EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR JONATHAN EVANS: Madam

Chair and members of the Board, if I can have

Ms. Kristen Hicks from the CRA and Mr. Scott Evans make
this presentation. I mean Annetta Jenkins. I'm sorry.

CHAIR LANIER: Food truck pilot update.

The acceptance of public comment cards is now closed.

MS. HICKS: Good evening, Madam Chair and Commissioners. It's a pleasure to speak in front of you guys this evening. My name is Kristen Hicks, and I'm here to give you an update on the pilot program for our Thursday Tastes of Riviera Beach Food Truck Series.

Today we're going to update you on the process, the approval and the kickoff of the Thursday Tastes of Riviera Beach Series pilot program. We'll go through the outreach, marketing of the series, food truck interest, feeding and how the conversations happen there, how the vendors were selected and the recap of the last event we had on September the 16th. We'll want to review a little bit about what the pilot program consists of.

So what happened was at the Board meeting on August the 26th, you guys voted four to one in approval

to move forward with the pilot series. The program consists of three dates. The first one was September the 16th, the next is October the 21st, and then November 18th at the Spanish Courts and Riviera Beach Marina.

The marketing for the program is as follows. The series was marketed under both the CRA and City websites' social media. It was also marketed on TV 18. Eventbrite events were created, and newsletters from the CRA and the City went out to all residents that had signed up for the newsletters.

and the food truck events were posted on the CRA and City websites. Facebook and LinkedIn events were created, and press releases to the local media went out. Flyers were posted on multiple Facebook groups, and printed flyers were left at multiple City buildings. Events were put on the calendars for additional different websites, as Discover the Palm Beaches, North Chamber of Commerce, Munchkin Fun and various others.

The interest meeting was where we had them come to the Event Center, and that was on September 9th at 4:00 p.m. We reached out before that to Development Services to get their list of trucks that they already

have and e-mailed them the flyer. And then we also reached out to anyone that had their interest at the City Council meeting to make sure that they got the information. We distributed the interest flyer on all of our social media platforms that you saw previously. Trucks were e-mailed about their interest, and we asked them before the meeting on September 9th to provide their business tax receipt and their liability insurance to us.

When we had the meeting, we gave them a packet of information of all the details we needed, including our sign-in sheet, and we had 11 trucks attend this meeting. And any trucks that had their interest that were unable to attend and had e-mailed us, we e-mailed the packet the next day to them.

Development Services and Finance helped us fast track the business tax license process for the first event and did a phenomenal job.

So the selection process, this is how we selected the trucks. So it was based on the packets, receiving back their sign-up sheet, their business tax receipt, or if they had submitted for fast tracking for the event to our Finance, liability insurance and a mixture of the food for variety at the actual event.

The number of trucks were placed based on the

attendance. So for our first event, we had four.

So we wanted to give a brief recap of what happened at the event itself. So on September the 17th we had Tastes of Rivera Beach food truck event, and that night was a really bad rainstorm. So thankfully we still had people come out, and they came out underneath their umbrellas and they enjoyed the event. We had an attendance of about 50 people that came out, and food trucks were still able to make some form of a profit during it.

We had media coverage on Channel 5 News,
Channel 10 and Channel 25. And these stations, they
came out in the rain to do interviews on site. We had
placement in multiple newsletters, also through press,
on television, and it was also listed in the Miami
Events and Festivals Newsletter.

So the event is set for an environment of fun, good food and entertainment. And so we had a ten piece band called N2Nation who were unable to perform due to the rain. They had actually set up, did all of their preset, and unfortunately, once the event started, the rain started.

We had four food trucks. We had giant games for kids to play, Uno, chess, checkers and Jenga, had picnic tables for people to sit at, bistro lighting to

create a relaxed ambiance, and free parking there. The Riviera Beach Police were out there to help direct traffic and also help people park, and they even were so wonderful and had umbrellas to take people to the food trucks. And some of the trucks stayed through the entire event. We only had one leave before the end.

So for our future events, in October, on October 21st we'll be featuring a jazz guitarist for the entertainment. Each event will have the giant games for kids to play, picnic tables for people to eat, the bistro lighting, the free parking and five to seven food trucks.

And for our November event, we are planning for a local DJ for entertainment, and we have already reached out to multiple media entities, such as paper, television and radio, with our press release so that we can hopefully have them come out again to the event and hopefully not have weather this time.

So with all of that said, we want to invite everybody to come out to the event on Thursday, October the 21st, which is next Thursday, from 5:30 to 7:30 at the Spanish Courts at Marina Village. And we're here to take any questions you guys have.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: Madam Chair.

CHAIR LANIER: Yes, go ahead.

1 COMMISSIONER McCOY: Thank you. 2 Ms. Hicks, I was the one person that didn't 3 support it because you guys didn't have a budget. 4 would hope that we've gotten the budget, and if so, can 5 you give us some of those numbers? 6 MS. HICKS: For the permanent structure, 7 correct? 8 COMMISSIONER McCOY: No, just for the event 9 altogether. 10 MS. HICKS: For the temporary event? 11 COMMISSIONER McCOY: Yes. I mean we had a 12 band. I mean, obviously, there's police coverage. Ι 13 mean I think I want to kind of understand exactly what 14 was spent out and what should we expect that's going to 15 be --16 MS. HICKS: Sure. So our total budget for 17 all three events is \$8,000, total. 18 COMMISSIONER McCOY: Inclusive of the band 19 and police? 2.0 MS. HICKS: Yes, sir. 21 COMMISSIONER McCOY: Okay. So I quess going 22 forward, do we have any measurables as to perhaps not 23 dollars, but how many attendees supported each 24 individual business? 25 So unfortunately, due to MS. HICKS: Yes.

the rain last time, we were only able to survey two people. But our goal is when we're there, to be able to count and measure by having a six question survey for the public to write down their information so that we can get their feedback for any type of future events, if you guys agree and proceed to go to the next level of this.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: Okay. Lastly, I guess I was speaking in terms of the actual food trucks. If they had 40 customers, that's 40 more than they would have had. So at least going forward, is that something that we can look at perhaps keeping track of so that way we can know that, you know, we've served, you know, on this Thursday night 200 people which we would have not normally, you know, had that, I guess, impression or contact with?

MS. HICKS: Definitely. So we are going to definitely survey them, and we'll get the numbers to you guys also.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: And the reason is when you eat food, I don't know how genuine folks are going to be with doing a survey. Maybe they're too full or maybe not even interested. So at least from those vendors that are benefiting, we can kind of know how many, you know, families or customers that they've

1 touched. 2. MS. HICKS: We will definitely. 3 COMMISSIONER McCOY: Thanks. CHAIR LANIER: Are there any other questions 4 5 in regards to this item? 6 Are there any plans to expand the number of 7 food trucks? 8 MS. HICKS: For the pilot series or for later 9 on? 10 CHAIR LANIER: Either one. 11 MS. HICKS: So right now we're looking at 12 having five to seven for this next event. Depending on 13 the attendance, that's where we can go even larger, 14 depending on if we need more trucks. 15 CHAIR LANIER: Very good. Thank you. Thank 16 you for your presentation. 17 MS. JENKINS: Thank you. 18 MS. HICKS: Thank you. 19 CHAIR LANIER: Our next item on the agenda is 20 number three, Madam Clerk. 21 THE CLERK: Resolution authorizing the 22 approval of Commercial Grant Incentive Program for 23 round four, totaling \$236,087, to assist local 24 businesses to complete external improvements to 25 businesses located in the Community Redevelopment

1 Agency area.

The acceptance of public comment cards is now closed.

VICE CHAIR MILLER-ANDERSON: So moved.

COMMISSIONER BOTEL: Second.

CHAIR LANIER: Mr. Evans.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR JONATHAN EVANS: Madam Chair and members of the Board, if I can have the Director of Planning and Development Services, Mr. Scott Evans, make this presentation.

MR. SCOTT EVANS: Good evening, Madam Chair and members of the Board.

This item is to complete property improvements for our local businesses that are in the Community Redevelopment area. And on November 12th of last year the CRA Board updated the scoring criteria for this program and approved the new application process going forward. And this allowed all of the existing businesses who are located in the CRA to apply for that current round of funding to make improvements to their properties and their building.

In that current round of the applications, we received eight for our Property Improvement Incentive Program. And this program provides \$40,000, up to \$40,000 to any local business owner who wants to invest

that in their project. And it requires a match, so it's a four to one match. So for every dollar that the local business owner puts into the improvement, the CRA matches that at a four to one ratio, up to a maximum of 40,000.

And this program has resulted in various improvements that have happened previously during our previous rounds. This is -- I'll show a few of the before and afters of some of the success of this project.

This is the Integrated Care located at 31st Street -- I mean, sorry -- 31 West 20th Street, and this was the before picture. And they did a signs package, they painted the building, added some aluminum fencing. And you can see the after, after those minor improvements. This particular one cost about 32,000, total.

This is the Get Wet business, and they're located on 237 East Blue Heron, which is the south side of Blue Heron, just west of the Blue Heron bridge. And they installed all new metal roofing, some landscaping improvements and paint. And this is the before picture. And this project turned out very nice. You can see the after picture (audio disruption) made a significant aesthetic improvement to the building.

1 COMMISSIONER BOTEL: Madam Chair.

CHAIR LANIER: Yes, go ahead.

COMMISSIONER BOTEL: Did we require them to use a particular color scheme or anything, or we just let them do what they wanted to do?

MR. SCOTT EVANS: For each application, before they are permitted to proceed, they have to apply for their building permits. And at that time the CRA reviews what they're proposing to do, and then we give them authorization to proceed. So we don't direct the type of colors that they use, but we review them before they proceed.

COMMISSIONER BOTEL: Thank you.

MR. SCOTT EVANS: This was the Boat Owners
Warehouse, which was located on the east side of
Broadway. And they made some major upgrades to their
property, from signage to the entire exterior of the
building. And this resulted in quite a significant
improvement of the way the building looks along
Broadway. It had been many years before it had
received any improvements. And this project cost
\$131,352, and the CRA provided a \$40,000 grant for it.

And the last one that was approved by the CRA Board was to provide \$40,000 for the complete building and site renovation for the Busch Canvas Shop. And

this is the before picture, seen above, and the after picture is below. And that project took a very small, older commercial building and made significant expansion and renovations to the project.

COMMISSIONER BOTEL: Madam Chair.

CHAIR LANIER: Yes, go ahead.

COMMISSIONER BOTEL: Just wanted to say I stopped in to visit them the other day, and they've done a fantastic job with that space. And they're looking to hire, in case anybody's interested in being trained in the canvas making business -- not making, but utilizing for upholstery. And it's a women owned business. They've been in business since 1965 and they're happy with their new location.

So thank you.

VICE CHAIR MILLER-ANDERSON: Madam Chair.

CHAIR LANIER: Yes, go ahead.

VICE CHAIR MILLER-ANDERSON: What was the total of their project? Do you know?

MR. SCOTT EVANS: I don't have the total, because it was such a large project. When they applied, they only applied for, I think approximately \$80,000 because it was just a component. So I didn't provide that number because I'm not sure of the entire cost of the project, but it was well into the hundreds

of thousands of dollars.

VICE CHAIR MILLER-ANDERSON: Okay, thank you.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: So can you clarify?

They applied for 80?

MR. SCOTT EVANS: Yes. Originally in the round, they applied for a series of, I think it was landscaping and exterior improvements that were just part of their overall project. So we only had the data on just that one aspect that they wanted to add to their project, but we didn't have the total data on the whole site renovation and expansion. But our investment was a very small component of that total overall improvement.

All the grant applications in this round were reviewed and scored by myself, Andre Lewis, our Project -- former Project Manager, and Scott Evans, Planning and Development Director, and our Director of Neighborhood Services, Annetta Jenkins.

The Board selected Commissioner Douglas

Lawson to assist us with this program, and Mr. Lawson

participated in the review of the submitted

applications.

Applications were scored based on the underwriting criteria that the Board, this Board approved back in November, and the purpose of the

scoring is it was implemented in order, one, to make sure that a project meets the minimum criteria for funding, but the primary reason was in previous rounds we received more applications than the funding that was available. So we implemented the scoring criteria in order to provide the Board a ranking of the projects in case there were more projects submitted than the available funds that we had.

The total request for this round did not exceed our available funding, so we are -- CRA staff is recommending that all the grant requests are approved.

We received eight applications, for a total of \$236,087. And applications were received from Atkins Day Care, which is located on 10th Street just east of Australian Avenue. And their request is for improvements to their playground surfacing, ADA accessibility improvements to the exterior, painting, exterior lighting, and to replace some of their exterior doors.

The Grator Gator has applied for 40,000 also, and they're looking at also doing ADA accessibility, installing hurricane impact doors and windows, and doing some exterior painting and improvements to their property.

The Crown Square Plaza, which is located on

the northwest corner of 10th Street and Barack Obama Highway, have requested \$40,000 also, and they're looking at doing a variety of improvements, from solar panel installation, hurricane shutters, irrigation, signage and exterior painting enhancements.

There's a small commercial building on the east side of Broadway just north of 28th Street who is requesting to make stucco repair and replacement, some painting, parking lot improvements, and to do some external power and electrical needed for their site.

And that's from Gem Keen Realty at 2826 Broadway. They have requested \$29,841.

The Vilijo Coin Laundry, which is located right at the base of the Blue Heron bridge, and they're looking for a grant of \$32,000. And they're looking to make major changes to the exterior of their building, so they're looking at exterior painting, installing an awning, doing some landscaping, enhancing their parking lot and adding security, exterior lighting and fixing -- replacing, rather, their sign.

And Sea Shell City has requested a grant of \$27,000. And their property, this would be used to repaint all of the exterior, install a new mural. When that -- a new building was built adjacent to it and expanded, then their mural that they had installed

became damaged as a result, because it was only partial, and they repainted it, sort of. But so that would add a new mural at the same time as repainting the building, and they would also make improvements to their parking lot and make ADA improvements for access to their business.

Easton Boat Works has requested \$17,000, and this would be for exterior fencing. Easton Boat Works is located on Avenue C, across from Marina Village, and they're looking to install security fencing on their property. And they're looking at installing the decorative aluminum type fencing, which would enhance the appeal of the project.

And the last grant request we received was for \$8,532 from Guacamoles Restaurant, and they're located at 1281 Plaza Circle. And they're looking at doing a new, very large awning that would enhance the look of their building. And their building's right across the street from the gas station, right beside the Grator Gator on the south side of -- just south of Blue Heron, rather.

As a component of the requested grants, we do a series of things to ensure that the applicants maintain compliance and complete the projects accordingly. They have to apply for and receive

building permits for all of their improvements, and they cannot apply for reimbursement until they get approvals on inspections for those improvements that go through the Building Department.

Each applicant is required to sign a grant agreement. This ensures that the improvements are completed in one year and that they're maintained for a period of 60 months.

And additionally, we require a promissory note. And this document holds the grantee or business owner liable if the terms of the agreement are broken and the Agency must seek legal remedy.

And prior to the execution of the individual grant agreements, the CRA will hire an independent contractor to review the scope of work and confirm that the proposed cost is consistent with the planned improvements. And we implemented this during the last round, and that worked very well.

Once the applicants put all of their application together for the Building Department to make their submittal, we were then able to review those plans and have a third party contractor look at them to ensure that the dollars that are invested on behalf of the CRA are being appropriately spent and that the cost for the projects are equal to what the market is at the

1 time.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: Madam Chair.

CHAIR LANIER: Yes, go ahead.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: So speak to that a little further, Mr. Evans. You said you had a third party. Is that -- who is that party, and is that also included in the budget going forward, because I see there's a --

MR. SCOTT EVANS: Yes, we have professional services funds that we use for that. Those costs range between 500 and \$1,000 per project. And we get three bids from local contractors to do the work. And I think only in one case we did find that the costs weren't exactly what we felt was fair, so we took the bid from the third party contractor and offered that as the grant. But that one did not proceed.

And so we would propose to do that for all of these applicants before they receive their building permit and permission to proceed for the grant related improvements.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: Mr. Evans, let me ask you, you said anywhere from 500 to \$1,000 per project. Are we speaking of per applicant or per round?

It's per applicant,

depending on the scope of their project. So a lot of

MR. SCOTT EVANS:

1 these projects cost between 50 and \$100,000, and so we 2 need a contractor to look over all of the items, 3 understand them, and then prepare a bid and a pricing 4 for it. And obviously, that's professional work done 5 by those contractors, not for the purposes of getting 6 the work, but for ensuring that we have a fair price. 7 COMMISSIONER McCOY: And lastly, is it one 8 person, or do we have a pool of third party contractors 9 that do the estimation service? 10 MR. SCOTT EVANS: For all of the projects, we 11 submit it to the pool of contractors. 12 COMMISSIONER McCOY: Okay. All right, thank 13 you. 14 MR. SCOTT EVANS: Staff recommends approval 15 of the eight commercial grant applications. The fiscal 16 budget, which was approved, included \$250,000 to fund 17 this round of commercial grants, and so the funding is

COMMISSIONER McCOY: So, Madam Chair.

CHAIR LANIER: Yes, go ahead.

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and thank you.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: I think it's a great program, and I like it. I see that we had about \$13,900, I guess, left over. And I guess that just kind of ended up that way, that we were right under the

available. And I'm here to answer any Board questions,

1 | 250,000 that was budgeted for?

MR. SCOTT EVANS: Yes, sir.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: And it was just those eight applicants?

MR. SCOTT EVANS: Yes. This is all the applicants that we received.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: Okay. Well, that's good. I guess I would just -- I don't know how this works, but going forward, if there's dollars left over, instead of going into professional services, it would really make sense that if we're going to have an estimator review these plans, it should likely come out of this budget as well.

That's just, I think, not a bad idea going forward, because -- and I guess here's a better question. What does it mean to have a round, because the 2020 resolution shows that that was round four as well. Are these not done by each fiscal year?

MR. SCOTT EVANS: They're done by fiscal year. The projects take quite a bit of time from the time that we offer the opportunity for them to apply. Then they put their applications together, then they submit them with the bids from the contractors, which is the most lengthy part. And then they're evaluated and finally approved by this Board.

So the approved budget has new dollars for a new round that we would hope to bring back to the Board in the next CRA Board meeting. And the approved budget also included the funding from the previous round, since that opportunity was made available to business owners and we were processing their applications. So this year's budget included both the funds rolled over from the previous year and funds to issue a new round.

And per our discussions in November of last year, we no longer are holding applicants who exceed the one year that they have to proceed with the project. Any applicant who has not initiated to move forward, those grants have been rescinded. They were already canceled, since the grant agreement was not completed.

Because previous -- in previous years we had grants that we were holding open in case the business owner moved forward. And during our discussions in November and previously, the Board had indicated that they wanted to make sure that those funds were utilized. So we are holding funds for this round, but there's no other round that we're holding funds for for projects that did not begin.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: Madam Chair.

CHAIR LANIER: Yes, go ahead.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: So are we sure in those situations, Mr. Evans, that these are, I guess, businesses that are holding over for some reason of their own and not some delay in the permitting department, correct?

MR. SCOTT EVANS: Yes. We reach out to these applicants. Most of the ones that didn't proceed didn't even complete a grant agreement. So they got the grant, but then decided not to sign an agreement and move forward with the project.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: Okay. So what did we, if you know or recall, and if you don't, it's fine, what do you remember that we rolled over from last year as far as funds?

MR. SCOTT EVANS: Yes, well, the entire amount for this round was what we rolled over, plus one grant is for -- I forget the name of it, but there's a church located just off of Avenue E, and they were in the permitting process and trying to get information from the contractor. And they had started work, so they were part way through. So that's the only one that was underway that wasn't completely reimbursed in the previous year.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: Okay, thank you.

CHAIR LANIER: Any other questions in regards

1 to this item? 2 Madam Clerk. 3 THE CLERK: Commissioner McCoy. 4 COMMISSIONER McCOY: Yes. 5 THE CLERK: Commissioner Botel. THE CLERK: Chair Lanier. 10 CHAIR LANIER: Yes. 11 THE CLERK: Motion carries. 12 CHAIR LANIER: Madam Clerk, next item. 13 THE CLERK: Small Business Incubator Program. 14 CHAIR LANIER: Mr. Evans. 15 The acceptance of public comment THE CLERK: 16 cards is now closed. 17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR JONATHAN EVANS: 18 Chair and members of the Board, if I can have the 19 Director of Neighborhood Services, Ms. Annetta Jenkins, 20 make this presentation. 21 MS. JENKINS: Good evening, Madam Chair, 22 Madam Pro Tem and Commissioners. 23 I am here to go through a proposed program 24 that we've mentioned during our budget season, and it's 25 here for you all to hopefully provide some comment and

feedback. And at a subsequent meeting we'd like to bring the full program to you to approve, hopefully.

Before you is the Small Business Incubator
Program. We know that small businesses are the
backbone of our local economy. And as we embark upon
expanded and new economic development opportunities
here in the City of Riviera Beach, we need to ensure
that we have excellent small business support for our
various businesses, entrepreneurs, et cetera, by
offering incentives similar to what you've just heard,
capacity building, training and removal of barriers for
growth.

What you have included in your packet is a description of staff's work and taking into account comments and suggestions from this Board over the last few months.

We're proposing that we have a program that will be offered to businesses interested in participating within the CRA, located in the CRA for pop-up opportunities, et cetera.

The types of business uses or types of businesses that would be eligible would be restaurants, bakeries, insurance offices, gourmet food markets, and there is a list that's included in the packet, including marketing offices, accounting, small

boutiques, real estate offices, hair and nail salons, take-out restaurants, florists and medical offices, similar to other programs that we've presented over the last few years.

Ineligible businesses that we would proffer would be things like businesses that sell firearms, or a shooting range, religious affiliated retail stores, adult gaming arcades, liquor stores and bars, adult entertainment, vapor cigarette stores, convenience stores, discount stores, churches and places of worship, alcohol or drug rehab centers or housing for same; home based businesses would be ineligible; and any other use that the CRA staff or Board determines will not support the redevelopment of the area.

The program, as I said, would be open for emerging or entrepreneurial participants for up to three years of support. The submitter must ensure that the proposed enterprise complies with all City ordinances that apply within the CRA District. And that will pertain to property location, the square footage of the building, et cetera.

The proposer should provide a comprehensive business plan during the process that clearly explains the vision of the business, a complete SWOT analysis, which is strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and

threats, and how the business venture will be successful in the aforementioned location.

Financial verification. The proposer will be prepared to furnish documentation so that the business financials can be verified. And as part of the program, the successful applicant will be required to participate and successfully complete our business rating certification program and training through the CRA, or similar types of programs that are offered, within one year of application.

And there would be, depending upon the type of opportunity that we're moving forward with, it would either be through an RFP process or a mini application process. For instance, we heard a presentation on food trucks. We might very well want to incentivize expansion of our food truck program and offer some small business support.

We would want to encourage some of our businesses operating in the Tiki Market perhaps to expand into a brick and mortar type of location. We know that we're going to have several live/work lofts that we hope to attract some small businesses on our Broadway corridor, so those emerging businesses might be eligible for this particular program.

So I'll stop there and just see if there is

any feedback or comments on the proposed program, and we would take that and then bring back a complete set of guidelines and applications for you.

CHAIR LANIER: So what's the budget for this program?

MS. JENKINS: The budget that was set aside and that was just approved is a total of \$115,000 for this year, for this fiscal year. And if we're able to move ahead, we're proposing to bring back the item either at the November or December meeting and launch the program shortly after approval.

COMMISSIONER BOTEL: Madam Chair.

CHAIR LANIER: Yes, go ahead.

COMMISSIONER BOTEL: So are we looking to -I probably have misread it or something, but I just
want to know, are we looking to provide a space, as we
did with the one on Broadway, the original incubator
that we did? So we're looking for -- it's like the
Miami Subs, for example?

MS. JENKINS: We might very well provide space. There may be an emerging business that -- where they have their own space and they're looking for some help with build-out or marketing or equipment, et cetera. So it would depend upon the --

COMMISSIONER BOTEL: Case by case.

1 MS. JENKINS: On a case by case basis. 2 COMMISSIONER BOTEL: How's the one on 3 Broadway doing? 4 Doing very well. From all of MS. JENKINS: 5 the marketing outreach and the feedback that we've 6 received, the business is doing very well. We're very 7 proud of it. 8 COMMISSIONER BOTEL: And how long did we --9 how long is that pilot extending? 10 MS. JENKINS: Three years. 11 COMMISSIONER BOTEL: So she's been in there, 12 what, a year and a half? 13 MS. JENKINS: Not quite. January 2022 will 14 be one year. 15 COMMISSIONER BOTEL: Okay, thank you. 16 MS. JENKINS: I want to also mention that 17 we've looked around and had some preliminary 18 conversations with potential partners, and I listed 19 them in the write-up, where we'd be looking to work 20 with the Office of Equal Business Opportunity, with the 21 County, the Black Business Investment Corporation, the 22 Black Chamber of Commerce, the Florida Hispanic 23 American Chamber of Commerce, Community Partners of 24 South Florida, Florida State Minority Supplier 25 Development Council, the National Development Council

with their small business arm, various small business
lenders, profit and not-for-profit, and various CDFIs
in our area.

So if there's any feedback or reaction or input?

CHAIR LANIER: All right, very good.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: Question.

CHAIR LANIER: Yes, go ahead, sir.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: I think it's great. You know, I was really looking. I think this captures all, especially I can't tell you how many times folks ask the question of is the City or the CRA doing anything to help small or starting businesses, and you know, I think this is a great program.

I just want to, I guess, ask the question.

It says the business can be in operation -- can only be in operation for less than three years. And I guess my only thinking in that is it's a great program to be an incubator and that's just what it is, it's an incubator. But you know, I hope there's a lot of thought process into this, because you want two years of tax returns, but I don't want someone coming in here with just an idea that don't have a real viable plan forward.

So obviously, you know, that first year is

going to be, I imagine, probably one of the most difficult or challenging ones, but I just don't want anyone to have just a great idea and expect that they meet all the other criteria, that they can just be able to get a free ride for three years.

So I just hope that there is a little more consideration in that, because I mean if you make it past one year, I think you're doing good; two years, you're on your way. But you may have somebody that's at that three year mark, and I don't want to close the door on them, but, you know, it's almost -- it's a delicate balancing act.

But I appreciate the overall program and what you want to do. I think it's a great idea, especially given where we are. And then obviously, if we move forward with the Blue Lagoon and we do the self-financing -- and I don't know what we're going to do with that. I think we're still out on that. But I think if those spaces come online, this is a good template to use in those other two spaces if that's the direction that we choose to go. But that's just my only feedback.

Thank you, Ms. --

MS. JENKINS: Thank you, sir.

COMMISSIONER McCOY: Thank you.

1 CHAIR LANIER: Any other questions in regards 2 to this item? 3 VICE CHAIR MILLER-ANDERSON: No, I think it's 4 a great program if we're able to continue to expand on 5 I was looking -- are you finished with your 6 presentation, or are you still going through some 7 others? 8 MS. JENKINS: I'm done. 9 VICE CHAIR MILLER-ANDERSON: Okav. So I did 10 notice on the -- some more information about the 11 partners where you mentioned the different Chambers, 12 Black Chamber and a few others. And if you could add 13 the Palm Beach Chamber North on there, because Riviera 14 Beach, I know Dr. Botel and I, and sometimes Mr. Lawson 15 participate in their meetings and their committees, so 16 they're always trying to make sure that Riviera Beach 17 is included. So make sure that we reach out to them as 18 well. Thank you. 19 CHAIR LANIER: Madam Clerk. 2.0 THE CLERK: Commissioner McCoy. 2.1 COMMISSIONER McCOY: Yes

That's a pure policy decision that the 21 Board would consider. But we are going to look to 22 bring that item back for your consideration at your 23 meeting in November, to get direction from the Board.

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solicitation for that, you would have to conceivably make the same type of concession, and maybe more so just based on the aggressive nature of the market and what we're seeing. So legal has done some research and has provided that to staff.
