290 291 292	City Clerk Anthony: Mad', Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we do not have any public comments on this Item. The acceptance of public comment on this Item is now closed.	
293	Mayor Felder: Thank you, Madam Chair.	
294 295 296	WHEREAS, every day more than a hundred Americans are killed by gun violence, alongside more than two hundred and thirty who are shot and wounded. And on an average, there is more than 13,000 gun homicides every year; and	
297 298	WHEREAS, Americans are twenty-five times more likely to die by gun homicide than people in other high income communities; and	
299 300 301	WHEREAS, ;in Florida, there's 2,752 gun deaths every year, with a rate of 12.5 deaths per one hundred people. Florida has the highest rate of gun deaths in the U.S.; and	
302 303 304	WHEREAS, gun violence and homicides and assaults are concentrated in cities with more than half of all firearm related gun deaths in the nation occurring in a hundred and twenty-seven cities; and	
305 306	WHEREAS, cities across the nation, including the City of Riviera Beach, are working to end senseless gun violence with evidenced based solutions; and	
307 308	WHEREAS, protecting public safety in the communities they serve, is their highes responsibility; and	
309 310	WHEREAS, support of the 2^{nd} Amendment Rights of law abiding citizens go hand in hand with keeping guns away from people with dangerous histories; and	
311 312 313	WHEREAS, Mayors and law enforcement officers know their communities best, are the most familiar with local criminal activity and how to address it and our best position to understand how to keep their citizens safe; and	
314 315 316 317	WHEREAS, gun violence prevention is more important than ever as COVID-19 pandemic continues to exacerbate gun violence over more than a year of increased gun sales, increased cause to suicide and domestic violence hotlines, and an increase in City gun violence; and	
318 319 320 321	WHEREAS, in January 2013, Hadiya Pendleton was tragically shot and killed at age fifteen, and on June 4, 2021, in recognition of her twenty-fourth birthday, Hadiya, born June 2, 1997, people across the United States will recognize National Gun Violence Awareness Day and wear orange in tribute of Ms. Pendleton, victims of gun violence and	

their loved ones; and

WHEREAS, the idea was aspired by a group of Hadiya's friends who asked their classmates to commemorate her life by wearing orange. They choose this color because hunters wear orange to announce themselves to other hunters out in the woods, and orange is the color that symbolizes the value of human life; and

WHEREAS, anyone can join the campaign by pledging to wear orange on June 4th, the Friday in June 2021 to help raise awareness about gun violence; and

- WHEREAS, by wearing orange on June 4, 2021, America will raise awareness about gun violence and honor the lives of gun violence victims and survivors; and
- WHEREAS, we renew our commitment to reduce gun violence and pledge to do all we can to keep firearms out of the wrong hands and encourage responsible gun ownership to help keep our children safe.
- NOW THEREFORE, I, Mayor Ronnie Felder, by the power vested in me by the residents of the City of Riviera Beach, Palm Beach County, Florida do hereby declare June 4, 2021 as National Gun Violence Awareness Day.

- and raised. We have a quick presentation. I know my, my colleague in the State House.
- Representative Hardy is here as well. If we can get that presentation up. I think I saw it
- earlier. [Pause]. There it is. We wanna start from [audio skipped]. [Pause]. There we

358 go.

- lt's a view from Tallahassee. And see, this is a quick legislative update. As you know, we just came back from a special session. As you can see here, I'm wearing a mask which is [inaudible] people were not able to come in through the Capitol, although [inaudible]. This is pretty much how we spent our session, wearing masks and [inaudible].
- 363 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, Madam Chair, we, we got some volume issues. His, his
- microphone is cutting in and out.
- 365 **Councilperson Botel:** I think they fixed it.
- 366 **Senator Powell:** Testing, testing.
- [Inaudible comments]
- 368 **Senator Powell:** We're good?
- 369 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yeah. Go ahead.
- 370 **Senator Powell:** Awesome. Thank you.
- I did wanna say hey to the Members of the Council. Of course, recognizing the Honorable Councilman McCoy, Councilwoman KaShamba Miller-Anderson, Councilman Lawson, Councilwoman Botel, and our Chairwoman. Also a graduate of FAMU, Councilwoman Shirley Lanier. Thank you all for having us here this evening to discuss what happened with session.
- Of course, I represent the northern parts of Palm Beach County. This is to highlight all of the cities that I represent. Pulled out of that is Riviera Beach, just to let you know we go from City of West Palm, all the way over to Royal Palm Beach to the Martin County line, representing more than a half a million people here in the State of Florida. Inaudible.
- 381 **Chairperson Lanier:** Walter is also from Florida A&M University.
- 382 **Senator Powell:** That's right.
- 383 Chairperson Lanier: [Chuckle].
- 384 **Senator Powell:** Walter is Rattler as well. Rattlers in the house. Mr. Sirmons as well.
- 385 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Mr. Sirmons as well.
- 386 **Senator Powell:** So, thank you. We're, we're in the house.
- Of course, just a little quick brief overview of the legislative process.
- 388 Representative Hardy is here. He represents...
- 389 **Councilperson McCoy:** Senator, I think Ms. Jacobs also is a FAMU graduate.
- 390 Chairperson Lanier: That's right. [Chuckle].
- 391 **Senator Powell:** That's right.

- **Councilperson McCoy:** And Florida State too.
- **Senator Powell:** [Inaudible]. Rattlers are in the house. And, just so you know...
- 394 Chairperson Lanier: [Chuckle].
- **Senator Powell:** ... Assistant City Manager and attorney, [inaudible] McBride was
- former general counsel for FAMU while I was there too. So, the Rattlers are here today.
- 397 Anyway.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** I attended the set on Fridays.
- 399 [Chuckles]

Senator Powell: Thanks, Councilman.

Alright. We'll, we'll stay on target here. [Inaudible] Democrat and seventy Republicans. [inaudible]. I currently serve as the 2021-2022 Chairman of the Florida Legislative Black Caucus, as well as the Senate Democratic Leader Pro Tem. That means, if anything happens to the leader, I'm the leader. And actually, I was the leader in charge for about fifteen minutes this year. We'll talk about that later.

These are the committees I sit on, Appropriations, Top Committee. That's where all our funding goes through. When it comes to appropriations, I've dealt with appropriations for the nine years that I've been there. I can tell you where the cracks and crevices are, the ins and outs. Councilman McCoy, you know, you've been through that process with me. Rules, Commerce & Tourism. Rules is what every bill, that moves the Senate had to go. Community Affairs, Criminal Justice. And I'm the alternating Chair on the Joint Committee on Public Counsel Oversight.

These are some of the major session issues. Just some of them. We had a lot of issues this year, combatting [stammer] public disorder, which is actually known as the Anti-Protest Bill. The [audio skipped] Administration, they also called Integrity in Elections, Senate Bill 90 which dealt with the way we vote here, and getting rid of.., we'll talk about it a little bit more but, restriction of voting here in the State of Florida.

House Bill 7051, Police Reform, which was a priority for the Florida Legislative Black Caucus; Senate Bill 54, Motor Vehicle Insurance. We got rid of PIP. And then, a lot of things dealt with local government preemptions, including Senate Bill 60, Code Enforcement; 893 dealt with fuel retail [audio skipped] fuel retailers in the State of Florida can't mandate that you have a electric charge station; preemption of occupational licenses. That goes to the state now.

Impact fees. You will know that you cannot have.., you cannot set the [inaudible] more than once every four years based on criteria from variables in terms of [inaudible] increase. So you might wanna be aware of that. The League of Cities [inaudible] as a big, big issue. If you're increasing by fifty-five percent, you can do it annually, but twice. If you're doing it by more, more than fifty percent, you can do it four times, but it has to be in a specific point periods of time, and you cannot increase your impact fees more than

once every four years. And you have to meet the criteria that's set out in statute. This is another preemption that we saw, we dealt with this over and over again during session.

Also, one of the bigger issues was reemployment assistance. As you know, during the middle of the pandemic, which many of us went through, it was very difficult for people who were unemployed to receive benefits. Backed up, backed up. And there's some people who still, at this point, haven't received the first check.

The anti-protect legislation. I wanted to talk about this because, if you have not paid attention to it, this is going to affect everybody in our community. If they go out and protest, this was something that was brought up based on the idea that.., this was brought up because they said it dealt with January 6th here in the State of.., here in Washington, DC, but it actually started with the Governor during the midst of the protest related to George Floyd.

It creates a new crime called mob intimidation, prohibits a mob from forcefully compelling or attempting to compel another person. A mob is then identified as three or more people. It requires a person who was arrested for a specified offense relating to a riot to be held until first appearance, maybe even twenty-four hours, or until a bond is set.

It creates additional civil penalties for someone who is obstructing roadways, and for you all who are municipalities, if you waive your .., it will waive your sovereign immunity if there's an opportunity where you.., they say you breached statutory duty. And remember, this is all subjective to allow law enforcement to respond to an unlawful assembly, meaning they can take funding from the cities and you would lose your rights, if the state, or the state's attorney, were to sue the City.

Voter restriction, Senate Bill 90. Of course, this was something that was a hot button issue when it came to the Senate floor. This bill severely restricts citizens' access to voting. Many of us in the City of Riviera Beach know that some of our seniors are not able to get out and they are voting by mail. Well now, they cannot vote by mail unless a person who is direct and immediate family is taking that ballot for them. Immediate family goes down to the grandchild, or the grandparent. It does not include cousins or aunts. So just know that. And that person cannot have more than two ballots.

I believe there's also a.., an.., there was, there still may be an instance in there where, if you're carrying the ballot, you have to have proof that it was signed for, that you're allowed to carry that. It reduces the number of selection cycles for which you can request a ballot to one. Meaning that every two years. And it ends at the end of the fiscal year. I'm sorry, the, the calendar year. Limits the use of drop boxes. We had drop boxes here in the City of Riviera Beach but also, if you have a drop box like at the Supervisor of Elections office, you cannot use that drop box unless it is during early voting hours or during, during hours in which you are allowed to vote. And it has to be manned in person. It also prohibits anyone from personally possessing a vote by mail ballot, regardless of the reason, unless, like I said earlier, they're authorized by law.

It also pushes an additional.., you know you have a, a setback where you can only be up to a hundred feet, in terms of being able to campaign on election day, it pushes

that to a hundred and fifty feet. And if there's a vote by mail box, it still has to be a hundred and fifty feet from that.

There was nothing in this bill, we talk about integrity, nothing in the bill mentioned the sham candidates that were put in three races throughout the state, that were put in three Senate races that ultimately caused some of the Democrats to lose their race, because of these sham candidates. Someone is currently dealing with that as a legal issue and facing jail time in Miami because of it.

Police reform. This is something that myself and Representative Hardy, as well as all the members of the Florida Legislative Black Caucus worked on. This happened. We working on it until the wee hours of the end of session. We put some measures in place. It was bipartisan. It passed with every member voting for it, however, please keep in mind that some of the, some of the teeth of this legislation are, are not as strong as they are for HB 1.

It implements minimum standards for law enforcement officers and corrections officers, make sure they are limited with choke holds, there's a duty to intervene if they see someone choking someone or someone doing something that's not right. And, also, it, it's supposed to prevent some of those bad apples from being able to go from agency to agency by disclosing all of this information on their employment application, which should be available to the public. It also allows for independent investigations of data collected on a use..., use of force incidents. So, it shouldn't' be investigated by that own..., their own Internal Affairs agency.

A bill that I was carrying, minimum age of arrest for a child. We wanted it to be at ten years old. They settled on seven years old. That is within this police reform bill, as well as another bill that we carried which was mental illness training for law enforcement officers, which allowed for a law enforcement officer to get mental illness training as a part of their, their qualifying continuing learning hours for officers.

Legislation that we push. Of course, unemployment compensation. A bill did pass. It wasn't a bill that I was carrying, along with Senate Representative Eskamani in the House. It was a bill that was carried by Senator Brodeur. It had a lot of the information, and a lot of the characteristics that we had in our bill, in his bill. It allowed for additional funding for unemployment compensation, extended the weeks. That additional funding was up to three hundred and fifty dollars, but it went over to the House and they would not see that through.

Electronic legal documents. Some clean up language related to notary. Minimum age of arrest. As you know, that was put in our, our other bill, Senate Bill 7051. And the waiver of fees for affordable housing construction. You would hear that, in the legislature, we talked about impact fees. In the changes to impact fees, they've said this is because of affordable housing. Well, the truth is, if we wanted to something about affordable housing, this particular bill right here, would've allowed the local government to waive fees related to affordable housing but that is not what happened.

Mental illness officer training. We talked about that and then back'..., background screening, which you all know as Ban the Box, which is an issue that we've been pushing for several years, which would allow people who have had an arrest be able to get at least to the interview process.

Some of the budget highlights. As you know, the City of Riviera Beach, we worked together to add a million dollars in the budget for the Public Safety Complex. That was a very difficult task. As you know, City Manager Evans, along with our Chief of Staff for the Senate, as well as Chief of Staff for the House, Mat Bahl, and I can't think of her name now, Kathy Mears.

And, I talked with several of you all, who are Council Members, as we worked on these projects. As well as, we did not get the money in there for the critical water main infrastructure, the \$600,000 there, and the million dollars that we wanted for the Riviera Beach water plant, but it's something that we'll continue to work on because I understand that the Governor has money for resiliency. So, that's something that we'll work on together.

Another thing we didn't really talk about, there's money in the budget. We got \$50,000 a piece, for both Goodmark Park, which is [inaudible] money, and Monroe Heights. \$50,000 apiece. So, we counted that as another \$100,000 that goes directly to the City of Riviera Beach.

Overall, we worked very diligently to get a lotta things in the budget. A lot of it was cut today. It was \$101.5BB budget, and ultimately, we ended up with a hundred mill'.., \$100MM budget.

With that, we move on to the special session which we just finished. The implementation of a Gaming Compact, gamin enforcement. Public records, we, we came up with an idea for a Gaming Commission. And finally, the Senate Bill 8, which was all of gaming, allowed new pari-mutual.., allows pari-mutual to move in different locations. Some of our members voted for it, some did not. But, this is something that ultimately passed. I think it was a decision that was kinda made up before we got [inaudible].

That being said, I wanna thank our Attorney Sean Pittman, who has continued to work with us yearly.., year in and year out. Without him, none of this really happened because he knows the ins and outs. And while we're here, Attorney Pittman is still in Tallahassee. We have constant communication. I talked to him this morning. And, he's been instrumental in terms of some of the legislation that we pushed, instrumental in terms of funding. And we keep him in the loop and keeps us in the loop as things continue to move.

Sean wanted to be here today but he couldn't. It was a little bit too fast. But, I suspect in the future, within the next couple of months, Sean Pittman will get down here and we'll get a chance to come and speak to you all together.

And, I want to introduce my staff, who is also here. Attorney Kersti Myles, Dr Kristofer Stubbs and Attorney Diane Andre. We work together in Tallahassee to make sure

- that Riviera Beach has the best representation as the best waterfront City to live, work and play. And I'm proud to be here before you all today.
- And, with that, if there's any questions or comments, we can have that now or we'll wait until Representative Hardy finishes.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Are there any questions from the Board for Senator Powell? [Pause]. Thank you, sir, for your service to the City of Riviera Beach.
- **Senator Powell:** Thank you very, very kindly.
- **9. City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we're now on to

- 560 City Clerk Anthony: LEGISLATIVE UPDATE FROM OMARI HARDY
- **State Representative Hardy:** First off, can everyone hear me?
- 562 Chairperson Lanier: Yes.
- **State Representative Hardy:** Okay. Thank you.

First off, I wanna recognize and thank all of you, the Honorable Members of this Council for inviting both myself and Senator Powell to come provide this legislative update after, not only the regular legislative session, but this special session which we just finished and we can get into that as well.

I said this before going to Tallahassee and I believe that it's true after having come back from Tallahassee, I think Senator Powell might agree, this is one of, if not the most, important legislative sessions that we've had, not just in recent memory but potentially in the history of the State of Florida when you think about some of the challenges that we faced going into it.

We haven't had a pandemic like this since 1918. And the pandemic was not just a public health crisis, with over 35,000 Floridians having died before we got there, it was also an economic crisis and an education crisis. We had small businesses that struggled throughout it, we had folks who not only lost their job, but after losing their job, could not access the jobless benefits that they were due because of our broken unemployment system here in the State of Florida.

But then, in addition to that, we had what's called the COVID slide in education, whereby many, many kids who had to stay home, not [inaudible], but because we, especially early on, were not sure how this virus was transmitted, we weren't sure as to the risk of sending kids to school, so we had kids who were at home. They were doing their best to learn remotely.

Not only were the kids doing their best to learn remotely, but as a former classroom teacher, I can tell you, if you're used to teaching in a room with students live, in front of your face, it's very difficult to transition from that to teaching synchronously, meaning

teaching some students in the classroom and some students online at the same time is an extremely challenging thing to do. So our teachers rose to the task.

 So, this [stammer]... Going into that, we had to take all that into effect and obviously, that was gonna have an impact on the budget.

So, it was a very challenging session. We had very important issues to address. Not only that, I, I like to say that everything was open in Florida except for the Capitol building. And that was true. You could go to a restaurant, you could find legislators in there partying, eating, drinking. but it was very difficult for members of the public, and members of the press to get into the Capitol building to let legislators, like myself and Senator Powell, know what they felt about what we were doing there. And I think that had an impact on the session as well.

So, it was a challenging session, but I try to find a silver lining in that. And I think Senator Powell can attest to this. During a normal legislative session, you have folks coming by your office every fifteen minutes. And it's very difficult when you have two hundred plus bills being voted on to do your work as a legislator, which is to read and understand the policies that you're being asked to vote on and to weigh in on. And the fact that the Capitol was closed, that we had an opportunity to actually do our job and to hone in on the details, which was one silver lining that I appreciated. So, in this session, there was some good, there was some bad. I'll start with the bad so that we can end on a high note, which is the good.

Senator Powell spoke about this House Bill 1, combating the public disorder. I just wanna be clear about one thing. This was previewed last summer, when the entire nation had taken to the streets to protest police violence against people of color. But it was filed officially on January 6th. Why was that? Because the leadership of the House and the Senate wanted us to believe that this bill didn't have anything to do with George Floyd, didn't have anything to do with other folks who had been killed, unfairly, Breonna Taylor, by police officers.

No, no. The leadership of the House and Senate wanted us to believe that this had to do with the January 6th insurrection and attack on the Capitol. I mighta been born at night. Some of us in this room mighta been born at night. But I don't think any of us in this room, unless there's a newborn here, was born last night.

And, unfortunately, those are the kinds of games that they play. So, House Bill 1 is an attack on our First Amendment right. Because, basically, what it tries to do, is it tries to confuse protesting law, as to what's legal and what's not. If I go to a protest and I know that there's a law that says if a few knuckleheads get outta line and damage some property, that the law enforcement officer, the very folks you're protesting and asking to do better, who may be a little peeved that you're protesting their conduct, that those folks get to now call that protestor riot. And that you could be, not only, not only charged with a felony, and not only risk having your rights taken away when you're charged with a felony, but that when you're arrested, you have to stay in jail overnight until first appearance, and that you can't make bail until then.

The whole point of this bill is to chill the expression of free speech. And so while facially it's about quote unquote rioting or aggravating rioting, in reality, it's attacking our First Amendment rights. That passed, unfortunately, and it was one of the first big pieces of legislation that passed.

We had Senate Bill 90, which is the voter suppression legislation. If you're gonna say that we need legislation to uphold election integrity, you should be able to point out that there's something wrong with the integrity of our election. The Republicans couldn't do that. As a matter of fact, the Governor of himself, shortly after the November election, bragged about how smoothly it went for us. Said that we had put the ghost of <u>Bush v. Gore</u> behind us. But unfortunately, we have a former president who couldn't process the fact that he lost and so we brought this piece of legislation that's going to make it difficult for folks to vote.

Senator Powell touched on this. I wanna talk about drop boxes. Drop boxes are critical because it makes it easier for people to cast their ballot. I represent a lot of working class people. Everybody in this room represents a lot of working class people. It's difficult if you work a job, to get off of our job, drive to a early voting location or drive to a voting location and cast your ballot. That's why drop boxes, especially drop boxes in the community, are important.

But what this bill does is, is says that a Supervisor of Elections can't place a drop box anywhere, unless it's a permanent branch of the Supervisor of Elections office. Or, unless it's an early voting location. And they can only have it for early voting hours, which kinda defeats the purpose. You might as well vote in person, early, at that point. And it also makes it more expensive for Supervisor of Elections to operate the drop boxes because it requires them to have them manned as long they're open, but it doesn't give them any more money to do that. It discourages Supervisors from taking the steps that they need to encourage people to vote. That passed unfortunately.

I wanna talk about.., this is the last bad thing I'll talk about before we get on to the good. This, to me, was the most egregious part of the session. We have something in Florida called the Sadowski Trust Fund for affordable housing. Here's how it works. When you buy a piece of property, you need a doc stamp. In order to get that doc stamp, you pay a tax. What happens when you pay that tax? Where does that money go? It goes into a trust fund. And the trust fund is meant to fund affordable housing. The key word in there is trust. When you have a trust fund, you should be able to trust that the legislature will use that money in accordance with its purpose.

So, since 2003, the legislature has colluded with the Governor to sweep, which is a nice word for steal, money from that trust fund and to use it for other purposes. 2003 is a significant year. Politicians tend to do their dirt after they secured reelection. Jeb Bush was elected in '98. He was reelected in 2002. 2003 was the first legislative session after his reelection.

They've swept it every year, between 2003 to 2019. Over \$2.3BB, that could have and should have gone to affordable housing, went to other things, most notably, tax cuts for large corporations here in the State of Florida.

So this year, after folks really made an issue of it, they said we got it. We're not gonna take money out of the trust fund anymore. Cool. The problem is that came with a caveat. The caveat was that they were going to cut in half the money that went into the trust fund to begin with. So, it's almost saying who stole the cookie from the cookie jar. They say, okay, we're gonna solve that problem by making sure that the person who's putting the cookies in the cookie jar, doesn't put any in there to begin with.

And, you know, look, I agree that some of the things that they used to, to fund that money, infrastructure for sea level rise, septic to sewer coverts for our water quality, which is important. Those are notable and laudable goals, but you didn't need to fund those things on the backs of working class people who need housing that they can afford. Period. There's affordable housing crisis. Not just in Palm Beach County, but all over the state and we need that money. We have needed it for years. And rather than fixing the problem, they make the problem worse, and they made it worse permanently. Because that's a permanent change to the Sadowski Trust Fund for affordable housing. It's a shame. \$200MM of, of money, a year, is now off the table for affordable housing.

Let's get on to the good. Sometimes folks get what they believe to be a good idea, and it's not so good. I'm a former classroom teacher. Both my parents are, my grandparents and my great grandmother. I was a member of the union. The union was important to me because they negotiated my wages.

There was a gentleman named Cord Byrd, who said I've got a brilliant idea. We're gonna pass a law that makes it difficult for unions to collect their dues. And then after we make it difficult for them to collect their dues, we're gonna include in this law a provision that says we're gonna decertify, or eliminate the union if it can't collect dues from over fifty percent of its members. That's not right, but that's what they did. They made two exemptions, fire and police.

I wanna talk about.., I know Senator Powell talked a lot about equity, and about [inaudible] for people of color. Let's be, let's be for real. Black folk are under-represented in the fire and law enforcement professions. Women are underrepresented in fire and in law enforcement. Those professions have historically been for white men. Who is over-represented among teachers, sanitation workers, water plant operators and so on? People of color.

So, when you have a bill that makes it difficult for professions that are predominated by people of color to organize and to demand fair wages, while exempting professions that tend to be dominated by white men, you are targeting, on purpose or not, people of color and making it difficult for them to earn their living. We were able to stop this bill from passing. I saw it on the last committee that it came through before it died. I won't tell you what I went through in that committee, but let's just say I didn't finish the whole committee.

We were able, and Senator Powell spoke about this, we were able to secure \$1MM, not only in the budget, but to have pass the Governor's veto in, in their Port of Riviera Beach Safety Complex. I wanna shout out Senator Powell, and I wanna shout out Mr. Sean Pittman. It takes a team effort in Tallahassee because we're all in trouble

at one point or another. And, it's just like, if you put all your eggs in one basket, you're not gonna.., you're not gonna be able to come away with anything. We had Senator Powell, who has experience in this. He's served on Appropriations in the Senate. We had Mr. Pittman, who has relationships with folks in Tallahassee to go back just for four hours more. It took all of that to get these million dollars that we got for this Public Safety Complex, which I know is very much needed.

The other thing is, that we were able to come back with a bill that empowers local governments, that's HB 487. I reached across the aisle with a Republican member of the legislator to pass this. You guys have to have a Comp Plan. Every so often, you're allowed a small scale Comp Plan amendment. The small scale Comp Plan amendments that are too small makes it very difficult for you to make these changes to your Comp Plans so that you can encourage redevelopment. We passed this bill to put more power in your hands so that you don't have to ask folks in Tallahassee and wait for a review, which often takes ninety days or more in order to make these small scale Comp Plan changes by increasing the amount of land area that you're able to do.

So that was the session in a nutshell. Obviously, we had a special session. The special session was challenging for me because we passed, or ratified unfortunately, a Gaming Compact, that we know and that the Chair of Gaming Compact Committee knows not to [inaudible] federal scrutiny because it doesn't meet the requirements. Not only under federal law, but under state law. Yet, the legislature passed it. Because, unfortunately, in Tallahassee, the most important thing isn't reason, it's power. That's why we need more seats. Senator Powell said it's seventy-eight Republican in the House, forty-two Democrats in the House. That means, that often times, they don't even ask us what we think. So we need to win some of these seats in some of these swing districts, and hopefully, we'll be able to have a little more influence and say as to how things go in Tallahassee.

- 747 DECLARING JUNE 8, 2021 AS WORLD OCEANS DAY
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Go ahead.
- **Councilperson Botel:** Thank you.

750 WHEREAS, World Oceans Day reminds us of the very beginnings of life and the 751 many benefits and services the oceans have been providing to all people, in all places 752 around the globe; and

WHEREAS, World Oceans Day was originally proposed at the 1992 Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro and June 8th was officially declared World Oceans Day by the United Nations in 2009; and

WHEREAS, this celebration has brown from a ripple into a tidal wave, with a myriad of activities around the world aimed at increasing awareness about how oceans work, and how they're health is related to our own wellbeing; and

WHEREAS, Riviera Beach, like so many coastal communities and towns, owes it cultural heritage and sense of place to the ocean and it's natural jewels; and

WHEREAS, the intracoastal waterway, Lake Worth Lagoon, and the Atlantic Ocean meet at the Palm Beach Inlet, representing a self-sustaining, biodiverse habitat supporting marine life from tiny phytoplankton, producing the oxygen we breathe, to amazing dolphins, who serve as flagship species for the entire seven seas; and

WHEREAS, world class ocean explorers, , researchers and their organizations, and many operators offering experience on and in the water, have chosen Riviera Beach to launch and carry out their projects and programs, continuing the work of previous generations while advancing and contributing to the protection of our marine world and the sustainable development of Riviera Beach.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that I, Councilwoman Dr. Julia Botel of the City of Riviera Beach, Florida, do hereby proclaim that June 8, 2021, shall be known as World Oceans Day in the City of Riviera Beach and be recognized and celebrated as a means to foster support for those who have dedicated their lives to ocean research and conservation, and advanced awareness and appreciation of our oceans, their sustainable resource use and stewardship for our common future.

And just to let you know that, although World Oceans Day has been declared by the U.N. as June 8th, we will be broadcasting some videos that day from local ocean related organizations, such as the dolphin research tour groups, Loggerhead Marine Life, Palm Beach County Marine Industry Association and others. But we will be having a celebration on the following Sunday, in the afternoon, from 2:00 to 5:00 at the Ocean Walk Mall, under those beautiful blue awnings. And we'll have.., learn how to cook a, a lionfish, which we know we'd like to get out of waterways and cook them and eat them instead. You might win a free boat ride on the ocean. You could help us clean up the beach that day, or meet some local divers and a host of other interesting ocean related things.

Chairperson Lanier: Thank you for that Proclamation. Madam Clerk.

- 789 **9B.** City Clerk Anthony: Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we're now on to
- 790 Item No. 9B.
- 791 City Clerk Anthony: WATER QUALITY PRESENTATION BY MAYOR RONNIE
- 792 **FELDER**
- 793 **City Clerk Anthony:** Mayor. Chairwoman Lanier and Members of the Board, we
- do not have any public comments on this Item. The acceptance of public comments on
- this Item is now closed.
- 796 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Mayor Felder.
- 797 **Mayor Felder:** Thank, thank you, Madam Chair.
- Staff is gonna present this Item. I asked.., I had a meeting with City Manager and Staff concerning some of the water issues that we had. So, they're gonna come and give a short presentation.
- Thank you.
- 802 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.
- 803 Go ahead, Ms. Jacobs.
- 804 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Sure. Thank you.
- 805 [Pause]
- 806 **Chairperson Lanier:** Before you get started, Ms. Jacobs, let me ask the Mayor,
- what is the reasoning behind this presentation?
- 808 **Mayor Felder:** Well, as the community know, we had some issues with the Pepsi
- 809 Cola, and just some of our residents. So, I met with Staff, I believe yesterday. They gave
- me a recap of what happened with Pepsi, so I'm asking them to kinda present that so
- the community can better understand what went down with...
- 812 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.
- 813 **Mayor Felder:** ...the Pepsi Cola plant.
- 814 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you so much for that.
- You guys can go ahead and get started.
- 816 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Sure. Thank you. Can you hear me?
- 817 **Chairperson Lanier:** No. We're having a little technical difficulties. Give her a
- 818 second. [Pause].
- 819 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Good evening, [Pause]. Good evening, Chair
- 820 Lanier, other Councilpersons in your respective places, Mayor Felder, City Manager

Evans, Attorney Wynn. For the record, my name is Deirdre Jacobs and I'm the Assistant City Manager here with the City of Riviera Beach.

At the request of the.., of Mayor Felder...

Chairperson Lanier: Can you speak up a little louder?

Assistant City Manager Jacobs: Sure.

At the request of Mayor Felder, Staff was asked to put a short presentation together that would address some of the water quality issues here in the City of Riviera Beach, and to just talk briefly about some of the improvements that are taking place over on..., over at the plant. We met with the Mayor on yesterday to discuss some of the issues that he had that dealt with the plant. And, he asked that, in follow up to that, that we make a presentation to the Board and to the public.

So with that said, in my capacity as Acting Executive Director there, Mr. Pinkney, Melvin Pinkney, who is the newest member of our team. He's the water treatment plant Superintendent, Dr. Anthony Williams, is the Compliance Manager there, and of course, Nigel Grace is the USD's..., one of our consultants that helps us out in terms of assisting with some of the improvements and the development opportunities that are on the rise.

So, we put together a short pre'.., PowerPoint presentation for you this evening, just to go over, briefly, some of the, the facts that, that are occurring over at the District.

Slide please.

This simply is the short agenda that details what we're gonna discuss with you today, starting with an overview of the Utility District. And it, it will end with any questions that you may have of us, as a, as a team. Next slide.

The Riviera Beach Utility District was formed in 2004. It was formed in 2004 with a population in 1958 of approximately 13,000 persons. We know now that we have a customer base of a little over 42,000 persons we serve in terms of water, the municipal limits of the City of Riviera Beach, Gramercy Park, Palm Beach Shores. And we also provide sewer collection services for the Town of Mangonia Park.

The Staff at the District totals fifty-seven persons. There are five divisions. Right now, we have eleven vacancies, primarily in water distribution and collection, with a capital projects budget of about \$56MM, and an operating budget of about \$30MM. Next slide.

- [Inaudible comment]
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Oh, that's right.
- Assistant City Manager Jacobs: So, with regard to the existing treatment initiatives that are taking place over at the plant, right now, we have a little over \$13MM in improvements that are going on as we speak. It is our hope and expectation that they'll
- be done some time in the spring of 2022. Many of them are in.., they were put in place

as a result of the Consent Order, as well as ways in which that we can improve the quality of the water that we provide to our, our customers.

Nigel Grace, from Brown and Caldwell, has been extremely instrumental in helping us to come forth with the improvements to our system. So, he's gonna present to you all of the existing treatment initiatives that are ongoing at the plant.

Mr. N. Grace: Thank you. Nigel Grace with Brown and Caldwell.

At first, I'd like to, to really congratulate this Council because, you know, you, you recognized the fact that you have an aging treatment plant that, you know, went for many years without adequate investment into it. And, everything that I've seen that Staff has brought before you to, to improve the performance and quality of, of the drinking water produced at that facility, this Board has taken action in, in approving.

So, as a result of that, you currently have two contractors working on this site, on multiple projects. Right? The, the, the.., the treatment plant is largely a collection of chemical feed systems that interact with the water to produce treatment objectives. Your existing plant does not have any of the controls or, or, or performance characteristics that would allow the plant to operate in a consistent, reliable manner.

Thee treatment investments are essentially going to give the operation Staff the tools needed to determine the appropriate level of treatment, operate the plant, you know, in a consistent ma'.., in a manner consistent with, with the, the objectives, and to maintain that with some level of consistency that would eliminate the swings in, in water quality that's, that's been plaquing the plant.

You also have significant.., to, to liken it to an old car, just imagine you had a twenty-five year old car that went a couple decades without adequate investments, didn't get through all the service checks, et. cetera and now things are beginning to fail. You know? One minute it's a transmission, the next minute it's.., it's something else. Right? And as you're fixing things, more things are breaking.

Well, the, the \$13MM that Ms. Jacobs indicated is, is r rather comprehensive for this plant. It won't fix everything, but it's going after the things that will give the operation Staff the tools needed to really get the best out of what that plant is able to deliver for the public. So that's where things are at, at this point in time.

The, the next slide that you'll see, highlights the, the key improvements that are being done by these two contractors. And again, you can see the chemical feed systems within this plant is largely the target of the improvements. Primor is, is addressing the lime feed system, as well as the carbon dioxide feed system. Those feed systems...

Chairperson Lanier: Mr. Nigel, when you say chemical feed systems, what does that mean?

894 Mr. N. Grace: Yes.

So, you, you..., you pull water out of the ground and in the process of treating it, you apply difficult chemicals, each of which has a specific treatment objective. Right? Like, for instance, lime. Your lime is used to soften the water. You add lime to the water and it pulls the natural hardness that's in the water, out of the water. Right?

The existing feed system is antiquated. Multiple decades old. It's a dinosaur. Right? So, you're getting a brand new system with all the modernized controls and capabilities for that. In addition to that, you're getting a recarbonation system. Recarbonation just means you're adding carbon dioxide to the water. Every time you pop a soda can, that effervescence, that's carbon dioxide. You're gonna be doing exactly the same thing to your water on a much larger scale than what you'd have in a soda can.

And what that carbon dioxide does, it allows you to regulate the pH of the water leaving the plant has a number of important chemistry type of, of benefits. You don't have that capability today. It doesn't exist within that plant, so it limits your ability to, to treat the water adequately because the pH is an important polymer to control, that capability doesn't exist.

In addition to that, GlobalTech, they're putting in a brand new disinfection system, eliminating the, the use of gas chlorine. They're adding a polymer feed system that will improve the performance [inaudible] process. It will reduce the amount of lime. In the process of softening the water, you create, it looks like talcum powder. Right? But it's really small particles of calcium carbonate. This is the same calcium carbonate many people take as a dietary supplement. It's in your medicine cabinet there.

But, but, but this is a real fine colloidal, you know, set of particles dispersing the water. The purpose of the filtration process is to remove those particles. Right? And, and this polymer feed system will aid in the removal of, of the, the calcium carbonate particles. So each of these chemical feed systems does something different. You know? That collectively work together to produce a, a desirable quality of water.

In addition to that, beyond the initial suite of improvements that was initially undertaken when both of these contractors was hired some time ago, the City has identified additional priorities in the plant. And, this Board has approved modifications to the respective contracts to enable these contractors to do additional improvements. One recently approved project was the rehabilitation of your filters. Right? So, your filters is, essentially, the last barrier. Right? Any fine particles that, that your, your lime softening process.., escapes the lime softening process is captured there.

So, the, the.., again, those filters, they're, they're dated, they're old. [Stammer] there's a lot of things just don't work right. This.., one of these two contractors is gonna go in and replace the [inaudible] and replace a lot of the, the peripherals in the filtration system to improve your performance of that. So, there are a number of complimentary improvements that are being done in the plant, as we speak. Right? That will ultimately produce a better water quality experience. Right?

You're, you're still gonna have lime softening technology. It's still 1950s and beyond technology, but you're gonna get better performance out of the plant that you

- have. Right? And that's what this \$13MM that Ms. Jacobs described is, is really targeting.
- You know? Going and getting the best performance that you can out of the plant. Within
- 938 reason.
- Because, of course, the intention is to replace this facility so you can't go
- overboard. But there's a certain amount of domino effects. You can't just replace one or
- two things. You kind have to get the key.., the key components needed to keep the car
- 942 running. Right? You can put in a brand new transmission, but if you lose some other
- oritical component, the car is still not gonna have mobility.
- 944 Chairperson Lanier: Okay. Dr. Botel...
- 945 **Councilperson Botel:** Madam Chair?
- 946 **Chairperson Lanier:** ...you have a question?
- 947 **Councilperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 948 **Chairperson Lanier:** Go ahead.
- 949 **Councilperson Botel:** Thank you.
- So, you said.., you used the ultimately. [Chuckle]. That's my question. When can
- 951 I say to people, 'The work is done. The water is better.'?
- 952 **Mr. N. Grace:** Okay. So, so.., the, the work is gonna be progressively
- completed between the latter pater of this summer and next spring. Right? Again, we..,
- let's say the contractors are working on ten different things.. They're all not gonna be
- completed at the same end point. Right? So, at different times, over the next, let's say
- the next year, right? Less than a year. Over the next eight months to ten months, different
- 957 improvements are gonna kick in and progressively you'll have a better domain of
- 958 [inaudible].
- 959 **Councilperson Botel:** I have one more. So, is there any reason why the water at
- 960 Woodbine... I.., there's a, a local way that people communicate, Nextdoor. I don't know
- if you're familiar with it, but a lot of people have... on Nextdoor have been complaining
- about their water. And many of them live over in Woodbine. Is their water any different
- 963 from the rest of the City? For any reason? Or...
- 964 **Mr. N. Grace**: What's the nature of the complaints?
- 965 **Councilperson Botel:** [Stammer] they vary. The color, the, the.., mostly the color, I
- 966 guess.
- 967 **Mr. N. Grace:** Mostly the color.
- 968 **Councilperson Botel:** Some people just...
- 969 Mr. N. Grace: Yeah.

- **Councilperson Botel:** ...say it doesn't smell right, but the color I would say is the
- 971 biggest complaint.
- **Mr. N. Grace:** Yeah.
- **Councilperson Botel:** So when, when will that be addressed?
- **Mr. N. Grace:** So, well, these, these improvements... Let's back up a little bit. You
- know, the color is in inherent to the characteristics that are tied to the groundwater supply
- 976 that you have. Right? More South Florida Utilities, they have the same color water.

Your lime softening technology is fairly limited in its ability to reduce [inaudible]. Right? That's one of the benefits of going to the membrane treatment. What you need to do with this plant, and the improvements that we're making here, is achieve a much higher degree of consistency with performance. It still won't be bottled water quality, obviously. But, but you're not gonna have higher color one day, lower color the next. You know? And, and that variability.., you know, a lot of people are sensitive to change. Right? If you, if you maintain a fairly consistent color, that's one thing. When it starts varying, right? That's when you have a different outcome.

Another thing that the City is, is doing, they're in the process of doing a condition assessment of the well field. And, you know, with, with, you know, most people in the operations business, you know that no two wells are identical. Right? You, you have twenty-seven wells and each of them has its own little idiosyncrasies and characteristics.

Once you get more of your wells in better operating condition, then the City will also have the flexibility to select the wells that are more favorable, in terms of color. Right? To, to more consistently operate wells that produce a better outcome at the plant.

So there are a number of things coming together. You will see, towards the end of the year, you will start seeing improvements. The work that Primor is, is doing, which is tied to the carbon dioxide feed system and the lime feed system, those are two important components. Every time your existing lime system goes out of operation or gets into a funk, for whatever reason, it has a direct and immediate impact on color. Right? With this new system, you should, you should.., you know, much of that variability should go away.

- **Chairperson Lanier:** Okay. Go ahead.
- **Councilperson Botel:** And just, just so that people listening at home and people
- here will know, the color comes from what? And, and is there any problem drinking it?
- 1002 The color...

- **Mr. N. Grace**: No.
- **Councilperson Botel:** What, what causes the color to be...
- **Mr. N. Grace:** So, so...
- 1006 Councilperson Botel: ...yellow?

- 1007 **Mr. N. Grace:** ...so the color is basically the, the end product of vegetative matter
- that has dissolved and become a part of the water for eons. This, this geologic era.
- Right? And it's millennia old. [Chuckle]. And it, it.., the technical terminology used for
- this substance is, is phthalic and humic acids. Right? It's gonna reduce the just basic...
- basic organic material. There's no known public health hazards associated. It's common
- 1012 to South Florida groundwaters. South Florida groundwaters are relatively unique to many
- groundwater sort in the United States, most of which don't have this particular issue.
- 1014 So, those substances, in and of themselves, [stammer] doesn't po'.., it's an
- 1015 aesthetic concern.
- 1016 Councilperson Botel: Yeah.
- 1017 **Mr. N. Grace:** Right? But, it's not a public health concern.
- 1018 **Councilperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 1019 Assistant City Manager Jacobs: Madam Chair?
- 1020 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair?
- 1021 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 1022 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Dr. Botel, in follow up to your question, I, I
- wanted to ask Dr. Williams if he could provide for you information with regard to the water
- being safe.
- 1025 Councilperson McCoy: So, can I ask a question of...
- 1026 **Chairperson Lanier:** Wait. Let me.., let her, let her, let her finish, sir. Let her finish.
- There was a question, responding to Dr. Botel. Let them finish. Go ahead, sir.
- 1028 **Dr. Williams:** Good evening. My name is Dr. Williams. I'm the Compliance
- 1029 Officer over at USD.
- 1030 When it comes to the color, as Mr. Grace has stated, color is a secondary
- 1031 contaminate, which means that the United States EPA, they do not look at it as something
- that affects our health.

When it comes to our monthly compliance, here in the City, I can assure everyone, that we are compliant. We do test, every month, we te'..., we sample forty-two sites on a regular basis. And that's not including our raw water wells. When we do sample these wells, we have to report these results to the Department of Health and all of the results always come out absent. Total chloroform is natural in drinking water. So the EPA does allow you to have up to five percent. However, we don't exceed that. We are usually, or always, within the limits so that we don't ever get any citations or any... get in any trouble

with the, the Department of Health.

Our public water supply is safe. The quality of it is at its best. And again, I can assure everyone that, based on the testing that we do every month, we do test every day,

- the, the drinking water supply. And, we do go out every month. And we have all of this
- 1044 documented.
- 1045 **Chairperson Lanier:** Alright. Very good. Thank you.
- 1046 Councilman McCoy, you had a question?
- 1047 **Councilperson McCoy:** Yes. So, to clarify Mr. Grace, you spoke of color. And, you
- know, Councilwoman Botel, are we speaking of the tint that's associated with the lime
- softening process? The light greenish tint?
- 1050 **Councilperson Botel:** Yeah...
- 1051 **Mr. N. Grace:** [Inaudible]...
- 1052 **Councilperson McCoy:** Or are we speaking of the cloudiness and the clarity?
- 1053 **Mr. N. Grace:** I'm, I'm speaking of the tint. It's...
- 1054 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.
- 1055 **Mr. N. Grace:** ...kind of a, a pale tea color tint.
- 1056 Councilperson Botel: Right.
- 1057 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. So, well, that would be an explanation for, excuse me,
- for the, the color or what you described as the tint. But, what about the cloudiness and
- the content of the water? Because I've seen certain cases where appears to be actual
- particles in the water.
- 1061 **Mr. N. Grace:** Yes. Those, those particles are the calcium ca'.., I'm assuming the
- par'.., the particles, I haven't looked at what you've [stammer] precisely seen, but any
- cloudiness you'd see in the water will be due to remnants of the calcium carbonate that
- is, is removed from the raw water as part of the treatment process. If.., it, it depends on
- where you see those particles. Right? But, the.., to the extent that particles escape the
- filtration process, then, then that will be calcium carbonate particles that you see.
- 1067 **Councilperson McCoy:** Follow up.
- 1068 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yeah. One more question then we're gonna let them finish
- their presentation. Go ahead.
- 1070 **Councilperson McCoy:** I wanna get clarity because he said a few things. So, if you'll
- 1071 allow me...
- 1072 **Chairperson Lanier:** You have another question. Go ahead, sir.
- 1073 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Well, I thought I have ten minutes. No?
- 1074 **Chairperson Lanier:** Go ahead, sir.
- 1075 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Well let me... You mind if I start my timer?

- 1076 Chairperson Lanier: You have one que'.., you have one question to ask. Go
- 1077 ahead, sir. l...
- 1078 Councilperson McCoy: Well...
- 1079 **Chairperson Lanier:** ...want them to finish their presentation.
- 1080 Councilperson McCoy: Well, I thought we...
- 1081 **Chairperson Lanier:** You can ask...
- 1082 **Councilperson McCoy:** ...were gonna address...
- 1083 **Chairperson Lanier:** ...as many questions as you would like. They're in the middle
- of their presentation, and I want you to go ahead and get your question out so they can
- 1085 finish.
- 1086 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. Well that answer was not clarification. So, Mr. Grace
- and Mr. Williams, speaking to the calcium carbonate, is there a EPA testing on the
- 1088 allowable amount of calcium carbonate?
- 1089 **Mr. N. Grace:** Yes. Okay. So, calcium carbonate, as, as was just indicated, is a
- 1090 secondary consequent. It's not a regulated contaminate. There's no public health
- outcome. The only reason why you have the existing lime softening plant is to reduce
- calcium carbonate, but it's purely discretionary.
- If you were to go to central Florida, very few of the water Utilities in central Florida remove calcium carbonate. Same groundwater. Right? And if you notice, you go to a hotel there, the water tends to be a little harder, your, your soap takes a little bit more to soap..., soap up. You know? Their calcium carbonate level is in the hundreds. Right?

 Because, they do not have treatment to remove it.
- Here in South Florida, and again, it's just the way the Utility [inaudible] is purely discretionary. You have a treatment plant designed to remove calcium carbonate. Right? So, it, it's, its.., removal of calcium carbonate is not a public health issue, it's not a mandatory requirement. It's discretionary. Your customers are used to it, you, you want to do it on a consistent basis.
- If you have any [inaudible] treatment where the hardness goes up, you know, a little bit or is lower, it's, it's purely an aesthetic. Customer perception. But, but there's no public health outcome associated with that.
- 1106 **Chairperson Lanier:** Okay. Thank you. You can go ahead and finish your presentation.
- 1108 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, can I ask another question?
- 1109 **Chairperson Lanier:** No. No. no. No. no. We're gonna finish the presentation. Let
- them get everything out. Because the questions that you're asking may be a part of their

1111 presentation.

- So, let me let them finish.
- 1113 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.

- **Chairperson Lanier:** Go ahead, sir.
- **Mr. N. Grace:** Okay. So, I, I think I'll just wrap up this slide.

The next slide is just pivoting to the future. Again, you know, just a reminder that, you know, all of these improvements that are being [stammer] the existing water plant is intended to extend the service life, just a few years to bridge to, to, to really where the City is going, which is a brand new water plant that will incorporate modernized technology, give you, you know, superior quality products that, that, that will really put in the rearview mirror a lot of the challenges that, that you've [inaudible] encountered with this system. That, that process will produce a consistently high quality water. The technology will provide broad spectrum removal of many consequence in the water.

So, it's really future proofing the plant, so to speak. There's just no comparison between the current technology that exists today, and the technology that, that you're headed towards. As part of that work, you're gonna be updating your wells, you're gonna be diversifying your supply, you'll have a brand new treatment technology with new capabilities that I, I think will benefit the, the City of Riviera Beach for many, many years to come.

So, so that's where we're headed to. Right now, you know, I think the City's been struggling with making all the necessary investments to keep the existing plant because you have to continue to operate that plant in the present, but without going, you know, without spending multiple tens of millions of dollars at a plant that, in the end, you're still gonna have, you know, seventy year old technology working..., working for you.

So, so the City's working on, on both fronts. You know, to, to keep the existing ship flying, while at the same time, positioning the City for the future and where you want to go.

- That was the, the last slide that, that I had as part of this, this presentation.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Okay. Very good. Go ahead, Ms. Jacobs.
- Assistant City Manager Jacobs: So, Madam Chair, this is for the benefit of the Council and the public. Maybe about a week ago, there was an incident over off of 26th Street and 26th Court, wherein one of our collection Staff, he, he needed water in order to mix it with concrete. So, what he did was, he opened the fire hydrant to, to take the water to mix it with the concrete in order to repair the sidewalk. But, when he opened the hydrant, he opened it up in a way that he shouldn't have and it caused a flood of water.
 - So, when it did, when it did that, of course, all the.., in just layman's term, the water rushed into the hydrant. And what it did, it created a flurry of activity which caused the water to come through the pipes at a tremendous speed and it aggravated the system

- over in that area. And because of that, at least for maybe a few hours, the residents.., the residents in that area experienced a higher amount of turbidity than normal.
- So, we wanted to bring that to your attention as well. But, as soon as we heard about it, the Staff went out to that neighborhood and they spoke with the residents in that area and explained what happened, and just advised them to run their water for a short period of time. And the water cleared up.
- 1155 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you very much.
- 1156 Assistant City Manager Jacobs: Also, Madam Chair...
- 1157 **Chairperson Lanier:** Go ahead.

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- 1158 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** ...with regards to the end of our presentation,
- Staff has been working night and day to work with another consultant that has been
- assisting us with developing an RFQ. It is hopeful that it will go out on the street with'...
- within the next couple of weeks to begin the process for us to go ahead and construct the
- new water treatment plant, within the next thirty-six months.
- 1163 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. [Sigh]. Thank you for that. I know that, not just 1164 myself, not just this Board, but everybody who lives in the City of Riviera Beach are concerned about their water.
 - We know that the City of Riv'.., West Palm Beach, in certain areas, cannot even drink the water at this point. So, there.., it's just not the City of Riviera Beach, it's, you know, Utility Districts across the country, in terms of struggling. Especially with their almost sixty year old water plant that we have.
 - So I applaud the Utility District for.., that incident that you mentioned, that, that I was called on, the fact that the City is trying to fix one plant while building another. There has to be a lot of work that, that is going on. We can appreciate that. And we can appreciate the fact that when something does happen, the City responds to it right of way to be able to, to take care of it.
- But, of course, and I appreciate this, this presentation, given the fact that, as I said before, everyone is concerned about, you know, what we put in our bodies and, and the drinking water that we have in the City.
- 1178 With that being said, the Board, if you want to ask any questions, you can so at 1179 this time.
- 1180 **Councilperson Lawson:** Madam Chair?
- 1181 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, sir.
- 1182 **Councilperson Lawson:** Thank you.
- 1183 Ms. Jacobs, guestion. Who did you say touched the fire hydrant?
- 1184 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Madam Chair, for the record...

- 1185 Councilperson Lawson: [Inaudible].
- 1186 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** ...it was one of our Staff people.
- 1187 **Councilperson Lawson:** And, are they permitted.., I'm, I'm not familiar with...
- 1188 Assistant City Manager Jacobs: Well, he's not...
- 1189 **Councilperson Lawson:** ...their access...
- 1190 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** He wasn't.., it wasn't a prohibition for him to
- open the fire hydrant in, in order to get the water, but it was the manner in which he did
- 1192 it
- 1193 **Councilperson Lawson:** Okay. So, what process are we putting in place to make sure
- we regulate this doesn't happen again?
- 1195 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** So, it was quite uncommon for him to do that,
- but his supervisor did speak with him and we believe that it won't happen again.
- 1197 **Councilperson Lawson:** Okay. 'Cause normally...
- 1198 Assistant City Manager Jacobs: [Inaudible].
- 1199 **Councilperson Lawson:** ...I, I, I'm not sure of the regulations of the fire hydrants and
- usage by City Staff, but I thought those were prohibited to Fire Department only usage.
- 1201 Assistant City Manager Jacobs: No. We, we use.., we open the hydrants on a
- regular basis when we need to flush the areas.
- 1203 **Councilperson Lawson:** So.., but, it was just the way that he used it? So the train'...
- 1204 Assistant City Manager Jacobs: I'm sorry?
- 1205 **Councilperson Lawson:** So, the training for this employee is just what needs to be
- 1206 addressed?
- 1207 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Well, it is quite uncommon. What, what he did
- was, was.., it was unique. So, it's not something that should've been done, and it's not
- something that's done on a normal basis. He should've only opened it to just get a small
- 1210 amount of water.
- 1211 Councilperson Lawson: Mhmm.
- 1212 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** But that's not what he did.
- 1213 **Councilperson Lawson:** So, then what I may re'..., recommend is just that we do some
- retraining for our Staff because with this one situation, it seems like there was a, a
- shortcoming in regards to understanding what the expectation is when it comes to flushing
- that system. So, that can't happen again.
- 1217 Assistant City Manager Jacobs: Yes, sir.

- 1218 **Councilperson Lawson:** And, I just have a few questions, Madam Chair.
- 1219 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead. You have another question and I'll let the
- rest of the Board also entertain their questions as well. Go ahead, sir.
- 1221 **Councilperson Lawson:** Thank you.
- Well, I am appreciative of the presentation. And we've addressed kind of the bandaid on this water plant that has been dilapidating for a number of years. I think we stated
- that there's a..., we're trying to extend the existent service life. How long are we trying to
- extend that life and what's the total budget of the investment we're making?
- 1226 **Chairperson Lanier:** Mr. Nigel, do you wanna answer that?
- 1227 **Mr. N. Grace:** Certainly.

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- The, the.., well, the City has a goal of establishing a, a replacement water treatment plant within a few years. Right? Now, to use an automobile analogy, you know, if you're gonna put a transmission in a car, you put a transmission in the car. Right? You don't put a transmission in a car to only last you, you know, three years or five years.
 - So, with these improvements that are being implemented, you are improving, you know.., you're, you're putting in new equipment, right? That's gonna provide useful life, you know, you know functional, useful life potentially well over a decade. Right? [Stammer] so, so you're making good sound investments that are really essential at this point in time, to be able to keep the operating plant going.
 - Where you're holding off is on some of the major structural things that would require a significant infusion of capital. Right? To, to.., you're, you're not trying to upgrade the entire plant. You're being selective and strategic about upgrading the elements to the plant, that will have delivered the biggest bang for the buck, if you will. Right?
- But where you're choosing to invest, you know, you're going all in and you're, you're making it right, to be able to equip the Staff to, to, to carry over their jobs.
- 1243 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Thank you. I'll come back to you, Councilman Lawson. 1244 Are there any other questions from the Board? Yes. Go ahead, Councilman McCoy.
- 1245 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, can you clarify.., in fact, I'm gonna ask that you have
- something like this, I would hope that the Members of the body is brought aware of this,
- because this is the first that I've heard. And obviously, if this caused such a problem, I
- would hope that there's a documented incident report or something of that effect. But, you know, I mean, I can't field calls when I'm not provided with the information that there
- was potentially a problem. And this is my opinion, no different than when we have notices
- that we have to then provide for whatever reason, if there's some sort of precautionary
- measure to boil water.
- But if you some sort of breach in the system that causes an adverse effect on the end users, can you kindly share it to the Board Members, because I had no knowledge

- of what was said today. And I know, if you're speaking of West 26th Court, I would imagine that's some, some portion of the areas that I represent.
- And, I just don't wanna kinda be the last to know. And sometimes I'm the first to be asked. So kindly, I would hope that this is something that we can formalize. That way, when we do get approached with these inquiries, we know exactly what it is. Because, you know, until today, we're speaking of something that occurred last week. I mean, I, I just think that there has to be a better communication.
- So, can we.., or is that prohibited?
- 1263 Assistant City Manager Jacobs: Madam Chair?
- 1264 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 1265 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** It's my understand that what occurred did not
- rise to the level of a formal notification, like a boil water notice. And Mr. Pinkney can
- speak to that more on a technical manner that I can.
- 1268 **Councilperson McCoy:** But it was obviously worth bringing to the public City Council
- meeting, so it wasn't a minor event.
- 1270 Okay. I...
- 1271 **Chairperson Lanier:** Are you...
- 1272 Councilperson McCoy: ...yield. I yield.
- 1273 **Chairperson Lanier:** Okay. Yes. Thank you very much. Dr. Botel, any other
- 1274 questions that you have?
- 1275 **Councilperson Botel:** Just, just briefly.
- 1276 I, I was referring people to the City's webpage to look at the water quality report.
- 1277 And it looks like the 2019 report was the most recent one on there. Will there be a, a
- more recent report put, put up there?
- 1279 Assistant City Manager Jacobs: So, Madam Chair?
- 1280 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 1281 **Assistant City Manager Jacobs:** Dr. Botel, on our meeting yesterday with the
- Mayor, that's an issue that came up, that it would be prudent for us to make sure that our
- webpages are updated with regards to Utility Special District. So, from this point forward,
- we're gonna work on that, and we'll put measures into place where the public will be
- adequately informed whenever we have issues like the one that occurred, that Mr. McCoy
- spoke of, as well as our reports that are shared with the Department of Health.
- 1287 **Councilperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 1288 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.

- **Councilperson Botel:** And I just wanted to thank you all for, for attending the town
- hall meeting I had recently. It was wonderful to have you all there. And I congratulate
- 1291 Mr. Melvin on his promotion to a supervisor over there. 'Cause I know you've spent a
- good many years. I.., maybe I shouldn't say but thirty? Is it thirty years? Thank you.
- 1293 Thank you for your service and congratulations on your promotion. And thank you for
- being there the other day. I appreciate it.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Commissioner Miller-Anderson, do you have any
- 1296 questions that you want to ask at this time?
- **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** Yes. Can you hear me?
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.

Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: Thank you.

I just wanted to make a comment. I certainly appreciate the efforts that's being put forth with the individuals that are currently over at the Utility District. If you all were around, or following what was going on back in 2016, I can assure you that we had [chuckle] we didn't even have ten percent of the information that we're receiving now.

There's been a higher level of transparency that has been occurring with this new Administration, and with the Board. We have received more water quality presentations, water update presentations, than when we truly had some major issues going on, that was truly being hidden from the public.

And, the only way that it was really disclosed was because of the media getting a hold of it. And that is what brought it to the attention, and caused.., there was so much that was revealed that had been going on for several years that no one knew about, and that dealt with a lot of Consent Orders through the Health Department, the State. There were a number of those issues that were, turned out, were very serious things that were going on that was not made aware. So, I.., I'm glad that we are not in that situation.

We do have some issues but, as we have heard, this, this this Utility District Department, this building has been around for many, many decades and it's been neglected for many, many decades. And so, we have definitely, as a Board, taken more precautions and more steps to improve the water quality. And I think we have to be proud of what we have done, because that is not what was happening for many years prior. At least from what I can speak of, back in 2016 [inaudible].

And so, although we have some challenges, as we see, some cities have more [inaudible] challenges and, and more dire challenges than we do. We're not saying we're perfect, but we are certainly trying to be transparent about what we're doing. And also, we're trying to do something about it. And I think the improvements that we have agreed to make are a great step in the right direction.

And so, thank you, Staff, for doing what you do. I know it's not easy and I know as a resident, you know, we, we definitely want safe water. We all want that. And we want to see clear water, not the tint that we see that sometimes messes up the toilet, or

- your tub. But I, I'm glad to hear that there's some sort of measures in place to make sure that all of the water is safe.
- So, thank you all. I just wanted to make that comment.
- 1331 Thank you.
- 1332 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you so much for your comments, Commissioner
- 1333 Anderson.

- comes here to make their comments. And we can pick this up after public comments,
- sir? That's okay with you? Very good. Let us go to public comment.

- 1362 City Clerk Anthony: Madam Chair, Members of the Board, the acceptance of
- public comments at this time is closed.

- Lesa McComben, Billie Brooks, Cindy March.
- 1365 **Ms. L. McComben:** Good evening everybody.
- 1366 Chairperson Lanier: Good evening.
- 1367 **Ms. L. McComben:** I just have just a couple of guick guestions. I'm new to Riviera Beach.
- Been here about a year. Love the City.
- 1369 My question is Goodmark.., Goodmark Park. When are the lights all gonna fixed 1370 over at Goodmark Park? And from when.., when I look up there, I, I think I see a gunshot meter. Is that.., is that in use? Does it actually work? And, also, what was there first, the 1371 1372 park or the speed bumps? Because, the speed bumps don't effectively shield kids who 1373 cross that street to go to the park. The speed bumps are way too far apart from the park. 1374 And I see kids darting across that street, and cars missing them, because they'll go over 1375 a speed bump and then speed through the area where the park is. And then there's 1376 another speed bump probably about five to seven hundred feet passed the park. And so, 1377 then they'll slow down there. But it makes no sense to have a park there and the speed bumps so far apart that, that the kids, you know, can't safely cross the street. 1378
- But, my number one issue is the lighting in the park. Really, it's been out ever since I, I bought my home across the street from the park. So.
- And, that's pretty much what, what I have to say. And, not a FAMU fan, I'm Pepperdine but, you know, school is school. So.
- 1383 **Chairperson Lanier:** [Chuckle]. Alright. Thank you very much.
- At the end of the public comments, we will have the City Manager to address all the issues from the residents who come to the podium.
- 1386 **City Clerk Anthony:** Billie [stammer]... Billie Brooks, Cindy March, Trisha Williams.
- Ms. B. Brooks: Good evening to Mayor, Chair, all the Councilpersons, and our City Manager. I think about you a lot. I pray for you. [Chuckle].
- I wanna start off first with some thank yous. I certainly wanna thank the Mayor for his \$1,000 contribution to the Riviera Beach Cares. We certainly appreciate it.
- And my second thank you is to the Council for now looking at the Brooks subdivision for affordable housing. That some.., a project that my then husband and Mayor started way back when. And I'm sure it had to be a challenge for you all to reach back and get all the information about it. But, we need it very much in our City and I'm glad that we're moving forward.
- Now, I just wanna make a comment. I certainly... Is Ms. Deirdre Jacobs still here?

 Well, I had the opportunity to attend the quarterly meeting that Dr. Botel had at last week.
- And, I was just so proud, first of the way that Deirdre and her Staff presented the

information. I mean, they represented the epitome of professionalism and competence.

And that's something we should all be proud of.

Now, when I was on the Council, we had issues with the water situation, but people let us just move forward now. We were letting this thing become something to divide us. In our last election, so many lies went around about the situation there, the water plant. People were confused. But let's stop looking in the rearview mirror. Let's move forward. Don't just try to nitpick and find every little thing that you can find about this water report. We are moving forward. So let us just work as a team. Don't do anything to divide us as a City. And this one issue almost divided us as a City.

But we're moving now. We're moving forward. As I say, get your eye out of the rearview mirror. Let's look forward and just appreciate the wonderful Staff that we have now, that's working on this situation.

- **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.
- **City Clerk Anthony:** Cindy March, Trisha Williams, Eric Williams.
- **Ms. C. March:** Good evening.

We've been moving forward for three years with this water plant. My question is, when he said something about the wells system, what about the lift system? How often are [inaudible] maintained in the sewer system? Because the sewer system is so corroded, that has a lot to do with the contamination of the water. The water is yellow and green.

And not only that, it look like every other year, you all are updating the water assistant program, to pay your bill. I came over yesterday to pay my bill. The bill said \$63.93. Through June 1st. I paid the bill. So, when the guy looked at me, he say, 'You know the bill really \$151.00.' Well, why is it not stated on the bill?' Mind me, I just paid \$151.00 April 30th. At approximately 2:14. So how, [inaudible] gonna be \$150.00?

And I understand it might be a mistake. So I addressed to my landlord, 'cause she, she's gonna be more professional than I am. Just point blank, simple as that. Because ya'll upgraded this program, these computer systems, first the young lady took my check. She stamped paid on it. Then she took the check in the back. So the young guy came out. He said, 'Ma'am, let me help you do it on the machine.' I said, 'So, what you want? My credit card or my Capital One card?' He said, 'Either one. As long it got a Visa slogan.' So when he slid it in there, paid the bill, got a receipt, a balance of eighty some dollars.

I'm gonna let my landlord handle it very professionally, but I want answers. Because I'm not gonna pay a hundred and fifty something dollars every month. For a water bill. And I know there's not a leak in that building. So, somebody need to address the problem. And I mean, she's gonna take care of it on her end. But I would like ya'll to look into it because I'm not the only one have issues with the water bill.

So it's just not about the contaminated water. It's our water bill is so high and we have not, as residents, got a notice saying the bill's gonna be triple than what it's supposed to be. It's utterly ridiculous, it's shameful. I'm not gonna look back. I'm gonna stay where I'm at because I'm gonna address these issues, and you all are gonna have to answer to them.

Because, there's no reason why you pay \$13MM and some other stuff is not gonna be taken care of. If I'm gonna pay \$13MM, I'mma make sure I get what I paid for. Point, blank, simple as that. I mean, I can call MSNBC and do an investigation. Have 'em come out and test my water and go forward. I'm not threatening, it's a promise. We need to get it together.

Chairperson Lanier: Thank you.

- **City Clerk Anthony:** Trisha Williams, Eric Williams, Mary Brabham.
- Ms. T. Williams: Good evening everyone. My name is Trisha Williams and I am proud to say that I'm a new homeowner in the City of Riviera Beach. My husband grew up in this area. And, I have grown to love the City of Riviera Beach. We have two little boys who have tried patiently and quietly to keep it down during the meeting.

And, I'm here to address two things as a homeowner. First, let me cover the one as a mother. As I said, I have two little boys, ages six and eight. And, I am really concerned about our playground. We live off of 20th St'..., West 19th Street. And so, we are right across from Wells Recreation Center. Well, the Recreation Center, but the playground there doesn't look great. Our kids have been at home and on lockdown now for fifteen, sixteen months. And so now that we're going down the street, you know, to go to our local playground, it really looks dilapidated. And, it became more evident to me when over the Memorial holiday, we went to Singer Island and there was a playground and it look fresh and new.

So, my question to you is, how can we get this playground taken care of? Is it something that we as a community need to do? Is it something that you all are taking care of? I am here to help in any way. If I have to garner support from my neighbors in Park Manor to get this done, we will. But we really need help for our kids. And my kids are not the only ones on that street, we have several growing families, and we would love to have a place that our kids can play safely. That's my first comment.

The second one is, as a homeowner, I know that there are several different programs that different cities have, and were just wondering if there were any programs coming soon, to our area, that would help with things like new roofs or other updates on your homes.

- So, those are my questions and comments. Thank you.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you so much. And welcome to the City of Riviera 1476 Beach.
- **Ms. T. Williams:** Thank you, Madam Chairperson.

- 1478 **City Clerk Anthony:** Eric Williams, Mary Brabham, Doretta Paulk.
- 1479 **Mr. E. Williams:** Good evening. My name is Eric Williams. This is our son, Michael
- 1480 Williams.
- 1481 And, I spoke with Commissioner Miller-Anderson last week just to let her know that
- Michael has been racing BMX for the last two years... two and a half years, which last
- vear was basically a, you know, a lockdown year. He didn't really get to do anything. But,
- he just, last weekend, he just became the number one rider in the State of Florida for A
- 1485 intermediate.
- 1486 [Applause]
- 1487 **Mr. E. Williams:** So, I just wanted to come..., I think Ms. Miller-Anderson..., yeah, has
- some pictures there that I sent him on the bike.
- 1489 **Chairperson Lanier:** There's some pictures about... Yeah. There they are.
- 1490 **Mr. E. Williams:** Yeah. So, he's..., in, in the short two years that he's been racing, he's
- actually... He went over to Cape Coral a couple months ago, won the.., he won holeshot
- award, which he got \$50 for. He was on a team called Deadweight Racing. This is his,
- this is his jersey, part of his uniform. They're out of Jacksonville.
- But, like I said, we just..., it's a sport that..., it's an Olympic sport now and he met...,
- he actually got to meet Connor Fields, which is the last gold medalist that won back in...
- 1496 where was the last one? I think Rio or Brazil?
- 1497 **Unk.:** Rio.
- 1498 Chairperson Lanier: Rio.
- 1499 **Mr. E. Williams:** Rio. So, he won.., he, he got to meet him and that's his goal, to one
- day go to the Olympics and win gold.
- So, we just wanted to kinda acknowledge him. And, tomorrow is his nineth birthday
- 1502 so...
- 1503 Chairperson Lanier: Oh.
- 1504 **Mr. E. Williams:** He'll be, he'll be moving up.
- But, that's all we wanted to...
- 1506 **Chairperson Lanier:** Well, congratulations, Mr. Michael Williams. And Happy
- 1507 Birthday to you as well from the City of Riviera Beach.
- 1508 Give him a round of applause.
- 1509 [Applause]
- 1510 **City Clerk Anthony:** Mary Brabham, Doretta Paulk, Erica Davis.

- 1511 **Ms. M. Brabham:** Good evening. Mary, Mary Brabham.
- 1512 I'm gonna give a sh'.., give a shout out to the vendors that were there on last
 1513 Sunday, sweet Italian ice, the popcorns, the barbecue, that Monday. All of those vendors
 1514 there we leve you. Thank you and thank the Staff that provided all of those who treats
- there, we love you. Thank you. And thank the Staff that provided all of those.., the treats
- 1515 for us.
- 1516 I'm gonna say something because Commissioner Miller-Anderson touched on it as 1517 well. See, Ms. Brabham was in that with the news with our water in 2016, and all of that, 1518 and all of that, and all of that. Every paper it is pertaining to our agua filters and our water
- because Ms. Brabham has it. She shares it with each City Manager, as well as Ms.
- Jones. Pepsi Cola, all of you five Fortune companies in this City here, this is nothing new
- to you. The Board that we have here, has done more in addressing the needs of our
- water in this City than any other elected officials that have sat on that Board.
- 1523 Why can Ms. Brabham...
- 1524 [Clapping]

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1540 1541

- 1525 **Ms. M. Brabham:** ...say that? Because they have only been interested in interested in
- their little pet peeves. They're little projects. City Manager, you as a Board, whatever
- money is gonna be trickled down, we don't want you spending it to the, to, to the
- 1528 Councilpeople up there.
- We want the investment in our plant to be built. West Palm Beach got a bad water problem that nobody's [inaudible] about that, and some of them live in Riviera.., in West Palm Beach.
- But thank you, to the Utility District. Thank you, Staff, for addressing, to rise into the occasion. Because water is life. And I will forever say that. And thank you, some of you as a Board for addressing this problem.
 - Some got in there, that was your mission from day one. You should've continued on that. You should not have deviated to start on other things. You must do the critical things that this City needs instead of putting your needs before the residents' needs. And this will not work. Not in this season of time.
 - Every piece of money, City Manager, and you Councilpeople, invest it in building up what we need to build up in this City here. Not just our City is having water.., a problem. Other cities is building up their plants, because they realize the ageing of their infrastructure has deteriorated. It's just like our bodies.
- And my condolences goes out to Mr. Earl Davis and his family. You have Ms. Brabham's deepest condolences. Yes, Mr. Davis and I, we, we were copartners. He was outspoken, as well as Ms. Brabham. But we always deviated on the issues that was pertinent for our City. And Ms. Brabham will continue to do that.
- So no money, no money will be spent out until we get our plant made.
- 1548 Thank you.

- 1549 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, Ms. Brabham.
- 1550 **City Clerk Anthony:** Doretta Paulk, Erica Davis.
- 1551 **Ms. E. Davis:** Good evening, Council, City Manager.

I just wanna piggyback off of what Ms. Brabham just said. We need to put this water situation to rest because Mr. Evans and his Staff, they are doing the best that they can by putting a \$15MM band-aid on something that we need to take care of. We have a \$150MM project and we don't have any money to get this done, and they're trying the best they cou'.., they can to get this money to put in this water plant.

Now, your bill is high because, in the plan, you were supposed to get tax for this water plant within five to six years. Am I correct? So, that is why your water bill is high. We don't have the money yet for the \$150MM water plant. They're trying to get it.

So, City Councilperson, you know this, Mr. McCoy. So, you need to stop trying to make this a big deal or a political stunt, you know, for your, your, your election next year. You know what the real deal is, and they're trying as best as they can to get this money up. The \$14MM that we're getting from the federal grant, that needs to all go towards that.

Now, all of you, while you're, you're recklessly writing checks to foolishness, you need to be putting.., allocating some of that money towards the water plant if you're so concerned about it. Maybe even releasing your aide, if that's what you need to do, Mr. McCoy. Or your salary, for that matter.

- 1570 **Ms. E. Davis:** But ya'll need to stop knocking on the Staff, including the Staff, Mr.,
- 1571 Mr. Sirmons and all of them. I'm sick of hearing about Facebook, I'm sick of hearing all
- of this stuff. These people are professionals and they're doing a great job, so stop
- nitpicking. Because you're not doing a thing.
- By the way, when are we gonna have a town hall meeting? 'Cause you haven't had one since you've been in here but one. For three years.
- And I thank you, Mr. Evans, and your Staff, all of you for doing an excellent professional job in this City. And I'm gonna give you all the credit in the world 'cause you're doing a great job. You're very professional, you know what you're doing, and you, you people need to stop it. You two.
- 1580 Thank you.
- 1581 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, Ms. Davis.
- 1582 **City Clerk Anthony:** Doretta Paulk, Herenda Brown. No, Brenda Brown. My

apologies.

Ms. D. Paulk: Good evening. My name is Doretta Paulk. And, I would like to also address some issues that I hold very dearly, and very concerned about.

At the last couple of, of Council meetings, there was a representative from the Port of Palm Beach, and he was just telling that he's gonna be presenting the City with \$45,000. And, Councilman Lawson, misstating that maybe the forty-five dollars could possibly be used for the arts and poetry. No. I don't think not one nickel of this \$45,000 should used for arts and poetry.

I love the arts. I love the arts, but we have bigger, bigger problems that we have to solve in this City. So, just like the other speaker said, every dime should go to the processing this new water plant. This new Fire Station we need for our firewomen and men. Every dime.

Another thing, Mr. McCoy, you stated that it sounded like it might be a shakedown. I don't think the Port Commissioners, I don't think Mr. Evans, I don't think this Council will think this was a shakedown. They came to the City offering this money. Mr. Evans certainly didn't go to them. So, I think that when you make comments like that, it doesn't help the situation at all and the City of Riviera Beach.

You all need to come aboard and help assist Mr. Evans in taking care of the entire City. That's what his goal is. To take care of each and every one of us.

- And also, about these community benefits. I think each and every one of you all should dedicate some or part of that money, and put it for...
- **Unk. Audience:** The water.
- **Ms. D. Paulk:** ...the water plant...
- 1606 [Clapping]

- **Ms. D. Paulk:**the Fire Station. And I'm gonna keep talking about this because 1608 I've talked about this before, that you all should.., that, that is [stammer] be basically our
- money. So put it for everybody for the, the welfare of this water. Very precious.
- Another thing. I wanna [stammer].., my condolence goes out to Mrs. Gwen Oats.
 She lost her dear grandmother. Her grandmother was a part of Lindsay Davis. I was able to meet her. What a wonderful woman she is. She always said, 'Dear, how you don'? Did you sleep well? How ya feeling today?' So, I know the type of precious person she was, and I know Mrs. Gwen Oats loved her dearly. And I wanna thank Ms. Gwen Oats, Ms. Alice Williams, and Mr. Blankenship for the things that they do for the seniors in Riviera Beach.
- So let's get, get on the board here. Mr. Lawson and Mr. McCoy, we need to work together...
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you so much.
- **Ms. D. Paulk:**to get this water plant...

- **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you so much.
- **Ms. D. Paulk:** ...and this Fire Station...
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes, ma'am.
- **Ms. D. Paulk:** ...up.

- 1625 Chairperson Lanier: Thank you...
- **Ms. D. Paulk:** I thank you...
- 1627 Chairperson Lanier: ...so much.
- **Ms. D. Paulk:** ...very much.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.
- **City Clerk Anthony:** Brenda Brown.
- **Ms. B. Brown:** Good evening all. My name is Ms. Brown.

I too would like to address this water situation. It, it, it is continuing to develop. I'm gonna digress back to 2009. I've been in Riviera Beach for quite some time now. You guys raised our water bills, you didn't send anything out to any of the residents. Any city or, or, or municipality, or, or, or Utility company, if you're gonna raise your rates for your residents, or people in the [inaudible], you need to give them notice.

Our bills.., well, my bill started out being thirty-five dollars a month. And I live in a gated community. Now, my.., now my water bill has [stammer] tripled, almost quadrupled. How can that be? I'm never at home. There's only three people in my house. We're gone all day. So, I don't understand why this is still an issue and why we're just letting it just, you know, just [inaudible]. Something has to be done about this.

And, as you all know, there's other situations going on in other cities with this water. Now, I know that if, if, if you really wanted to get this did, instead of just saying, 'Okay, we're gonna do this, we're gonna do that.' I do understand that the budget and what you have, and the monies that you got for that is, is kinda, like, [inaudible] and you're doing this, and you're doing that. But this situation is not gonna get any better if we don't do anything about it.

And then another thing that I noticed, like, in the mornings, during rush hour, okay? I mean, rush hour in the morning is usually, what? 7:00 to 9:00, or [stammer], or 6:00 to 8:00 or whatever. It just..., I guess it depends on where you live, but, sometimes in the morning, the railroad tracks, it's like the trains are constantly coming. You know, you can't get by and stuff like that. Even when you leave on time. Like I say, there's a lotta things that need to be did.

And, the.., and, and by our water bills continuing to escalate, something has to be did about that, and you're not informing the residents why it's escalating with the fact that the water is, is the entire situation. The water treatment is still pending. So, you

- know, we need to do better. We need to really do something about this, instead of talking about it, we need to be about it.
- Thank you.
- 1660 [Inaudible audience comment]
- 1661 Chairperson Lanier: Thank you
- 1662 [Inaudible audience comment]
- 1663 City Clerk Anthony: Madam Chair, Members of the Board, that concludes our
- public comments.

- **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you so much for the public, for those comments. Mr.
- 1666 Evans, could address some of those comments that were made by the residents?
- **City Manager Evans:** Certainly, Madam Chair.

I was gonna start with Mr. Williams. I think he left, but that's such a great accomplishment. And, and we're certainly proud of what he was able to accomplish. And I was gonna invite him to go out riding with our law enforcement team, and maybe challenge them to a friendly race. Nonetheless, we'll reach out to him and, and make sure he gets the information.

With regards to a couple of the items that were communicated by members of the community. With respect to Goodmark Park and the lights being out, I'll have Director Blankenship take a look at that this evening, and, and see if there's anything that we can do to get that resolved. If there are some lights out, we can certainly get that remedied.

As it relates to the speed bumps at the park, we can do some research and have the City Engineer take a look at if their appropriately placed. And, if in fact the speed bumps were an afterthought, or they were there before the park was constructed, we can make the appropriate modifications to address that, 'cause we certainly don't want a situation whereby you can have a pedestrian and vehicular incident.

The City is actively moving forward in regards to a solicitation document for the new water treatment plant. The projected cost for that is anywhere between \$100MM to \$150MM. Our intent is to release the solicitation document at the beginning of next week. That is a monumental step towards getting the water quality that we are looking for, to receiving in, hopefully, thirty-six months.

With respect to the water bills. One of the things that we constantly hear persons have issue with, is the amount of the water bill, and why the water bills increasingly go up. There's a couple of reasons. But primarily, most of the costs are associated with debt issuance that municipal governments have to go out to make infrastructure improvements. And the other side of it, is the cost for operating. Every commodity, every good, every service that we acquire goes up in cost. So, in'.., invariably, if the cost to produce and treat the water goes up, and you have an aging, archaic asset, it provides for significant challenges.

And, this Board, has been the Board that has invested the most money in the water plant, in probably a generation. And will be the Board that will move forward with ultimately bringing a new water treatment plant online. So, we will be willing to have the conversation and discussion with any persons in the community, or even convening a meeting, to talk about the rate and what is incorporated in the rate.

One of the larges fees that you have in the rate is the actual availability fee, and that's a fixed charge. And that fixed charge is usually levied when a Utility District, or a Utility is constructed, and that is the fee that is apportioned to all the members of the community, all the connections, to make sure that one generation doesn't foot the bill for the entire investment.

So when we move forward with a new water treatment plant, realize that there is some fees associated with that and there is revenue that the City would have to collect to be able to pay back the debt issuance. But we're looking at innovative and creative ways to help minimize the impact to the rate payers.

We are hearing conversations that are occurring both on the.., both sides of the aisle in Washington, and it looks like Utilities, as well as water and wastewater incorporated in that, is a priority by the Administration, as well as both parties. So, we're hopeful that something may come out of Washington, DC that addresses some of the infrastructure.

I did have a conversation with Senator Powell about the opportunity to receive funds from the supplemental list. The State of Florida did very well this year. And so, there is some monies that's available, so we are gonna go after some other projects. So, we may have some additional appropriations that are coming to our community. But we'll work through that.

With respect to the sewer system. As stated, the sewer system is a portion of the infrastructure operations. There is some sewer improvements that invariably are going to happen, as infrastructure ages. We have a program whereby we try to be as [stammer] as much proactive as possible. But there is no cross contamination between the sewer and, and the potable water supply. If that was the case, we'd be the first ones to let the community know, but there is no cross contamination with regards to that.

And the City does not tret the sewer. Our infrastructure is what takes the sewer to the ECR, and that's where the treatment is, .., is provided. So, it's not handled by the City of Riviera Beach.

As it relates to the playground. The playground is going to be relocated when we look to have discussions with the Board and bring you the Site Plan for the Fire Station 87. So, when we look to do that relocation, there's some other amenities and things that we can do to improve that particular condition.

As it relates to funds that are available for home improvements, or grants. That's something that we do wanna discuss with the Board, and see if there is an appetite to immolate some of the programs that are available at the CRA, to have it on the City side. So we are having that conversation internally, and look to have a more robust discussion

with the Board as part of your budget program, so you can definitely see if there's some things that you want to bring to life on the City side, similar to that of the CRA.

As it relates to the trains. We've had the conversation about that. In a perfect world, certainly we would not want the trains to impact our community as much as they do, but unfortunately, we have.., or fortunately, depends on your perspective, we do have a lot of cargo that comes in to our community and goes to the Port of Palm Beach, that does over seven.., or \$8BB worth of import/export business with the Bahamas.

So, you are going to have that influx of train traffic. The time in which those trains, that, that's outside of our purview. And that's one of the most challenging endeavors that we're gonna try to see if there's some type of reasonable accommodations that can be made.

- And I believe that completes the comments that were communicated by the public, Madam Chair.
- 1749 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you so much, sir, for that response. Madam Clerk, our 1750 next Item.
- 1751 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board. Madam Chair, I believe you stated that you were gonna go back to the water quality presentation for questions.
- 1753 **Chairperson Lanier:** Oh yes. I did. I'm sorry. Mayor.
- 1754 **Mayor Felder:** Mhmm.
- 1755 Chairperson Lanier: I did not mean to cut you off, I just wanted to make sure that
- we got the public comment in. So, you...
- 1757 **Mayor Felder:** [Inaudible].
- 1758 **Chairperson Lanier:** ...can have the floor.
- 1759 **Mayor Felder:** I, I just had a question and Mr. Evans answered one of them. It was
- a hundred and.., \$100MM to a hundred and fifty because I think Councilman Lawson
- asked that question.
- Are we going to [pause] private public partnership with the water? The Utility
- 1763 District?

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- 1764 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, if I may?
- 1765 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 1766 **City Manager Evans:** We are looking at that opportunity, so it would be a design-
- build finance. Similar to that what's being considered for Fire Station 88. So, we are
- looking at that opportunity.
- 1769 **Mayor Felder:** Thirty-six months?

- 1770 City Manager Evans: Yes, sir.
- 1771 **Mayor Felder:** And I know a lotta planning has to go in. So, it can't be fast tracked?
- 1772 **City Manager Evans:** That is, that is the fastest we can probably look to deliver that.
- However, we believe, and when we do have some subsequent budget conversations with
- the Board, that we can conceivably have some activities, some construction activities on
- that site within the year. So we can start having some incremental progress on that.
- But some of the permitting process, all that stuff, will be going concurrently.
- 1777 Actually, we've started some of that project..., started a [stammer] part of the process
- 1778 already.
- 1779 **Mayor Felder:** Okay.
- 1780 Thank you. That's it for me, Madam Chair.
- 1781 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you so much. Are there any other questions. I know
- that I cut the presentation short for the Board to.., commenting for public comment. Did
- any of you have any more comments for the presentation.., the water presentation?
- 1784 City Manager Evans: Madam Chair?
- 1785 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: Madam Chair?
- 1786 Councilperson Lawson: Madam Chair?
- 1787 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, Commissioner Anderson.
- 1788 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** I just wanted to make..., just add to my comment.
- For those who may not have been aware of what took place in 2016. Please go back and
- just google Riviera Beach water, and you will come up with a, a litany of articles that took
- place so that people can understand the seriousness of what was going on and things
- that were being hidden from the public.
- So, I, I just want people to really understand there is a difference in what's going
- on now versus what was taking place over there.
- 1795 Thank you.
- 1796 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Yes. Go ahead, sir.
- 1797 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, and one of the things, after our conversations
- with the Mayor, we are going to revamp our Utility District website. We're going to have
- every presentation we've made to the Board or at a civic agency, we're gonna have those
- presentations that are gonna be downloadable. We're gonna be putting more information
- on the water quality stats. We're gonna be putting information concerning, you know, if
- somebody just moves to the area and asks questions about the water, we're gonna have
- 1803 kind of a fact sheet and things that folks can be able to grab, as well as the progress as
- it relates to our capital projects camp'.., campaign.

And then, we're also gonna provide the elected officials with kind of a cheat sheet on Utility District 101. Because, invariably, you're gonna get asked, you know, ten to fifteen questions and we're gonna provide you those answers to what.., the some of the commonly asked questions are so you can have that.

But in the event that anyone in the community is interested in having the conversation with us or, or facilitating a presentation, Staff and myself will certainly make ourselves available. Because, at the end of the day, we wanna make sure you have all the information to be assured that we're taking the steps to move this particular issue forward. And nobody wants to have to deal with some of the challenges that other municipalities have, but we are trying to accelerate and move as quickly as we possibly can to bring this plant out of the ground.

- 1816 Councilperson Botel: Madam Chair?
- 1817 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you so much. Yes. Go ahead.
- Councilperson Botel: I, I have a question for Mr. Evans. Will, will the information you put on the web include information about when the pipes will be replaced? That issue came up at the town hall meeting, and I, I wanna be sure that people understand that, not only are we gonna build a new water treatment plant, but also the pipes, the whole
- system.., we're looking at the entire system.
- So, it would be good if that kind of information were put on the website as well. If you could.
- 1825 **City Manager Evans:** Ma'.., Madam Chair, if I may?
- 1826 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 1827 **City Manager Evans:** Certainly, we can put some information as it relates to our
- repair and maintenance program, and then our reconstruction program related to
- distribution lines, and the like. So, that's something that we certainly realize that that's
- part of the process and we will communicate that with the public when we're moving
- through that.

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- 1832 **Councilperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 1833 Councilperson Lawson: Madam Chair?
- 1834 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Yes. Go ahead, Madam Clerk,.
- 1835 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board...
- 1836 **Councilperson Lawson:** Madam Chair?
- 1837 **Chairperson Lanier:** I'm sorry? You had a question?
- 1838 Councilperson Lawson: Yes, ma'am.
- 1839 Chairperson Lanier: Go ahead, sir,.

1840 Councilperson Lawson:	Thank you,	Madam	Chair.
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- Mr. Evans, for clarity, you said that the RFP would.., the RFQ would be released
- 1842 within one to two weeks?
- 1843 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, if I may?
- 1844 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 1845 **City Manager Evans:** The intent is for the document to go out the first part of next
- 1846 week.
- 1847 **Councilperson Lawson:** Okay. And the timeline for that water plant of thirty-six
- months, you stated would be completion and finalized? New water plant? Or is that
- gonna be the beginning construction of the water plant?
- 1850 **City Manager Evans:** In the thirty-six month period?
- 1851 Councilperson Lawson: Yes. Yes, sir.
- 1852 **City Manager Evans:** We'd like to be completed with construction in thirty-six
- months.
- 1854 **Councilperson Lawson:** And how quickly can we get funding streams and options for
- funding this water plant? And then also, additional income revenue for the City to cover
- the cost of this water plant? I mean, can we talk about the financing options?
- 1857 City Manager Evans: Madam Chair, if I may?
- 1858 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 1859 **City Manager Evans:** We, we are gonna be having that discussion with the Board
- about utilizing some of the monies that have been provided from the federal government
- as seed capital for the purposes of the project.

Additionally, as it relates to going out to the bond market, that's something that the Finance Director and I can provide you with a more robust conversation as part of our budget discussions on June 12th, because there are some things that the City would have to do in the event that we're gonna go out for a bond issuance.

But, we are looking at some other revenue.., or some other streams of pots of money through the state, as well as through the federal government that can conceivably look to reduce the burden, as well as the design-build finance option that will be discussed.

But all those particular options and what is necessary to facilitate that, is antic'..., anticipated to be part of your budget conversations that will happen here in the next month.

1873 **Councilperson Lawson:** Perfect. The \$2TT American Infrastructure Plan is being rolled out, with a lot of the dollars just coming down the pipeline. I think we will have the

- 1875 money to get start and to begin this project immediately. I like the aggressive approach
- of thirty-six months to get us..., our residents a brand new water plant. And I'm very
- appreciative of the work that you and Ms. Jacobs has done.
- 1878 So, thank you so much.

- 1895 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we do not have public
- comment on this Item. The acceptance of public comment on this Item is now closed.
- 1897 **Chairperson Lanier:** Mr. Evans.
- 1898 City Manager Evans: Madam Chair and Members of the Board, at this time, I'd like
- 1899 to have the Development Services director, Mr. Clarence Sirmons, make this
- 1900 presentation.
- 1901 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Mr. Sirmons.
- 1902 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Good evening, Madam Chair.
- 1903 Chairperson Lanier: Good evening.
- 1904 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Members of the Council.
- 1905 Good evening, Madam Chair, Members of the Council, Mr. Mayor, Madam
- 1906 Attorney and Mr. Manager. I am Clarence Sirmons, Director of Development Services.
- 1907 And I am before you this evening to present the Items related to Florida Sunstar Logistics.
- 1908 City Clerk Anthony: [Inaudible].

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- 1910 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: Madam Chair? Are you all having.., is it his
- 1911 microphone? But it's really staticy.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Okay. We'll try and fix that. Maybe, maybe bring it down a
- 1913 little bit further from your... Yeah.

- **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Yeah.
- 1915 The, the previous presentation was the correct one.
- So, as you are aware, this Item is related to Florida Sunstar Logistics. They have two applications that are for consideration for Council this evening.
- The first is the second hearing for the text amendment they have requested for their related Zone District, and the second is for Site Plan approval. My presentation will cover both Items, and of course, the vote would be separate.
- These are the Site Plan numbers under consideration today.
 - So, before you again, is the image of the affected area, which is hashed in pink. This is the affected area for the proposed text amendment for the Ordinance before you. The area outlined in red is the subject area for the Site Plan proposal before you. It's located within the Port of Palm Beach, between Avenue E and Broadway on the east and west, and Port Road Drive and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd. to the south and north.
 - Again, the text amendment before you today for consideration is an application for the approval to increase the maximum building height from fifty to a hundred and fifty feet on approximately 17.75 acres of land at the Port in the center of the IG, or General Industrial Zoning District. This request comes from a desire to facilitate and expand the opportunities for future growth and economic development of the Port of Palm Beach, and allow for the construction of a hundred and fifty foot high material storage structure by Florida Sunstar Logistics.
 - For context, Staff has highlighted other structures in the area that are at similar heights. They include the FPL stacks at their plant, the Cemex silos right on the other side of Broadway from the proposed site. Some of the light poles also at this site are at a hundred and ten feet in height. The increased height area is a portion of the overall Zoning District and would not apply to the entire Port boundary.
 - The Site Plan associated with this proposed development include a 12,271 square foot, a hundred and fifty foot tall cement material storage dome; a one story, 2,080 square foot office building; a 2,568 square foot mechanical equipment building; and then associated parking for the project.
 - And some items, just for clarification, the material storage dome is to store dry materials used to create concrete. The materials in concrete include stone, sand and cement. The tank cannot be used to store liquids. This is not a batch plant. And the closest Riviera Beach resident is 1,400 feet away, approximately.

Again, in red, is the area outlined for the proposed Site Plan. This is a picture of the proposed Site Plan. [Pause]. Additionally, at the urging of Staff, the applicant considered the aesthetic of the proposed structure at this site and, as a result of those conversations, they created the renderings that are on the subsequent slides. Two designs are before you for consideration this evening. The Planning & Zoning Board requested that a second be presented to Council for your consideration.

This is the first rendering of the, the dome and the original. It has the City of Riviera Beach at the top on both sides, so traffic heading north or south can see the City. And, it would also serve as some.., a sort of beacon for a entryway into the City for those heading north on Broadway. And it has an aquatic design featuring dolphins at the bottom.

The second rendering, Option 2, which was generated subsequent to Planning & Zoning Board meeting, includes the mural at a high level on the dome, and additional aquatic life at the bottom of the dome. It is also illuminated at the top in the evening.

For the record, Staff does recommend the second rendering for approval.

Here's a section of the flyover bridge next to the proposed dome structure, and the building for the site. And, on the subsequent slides are the conditions for the Site Plan before you for consideration.

First, that construction must be initiated within eighteen months of the effective date of this Resolution or it shall be null and void. Two, City Council authorizes Staff to approve future amendments to the Site Plan administratively, so long as they do not deviate more than five percent from what is being presented before you tonight. Three, this development must receive a final Certificate of Occupancy within five years or this Resolution shall be deemed null and void.

Four, all future advertising must state that the, the development is located within the City of Riviera Beach. Next, once approved, this Resolution shall supersede any previous Site Plan approval Resolutions associated with this property. Six, the concurrently processed Ordinance associated with the increase in the allowable structure maximum height for the Zoning District must be approved before the Site Plan. Seven, the applicant shall provide a check payable to the City of Riviera Beach for not less than \$45,285.15 for landscape improvements in the City prior to the issuance of a building permit. And I'll pause here.

In response to comments made by the Board at the first hearing, this alternative language on the screen before you, is being proposed for consideration.

The applicant shall expend not less than \$45.285.15 for the landscape/beautification improvements as part of the beautification of the Port of Palm Beach gateway and bridge within twelve months of issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy, in order to satisfy the landscaping requirement associated with this project. Staff worked with the applicant on this amened language, and they are in agreeance with it. So, if a Member of the Board would like to amend the language in the Ordinance to reflect this for Item 7, this language has been presented for that purpose, if it's the desire of the Board.

Eight, the applicant shall consider partnering with the City as possible to identify opportunities to provide outreach and support to local residents including, but not limited to, programs such as the Youth Empowerment Program, the Reentry Center, or the establishment of a charitable foundation. Next, the applicant shall actively advertise employment opportunities for temporary and permanent positions within the City of Riviera Beach including, participation at community job fairs or hosting specialized recruitment events. The developer shall provide a report to the Development Services Department at six months post-occupancy documenting the outreach efforts to acquire local employees, the number of local employees hired, the number of local businesses contracted with, subject to employment and privacy laws, and the percentage of construction costs expended with local vendors.

Florida Sunstar Logistics shall participate in efforts to enhance and beautify the bridge and southern gateway to the City by working with the City and other partners to provide a conceptual design for the beautification of the gateway and bride to the City of Riviera Beach. Florida Sunstar Logistics shall deliver the conceptual bridge and gateway beautification design to the City prior to the issuance of a building permit. And the final design of the mural on the dome structure shall be to the satisfaction of City Council and installed prior to the issuance of Certificate of Occupancy.

Staff recommends approval of this amendment to the Zoning Code of this District to increase the height and allow this project, only limited to area itemized on the picture earlier. And finally, Staff recommends approval of the Site Plan associated with this text amendment.

- 2071 Member Botel, I was gonna see if you would be willing to accept the amendment that's
- being proposed, in lieu of the check payable, that the applicant would expend \$45,285 for
- 2073 landscaping and beautification instead of providing a check? To the City.
- 2074 Chairperson Lanier: Uh-uh.
- 2075 **Councilperson Botel:** I'm sorry. Could you state the modification you want again?
- 2076 **Councilperson McCoy:** There it is. Right there.
- 2077 **Councilperson Botel:** Uhuh. Oh. So, you're, you're saying that we, we need to say
- 2078 that that ultimate language is what's part of the...
- 2079 **Councilperson McCoy:** We need to amend the Resolution to include that language.
- 2080 That's what I'm asking.
- 2081 **Councilperson Botel:** Okay.
- 2082 **Councilperson McCoy:** Instead of accepting a check. Have the applicant to perform
- the landscape improvements at the Port, or at the entrance of the Port.
- 2084 **Councilperson Botel:** Okay. That, that's what [stammer]... Please note that that's
- what the motion is.
- 2086 Councilperson McCoy: So...
- 2087 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** Madam Chair?

2088 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.

2089 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** Can, can you put that back up for a minute, the

2090 alternate language?

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2091 **Chairperson Lanier:** Explain this to the audience, Mr. Sirmons.

2092 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Yes, ma'am.

So, in response to comments at the first hearing of this Item, Staff drafted this language to state that the applicant would directly make the installation of the offsite improvements in lieu of installing that landscaping for meeting those landscaping requirements onsite because it, it's, it's pretty certain that they would not serve their purpose, or the landscaping would not survive on the site, being that it's in the middle of the Port industrial area. So, instead of them giving those funds directly to the City for installation offsite, it would be installed by the applicants within twelve months of Certificate of Occupancy for this project. They would be connected to the gateway bridge or the flyover bridge of the Port.

- 2102 **Chairperson Lanier:** Why did we change it from the original language?
- 2103 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** So, currently the Resolution still
- 2104 contains the original language. This alternative language is being presented in case it is
- 2105 preferred over the original language. But, un'..., ;until the motion was made, the, the
- 2106 material provided by Staff still read as they did at the...
- 2107 Chairperson Lanier: Right.
- 2108 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** ...first hearing.
- 2109 Chairperson Lanier: I.., I, I hear your motion for amendment, Mr. McCoy, but I do
- 2110 not agree with changing the original language that was a part of the agreement, and a
- 2111 part of the presentation from the last time. I don't have any problem with the City providing
- the landscape services.

What I do have a problem with is, the language that you used the last time, in terms of shakedown. That is, that is not acceptable to say any form in which we are trying to do business with an entity. They are making good faith effort to say, listen, we're coming to do business in your City and we want to be able to, you know, provide landscaping so that, you know, where we are, what we're doing... We require landscaping for any developer that comes to this City. For the most part. When they expanded the Solitron, or the Public Storage in that area, we forced them to come back twice with additional

2120 landscaping.

2121 If you feel differently from that, that is fine, but to say shakedown, that's 2122 unacceptable. Because the City is not shaking down anyone to be able to do business.

2123 Shakedown means that we have provided a threat to someone, to take money from them.

2124 That is the definition of shakedown.

So maybe you could've used a different terminology, maybe you could've said it differently, but that particular language is unacceptable when we're trying to do business with entities who are coming to the City. And it was offensive. I felt. Especially for the entity and for myself to be accused of such a heinous act in doing business with the City.

If you want to impose an amendment for that alternative language, of course you can. You get a second, that's what it is. But I just wanted to be clear about the original language that is there, I'm okay with it. I'm only one person. It comes up for a vote, that's

- 2132 how we move forward.
- 2133 Councilperson Lawson: Madam Chair?
- 2134 **Councilperson Botel:** [Stammer]...
- 2135 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, Ms. Botel.
- 2136 **Councilperson Botel:** I, I have a question. What would the nature of the landscape
- 2137 and beautification improvements be to the Port of Palm Beach gateway and the bridge?
- 2138 I'm trying to picture what you could possibly do to the bridge to make it more beautiful.
- 2139 Have you discussed that with the team, the development team?
- Development Services Director Sirmons: Yes, we have. And, this is related to the latter condition of this Resolution in which the applicant has agreed to provide a
- 2142 conceptual design of what that bridge can look like. As you know, at the base of the
- bridge, as you are exiting the City of West Palm Beach heading north, there is a sign
- stating, 'Welcome to the City of Riviera Beach.' That is an area that could use some
- 2145 additional attention.

But the bridge itself only has structural conditions in how it exists today. But there could be aesthetic considerations in addition to that, such as the ornamentation on the Blue Heron Bridge. The applicant is going to create a rendering, a conceptual design, of what that bridge could look like. And they, with the funds for this condition, they will pay or install the first \$45,000 worth of improvements on that bridge based on the design that they will separately be developing for it.

- 2152 **Councilperson Botel:** Okay.
- 2153 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Does that answer your question?
- 2154 **Councilperson Lawson:** Madam Chair?
- 2155 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Councilman Lawson, you can go ahead, please.
- 2156 **Councilperson Lawson:** Thank you, Madam Chair.

Mr. Sirmons, you said that the applicant would provide a rendering, if this is the language that was selected, or is there a rendering available? Is this just an idea that they're gonna present? Because right now, to change the language and to allow for them to handle the operations without a rendering or an idea of what they're doing, I'd rather

put it in the Staff's hands and Mr. Evans, with him giving us a proposed plan of what we're gonna do with the landscaping.

So, I don't really have an idea of what it would look like. That's my concern currently, before changing the language.

Development Services Director Sirmons: Correct.

So again, this is Item 10, and they are required to provide that rendering to us before they.., before they get their building permit for the site. So before it's under construction, they would've provided that conceptual design. And, at that time, we can return to Council to, to discuss the acceptability of it or if it needs to be revisited.

Councilperson Lawson: The concern I have, Mr. Sirmons, is that we had to accept the conceptual design for the mural of the building, prior to passing the Site Plan. So, I would expect the same thing prior to removing the funds from the City and leaving it with the applicant, I would wanna actually see a conceptual design to get an idea of what we'd be voting on.

So, as currently stated, I would actually like a plan and procedure of what we're gonna do, what the landscaping is going to actually entail for beautification if we left the language as is, currently seeded so that we can see that and make sure that we're moving forward with a correct plan.

But I would rather leave it in the hands of the City versus an idea that we don't have any real influence and we just have to approve based upon what they provide a rendering for, so we can give Staff more direction as to what we expect with that spending for the landscaping. And, kind of give them an idea of, Mr. Evans, and what they need to do.

- **Chairperson Lanier:** Very good. Dr. Botel?
- **Councilperson Botel:** Madam Chair?

So, what I'm thinking, as I think about this, if we leave the language as it was, we could set aside the.., I need the amount. Go to the next slide, would you, please? Sorry. No. The one with the.., yeah. Thank you. If we haves the \$45,285.15 in hand then, if we wanted to do improvements on the bridge, the City could.., the Staff of the City, we could decide what those improvements would be with that money. Or, if we wanted to use the money for'.., in some other way in the City, we could make that decision.

So, it do'.., it kinda does make sense to me now that I think about it, to leave that money in the hands of Staff rather than allowing the developers to do it. And I, frankly, don't think the developers care one way or the other [chuckle], as long as they get this passed tonight.

So, do we need to take a vote on whether or not we want the language changed?

Chairperson Lanier: I, I, I don't.., I don't think so. I think that.., the presentation is with the original language. That was just offered as alternative to the language.

- 2200 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.

- 2255 that's why I asked Legal if there was another option, and this is what the alternative
- language came up with.

- landscaping, but we tell an applicant you don't need to provide landscaping, instead, give 2263

- 2265 the.., that appearance. And, you know, that is my opinion.
- 2266 And I did find exact language in the Code of Ethics that speak to it. So, I, you
- 2267 know, I would very much caution you, Board Members, but that is prohibited.
- 2268 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you for comment, sir.
- 2269 And I have to disagree with you in terms of the appearance of. Number one, we
- understand what the intent is of, of this agency.., of this organization coming to the City 2270
- 2271 to be able to do business with us. You ma'.., you feel that it's a condition, or that we are
- 2272 taking money in lieu of something else, that is not the case here and I want to emphatically
- state that that is not the case here. 2273

- 2316 **Ms. M. Brabham:** Ms. Mary Brabham, Riviera Beach.
- Thank you, Mr. Sirmons, for bringing this City to the level of addressing the Code
- 2318 Compliances that we need in this City. Resi'...
- 2319 **Chairperson Lanier:** [Chuckle]. We can hear you real loud and clear now, Ms.
- 2320 Brabham. Go ahead.
- 2321 **Ms. M. Brabham:** The property maintenance is up to each municipality to maintain
- their Codes. I have ridden around this City, along with another management team and
- they asked Ms. Brabham, ride around this City and, and show me your City. And we did
- 2324 this. And, we rode around, and the, and the properties was.., some of the properties was
- totally in disarray. Trash, papers, cans, all in the yards and stuff. Who are we? What
- are we? We don't look like our yards, so why should we maintain our properties in the
- 2327 way that we look?
- So, this particular Code investment... I call it an investment, because it tells us
- 2329 right here. If you read the backups.., and Ms. Brabham has the backup. And I'm gonna

- share something with, with the general public. Since the FDC does not contain a Property
 Maintenance Code that's standard, it is up to each municipality to adopt their own
- 2332 Property Maintenance Codes. Long overdue for the City of Riviera Beach.
- Our Code Enforces need every tool that they can get in their arsenal to address the needs of the City of Riviera Beach. We are not going backward, we are moving forward. And the way that we need, need to move forward is to not do business the way that we used to do business. We have to set standards.
- We, we have to rise to the, to the occasion to meet where we live, and how we live now, in this age of century. Because, COVID has devastated the global landscape. Everything is different now. So, we must live and we must govern and we must build up the way that we should build up now. This is all, all about, not just Riviera Beach, but just all over the other municipalities and cities, that they are taking these [inaudible]...

- 2343 **Ms. M. Brabham:** Thank you.
- 2344 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, Ms. Brabham. Thank you so much for your
- 2345 comment.
- 2346 **Ms. M. Brabham:** Thank you.
- 2347 Chairperson Lanier: Wow.
- 2348 **Councilperson Botel:** That's a...
- 2349 **Chairperson Lanier:** That was a little... [Chuckle]. Thank you so much. Are there
- 2350 any other questions in regards to this Item? Thank you, Ms. Brabham.
- Very good.
- 2352 Councilperson McCoy: Yes.
- 2353 Chairperson Lanier: Madam Clerk.
- 2354 Councilperson McCoy: Yes.
- 2355 **Chairperson Lanier:** Oh, you have one?
- 2356 Councilperson McCoy: Yes.
- 2357 **Chairperson Lanier:** Go ahead, sir.
- 2358 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, Mr. Sirmons, I'm curious as to the.., is the guide gonna be
- changed administratively or does that then have to be done by us, as a Board?
- 2360 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** It would have to be done by the Board.
- Just like with our Building Code for the City, every time it's updated, we have to bring it
- 2362 to.., I'm sorry. Every time our.., the amendments to the Florida Building Code that we

- adopt locally, anytime we want to change or update them, we have to bring it to the Board.
- 2364 And we would have to do the same with this document so it would move through our
- 2365 system, just like the Florida Building Code.
- 2366 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. So, I guess in drafting it, I just see some minor technical
- things that's within it. Obviously, I mean, not too far from the first page, but there are
- some several instances within the guide that I think need some technical, or maybe even
- 2369 punctuation and grammatical corrections. I mean, are we going to, I guess, fine tune that
- or? I mean, what happens? There's fifty-eight pages. I mean, we're basically adopting
- a fifty-eight page manual and that's why I asked the guestion, will it come back to us, or
- is this something that can be done administratively? Because, you know, my.., I guess..,
- and, and clarify. My understanding was that when we adopt this, we were adopting a
- 2374 guide and not specifically adopting this guide. Is that...?
- 2375 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** The way we have constructed this Item,
- is that the Ordinance that is approved, we'll add language to the City Code, stating that
- we are adopting the Riviera Beach Property Maintenance Code. That Code is a separate
- document from what will be Municode or in, in our Code language.
- But, I would defer to, I think Legal and the Clerk, to...
- 2380 Councilperson McCoy: Well...
- 2381 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** ...to that question, as to whether we
- can update the associated manual after the Ordinance is adopted.
- 2383 Chairperson Lanier: Okay?
- 2384 **Councilperson McCoy:** Can someone answer that? Madam Chair?
- 2385 **Chairperson Lanier:** Mr. Sirmons didn't answer the question for you?
- 2386 **Councilperson McCoy:** No. He said he's gonna defer to Legal.
- 2387 Chairperson Lanier: Okay. Legal?
- 2388 **City Attorney Wynn:** Ms. Busby's on her way.
- 2389 **Chairperson Lanier:** Ms. Busby.
- 2390 Assistant City Attorney Busby: Good evening, Chair.
- 2391 Chairperson Lanier: Good evening.
- 2392 **Assistant City Attorney Busby:** Members of the Board, and Mayor.
- No. You are.., with this Ordinance, you are adopting that manual, and changes to the manual can be made without it going before the City Council.
- Councilperson McCoy: Okay. That's exactly... I would prefer that because there are some things that I think needs to be addressed administratively. Have we established a

- 2397 process on how that's done? Because, if this is not gonna be codified in Municode, I
- mean, I don't want somebody to basically come in and say that they're property, in their
- belief, is within the Property Maintenance Code and then the document can be changed
- arbitrarily without, you know, it having any kind of review process. How is that gonna be
- amended? If and when that happens?
- 2402 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** For the Property Maintenance Code,
- there's a regular cycle of updates just like the Building Codes. So, we expect every
- several years to bring it back before the Council to make any necessary updates...
- 2405 **Councilperson McCoy:** I'm speaking of the actual guide, the one...
- 2406 **Chairperson Lanier:** Mr... Councilman McCoy, could he please finish? Go ahead,
- 2407 sir.
- 2408 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** But.., so, the actual guide, yes, we
- intend to bring it back before this Board every several years as updates need to be made.
- But, as was just advised, there are some minor, or technical, typos or anything like that,
- that are observed, we would absolutely update those before this is published.
- 2412 And again, subsequent updates to the document would come back before the
- Board, just as we did with the Chapter 1 of the Florida Building Code for our, our local
- 2414 provisions.
- 2415 **Councilperson McCoy:** Follow up.
- 2416 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, sir.
- 2417 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. I'm not sure that was the same thing that she
- 2418 explained. She said administratively it would be changed. I mean, to what extent are we
- 2419 authorizing you, by approving the Order to administratively change the guide? And,
- 2420 perhaps that's a Ms. Busby question.
- 2421 Assistant City Attorney Busby: Yeah. If I...
- 2422 **Chairperson Lanier:** Ms. Busby.
- 2423 **Assistant City Attorney Busby:** Thank you, Chair. If I can address your concern.
- So, it will not be administratively changed from the form that it's in now, unless it
- 2425 goes to the City Council. And, most cities, it's pretty standard to go before, for updates
- es, every three to six years. I don't think ours has been updated since 2004, if you could
- 2427 correct me. Mr. Sirmons.
- 2428 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.
- 2429 **Chairperson Lanier:** Alright. Very good. Are there any other questions in regards
- 2430 to this Item?
- 2431 **Councilperson Botel:** Yes, Madam Chair.

- 2432 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 2433 **Councilperson Botel:** Section 108.1.5. Let me find it again, please. Just one
- 2434 minute. 108.1.5, refers to unsafe structures. First, let me ask, what are the remedies that
- 2435 we have as a City when we have an unsafe structure? Do we have the ability to go in
- 2436 and remove that structure? What's, what's the remedy when we find something like that?
- 2437 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** If I may? For this question, I would turn
- 2438 the floor over to our Building Official, Mr. Michael Grimm, to address that question.
- 2439 **Councilperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 2440 **Chairperson Lanier:** Mr... What's his name?
- 2441 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Grimm.
- 2442 **Chairperson Lanier:** Graham?
- 2443 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Grimm. G-R-I...
- 2444 **Chairperson Lanier:** Grimm. Welcome, Mr. Grimm. [Chuckle].
- 2445 **Building Official Grimm:** Thank you. My name is Michael Grimm. I'm the Building
- 2446 Official.
- Our, our current City Code does have a, a, a section for how to deal with unsafe
- structures. That's laid out very well. And we will continue to, to use that process.
- 2449 **Councilperson Botel:** But, what is the process?
- 2450 **Building Official Grimm:** Well, I have to go ahead and determine that it is unsafe.
- Similar to.., we just had a fire and if I agree with the City Engineer that it's in imminent
- 2452 danger, we, we get to eliminate using a lot of the, the safeguards but during normal unsafe
- structures, I have to give notice. And then there would a hearing to take it before the
- special magistrate and get an Order that I can abate an unsafe structure.
- 2455 **Councilperson Botel:** So, Section 1.8.1.5.., 108.1.5, refers to dangerous structures
- on premises. And it refers to an portion of a building structure of pertinence that has been
- 2457 damaged by fire, earthquake, wind, flood deterioration, neglect, abandonment, vandalism
- or by any other cause to such an extent that it is likely to.., likely to, or partially, or
- completely, collapse or to become detached or dislodged.
- Does that have to be a structure that is a.., something in which one lives or could
- that be a fence?
- 2462 **Building Official Grimm:** It could be.., there, there's unsafe structures, and there's
- 2463 also unsafe equipment. So...
- 2464 Councilperson Botel: Okay.

- 2465 **Building Official Grimm:** ...a structure is not necessarily something that's lived in. It
- 2466 could be something...
- 2467 **Councilperson Botel:** Okay.
- 2468 **Building Official Grimm:** ...different.
- 2469 **Councilperson Botel:** So, if a fence has fallen down and is perceived to be a
- 2470 dangerous..., a danger to the community, it could be dealt with in the same way as you
- 2471 just...
- 2472 **Building Official Grimm:** It...
- 2473 **Councilperson Botel:** ...referred to?
- 2474 **Building Official Grimm:** It could be. Yes.
- 2475 **Councilperson Botel:** Thank you.
- 2476 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Any other questions for the.., this Item before us?
- 2477 [Pause]. Thank you. Madam Clerk.

- 2527 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Are there any questions in regards to this Item?
- 2528 Do you have a presentation? Or, are you just here for questions?
- 2529 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 2530 I'm just here to speak about an overview of the process, if desired.
- 2531 **Chairperson Lanier:** Okay. You want to hear that, Board?
- 2532 **Councilperson Botel:** I want to hear in par'.., excuse, Madam Chair?
- 2533 **Chairperson Lanier:** Go ahead.
- 2534 **Councilperson Botel:** Thank you.
- I wanna here, in particular, the, the Resolution. What, what, what happens if
- something is determined to be a chronic nuisance? What are our.., what does the Ci'..,
- what is the City able to do?
- 2538 **Chairperson Lanier:** You wanna address that?
- 2539 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** Yes. Thank you...
- 2540 **Chairperson Lanier:** Go ahead.
- 2541 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** ... Madam Mayor.
- 2542 Chairperson Lanier: Yes.
- 2543 Ms. C. Goddeau: Christy Goddeau. I'm with Torcivia, Donlon, Goddeau & Rubin, an
- outside law firm that represents the City. I've had the pleasure of working with the Chief
- and his Staff on this Ordinance, along with Cheryl Bostic from Code Compliance because
- 2546 this Chronic Nuisance Ordinance addresses two issues, chronic nuisance calls to the
- 2547 Police Department in properties that have gone through the Code Enforcement process.
- 2548 who have not brought their property into compliance after an Order by the special
- 2549 magistrate.

To answer Dr. Botel's question, what happens through this process is, if there is a declaration that a property is a chronic nuisance and that declaration is upheld by the special magistrate, if there's an appeal, what that triggers is, it allows the City to do essentially two things. First, if there is a nuisance issue at the property that the City could

2554 abate, through some type of environmental improvement on the property, the, the

2555 magistrate can authorize the City to take that issue... take, take care of that issue.

It also triggers the City, the ability to go after the City's cost through the entire process. And for the Police Department, that is really essential because the way we've set this up is, if this is a property that's constantly calling for nuisance activity at the property, and that nuisance activity is not abated, then future calls to the Police Department for such nuisance activities, we can start assessing them for those additional

2561 calls for nuisance activity.

And, and that's sort of the hammer that this Ordinance has. And as Dr. Botel may have recognized, a lot of cities have these types of Ordinance, but they don't really have a hammer if there's not voluntary compliance. And so, what we've developed, working with the Police Department, is to try to put something in place that if we don't get the cooperation of the property owners, there is something there that we can go after.

- **Councilwoman Botel:** Thank you.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Very good. Thank you.
- 2569 Councilperson McCoy: Question.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, sir.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** So.., thank you, Madam Chair.
- Ms. Goddeau, I was specifically concerned with a couple portions in here. And perhaps you can help me.
- This provides that the formal Rules of Evidence shall not apply. And I've seen that similar to several other Codes. I think Boca, West Palm and then.., now what we have here. What rules would apply in a, in a hearing that a person is brought before in Section 2-334? What are the actual rules?
- **Ms. C. Goddeau:** Okay. Madam Chair, if I may?
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- Ms. C. Goddeau: Mr. McCoy, that's a great question. And, we've set this up, like many other cities as you recognized have done so, to set it up as a quasi-judicial hearing that goes before the special magistrate. Just like Code Compliance, it's no formal Rules of Evidence. It's informal Rules of Evidence. But what the special magistrate, and what the City has to ensure is that each property owner receives the due process.

And what that requires is notice of the issue. In this case, the chronic nuisance, and an opportunity for them to challenge those notices, and to challenge what services the City is seeking to impose to abate the chronic nuisance. And, the rules for the magistrate hearing are set forth in the Ordinance to ensure that due process is afforded to every property owner, just like what is done through the Code En'.., Compliance process, and through the other process that the Police Department uses for nuisance abatement, typically for drug offenses.

Councilperson McCoy: Follow up.

- **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, sir.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** So, this Ordinance, along with the next Ordinance, I, I guess I seen some, some items that were different in that one Ordinance provided for a constructive service [chuckle]. And, the definition of constructive service was really
- unusual. I think it said something in, not this Ordinance, but the next Ordinance, that was

really unusual, that I've never seen. And I wanted to understand, why is there a difference in the two processes, as far as there is a requirement of certified mail, but then, if I can just jump to it... But it just doesn't seem consistent across the two different Ordinance.

But.., I need to jump right back to it. But, it gave something really innocuous, like, you could.., if a person missed the fifteen days of collecting it, you can then... Well, you said if the person is believed to have known that there is a chronic violation. And I'm saying to myself, there is genuinely an opportunity for a person not to receive a notice. And I said this to the Manager today. So often we get these calls that there's a lien on my property that I had no idea. And, when they go back and they look at the records, there is no, for whatever reason, record that this was actually provided to them certified mail.

Now, what I don't' wanna do is continue to go down that road of making it easier for somebody to say, 'Well, they should have known and, under the Code, that constitutes constructive service.' That, I thought was the most.., I mean, that's definitely a deprivation of a person's right when the title starts off by saying that we would like to provide due process.

- So, I don't understand that. And then there's no actual set forth timeframe. So, are you able to respond to that?
- 2616 Ms. C. Goddeau: Yes. Madam Chair...
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- **Ms. C. Goddeau:** ...can I respond?

Mr. McCoy, the, the process in the Chronic Nuisance Ordinance before you now is very similar to the process set forth for Code Incompliance, in terms of notice. What happens is, we utilize the Property Appraiser's office, or the Tax Collector's office, the mailing address that's listed on their website for the property owner.

If the property owner does not update that address, then you're absolutely right, the certified mailing and the regular mail that we do, 'cause we do them both, may go to the property, or another property that the property owner listed with the Property Appraiser. If they don't update that address, you're absolutely right, those notices may not be received by the property owner.

In addition to that, if certified mail is not claimed, what this Ordinance requires, and what is required in our Code Compliance is what you're mentioning of constructive service, and that is where we actually post the notices at the property. So, the only way the property owner is not getting these notices, is if they have the wrong address with the Property Appraisers and the Tax Collectors, or if they're not going to their property, or whoever is at their property is not providing the notices that are posted.

And, I can guarantee you, that through Code Compliance and through Chronic Nuisance, there are at least two official notices that go out, both through certified mail and

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regular mail. And that then get posted at the property. Those notices are also accompanied by other notices through the process.

In Chronic Nuisance, the best way to do this, is to send out a warning letter. If a property is getting close to being a chronic nuisance, you wanna put that property owner, right away, and warn them you're about to become a Chronic Nuisance property. Just like we do in Code Compliance, we do notices of noncompliance, where the inspectors do inspections on a regular basis and send a Notice of Noncompliance. Those notices are in addition to the official notices. They're all provided through certified mail, regular mail, and then if not claimed, through posting.

So yes, there is an opportunity that a property owner may not get notice because they don't have their right notice with the Property Appraiser's office, or they don't go to their property. But we make every effort through this Ordinance, the existing Code Compliance process, and the proposed Code Compliance Ordinance, to make sure that they get notice.

- **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you for that response.
- **Councilperson McCoy:** Can I ask one other question?
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, sir.

Councilperson McCoy: So, I found the specific section. And this is what concerns me.

It says the lack of knowledge or acquiescence to participation in, or responsibility for a nuisance activity on the part of the responsible party, should not be a defense to any enforcement of this Article.

But then, as I mentioned, it also starts off by saying, fundamental due process shall be observed and shall govern these proceedings. And I would think, just saying, if a person should've known and because they don't know, they're still responsible, goes against the very fundamental principle of due process.

And to that point, you know, I can't support this for that reason. And, the other reason that I think I'm gonna share with you at this point was, this, and the next Ordinance, basically fast tracks and reduce the second hearing requirement that, again, goes against the fundamental requirement of due process.

So, if, at all possible, I wanna exhaust every option before we declare or make a declaration that somebody's property is a chronic nuisance or we begin to assess a fine or a, or, or liens for that matter, by the special magistrate. I just really have seen too much of a process, in the City of Riviera Beach, where there has not been substantiation that we have, that we actually made a, you know, a legal effort to give them certified notice.

- So, for that reason, I can't support this in this form.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, sir, for your comments.
- 2673 Councilwoman Botel, you had a comment?

- 2674 Councilperson Botel: It was very small. I can.., it, it's really not important. I, I'm
- looking at Section 11-234, lien of police assessments. And, I just don't understand what
- it means when you say a perfected lien.
- 2677 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** What that... If I may, Madam Chair?
- 2678 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 2679 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** What that means in the Ordinance is, the first step is to lien the
- 2680 property. And you would lien the property for your costs. That means recording in the
- official records you have a lien, and that's the perfected [inaudible]...
- 2682 **Councilperson Botel:** Okay. Thank you.
- 2683 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** You're welcome.
- 2684 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Any other questions in regards to this comment?
- 2685 Or, this Item that's before us? [Pause]. Hearing none. Madam Clerk.
- 2686 **City Clerk Anthony:** Mary Brabham.
- 2687 **Ms. M. Brabham:** Thank you, Ms. Christy. We finally, as homeowners in this City, and
- property owners, we are.., we, we have some help on the way.
- To the general public, this process is used by other cities to enhance the processes and as another tool to encourage good property ownership. This is what has happened. When we say you don't get this and you keep giving chance after chance after chance,
- and these peoples do not rise to the occasion.

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- And, and not only that, but this is not limited to alcohol, noise, dogs, discharging firearms, prostitution, resisting arrest, house parties, [stammer] controlled substance, and other felony violations. All of this here is what we endure in our communities. And it is about time.
 - Thank you. Thank you, Staff. Thank, thank, thank, thank you that are onboard here, to bring us to where we need to be in addressing these critical elements that we.., that, that we property owners have. I, I'm not saying that you just come in here just to live overnight. And, and then go and stary somewhere else.
 - But we endure all of this, residents, what I just read. In our communities. Parties, all night. Dogs and stuff. All day. Or not on their leashes and stuff. We don't see that in other neighborhoods. So, so, so, so this is good. And I'm hoping that the Board gets onboard, and bringing our Code stipulations to where we need to be.
- It, it, it, it's, it's an elimination that would help, not just we as residents, but our governing Board too. See, and Ms. Brabham never decided to get up in.., on.., in one of those seats there, and I can take either one of them. 'Cause I move all over this City here, in order to make this City.., and bring this City where it needs to be. Because it is about time. We are long overdue.

- 2728 Chairperson Lanier: Yes.
- 2729 Councilperson Botel: Ma'...
- 2730 City Clerk Anthony: Madam Chair?
- 2731 **Councilperson Botel:** Go ahead.
- 2732 City Clerk Anthony: Go...
- 2733 Chairperson Lanier: Yes. Go...
- 2734 Councilperson Botel: Madam Chair?
- I just wanna make one comment before we move on because I wouldn't want Attorney Goddeau to leave before I say this. I wanted to thank her for the good work she did today on more than one occasion, in, in supporting us and helping us. Bravo, brava to you, my dear. It was a wonderful day.

- 2752 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we do not have public
- comment on this Item. The acceptance of public comment on this Item is now closed.
- 2754 **Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson:** So moved.
- 2755 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.
- 2756 Can I get amotion to approve this Item?
- 2757 **Councilperson Botel:** So moved.
- 2758 Councilperson McCoy: Second.
- 2759 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: Second.
- 2760 **Chairperson Lanier:** Very good. Mr.., Mr. Evans.
- 2761 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, I'd like to have the
- 2762 Director of Development Services, Mr. Clarence Sirmons, make this presentation.
- 2763 **Development Services Director Sirmons:** Thank you, Mr. Manager. Good
- evening again, Madam Chair and Members of the Council, Mr. Mayor, Madam Attorney.

This Ordinance before you today, on first reading, is the third and final of the three ltems that were presented two Council meetings ago related to the Clean and Lien

- initiatives that are aimed at giving the City additional tools to address problem properties.
- 2768 This particular Ordinance to essentially repeal and replace the Code Compliance
- section of the City Ordinances has been discussed for quite some time. It was, initially back in 2016, that Council first acknowledged and made... took action to address the code
- 2771 Compliance process, and the fact that it, it needed some adjustment, and needed to be
- improved.

As far back as 2017, we began working on this repeal and replacement Ordinance

with Ms. Goddeau, who you just heard from, in addressing the deficiencies and the, the

outdated practices that are built into our current Ordinances. In, most recently, January

of 2020, the City hosted a workshop at the Lindsay Davis Center where this, among other

- items, was discussed and feedback was provided to Staff and our legal consultants as to what you desired to see in this Ordinance.
- But essentially, it streamlines the process that allows Staff to be more efficient in its process of gaining compliance for properties that violate our, our City.., or, property standards, and now our Property Maintenance Code. So, this would modernize the process, remove unnecessary steps, and allow Staff to be more efficient.
- And again, I would like to reintroduce Ms. Christy Goddeau, who has been instrumental in developing this Ordinance, with feedback from Staff, a lot of versions and iterations of this, and also, taking into account, the feedback provided from this Board previously, and we're proud to present what we've come up with today.
- Ms. Goddeau.
- 2788 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.
- You have a presentation for us?
- 2790 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** Thank you. Yes. We do have a presentation.
- 2791 Chairperson Lanier: Okay.
- 2792 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** Is there a, a clicker? I'll grab that.
- 2793 [Pause]
- 2794 **Councilperson Botel:** It's in the backup.
- 2795 **Chairperson Lanier:** We're having some technical difficulties?
- 2796 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** It looks like it, Madam Chair.
- 2797 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. You can go ahead...
- 2798 Ms. C. Goddeau: Madam Chair....
- 2799 **Chairperson Lanier:** ...and get started.
- 2800 Ms. C. Goddeau: If, if I..., if I may go ahead and get...
- 2801 Chairperson Lanier: Yes.
- 2802 **Ms. C. Goddeau:**started...
- 2803 Chairperson Lanier: Please.
- 2804 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** ...while they're working through the technical difficulties.
- As Mr. Sirmons mentioned, my name is Christy Goddeau. Thank you for having me here tonight to talk about this amended process.

As Mr. Sirmons said, the proposed Ordinance is to streamline some of the processes in Code Compliance, to make it more efficient. What I do wanna point out at the outset is, what this amended process is not changing. What this amended process is not changing is that Code Compliance will continue to work closely with property owners to encourage voluntary compliance. That's not changing, and that's never gonna change. In fact, the name now has been changed to Code Compliance. And that's an attempt to get folks to come into voluntary compliance.

Furthermore, as Mr. McCoy mentioned, it's not gonna change the notice process. Code Compliance will continue to send out multiple notices to try to reach property owners so that they are aware of violations on their property. As Mr. McCoy pointed out, sometimes that notice cannot reach the property owners for a variety of reasons, but Code Staff will continue to try to reach them all.

This new process also is enhanced by the Property Maintenance Code that you just adopted, that will also allow clarity to this process so property owners have a better understanding of what their Code violations are.

And finally, Code Staff, as you know, works closely with all property owners, that if they need more time to correct their violations, extension are granted on a different timeframes that are provided for voluntary compliance. That's not changing.

What is changing from your current process to the new process, is really towards the end of the process. So, if we go through the regular process, right now, under your Code, the initial process is a Code Inspector finds a violation at your property. He or she sends you a Notice of Violation to tell you what those violations are. You are then given a reasonable time to bring your property into compliance and, if you do not, the next notice you receive is a Notice of Noncompliance. And then a Notice of Hearing to go before the special magistrate.

The special magistrate then determines at the first hearing, whether or not you're in violation. And then the magistrate, if they find a violation, sets the fine amount. You're given a time by the magistrate to bring the property in compliance and, if you fail to do that, the fine then begins to accrue.

Under your current process, then the City has to bring the case back for a second hearing to impose a lien. And, this hearing will then address the fine amount and, if the fine continues to accrue and ultimately the lien's imposed, when a lien is imposed under your current process, the lien is under the jurisdiction of the City Council, whether or not that lien gets reduced.

What the proposed process is really changing, is everything that happens after the special magistrate finds the property owner in violation, sets the fine amount and gives them a time to bring it into compliance. So, what changes now is, the Order that the special magistrate will enter will tell the property owner, from the date of this Order, you have twenty days to request a hearing to contest the fine amount.

Now, this process was not made up by the City of Riviera Beach, it wasn't made up by other cities that use the same process. In fact, this process was a process that an

appellate judge recommended in a case dealing with Code Enforcement, where the judge said, 'I think a better process, instead of having a second hearing, would be to afford the property owner the opportunity to request a second hearing and contest the fine amount. If you offer them that opportunity and they don't take advantage of it, you've provided them due process and you can go forward with imposing the lien.' So what you're seeing in the world of Code Compliance, is where cities are picking up on what that appellate judge said and saying, 'Hey, let's amend our process. Once the magistrate finds you in violation, you've got twenty days to contest the fine amount that the magistrate set. If you don't contest it, that's the fine amount going forward. If you don't bring the property in compliance within the timeframe the magistrate gave you, this will convert to a lien.'

So, what's important in changing this process is, to also lay out a very scripted process for how you address liens. What your Code of Ordinance currently does have is a process for lien reductions. We've been taking fine reductions before the magistrate, and every now and then, the City Council has heard a lien settlement agreement, but what's not laid out in your current Code, is a lien process that allows for a property owner to bring their property into compliance and to get that lien reduced.

So, I see that the presentation is up, so I'm gonna skip forward to the amendments to this process. And these are the key amendments.

The notices are not changing. However, this gives the City an option to do a joint Notice of Violation, Notice of Hearing and that's sometimes crucial and a life safety issue, where you wanna get the case before a special magistrate quickly. So this Code revision gives you that opportunity. This also codifies a stipulation process where, if a property owner agrees their property's in violation but just needs more time to bring it into compliance, they can enter a stipulation. They don't have to come to the hearing, but they will have the time to bring it into compliance [inaudible] which they will agree to a fine amount.

This also addresses that fine contest hearing that I mentioned. That was developed by the appellate judge, to allow a property owner to context the fine amount set by a magistrate. This also codifies your administrative fee process, where you assess administrative fees only in the event there's a repeat violation.

The big change is to set forth in this new Code process, a lien reduction process. And this gives a jurisdiction..., the magistrate, the jurisdiction over all Code Enforcement liens. It's a scripted process. And I don't wanna get into too much detail because I have a slide that sort of lays out a straightforward couple examples to understand how this works. But the goal of this is, is to make liens the amount of the lien really more manageable. And it should be based on your property value.

So this caps liens. So, if you have a Code Enforcement lien that's been out there for years, it will cap the lien amount so it's more equitable to your actual property value.

This is in a lien reduction scenario. So, it also talks about allowing a property owner to discount a lien amount based on the expenses they incur of bringing the property into compliance. It then allows the magistrate to reduce the property, based on a

percentage. And the percentages are different. And we did this to address homestead properties, to allow for a greater reduction in a lien amount versus non-homesteaded properties.

This Ordinance also lays out what's required to get a lien reduction. And the key, number one factor, I don't care what city you go to, or whether you go to the county, to get a lien reduction, your property has to be in compliance. This codifies some other requirements. This also gives the City Council the ability to issue an amnesty program. Where, if you wanted to, you could lower those percentages in this Ordinance by Resolution, to try to encourage property owners to fix their properties and then ask for a lien reduction, and ultimately, get the liens removed.

So, what I mentioned was, is to understand this scripted lien reduction process. It's really to make lien reductions more equitable and more fair, and give notice to folks that this what you can anticipate. If you have a big lien on your property, or even a small lien, what you're facing. The example on the screen is for a homestead property. And if they had a lien that accrued to \$250,000. Now, let me say this. If you've a lien that accrued to that much on a homestead property, this lien has been around for a while.

But, as you can see, going through the scripted process, the lien amount is capped based on the fair market value of the property. If the property owner incurred expenses to bring the property in compliance, those are taken off after the cap lien amount. And the, ultimately, the lien is reduced by the percentage based on whether, in this case, it's a homestead property, reduced by the percentage. And then the example, for a non-homesteaded pr property, there's a larger percentage of the reduction.

So this is how you can take a \$250,009 lien, Code Enforcement lien, once the property's in compliance, to bring it down to a much more easier, payable lien amount, to remove that lien off the property.

The new process also allows a scripted and codified process for your partial releases of liens. These are in cases where, as you know, a Code Enforcement lien is an umbrella lien. And it attaches to all property you own. Sometimes you need a partial release of lien to sell off one property or another. There will now be a codified process for the partial releases of liens.

And finally, and perhaps most important to this amended Code Enforcement process, is to set up a property improvement account. My understanding is this account has already been set up. And what it's geared to do, is to take a percentage, five percent, of the amounts that are paid to Code Compliance for their efforts, and to put those monies in a separate account so Code Compliance, working with Mr. Sirmons and his Staff, can come up with different plans of how to address hardship cases. Because, in Code Compliance, we often see case where someone's on a fixed income, they're a senior, they may have a disability or other hardship issues, where they just need some financial assistance to bring their property in compliance.

- So, this would allow for those programs to be set up and for Code Compliance Staff, and Mr. Sirmons 'Staff, to develop these programs to allow for those hardship cases to be addressed.
- That is an over of the proposed amendments. If there's any questions, I'll be happy to answer them.
- 2933 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you so much for that presentation. That was very thorough.
- 2935 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** Thank you.
- 2936 **Chairperson Lanier:** Are there any questions for, for this presentation? For...
- 2937 Councilperson Botel: Ma'...
- 2938 Chairperson Lanier: ...this Item?
- 2939 **Councilperson Botel:** Madam Chair? Just a comment.
- 2940 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 2941 **Councilperson Botel:** I, I support this completely. My, my only concern, and it has
- been a concern for quite some time, is that Code.., Code Enforcement be very equitable
- 2943 in terms of their decision making. You know? I hear from people on a regular basis,
- 2944 'Well, my yard looked like this. My neighbor.., neighbor's yard looked worse. How come
- 2945 I'm the one who got the fine?' So, I just wanna be sure that, going forward, we are very,
- very cons'.., very, very sure that our Code Enforcement folks are being, you know,
- 2947 equitable.
- 2948 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.
- 2949 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair?
- 2950 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead, sir.
- 2951 **Councilperson McCoy:** Thank you.
- 2952 Ms. Goddeau, thank you for the presentation.
- 2953 I, I guess I wanted to go back to discuss, I guess,, you kinda talked about it but the
- removal of the next hearing. That second hearing would've been only to challenge the
- 2955 actual fine. Correct?
- 2956 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** Under your existing process or the proposed amendment?
- 2957 **Councilperson McCoy:** Under the existing proc'.., I mean, I'm sorry, under what's
- 2958 being proposed now, today.
- 2959 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** Well, what's being proposed today, the second hearing now
- becomes optional if the property owner requests it.

- 2961 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. And, prior to that, if a person came in to the second
- 2962 hearing, they could challenge the very nature of the violation?
- 2963 Ms. C. Goddeau: No.
- 2964 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, after, for whatever reason, if a violator doesn't participate
- in the first hearing, there's no avenue to challenge...
- 2966 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** If I may, Madam...
- 2967 Chairperson Lanier: Yes. Go...
- 2968 Ms. C. Goddeau: ... Chair?
- 2969 **Chairperson Lanier:** ...ahead.
- 2970 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** So, under both processes, when the first Order is entered by the
- special magistrate, finding the violation, setting the fine amount and giving a date for
- 2972 compliance, that Order can absolutely be challenged by appeal to the Circuit Court.
- 2973 And...

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- 2974 **Councilperson McCoy:** But only for the fine.
- 2975 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** ...that's set.., that's...
- 2976 Chairperson Lanier: [Stammer]...
- 2977 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** ...that's set for...
- 2978 **Chairperson Lanier:** Let, let her finish.
- 2979 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** ...in Chapter 162, Florida statutes.
- 2980 **Councilperson McCoy:** But that's only for the fine. Correct?
- 2981 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** They can challenge everything in that Order, that's entered by
- special magistrate. What the current process requires of the City, is that if we want to
- impose a lien, we have to take you before a second hearing before the special magistrate.
- Now at that hearing, the property owner can challenge the fine amount that was originally
- set by the special magistrate, and then the special magistrate would rule on the fine
- amount and impose the lien.

What this new process does, is it takes that second hearing burden off of the City and puts the burden on the property owner, for the property owner, within twenty days, to request that hearing. And that is the process I addressed, that the appellate judge came up that ensures that the property owner is given their due process before a lien is imposed.

And I can tell you from practice at other cities and for Palm Beach County, most property owners don't request that second hearing because the fine amount is set by the special magistrate at the original hearing. And what the special magistrate considers, is

what the property owner's done to bring the property into compliance, the past history that the property owner may have of Code violations, and the nature of those Code violations. That really is the basis for the fine amount that's set by the special magistrate.

And if the property owner does nothing to fix the property, then more than likely, the special magistrate is gonna keep the same fine amount. But it shifts that burden to the property owner, that if they wanna exercise their due process, they absolutely can, and they can request that hearing, and within twenty days they can say, 'I want this hearing.' And then, we will have to go back before the special magistrate to hear their contest to the fine amount.

- 3004 Councilperson McCoy: Okay. Well.., I... Madam Chair, follow up.
- 3005 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 3006 **Councilperson McCoy:** So, I mean, you said a whole lot. And that's exactly what I asked you, so you gave me a whole scenario and I...
- 3008 Ms. C. Goddeau: [Chuckle].

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- Councilperson McCoy: ...appreciate you being thorough. But, I, I guess I was trying to arrive at that there is no second bite at the apple if a violator, for whatever reason, does not attend the first hearing. And I understand that. So, the only thing at the second hearing would be if they request it within the twenty days, would be to challenge the fine.
- But this is the part of that section that I'm not exactly sure I agree with, but it says, and this is.., I'm sure you probably are familiar with it, the special magistrate may authorize the City Attorney or designee to foreclose on the lien, or to sue to recover a money judgment for the amount of the lien plus accrued interest. Is that new language?
- 3017 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** That language actually tracks Chapter 162.1 of the Florida statute. 3018 And that actually same language is in your current Code. It's pretty standard that, once
- the lien is imposed, then the City can be.., the City Attorney can be authorized to foreclose
- on that lien after it's been recorded for three months.
- 3021 **Councilperson McCoy:** Yeah. But, see.., and this is what doesn't make sense.
- 3022 Because this is a political subdivision, right? The special magistrate is, what I believe
- and I have no other reason to think that they wouldn't be impartial. But, if the special
- magistrate, for some chronic violator, which may have not gotten that notice, then directs
- the City Attorney to then.., or the City Attorney or the City Attorney's designee, to foreclose
- on the lien, then quite frankly, you have somebody that is a judicial arm that can direct
- the City Attorney to move with a foreclosure.
- 3028 Is that not the way that it's written?
- 3029 Ms. C. Goddeau: Madam Chair?
- 3030 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 3031 **Ms. C. Goddeau:** Thank you.

The, the way that it's written and I'm apologizing if it's confusing how it's written, is that it's not the special magistrate that directs the City Attorney to foreclose, it's that the City Attorney may foreclose at that point.

3035 Back in 2005. our firm was actually hired by the 3036 City to foreclose on several properties that had large Code Enforcement liens on them. 3037 I'm assuming the same process would apply, which is usually what happens at most cities, is before the City Attorney pursues foreclosing on a resident or a business within 3038 3039 the City, they come before the City Council to request the authorization to foreclose.

- 3040 **Councilperson McCoy:** Follow up for clarity.
- 3041 **Chairperson Lanier:** Alright, that's... Go ahead.
- Councilperson McCoy: So that still doesn't answer the question, Ms. Goddeau, and l'm saying this respectfully, and really want to be sure on this. This reads, 'The special magistrate may authorize the City Attorney...' Does that come with a caveat that the City Attorney now has to clear that with the City Council, or does the City Attorney, based off of that authorization, can move forward with seeking outside counsel to foreclose on liens?
- And this is very important because I don't want to be accused of now initiating this directive to allow for foreclosures on, on a violator.
- 3050 **City Attorney Wynn:** Can I jump in?
- 3051 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead...
- 3052 **City Attorney Wynn:** Thank...
- 3053 **Chairperson Lanier:** ... City Attorney.
- 3054 **City Attorney Wynn:** Thank you, Madam Chair.
- Mr. McCoy, the, the policy of the office is always, when we initiate a lawsuit, to bring that to Council first. You've seen that, for instance in the opioid requests that we had a while ago. We would never initiate a lawsuit without coming to Council first, then we would go to the special magistrate and seek that authorization as well. To, to foreclose on a lien.
- So, that's where it is. It's not that the special magistrate would direct the City
 Attorney's office to foreclose. We would request that, or we.., we would not request that
 until after coming to City Council. Because we don't initiate lawsuits as an office, by
 ourselves. Only at the re'.., at the behest of the City Council.
- Councilperson McCoy: Okay. Well, I, I, I appreciate your response but that's not what's written here. But thank you. I appreciate it, Ms. Goddeau.

- 3107 Lanier, Mayor Felder, Pro Tem, Council and City Administration.
- 3108 This Item before you is a series of Items that we were, in our strategic plan, was 3109 creating Citywide agreements in order to be able to have our departments to respond 3110 quickly and effectively to HVAC, electrical, plumbing and those type of services. This is one of the continuing services contract before you, with a number of firms. It'll allow the 3111 City to be able to develop, enhance and maintain the integrity of the City, as well as to 3112
- provide the services that are limited, that may not be limited to general electrical services 3113
- 3114 on existing City buildings, lift station that receive permitting through appropriate local

- 3116 So, on March 2nd, we issue an RTQ, a Request to Qualify, for Citywide electrical services. We received over a hundred responses on the website, in terms of broadcast. 3117

- 3119 So we're asking, and our recommendation is that you allow us to issue contracts
- for continuing services to the six firms that are listed. Those firms consist of Altima 3120
- Lighting and Electrical Contracting, Arbor Electrical, Inc., Electric, Inc., excuse me, dba 3121 Mr. Wireman, Brown Electrical Solutions, Carpenter Electric, Inc., Grid One Electrical
- 3122 Construction, Inc., Universal Electric of Florida. 3123
- 3124 Councilperson McCoy: Madam Chair?
- 3125 **Chairperson Lanier:** Hold on a second. Is that the end of your presentation?
- 3126 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Yes.
- 3127 **Chairperson Lanier:** Okay. Very good. Any questions in regards to this Item?
- Councilperson McCoy: Yes. 3128
- 3129 **Chairperson Lanier:** Go ahead, sir.
- 3130 **Councilperson McCoy:** Ms. Pemsel, did you say lift stations?
- 3131 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Yes. As well. Mhmm.
- 3132 **Councilperson McCoy:** Okay. So, lift stations would be handled on USD. And I think
- we've already kinda taken this Item on USD, so that's why I was a little confused. But 3133
- 3134 this not a specific for projects for the Utility Special District. This is other Citywide

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3135 projects?

- 3136 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** It's for Citywide projects...
- 3137 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.
- 3138 Procurement Director Pemsel: ...general maintenance, and they can use it for
- 3139 projects.
- 3140 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.
- 3141 Procurement Director Pemsel: As well.
- 3142 **Councilperson McCoy:** Alright. No problem.
- 3143 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Within a certain authority.
- 3144 Councilperson McCoy: I'm sorry?
- 3145 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Within a certain dollar authority.
- 3146 Councilperson McCoy: Okay.
- 3147 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Mhmm.
- 3148 Councilperson McCoy: Alright.
- 3149 **Chairperson Lanier:** Very good. Thank you. Any other questions regarding this
- 3150 Item? [Pause]. Excellent. [Chuckle]. Madam Clerk.
- 3151 City Clerk Anthony: Councilperson Botel?
- 3152 Councilperson Botel: Yes.
- 3153 City Clerk Anthony: Councilperson Lawson?

- 3164 **Procurement Director Pemsel:** Thank you.
- 3165 City Clerk Anthony: Update...
- 3166 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you, Ms. Pemsel. I'm sorry, Madam Clerk.
- 3167 City Clerk Anthony: UPDATE ON PARKS AND RECREATION MASTER PLAN
- 3168 PROCESS
- 3169 RICHARD BLANKENSHIP, PARKS & RECREATION DIRECTOR, 561-845-4070
- 3170 **City Clerk Anthony:** Madam Chair, Members of the Board, we do not have public
- 3171 comment on this Item. The acceptance of public comment on this Item is now closed. I
- also need to bring to your attention, the time is now 9:37.
- 3173 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. The Item... Mr. Evans.
- 3174 **City Manager Evans:** Madam Chair and Members of the Board, at this time, I will
- 3175 ask for the Parks & Recreation Director, Mr. Richard Blankenship, to make the
- 3176 presentation and introduce the consultants that will be providing you an update
- 3177 concerning the Parks & Recreation Master Plan.
- 3178 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Mr. Blankenship.
- 3179 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: Good evening, Council. Richard
- 3180 Blankenship, Parks & Recreation Director.
- 3181 I'd like to first thank the City Manager for saving the best for last.
- 3182 [Chuckles]
- Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: This is.., we're giving you an update on
- 3184 the...
- 3185 **City Manager Evans:** [Inaudible].
- 3186 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: ...on a..., the Parks Mast Planning
- process that we've been involved with in the year. We took a little bit of a, a hiatus with
- 3188 COVID, but now we're back.
- So, I'd like to introduce Joe Webb, with the firm of AECOM, and Ann Marie Sorrell.
- And I'll let them take over the, the presentation at this point. Again, this is an update of
- 3191 the Parks Master Plan.
- 3192 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you. Go ahead, sir.
- 3193 **Mr. J. Webb:** Yes. Thank you very much. Again, my name is Joe Webb. I have an

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- 3194 hour and a half presentation...
- 3195 Councilperson Botel: [Chuckle].

- 3196 **Mr. J. Webb:** ...for everyone's enjoyment. Yes, thank you very much for the opportunity
- to be here this evening. I'm here to talk about Parks & Recreation. Very.. Uh oh. We're
- 3198 having some...
- 3199 **Chairperson Lanier:** That was quick.
- 3200 **Councilperson Botel:** That was...
- 3201 [Chuckles]
- 3202 **Mr. J. Webb:** Any questions?
- 3203 [Chuckles]
- 3204 **Councilperson Botel:** We like that.
- 3205 [Chuckles]
- 3206 **Mr. J. Webb:** I'm sorry. It...
- 3207 **Media Team:** [Inaudible].
- 3208 **Mr. J. Webb**: Yep.
- 3209 **Media Team:** [Inaudible]
- 3210 **Mr. J. Webb:** I'm trying. So...
- 3211 Chairperson Lanier: There we go.
- 3212 **Mr. J. Webb:** There we...
- 3213 [Chuckles]
- 3214 **Mr. J. Webb:** Okay. It's late.
- 3215 Chairperson Lanier: I know. Right?
- 3216 **Councilperson McCoy:** He can just summarize.
- 3217 **Mr. J. Webb:** It seems...
- 3218 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yeah. You can, you can, you can., you can talk and you can
- 3219 go fast or you can go slow but you can just go.
- 3220 **Mr. J. Webb**: Okay.
- 3221 Chairperson Lanier: [Chuckle].
- 3222 **Mr. J. Webb:** A very simply agenda just to discuss our project goal, our process. Our
- 3223 system inventory, kind of an overview and go over what we have heard from the
- 3224 community and what they've told us about the park system.

- 3225 Oh my god.
- 3226 **Chairperson Lanier:** Don't worry. You can start at number four. [Chuckle].
- 3227 **Mr. J. Webb:** I just pressed it once really quick.
- 3228 Media Team: Let me know when you want it advanced. We'll advance it from back
- 3229 here.
- 3230 Mr. J. Webb: Okay. Then go back... The slide after [inaudible]...
- 3231 **Media Tem:** Don't, don't press [inaudible].
- 3232 Councilperson Botel: Get your hands...
- 3233 City Manager Evans: We have a special clicker when it gets later on in the evening.
- 3234 [Chuckles]
- 3235 City Manager Evans: It skips four or five slides.
- 3236 Mr. J. Webb: Okay. Let me start with project goal. Next slide please. Not...
- 3237 [Chuckles]
- 3238 **Chairperson Lanier:** It's not you. I think that the system is...
- 3239 Media Team: [Inaudible].
- 3240 **Chairperson Lanier:** Alright. Go ahead. You just start talking, sir. We'll, we'll, we'll
- 3241 fix that as we go.
- 3242 Mr. J. Webb: Yes.
- 3243 **Chairperson Lanier:** You just start talking.
- 3244 Mr. J. Webb: Thank you.
- 3245 **Chairperson Lanier:** You have it in front of you. We have a copy.
- 3246 Mr. J. Webb: [Inaudible].
- 3247 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yeah. Just... There we go.
- Mr. J. Webb: Yeah. Just get me... 3248
- 3249 The project goal of the Master Plan is to develop a long range planning document 3250 for the.., and, essentially, for the next ten to fifteen years. The important part of that is
- the comprehensive look at the Department, you know, facilities, operations and programs. 3251
- 3252 So, we're kind of comprehensively looking, but also looking out long term, ten to fifteen
- 3253 years. That doesn't mean we don't do anything for ten to fifteen years. We also back, do
- 3254 a five year strategic plan, and a one year action plan.

In Parks & Recreation, if you don't live in the world I do with Parks & Rec, the, the nature of Parks & Recreation [inaudible]...

- 3257 **Chairperson Lanier:** Keep the mic... Yeah.
- 3258 **Mr. J. Webb:** Is changing a great deal.
- 3259 That's better?
- 3260 Chairperson Lanier: Yes.
- Mr. J. Webb: So, we need to look forward to what are the trends and what people's need are, and really assess what people today, in the City want, need and are priorities.
- So, our process... Helps if you have it. But, it's really a four step process. All planning is simple, where are we? Where do we need to be? And how do we get there? We've really been doing up 'til.., up 'til now, our homework, I would say. We researched a lot of level of service, looked at data from the City, other guiding documents from the City. And then, we launched in pretty much in to a pretty extensive, very extensive public involvement process.
- 3269 Could you go a couple slides?
- 3270 **Media Team:** [Inaudible].
- 3271 **Mr. J. Webb:** Okay.

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- 3272 **Media Team:** [Inaudible].
- 3273 **Mr. J. Webb:** Oh, that's beautiful.
- So, again, we're, we're right now here at a, at a mid-point in the process. Really, a check in with Council and, you know, [inaudible] to report back in our findings to date before we advance too much further into visioning and implementation. So, we are here.
 - Our system inventory, we went out and visited all the parks. We did an assessment of each of them. The good news is, you know, in general, the parks are very well maintained. There are certainly opportunities. I think access improvements or, you know, better connectivity to the neighborhoods, but the parks themselves, well maintained, the mo'.., the grass is mown, the litter is picked up.
 - But what we have seen out there are.., it's kind of typical of many parks departments, there are things reaching their age. It isn't that it's not being maintained. I hate using the term deferred maintenance, it's really about capital reinvestment in certain items. It's.., from just a professional review of buildings and parking lots and things like that.
- We did a level of service analysis. We like to see, is there good access to parks?

 Another fortunate part of a good layout, or original layout of Riviera Beach is, you know, the purple areas are all those parts of the City where people can walk to a park within ten minutes of their home. Which is really optimum. We want everyone to be able to walk to

a park within proximity. It's not uncommon for us to do these plans where there's half the City that isn't within that. You know, fortunately here, we're not in that situation. That can be very difficult to, to remedy.

So, with that... [Inaudible] to Ann Marie here to talk about some of our outreach efforts.

Ms. A.M. Sorrell: Alright. Good evening, Council Members, Mayor, Staff. Thank you so much for this opportunity.

We wanted to really make sure the community felt a part of this process. So, we came up with a campaign like.., a campaign style theme, Your Park, Your Voice. And, with that, we did several different community outreach initiatives. One of them being our virtual community meeting. Uh oh. I'm going faster than my own slides. Give me a second. One of them being our virtual community meeting.

With that, we also did six focus groups. And we broke the focus groups down into specific segments of the community, including our Parks & Recreation Advisory Board, City department heads and Staff, seniors, neighborhood associations, aquatic, the marine industry, you'..., and youth sports organizations. We had eleven stakeholder interviews with City officials, Staff and community members. And, we conducted an online survey, and mailed a statistical survey to residents. Next slide.

In addition to that, we created outreach materials in which we coordinated with the City Parks Recreation team, as well as the City's communication team to place those promotional materials to advertise online survey, as well as the virtual public engagement on both the website, TV 18, social media channels, the City's newsletter. We did a mailing in the Utility bill, as well as posters throughout City facilities. Next slide.

So we also made sure that we wanted to get boots on the ground. So, we did a very grassroots effort. We put flyers and distributed flyers to over twenty-five Riviera Beach businesses and churches. Next slide.

So, what were the.., what were the outcomes? For focus groups, we had over [stammer] forty participants. Next slide. Our teen workshop, which was very successful and fun, we had over twenty-five participants. In our senior focus group, we had over fifteen participants. With our virtual kickoff, we had twenty-eight participants and we completed the eleven stakeholder interviews.

And I'll turn it back over to Joe.

Mr. J. Webb: Thank you, Ann Marie.

 In summary, a very extensive outreach effort and, you know, in, in the end, what we heard was a little, a little surprising but maybe not if we think about it. What we heard from a lot of people through the virtual engagement was, some things, park accessibility, greenways and trails, improve existing parks. These are some of the common themes we heard through that process.

Our virtual engagement was actually very successful in, in our mind. It isn't uncommon, you know, even pre-COVID, for me to have more staff at a public meeting than, than people that participate. I mean, we try very hard to turn people out to meetings. Here, through our virtual engagement platform, we had over 4,000 people visit our website and, you know, view the information.

You know, I would've expected maybe four hundred. Here, 4,188 people engaged, fifty comments. Really, you know, giving [inaudible] very successful outreach.

- **Chairperson Lanier:** So, so, I'm sorry. What.., so, what website was that? The 4,000 visits? That was the site about the Plan itself?
- **Mr. J. Webb**: Yeah.
- 3339 Chairperson Lanier: Oh.
- **Mr. J. Webb:** Right.
- 3341 Chairperson Lanier: Okay.
- **Mr. J. Webb:** Right. So, there was certainly a lot of interest. And, and Ann Marie
- eluded to it that, you know, teens and seniors were both equally as engaged. The teens
- are a ton of fun. You know, just quick and...
- 3345 [Inaudible comment]

- **Mr. J. Webb:** Yeah. So, we really got a lotta people focusing in on it, and having a lotta fun with it. But, you know, the focus groups, all of these different groups participating in
- the process, on top of the virtual public engagement.

What we heard from all these people and what we try to do is listen in multiple different ways, and look for those things that come to convergence. You know, improvements to existing parks, a need for multipurpose, multigenerational facilities, more walking trails, education and wellness. You know, those are different themes than might, might have been what was expected, but very much also in, in concert with, I would say state and national trends.

We're hearing things like this more in Parks & Recreation where there's a real focus on health and wellness. There, there's certainly issues of other things. People still want to play. That doesn't take anything away from, you know, your very, very good sports and.., I guess, society are changing. People are more interested in health and wellness, there's a different.., it might've been also COVID, has made us.., parks more valuable to people. That ideas of health and wellness are more important. But this is what we heard. Our stakeholders also improved existing facilities. Again.., so, there's themes that have started to evolve here.

Additional park amenities and facilities, increasing diversity or programming. I heard that repeatedly from almost every group across the board. So, same with our online survey. I mean, we had a great number of [stammer] people participating in the online survey. High level of satisfaction with the existing facilities and programs.

- But again, this desire for a broader base and maybe more noncompetitive,
- nontraditional activities, what I like to call at will recreation. Where people can walk and
- bike and access the parks, get together, socialize. So, not, not the competitive sports.
- Not to take away from those, but that.., what's missing, according to the residents we
- heard from, are those things.
- So, statistical survey. This is always one where we rely heavily on it, because we
- get very accurate results. It, it allows us to quantify eighty-seven percent of people said
- this, thirty-four said that. So, top priorities, again, walking...
- 3375 **Chairperson Lanier:** So, so let me ask a question right quick.
- 3376 **Mr. J. Webb:** Yeah.
- 3377 **Chairperson Lanier:** I, I, I got one of those surveys. So, you said you sent out how
- many, and got back how many?
- 3379 **Mr. J. Webb:** Six hundred.
- 3380 Chairperson Lanier: And how many you got back?
- 3381 **Mr. J. Webb:** Pardon?
- 3382 Chairperson Lanier: How many did you get back?
- 3383 **Mr. J. Webb:** Six hundred back. We only count, really, what comes back. We have to
- go through.., I think we sent out almost six thousand.
- 3385 Chairperson Lanier: Oh, so you got six hundred back?
- 3386 **Mr. J. Webb:** Right.
- 3387 Chairperson Lanier: Oh. Excellent.
- 3388 **Mr. J. Webb:** I think.., and it's, it's never simple but I think around six thousand went out
- in three separate [inaudible].
- 3390 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yeah. That, that thing was long, it had.., it asked two
- thousand questions [inaudible] in it. [Chuckle].
- 3392 Mr. J. Webb: [Chuckle].
- 3393 **Chairperson Lanier:** But it was..., but that's good you got that many back.
- 3394 **Mr. J. Webb:** Yeah.
- 3395 Chairperson Lanier: Excellent.
- 3396 **Mr. J. Webb:** And we keep going until we get the statistically valid number. And it
- 3397 actually extended our schedule a little because we weren't getting the accurate number
- 3398 across. So...

- 3399 Chairperson Lanier: Right.
- 3400 **Mr. J. Webb:** ...we'll keep going until we get a hundred [inaudible].
- 3401 Chairperson Lanier: Excellent.
- 3402 **Mr. J. Webb:** And, it took a while. And, yeah, they say fifteen to twenty minutes. But I
- 3403 think...
- 3404 Chairperson Lanier: No. It...
- 3405 Mr. J. Webb: [Chuckle].
- 3406 **Chairperson Lanier:** No. It took forty-five minutes at least.
- 3407 **Mr. J. Webb:** We often struggle because we wanna ask as many questions as possible.
- 3408 But I'm grateful that you answered it.
- 3409 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yeah.
- 3410 **Mr. J. Webb:** Did you find it...
- 3411 Chairperson Lanier: I mean, it was, it was kind of.., it just was long. It wasn't
- difficult, it was just, just long to, to, to complete. But it was worth it though, because, I
- 3413 see a lot of responses came back.
- 3414 **Mr. J. Webb:** And, and obviously, look, it's again, walking, sidewalks......
- 3415 Chairperson Lanier: Uhuh.
- 3416 **Mr. J. Webb:** ...nature parks, picnic areas. You know, we break it up, usually by
- facilities and activities. You know? Somewhat to ask the question.., similar questions in
- different ways, 'til we get the right... It's consistent.
- 3419 Chairperson Lanier: Yeah.
- 3420 **Mr. J. Webb:** You're hearing things that are not, you need twelve more basketball courts
- or this. You know, it's funny, those were on there but, you know, way down the list.
- 3422 **Chairperson Lanier:** Mhmm.
- 3423 **Mr. J. Webb:** So, I think this is indictive of, honestly, what I've seen over the last.., kind
- of evolving over the last five years, or even ten years, where it's a little different than my
- 3425 generation. My generation different than my parents' generation. As a lifestyle, as
- people, you know, what we do for fun are often what I call at will. We walk and bike and
- canoe and kayak and do things less rigid on a schedule.
- 3428 City Clerk Anthony: Madam Chair?
- 3429 Chairperson Lanier: Yes.
- 3430 **City Clerk Anthony:** Members of the Board, the time is now 9:53.

- 3431 Councilperson Botel: I make a motion that we extend the meeting until it's
- 3432 completed.
- 3433 Chairperson Lanier: Second.
- 3434 City Clerk Anthony: Cou'...
- 3435 **Mr. J. Webb:** Okay.
- 3436 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson McCoy? [Pause]. Councilperson Botel?
- 3437 Councilperson Botel: Yes.
- 3438 **City Clerk Anthony:** Councilperson Lawson?
- 3439 Councilperson Lawson: Yes.
- 3440 **City Clerk Anthony:** Pro Tem Miller-Anderson?
- 3441 Chair Pro Tem Miller-Anderson: Yes.
- 3442 [Chuckles]
- 3443 **City Clerk Anthony:** Chair Lan'...
- 3444 **Mr. J. Webb:** [Inaudible].
- 3445 **City Clerk Anthony:** Chair Lanier?
- 3446 Chairperson Lanier: Yes. [Chuckle]. Now...
- 3447 **Mr. J. Webb:** I'm very close to the end.
- 3448 **Chairperson Lanier:** We, we... No. We [stammer] we extended the time. Take
- 3449 your time. Present the information to us, because you guys worked hard on this and I
- want us... I wanna know what the residents said about this.
- 3451 **Mr. J. Webb:** Yeah. So, what we tried to do in the end is, you know, we used all these
- different methods across the top. And what we looked for is what keeps boiling to the
- top? What do we [inaudible]? Every different way we ask, every different group, all these
- similar questions, what are the things that we keep hearing and that keep... people keep
- 3455 identifying as priorities?
- Because we try not to just ask, you know, what do you want? 'Well, I want this, I want that, and I want...' You know, we try to ask want, then, of course, questions that are about need. Then, need versus priority, so that we really hone down people to not just a litany list of a hundred things that might be wanted, but really what is the consensus within the community of what is a need and what is a priority.
- So, I think you've seen it here. When, when you summarizes it out, it's these walking.., walking paths, nature parks, picnic areas. You know, top activities, fitness and

3463 wellness, nature enjoyment. You know, again, history and museums are coming up.

- Performing arts as, again, those things that are high priority, but are not available to people. So, there are things in need and are high priority.
- So, this is kind of your quick summary of what we heard. That may not have been what I guessed. But this is what we heard. So, you know, I think it's.., we got.., what we really look for is convergence, where, you know, we'd like to see that everything kind of points in the same direction. It's not scattered. So, when I hear it in a statistical survey, I heard it in focus groups, I got it back in my virtual meetings. It's pretty true to me that this is what people are saying that is priority. If that makes sense.

So again, this is kind of a mid-point check in, just to, you know, catch you all up. I know COVID has definitely put some stops and starts in our work, but, you know, bringing you all up to speed on what we've been doing so far. Here we are. You know, we're, we're meeting here in June to kind of report out on our, our findings from our inventory and analysis. And report what we heard from the public. We'll be moving forward with kind of a visioning. Okay, how do we get there? And then, ultimately, come back to you with a draft Plan that also lays out some steps for implementation. So.

- 3479 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you.
- 3480 **Mr. J. Webb:** Certainly, your patience and perseverance is appreciated. Happy to answer any questions you may have or anything else that we could...
- Chairperson Lanier: Yes. Thank you for that presentation because when I did the survey, I can tell that you were gonna drill down to find the information about what people actually really wanted. And I.., and, and looking at this and seeing that, you know, people are actually wanting nature trails and being able to enjoy nature in the City, that's, that's a plus.
- I thank you for the.., for, for the work. We appreciate it.
- 3488 Any questions from the Board? For the, for the consultants?
- 3489 **Councilperson Botel:** Madam... Just.., Madam Chair?
- 3490 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yes. Go ahead.
- 3491 **Councilperson Botel:** Thank you. No, just thank you for your work. It was interesting
- to see people's reactions. I had the same thoughts as Chair Lanier. You know, it took a
- 3493 long time but it was worth it.
- 3494 [Chuckles]
- 3495 **Chairperson Lanier:** Yeah. It was.
- 3496 **Mr. J. Webb:** Well, and we're moving ahead now. So, I guess that's the important thing.
- 3497 **Chairperson Lanier:** Thank you so much for your presentation.
- 3498 Any other questions?

3499 Thank you...

- 3500 Parks & Recreation Director Blankenship: Thank you.
- **Chairperson Lanier:** ... [inaudible] for your presentation as well.
- **Councilperson Botel:** Mr. Blankenship..
- **Chairperson Lanier:** I'm sorry. Mr. Blankenship. Mr. Blankenship, thank you.
- 3504 [Chuckle].

DISCUSSION BY THE CITY MANAGER

- **Chairperson Lanier:** Discussion by the City Manager.
- Yes, Madam Chair. Just very briefly in regards to the City Manager Evans: presentation. As you see that there is a lot of desire as it relates to recreational open space, passive parks, opportunities for folks to go out and recreate, that certainly is something that should be considered when you look at the densities and intensities that we will be looking at, as it relates to development within the Broadway/Blue Heron corridor. Because, in order to preserve the land and to provide the opportunities to create some of those linear parks so you don't' have a, you know, a canyon feel or you have a situation where the buildings over tower some of the natural beauty that we have in our community, is you create for those density bonuses associated with some of the amenities that were discussed today.

So certainly, when we do have that conversation with Treasure Coast, some of the themes that you've seen here this evening, will be incorporated in some of those discussion.

Also, with the survey that we put out as it relates to the community value survey, I think we've got roughly about a thousand responses thus far, that will be shared as part of your budget discussions. So, this is coming together at the right time. So, if the Board does want to look at placing some monies to address some of the items that's contained in this study, that will be part of your budget discussions to have the conversation amongst yourselves, as to how do we prioritize from a recreational offering perspective, to address some of these.., these things that were articulated in the in the study.., or, in the survey. So, I, I did wanna bring the attention to the Board on that particular matter.

I did wanna inform the Board that I will be out of the office starting this evening, after this meeting, and returning back on Tuesday. I'll be at the Florida City County Management Association's annual conference. And so, in my absence, Deputy City Manager McBride will be running day to day operations. And I will be available via email and telephone if you have any questions.

And, I also would like to express my condolences to Ms. Gwen on the loss of her grandmother.
