we want to proceed with it
- 2852 I'm taking motions and recommendations at this time.
- 2853 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair?
- 2854 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes, sir.

- 2855 **Councilperson McCoy:** I, I, I'm in favor of offering a motion to sunset this. The current
- 2856 names that are being proposed, and I wanna know, do we need to identify the names or
- do we just do all their names with the exception of Obama and... Well, we can't do
- 2858 anything with Obama 'cause...
- 2859 Chairperson Lanier: Can't do...
- 2860 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...it was done by the...
- 2861 Chairperson Lanier: Can't, can't....
- 2862 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...county.
- 2863 **Chairperson Lanier:** ...do anything with it. But with Obama and Martin Luther King,
- it was done through the state, so we can't do anything those.
- 2865 **Councilperson McCoy:** Right, right. But the.., those that were named, we, we can just
- say the ones that were named by City Council.
- 2867 Chairperson Lanier: Yes.
- 2868 **Councilperson McCoy:** And then, it'd be hope that, Mr. Evans, we can send out, not
- just one but at least two notices, to everyone that is affected, that lives on those streets,
- that this name will be sunsetting.
- 2871 Is that ideal, Members and Staff?
- 2872 **Councilperson Botel:** I'm just wondering how people.. I don't know how I would feel
- 2873 if I...
- 2874 **Chairperson Lanier:** [Chuckle].
- 2875 Councilperson Botel: ...lived on.., and I keep going back to A.C. Evans 'cause I
- have'.., you know, Reverend Evans is a friend. But, I, I keep thinking, what if I lived there
- and really respected this guy, now the Council's gonna say no, you can't live on that str'...
- 2878 no, you can't name that street after him any longer?
- I don't know. I'm wondering now, I'm wondering if we should get input from the
- 2880 community of people who live on those streets.
- 2881 **Councilperson McCoy:** Well, and that's fine but, you know, we already are dealing
- with the dilemma that one d'.., A.C. Evans doesn't go across the entire City.
- 2883 **Councilperson Botel:** Yeah. Yeah.
- 2884 **Councilperson McCoy:** You got some that goes probably at least four miles. Or, three
- 2885 miles I would say.
- 2886 Councilperson Botel: Yeah.

- 2887 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, I mean, I, I think if we do it in one whop, then nobody can
- come in here and say it was personal. So, we can't get the, you know, the sympathizer
- for Reverend so and so to come in and say, 'Well, why did you do my Bishop like that?'
- 2890 Or whatever.
- 2891 **Chairperson Lanier:** [Chuckle]. Alright. I, I, I think that, [stammer] you see how
- we've been going with this? This is a very controversial issues, which means that, as
- long as this policy is alive, we're going to have these conversations about who should get
- a street, who should this be named after? And I think that it becomes a situation where,
- as I said before, we have bigger fish to fry here.
- We have new water plants to build, we have new City Halls to build. We have bigger things to do. And I think spending a whole lot of time on trying to figure out who's gonna be named on 1st Street, is something that's just..., that, we don't need to be dealing
- with that right at this moment.
- So, with that being said, Ms. Miller-Anderson, you had a comment you wanted to
- 2901 make?
- 2902 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: I was just going to say, you know, to Dr. Botel's
- 2903 point, when you said, you know, at some point, have community input. And, I do believe
- that this is something we, we don't need to address at this moment maybe. I, I just..,
- there are a number of ways we can probably honor people, but the street names, even if
- 2906 it's, you know, having pavers. I don't know. Maybe have bricks with.., sim'.., similar to
- what you all have over at, at JAYS.
- I mean, there are a number of ways we can honor people. And, I think we, over
- the years, have just got fixated on street names all the time. But there's, you know, there's
- 2910 numerous ways I'm sure that we could honor people and just..., in memory of them.
- 2911 **Chairperson Lanier:** I'd like to make a correction. Someone just text me and said
- that A.C. Evans Street has been changed to A.C. Evans. There are actually two blocks.
- 2913 One is A.C. Evans Street and one is actually West 37<sup>th</sup> Street.
- 2914 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: So maybe we can just have someone look into
- 2915 the, the...
- 2916 Councilperson Botel: Yeah.
- 2917 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** ...the changes, see whether or not those
- changes were actually done on the books. So we know what we're doing with.
- 2919 Chairperson Lanier: Right.
- 2920 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair?
- 2921 Councilperson Botel: And I... Madam Chair?
- 2922 **Chairperson Lanier:** Let me let Mr. Evans have a...

- **Councilperson Botel:** Yeah, yeah. Go ahead.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** ....conversation then we'll, we'll come back to...
- **Councilperson Botel:** [Inaudible].
- **Chairperson Lanier:** ...you, Dr. Botel.
- **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, if I may? One of the communities that I used to work for had a similar challenge with regards to this particular issue. And, what they did, in lieu of renaming some of the streets, they create a, a public art project hat commemorated the names of the individuals and it was considered, you know, a, a piece in a park that actually recognized folks for their contributions.
- in a park that actually recognized folks for their contributions.
  - So, there's, there's other ways to do it. It could be something that you do as a park piece. I've also seen situations where they've created, quote unquote, a Hall of Fame, or, or persons that have been recognized. The other thing we also thought about is the bottom half of the water tank, we've had the discussions internally, maybe that's an opportunity to recognize our local heroes and folks that have made contributions, and the bottom half of the tank be painted in the likeness of persons within our community.
  - So, there, there's a multitude of ideas, in the event that the Board wants to find another mechanism to commemorate the service that some of the folks that have been recognized by a street naming, to do something different, in lieu of the existing policy or the discussion that we're having.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Very good.
- 2943 Councilperson Botel: I, I just had a quick question about buildings. We haven't
- talked about those, and I wondered when we eventually build a new City Hall Complex,
- will the [stammer] will the Bobby Brooks Government Center, will that name go away?
- 2946 Or will that name carry over to the Government Center?
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Mr. Evans, [inaudible].
- **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair? That's a, that's a policy decision for the, the
- Board at the time that we move forward with the project, if they want to carry the name
- over. So that would be something that will be part of the discussions that we would have.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** But.., but then... And essentially, that would then fall up under
- 2952 the new policy. So...

- **Councilperson Botel:** Yeah. That's what...
- **City Manager Evans:** Assuming...
- 2955 Councilperson Botel: ... I was getting at.
- **City Manager Evans:** ...that the policy is adopted.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** [Chuckle].

- 2958 Councilperson McCoy: Well, well... 2959 City Manager Evans: Yeah. 2960 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...we have to do something. We have to act. 2961 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: [Stammer]... 2962 **Chairperson Lanier:** Go ahead. 2963 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: Officially or unofficially. We said we're not putting anything..., do anything right now until we figure this out. So... 2964 2965 **Chairperson Lanier:** Right. 2966 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** ...we don't have to worry about anyone coming before us trying to put a street name in. Right? 'Case... 2967 2968 **Chairperson Lanier:** And, and... Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: 2969 ...we, we said we're not doing that until we 2970 figure this out. 2971 I agree. And what we can do is this. If we want to impose a Chairperson Lanier: 2972 moratorium on this until we can figure this out. Because clearly, this is an issue that we 2973 don't want to be able... The, the existing streets, and people who have fought hard to 2974 have their names [stammer], you know people recognizing their names are on these 2975 streets, may want them to stay. We have a situation where we're trying to get a policy in 2976 place that, number one, you can't please everyone but we definitely want to make sure 2977 that what is existing, we can deal with that as well. 2978 But we wanna be able to move this forward and we have to make a decision on it. 2979 But I propose that we do a moratorium on naming streets or buildings at this time until we, as a Board, can figure this out. And this may need to be an issue that we can 2980 2981 workshop. Because what's happening is that we need to have community input, we need 2982 to be able to have information brought in to us from Staff. 2983 So, I think that, given tonight, we're not going to solve it tonight, but we do need to 2984 solve it. This is something that we need to flesh out, to be able to have a policy that will 2985 stand the test of time, and that we can move forward in confidence and know that 2986 whatever we have done is going to be able to be amendable and acceptable to the public 2987 as well. 2988 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** Madam Chair? 2989 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes.
- 2992 **Councilperson Botel:** Yeah. [Chuckle].

this. And, you know, I, I do wanna...

**Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** 

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I do wanna acknowledge the Staff for working

- 2993 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** ...apologize on my behalf anyway. We're, you know, I know you all put a lotta work into this but, you know, this is almost becoming bigger than [stammer] this, I mean, the, the lobbying that's done behind the scenes because of this policy is, is great.
- And, I just.., this.., and, and you will.., if you go back some years, you will see that l've always kinda had some thoughts about this because it just becomes a popularity contest. And I just feel that this.., we, we.., like Ms. Lanier just said, we have so many important things that we need to really be addressing and look at how much time we spent on this tonight.
- So, although I know you all have been working on this, I just don't.., I'm, I'm..,, I think we need to really just pump the brakes and figure this out before we go moving forward with anything.
- 3005 Councilperson Botel: Madam Chair?
- 3006 Chairperson Lanier: Yes.
- Councilperson Botel: And if I could just piggyback on that. I think at our next conversation about this, we really do need to have a better understanding of how many of the streets go all the way across, how many are just in one neighborhood? Are some of them just one or two blocks? I, I don't know that.
- So, it would be good if we knew that I think.
- 3012 **Chairperson Lanier:** Alright. Very good. Can I get a motion to put a six month moratorium on naming buildings or streets?
- 3014 Councilperson Botel: So moved.
- 3015 **Chairperson Lanier:** So we can figure out how we can move forward with this Item
- that, not only works with the Staff and the Board, but to certainly have the public involved.
- 3017 Councilperson Botel: So...
- 3018 Chairperson Lanier: ...with this decision.
- 3019 **Councilperson Botel:** So moved.
- 3020 **Chairperson Lanier:** I can't make a motion, I'm just asking for one.
- 3021 Councilperson Botel: I, I just made it.
- 3022 Chairperson Lanier: Okay.
- 3023 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: I'll second that. I mean, do we even need a
- 3024 moratorium? I mean just...
- 3025 Chairperson Lanier: I mean, we're gonna...

- 3026 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: We don't really need one. 3027 ...gonna keep having... We're gonna have to.., if it's on the Chairperson Lanier: Agenda, we're gonna have to, we're gonna have to address it at some point, unless we... 3028 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** 3029 What I'm saying, we don't... 3030 Councilperson Lawson: Ma'... 3031 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** ...have to have a moratorium. 3032 Councilperson Lawson: Madam... **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** 3033 We just won't do it, that's all. 3034 **Chairperson Lanier:** [Chuckle]. 3035 Councilperson Lawson: Madam... 3036 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: But, I second it,. I did. 3037 **Chairperson Lanier:** Alright. Very good. Mr. Evans. 3038 City Manager Evans: Madam Chair and Members of the Board, I did get some 3039 communications from our Fire Chief and he said that the names on the street do pose a challenges for some of our new firefighters that are still learning the community. 'Cause 3040 somebody says, 'I live on A.C. Avenue,' and, you know, they're still trying to find it and it 3041 3042 doesn't populate in Google and those things. So, when we do have that discussion, I will include Public Safety into as well, so 3043 3044 it's a more robust conversation about it. 3045 **Councilperson McCoy:** Yeah. Madam Chair? Then Uber drivers, that may be difficult 3046 for them when they wanna go and pick somebody up or deliver food. So, I think we should 3047 consider that as well. 3048 Councilperson Lawson: Madam Chair? 3049 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. sir. 3050 Councilperson Lawson: |, |... 3051 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes, sir.
- Councilperson Lawson: ...I don't think we should do a moratorium, we should just kinda put this Item out. Ask Mr. Evans to give us a few months to bring this back. Give us some time to dissect and have some workshops to discuss it. 'Cause even the policy, and looking at it now, I think we need to just separate the, the policy of street naming and the building naming. I think those are gonna be individual policies 'cause they're, they're very different in nature, where we can vote.., look at possible sponsors for buildings. We can be honoring individuals from the community, for the buildings versus individuals from

- the community wanting to have streets named after them, that they, you know, played an important role too.
- So, also looking at the possibility of separating the policies. So, if we could possibly not put a moratorium, but just give it a few months to come back.
- Chairperson Lanier: That is up to the Board. Because what is happening is that it has to be addressed regardless.
- 3065 Councilperson McCoy: Well, Madam Chair?
- 3066 **Chairperson Lanier:** We, we have allowed.., we have asked the Staff, who have put a lot of time into this and we just need to address it.
- 3068 Yes, sir.

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- 3069 Councilperson McCoy: Members.
- 3070 **Chairperson Lanier:** Go ahead.
- Councilperson McCoy: Members, ;respectfully, this is the fourth time that we've talked about this. So, I don't know what we're coming to do. Other than talk more about it. But, I think we all can agree, and if it's not that we can agree, even from our Fire Chief, that it can... it creates confusion.
  - And more importantly, I think we should all know that we have to be uniform in whatever we do. And, the problem isn't gonna fix itself. So, I, you know, ii appreciate us not.., or wanting to enact a moratorium but, you know, I wanna sunset it. And, you know, give it to the end of the Fiscal Year, September 30<sup>th</sup>, and then make sure we send out ample notice. But we have to fix it.
  - Because you can't.., I mean even from the Public Safety standpoint. Oh my gosh, can we imagine if this creates a problem for, for first responders and they can't get there in time? And... I mean, this just, to me, seems like a no brainer, that we have to take action. And, I know it's gonna hurt some folks feelings but, you know, I'm not here to, you know, I'm not here to appease anybody's, you know, ego, but I wanna do the right thing. And think it's quite apparent, just from the discussion that we have to be uniform. And we can't create more confusion.
- 3087 So, if nothing, I, I reserve it back and I wanna see if I can make a motion to sunset.
- 3088 Councilperson Lawson: [Stammer]...
- 3089 **Chairperson Lanier:** Well, there is a motion on the floor. And, you know, you can always come back with your motion as well, sir.
- 3091 Councilperson Lawson: Madam Chari?
- 3092 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.

Councilperson Lawson: Just a response to that. I know with this comment, sunsetting or a moratorium, that addresses the street renaming, especially with comments from the Chief. But also, we have in the policy, the building naming as well. And we haven't even addressed the building naming.

So, that's a concern if we do sunset the, the streets, are we also sunsetting building namings? Are we not going to name any of our future buildings that's coming to the table? What is gonna be the plan? So, I think this does need some more discussion in regards to... before we make any motion or action.

- 3101 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Madam Chair?
- 3102 Chairperson Lanier: Yes, sir,.
- 3103 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** I, I would like to add that the [stammer]
- for consideration of the conversation of sunsetting, that the current policy does govern
- the naming of new streets. So, if a new subdivision or development is proposed, this
- policy is what guides how that is to happen. So if it was sunsetted, I would just wanna
- make that it only applies to the portion related to honorary street renaming.
- 3108 **Chairperson Lanier:** Very good. Are there any other questions in regards to this
- 3109 Item?
- 3110 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: Madam Chair?
- 3111 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 3112 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: So, my, my support in, in holding off on it
- includes the naming of the buildings too. Be'... not just the street naming. And we say

- 3216 Ordinance. We presented to you on March 3<sup>rd</sup> for you input and some discussion, the
- 3217 Ordinance changes we were proposing.
- The Cone of Silence is designed to protect the integrity of the Procurement
- process. It shields from undue influence prior to the recommendation of contract award.
- 3220 It's essential purpose is to ensure fair, transparent, ethical and open competition in the
- 3221 Procurement process while we're securing the best value at the lowest possible expense
- 3222 for the City overall.
- The parties to whom the Cone of Silence is applicable, currently is bidders,
- proposers, others, elected official, legislative Staff. Currently, there is no provision for
- 3225 City Staff.

The commencement. The commencement of the Cone of Silence currently is when the bid proposals are received. That's why you're receiving notices for the imposition of the Cone of Silence.

Also, the termination. There will be no changes to the termination because it terminates upon contract award. One of the other things that we're considering, or is for your consideration, is the reinstatement of the Cone, if the Council asks the City Mayor.., City Manager, excuse me, or the Procurement Department to go back out for solicitation.

The prohibited and permitted communications during the Cone of Silence, currently prohibits communication except for written correspondence. Amendments to the Cone of Silence, continue to prohib'..., prohibit communication upon the imposition of the Cone of Silence with some exceptions, for emergencies, or if there's contract negotiations during public meetings, or for protest hearings, or any dispute resolution, and for sole source procurements.

The notice for imposing the Cone of Silence, a recommendation for your consideration, is that it begins at the time the solicitation is issued. Currently, as I said, it is now begins..., the Cone of Silence begins when the proposals are received. A survey of our surrounding communities revealed there is a bit of a mixture, but the highest percentage is for those cities that allow the Cone of Silence to be imposed at the time the solicitation is issued.

**Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.

**City Manager Evans:** ... exactly what I'm gonna do at this particular moment.

**Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.

**City Manager Evans:** With regards to the request, or the Item related to funding for Riviera Beach Cares, I, I will do some research with the Finance Director and if that was an appropriation that was provided for in the budget, we will make sure we get that resolved in the next two weeks.

With respect to the railroad crossing on 13<sup>th</sup> Street, we can see if there's any improvements that can be contemplated, but that's..., a lot of that's FEC property and there's little things that we can do. I know Ms. Jacobs is working with Staff, when we talked about a..., the railroad and the railroad crossing creating that quiet zone, and that closed corridor. So, I think Staff is still doing some additional research with regards to that but I can have something sent out to the Board to give you an update on that.

With respect to the corner of Broadway and Blue Heron, we are moving forward on the CRA side with the demolition of 2600 Blue Heron. That's the old bank building on the corner, and the Board did authorize about \$90,000 in expenditures to improve the landscape at that particular corridor.

Our intent also, is to move forward very quickly and aggressively to get an ITN together for the Board to review to look to see if there's opportunities for public private partnerships and some development that could occur on that particular site.

As it relates to the individual that spoke about the res'.., the fees associated with backflows and, and the backflow prevention devices. This is something that's not new. This is something that's been in place for a long time, but we will put together a, a comprehensive memorandum and share that with the Board, as well as the resident that requested some information. 'Cause there's a couple of things that we wanna be able to unpack and provide some clarity with respect to that particular Item.

On the Code Red. I've requested that Staff work with USD Staff. One of the things that we're going to do, is we have to get the shade file from the Utility District as it relates to the zones they have. Once we have that information, we can input it in Code Red, and we can do some geofencing.

But at minimum, what we're going to do for any boil water notices, we will use some snipe signs and put that on the corner of every street that's affected on both entrance points, if there is two entrance points on the street. We will canvas the neighborhood. We will utilize the Code Red system if we do have the shade files. And, we will make sure that, on our social media platforms, that that is communicated.

So, we'll make sure that we do a better job as it relates to the notifications concerning any water main breaks.,

The other comment with respect to businesses coming to the City. It is very common that any business that comes to the City does look to have a conversation with Administration, but also, the elected officials, just to get an understanding of what their perspective is and if it's a good fit. So, there's no policy per se, and no entity that I've ever worked has a policy that prohibits or outlines the communications that selected officials or Staff have with perspective businesses, or business parties, that are looking to do business in the City. And actually, when they do have conversations with the elected officials, in some cases, it's..., they want to hear the vision that the elected official has for the community and, and see if it's worth the investment..

 And a lot of times, elected officials serve as great spokespersons for the community and attracting a lot of businesses. So, it's not uncommon to see elected officials, such as the Mayor, go talk to executives from other corporations to see if there's a potential for coming in the community.

And the last comment, with respect to investment on the west side of the community, that was referred to on the, on the west side of the tracks. The City has spent substantial capital recently with the acquisition of the property on the corner of Broadway & Congress for the new municipal Fire Station. That project's anticipated to be about \$12MM.

The lights and the intersection will be improved. It is not something that is an issue or a concern for us, as it relates to Public Safety vehicles being able to respond to the community. It's actually very common in a lot of major cities that fires stations are located on major roadway networks. It actually improves some of the response times, and actually gives us better response times to the western side of our community.

So, there will be some preemptive measures that will be put in place to ensure that our units can safely be able to exit the Fire Station and return back.

Also, on July 3<sup>rd</sup>, the City will be opening its new municipal Library, as well as Reemerging Center. That's at 2129 North Congress Avenue. That expenditure was about \$3MM in totality to bring that facility to life, which will be the City's first staple, state of the art facility. So, just in property acquisition alone, and investment, the City has made well over \$5MM of capital investments. Not to include the \$12MM that will occur once the Fire Station is constructed.

The City also did move forward with its Urban Farms. So there's actually an Urban Farm that's at the old site of the Fire station 88.

So, there's a lot of activity that's occurring throughout our community, and some additional projects that will be coming to the Board for consideration.

Madam Chair, that concludes my remarks as it relates to comments that the residents made.

I did want to encourage and urge our residents, over the next two to three weeks, please make it a point, if you haven't received the vaccine to visit our vaccination site. We offer vaccines on Thursday and Friday. Walk-ups are available. So please make

sure you do that because our, our spots that we have right now is possibly going to look to close in about the next two weeks, as we're having a situation where the numbers aren't there. And in some cases, we are having more Staff there running the pod than people that are getting vaccinated.

So, we're encouraging our residents to please make a push over the next two weeks to visit our site, if you are looking to the vaccine. We are providing the Moderna vaccine, so we're gonna probably be doing that for next two weeks and then we're gonna go and transition into the second shots, and then we may see our pod close.

We are also partnering up with the Healthcare District. There's an event later on this evening, that I'm sure a lot of the Council Members will talk about Mr. Willie Spence, but we've partnered up with the Healthcare District, that they're actually gonna have their mobile bus there the night of the event to provide vaccines for residents.

So, a lot of the things that you're seeing with regards to the vaccine, they're going to do a lotta pop ups, a lot of events. We're also working with the Office of Councilman Lawson. There's an event that's going on, on Saturday at Stonybrook or Azure Estates. We're gonna be doing some onsite vaccination there as well.

So, we are going to transition. If there is opportunities for pop ups, if you're interested and you would like to work with the City of Riviera Beach, please reach out to the Office of the City Manager or the Fire Chief, and we can get a pop up vaccination station at your clubhouse or a park or what have you. We're going to be demobilizing our operations at Wells and, and looking to bring it to the community.

But certainly, I cannot encourage folks enough to please continue to follow the guidance and direction provided by the CDC. We also we will putting out additional guidance as it relates to the wearing of masks and, and what the appropriate practices are gonna be for the City employees and persons visiting City facilities, working with Legal to get that out. So that will be coming out as quickly as possible.

And I have a set of notes from that meeting from today and I'll provide them to Mr. Evans so that he care share them all of you.

**Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Thank you. I do have a committee report for the Health and Human Services Committee, through the City. We are proud to say that we have finally worked our agreement with the organization considered to [stammer], considered to be called the Hope Dealers. They are a West Palm Beach organization that is now going to be Hope Dealers Riviera Beach. We are looking forward to welcome'.., welcoming them to our City.

Just a little bit of information about Hope Dealers. Now, there are kids that go to Boys & Girls Clubs, there are kids that go to PAL programs, there are kids that go to afterschool programs. These are not those kids. These are kids that need an extra additional in'.., I mean additional support. It has a mental health component to it, it has a therapy component to it. And, it is a, it is a program that deals with troubled youth that, basically, the system has kinda thrown away.

So, we are happy to bring that organization to the City. We worked on it through our Health & Human Services Committee, and that is that committee report.
